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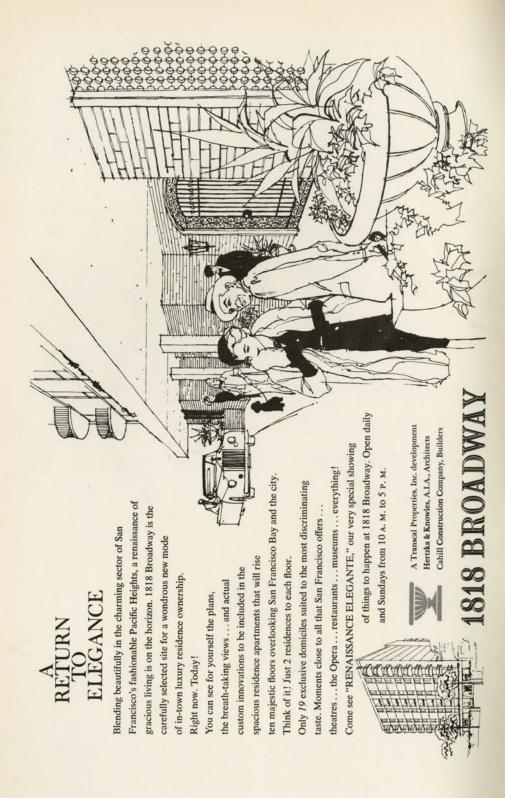
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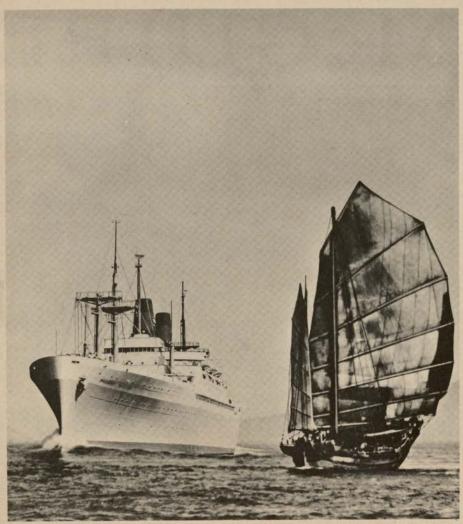
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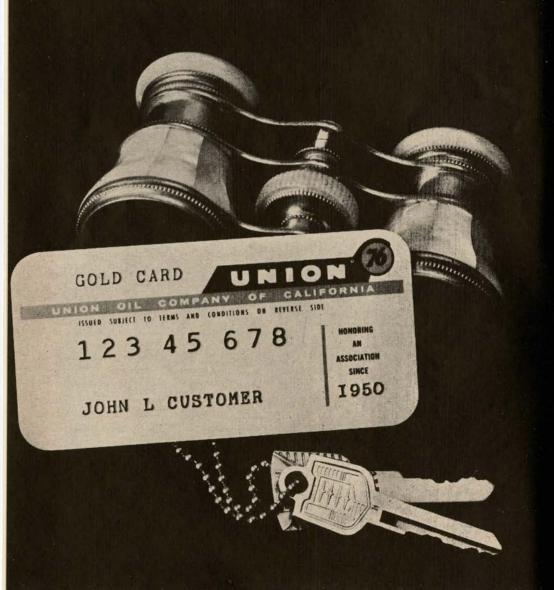
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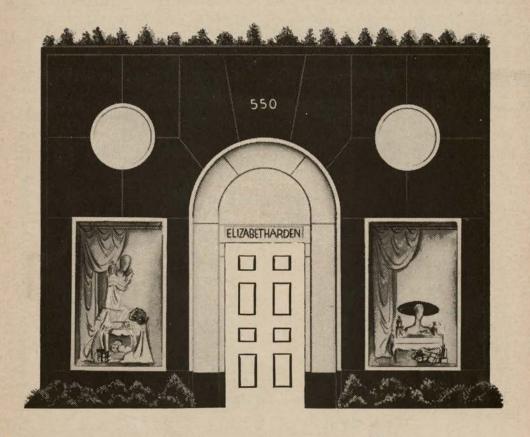
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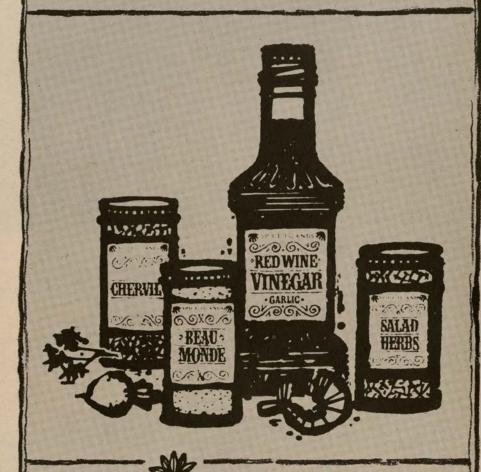
