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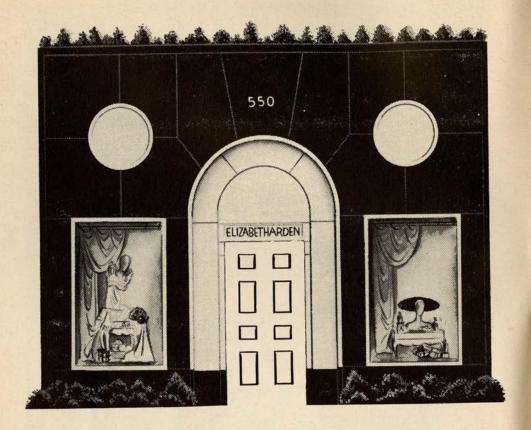
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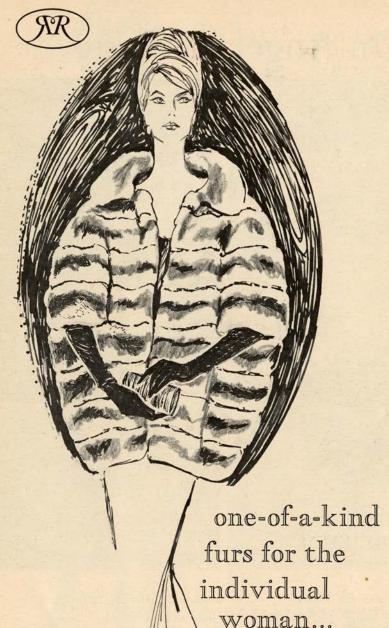
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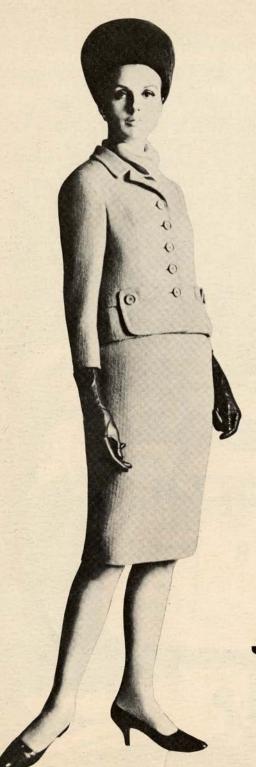
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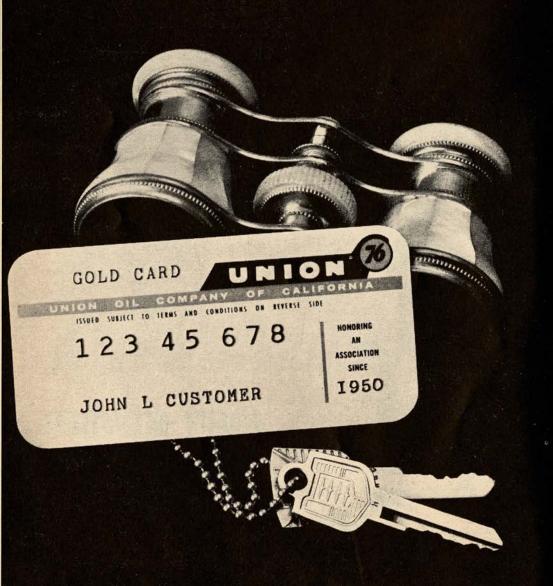
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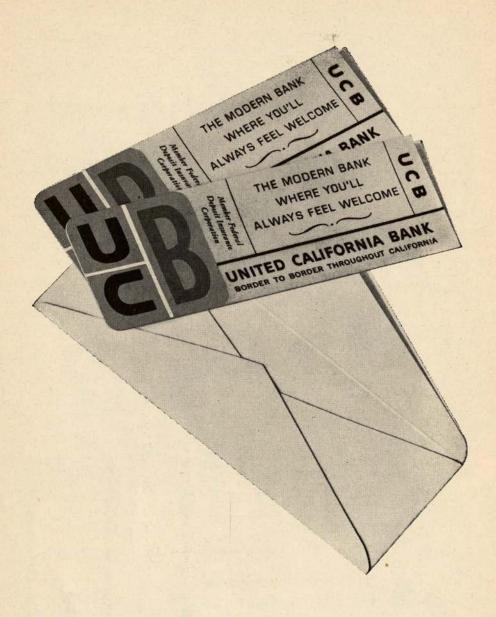
