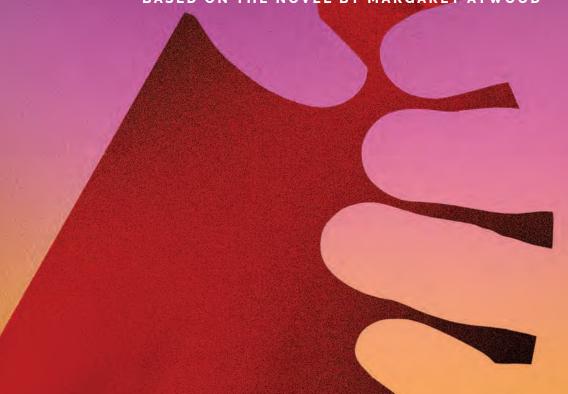

Un Ballo In Maschera (A Masked Ball)

MUSIC BY GIUSEPPE VERDI · LIBRETTO BY ANTONIO SOMMA

Structure: 3 acts with 2 intermissions

Running time: 3 hours

Language: Italian with English supertitles

Key Characters:

- · Gustavus III, King of Sweden who loves Amelia
- Amelia, wife of Renato who is torn by her affection for the king
- · Renato, the king's adviser and friend
- · Oscar, the king's page
- · Ulrica, a fortune teller

Un Ballo in Maschera (or *Ballo* for short) is one of Verdi's most direct and tightly constructed operas. *Ballo*'s relatively simple story—a love triangle that leads to murder at a masked ball—

owes much of its tension, drama, humor, and romance to Verdi's musical imagination. The score, which opens with a four-note motive that develops into a complex web of light and dark gestures, illuminates the characters and their motivations. *Ballo* is filled with jocular moments (especially for the king and Oscar) which Verdi contrasts with music depicting more elemental passions to create a masterwork that both gets the heart pounding and the feet tapping.

Listen for: In Act III, Scene 1, Renato's aria "Eri tu" ("You were the one") is arguably the opera's turning point. The aria, which captures the moment when an essentially good man reaches his breaking point, challenges the singer to use the full range of their voice while portraying an expansive range of emotions. "Eri tu" is one of the most important arias in the baritone repertoire.

The Handmaid's Tale

- The Commander, a member of Gilead's leading class

Poul Ruders' operatic interpretation of Margaret Atwood's best-selling novel *The Handmaid's Tale* received its world premiere in 2000 at Copenhagen's Royal Danish Theatre. This

production marks the opera's West Coast premiere in a new co-production between Copenhagen's The Royal Danish Theatre and San Francisco Opera. The story takes place in a dystopian American future where women are forced into child-bearing servitude by the theocratic regime of Gilead. Atwood's chilling vision of a post-democratic reign of terror, adapted in Paul Bentley's libretto, finds vivid expression in Ruders' score. The Grammy-nominated composer employs a large orchestra including an expanded battery of percussion instruments and digital sound effects, along with a chorus, to create the opera's haunting sound world.

Did you know? The Handmaid's Tale has been adapted for a variety of works on the page, stage, and screen including a 1990 feature film, a ballet, several stage plays, and the Emmy- and Golden Globe Award-winning Hulu series starring Elisabeth Moss.

nce again, the unprecedented generosity of Cynthia and John Gunn has set the stage for a dazzling season at San Francisco Opera. Since 2002, when John joined the Opera Board, the couple has underwritten numerous productions and provided exceptional support for many of the Company's innovative endeavors. In September 2008, the Gunns made a historic commitment—believed to be the largest gift ever made by individuals to an American opera company—to help fund the signature projects of then General Director David Gockley, including new operas and productions, multimedia projects, and outreach programs, and they have proudly continued that support for General Director Matthew Shilvock. This season, the Gunns' inspired generosity is helping make possible four productions—Un Ballo in Maschera, The Handmaid's Tale, Tristan and Isolde, and La Bohème—and the Beethoven 9 Concert. Jerome & Thao Dodson (Production Sponsor, Un Ballo in Maschera)

"A fiery horse with the speed of light, a cloud of dust, and a hearty, 'Hi-Yo, Silver!" Those words, accompanied by the galloping excitement of Rossini's *William Tell* Overture, transfixed a young Jerry Dodson as he listened to *The Lone Ranger* on the family radio in Oak Park, Illinois. Just as Bugs Bunny's *Rabbit of Seville* had done for many, a lighthearted entertainment sparked a future operatic devotion.