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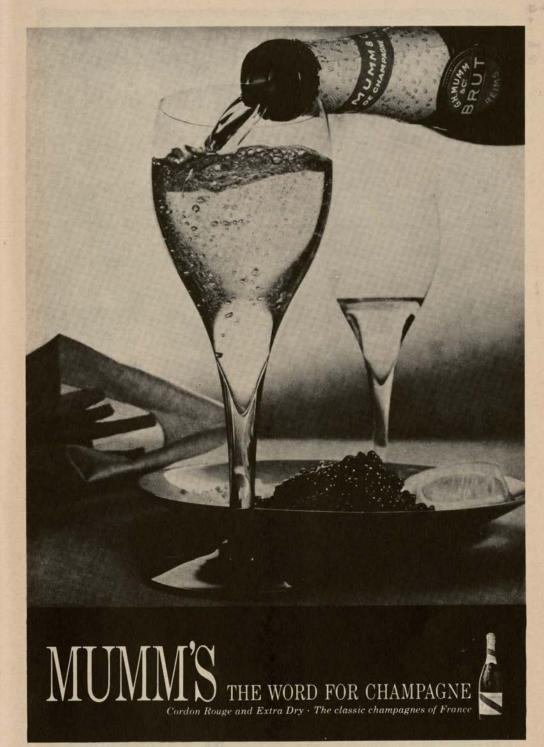
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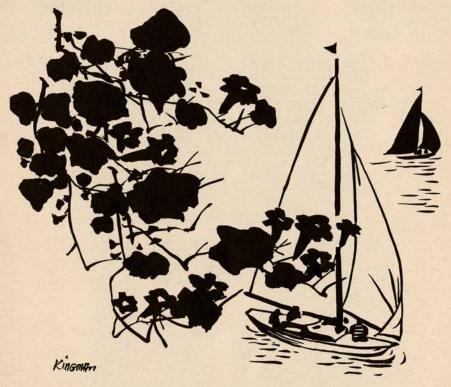
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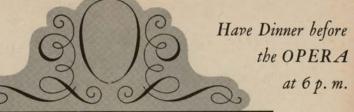
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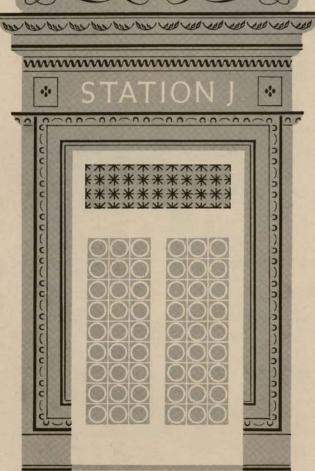


