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Act II—Ambushed in a lonely spot by assassins, Banco's son manages to escape but his father is killed. Later, Macbeth, now exercising the prerogatives of the murdered king, gives a banquet at which the ghost of Banco appears. The apparition, although invisible to the other guests, unnerves Macbeth who resolves to revisit the witches.

Act III—Macbeth arrives at the witches' cave demanding to know the future, and is shown a series of visions. The first, an armed head, warns Macbeth against Macduff. The second, a bloody child, is accompanied by the advice: "Behold . . . for none of woman born shall harm Macbeth!" In the third apparition a crowned child is shown with a tree in his hand. It is then chanted that Macbeth will never be vanquished until Great Birnam wood shall come against him. The last apparition is of eight kings passing in order; the eighth, Banco, holds a mirror in his hand. Lady Macbeth enters, and learning what Macbeth has seen and heard, furiously orders him to exterminate all who stand in their way.

Act IV—Near Birnam wood Scottish exiles bewail Macbeth's tyranny and joining the English force, prepare to march against him under the leadership of Malcolm. In the castle Macbeth, preparing for battle, learns that his wife is dead. The enemy approaches, camouflaged behind shrubbery, giving the illusion that Birnam wood is really moving on the castle. During the battle Macbeth comes face to face with Macduff, who "was from his mother's womb untimely ripped," and is slain by him amid the rejoicing of the liberated Scots. Malcolm is proclaimed King of Scotland.



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
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



THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL SEASON

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The Story of "Louise"

Act I—Louise, the daughter of working people, although in love with the poet Julien, cannot marry him without her parents' consent. The mother finding Louise singing to Julien from her window, sternly reprimands her, voicing her disapproval of what she considers an unwise match. Louise's father enters with a letter from Julien, the second requesting permission to marry Louise. Enraged, Louise's mother begins a bitter tirade against Julien, but her father kindly reasons with her, and she promises to try and forget her love.

Act II—In the early morning a strange variety of Parisian street-types is gathered near the shop where Louise works. Soon Julien and his friends come to await the arrival of Louise, who later enters accompanied by her mother. Waiting until the mother departs, Julien then asks for the answer to his letter. Although it is unfavorable, he begs Louise to elope, but refusing she enters the shop. (Scene 2) The girls in the dress shop tease Louise about being in love, while outside Julien is heard serenading her. The girls applaud him, but as his singing continues they indulge in sarcasm when he refuses to stop. Louise, pleading illness, leaves the shop and goes away with Julien.

Act III—Now in Paris, Julien and Louise stand in their garden to watch the sunset, and then enter their cottage. Soon their friends appear to begin preparations for a carnival honoring the young couple, and with great ceremony and merriment, Louise is crowned Queen of the Montmartre. In the midst of the gaiety, Louise's mother arrives, declaring that the father is dying. She begs Louise to return home. Deeply moved, Julien allows Louise to go.

Act IV—Louise, discovering that she has been duped into returning home is sullen and rebellious. Her father tries to reason with her, but she persists in her love for Julien. Angered, her father orders her from the house, and terrified she runs into the street. Too late her father goes to the window to call her back, for once more Paris and Julien have claimed her.

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
