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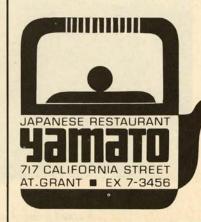

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THE STORY OF "SAMSON ET DALILA"

ACT I—Chanting a prayer of sorrow and resignation, a group of Hebrew slaves kneel in the square below the Philistine temple of Dagon. Samson stands forth adjuring them to lift up their hearts in faith and their arms in strength, and God shall be found to them. Inspired, the Hebrews arise and rejoice. Abimelech appears and charges them to subjection. The Hebrews glorify God and the enraged Abimelech leaps out with drawn sword. Samson, striking down the Prince, leads the Hebrews in glorious revolt. The High Priest comes from the temple and discovering the slain prince, demands immediate retribution. But a messenger hurries in to tell of the Hebrews rampant in the city, and the already cowed Philistines retreat. The Hebrews reenter rejoicing and are joined by the women from the Temple of Dagon, led by Dalila who in tones of mellow innocence pleads with Samson for a renewal of the pleasures of love they once shared. Samson prays for strength to resist her seduction, conscious that behind it lies treachery.

ACT II — Dalila is appealing to the power of love for allure which will drive Samson again into her arms and disclose to her the secret of his strength. The High Priest of Dagon comes to her offering unlimited wealth if she will secure this same secret. She scorns his bribes and confides her protestations have been only an effort to bring Samson to betray himself. Together they pray for his capitulation. Dalila is beginning to question her power over Samson when he appears in a torment of uncertainty. Loosing upon him gentle reproaches for desertion and love's every blandishment, she woos him with dispassionate passion. Samson vows his love, but still denies the secret she would have as proof of his complete devotion. Angry and tearful, Dalila rushes from him. Samson, remembering his God, hesitates; then, in passionate abandon, follows her within. Philistine soldiers surround the house, and, answering Dalila's triumphant call, overpower Samson.

ACT III — Scene 1 — Samson in prison, blinded and chained, works at the mill, besieged with reproaches from the Hebrews. Deeply repentant, he beseeches that Jehovah pour His wrath upon his head alone and take again under His protection the children of Israel. Philistine soldiers come to take him away.

Scene 2 — Philistines, princes, and vulgars have flocked to the Temple of Dagon. Licentiously singing and dancing, they hail Samson led into their midst by a child, as the savior of Israel, and ridicule his God and his own ruin. With magnificent humility Samson accepts their abuses. Dalila laughs at his weakness in the embrace of love and with the High Priest forces upon him a cup to offer in sacrifice to Dagon. Led forward, Samson, filled with repentance, wrath and a mighty faith, prays for a miracle of strength, and grasping the pillars of the temple, he crumbles them crushing the Philistines and himself, while his voice soars in praise of the glory of his God.

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THE STORY OF "FALSTAFF"

ACT I—Scene 1—At an inn after a drinking bout in which he manages to fleece Dr. Caius, Falstaff tells his followers, Bardolfo and Pistola, of two new conquests he hopes to make—Mrs. Ford and Mrs. Page. He asks his companions to deliver-identical love notes to the ladies, and when they refuse he chases them out and sends the messages by a page.

Scene 2—Comparing notes, the matrons with Nanetta and Dame Quickly plan revenge on Falstaff. Entering with Ford, Dr. Caius and Fenton, Bardolfo and Pistola disclose Falstaff's amorous project, and the men too plan revenge in which the disguised Ford will lure Falstaff into a trap. They leave while Fenton and Nanetta enjoy a brief love scene, soon interrupted by the returning women.

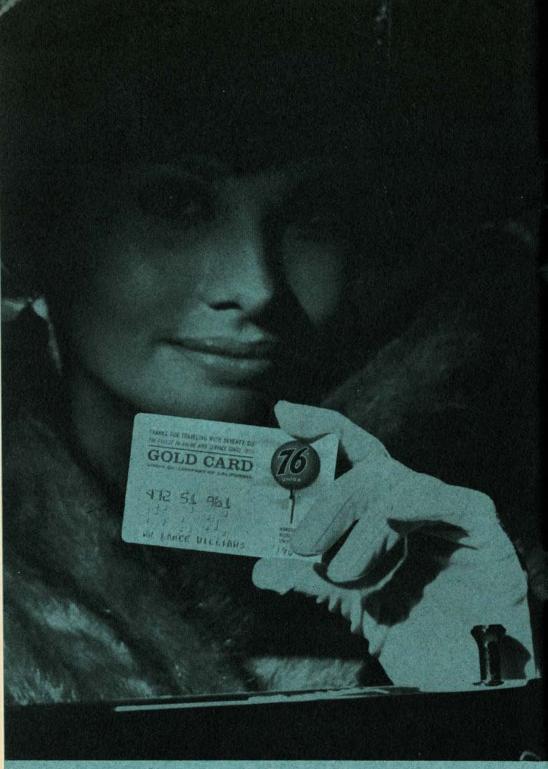
ACT II—Scene 1—Dame Quickly delivers a note to Falstaff from Alice Ford making an appointment for that afternoon. She leaves as the disguised Ford arrives. Calling himself Brook, he asks Falstaff's aid in what he pretends is a hopeless romance with Mrs. Ford. Falstaff agrees to help, revealing his afternoon rendezvous with her. This astonishes Ford who now fears she is deceiving him.