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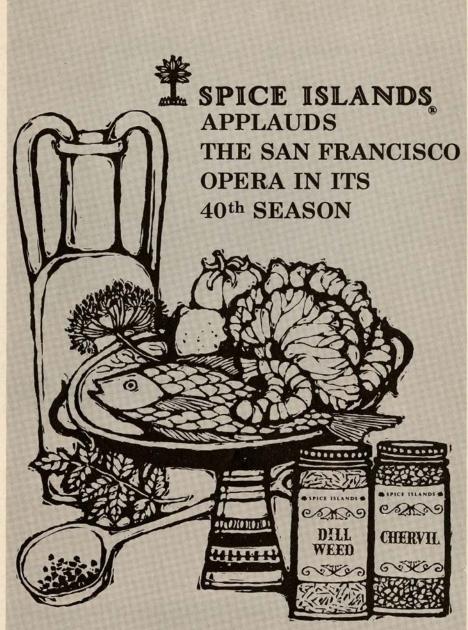
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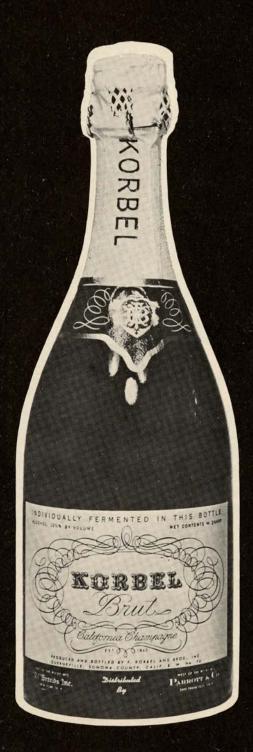
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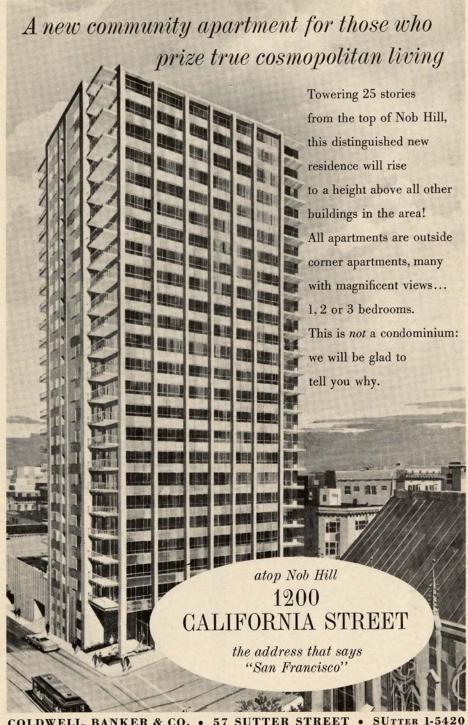
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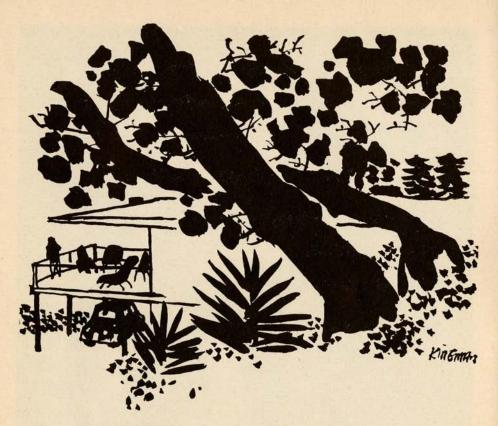


