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The Story of "Pelleas Et Melisande"

ACT 1-Melisande, a mystic maiden with wonderful long yellow hair, sits weeping on the edge of a pond. She is discovered by Golaud, a mighty hunter. He calms her fright and asks her why she weeps. Melisande tells him she has been cruelly treated and has run away. She has lost her crown in the pond but will not let Golaud recover it. Golaud is fascinated and takes her away with him. Scene 2: Genevieve reads a letter to the ailing Arkel. It is to Pelleas from Golaud telling that he has wed a strange maiden, Melisande, but even now, after six months, knows nothing of her. He asks that Pelleas intercede for him and if a light is placed in the tower of the castle overlooking the sea, he will know that his bride will be received. If there is no light he will sail on never to return. Arkel has desired for purposes of state that Golaud, who had lost his first wife, marry Ursula. But accepting the decree of fate, he consents to receive Melisande. Pelleas, a wild and passionate youth, enters and is told to place the light for his brother Golaud. Scene 3: As Genevieve shows Melisande about the grounds of the castle, Pelleas enters. They see a ship sailing out of the darkening sea. Melisande recognizes it as the one in which she had come. It grows darker. Genevieve goes in search of Yniold. Left alone. Pelleas tells Melisande that he plans to leave at morn to attend his sick friend, Marcellus.

ACT II—Pelleas recites the legend of the healing power of "The Blind Men's Well," of which the bottom has never been seen. Melisande looks into the well and wonders if something bright were shining below could it perhaps be seen. She leans over, Pelleas bidding her be careful. Melisande tosses into the air the ring Golaud had given her. It falls into the well as the noon hour is heard to strike. Scene 2: Golaud tells Melisande of the strange incidents attending his accident while hunting. Just as he had counted the last stroke of the twelve o'clock bell, he related, his horse, suddenly and without apparent cause, had bolted in fright. His injuries, however, are not serious. He begs Melisande not to weary herself when she attempts to administer to his wants. She bursts into tears and at his anxious inquiry, tells him she is not happy. Golaud asks if it is because of Pelleas whom, he has noticed, seldom speaks of her. It is not Pelleas, she answers, but the continued gloom of the castle. Consoling her, he takes her hand and sees that his marriage ring is not upon her finger. He asks where it is. Only that morning, she tells him, when on the shore gathering shells for Yniold the ring had slipped off and the tide had come in before she could find it. Golaud commands her to go in search for it at once despite the night, telling her that the ring has a potent value of which she does not know. Melisande is frightened and goes out weeping. Scene 3: Pelleas and Melisande arrive at the grotto but, having brought no light, decide to await the rising moon before entering. Pelleas describes the grotto, telling Melisande that she must explore it well. The moon lights the grotto entrance disclosing three sleeping paupers. Melisande, frightened, begs Pelleas to take her away.

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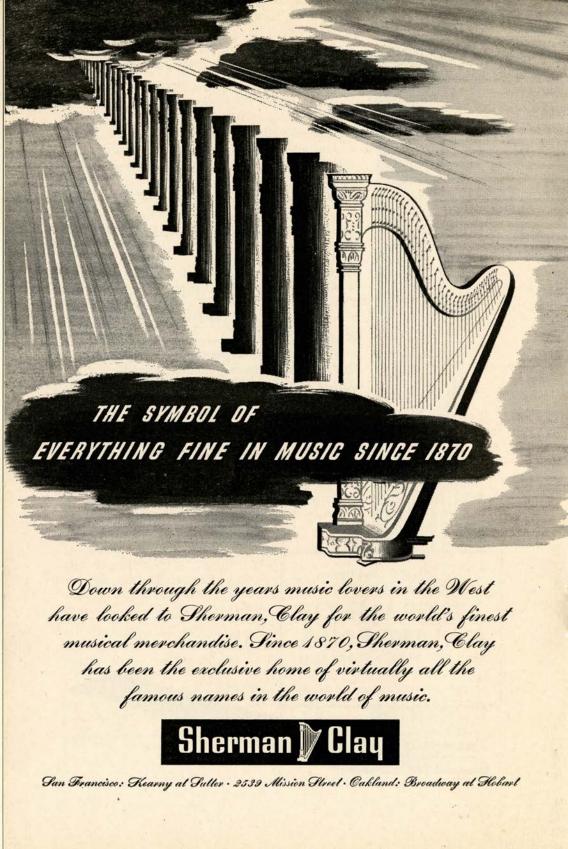
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The Story of "Pelleas Et Melisande" (Continued)

