Next Saturday Evening Series performance: November 4, at 8:00 FAUST (in French) Gounod

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Latecomers will not be seated while the performance is in progress. A warning bell will ring in all foyers five minutes before the end of every intermission. Three minutes prior to the start of each act a final buzzer will sound.

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PROLOGUE

ACT I: A WARNING. Three men and an Inspector intrude upon Carter Jones and warn him that he is known to their superiors.

THE NEIGHBOR. Carter Jones' honesty and affection are betrayed and ridiculed by his landlady and by his neighbor, Miss Hampton.

A SUMMONING. Two deputies seek out Carter Jones at the drugstore where he works and summon him to appear the next evening at a warehouse.

AN INTERROGATION. A Saturday night gathering of men interrogates and further intimidates Carter Jones.

ACT II: THE COURTHOUSE. At the Legal Aid Society offices, where he had hoped for help, Carter Jones discovers corruption of the laws and resignation in its executors. AN ENCOUNTER. Chuck and three companions follow and attack Carter Jones and his

THE WHIPPER. Carter Jones finds two of the men who had ransacked his room being whipped but fears to help them.

A DREAM.

THE UNCLE. Carter Jones' Uncle Albert reluctantly consents to help him.

THE LAWYER. Carter Jones is horrified by the figures to whom his Uncle Albert has led him: Held, an unscrupulous lawyer, and Patterson, Held's associate. He escapes into another room where he faces the seduction attempts of Held's maid, Teena.

ACT III: THE NIGHTCLUB MANAGER. From Angelo Pulisi, a nightclub manager and underworld operator, Carter Jones learns that he has no chance for freedom. Before he can decide whether he should accept temporary release, Pulisi is called away for a show rehearsal.

THE PREACHER. A preacher, to whom Carter Jones has turned in final desperation, chastises Carter Jones for his past ungodliness and evades his pleas for help.

THE SACRIFICE. Wandering hopelessly through the streets Carter Jones is pursued to his death.

EPILOGUE.

