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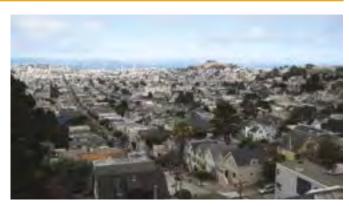
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A Message from the Leaders of San Francisco Opera

these two titans with three unique offerings.

Music Director Nicola Luisotti conducts the definitive Falstaff of our day, Bryn Terfel, in Verdi's masterful comedy as well as his *Messa da Requiem* in a once-in-alifetime concert featuring the combined forces of San Francisco Opera and Italy's Teatro di San Carlo of Naples—where Maestro Luisotti is also music director. We are pleased to host this unique presentation of the Requiem, given in recognition of *2013 The Year of Italian Culture in the United States*, an initiative under the auspices of the president of the Italian Republic.

Later this month, Principal Guest Conductor Patrick Summers leads Wagner's first masterwork, *Der Fliegende Holländer*. This inventive new production by Petrika Ionesco, who directed 2010's widely praised *Cyrano de Bergerac*, promises to be a feast for the senses. The works of Verdi and Wagner continue to inspire us all, and this month our programming honors them and their unprecedented artistic contributions.

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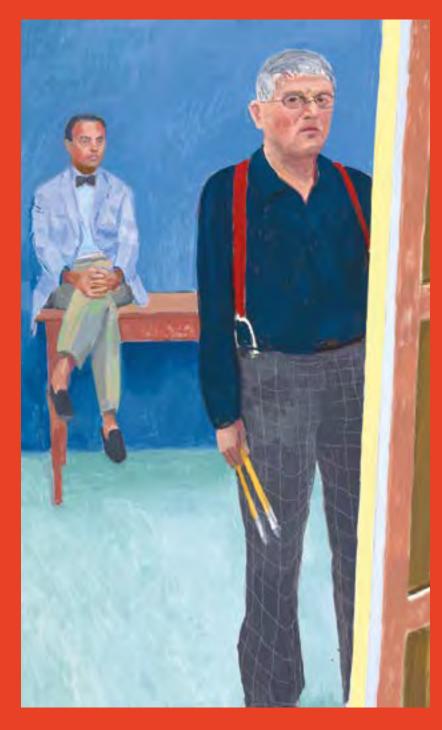
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DAVD HOCKNEY A BIGGER EXHIBITION

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David Hockney, *Self-Portrait with Charlie* (detail), 2005. Oil on canvas. © David Hockney, 2013





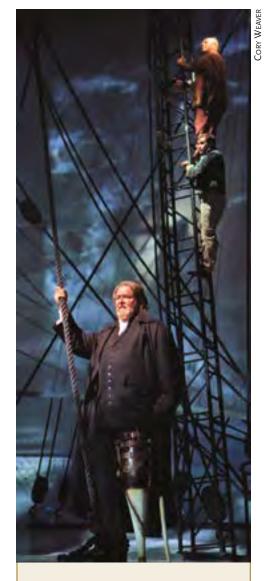

Notes from the General Director San Francisco Opera Media

I strongly believe that opera is an art form for everyone. In its synthesis of singing, acting, music, narrative, and visual art, it connects to us in a way unique to opera. However, we

all know that there are increasing challenges in getting people into an opera house. If opera is to continue its legacy of transformative experiences that lead us to a deeper understanding of the human condition, a large part of its future depends upon emerging technologies that can distribute it to a wider audience.

My first opera experiences were not in an opera house, but through media. At an early age I heard Mario Lanza sing in the film The Great Caruso, and I vividly remember the power of hearing that unbelievable voice and the feeling that I absolutely had to experience a live opera. I also remember watching The Voice of Firestone on television with my parents, where the great singers of the day performed opera arias. It was a visceral, immediate connection for me, and it sparked a lifelong love of the human voice. The popularity of singing in today's cultural landscape, with television shows like American Idol and The Voice topping the viewership charts, and singers being discovered on YouTube, proves we're still in love with the voice-and we're finding new ways to experience, discuss, and share it.

High-definition video technology has been a huge boon to our world of opera. The Metropolitan Opera has shown that the public has an incredible enthusiasm for experiencing the art form in movie theaters, with thousands of cinemas broadcasting that company's live productions worldwide. Simultaneously at San Francisco Opera, we've continued to be an industry leader in this arena by putting opera in cinemas regionally and internationally. We also have a very strong partnership with KQED-TV and nationally will return to PBS this fall. We use technology to bring the immediacy of the stage to the farthest reaches of the balcony with our OperaVision displays. And then of course there are the big screen relays at Civic Center Plaza, Stanford's Frost Amphitheater (where a simulcast of this season's Falstaff will happen next month), and our immensely popular Opera at the Ballpark at AT&T Park.

