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CONCERT NOTES

an Francisco Chronicle Presents Opera in the Park concert is a musical gift to the Bay Area in partnership with San Francisco Opera, San Francisco Parks Trust, The CW Bay Area/CBS 5, Classical KDFC, and San Francisco Classical Voice. Kurt Herbert Adler, the late general director of San Francisco Opera, founded the annual free concert in 1971 as a way of making opera more accessible to the public.

The concert is presented in the tradition of Luisa Tetrazzini, who in 1914 sang an aria in a ceremony dedicating a statue of Verdi in Golden Gate Park. From 1973 until his death in February 1988, Adler conducted every Opera in the Park concert but one. The exception was 1980, the year the orchestra was rained out and the performers sang with the accompaniment of a single piano.

Since then, crowds of nearly 20,000 have come to the park every September to see the stars of the current San Francisco Opera season perform al fresco. Opera legends from Pavarotti and Domingo to Sills and Horne have performed at Opera in the Park. The program concludes each year with the traditional champagne finale, "Libiamo" from La Traviata.

For 38 years the Hearst Corporation has been associated with Opera in the Park. It is pleased to present this one-of-a-kind annual event.

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