ACT III-Melisande sings as she combs her hair by the window. Pelleas, passing beneath, asks her to bend down that he might behold her hair unbound. He is enchanted with her beauty and asks that she lean further out so that he may kiss her hand-but he can not yet reach it with his lips. Melisande leans further and her mass of golden hair streams down and envelops him. In ecstacy he folds her tresses about him. Golaud comes upon the scene and, laughing nervously, chides them for playing like children in the dark. Scene 2: Golaud leads Pelleas into the stagnant vaults of the castle where the air is putrid with death. "Do you see that chasm?" he asks. Pelleas, sickened by the stifling stench, demands that they go into the open air. Scene 3: Pelleas is relieved and thankfully compares the brightness of the scene to the dark dankness of the cavern. Golaud then tells him that he has observed that there might be something between him and Melisande and commands that he avoid her, but not too pointedly. Scene 4: Yniold, guestioned by Golaud, tells him that Pelleas and Melisande are often together and once he had seen them kiss. A light is seen in Melisande's window. Golaud lifts Yniold up so that the boy can see within. He tells Golaud that Pelleas is with Melisande but that they do not speak or do anything except sadly look at each other. Golaud lifts him down and they depart.

ACT IV-Pelleas regretfully informs Melisande that Arkel has commanded him to undertake a voyage and that he intends to obey. They make a farewell appointment and separate. Melisande returns with Arkel. He has a premonition that Melisande has not long to live and tells her how much he has pitied her through the depressing months of his illness. He sees only innocence in her eyes but Golaud, entering furiously, believes her guilty. He upbraids her in a torrent of bitter words and, grasping her by the hair, pulls her back and forth roughly. Arkel interferes and Golaud, declaring that he will leave confirmation of his suspicions to chance, strides madly from the room. Scene 2: Pelleas and Melisande, who is late, meet at the well. They declare their mutual love but in their rapture overstay the time and the doors of the castle are heard closing. Golaud, who has been watching, rushes upon them. Sensing death at his hands, Pelleas and Melisande despairingly embrace. Golaud strikes down Pelleas as Melisande flees in terror.

ACT V—Melisande is now the mother of a child and her life hangs by a thread. Golaud, remorseful, now knows that Melisande was innocent and begs her forgiveness. Listlessly she grants it. The serving women enter and Melisande quietly passes away. Old King Arkel takes his great-grandchild in his arms declaring: "A life is ended, a life begins."



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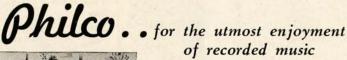


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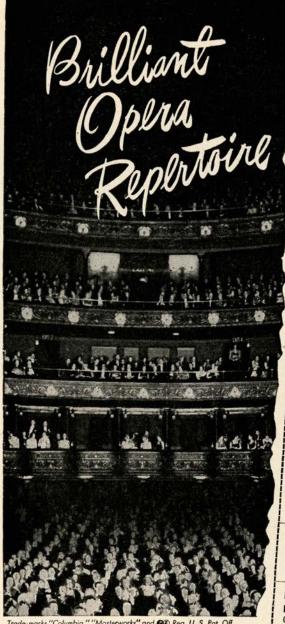

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The Story of "Romeo and Juliet"

