Strauss' "Elektra"

by BRUCE DONNELL

Elektra marks the beginning of the collaboration between Richard Strauss and Hugo von Hofmannsthal which was to color Strauss's entire artistic life. Following Wagner's example, Strauss had previously written his own libretto for Guntram and most recently had himself adapted Oscar Wilde's play of Salome, after having seen it in Berlin, for his own opera. Similarly, when Strauss saw Hofmannsthal's play in Berlin, the musical-dramatic possibilities immediately struck him and he contacted the poet as to the possibility of using it as a libretto. Although the personalities of the Bavarian composer and the refined poet differed immensely, Strauss was quick to sense the value of their relationship; he wrote in an early letter, "we were born for one another and are certain to do fine things together if you remain faithful to me."

Strauss's only hesitancy in setting Elektra to music was his fear of his own inability to compose in a fresh style so soon after Salome, which he considered similar in many respects. Although begged by Strauss for a work on Semiramis or Cesare Borgia during the early stages of composition, Hofmannsthal persuaded Strauss to pursue Elektra, saying that the "similarities" amounted to no more than both are one-act plays, both have a woman's name for a title, both occur in classical antiquity, and both parts were originally created by the same actress in Berlin. He extolled the opportunities for music to heighten the qualities of light and dark and intensify the rapid sequence of events leading to the climax. Strauss accepted this and later (1946—Reminiscences of the First Performance of my Operas) set down the individual points of attack of each opera:

Salome: the contrasts, the court of Herod, Jochanaan, the Jews, the Nazarenes Elektra: the possessed goddess of vengeance contrasted with the radiant character

of her mortal sister

Salome: the three seduction songs of Salome, Herod's three persuasive speeches, Salome's ostinato "Ich will den Kopf des Jochanaan" (I want the head of Jochanaan)

Elektra: the first monologue; the unending climaxes in the scene between Elektra and Chrysothemis in the scene between Elektra and Klytämnestra (both unfor-

tunately extensively cut)

Strauss began composition of the opera in June of 1906. The play was abridged somewhat, and Strauss rejected the suggestion that Aegisth be omitted but agreed that the murders should take place out of sight. Conducting engagements kept him from *Elektra* through 1907, but with the aid of a leave of absence, he was able to complete the work in September 1908. He chose Dresden, the site of the *Salome* première, for the first performance on January 25th, 1909.

The actual reception of the first performance is something of an enigma, owing to conflicting reports. Strauss greatly admired the Elektra, Annie Krull, although Ernestine Schumann-Heink was totally miscast as Klytämnestra. Hofmannsthal was displeased by both the production and the performance. The tenor Angelo Neumann even wired to Prague that the performance had been a disaster. Within a year, however, performances followed in Berlin, Munich, Hamburg, Vienna, Milan, London.

and New York.

Strauss claimed to have "penetrated to the uttermost limits of harmony, psychological polyphony (Klytämnestra's dream), and the receptivity of modern ears." The opera is an example of expressionism at its full height, Strauss demanding an enormous orchestra of 111 players to produce his full palette of bold colors. Schumann-Heink called the opera "a fearful din." It lasted two performances at Hammerstein's Manhattan Opera in 1910, described by a critic as "putrid morbidity." Contemporary caricatures depicted Strauss subjecting his audiences to the tortures of the "Elektric Chair." Even the most conservative audiences of today, however, have long accepted the opera, and, after Der Rosenkavalier, it is the most widely-performed of the Strauss-Hofmannsthal operas.