As you see from page 18 of your program, we're continuing to expand our media horizons to create new opportunities for people to encounter the operatic art form. We've partnered with EuroArts Music International, a leading worldwide distributor of classical programming, to release six San Francisco Opera productions, recorded live in high definition at the War Memorial Opera House, over two years on DVD and Blu-ray beginning in fall 2013. Our first two offerings—Lucrezia Borgia, starring Renée Fleming, and Moby-Dick by Jake Heggie and Gene Scheer-will be commercially available next month. This fall KQED-TV pre-

sents our fourth series of San Francisco Opera productions to the Bay Area, and we return to national television on PBS's Great Performances with our production of Moby-Dick on November 1. We are also continuing our radio partnerships with the Bay Area's KDFC; Chicago's WFMT Network, where our productions are broadcast nationwide; and growing international offerings. And one very exciting new enterprise that we recently announced will occur this fall, as we stream our beloved production of *Mefistofele* live to theaters across Europe in October. This will be the first of a series of operas to be broadcast "across the pond" through San Francisco Opera's partnership with international media distributor Rising Alternative.

Actor Kevin Spacey recently discussed his wildly successful series House of Cards, the first of its kind not to be released on television but exclusively through the streaming service Netflix. Of the revolution that Spacey and his fellow producers created, he said, "When we give the audience the stories and content they want and in the way they want it, they will talk about it, binge on it, carry it with them to the hairdresser, force it on their friends, tweet, blog, Facebook, make silly gifs, and god knows what else. They will engage with it in a way that a blockbuster movie could only dream of. All we have to do it give it to them." Through our media initiatives, San Francisco Opera is committed to finding that same kind of tactile interaction with our art form, blowing open the walls of the War Memorial Opera House and letting audiences engage with opera in places and ways that work for them. 🎙

San Francisco Opera celebrated the opening of its 91st season on September 6 with a sold-out performance of Arrigo Boito's *Mefistofele*, led by Music Director Nicola Luisotti. The evening was distinguished by two events that are the highlight of the City's cultural season: San Francisco Opera Guild's *Opera Ball 2013*, co-chaired by Ann Girard and Mai Shiver, and BRAVO! Club's Opening Night Gala, co-chaired by Sia Charonis and Lauren Groff. 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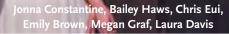

San Francisco Opera's season-opening festivities included the 40th annual San Francisco Chronicle Presents San Francisco Opera in the Park, featuring Music Director Nicola Luisotti conducting the San Francisco Opera Orchestra and stars from the fall season. Opera in the Park drew 12,000 opera lovers to Golden Gate Park's Sharon Meadow this year.







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In 2007, San Francisco Opera General Director David Gockley led the Company to the forefront of new media with the creation of the Koret-Taube Media Suite, the first permanent high-definition broadcast-standard video production facility installed in any American opera house. 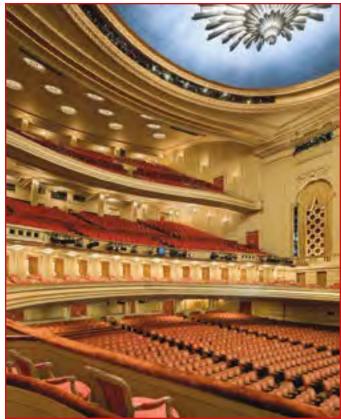

ompany Sponsors Cynthia and John Gunn are pleased to support San Francisco Opera's 2013–14 Season productions of Mephistopheles, Falstaff, The Barber of Seville, and Show Boat. Last season the couple underwrote Rigoletto, The Capulets and the Montagues, Moby-Dick, and The Tales of Hoffmann. In prior years, the Gunns sponsored Nicola Luisotti's inaugural year as music director of San Francisco Opera (2009-10); the world premieres of Heart of a Soldier (2011), The Bonesetter's Daughter (2008) and Appomattox (2007); Francesca Zambello's productions of The Ring of the Nibelungen (2011) and Porgy and Bess (2009); new productions of Attila (2012), Lucrezia Borgia (2011), Werther (2010), The Maid of Orleans (2006) and La Forza del Destino (2005); and the American premiere of Le Grand

Macabre (2004). The couple also provided underwriting for the company's first free live simulcast of *Rigoletto* at Stanford's Frost Amphitheater in 2006, and has invested in San Francisco Opera's multiple media initiatives.

In September 2008, San Francisco Opera announced that Cynthia and John had made an historic commitment—believed to be the largest single gift ever made by individuals to an American opera company—to help fund the signature projects of David Gockley's tenure as General Director, including new operas and productions, multimedia projects, and outreach programs.

"This season, we are proud to support four productions that we feel represent the breadth of David's artistic vision, and our shared commitment to keeping this a leading-edge opera company," notes John. "Verdi's comic masterpiece Falstaff is, of course, a classic. David presents it here in a vibrant new production from Chicago's Lyric Opera starring the great Welsh baritone Bryn Terfel, who returns to our stage after an absence of over a decade." The Gunns are equally enthusiastic about the artistry of Maestro Luisotti. John notes, "Securing Nicola as our music director has been one of David's greatest achievements, and we love hearing him conduct the great Italian repertoire for which is he renowned." Cynthia continues, "Patricia Racette has become a major star since her 1989 debut at San Francisco Opera while she was an Adler Fellow and we are pleased that she returns in three productions this season, including Mephistopheles, Show Boat, and Madame Butterfly. Nothing represents David's commitment to bringing the finest singers in the world to San Francisco better than seeing Pat cast alongside such stars as Ildar Abdrazakov, Ramón Vargas, and Nathan Gunn."