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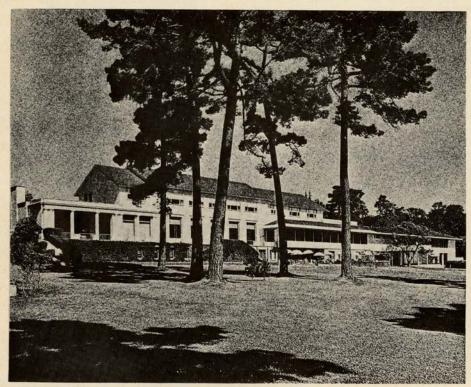


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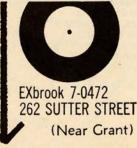
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DEBUT OF THE WEEK



VICTORIA DE LOS ANGELES

The Spanish soprano was born in Barcelona, the daughter of a campus caretaker at the university, and as a child she learned to play the guitar and often sang to her own accompaniment for sheer pleasure. Upon finishing her schooling, Miss De Los Angeles made her operatic debut as the Countess in "Le Nozze di Figaro" when she was twenty years old, at the Barcelona Liceo.

In 1947 she won first prize over 120 contestants at the International Singing Contest held in Geneva. Her La Scala debut came in 1950, during which year she also sang at Covent Garden, Edinburgh, Paris, and made her American debut

in a recital at Carnegie Hall.

Miss De Los Angeles joined the Metropolitan Opera in 1951 and has in the interval appeared in most of the prominent opera houses in Europe and has also made many recordings. In addition to her San Francisco Opera debut role of Desdemona in this week's "Otello," she will also be heard as Donna Anna in "Don Giovanni" on October 16 and 20 and as Mimi in a special non-subscription performance of "La Boheme" on October 22.

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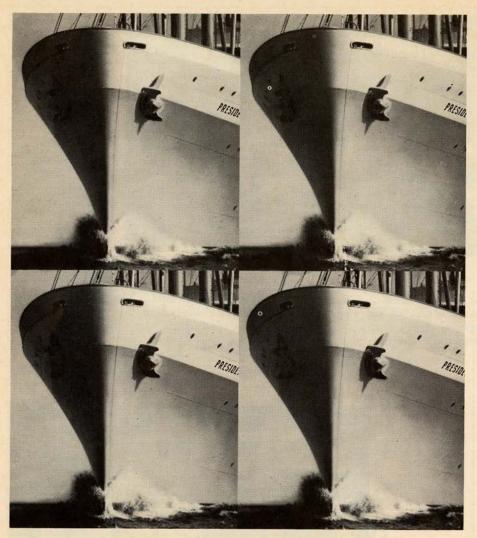

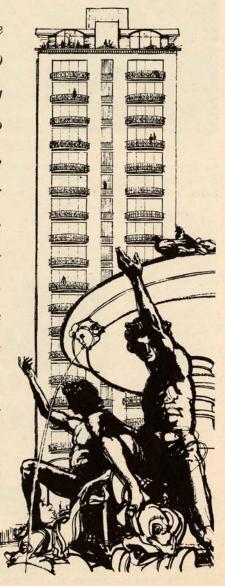

MAJOR INTERMISSION AFTER ACT II

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THE STORY OF "IL TROVATORE"

ACT I, Scene 1—In the royal castle of Aragon the men of the Count di Luna, the queen's general against the rebellious forces of Urgel, are on the lookout for a mysterious troubador, who every night serenades Leonora, a lady-in-waiting to the queen. The count loves Leonora and has given orders to find and arrest this troubador. Ferrando, the captain of the guard, tells his men the story of a gypsy who was burned at the stake for abducting the count's younger brother. The child is supposed to have perished in the same fire.

Scene 2—On a terrace of the palace Leonora confesses to her companion, Inez, that she has met the mysterious troubador only once, yet has fallen in love with him. As soon as the two women retire into the palace the count appears but before he can follow Leonora the troubador's (Manrico) serenade is heard. Leonora rushes onto the terrace. When she betrays her love for Manrico, the Count di Luna challenges his rival to a duel.

ACT II, Scene 1—Gypsies, amongst them Azucena, are encamped in some half-destroyed buildings. Staring into the flames of their fire she relives the hour of her mother's death at the stake, and reveals that in a frenzy she threw her own child into the flames instead of the kidnapped child. She calls for vengence. Manrico, recovered from an almost fatal wound received during the continuing civil war, asks Azucena, if he really is her son. The old woman contradicts herself, and finally asks him why he has spared Di Luna's life when he once had him at his mercy. Manrico confesses that a mysterious force had stopped him. A messenger brings news of an impending skirmish, and Manrico leaves to lead his men into battle.

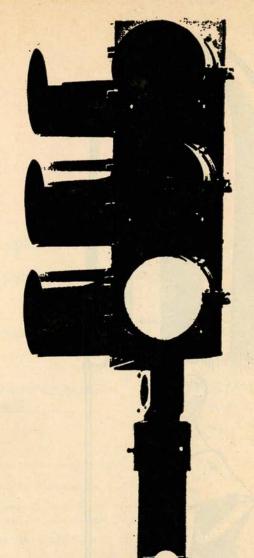
Scene 2—Leonora, believing that Manrico has been killed in a battle, is about to take the veil when suddenly the count and his men attempt to abduct her. Unexpectedly Manrico and his insurgent soldiers emerge and repulse Di Luna. Overjoyed, Leonora escapes with Manrico.