The psychological analytical approach of the authors is typical of the age in which they lived, but remains compelling to audiences of today. Another viewpoint of Elektra and an incidental commentary on present-day conditions in the location of the première is found in the East German critic Ernst Krause's book, Richard Strauss,

the Man and his Work (Collet's, London, 1964)

The nature of both works (Salome and Elektra) can be understood only with reference to the social structure of opera at the dawn of the present century, and the question of their lasting life is first and foremost sociological. Operas such as Salome and Elektra will always retain their power over the public in a bourgeoiscapitalistic society. In both works Strauss skilfully employed decadent forms of expression to present socially negative elements of dissolution within the sphere of modern opera. However much life still remains in the music, the typical features of this morbid age of decadence, with its craving for sensual satiety and its blindness to reality, now appear as products of soul-destroying luxury... What is monstrous remains monstrous. No one should attempt to regard it otherwise.

The opera divides into two halves, the first introducing the female protagonists, and the second initiating the action of the murders with the announcement of Oreste's "death."

The atmosphere is set in the prologue, the five maids taking the place of the classical Greek chorus. One of the principal images introduced is that of Elektra's having been reduced to the condition of an animal, to which Hofmannsthal makes constant reference in his stage directions. Her first brief appearance is described as an animal emerging from and then regaining its burrow. Near the end of the opera, as Elektra waits for Orest to murder Klytämnestra, she is described as a wild beast walking back and forth in a cage. She is beaten and treated like a dog, say the maids (Hofmannsthal again uses the image of the dog for degradation in *Die Frau ohne Schatten* in the person of the Nurse who is referred to as "Hündin.") The one maid who recognizes and honors Elektra's royal blood is beaten for her loyalty.

Elektra in her monologue is like a wolf howling at sunset. She relives the terror of her father's murder to the point of believing she had seen him the day before in a shadow. She has visions of blood pouring from sacrificial victims and animals. She views herself and her sister Chrysothemis as blood priestesses who must execute and celebrate their father's revenge.

Chrysothemis is a creature of light in total contrast to Elektra. She feels the fire of life within her and wants nothing more than to leave the lifeless stone palace for a normal family life even to the point of forsaking her royal lineage to marry a peasant. She would rather be a woman than an instrument of revenge.

Heralded by a deafening crescendo in the orchestra, Klytämnestra enters. The animal imagery is continued as sacrificial animals are driven before her, and one of her companions is described as resembling a snake. Whereas Chrysothemis is a ripe fruit longing to produce, Klytämnestra is a soul imprisoned in a barren desert of a body. Everything about her is heavy; she can scarcely keep her eyelids open, and she is covered with stones she considers powerful but whose power she is unable to unlock.

Clinging to her like two vultures picking at a carcass are her two advisors who urge her to endless sacrifice to terminate that which devours her now—the nightmare of Orest's return. Believing the dreams will end if the right blood is shed, she asks Elektra if she knows what animal is the proper victim. Elektra seizes her mother's words and taunts her, ironically describing Klytämnestra's own murder, saying that it is an impure beast, a woman, in fact, who must be slain by a particular man. The more detail in which Elektra describes the murder, the more the uncomprehending Klytämnestra is pleased that Elektra seems less rude than usual.

When Elektra abruptly changes the subject to the banished Orest, Klytämnestra shows her contempt for her in describing how he stammers and lies with the dogs, since he is unable to distinguish dog from man. As Klytämnestra tries to convince herself that she is well guarded from any potential attack, Elektra savagely describes in minute detail the hunting and killing of her mother by Orest. Orest will be the hunter, and she will be the dog pursuing the beast: in the shadow of Agamemnon there will be no escape. The first half of the opera ends with Elektra's pronouncement that with Klytämnestra's death, those who live now will finally know life.

Part two begins with Chrysothemis's announcement, "screaming like a wounded animal," of Orest's death learned from the two strangers. Klytämnestra's disposition changes abruptly from terror to triumph. Elektra refuses to believe the news until a messenger (the first man to appear in the opera) departs to inform Aegisth.

Elektra decides to take the action she had reserved for Orest—she must take the axe she had hidden and herself carry out the sacrifice. In an attempt to persuade Chrysothemis to aid her, she praises her sister's physical qualities, driven almost to a display of lesbianism. Elektra promises to serve Chrysothemis forever if her sister will serve her now, but Chrysothemis is repulsed and cannot bring herself to aid Elektra in her revenge. Elektra curses her and resolves to act alone.