That little boy grew up to attend Berkeley in the 1960s, serve with the American Embassy in Vietnam where he and Thao met, and attend Harvard Business School. Eventually, the couple married, settled in the Bay Area, and raised a family. In the 1980s, Jerry was a pioneer in the field of socially responsible investing with little interest in opera. But in 1992, when San Francisco Opera celebrated Rossini's

bicentennial with the rarely performed William Tell, Thao, already an opera lover, suggested to Jerry that they go.

William Tell was praised for its striking Lotfi Mansouri production, and the Dodsons began attending regularly. They became season ticket holders in 1999 and supporters "in a small way," as Jerry puts it. A friendship with David Gockley, which endures to this day, led to a larger role as Company Sponsors. "I so admired what he did for the opera, but it was not very good for my pocketbook," Jerry laughs. Jerry also lends his financial expertise to the audit committee.

In 2016, Dodson considered the import of Gockley's departure. He met with Matthew Shilvock and joined the board that year. "We hit it off right away!" Jerry says. He felt a similar affinity with Keith Geeslin, then President of the San Francisco Opera Association. Eager to continue support, the Dodsons see this as a perfect time to revitalize and energize the Company within the San Francisco community. The initial fire ignited by *William Tell* continues to burn brightly.

Phyllis C. Wattis Fund for New Productions (Production Sponsor, *The Handmaid's Tale*)

San Francisco Opera owes a heartfelt debt of gratitude to Phyllis C. Wattis for her many generous and visionary gifts to the Company that include an endowment that established the Phyllis C. Wattis Fund for New Productions. Mrs. Wattis passed away in June 2002 at the age of 97. During her life she generously supported many Bay Area nonprofit organizations and was especially interested in the arts, also contributing her time, wisdom, and leadership to the fine arts and the performing arts. 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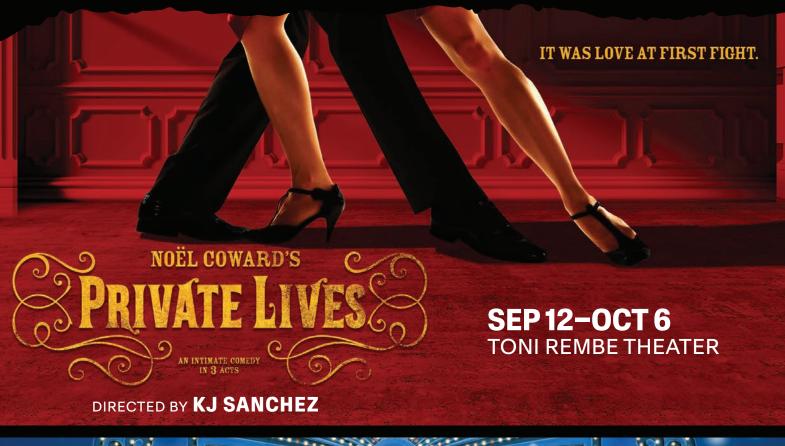

The Handmaid's Tale

A Handmaid pieces together the fragments of her story and tells it to us.

Her life in America changed overnight in 2024 when, triggered partly by a low birth-rate caused by an environmental crisis, fundamentalists established a religious dictatorship known as the Republic of Gilead. Women were denied the right to work, possess property, or read and write. Furthermore, all fertile women of child-bearing age who were in breach of new marriage laws were forcibly separated from their families and sent to indoctrination centres, run by 'Aunts.' There the women became Handmaids, to be posted to privileged childless households and ritually impregnated by the husband in the presence of his wife. If a Handmaid had not produced a child after three postings, she was sent to the colonies to clear up radiation spills.