ACT III, Scene 1—The Count di Luna and his army are besieging Castellor, into which Leonora and Manrico with his forces have retreated. The count's soldiers are ready to storm the castle when Azucena is discovered and dragged before the count. She is forced to admit that Manrico is her son. She is then tied to a stake, visible from the castle, in order to force Manrico's surrender.

Scene 2—Inside the fortress Manrico and Leonora are about to be married when the news of Azucena's impending execution reaches them. Manrico rallies his forces for a last desperate sortie to save his mother.

ACT IV, Scene 1—Manrico has been captured and awaits his doom. Leonora approaches the stronghold of the royal castle from which she hopes to rescue him. When the count discovers her she offers herself as price for her lover's freedom. The count accepts with joy, but does not see Leonora swallow a deadly poison.

Scene 2—In their prison Azucena and Manrico recall the days of freedom in the mountains. Leonora enters and urges Manrico to flee. He has been granted his freedom. Manrico refuses to leave, suspecting the price Leonora had paid in exchange for his liberty. The poison begins to take effect and with her last breath she declares her innocence. The count enters the prison. As he sees Leonora dead, he orders Manrico's immediate execution. Azucena, seeing Manrico put to death, cries out triumphantly that her mother is finally avenged. It was his own brother that Di Luna had just executed.

THE STORY OF "OTELLO"

ACT I

Citizens and soldiers are gathered to greet the ship of Otello returning victorious through a raging storm. Otello, brought ashore in a small boat, announces that the Turkish fleet has been destroyed and enters the castle to meet the awaiting Desdemona. Iago, determined to gain the power that is now Otello's, and Roderigo, who desires Desdemona, ply Cassio with wine. Brain-befuddled Cassio is adroitly led to quarrel with Montano, who is wounded, and the disturbance becomes a riot. Otello, emerging from the castle, quells the uproar and in punishment relieves Cassio of his command.

ACT II

Iago, in furtherance of his play to overthrow Otello, urges Cassio to enlist the aid of Desdemona in the effort to gain back his post. Cassio goes in search of her. Iago bids Otello watch his wife, cunningly awakening his jealousy. The Moor seeks out Desdemona and questions her. She innocently pleads the cause of Cassio and Otello's jealous suspicions take definite form. Desdemona endeavors to wipe his perspiring brow with a handkerchief which was his first gift to her. In anger he tears it from her hand. Emilia picks up the handkerchief, but is forced to surrender it to Iago as Otello berates the bewildered and alarmed Desdemona. Following the scene with Desdemona, Iago adds to the flame of Otello's jealousy when he tells him that he has seen Desdemona's handkerchief in Cassio's possession. The Moor's rage leaps out of bounds. Iago offers to help him to vengeance and they take the oath to punish the guilty.

ACT III

Otello takes no interest in the announced arrival of Lodovico, Venetian ambassador. He thinks only of his wife and her presumed perfidy. The puzzled Desdemona evades her husband when he seeks to borrow the lost handkerchief. Cassio enters seeking forgiveness. Iago bids Otello hide, and contrives by half-audible conversation with Cassio to permit the Moor to hear only that which will inflame his suspicions. Cassio in innocence produces the handkerchief saying he had found it in his rooms. Otello goes mad with jealous anger and at Iago's suggestion grimly plots to strangle Desdemona in the bed he believes she has dishonored. Lodovico arrives and proclaims that Otello has been called to higher honors in Venice. Otello announces his departure for the morrow but unable to control his anger publicly berates Desdemona. The populace hail Otello in his new honor but are silenced by Iago.

ACT IV

As she retires the heartbroken Desdemona tells the wondering Emilia the despairing story of a lover lost in maidenhood. Otello enters and charges the now awakened Desdemona with an intrigue with Cassio. Refusing to accept her denial he grips strangling hands about her throat as the alarmed Emilia gains entrance. Emilia's screams summon the people. Otello denounces the woman he has killed showing the handkerchief in proof. But Emilia explains its false evidence and the remorseful Otello brings his unhappy life to an end.
