THE STORY OF "DIE FRAU OHNE SCHATTEN"

Acr I-In the Empire of the Southeastern Islands, the Nurse guards the palatial bedroom in which the Imperial pair is sleeping. Keikobad's messenger appears, and announces: "The irate father will turn the Emperor to stone, and reclaim his daughter, if she does not obtain a shadow within three days." He disappears. The Emperor emerges. He wants to go hunting for three days,

to recover his Falcon.

As soon as he has disappeared into the dawn, the Empress discovers the Falcon, and learns from it the fate her father Keikobad is threatening-turning the Emperor to stone unless she obtains a shadow. A shadow can come only from a woman of the human world, from which the Emperor has jealously tried to keep her away. She forces the reluctant nurse to help her look for a shadow. (Scene 2)-The music during the change of scene describes their flight down to the drab reality of earth.

In a hovel under the city wall, the young wife of the Dyer, Barak, is quarreling with his misshapen

brothers. She is unhappy in her marriage with the older man, who longs for children.

The Empress and the Nurse enter. The Nurse senses the unhappiness of the Dyer's wife, and plays upon it, hoping to turn it to her own advantage. By promises of a beautiful life filled with all the luxuries of which she has dreamed, she tempts the Dyer's wife to induce her to sell her shadow. As a condition the Dyer's wife must refuse herself to her husband for three days. During this time, the Empress and the Nurse will serve her during the day as maids-nights they will spend in the Imperial falcon-house. For the return of Barak, the Nurse prepares a meal, and provides for separate beds. The Dyer's wife hears the wailing, warning voices of her unborn children. Nevertheless, she refuses herself to her husband, though the exhorting voices of the gity guards are praising the sacredness of marriage.

Act II-The next day Barak is away at work and the Nurse continues to tempt his wife. She makes the phantom of a youth appear, personifying the wife's most secret desires. But as the

youth seeks to touch her, she pushes him away. Barak returns with rich food, and is surrounded by poor people and begging children. Deeply

perturbed, she does not enjoy the feast, and ruins his enjoyment too.

(Scene 2)-The Falcon has returned to the Emperor, and induces him to come at night to the falcon-house, where, according to a message, the Empress will be. But the house is empty. Suspicion grips the Emperor. He sees the Empress steal in, secretively, and fears that she has been in touch with the human world. He resolves to murder her. But he cannot bring himself to do it, and flees into the wilderness.

(Scene 3)-In the falcon-house, the Empress dreams of seeing the Emperor force his entry into Keikobad's domain, lured into the Temple by the messenger. She fears that his fate is overcoming him.

(Scene 4)-On the third day, the Dyer's wife taunts her guileless husband. She makes her wicked intentions appear fact; that she has been unfaithful and has sold her shadow. Barak wants to kill her. The Nurse, assuming that the shadow is now free, hands him the sword. The Dyer's wife realizes that in truth she loves him. The Empress becomes aware of the sinfulness of the shadow barter, and now repudiates the ownerless shadow. Keikobad's messenger enters, takes the

shadow, stops Barak from murder, and calls them all to Keikobad's judgment.
Emperor and Empress, Dyer and Dyer's wife, all have sinned. The Emperor has turned to stone.
Barak has become a murderer. The wife has lost her shadow. The Empress has obtained no shadow. All four await Keikobad's judgment, because they have sinned against their fellow men,

their husbands, and unborn children.

Act III-Barak and his wife are led by spirit servants into separate dungeons. In solitude, each one realizes that they love one another and belong together. The spirits free them to seek each other through further trials.

(Scene 2)—A shadowy boat takes the Empress and the Nurse to Keikobad's Temple. The Empress recognizes the portal-in her dream, the Emperor had entered it. The Nurse warns her against an encounter with her father, but the Empress enters the Temple.

(Scene 3)-In the Temple, the Empress wants to face Keikobad, to assume her responsibilities, and to ask for her husband's life. She does not succumb to the temptation to take the shadow from the Dyer's wife. Rather than have the unhappiness of other human beings pay for her happiness, she would die for her husband. Keikobad, as a last trial, shows her the Emperor turned to stone. Then as a gift of mercy, since she has learned to feel as a true human being, he gives her a shadow, liberates the Emperor, and frees both from the Spirit World.

(Scene 4)—Emperor and Empress return to the sun-flooded beauty of the springtime world, matured and understanding.

The Dyer couple find each other, and the wife's shadow is restored.

The chorus of future children is singing hymns of praise.

SYNOPSIS OF KATERINA ISMAILOVA

by Edward Downes

ACT 1, SCENE 1 The garden of the Ismailovs' house

Sitting in the garden is Katerina Lvovna Ismailova, a young woman about twenty-three years old, wife of Zinovy Borisovich Ismailov, the middle-aged son of the wealthy merchant Boris Timofeyevich Ismailov.

