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DEBUTS OF THE WEEK



JAMES McCRACKEN

Currently one of the leading dramatic tenors in Europe, James McCracken returns in triumph to his native United States through his appearances with the San Francisco Opera as Manrico in "Il Trovatore" and in the title role of "Otello." Later this winter he will also perform the latter part in the new production of Verdi's opera at New York's Metropolitan.

It was at the Metropolitan that the Gary, Indiana, born McCracken spent four years singing "all the first messengers" following stints in Broadway musicals. Then, at the urging of his wife, mezzo-soprano Sandra Warfield, he made the break, headed for Europe and success. He now performs such roles as "Otello," Canio in "Pagliacci." Alvaro in "Forza del Destino," Bacchus in "Ariadne auf Naxos," and Rhadames in "Aida" at the Vienna Staatsoper, the Buenos Aires Colon, Wiesbaden, Zurich, Paris, Trieste, and Palermo.

JOLANDA MENEGUZZER

The latest of many American operatic "firsts" presented by the San Francisco Opera is the initial appearance in the United States of the young Italian soprano Jolanda Meneguzzer, who has the title role in the season's only public performance of Donizetti's "La Figlia del Reggimento" this Thursday. She studied in Florence and made her debut there during the 1957 Maggio Musicale. Every year since then Miss Meneguzzer has returned to Florence in the spring, including an appearance this year in the world premiere of Castelnuovo-Tedesco's "The Merchant of Venice.'

A specialist in Donizetti and Bellini roles, she has appeared in works by these composers at the Piccola Scala, the San Carlo in Naples, and the Rome Opera, and foreign engagements have taken her to Germany, France, and Switzerland. In San Francisco Miss Meneguzzer will also sing Nanetta in "Falstaff" and Zerlina in "Don

Giovanni."





ELINOR ROSS

Miss Ross made her debut with the San Francisco Opera last November in Los Angeles singing the title role in "Aida." She returns this year as Leonora in all performances of "Il Trovatore," which means that she will be appearing with the Company in Berkeley, San Diego, and Los Angeles in addition to the bay city.

The young soprano is a native of Tampa, Florida. She has appeared in opera in Chicago, New Orleans, Pittsburgh, and Cleveland, and has sung with the American Opera Society in New York. Following her Hollywood Bowl debut in 1961, Miss Ross was immediately re-engaged and appeared there again this past August, in the meantime having made her debut with the Los Angeles philharmonic.

This past season Elinor Ross has also sung the Verdi requiem in Philadelphia's Robin Hood Dell and appeared in London's Royal Festival

hall under Carlo Maria Giulini.



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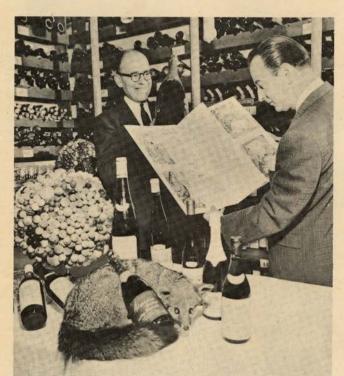

With best wishes for continued success to you and to all of your Associates, I avail myself of this opportunity, dear Maestro Adler, to assure you of my highest esteem and consideration.

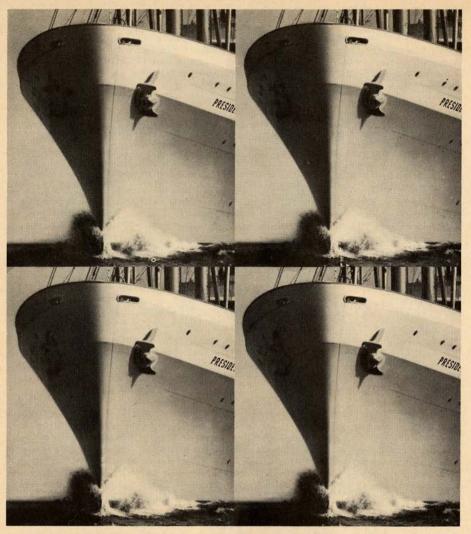

Every ten days a great President Liner leaves on a once-in-a-lifetime trip

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The 40th opera season in San Francisco — that is the 40th year of German opera music in the city at the golden gate. It seems, therefore, appropriate to say a few words about this important part of German creative spirit and its relations to the principal center of American cultural life on the West Coast of the United States.