PROLOGUE

Torn from her husband, Luke, and their daughter as they were attempting to leave the country, the Handmaid was taken to the Red Centre where she participated in classes alongside other women who proved themselves fruitful in the past. Her friend Moira is among them and she meets Janine. Moira risked everything to escape and finally succeeded. Janine breaks down, imagining she is back in the time before the revolution. The Handmaids graduate from the Red Centre and are sent to their first postings.

ACT I

A few years later, the Handmaid, who has not yet produced a child, transfers to her third posting, where she is known as Offred (Of Fred), after the Commander of the house. She recognizes his wife as Serena Joy, who was a television Gospel singer before the revolution. She meets the servant members of the household: Nick and Rita.

Memories of her life before the revolution when she met Luke, fell in love, and had a daughter are ever present in Offred's mind. She remembers her mother's frustrated warnings about the need to keep fighting for hard-won rights and freedoms.

Offred goes shopping, paired with another Handmaid, Ofglen. They meet Janine, now called Ofwarren, who is heavily pregnant. When Offred visits the doctor, she rejects his offer to impregnate her. At home, Nick attempts to talk to Offred, and the Commander enters her bedroom—both are illegal acts. Offred undergoes her monthly ritual impregnation. Afterwards, Nick tells her that the Commander wants to see her privately, which is strictly forbidden.

At the Red Centre, Wives, Commanders, Aunts, and Handmaids gather for the birthing ritual and Janine/Ofwarren's baby is born.

Back home, Offred visits the Commander in his office at night.

ACT II

Next morning, Rita finds Offred lying motionless and overreacts. The Commander caresses Offred during a ritual impregnation. She is terrified Serena Joy noticed and that Offred will be sent to the colonies. Offred and Ofglen go prayer-shopping. Offred learns that there is an underground movement whose code word is Mayday, but she is too frightened to help them. Janine/Ofwarren, whose baby was euthanized due to deformities, breaks down again and is taken away to be killed.

Offred's secret visits to the Commander continue. He brings her gifts and explains things to her: why Rita overreacted, for instance—the previous Handmaid posted here had killed herself.

Desperate for a child, Serena Joy bribes Offred to try getting pregnant by Nick. The bribe is a recent photo of Offred's missing daughter.

The Commander smuggles Offred into Jezebel's, a private brothel for top-ranking men in Gilead. She meets Moira there.

Back home, Offred and Nick make love.

Wives and Handmaids gather to witness and participate in the hanging of 'criminals' at a Salvaging event. The second part of the event is a Particicution where Handmaids are required to destroy a 'rapist.' Ofglen starts by kicking him unconscious to spare him pain—he was in fact a fellow member of the underground movement.

Offred finds she has a new shopping partner; she never again meets the former Ofglen, who has killed herself rather than be exposed as part of the resistance. Serena Joy has learned about Offred's liaisons with the Commander. The police arrive to arrest Offred and to take her from the house. Nick tells her to trust them—that they are from the resistance and that she should go with them, but she is unsure what her fate will be.

To Sing is to Conjure

The Handmaid's Tale has been adapted into many artistic disciplines. What are the advantages of opera (singing, music, theater) for conveying this story?

The Handmaid's Tale should offer a visceral and overwhelming experience; opera's unique strength is in taking us right into the heart of the most extreme emotions.

The fragmentary nature of the book is challenging to bring alive on stage, and the opera has a naturally filmic structure, shifting constantly in and out of locations and periods. If we meet those challenges, live theater is an ideal medium for this multilayered narrative in which everything we see is a memory. Sometimes these

memories, from both the pre- and post-war periods, share the stage simultaneously as Offred tries to understand her younger self. We are unsure which facts can be trusted as events are distorted, duplicated, and mirrored, like in a dream or a nightmare.

In the opera, as in the book, Offred tells her own story. She does this both to piece her own story together and to protest against the things that happened to her and which continue to happen somewhere in our world. This act of protest is strongly felt in the shared experience of live performance.

What is distinctive about Poul Ruders' score and how the musical landscape of the opera affects the storytelling and impact?