She is bored, unhappy and lonely. She has no children, no friends, and nothing to do. Her father-in-law, Boris Timofeyevich, a gluttonous lecherous old man of nearly eighty, enters and blames her for the fact that there is no heir to the family fortunes. A millhand from one of the family's distant properties arrives and tells of an accident which will require the presence of Zinovy Borisovich. Among the work-people who come to hear the news is a new hand, Sergei, who had been dismissed from his previous job because he had an affair with the master's wife.

Boris Timofeyevich humiliates Katerina Lvovna by making her swear an oath that she will be faithful to her husband while he is away.

SCENE 2 The courtyard of the Ismailovs' house

Several of the workmen, including Sergei, are teasing one of the female servants, Aksinya. Katerina Lvovna enters and makes them stop and upbraids Sergei for not treating women with more respect. He takes her hand and will not let go. Almost as a game they start to wrestle but it ceases to be a game when they find themselves in each other's arms. Boris Timofeyevich enters and Katerina Lvovna tells him that she fell over and Sergei was trying to help her up.

SCENE 3 The bedroom of Katerina Lvovna

Katerina Lvovna is preparing to go to bed. She laments the fact that she is kept in seclusion, that no one loves her and that she has no one to love. She goes to sleep but is awakened by a knock on her door. It is Sergei who has come to ask if she will lend him a book as he is so bored and cannot sleep. She sympathizes with his boredom and after a short discussion tells him to go. Sergei suggests that they should wrestle again and takes her in his arms—at first she resists but finally yields.

ACT 2, SCENE 1 The courtyard of the Ismailovs'house

The old man, Boris Timofeyevich, cannot sleep. He recalls the virile days of his youth, regrets that his son has not inherited his appreciation of women, and begins to rhapsodize over Katerina Lvovna's beauty. He notices a light in her bedroom and is about to go in himself when Sergei appears at the window, says goodbye to Katerina Lvovna, and climbs down the drainpipe. Boris Timofeyevich grabs him, immediately awakens the household and proceeds to give Sergei a whipping, having first called Katerina Lvovna to the window to watch. She is held back by the servants until the old man has finished whipping Sergei—who is carried unconscious, and locked in the storeroom.

The old man then demands something to eat—his exertions have made him hungry. Katerina Lvovna gives him some mushrooms into which she has put rat poison. The poison acts quickly and as the old man lies dying she takes the keys of the storeroom to release Sergei. Some workmen enter the courtyard and the old man sends one of them to get the priest who arrives just in time to confess the dying man.

THE STORY OF "LA TRAVIATA"

ACT I—A party is in progress in the salon of Violetta's home, and Alfredo, who has come with friends, succumbs to the charms and beauty of the hostess. The guests retire to an adjoining room to dance, but Violetta, who is suffering from the early stages of consumption, is prevented from joining them by a severe coughing-spell, and remains on the lounge to recover. Alfredo remains with her, expressing first his solicitation and then his love, which deeply touches Violetta. Later, when the guests have departed, Violetta contemplates this great new love which has come to her.

ACT II—Violetta has deserted her former life and friends, and is living most happily with Alfredo in a small country house near Paris to which they have retired. Alfredo, upon learning from Annina that Violetta has quietly been selling her jewelry to aid in defraying expenses, departs for Paris to get money with which to repay her. Alfredo's father (Germont) arrives and succeeds in persuading Violetta that she must give up Alfredo and their happiness, not only because Alfredo's own career is threatened by this liaison, but also because its continuance will jeopardize the marriage of Alfredo's sister, for whom the father also pleads. As Germont departs, Violetta writes a note of farewell to Alfredo, but he returns before she finishes. She hides the letter and conceals her real feelings. When Alfredo tells her he has heard his father is to visit them, she departs on the pretext of leaving them alone, but sends the letter back by messenger. When Germont arrives he finds his son in despair, and vainly attempts to stir him by recalling memories of his home in "fair Provence."

ACT III—Alfredo returns to Paris seeking Violetta and finds her with her new companion, Baron Douphol, at a ball being held at the palace of her friend Flora. Alfredo, winning heavily at the gaming table, challenges the Baron to a game and adds still further to his winnings. When the guests retire for supper, Violetta returns, followed at her request by Alfredo, whom she implores to leave, fearful of the prospect of a duel between the two men. Alfredo bitterly charges her with falseness, which, remembering the promise to Germont, she does not deny. Alfredo summons the guests and before them all denounces her, throwing at her feet his winnings of the evening. As Violetta faints, Germont arrives seeking his son. He alone knows the tragic significance of the scene, but for the sake of his son and daughter cannot disclose it.

