
WHEREAS, The San Francisco Opera has become a universal symbol of the refinement, creativity and culture of San Francisco; and

DEBUTS OF THE WEEK



LEONA GORDON

A former chorus member of the San Francisco Opera, Miss Gordon's activities recently have included a Micaela in "Carmen" at the Hollywood Bowl and Mimi in "La Boheme" with the Los Angeles Opera company. She has been soloist a number of times with the symphony orchestras of San Francisco, Sacramento, and San Diego.



JOYCE HALL

Miss Hall first came to the attention of the San Francisco Opera through the Company's annual Auditions. She has a master of music degree from the Eastman school of music in Rochester, New York, and has performed with the San Francisco and Los Angeles Civic Light Opera.

FERDINAND LEITNER

Raised in Prague and his native Berlin, Maestro Leitner's musical abilities manifested themselves so early that he was able to begin his career at the age of seventeen as a chorus director. Four years later it assumed international proportions when he served as accompanist for a number of prominent singers and instrumentalists.

At the end of the second world war Leitner joined the Hamburg opera as conductor and only one year later was appointed director of the Munich opera. In 1947 he accepted the position of musical director of the Stuttgart municipal theaters and has led the Stuttgart Opera ensemble to its present eminence.

One of the highlights of his career came when Stravinsky chose him to conduct the world premiere of "The Rake's Progress" at the Venice Biennale in 1951. The list of Leitner's guest engagements is numerous and includes Bayreuth, Vienna, Buenos Aires, London, Russia, Stockholm, Salzburg, Rome, Naples, and Paris. He is also noted for his symphonic conducting.



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PILAR LORENGAR

The soprano from Zaragoza, Spain, makes her American operatic debut as the opening night Desdemona in "Otello." She has previously sung a New York concert in 1955. Later in the current San Francisco season she will be heard as the Countess in "Le Nozze di Figaro," Micaela in "Carmen," and Liu in "Turandot."

Miss Lorengar's voice was first noticed in the school choir of her convent and she was later trained in Madrid, where she made her professional debut little more than a decade ago. It was shortly thereafter that her presence became felt on the international scene. She made her debut at Covent Garden as Violetta in "La Traviata," followed by initial appearances with the Berlin Opera and at the Glyndebourne festival. In 1958 the late Sir Thomas Beecham introduced Lorengar to Teatro Colon audiences in Buenos Aires as Pamina in "The Magic Flute."

In 1961 she sang for the first time at the Salzburg festival and in 1963 opened the festival, again as Pamina. At present Miss Lorengar is a member of the Berlin Staatsoper.

PIETRO MENCI

Now a resident of San Francisco, Menci is on the faculty of the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. His vocal training was in Rome and his professional debut took place in Bari, Italy. Engagements followed in England, Austria, Germany, Spain, and South America, leading to his opening-night Lodovico in this week's "Otello."





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ZACHARY SOLOV

American choreographer Zachary Solov's work is seen for the first time with the San Francisco Opera in Monday night's "Carmen." He will also design dances for "The Bartered Bride" and "La Traviata" this fall.

Opera is not a new field for Solov since he first worked at the Metropolitan Opera in 1951, at which time he was awarded the first annual Capezio dance award. Indeed, he will go to the Metropolitan again this fall during a break in his San Francisco activities to choreograph a new production of "Samson et Dalila" with Georges Pretre conducting.

Solov started out as a dancer, making his initial appearance at the age of fourteen with the company of Catherine Littlefield, his first teacher. He later worked under George Balanchine on a number of occasions and has appeared on Broadway and on television. This summer he choreographed the "Merry Widow" production at the new State theater in New York's Lincoln center.

EBERHARD WAECHTER

One of the most acclaimed baritones of the present day makes his San Francisco Opera debut as Amfortas in the new "Parsifal" on the second night of the season. Later appearances will include Barak in "Die Frau ohne Schatten," Count Almaviva in "Le Nozze di Figaro," and the elder Germont in "La Traviata."

Waechter is a native of Vienna and comes from a musical family, one of his forebears having been for a time general director of the Stuttgart Opera. When financial reverses interrupted his musical studies, Waechter worked for a time as a cook, accountant, and in a bank. He made his operatic debut at the Volksoper in Vienna in 1953 as Silvio in "I Pagliacci" and two years later became a permanent member of the Staatsoper. He still makes his home in Vienna and accepts only a fraction of all the guest engagements offered him each year.