Poul's score foregrounds the singing voice; the determination and fragility of the solo voice as well as the homogeneity and strength of the choral voice.

The singing voice is the oldest instrument and, heard naked, takes us out of time and place. The opera emerges from, and ends with, the almost unaccompanied sound of Offred's solo voice. This is a story told by a single voice, determined to be heard. This plaintive voice, singing across time, is a memorable feature of the opera. To write is to imagine an alternative world, to sing is to conjure it.

Yet Offred is not really alone. Instead she is an



everywoman character whose story, Atwood implies, may be an assembly of many women's voices. So, another great feature of the score is the choral singing of the Handmaids, chanting as they are brainwashed in the Red Centre. This is an opera about a people and our production begins and ends with a group of mothers who will be transformed into Handmaids, and who will finally emerge to sing their story.

Since its 2000 premiere, Poul Ruders' work has been presented around the world. What is most important to you about staging this new production?

We are staging the opera 40 years after the novel was written, and the story comes to life all too easily in a dystopian future a few years from today. So we situate the story not back in the 1990s that Atwood originally imagined but rather in our own world transformed in the 2030s.

Margaret Atwood said in 1985 that everything in the book had happened somewhere in the world but of course its resonances have changed over time. We stage it now against the background of a global rise of polarized and extreme politics, the election of authoritarian governments, the shock of climate breakdown and global pandemic, a collapse of human rights for women in parts of the world such as Afghanistan, and the removal of reproductive rights in the US. The story is an urgent reminder that freedom is hard-won and can be easily lost by a complacent generation.

Any staging must be inspired by the iconic imagery described in the book, but this is no longer imagery which is only found in the fictional world. The red robe and the white headdress of the Handmaid has become a symbol of protest. Around the world, protestors dressed as Handmaids have campaigned in defense of reproductive rights in public squares and outside courtrooms. The red robe has been transformed from a fictional garment of submission to a real-world garment of protest.



Dressing Gilead

GENERAL DIRECTOR MATTHEW SHILVOCK IN CONVERSATION WITH COSTUME DESIGNER CHRISTINA CUNNINGHAM

losely based on Margaret Atwood's dystopian masterpiece, our new co-production of *The Handmaid's Tale* by composer Poul Ruders and librettist Paul Bentley is a piece with an iconography almost unmatched in any other literary work. The red cape and the white headpiece of the Handmaids have become immediately understood symbols of protest, worn at demonstrations when legislative and judicial actions threaten the rights of women. The stratification of society in *The Handmaid's Tale* suggests an approach to costuming that comes powerfully out of the text. I sat down with costume designer Christina Cunningham when she was in San Francisco for costume fittings, and she shared with me how she has brought the nuance of her own design to the text, bringing the work alive for the stage.

Christina makes her San Francisco Opera debut with *The Handmaid's Tale.* She is an incredibly in-demand costume designer, working frequently with director Simon McBurney. When director John Fulljames approached her about this new co-production between Copenhagen and San Francisco, she had some familiarity with the story, having read the book some years before. But she decided to

avoid watching any of the Hulu series that had just come out—she wanted to ensure that her influence was the primary source of the book, not the secondary source of the adaptation.

There were some fundamentals that she knew going in: first, colors play a critical role in defining the stratification of Gilead—they have to be part of the iconography of the piece. Christina noted that this is probably the most prescriptive show that she's ever worked on. Secondly, the Handmaids' headpiece could not cover the ears of the singers—it had to give them aural access. From there she began to envision what could be.

The costumes are not from a specific period, but generally harken back to a mid-20th-century aesthetic when a patriarchal society was more fundamentally ingrained; a time when women's clothes had a more feminine shape but were also more modest and understated. Wherever possible, Christina went back to the book. For example, Margaret Atwood talks of the Handmaids wearing a long red dress and talks of the Wives being in blue. Christina did switch the colors of the Aunts and Marthas: in the book the Marthas are a "dull green" and the Aunts are in

brown, but Christina favored the dull green for the Aunts to emphasize the militarization of their authoritarian rule.