ACT IV—Violetta is now confined to her bed by the ravages of the disease from which she has suffered, and, although the doctor attempts to cheer and reassure her, she knows she has not long to live. She is cheeered by a letter from Germont, who would seek to undo the damage he has done, and writes that Alfredo is returning to seek her pardon. But she feels it will be too late. Alfredo arrives, and in the great happiness of the moment they plan to leave Paris; but the excitement proves too much, and, as Germont and the doctor arrive, Violetta collapses in her lover's arms.

SCENE 2 Katerina Lvovna's bedroom

It is about a week later. Katerina Lvovna and Sergei are in bed. They have had seven wonderful nights together but Sergei knows that their love cannot go on because Katerina Lvovna's husband, Zinovy Borisovich, will return. Katerina Lvovna calms his fears and he goes to sleep. Katerina Lvovna imagines she sees the ghost of Boris Timofeyevich in the corner, accusing her. She awakens Sergei who, in turn, calms her fears. They both fall asleep but are awakened again by the sound of someone outside the bedroom door. It is Zinovy Borisovich. Katerina Lvovna delays opening the door to give Sergei time to hide. When her husband finally enters he is exceedingly suspicious and tells Katerina Lvovna that he has heard all sorts of scandalous rumours about her while he was away. He finds Sergei's belt and when Katerina Lvovna answers him back he starts to beat her with it. She calls out Sergei to help her and in the ensuing struggle Zinovy Borisovich is killed. They hide the body in the cellar.

ACT 3, SCENE 1 The courtyard, near to the cellar entrance

It is the morning of the wedding of Katerina Lvovna and Sergei. Katerina Lvovna, haunted by the memory of the two murders, is staring at the cellar door—behind which is hidden the body of Zinovy Borisovich. Sergei enters, tells her to be careful or people will notice. They go off to church. The Village Drunk enters. He sings a song in praise of drinking and, in order to console himself because Katerina Lvovna chose Sergei and not him as husband, he decides to break open the lock of the cellar and sample some of the expensive wines that are kept there. He discovers the body and rushes off to tell the police.

SCENE 2 The Ismailovs' courtyard

The wedding feast. The guests toast the bridal pair and, led by the Priest, the company becomes more and more intoxicated. Katerina Lvovna notices the lock has been broken on the cellar door and realizes that they have been discovered. She sends Sergei to get the ready money and prepares to escape when the guests have drunk themselves into a stupor. The sounds of the approaching police are heard and she realizes that all is lost. The police, led by the inspector, enter and arrest Katerina Lvovna and Sergei.

ACT 4, On the banks of a lake on the road to Siberia

Katerina Lvovna and Sergei, having been condemned to imprisonment in Siberia, are members of a convict train marching across the steppes. Sergei has deserted Katerina Lvovna and is paying attention to the young pretty Sonyetka, another convict. Katerina Lyovna bribes the guard who allows her to pass to the area where the male convicts are sleeping. She tells Sergei once more of her love for him but he repulses her and blames her for his position now. She retires in despair. Sergei now goes over to Sonyetka who tells him that he must prove his love for her by getting her some woollen stockings-she suggests he tries his 'rich merchant's wife'. Sergei now goes to Katerina Lvovna, begs her forgiveness and says that his legs have been so wounded by the fetters they wear that he can go no further and that this is probably the last time they will see each other. If only he had some woollen stockings it might relieve the pain. Katerina Lvovna joyfully gives him her own, whereupon Sergei immediately takes them over to Sonyetka who, now convinced of Sergei's worth, goes off into the bushes with him. Katerina Lvovna is horrified and is taunted by the other female convicts. Finally Sonyetka comes back and flaunts herself in front of Katerina Lvovna. As the guard wakens the convicts to resume their journey Katerina Lyovna pushes Sonyetka into the lake and then jumps in herself.



However, the normal processes of attrition mean that new and additional support from individuals, businesses, foundations and local government must be constantly sought, as well as continued assistance from our past contributors. By broadening the base of financial responsibility, we can provide a firm foundation for our operations. If all those who value opera's contribution to our cultural life will invest in its future, the need will be met.

Nothing can more clearly emphasize the need for financial support to meet steadily rising costs than the recent publicity resulting from our difficulty in reaching an agreement with the orchestra, despite our having made substantial concessions. Nevertheless, the Association strongly feels its obligation to ask no more of contributors than is actually needed at any time. Much will depend upon the dedication with which each individual meets his own responsibility to the Opera. We are counting upon a response from loyal contributors which will endorse the Association's efforts in establishing the 1964 goal at the minimum necessary amount.

The personal involvement of each person who loves opera must continue to grow and expand, just as the San Francisco Opera is doing. One cannot exist without the other.