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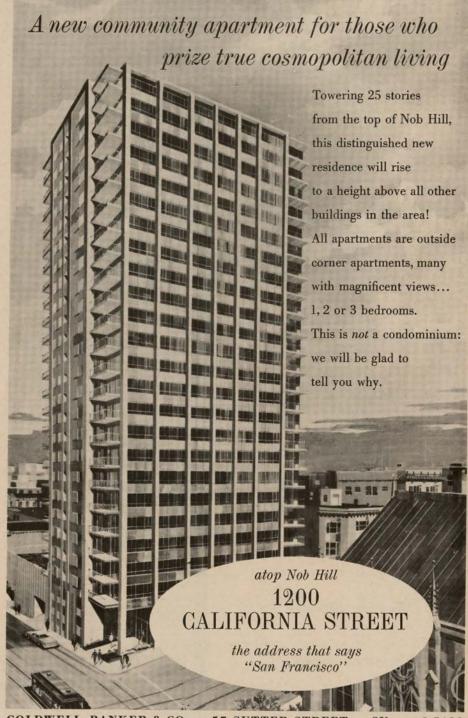
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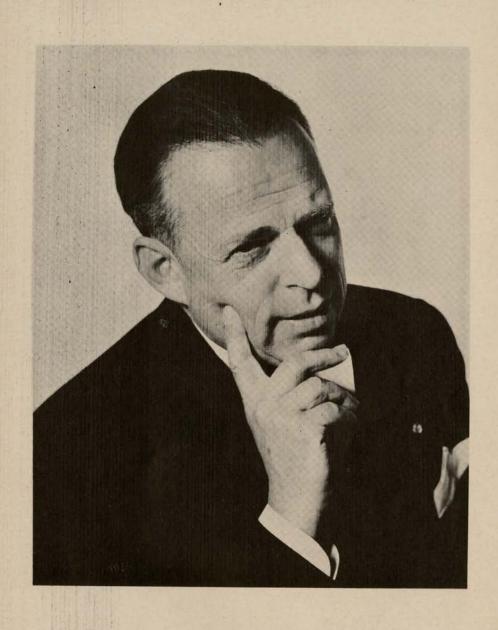
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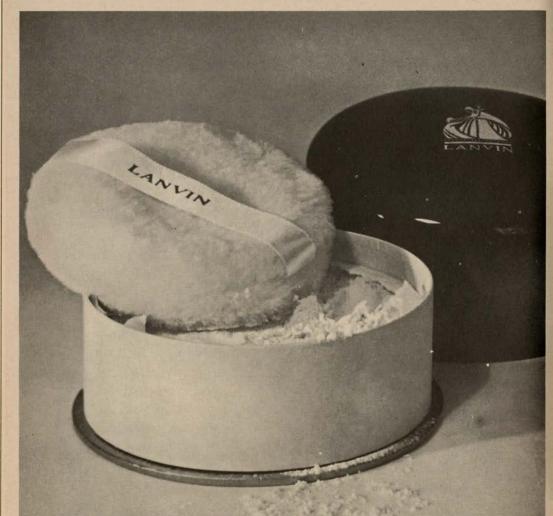
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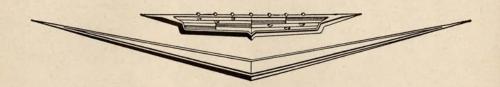
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DEBUTS OF THE WEEK