Christina wanted the Handmaids' dresses to be flattering but reserved. She gave them a slightly open neckline, and used a heavy fabric that gives a glide to the dress as the Handmaids walk, and a higher waistline that can work for pregnant Handmaids. In the book the Handmaids are in red dresses, the color of blood. The production's capes are made in a strong red, but Christina chose to soften the tone of the dresses beneath them, which are still red but in a slightly muted tone to give the subtle feel of many washes, of being handed on from Handmaid to Handmaid.

The 'wings' headdresses were a challenge. The book says of the prescribed white wings: "they keep us from seeing, but also being seen." Offred describes her room in the Commander's house as "In a nunnery ... time is measured by bells, and there are no mirrors." Christina had seen images of the red and white Handmaids' uniform being used in protests in which the white wings were much more enclosing. But, in an opera, the singers have to be able to hear themselves and each other, and see each other and the conductor. She needed a design that would take all of that into account.

She worked with a milliner in Copenhagen to come up with a material not quite as heavy as buckram and then worked with singers to try out shapes and sizes, to ensure that they could hear, see the conductor, and be slimline enough to credibly lean in and whisper to each other (important for the resistance) without hitting headpieces. To ensure the integrity of the wings, she added a folded seam on top to strengthen the edges without adding weight. As Christina notes, these headpieces take a lot of space to travel! (See images on next page.)

The Handmaids also have a small bonnet that they wear when not out in public, and Christina came up with a clever magnet system that allows the main headpiece to lock onto the bonnet to ensure it's always centered and secure.

The Wives are dressed in a feminine but modest look from the 1950s, again in a slightly muted blue, and a headpiece that they wear when going out to show a little more formality. It's as much a uniform as that of the Handmaids.

The Aunts embody an element of the military, and Christina turned to female military uniforms as inspiration, including a pin with the eye of Gilead. Top and center: The designs and example of an aunt's costume, including a closeup of the eye of Gilead pin.

For the Commanders' costumes, Christina wanted the men to feel smartly dressed but also be threatening and militaristic. She decided to go beyond the regular three-piece suit and was inspired by the British police, using 1990s versions of the police dress uniform. Christina found a surplus supplier that provided most of the uniforms.

There are also a number of costumes from "the time before"—the pre-story, before Gilead takes over American society in a coup. These are off-the-rack clothes aimed to show the normalcy of society before all of this unfolds. These scenes feature a number of children, and Christina noted a Covid-quirk. The production was originally intended to be produced in Copenhagen and San Francisco in 2020. When it came back to Copenhagen in late 2022, there was a Danish requirement that those people originally cast be offered the job again, including the supernumeraries (or extras). Those children cast in 2020 had outgrown their costumes and so Christina and the team there had to adapt and adjust.

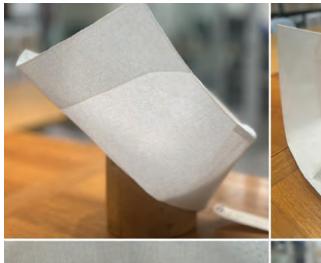
An interesting crossover from the time before to present day Gilead happens at Jezebel's—the nightclub that the Commander takes Offred to in the second act. Here the ladies entertaining the Commanders are in clothes of the time before, but it's as though they've found mismatched items from a dressing up box left up in an attic somewhere—things that the commanders have squirreled away from the time before and that they're making the ladies wear.

In a production with this much uniformity in the costuming—big blocks of commonality on stage—the costume staff must be on heightened awareness to the smallest of details. Seams, colors of fabrics, shades of white—all of these things have to maintain an absolute uniformity, otherwise the audiences' eyes will focus on the differences not the commonalities, particularly when set against Chloe Lamford's clean white set (a note that Chloe was also the designer of *Innocence* just on stage in June).

It's fascinating to see how Christina has fashioned this production, always sensitive to the text but ensuring the practicality of the costumes on stage to both tell the story and to allow the singers the freedom to perform within the restrictions of their Gilead uniforms. It's a critical part of how we bring "page to stage" and interpret the story through an operatic lens.