His outside appearances have taken him to La Scala, Covent Garden, Rome, Paris, Munich, Berlin, Bayreuth, Chicago, and Salzburg. Waechter's versatility is phenomenal and in addition to the complete range of his operatic portrayals he has starred in musical comedy and operetta.





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
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JOHN WEST

After two Spring Opera seasons, John West makes his debut with the San Francisco Opera. Other credits in the burgeoning career of the bass from Pennsylvania include the Santa Fe, Central City, Shreveport, and Chautauqua operas. As a soloist in oratorios and other works he has sung with the orchestras of Philadelphia, Buffalo, Cincinnati, and Rochester.

ERIKA WIEN


Miss Wien was born and educated in Vienna. Concurrently with her musical studies, she took up chemistry and is the holder of a degree in engineering. Winning the Geneva International Music contest, however, turned her to a career in music, begun as an apprentice at the Vienna Staatsoper.

The young mezzo-soprano then went to Bremen and since 1959 has been a member of the Deutsche Oper am Rhein in Duesseldorf. Guest appearances have taken her to many major European theaters in such roles as Amneris, Ortrud, Octavian, Ulrica, and Brangaene. Miss Wien took part in both the German and French premieres of Shostakovich's "Katerina Ismailova."



CLAUDIA WHITE

Miss White was awarded the first annual Florence Bruce award as the second-place winner in the 1964 San Francisco Opera Auditions last June. Since then she has participated in the Merola Opera Program with appearances at Stern Grove and the Paul Masson Vineyards. At present she is six hours away from a master's degree in music from San Francisco State college.

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THE STORY OF "CARMEN"

Аст І

Micaela has come from her village, looking for Don Jose. Another corporal, Morales, tells her that Jose will arrive with the relief guard and she decides to return later. Surrounded by street arabs, Jose and the guards march in. A bell rings and the cigarette girls—mostly gypsies—stream out of the factory for a short rest. Carmen is the last and all the men are immediately drawn to her. She, however, singles out Jose and sings a habanera to him. Piqued by his indifference, she tosses a flower into his face and runs off into the factory with the other girls. Micaela returns and tells Jose that his mother has forgiven his joining the army, which he did to avoid punishment for a killing he committed in a fit of anger. In his joy, Jose vows to marry Micaela. Suddenly the cigarette girls rush out of the factory. Carmen has wounded another girl. When questioned by Zuniga, she mocks him and refuses to answer. She is placed under arrest in charge of Don Jose. While they are alone Carmen persuades Jose to let her escape.

Аст II

Carmen, Frasquita, and Mercedes entertain the customers in a tavern, amongst them Zuniga. Escamillo, a victorious matador, arrives with his retinue. Everyone toasts him while he describes his latest victory. He notices Carmen but, after expecting that she will succumb to his charms, he is gently put off, he leaves, followed by everyone else. Dancairo and Remendado emerge—the tavern camouflaging the operations of a smugglers' band. The two have plans for new expeditions, with which Frasquita and Mercedes agree. Carmen, waiting for Jose, wishes to stay. She is urged to try to make him join the band. Just released from jail, Jose enters and once more succumbs to Carmen's fascinations. Zuniga returns and finds Jose. Both men draw weapons but Zuniga is disarmed by the smugglers. In disgrace, Jose joins their band.

ACT III

The smugglers bring their contraband to their mountain fortress. The gypsy girls read their fortunes in the cards—Carmen's destiny is an early death. The band leaves, with Jose remaining behind as a guard. Micaela arrives at the fortress in a last attempt to win Jose away from the smugglers. Escamillo has also penetrated the stronghold. Upon finding that Escamillo is his rival for Carmen's love, Jose challenges him. Escamillo is saved only by the return of Carmen. Micaela is discovered and pleads with Jose. Jose, after nearly killing Carmen in a fit of jealousy, leaves with Micaela.

Аст IV

The cuadrillas arrive at the bull ring. Escamillo, who escorts Carmen, is acclaimed by the crowd as he enters the arena. Carmen has been warned that Jose is waiting for her. She waits for him as she wants to settle matters between them. Jose pleads with her to return to him, but the fanfare from the arena reminds her of Escamillo. She tries to pass Jose to enter the ring. In his rage Jose kills Carmen and collapses over her body.