RENATO CIONI

This handsome young (born in 1931) tenor makes his debut on opening night as Edgardo to Anna Moffo's "Lucia di Lammermoor." He has already sung the role with great success in Italy, has recorded it with Joan Sutherland this past summer and will sing it with her again later this fall in Dallas.

Cioni first appeared in the United States in October of 1959 in another Donizetti opera, "Duca d'Alba," when the Festival of Two Worlds production was imported from Spoleto and presented in Philadelphia and New York. As befits a rising vocal luminary Cioni has been kept very busy recently with performances of "Rigoletto" in Brussels, "Francesca da Rimini" in Trieste and "Die Meister-singer" (in Italian) in Catania. San Francisco will also hear him as the

Duke in "Rigoletto" and Ismaele in "Nabuc-

co."

PLINIO CLABASSI

An eastern production of Pizzetti's "Murder in the Cathedral" was the occasion of Clabassi's American debut a few seasons ago. A veteran of all the major Italian theaters, the basso has over eighty roles in his repertoire. He has also performed in ten televised opera productions.

In private life Clabassi is married to the daughter of the late Beniamino Gigli, In addition to his debut role of Timur in "Turandot," Clabassi will also be heard here in "Un Ballo in Maschera," "Boris Godounoff" and

"Rigoletto."

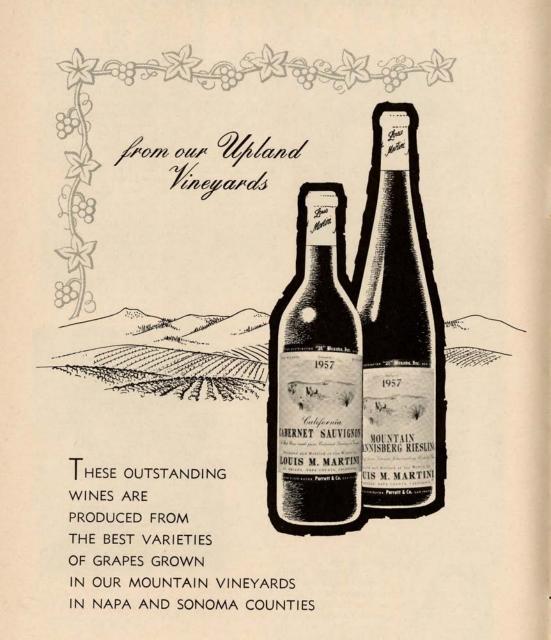


DOROTHY COLE



Winner of the 1961 San Francisco Opera Debut Auditions, this talented mezzo is familiar to Bay Area audiences through her appearances with the Oakland symphony and the San Francisco summer Pops concerts. She has appeared in

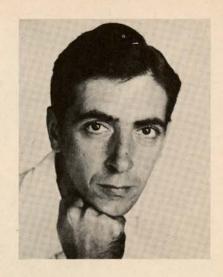
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NORMAN DELLO JOIO

One of the foremost figures in contemporary music, Dello Joio's prolific output includes operas, chamber music, symphonic works, cantatas, songs, ballets and piano solos. His opera "The Triumph of St. Joan" won the New York Music Critics' Circle Award in 1960, and he won the same award in 1948 for his "Variations, Chaconne, and Finale."

Born in New York in 1913, Norman Dello Joio comes from a family of professional musicians. He received his early training as a pianist and organist from his father, Casimir, and his godfather, Pietro Yon. He later studied at the Juilliard school and Yale university.

A Pulizter Prize was awarded to Dello Joio in 1957 for his "Meditations on Ecclesiastes."





KIETH ENGEN

Born in Minnesota, but raised in Berkeley, Engen's extremely successful career has been confined to Europe until the present. So popular has he proved with operagoers in Munich, where he is a permanent member of the Bayerische Staatsoper, that Engen changed the spelling of his name from Keith—which the Germans pronounced "kite"—to the more convenient Kieth.

A graduate of the University of California in Berkeley, bass-baritone Engen also studied in Zurich and Vienna. He made his debut in 1951 in Graz, singing 113 performances of 22 different roles in two years. He has since sung in Vienna, London, and Bayreuth.

Engen has roles in a number of important productions of the current San Francisco season, including "Blood Moon," "A Midsummer Night's Dream," "Fidelio" and "Le Nozze di Figaro."

MARGUERITE GIGNAC

The world premiere of "Blood Moon" will introduce this Canadian soprano to San Francisco in the role of Edmee. Later she will be heard as Helena in the United States premiere of "A Midsummer Night's Dream" and in student matinees of "Rigoletto."

For the past two summers Miss Gignac has appeared as "Lucia di Lammermoor" and in "L'Elisir d'Amore" at the Central City festival. She has also toured for the last two autumns with Boris Goldovsky's opera group. Only this summer Miss Gignac was married to William Hedges, flutist with the Minneapolis symphony.