The Handmaid's Tale in the Classroom

OAKLAND TEACHER AND WRITER ANDREW SIMMONS TALKS ABOUT THE ONGOING RELEVANCE AND IMPACT OF MARGARET ATWOOD'S BOOK ON NEW GENERATIONS OF READERS.

For those who aren't familiar, what is *The Handmaid's Tale* about?

The novel turns out to be a primary source document of the Gileadean regime, a totalitarian theocratic patriarchy inscribed (via coup and environmental calamity) into the guts of what was once the United States. It's narrated by Offred, the protagonist, on a series of audio recordings dubbed onto contraband cassette tapes (Boy George and Twisted Sister!) during a presumed escape. She is the representative Handmaid—a fertile woman assigned to a high-status household for a sanctified procreation "ceremony." Facing plummeting birth rates, Gilead has a broad agenda of ethnic and religious cleansing beyond depriving women of autonomy. Its ideology blends 17thcentury New England theology with early 1980s "family values" conservatism. The Commander, an apex predator of Gilead and head of Offred's new household, tells Offred that the now-vanguished feminist movements gave men "nothing to work for, nothing to fight for." Sex was too easy, chasing money "too abstract." For fulfillment, men had to subjugate.

Decades-old works of speculative fiction like The Handmaid's Tale are often (unfairly) expected to predict our present course at any given time. A novel rooted in historical record, The Handmaid's Tale is maybe most valuable (to me, at least) in how it explores how we study what's already happened. A self-described "refugee of the past," Offred is old enough to recall college classes and political suffrage. She records her story for the benefit of a potential future audience while acknowledging her likely insignificance. According to Margaret Atwood, Offred's decision to document her story is "an act of hope." It requires a certain faith in the humanity of those future audiences, the belief that they will in turn perceive her humanity and be moved, educated, and emboldened by what they learn. We should want the same from our own historians, the generations to come who may study and judge us for values, habits, and inaction.

Why do you think this story was turned into a film, TV series, ballet and an opera? What draws artists to tell and retell this story?

We like dystopias. Maybe we tantalize ourselves with stylish fantasies of future horrors and then rejoice that our lives are not (yet) so terrible. Or we fret and feel galvanized in our present to fight to avoid that scary future. The television show began production towards the end of 2016,

when, for many, the political climate reflected a slide towards authoritarianism, the mainstreaming of reactionary ideas that included gleeful celebrations of sexism and bigotry. When some major political actors called for a return to American greatness, they used the language of violent revolution.

You teach this book in your class each year. What are some of the students' responses to the story that have surprised or encouraged you?

The novel fittingly opens in the repurposed shell of a high school gymnasium, with Aunt Lydia instructing Handmaids-in-training. Unlike Offred, the next generation of women, the girls of Gilead, will have no fading memories of pep rallies and homecoming dances, of makeout sessions and fashion trends. Aunt Lydia tells Janine, another Handmaid-to-be, that she was to blame for her rape at 14. Acquiescing to "the ceremony" is, on the other hand, solemn duty to God and Gilead. The other women pile on—another hideous conditioning routine: feel shame for being a victim, be complicit in shaming others, feel shame for that as well.

Teenagers often capably diagnose unfairness in their domain and still struggle to resist it. In high school, as in Gilead, appearances matter. Social survival can mean ignoring inconvenient truths, even adding your voice to an ugly chorus. Janine's teenage experience and the community response register as familiar to many teens, especially girls.

And I unfortunately witness it in class: The book angers students because casual sexism, harassment, shame, and gaslighting feature in their social universe too. If you've read local news, you know that sexual assault and harassment scandals have plagued high schools across the Bay Area. In the past few years, several widely read articles have warned of the excesses of campus cancel culture, suggesting that droves of innocent boys may have their lives destroyed by false accusations or exaggerated responses to minor infractions. This may happen, and it's bad if and when it does, but the exact opposite pattern has been my experience: Most of the time, the accusations are valid and the consequences for harmers nonexistent or insignificant.