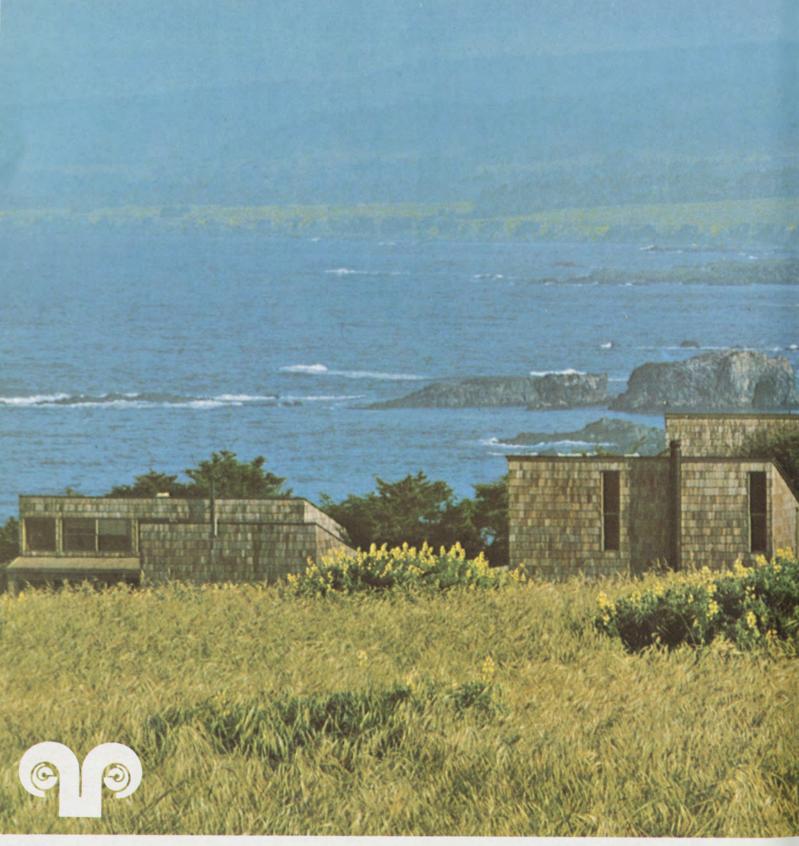

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Get the credit you deserve

GUNTHER SCHULLER



Gunther Schuller's life has been literally steeped in music since his birth on November 22, 1925 in New York. The son of a violinist with the New York philharmonic symphony orchestra, he heard music all through his childhood but did not become actively interested in it until the age of twelve, when he joined the St. Thomas choir school as a boy soprano. There his interest was aroused both in composition and in instrumental playing. His first instrument was the flute, but at fourteen he switched to the french horn. He developed so rapidly on the latter that two years later he left high school and the Manhattan school of music (where he had been studying horn, theory and counterpoint) to play horn professionally with the Ballet Theatre orchestra. In 1943 at the age of 17, he became the first horn player of the Cincinnati symphony. It was with that orchestra that he made his debut both as a soloist and composer, performing his own horn concerto with Eugene Goosens conducting. At 19, he joined the Metropolitan Opera orchestra, where he remained for the next fifteen years—nine of them playing solo

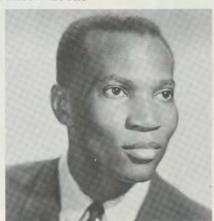
Entirely self-taught as a composer, Schuller resigned from his position in the Met orchestra in 1959 in order to devote his time more completely to creative work, and since then one commission has followed

Gunther Schuller's exceptional virtuosity as a composer, performer, conductor, teacher, lecturer, radio commentator, and writer has established him as one of the most distinguished musicians of our times. As a conductor, he organized the outstanding series of concerts entitled "Twentieth Century Innovations" in Carnegie recital hall, and in 1963 he became supervisor of the Fromm fellowship players for the festival of contemporary music at Tanglewood. His radio series, Contemporary Music in Evolution, comprising 154 weekly broadcasts, was created originally for WBAI in New York and subsequently was heard over 77 stations of the National Association of Educational Broadcasters. As a teacher, he was appointed to the faculty of Yale university in 1964 as associate professor. From 1963 to 1965 he was acting head of the composition department of the Berkshire music festival at Tanglewood, and in 1965 he was appointed its head.

Schuller's musical interests span many styles. He has published numerous articles about jazz and is currently working on a musico-analytical study of jazz for Oxford university press, which published his book on *Horn Technique* in 1962. His affinity for jazz led him to a long association with musicians such as John Lewis, Ornette Cole-

Debut Artists in "The Visitation"

SIMON ESTES



Bass-baritone Estes, who was Uncle Albert in the world premiere of "The Visitation" in Hamburg in 1966, is seen for the first time by San Francisco Opera audiences tonight in the leading role of Carter Jones, Later in the season he does Colline in "La Boheme"

Estes was catapulted to fame as one of the three American winners of the Tchai-kovsky vocal competition in Moscow in 1966. Prior to that, however, he had already fulfilled major operatic commitments with the Berlin Deutsche Oper and spent a season under contract to the Lubeck Opera in Germany. This followed graduation from the University of Iowa and scholarship studies at the Juilliard school of music. In addition to his operatic work Estes also appeared with great success in recital in Berlin and as orchestral soloist in Munich and Stuttgart

After his return from Moscow he was honored at a special White House reception at which Kurt Herbert Adler was among the guests. Singing engagements followed at the Tanglewood festival and the Hollywood Bowl and in the spring of 1967 Estes performed for the first time in San Francisco in Spring Opera's "The Tales of Hoffmann" and as soloist with the San Francisco Symphony.

man, and the late Eric Dolphy.

It was Schuller who coined the term "third stream" in reference to music that amalgamates concepts of "contemporary classical" music with avante-garde jazz. In explaining his viewpoint about this new style, he says: "I do not believe in qualitative distinctions between various styles and idioms per se. Each work of art must be judged on its own merits, and great musical creations can in principal be realized in any idiom, limited only by the limitations of the composer. We live today in an era of music synthesis—a synthesis which is attempting to bring together the various stylistic revo-lutions which shook the world of music in the first decades of our century. This is not a process which composers are intellectually or artificially forcing into being. It seems simply to be characteristic of mid-century musical developments, perhaps because certain styles and idioms remained seemingly irreconcilable for so many years. I believe that the serial technique is the most meaningful method so far discovered to organize present-day musical resources. I believe also that jazz has developed, through the improvisational medium, a natural, strongly individual, basically unnotatable feeling and spontaneity which has an extraordinary communicative potential. I believe these two forces (serial technique and jazz) will primarily determine the course of music in the next several decades."