She is a pupil of Lina Pagliughi.





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HERBERT HANDT



Tenor Handt, who is a native of Philadelphia, studied at the Juilliard school, Columbia university, the Vienna music academy and the Academy of Santa Cecilia in Rome.

His stage appearances have been with companies in Venice,

Florence, Vienna, Palermo and Genoa. At Milan's La Scala this spring he sang the same role in "A Midsummer Night's Dream" that he will do later in the current San Francisco season. Handt's activities also include many concerts, both solo and with orchestra.

JOSHUA HECHT



Hecht's singing career began with the United States army field band. It has led him to engagements in opera in Philadelphia, New Orleans, Central City, Pittsburgh, Miami and Baltimore. Since 1955 he has been a regular member of the New

member of the New York City Opera, with which he has sung over twenty-five leading roles.

He has appeared twice with the NBC-TV Opera and has made recordings of "Regina" and "The Ballad of Baby Doe." Hecht's wife, an accomplished concert pianist, is also his accompanist in recitals.

CLAUDE HEATER

Still another of the Americans who made good "over there" and now returns in triumph to his home country, baritone Heater was born in Oakland and got his theatrical start in musical comedy, appearing on Broadway in "Top Banana."

In 1953 he made his European debut in Milan in "Madama Butterfly" and since then has sung in Darmstadt, Basel, Copenhagen, The Hague and Amsterdam. Last year Heater made a successful debut with the Vienna Statsoper and has been re-engaged there. He has also appeared on television and in movies, including the popular "Ben Hur."

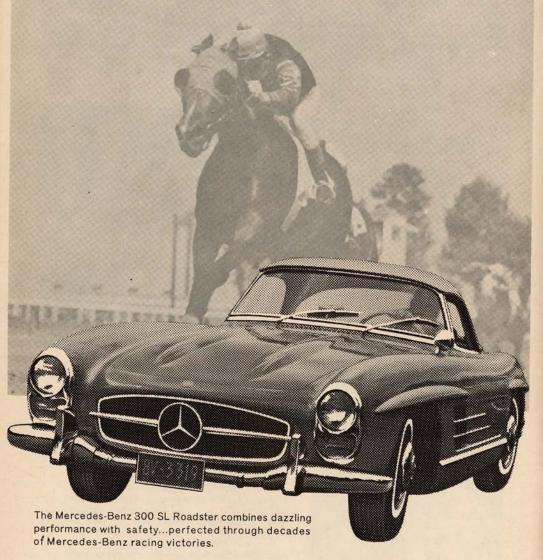


ALBERT LANCE

Medindie in South Australia is the birthplace of tenor Lance, who makes his American debut in the world premiere of "Blood Moon" on Monday night. Australia was also the scene of his first operatic triumphs as Lance toured the country with the National Theatre Opera. Just before leaving for Paris in 1954, he sang the title role in "The Tales of Hoffmann" when it was presented for the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh.

Lance now sings regularly with the Paris Opera. In 1958 he made his Covent Garden debut as the Duke in "Rigoletto" opposite Joan Sutherland's Gilda, and he returned there this spring. In Paris he has sung in "Carmen," "Ballo in Maschera," "Werther" and "Faust" among others. Guest appearances have also taken him to Portugal, Spain, Switzerland and Belgium.

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MING CHO LEE

From Shanghai to San Francisco, via Los Angeles and New York is the story of designer Lee. Born in Shanghai, he was educated in Los Angeles (Occidental and UCLA) and has recently been working in New York as an assistant to Jo Mielziner and other designers.

Among his own credits have been a production of "The Infernal Machine" at the Phoenix and the Baltimore Peabody institute's production of "The Pearl Fishers" which was given this summer at the Empire state festival. Lee is married and the father of two young sons.