I see parallels with the Commander as well. He wants Gilead to be "bearable" for women, but like a kid enabling a video game cheat code, in pursuing his affair with Offred, he seeks the thrill of seduction without the possibility of resistance. He describes himself as

"ordinary" yet finds a "natural" arrangement at Jezebel's, an elites-only sex club. There, in a "juvenile display," he parades Offred for his cronies pretty much like an insecure high school guy, but what he really craves is intimacy. And as one of my seniors once memorably announced in English class, you can't "hack" that.

Tellingly, some young readers note the Commander's politeness. He enjoys Scrabble. He doesn't force himself on Offred. Year after year, they don't always immediately grasp that he does force himself on her, that his power to give her taboo trinkets (or not) is the point, that he likes watching her read because it is forbidden, an exotic dance from a bygone era. Just as he marvels at lawyers and businesswomen trapped at Jezebel's, their former callings sanded away. The students prefer to see him as a good guy in a bad system. He is polite while being monstrous because that's how monstrosity usually works.

This is an important lesson for teenagers, who need to become adults with monster-detection capabilities at full tilt.

In what ways have students' responses changed over time?

Atwood has called the novel a "literature of witness." It asks you to look at what is going on around you, to diagnose dangers. Even if parts feel dated or some essential elements insufficiently addressed, like Gilead's overt racism, for example, its warning is always pretty fresh. I can teach *The Handmaid's Tale* differently every year because students are always facing phenomena—whether supreme court decisions or nuggets of pop culture—that all but scream relevance. So, last November, while we had to study Texas abortion restrictions and subsequent protests, we could also consider how *Barbie*, a subversive confection of a film, and Megan Thee Stallion, a swaggering and popular female rapper, each cleverly

assailed misogyny. This November, something else will surface, another chapter in the same story.

Students can really imagine how a contemporary totalitarian patriarchy might be different. Forget neighbors snooping and spying—the stranglehold on citizens would be enforced by extensive digital surveillance. The fundamentalist theology would have to be allied with irreverent, caustic social media-driven conspiracy—mongering and frank semi-ironic displays of sexism. Instead of a controlled media diet, citizens would have so much muck to wade through online that they would just give up.

One thing that is absolutely evolving is that too many boys—a significant minority, let's say—are being indoctrinated into misogynistic worldviews through bodybuilding influencers, content streamers, and pickup artist charlatans who masquerade as life coaches or financial advisors or mere goofballs. A Handmaid's Tale for 2024 might require a menagerie of such characters! Some boys genuinely believe the script they're handed, and others find the tone and ideas so edgy and daring that it passes for humor. But when the algorithm is responding and finding new increasingly virulent versions to share, one can only laugh ironically for so long before some of the ideas take hold. And these basic beliefs about where women belong in society are a skip away from the Sons of Jacob, the political group in *The Handmaid's Tale* that overthrows the government and establishes Gilead.

Consistently though, when I poll students every June, a surprising number call *The Handmaid's Tale* their favorite book of the year. Few students have seen the TV show before they read the novel, so they come in without much prior knowledge, just at most some sense of the costume look from a protest they've seen condensed into a clip online.