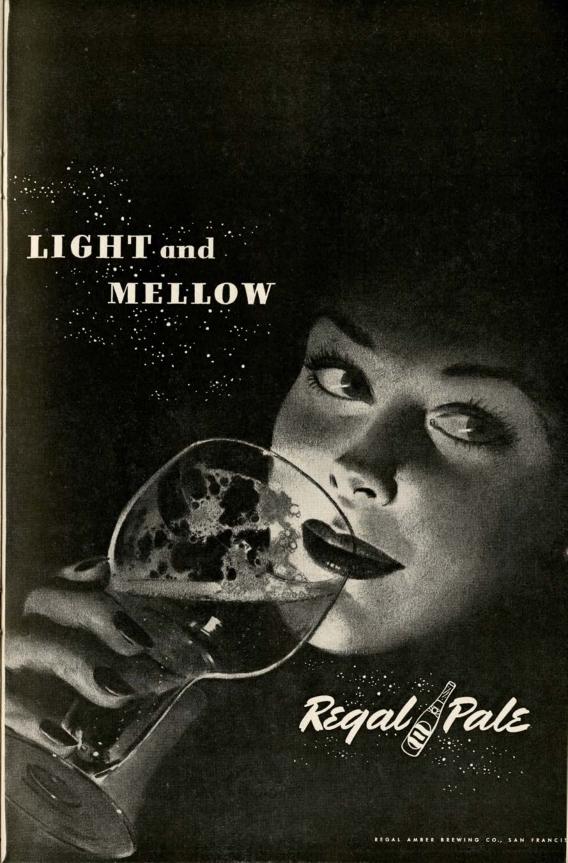
ACT I—The house of Capulet is en fete. A masked ball is being given for the entrance of Juliet into society. Capulet introduces his daughter to the assembled guests and all leave for the banquet hall. Romeo, Mercutio, Benvolio and others of the Montagues, in mask and bent on youthful frolic, enter. Juliet returns to the ballroom with her nurse, Gertrude. The intruders hide themselves. Gertrude is sent back to the banquet hall and Juliet is about to follow but is restrained by Romeo, entranced by her beauty. It is love at first sight. Their love banter is interrupted by the hot-headed Tybalt. He recognizes Romeo through his mask and denounces him, vowing vengeance. Romeo is about to draw his sword but is cautioned by Mercutio. Tybalt is restrained by Capulet and an open break is averted.

ACT II—Romeo ascends to Juliet's balcony. Juliet comes from her chamber and the long love scene begins. It is interrupted by Gregorio and Capulet retainers who have been warned of an intruder. Finding no one, they depart in anger. The lovers continue in bliss until Gertrude warns of the approaching dawn.

ACT III—Romeo, entering the cell of Friar Laurent, tells of his love for Juliet and their desire for a clandestine marriage. Juliet soon follows and the Friar, seeing in their union a healing of the feud between the two houses, performs the ceremony. (Scene 2) Stephano, in search of Romeo, sings an impudent song before the house of Capulet. It brings Gregorio in fury into the street. Stephano continues his taunting and in the general fighting which follows, both Capulets and Montagues coming upon the scene, Mercutio is wounded by Tybalt, who in turn, is killed by Romeo. The Duke of Verona, with his retinue, arrives. Romeo is sentenced to exile and escaping death only that he fought fairly, vows to see Juliet once more at all hazards.

ACT IV—Romeo has found a way into Capulet's house and comes to bid Juliet goodby. Juliet pardons him the death of Tybalt and their farewells continue throughout the night. (Scene 2) Capulet, with Friar Laurent, comes to tell Juliet that her marriage with Paris must straightaway take place. The Friar, when she would protest, cautions Juliet to silence. Capulet departs and the Friar, staying her desperate hand and descending dagger, gives Juliet a phial containing a potion which he tells her will cause a sleep resembling death for two and forty hours and admonishes that she take it at the hour of the marriage.

ACT V—Romeo forces his way into the Capulet vault. Perceiving the body of Juliet on her tomb and believing her dead, he drinks poison. Juliet, the effects of the sleeping potion having worn off, arouses. It is too late. Romeo, tottering, tells her of his fatal draught. Juliet, drawing his dagger from its sheath, pierces her breast and the houses of Capulet and Montague are united in death.





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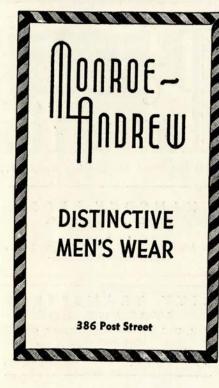
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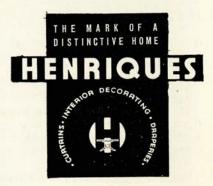
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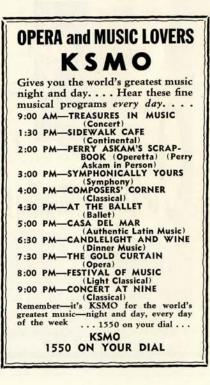
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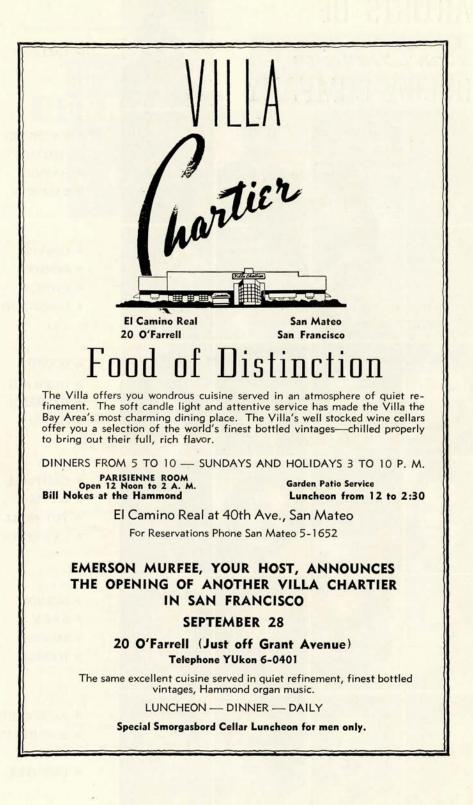