Scene 2—Warned by Quickly of Falstaff's imminent arrival, the women retire leaving Alice to greet him. He immediately begins to make violent love to her, but is interrupted by Dame Quickly who announces that Ford has returned and is searching for his wife's lover. Falstaff is successfully hidden first behind a screen and then in a basket of dirty linen. Ford, certain he has surprised Falstaff behind the screen, is dismayed to find Nanetta and Fenton. Disgusted at his error he continues his search as Mrs. Ford orders the basket containing Falstaff to be dumped into the river.

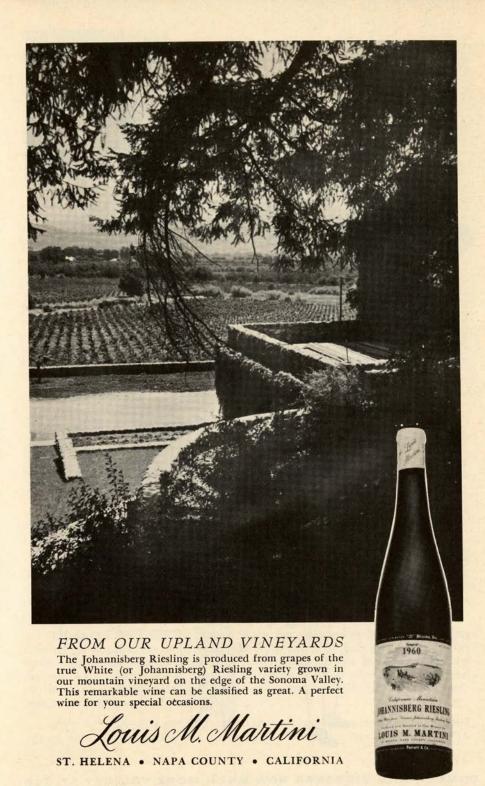
ACT III—Scene 1—Falstaff, accepting a new engagement to meet Mrs. Ford at Windsor Park the next evening, is unknowingly involved in another plot—of which Ford is also aware. Dame Quickly, returning with his acceptance, overhears Ford promising Nanetta's hand to Dr. Caius. She tells Mrs. Ford who immediately warns the young lovers.

Scene 2—Arriving in the wood, Fenton and Nanetta re-avow their love. Now the others arrive disguised as elves and nymphs and secrete themselves awaiting Falstaff. He enters and has a moment alone with Alice before they descend on him and trounce him. All is done in a jestful manner, and Ford now satisfied with this revenge finally agrees to let Nanetta marry Fenton.

A warning gong will be sounded in the foyers six minutes before the end of each intermission. A buzzer will signal the end of the intermission.



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SOME PRACTICAL ASPECTS OF THE CURRENT SEASON

The San Francisco Opera, founded in 1922, today stands in the first rank of the world's opera companies along with those of New York, Milan, Vienna, and the cultural centers of Germany. Yet our Company offers a far shorter season than the major opera organizations of New York and Europe.

A primary obligation of the San Francisco Opera is to meet the growing demand for fine opera in San Francisco. Toward this end, the local season has been extended from six to seven weeks this year and the number of performances increased from 30 to 36. This means that the Company will be presenting more opera to more people at a proportionately lower cost of production. Although budgeted expenses are up 17% over last year, a greater number of repeat performances will reduce our average deficit per performance after the added box office income, thereby accomplishing a more efficient use of staff and artists.

Nevertheless, the overall loss will be somewhat higher than before, due largely to the steadily rising cost of labor. While many business and industrial concerns have been able to cut costs, or boost production, through various labor saving devices, no machines have yet been developed that can sing, act, direct, dance, conduct, design and tend to the hundreds of other production jobs that call for a high degree of individual skill and talent. Because opera production is 95% labor, our costs have increased at a much greater rate than business expenses in general.

In 1947, our total expenses were \$728,842, with gross operating income at \$649,616. In 1962, expenses had reached \$1,672,525 against a gross operating income of \$1,345,920.

So, despite strict and relentless economies of operation, despite sell-outs for almost every performance, despite the fact that we are closer to being self-supporting than any other major opera organization (ticket proceeds cover from 80-85% of expenses), the San Francisco Opera this year must raise \$8,128 more than in 1962. The 1963 goal is \$160,000.

Thanks to the financial support from our guarantors and an increasing number of donors, the San Francisco Opera has, so far, survived the cost squeeze of recent years. To maintain our present artistic level, we will need the continued assistance of past contributors. At the same time, we must continue to develop new and additional support from individuals, businesses, foundations and local government.

Only by constantly striving to better our previous performance, in fund raising as well as staging, can we keep grand opera alive and growing in San Francisco.