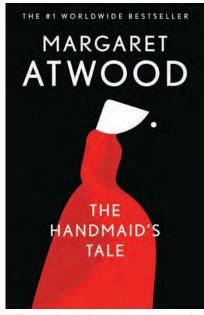

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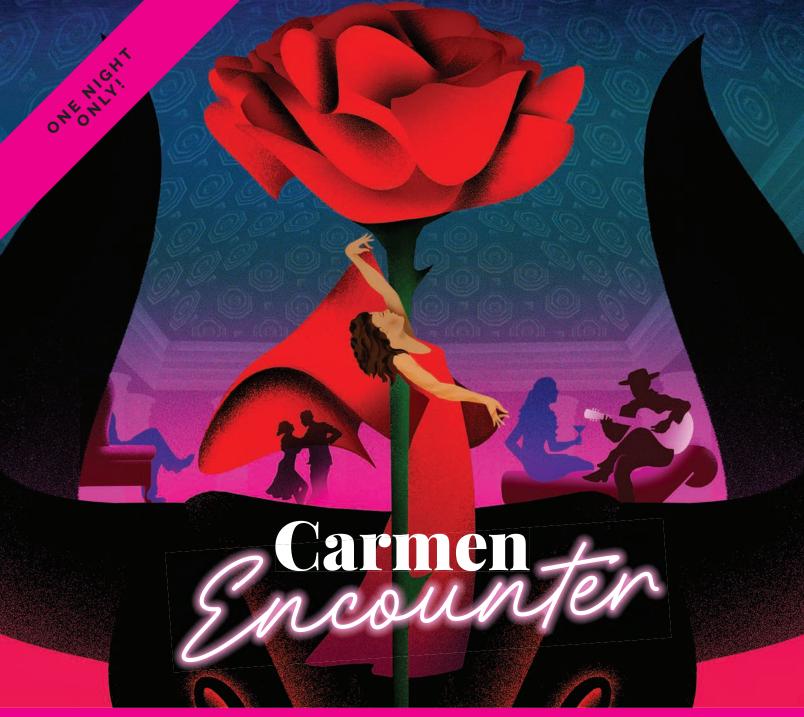












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SAN FRANCISCO OPERA SHOP

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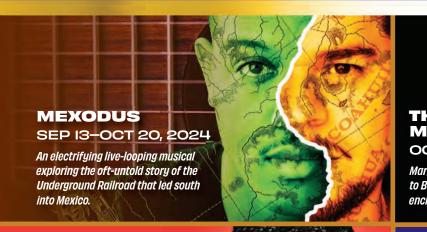
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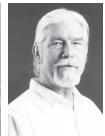
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The International Stage of Opera

ne of the questions I get asked most often is "Where do your productions come from?" It's a fascinating question to explore as we launch our 102nd season, using this season's operas as examples.

The simple answer is: a wide variety of places! But we can boil it down to five basic sources: i) things we build; ii) things we own; iii) things we coproduce; iv) things we rent; and v) things we acquire.



Productions we build quickly become the second category: things we own! The modus operandi of the repertory system is that a company invests in new productions designed for their stage and then brings them back in future seasons on a much more inexpensive basis. While a new production might cost us \$2 million to build, a revival of that production might cost just \$25,000 in touchups. We also rent out productions we own to other companies, making them a source of income. The challenge here is the perennial shortage of storage space. We store our sets in Modesto but are always having to make impossible decisions as to what to jettison to make room for new arrivals.

A variant of building is co-producing. This is where we enter into a shared upfront investment with 2-4 companies to build a new production. This both defrays costs for each company but also ensures that the production has a future

life, particularly critical for newly commissioned operas. *Innocence* was a co-production of five international companies. *The Handmaid's Tale* is a two-way co-production between San Francisco Opera and the Royal Danish Opera. The *Bohème* is a three-way co-production between us, Houston, and Toronto.

A very common source of productions is renting them from another company. For titles that we don't own and won't likely

produce on a regular basis, we generally look for options from other companies. This is a wonderful part of the job—scouring the world for all the options and then assessing them along a number of factors—aesthetics, logistics (will it work for our stage size and technology), sightlines, special effects and, most importantly, availability! The *Ballo* this season is a rental from Rome, and the *Idomeneo* is a rental from two Australian companies.

And then, a category that I might have said was rarer but we have quite a few examples at the moment: purchased productions. Often these begin as rental enquiries, but sometimes a company offers it for purchase given their own storage limitations. *Tristan* this season was a purchase from La Fenice in Venice; *Carmen* from the Royal Opera in London; and *The Elixir of Love* last season from Opera North in the UK. I abhor seeing beloved productions get thrown away, and purchasing allows some of the best ones from the world's stages to have a future life on ours.

As with all things in programming a season, balance here is key—we want to balance things people have seen with new interpretations; and we want to ensure enough new work (whether builds or coproductions) to showcase our creative vision. The interplay of all these factors is a thrilling reflection of the interconnectedness of the international network of opera companies and a reminder of the global stage on which we make art. I hope that you enjoy the season ahead!