During the last 200 years German composers have been extremely successful in writing operas, many of which proved to be of lasting value. No wonder, therefore, that the operas of Gluck, Mozart, Beethoven, Wagner, Richard Strauss, among others, belong to the classical repertoire of and are performed on the stages throughout the whole world. Fortunately the contemporary successors of these great masters are making considerable efforts to conquer a similar position of German music of today. Especially the expressionists and the advocates of the twelve tone system, among them such excellent opera composers as Hindemith, Alban Berg, Orff, Egk, Fortner, Blacher, von Einem, Henze, have earned themselves international approval.

Those great composers of the past as well as the modern ones were more or less the only emissaries of good will and good hope when an unhuman regime overpowered Germany and entangled the whole world into a horrible war. After the war the reputation of German culture had to be reestablished and many broken ties with the outside world had to be mended again. German composers and singers participating in the opera season in the United States as well as the ever increasing number of American singers engaged by German theatres have been and are instrumental in

achieving this aim.

It must be regarded as particularly favorable for the renaissance of German music abroad that Kurt Herbert Adler has been the General Director of the San Francisco Opera House during the last ten years. Acknowledging the fact that the success of a first class opera production highly depends on the participation of national artists, singers as well as conductors, from the composer's homeland, he gave the German element in the international team of San Francisco's Opera a remarkable share. Because of Mr. Adler's great merits in the promotion of German music, including such modern operatic works as Carl Orff's "Carmina Burana" and Alban Berg's "Wozzeck," the President of the Federal Republic of Germany bestowed upon him the Officer's Cross of the German Order of Merit.

Undoubtedly Mr. Adler and the San Francisco Opera will, in the future as in the past, present many wonderful performances of German opera music to a knowledgeable public rightfully expecting the very best from them. I join the music loving San Franciscans in wishing their Opera the very best of success in this 40th season and many others to follow.

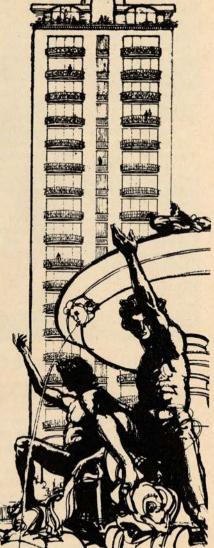

THE STORY OF "IL TROVATORE"

ACT I, Scene 1—In the royal castle of Aragon the men of the Count di Luna, the queen's general against the rebellious forces of Urgel, are on the lookout for a mysterious troubador, who every night serenades Leonora, a lady-in-waiting to the queen. The count loves Leonora and has given orders to find and arrest this troubador. Ferrando, the captain of the guard, tells his men the story of a gypsy who was burned at the stake for abducting the count's younger brother. The child is supposed to have perished in the same fire.

Scene 2—On a terrace of the palace Leonora confesses to her companion, Inez, that she has met the mysterious troubador only once, yet has fallen in love with him. As soon as the two women retire into the palace the count appears but before he can follow Leonora the troubador's (Manrico) serenade is heard. Leonora rushes onto the terrace. When she betrays her love for Manrico, the Count di Luna challenges his rival to a duel.

ACT II, Scene 1—Gypsies, amongst them Azucena, are encamped in some half-destroyed buildings. Staring into the flames of their fire she relives the hour of her mother's death at the stake, and reveals that in a frenzy she threw her own child into the flames instead of the kidnapped child. She calls for vengence. Manrico, recovered from an almost fatal wound received during the continuing civil war, asks Azucena, if he really is her son. The old woman contradicts herself, and finally asks him why he has spared Di Luna's life when he once had him at his mercy. Manrico confesses that a mysterious force had stopped him. A messenger brings news of an impending skirmish, and Manrico leaves to lead his men into battle.

