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
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

*The Masked Ball—''Un Ballo in Maschera''—was written shortly after the attempt on the life of Napoleon III. First called ''Gustavo III,'' after an assassinated Swedish monarch, it carried in its plot a similar murder and its intended presentation in Naples was prohibited. Later it was given in Rome but, in order to meet police requirements, with locale changed to Colonial America and Gustavo III to Richard ''Count'' of Warwick and ''Governor'' of Boston.

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The Story of "The Masked Ball"

ACT I

The townsfolk, assembled in the audience chamber, are awaiting their popular Governor, Riccardo. On his arrival he goes over the guest list for a masked ball the next night. Finding the name of Amelia, wife of his friend Renato, he breaks into a rapturous avowal of his love for her. The townspeople leave and Renato enters and warns Riccardo his life is threatened by a conspiracy in his own household. Riccardo laughs at his friend's fears, and turns to receive the Judge, who demands the banishment of Ulrica, a witch. Oscar, the page, pleads for Ulrica, and wins the Governor to look into the matter personally. (Scene 2) Riccardo, disguised, comes alone to the hut of Ulrica. A sailor seeks advice, and is promised speedy good fortune—which Riccardo immediately provides from his own pocket. Amelia enters. She confesses herself in love with her husband's friend and asks for a curative brew. Ulrica tells her that under the hangman's scaffold grows an herb which alone can bring her peace, if she will gather it herself at midnight. The listening Riccardo thus learns that his love is returned. When his friends arrive he is light-hearted but the sibyl is stern. She foretells his early death by a friend "whose hand you next shall take in yours." At this moment Renato enters and warmly grasps the Governor's hand.

ACT II

Amelia is seeking the herb when a shadowy figure startles her. It is Riccardo. The unhappy girl admits her love and begs him to go away. Renato appears! He has come to warn Riccardo of danger. Riccardo commissions him to take the veiled lady back to the city without speaking to her or attempting to learn her identity. The two are stopped by the conspirators against Riccardo, and in the confusion Amelia drops her veil standing revealed before them all.

ACT III

Renato is resolved that death by his hand is the only punishment for Amelia. She protests her innocence in vain. Finally, she asks only to say farewell to her child. With her departure Renato's mood changes. Riccardo is the one who should die. He summons the conspirators, and it is decided to draw lots for the honor of striking the blow. Amelia returning, Renato resolves that her hand shall draw the fatal number. To his great delight he finds himself the chosen man. Into this tense scene Oscar enters with the invitations to the ball. (Scene 2). Riccardo has just signed a document securing Renato an honorable appointment which will take him and Amelia back to England, and in imagination he bids farewell to his beloved. Oscar brings an anonymous letter (from Amelia, of course) warning him that an attempt will be made on his life that evening. (Scene 3) Renato seeks the Governor. Oscar teases him but finally describes Riccardo's costume. Meanwhile the two lovers have found each other. Riccardo is explaining his plan to return her to England, and they are about to take their last farewell when Renato rushes between them and stabs Riccardo to the heart. Riccardo lives long enough to gasp out his and Amelia's innocence, and breathes his last among the sobs of his grief- stricken people.


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

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The Story of "Carmen"

ACT I

Micaela, a country maid to whom Don José, young brigadier, is engaged, seeks her affianced with a message from his mother. He is not on duty, and embarrassed by the attentions of the soldiers, she leaves. The new guard marches in. José is told that Micaela has come to see him, and he sits thinking of her. Cigarette girls stream out from the factory near by, with them, Carmen the gypsy. Attracted by the indifference of handsome Don José, Carmen sings directly to him. Throwing him a flower, she leaves him, dazed and bewildered. A moment later a stabbing affray with a rival factory girl leads to the Gypsy's arrest and she is placed in the care of José. A few more smiles and José is half persuaded to allow her to escape and to join her later at the Tavern of Lillas Pastia. There is a sudden struggle, the soldier lets go his hold, and Carmen flees.

ACT II


Carmen and a band of gypsies are singing a gay song. She remembers that the soldier who went to prison for her is now at liberty and shortly will join her. Morales, of José's guard, is trying to win her favor, but she laughs at him. The famous bull-fighter Escamillo enters and she devotes herself to him. Morales is enraged. Both men leave and the tavern is closed. The inn-keeper then admits two smugglers who tell their plans to the girls whom they invite to join them. Carmen, alone, will not go. She is waiting for José, whose arrival leads to an ardent love scene. But he hears the trumpet sounding the retreat and tells Carmen he must return to his regiment. She is incensed and tells him that she hates him. Desperately he pours out his love and Carmen hurries to paint attractively the life they might lead together in the mountains. Despite her charms José is about to leave when his officer appears and orders him back to line. Resentfully José defies the captain, and escapes to the smugglers' camp. with Carmen.

ACT III

José is unhappy in the life of a bandit, and Carmen, tiring of her gloomy lover, dreams of the Toreador. José threatens to kill her if she abandons him. "Death comes as Fate decrees," is her answer. She lays out the cards. They predict that she and her lover will die. Two visitors arrive: Escamillo, to see Carmen, and Micaela with a message from José's dying mother. The jealous José sees only Escamillo and shoots at him. Escamillo goes at once, but challenges José to meet him later. Micaela implores José to go to his mother. They leave together.

ACT IV

Carmen has become Escamillo's adored mistress. Magnificently dressed she comes with him to the entrance of the bull-ring, where he takes leave of her with impassioned song. Then the clouds of tragedy, which Carmen had read in the cards, lower in truth. Don José comes to Carmen to plead with her to be kind to him. Escamillo's name sounds in the arena amid wild applause, and Carmen repulses José with biting scorn. Escamillo's name again rings out, and the cheated José stabs Carmen to the heart.



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
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