GINO LEONETTI



He earned his first dollar supering in a San Francisco Opera performance of "Carmen." After moving to Denver, Leonetti this year entered the San Francisco Opera Debut Auditions and was named an alternate winner.

RAYMOND NILSSON



Australian tenor Nilsson makes his debut with the San Francisco Opera after singing Lionel in "Martha" with the Spring Opera last May. He has sung in England with the Sadlers' Wells and Covent Garden companies and has also performed

in Germany and Austria. He returned to Australia last year in a tour of "The Merry Widow."

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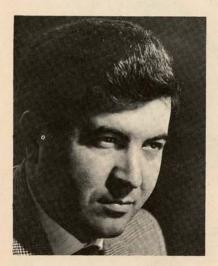
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RICHARD RIFFEL



A native of Fresno, tenor Riffel attended Pasadena college and the UCLA opera workshop before becoming an alternate winner in the 1961 San Francisco Opera Debut Auditions. His public appearances include stints with the Los An-

geles philharmonic, San Jose symphony, Carmel Bach festival and the Roger Wagner chorale.



VLADIMIR RUZDAK

In the international world of opera, baritone Ruzdak, a Yugoslavian, is currently the leading Italian baritone of the Hamburg Staatsoper in Germany. And he makes his American debut in an opera set in Scotland.

Born in Zagreb, Ruzdak also studied there and first sang with the Zagreb Opera in 1947. In the international competition held in Geneva in 1949 he won first place. He joined Hamburg in 1954 and since then has also sung in opera and concert in Paris, Vienna, Rome, Milan and London.

DAVID THAW

Munich, Frankfurt and Berlin are the present cities of this tenor's activities. He appears there in such operas as "Fra Diavolo," "Cosi fan Tutte," "Mignon" and "Elisir d'Amore."

Thaw is actually an American who studied at Columbia university's opera workshop. He went to Milan for further polishing and in June of 1954 made his operatic debut at Vichy in France singing Vincent in Gounod's "Mireille." Following his debut here in Saturday night's "Turandot" he will be heard in "A Midsummer Night's Dream," "Fidelio" and "Die Meistersinger."



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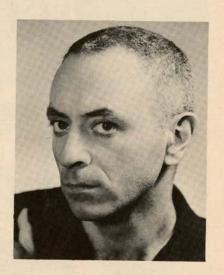
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ROUBEN TER-ARUTUNIAN

Television, ballet, Broadway and opera have all laid claim to the designing talents of Ter-Arutunian. A mere Jisting of his credit highlights would include NBC-TV operas and spectaculars, New York City Ballet settings and costumes, such Broadway shows as "Advise and Consent," "Redhead" and "New Girl in Town," and opera designs for the New York City Opera and La Scala.

He was born in Tiflis, Russia, and spent most of his youth in Berlin. He also studied in Paris and Vienna. One of Ter-Arutunian's first designing chores was to create the costumes for a gala Vienna production of "Salome" with Ljuba Welitsch in honor of Richard Strauss' eightieth birthday.

Ter-Arutunian also has done two shows for the San Francisco Civic Light Opera, including this summer's revival of "The Merry Widow."



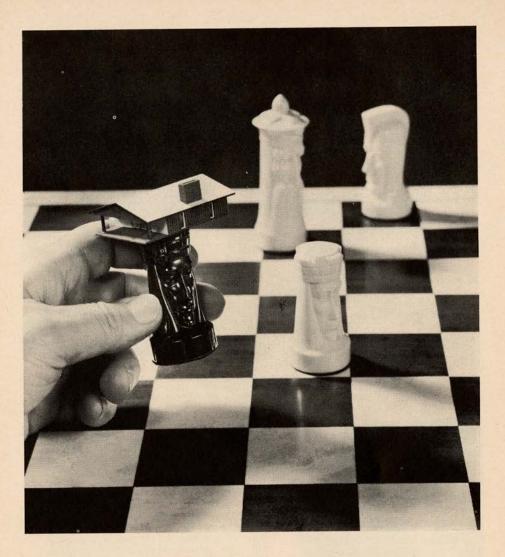


LUCILLE UDOVICK

Although born in Denver, soprano Udovick was raised in San Francisco and attended grade and high schools here. After leaving for New York for further study she was engaged for a number of Broadway musicals, including "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes."

