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
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

THE STORY

ACTI

The house of Capulet is en fete. A masked ball is being given for the entrance of Juliet into society. Capulet introduces his daughter to the assembled guests and all leave for the banquet hall. Romeo, Mercutio, Benvolio and others of the Montagues, in mask and bent on youthful frolic, enter. Juliet returns to the ballroom with her nurse, Gertrude. The intruders hide themselves. Gertrude is sent back to the banquet hall and Juliet is about to follow but is restrained by Romeo, entranced by her beauty. It is love at first sight. Their love banter is interrupted by the hotheaded Tybalt. He recognizes Romeo through his mask and denounces him, vowing vengeance. Romeo is about to draw his sword but is cautioned by Mercutio. Tybalt is restrained by Capulet and an open break is averted.

ACT II

Romeo ascends to Juliet's balcony. Juliet comes from her chamber and the long love scene begins. It is interrupted by Gregorio and Capulet retainers who have been warned of an intruder. Finding no one, they depart in anger. The lovers continue in bliss until Gertrude warns of the approaching dawn.

ACT III

Romeo, entering the cell of Friar Laurent, tells of his love for Juliet and their desire for a clandestine marriage. Juliet soon follows and the Friar, seeing in their union a healing of the feud between the two houses, performs the ceremony. (Scene 2) Stephano, in search of Romeo, sings an impudent song before the house of Capulet. It brings Gregorio in fury into the street. Stephano continues his taunting and in the general fighting which follows, both Capulets and Montagues coming upon the scene, Mercutio is wounded by Tybalt, who in turn, is killed by Romeo. The Duke of Verona, with his retinue, arrives. Romeo is sentenced to exile and escaping death only that he fought fairly, vows to see Juliet once more at all hazards.

ACT IV

Romeo has found a way into Capulet's house and comes to bid Juliet goodby. Juliet pardons him the death of Tybalt and their farewells continue throughout the night. (Scene 2) Capulet, with Friar Laurent, comes to tell Juliet that her marriage with Paris must straightway take place. The Friar, when she would protest, cautions Juliet to silence. Capulet departs and the Friar, staying her desperate hand and descending dagger, gives Juliet a phial containing a potion which he tells her will cause a sleep resembling death for two and forty hours and admonishes that she take it at the hour of the marriage.

ACT V

Romeo forces his way into the Capulet vault. Perceiving the body of Juliet on her tomb and believing her dead, he drinks poison. Juliet, effects of the sleeping potion having worn off, arouses. It is too late. Romeo, tottering, tells her of his fatal draught. Juliet, drawing his dagger from its sheath, pierces her breast and the houses of Capulet and Montague are united in death.

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
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

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THE STORY

ACT I

Before departing on a journey, Nilakantha, guardian of the Shrine of Ganesa, leaves Lakmé in charge of attendants, warning them that death will be the fate of any foreigner trespassing in the holy gardens. A party of English gentlemen and their ladies wander to the garden in their sight-seeing and, heedless of the advice of Frederic, break down the frail fence and enter. Gerald, charmed by the spot and intrigued with the story of Nilakantha and Lakmé as told by Frederic, remains to sketch the design of some jewels when the others depart. Surprised by the return of the attendants he conceals himself, but is discovered by Lakmé. Knowing her outcry would summon the guards from the temple, Lakmé hesitates to bring death to the obviously charmed youth and bids him begone. Gerald answers with a passionate outburst of love. Lakmé, deeply affected, finally prevails upon him to leave just as Nilakantha returns, and, finding the fence broken, declares the intruder must die.

ACT II

Nilakantha knows that the invaders of the holy grounds could be found in the bazaar. Disguised as a beggar, he brings Lakmé thither in the belief that the stranger would recognize her by sight or sound of voice and betray his presence. He orders Lakmé to sing. A crowd gathers, but Gerald is not among them. Nilakantha commands Lakmé to sing again. Gerald, now attracted by the voice, draws near. Their startled recognition is noted by Nilakantha, who contrives to separate Gerald from his friends. Lakmé warns Gerald to flee, but, feeling it beneath his valor as an officer, he refuses and they are surrounded. Nilakantha buries a knife in Gerald's body and makes his escape. But the wound is not mortal, and Lakmé, hoping to win the love of the man the gods have decreed she should hate, has Gerald carried to a hut in the jungle that she may nurse him back to health and strength.

ACT III

Gerald, watched over by Lakmé, recalls the past as his consciousness returns, but seems to heed nothing but his love for the Hindu maiden. A group of young people pass on their way to a sacred spring whose waters insure love's happiness. Besought by Gerald, Lakmé eagerly goes to bring some of the water. Frederic, who has searched out the hidden hut, comes to tell Gerald of a native uprising and remind him of his duty. Gerald half promises to rejoin his regiment, but in his heart would stay with Lakmé. On her return, Lakmé discerns the change in her lover. She drinks of the sacred water and gives some to Gerald. As he drinks it, the wounded officer gives eager ear to the sound of fife and drums and the song of marching soldiers. Lakmé, realizing her love is lost, unobserved plucks daturas from their stems and presses the poison petals to her lips. Nilakantha in rage comes upon them. But Lakmé, warning him that Gerald has drunk of the sacred water and is blessed of the gods, stays his vengeful hand and dies in the arms of her lover.



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
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
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
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