The Recognition Scene is one of the most moving that Strauss ever wrote. Orest hides his identity until he is recognized by old servants; he reveals himself in the tradition of the Odyssey: "The dogs of the courtyard know me, but not my sister." For a few moments, Elektra becomes aware of her condition as opposed to the princess she was, when she faces the brother to whose return she has dedicated her life. She has sacrificed all to become the priestess of her father's revenge. As Orest expresses his determination to act, the blood-priestess Elektra blesses him. Elektra's obsession with revenge has rendered her insane. Although she celebrates the revenge in her dance at the end of the opera, she herself takes no action and is responsible for no action. Her attempts to rouse Chrysothemis are fruitless, and Orest returned to take revenge without even knowing if Elektra lived. At the decisive moment in her role as priestess administering the sacrificial rite, she fails; the axe which she has guarded for so long remains buried. In spite of all she wants to do, she actually does nothing.

Having received the news of Orest's "death," Aegisth returns. Elektra has the opportunity to partially fulfill her role as princess in dancing a strange consecrational dance as she light's Aegisth's way into the palace.

Elektra feels a kinship with the gods. Having existed as a corpse living solely on

Oueen Klytemnestra and Aegisthus have murdered King Agamemnon. She has sent her son Orestes into exile, and her two daughters Elektra and Chrysothemis have been moved to the servant's quarters. Elektra has become obssessed with the thought of vengeance for her father and lives for the return of her brother who shall be the instrument of her revenge.

The serving maids discuss the two sisters and the degradation they have undergone. When they have left, Elektra enters mourning her murdered father and promising vengeance. Chrysothemis enters with the news that Elektra is to be put in a dungeon, and says that it is better to die than live as they are living. Elektra rebukes her, consumed by the thought of vengeance.

Queen Klytemnestra and her entourage enter. Though afraid of her daughter, the Queen speaks to Elektra, asking if there isn't a sacrifice that will drive away the demons that keep her from sleep. Elektra answers yes, and Klytemnestra warily asks what it is. "The blood of your own veins" Elektra replies. A confidente enters and whispers to the Queen, whose horror turns to scorn as she leaves for the palace.

Chrysothemis rushes in with news that Orestes is dead. Elektra, excited, says they must now carry out the vengeance themselves, but Chrysothemis refuses to aid her. Elektra curses her and prepares to do the deed herself. A man appears and she discovers that it is Orestes whose death was falsely reported. He soon enters the palace and a scream is heard from the murdered Queen. Aegisthus enters and Elektra lights his way to the palace. He too meets death by Orestes' hand. Elektra, triumphant at last, dances wildly in her joy and passion, and at the climax, she falls lifeless.

A warning gong will be sounded in the foyer six minutes before the end of each intermission. A buzzer will signal the end of the intermission



the hope of this slaughter, she now feels like a flame in the darkness of the world around her. Regardless of the fact that she had little to do with the execution of the dead, she grows gradually oblivious to all around her. As Chrysothemis rejoices in life-giving love, Elektra believes only that love kills.

Elektra calls for all to be silent and dance with her. Her existence justified, she collapses. The person who has struggled most to be a human being, the life-loving Chrysothemis is left alone with her dead sister and calling vainly for Orest.

Strauss never again wrote so compact an opera so filled with tension. The Mozart Rosenkavalier was his next creation, and when he returned to Greece it was through the Baroque Ariadne. In Die Agyptische Helena and in Die Liebe der Danae, Strauss was the self-styled Offenbach of the Twentieth Century. Daphne is the closest in style of his late works to Elektra, but it is the product of a serene mind. The heights of musical exploration that Strauss touched in Elektra were never again touched by him. Owing much to the influence of Hofmannsthal, Strauss was never again in the vanguard of Twentieth Century music and remained the last of the great Nineteenth Century Romantic composers.