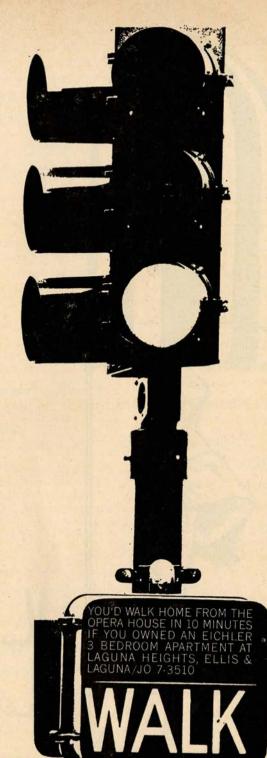
Scene 2—Leonora, believing that Manrico has been killed in a battle, is about to take the veil when suddenly the count and his men attempt to abduct her. Unexpectedly Manrico and his insurgent soldiers emerge and repulse Di Luna. Overjoyed, Leonora escapes with Manrico.

ACT III, Scene 1—The Count di Luna and his army are besieging Castellor, into which Leonora and Manrico with his forces have retreated. The count's soldiers are ready to storm the castle when Azucena is discovered and dragged before the count. She is forced to admit that Manrico is her son. She is then tied to a stake, visible from the castle, in order to force Manrico's surrender.

Scene 2—Inside the fortress Manrico and Leonora are about to be married when the news of Azucena's impending execution reaches them. Manrico rallies his forces for a last desperate sortie to save his mother.

ACT IV, Scene 1—Manrico has been captured and awaits his doom. Leonora approaches the stronghold of the royal castle from which she hopes to rescue him. When the count discovers her she offers herself as price for her lover's freedom. The count accepts with joy, but does not see Leonora swallow a deadly poison.

Scene 2—In their prison Azucena and Manrico recall the days of freedom in the mountains. Leonora enters and urges Manrico to flee. He has been granted his freedom. Manrico refuses to leave, suspecting the price Leonora had paid in exchange for his liberty. The poison begins to take effect and with her last breath she declares her innocence. The count enters the prison. As he sees Leonora dead, he orders Manrico's immediate execution. Azucena, seeing Manrico put to death, cries out triumphantly that her mother is finally avenged. It was his own brother that Di Luna had just executed.

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THE STORY OF "LA FIGLIA DEL REGGIMENTO"

Maria has been found on the field after a battle by Sulpizio and adopted by the eleventh regiment of the army of Napoleon. On her person has been a letter written by her father, a captain, and addressed to the Countess of Berkenfeld, which Sulpizio has carefully preserved. Maria, now grown to vivacious young womanhood, is the pride of her soldier "fathers" and the special joy of young Tonio, who has saved her at one time from falling over a precipice.

Acr 1: The villagers have taken refuge in a barn awaiting the coming of the victorious French regiment. Among them is the Countess of Berkenfeld. Maria and Sulpizio enter. He chides her over an apparent recent distraction and she confesses her love for Tonio. Guards arrive, escorting Tonio who had come near the lines to get a glimpse of Maria. She tells them that Tonio had saved her life once and she pleads for his.

The soldiers leave and Maria and Tonio declare their mutual love. Posing as her aunt, the Countess has told Sulpizio the truth of Maria's parentage. They enter and Sulpizio goes to fetch Maria. The soldiers return, followed by Tonio who has enlisted in the regiment. He asks them for the hand of Maria for she has pledged not to marry without their consent. They discuss the proposal and grant his wish. But Sulpizio, returning, tells them of his discovery and that Maria can belong to no one by her aunt. Maria bids the broken-hearted Tonio and her grieving soldier "fathers" farewell.