The search for her goal then led Miss Udovick to Italy where, after a period of intense study, she made her debut in 1954 at the Maggio Musicale Fiorentino singing the title role in the rarely-heard "Agnese di Hohenstaufen" opposite Franco Corelli. Since then she has been heard with the Fenice of Venice, the Massimo of Palermo, San Carlo of Naples, Communale of Bologna, the Rome opera and the Baths of Caracalla.

In February 1960 Covent Garden first heard Udovick as "Aida" and in July and August of that year she also made her debut at the Colon in Buenos Aires, returning there this summer.



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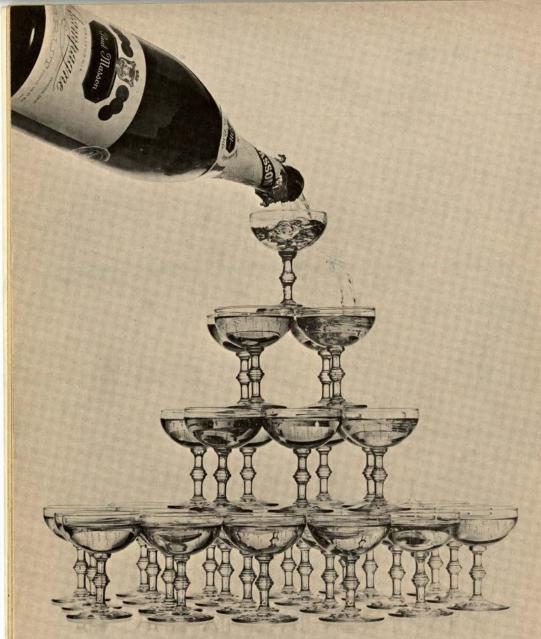
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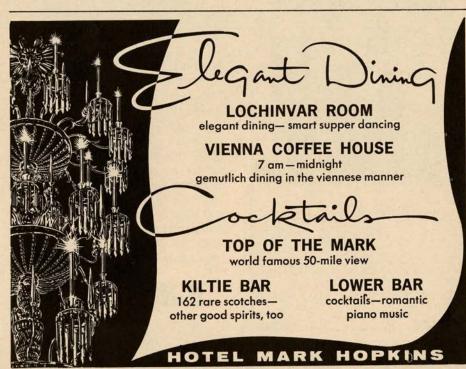

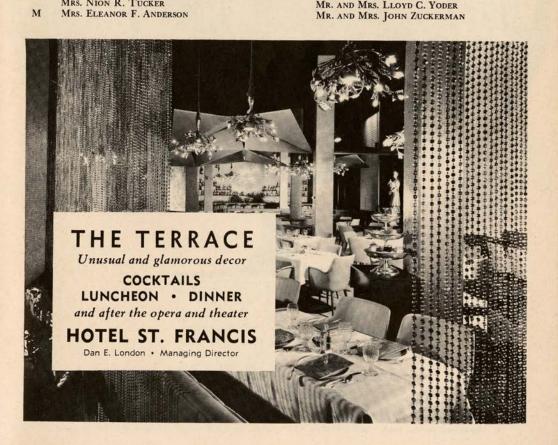
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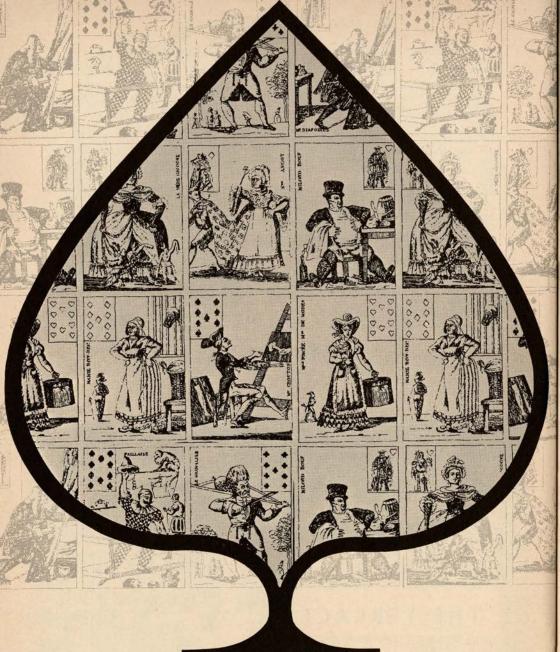
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A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT

