The Story

ACT I

Siegfried, the son born to Sieglinde, dead in child birth, has grown into fearless and savage young manhood under the care of Mime, who has hoped through him to regain the ring from Fafner, guarding the treasure in the form of a dragon. Mime has been unable to forge a sword with which to slay Fafner and, when the curtain rises, is at the forge in another attempt as Siegfried enters, leading a bear, to the dwarf's terror. Siegfried frees the bear, seizes the new sword and breaks it into bits. Questioning Mime, he learns the story of his birth and of the shattered Nothung sword, which he commands Mime to repair. Wotan, as the Wanderer, appears. From him Mime learns that "he who knows no fear" may reforge the Nothung. Siegfried, returning, remakes the sword in his own manner, and with it splits the anvil at a blow.

ACT II

Alberich watches at the Dragon's cave, hoping for a chance to secure the ring. Wotan tells him of Siegfried's approach. Alberich warns Fafner, promising him life in exchange for the ring. But the Dragon promptly refuses. Wotan departs in crashing thunder. As the day dawns Siegfried and Mime arrive. Mime reconnoiters the Dragon's cave while Siegfried, revelling in the awakening life of the forest, attempts to imitate the bird songs. Fafner, aroused by a blast from Siegfried's horn, drags his hideous form from the cave. But Siegfried, unafraid, rushes to the attack and thrusts his sword through the monster's breast. Dying, Fafner warns him against Mime. The taste of the Dragon's blood on his fingers gives Siegfried new power. He can now understand the language of the bird, which bids him remove the treasure, the tarnhelm and the ring. Warned by the bird of a poisoned drink proferred him by Mime, he forthwith slays the dwarf and, led by the bird, hastens to the sleeping Brunnhilde in her circle of fire.

ACT III

Wotan invokes the aid of Erda, the all-knowing, telling her of his hopes for the world's redemption through a new race sprung from the union of Siegfried and Brunnhilde. But she can tell him nothing, referring him to the Norns for knowledge of the future. Already Siegfried approaches. Outside the circle of fire, Wotan bars the youth's way. But with a mighty blow from his god-made sword, Siegfried beats down the pointed spear. Wotan realizing the end of the gods is at hand, makes way as Siegfried, with sounding horn, pursues his climb up the rock upon which Brunnhilde sleeps. (Scene 2) Siegfried arouses the beautiful sleeper with a kiss. Brunnhilde, who had fallen asleep a goddess but now awakens a human, first resents the passion of the kiss. But she cannot resist the tenderness which overcomes her, and abandons herself to the power of love with the coming of the dusk of the Gods.



The Story

PRELUDE

It is night. The Norns spin the golden thread of the world's destiny. But the curse of Alberich snaps the cord. Their power of prophesy is ended, and they descend into the earth. Dawn reveals Siegfried and Brunnhilde emerging from their dwelling. In search of fresh adventure Siegfried, giving Brunnhilde the ring mounts her horse, Grane, and rides off to the Rhine.

ACT I

Gunther and Gutrune talk with their half-brother, Hagen, conceived by Alberich, to regain the ring. Hagen arouses in Gunther a desire for Brunnhilde, in Gutrune a desire for Siegfried. A magic potion will gain their end. Hagen welcomes Siegfried who pledges loyalty to Gunther as Gutrune serves him the draught of oblivion. Siegfried drinks and his love for Brunnhilde forgotten, is enraptured with Gutrune. To gain her, he agrees to help Gunther with Brunnhilde and donning the Tarnhelm, changes himself into Gunther's form. Sped by the scheming Hagen, the two men depart. (Scene 2): Brunnhilde dreams of her absent lover when the Valkyrie, Waltraute, brings her a plea from Wotan to cast the fatal ring into the Rhine. Brunnhilde refuses. At the sound of Siegfried's horn she rushes to meet her lover. But it is Gunther in Siegfried's form. Siegfried, in the guise of Gunther, now appears and, his love forgotten, overpowers Brunnhilde and wrests the ring from her. She is forced into the grotto and in the night Siegfried follows but virtuously lays his naked sword between them.

ACT II

Hagen is asleep. In his dreams Alberich spurs him to renewed effort to secure the ring. With the dawn Siegfried arrives in his own form. He announces the coming of Gutrune and Brunnhilde, and is wedded to Gutrune. On her coming, Brunnhilde declares Siegfried to have wed her with the ring. But Siegfried, his mind a blank, denies. Infuriated, Brunnhilde convinces Gunther that Siegfried has betrayed him and with Hagen they plot his death, setting the time for a hunt on the morrow. They then join in the wedding march of Siegfried and Gutrune.

ACT III

Siegfried, strayed from the hunt to the banks of the river, comes upon the Rhine Maidens. They beg him to give up the ring. He refuses and they predict his death. The huntsmen arrive. Plied by Hagen with another magic potion, Siegfried, his memory returning, tells of his past life and Gunther hears the truth of his passage through the flames and marriage to Brunnhilde. The ravens of Wotan fly overhead. Siegfried turns to look and Hagen plunges a spear into his vulnerable back. (Scene 2): Gutrune, awaiting Siegfried's return, swoons at sight of his dead body. Hagen claims the ring and fatally stabs Gunther who tries to prevent his taking it. Brunnhilde commands a funeral pyre to consume Siegfried's body. With Grane, the horse, she follows her hero into death as the conflagration destroys Valhalla and begins a new world.