Acr II: Maria is not any too happy in her new surroundings and often is discovered singing the joyous Rataplan song of her regiment and going through the evolutions of the drill. Still more deeply does she sigh over her separation from Tonio. Sulpizio, wounded, is a visitor at the castle. Maria is storming at him that she will not give up Tonio for the duke of Krakentorp, an arranged marriage, when the Countess enters to rehearse her in a sentimental song. Maria and Sulpizio shock her with interpolations of the Rataplan and she leaves in a rage. Ortensio brings word that a wounded officer has arrived at the castle. Soldiers surge into the salon and noisily acclaim Maria. She runs to the wounded Tonio, now a captain. Sulpizio orders a cask of wine for the soldiers, who depart leaving Maria, Tonio, and Sulpizio reunited in happy reminiscense. The surprised Countess comes upon the joyous scene. Maria tells her of Tonio's love but is reminded of her betrothal to the duke and Tonio is ordered from the castle. He goes but promises the weeping Maria that he will return for her before the dawn. Maria also leaves and the Countess shows Sulpizio a letter which discloses that she really is Maria's mother. He promises to persuade Maria to marry the duke as befits her station in life. Maria, at her mother's command, is about to sign the marriage contract when a loud commotion arises. Tonio with his soldiers burst into the room shouting that they have come to set their child free. But Maria's sadness and devotion have now aroused the dormant mother love of the Countess and she consents to the marriage with Tonio.

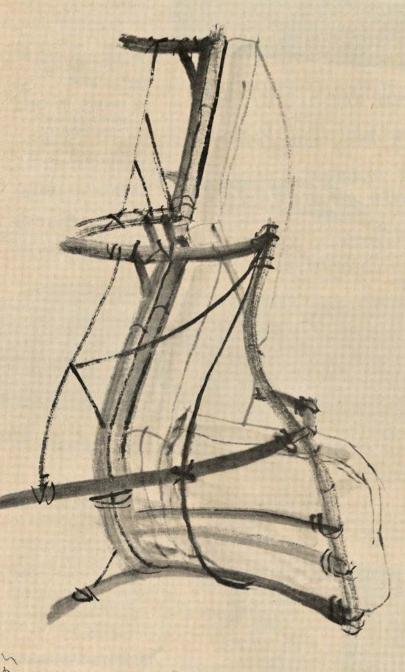

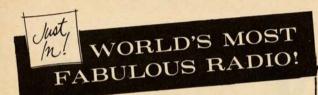
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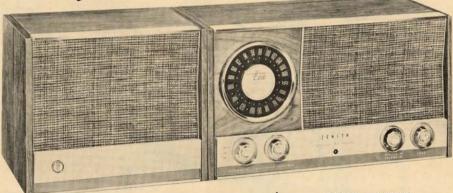

It is indeed a distinct pleasure to salute the San Francisco Opera on the occasion of its 40th season.

Since the very early days of San Francisco, the Italians in the bay area and the local community of Italian origin have enthusiastically supported and participated in operatic productions. When Gaetano Merola came to San Francisco from his native Naples in 1906, he immediately saw that this city, which was to become his adopted home, was a fertile field for operatic activity of a permanent annual nature. Merola enlisted the financial aid of a handful of men of the Italian group to finance his initial effort in this area, a season of opera in the Stanford stadium in spring, 1922.

When the curtain went up on the first performance of the first season of the new opera company in 1923, it was Maestro Merola who was conducting "La Boheme" in the pit. As general director of the company, Maestro Merola guided the group to further triumphs in the many seasons to come, and was a tradition on the podium on opening night until his death in 1953. The Italian community, in which Merola found so many friends, was always active, together with its fellow San Franciscans of all backgrounds and nationalities, in support and critical interest in each opera season.

Since my arrival in San Francisco in 1959, the Opera has truly been a highlight of my stay. What I had heard about it before coming, its world-wide fame, is more than fully justified. It is to be traced to the meticulous planning, the choice of the very best artists, the competence and the boundless enthusiasm on the part of the president, Mr. Robert Watt Miller, and the directors of the San Francisco Opera Association and to the outstanding accomplishments of the most able Maestro Kurt Herbert Adler, who has worthily carried on the traditions instituted by Maestro Merola. May I mention here that, most recently, San Francisco has in many instances taken the leadership in introducing new concepts of performance and production which have aroused the greatest interest abroad.

Italy, with its fine tradition of repertoire, performance and operatic training has served as a fountainhead for the opera here. And San Francisco has, in return, served as a showcase for the many wonderful new and established Italian singers. From the presentation of "La Boheme," 40 years ago, to the performance of "Nabucco" on the occasion of Italy's centennial celebrations last year, to this new season, which has also begun with "La Boheme," the San Francisco Opera has been instrumental in showing off my country in its very best light.