To Friends of the San Francisco Opera:

There was special cause for alarm at this time last year. Our annual income in 1958 had fallen short of expenses by \$10,016 and in 1959 the gap had widened to \$60,454. The implication was obvious; if this trend continued the San Francisco Opera could not survive.

The generous and widespread response to the 1960 drive by opera fans and business organizations helped us to protect the Opera from the dangers of deficit spending. Twice as many contributions were received than ever before and the amount raised, \$122,101, was almost 50% more than the fund-raising income of any previous year.

Particularly encouraging to opera management was the knowledge that an increasing number of opera goers and businessmen realized that the San Francisco Opera not only belongs to them, but depends on them for its very survival.

Yet we can never rest on past accomplishments, either financial or artistic. As production costs continue to increase so must our fund raising become increasingly effective. What was sufficient income to offset the expenses of previous seasons will not, in all probability, be enough to cover the expenses for this year.

The goal of the current drive is \$150,000, which is almost \$28,000 more than we raised in 1960. To reach this goal we need even wider and "deeper" support.

If you did not contribute to the 1960 drive we appeal to you to contribute now. If you did contribute last year, we are depending on you to contribute again. To those who can afford it, we must appeal for increased contributions.

It is through the generosity of its patrons, both individuals and businesses, that the San Francisco Opera has attained its high standards. Your support at this time will assure the continued vitality and development of your opera company.

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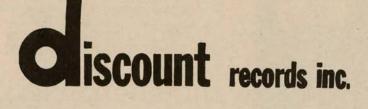
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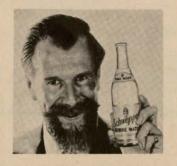
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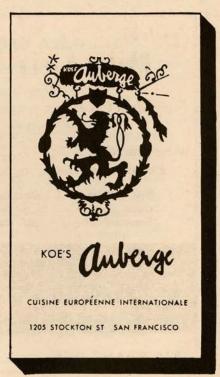
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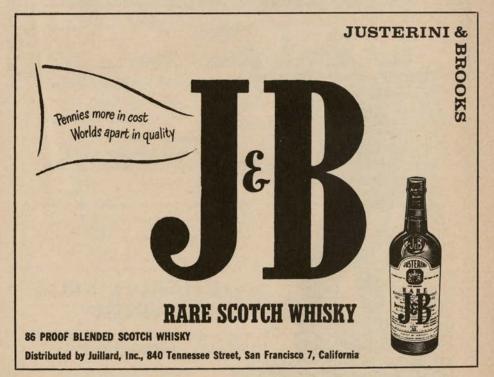
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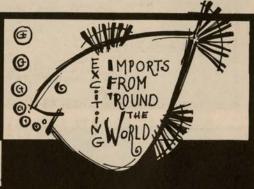
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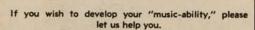
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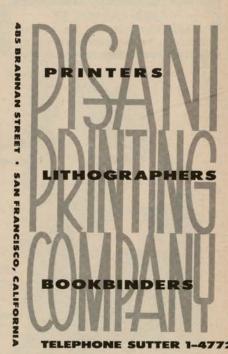
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