A warning gong will be sounded in the foyers six minutes before the end of each intermission. A buzzer will signal the end of the intermission.

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

THE STORY OF "LE NOZZE DI FIGARO"

Аст І

Figaro and Susanna, in preparation for their forthcoming marriage, are preparing the room they will occupy. Susanna is afraid it is too close to Count Almaviva's chambers, since he has been casting desirous eyes upon her. Marcellina enters with Dr. Bartolo, to whom she complains that Figaro has previously agreed to marry her! As they depart, Cherubino comes to see Susanna. Just then the Count enters and Cherubino hides, but the Count himself is shortly forced to hide at the entrance of Don Basilio. Soon both are uncovered and the Count exiles Cherubino to the army.

Аст II

Countess Almaviva, Susanna and Figaro conspire in a plot to bring the erring Count back to his wife. The plot requires Cherubino to dress as a woman, but in the middle of the preparations the Count arrives. Cherubino hides in a closet and the Count goes off for tools to force the door. While he is gone Susanna enters the closet and Cherubino leaps from the window. All is well until the gardener complains that someone has smashed his flower pots under the window. Figaro takes the blame. Then Marcellina and her retinue enter and demand that Figaro carry out his promise to marry her.

Аст III

The Count asks Susanna for a rendezvous in the garden that evening, telling her that otherwise he will force Figaro to marry Marcellina. This is soon proved impossible, however, since due to a birth mark on his arm, Figaro turns out to be Marcellina and Dr. Bartolo's long-lost son! As the others celebrate the Countess, still mourning her own husband's indifference, dictates a note for Susanna to give him, arranging for the promised tete-a-tete that evening. The note is sealed with a pin, to be returned.

SCENE 2—The marriage of Susanna and Figaro is performed, and during the festivities Susanna slips the Count his note.

Аст IV

Barbarina, searching in the garden for the pin which the Count has given to her and she has lost, inadvertently tells Figaro of the plot which Susanna and the Countess have hatched—they will disguise themselves as each other! What follows is a comedy of errors. When Susanna (as the Countess) sings of her love for Figaro, he thinks she is referring to the Count. Cherubino enters and makes love to the Countess (thinking she is Susanna). He is sent away by the Count, who takes over himself. But when the Count sees Figaro making love to the supposed Countess (really Susanna) he loses his temper. Then the plot is exposed, and the couples happily reunited.







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The 1964 fall season of the San Francisco Opera marks the 42nd year of its proud existence, and the increasing demand for fine opera in San Francisco is gratifying. Those years since 1923 have given our Opera a reputation for excellence which assures its status among the finest opera companies of the world. Although other major opera organizations have longer seasons, the San Francisco Opera continues to capture the imagination and devotion of those all over the world who know fine opera.

The San Francisco Opera Association is closer to being self-supporting than any other major opera organization in the world. The Association works vigorously each year conducting successful fund raising campaigns vital to its support. These contributions, together with its regular income from ticket sales and guarantors, enable the San Francisco Opera to present the consistently fine artistic achievements for which it is deservedly famous. However, despite steadily rising costs, so familiar to us in every facet of our existence today, a minimum of \$160,000, the goal of last year's successful drive, is required again this year. The need for the full amount is vital.

Every effort is made by the Association at all times to establish the lowest possible operating budget, consistent with its ability to present opera of the highest standards. However, the normal processes of attrition mean that new and additional support from individuals, businesses, foundations and local government must be constantly sought, as well as continued assistance from our past contributors. By broadening the base of financial responsibility, we can provide a firm foundation for our operations. If all those who value opera's contribution to our cultural life will invest in its future, the need will be met.

Nothing can more clearly emphasize the need for financial support to meet steadily rising costs than the recent publicity resulting from our difficulty in reaching an agreement with the orchestra, despite our having made substantial concessions. Nevertheless, the Association strongly feels its obligation to ask no more of contributors than is actually needed at any time. Much will depend upon the dedication with which each individual meets his own responsibility to the Opera. We are counting upon a response from loyal contributors which will endorse the Association's efforts in establishing the 1964 goal at the minimum necessary amount.

The personal involvement of each person who loves opera must continue to grow and expand, just as the San Francisco Opera is doing. One cannot exist without the other.