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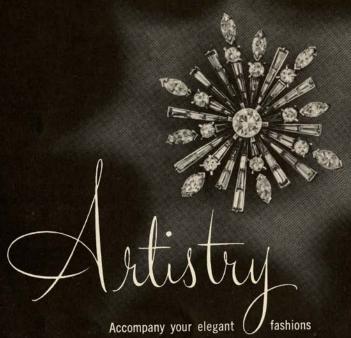
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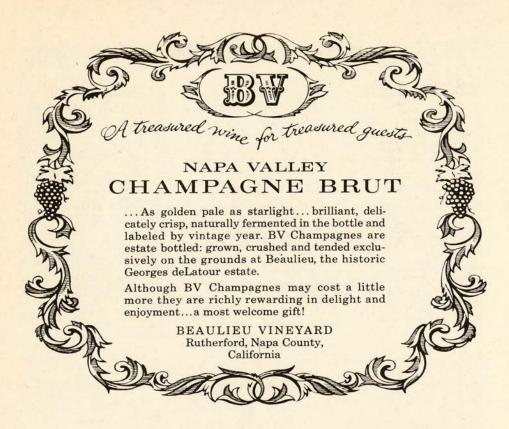
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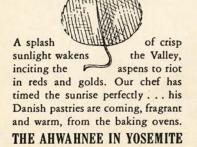
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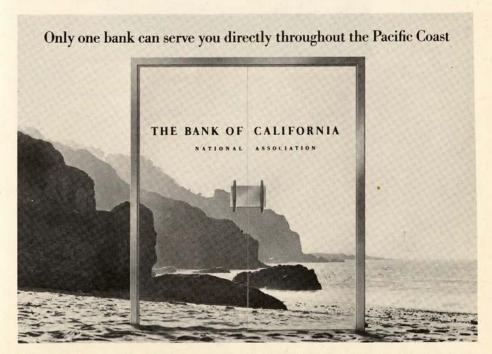


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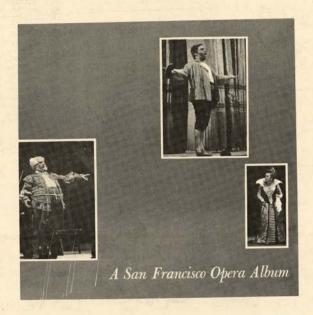
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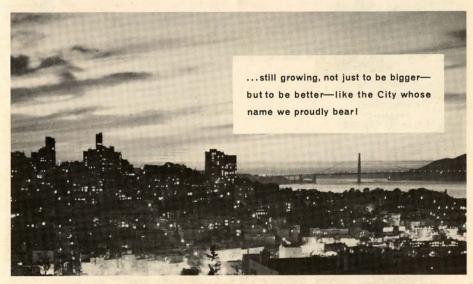
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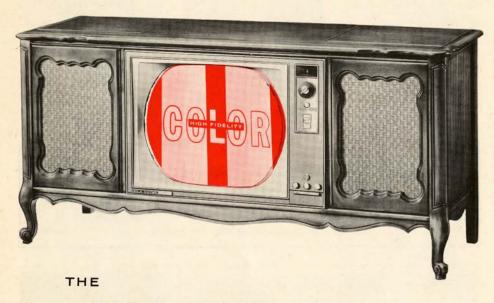
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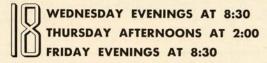
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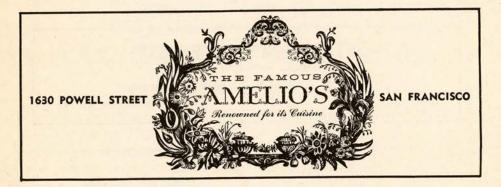
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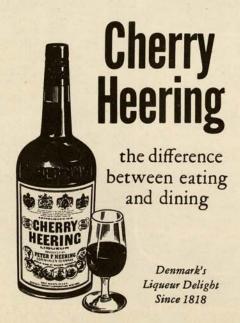
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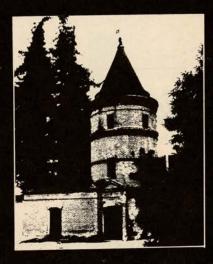
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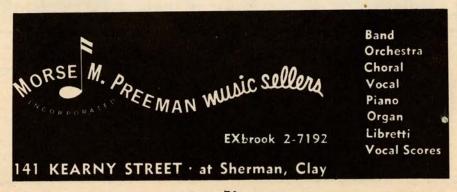
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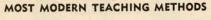


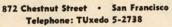
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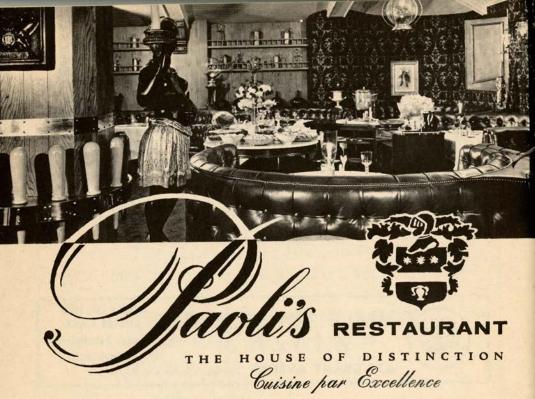
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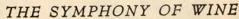