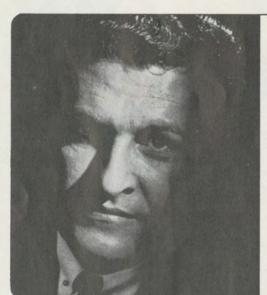

FELICIA WEATHERS



The role of Teena sung by Miss Weathers tonight is one she created in the world premiere of "The Visitation" in Hamburg last year.

The petite American soprano is a native of St. Louis, Missouri, and originally started on a medical career at the urging of her parents. But music, which had been important to her since earliest childhood, soon won out and she entered the 1957 Metropolitan Opera Auditions and won second prize. After graduating from Indiana uni-versity, Miss Weathers went to Europe where she won Bulgaria's first international

singing competition.

Her initial opera appearance followed in 1961 in Kiel as "Salome" and was so successful that she was invited to repeat the role in Munich and shortly afterwards was given a contract for the Vienna Staatsoper by Herbert von Karajan. Her bow at the

Metropolitan was in '1965 as Lisa in "Pique Dame" and last fall Chicago heard her as Renata in "The Flaming Angel".

Miss Weathers' repertoire is exceptionally varied and ranges from "Aida" to Melisande and from Prince Orlofsky to the Kaiserin in "Die Frau ohne Schatten"!

ALAN CROFOOT



One of Canada's leading opera singers makes his first San Francisco Opera appear-ances tonight, and later in the season will be Alcindoro in "La Boheme".

Weighing in at more than three hundred

pounds, Crofoot is easily recognizable onstage and once performed as Santa Claus in a television film series of "Tugboat Annie". He has also done musical comedy (Nicely-Nicely in "Guys and Dolls"), operetta ("Orpheus in the Underword"), legitimate plays, television, and films. And he has a master's

degree in psychology!
But opera is his first love and Crofoot is a regular with the Canadian Opera company both in Toronto and on tour and has sung for a season with Sadlers' Wells in London. Last season he was the "Salome" Herod in San Antonio and Aegisthus in "Elektra" in New Orleans.

RAGNAR ULFUNG



Ulfung, who was born in Oslo, was a featured soloist with Norway's famous Olavs-guttene boys' choir at the age of ten. After the second world war he embarked on serious vocal studies in Milan and returned to Oslo in 1953 to make his debut at the Norwegian National Opera in the title role of "Faust".

Engagements followed in Italy, Germany, and Yugoslavia and culminated in a debut at the Stockholm Royal Opera in 1958 as at the Stockholm Royal Opera in 1950 as Canio in "I Pagliacci", after which he sang leading roles in "Carmen", "Tosca", "Tales of Hoffmann", "Rigoletto", and "Un Ballo in Maschera". For his portrayal of Riccardo in the Verdi work (which he will sing here in November) Ulfung won international action. He repeated the role at Covent Carmeter and the releast Carmeter and the re claim. He repeated the role at Covent Garden and the Edinburgh festival.

Ulfung also has been hailed for his Tom Rakewell in "The Rake's Progress" which he first created in the production of Ingmar Bergman in Stockholm. Last summer the tenor appeared with both the Stockholm contingent and the Hamburg Staatsoper at Expo '67 in Montreal and with the latter in New York as well.

EUGENE HOLMES



Klebe is currently in his second season with the San Francisco Opera's Western Opera Theater and has also sung with Spring Opera. He is a regional winner of the San Francisco Opera Auditions and has participated in the Merola Opera Program. The young baritone has appeared with the Goldovsky Opera Theater, Riverside Opera, and the Laguna Beach Opera.

A rendition of "Without A Song" when he was a junior in St. Louis' Washington

technical high school inspired a classmate of Holmes to suggest vocal studies. He then graduated from Arkansas state college, took

graduate work at St. Louis university, and became a graduate assistant at the school of music of Indiana university.