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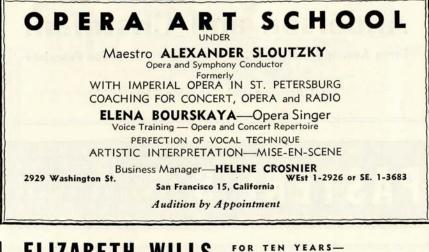
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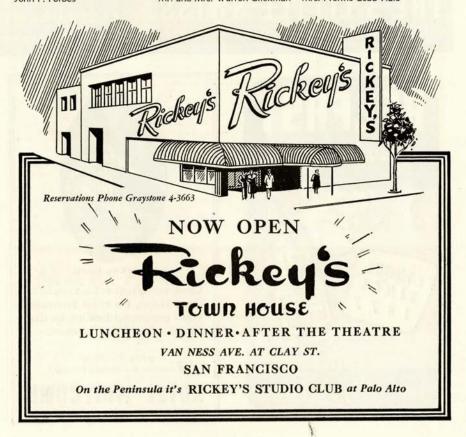


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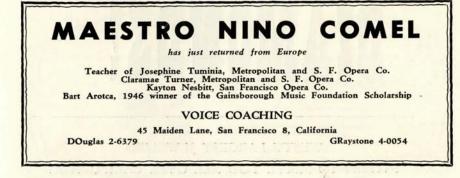




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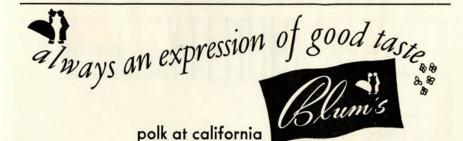


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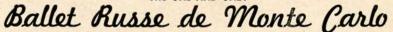
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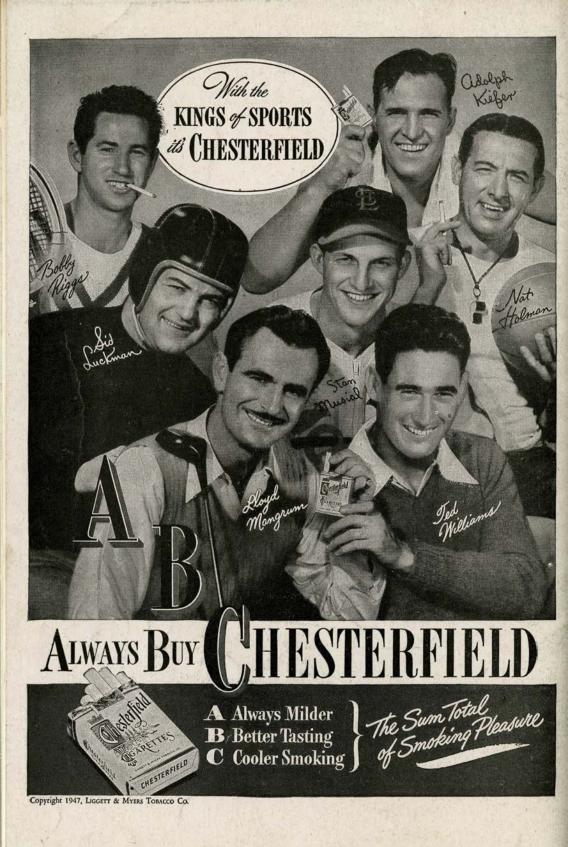
