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THE STORY OF "THE BARTERED BRIDE"

Act I—The villagers are dancing and singing in the square in celebration of the annual church festival. Jenik and Marenka are unhappily discussing the obstacles in the path of their love. Today Marenka is to meet the man her parents have chosen to be her husband. Jenik comforts her with the assurance that she will marry no one but him. He departs and soon the marriage broker, Kecal, enters with Marenka's parents. They talk with her about her prospective suitor, Vasek, son of Micha. Marenka does not wish to listen, insisting that she loves Jenik, but her father has already signed the agreement that she will marry Micha's son.

Act II—Inside the Inn Jenik and the village youths are drinking together. As Jenik expounds on the joys of love, Kecal declares that money is the only thing worth having. A moment later Vasek is encountered by Marenka. He does not know her but she has guessed his identity and warns him against marrying Marenka. In the meantime, Kecal attempts to bribe Jenik. At first Jenik is impatient with his talk but when Kecal finally bargains in terms of cash, he agrees to give up Marenka on one condition: no one else is to marry her but the son of Micha. When the contract is read aloud to the villagers, they are shocked that Jenik has sold his promised bride.

Act III—A traveling troupe of circus performers are putting on a show in the public square. Among them is a tightrope dancer, Esmeralda, with whom Vasek is enchanted. He dons a bear costume and goes through several tricks at the instigation of the troupe's manager who chose Vasek at random since his regular man is intoxicated. Vasek's parents enter and persuade the unwilling youth to accompany them to Marenka's house. There Kecal shows Marenka the contract Jenik has signed for money. Marenka is now convinced that Jenik has given her up and as he strides gaily in she refuses to hear his explanation. Kecal appears with the marriage contract. As parents and witnesses are called, Jenik is recognized by his father and the astonished Kecal sees before him another son of Micha. Marenka throws herself into the arms of Jenik and the happy couple receive their parents' blessings.

A warning gong will be sounded in the foyers six minutes before the end of each intermission. A buzzer will signal the end of the intermission.