During this time Holmes gained experi-

ence with the St. Louis grand opera guild

and an opera workshop in West Virginia. He entered the 1963 Metropolitan Opera

Auditions and in 1964 won the national championship on the Ted Mack television

show. During the 1966-67 season he toured the United States as a member of the Metropolitan Opera National company.

ALLAN WENTT



An ordained priest in the Episcopal church, baritone Wentt is also a 1967 graduate of the Juilliard school of music and was four-times winner of the school's coveted Enrico Caruso memorial fellowship. He was born in Kingston, Jamaica, grew up in Panama and began his voice studies there. His present plans include a return to Juilliard next year for a master's degree.

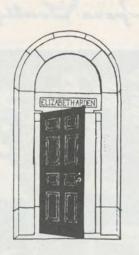

This exciting program seems likely to make the 1967 season the most popular in our history. Its broad appeal is reflected in the increased number of subscribers the Company has enrolled — more than ever before. And advance single ticket sales promise the highest ratio of attendance in our experience.

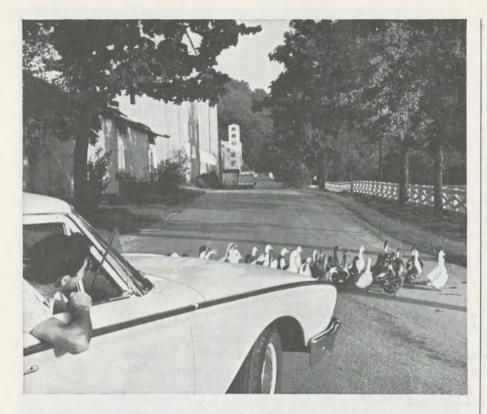
While we intend to continue the basic policies that have made the San Francisco Opera pre-eminent, our strong audience interest has led us to embark on certain expansion moves that we feel are now essential for both artistic and economic reasons. For example, the recently announced alliance with the Los Angeles Music Center Opera Company, which will result in a full and equal partnership within the next few years, holds great promise for both cities. The resources thus combined will enable us to present ever higher quality performances while effecting economies that will help control production costs.

Grand opera is an art form. It cannot be automated. First-rate performances depend on first-rate artists, and on a host of other experienced professionals. These personal services, not surprisingly, become more expensive each year. Present income from the box office enables us to meet more than 70 per cent of our budget, a high figure in comparison with other companies. However, the balance, an ever-increasing deficit, can only be met through our annual Fund Drive, now in progress.

We are proud of the significant public support that our Company receives. Still, it is vital to the success of our operations that the 1967 Fund Drive goal of \$400,000 be met and, hopefully, exceeded. In relying on the generous financial support of each individual friend of the San Francisco Opera, we look forward to a new season well worthy of our status as a leading international company.

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Travel Tidbits

Greece, the all too often by-passed country on the European tour programs, today has much to offer the visitor. Situated at the gateway of Europe and Asia Minor, its present day character is a blend of both East and West. Athens, its capital, reflects the culture of the past in its structures of simple straight line, unlike the ornate rather opulent counterparts of other European capitals.

The visitor will get the impression of everything being blue and white; even the newspapers use blue ink, giving a rather naive appearance. However, this country, the culture of which was the cornerstone of modern western civilization, is having a renaissance of its own. This coming summer the visitor will be able to attend performances of Greek Opera and Ballet, based on the Mythology.

Most people consider Italy as the home of Opera, and of course they have done much in this field. However, its birthplace was in fact Greece, and it was not until the early 14th century that the Italians founded their own school in Florence. Von Gluck, father of German Opera, also used Greek Mythology to base his Orfeo ed Euridice and his Alceste. The latter was a favorite of Arturo Toscanini.

It is interesting to note that contests in musical poetry were held as important as the competitions in physical aptitudes during the Games. Many of the performances to be seen during the early spring and summer are held in the open air on the temple sites, which give a ring of authenticity to the performances.

The visitor will find his Odyssey to Greece to be one of the most rewarding. The "Greeks have a word for it" and the word is "Welcome".