The couple also feels strongly about bringing new productions of seminal favorites to the War Memorial stage. John remarks, "A popular and approachable opera like *The Barber of Seville* will undoubtedly bring in first-time opera-goers, but the experience will be all the more memorable if it is presented in an engaging

production. Cynthia and I are excited to see this new staging from the Teatro Real Madrid performed by a young cast including Isabel Leonard alongside Company favorite Lucas Meachem."

John was raised in the San Francisco Bay area. He attended Lick-Wilmerding High School where he was a classmate of Ronald Adler, director of the Berlin State Opera and son of the late Kurt Herbert Adler, the legendary second general director of San Francisco Opera. As classmates and friends, John attended many dress rehearsals and performances with Ron, which left an extraordinary impression and appreciation. After graduating from Stanford (A.B. economics), John served as a commanding officer of a U.S. Coast Guard patrol boat on the Mekong River in Vietnam. When he returned to the Bay Area,

John's interest in opera was rekindled. Cynthia and John have been attending ever since and became subscribers in 1988.

John is former Chairman and CEO of Dodge & Cox Investment Managers. He joined the company in 1972, the year he received his MBA from Stanford Business School and married Cynthia. He has shared his investment and leadership skills as a member of San Francisco Opera's board of directors since 2002 and was elected chairman of the board in June 2008. Cynthia graduated from Stanford with an A.B. in political science in 1970. Early in her career, she was the editor and director of The Portable Stanford book series for ten years. She edited twenty-eight books by Stanford professors on a vast array of topics, including *Economic* Policy Beyond the Headlines by George Shultz and Ken Dam and The Politics of Contraception by Carl Djerassi. When Shultz returned to the Bay Area after serving six-and-a-half years as secretary of state under Ronald Reagan, he once again called on Cynthia to work with him editing his memoirs, Turmoil and Triumph, My Years as Secretary of State.

Together Cynthia and John are active members of the community, providing significant leadership and support to Stanford University, Lucile Packard Children's Hospital, San Francisco Opera, and Family and Children Services. John is chair of the advisory board for the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research (SIEPR), serves as a trustee of Stanford University, and is on the board of directors of Stanford Hospital and Clinics. Cynthia serves as an overseer of Stanford's Hoover Institution, a member of the board of the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health, a member of the advisory board of Family and Children Services, and a member of the board of the San Francisco Fine Arts Museums.

Opera lovers everywhere applaud Cynthia and John's precedent-setting leadership in supporting signature projects at San Francisco Opera. In the months and years to come, their generosity will make possible what are sure to be some of the most important endeavors of future seasons.

The Bernard Osher Endowment Fund (Production Sponsor, Falstaff)

A native of Maine, Bernard Osher began his involvement with San Francisco Opera more than forty years ago as a season subscriber shortly after moving here from New York. He and his wife Barbro have been outstanding supporters of Bay Area cultural programs ever since. In 1977, Bernard created the Bernard Osher Foundation to support principally cultural and educational organizations to maintain and enrich the quality of life locally and nationally. have also established the Great Interpreters of Italian Opera Fund to help bring today's most compelling artists in Italian repertoire to San Francisco Opera. "I am personally honored by Maria and Jan's support and confidence in me," says Maestro Luisotti. "With their help, we are realizing everything Italian opera can—and should—be."

"Without great singers, opera is not all it could be," says San Francisco Opera board member Joan Traitel. 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BECOMING SIR JOHN:

Bryn Terfel on the Joys of Playing One of Verdi's Greatest Characters

World-renowned Welsh bass-baritone Bryn Terfel has triumphed as Falstaff in Sydney (where he made his role debut in 1999); Lyric Opera of Chicago; the Metropolitan Opera; Milan's La Scala; the Royal Opera, Covent Garden; and in Cardiff, Vienna, Munich, Hannover, and Monte Carlo. A few days before San Francisco Opera rehearsals began, Terfel spoke about this signature role...

How has your Falstaff changed over the past fourteen years?

I used to go more for the comedy, instead of what Falstaff really is—very melancholic, fallen on hard times. He's a cuckold for the Windsor ladies who make fun of him, but he has the last laugh at the end!

What qualities in the character attracted you initially?

His ability to pick himself up and dust himself off is undoubtedly a strength—and one glass of warm wine brings some light into his day! Verdi gave the bass-baritone voice a role we all want to be a part of. It's a role that puts a smile on *my* face and also on the *audience*'s face. The scene where Falstaff jumps into the basket he's always flirting. I can flirt to my heart's content when I'm rehearsing *Falstaff* and these ladies won't do *anything*, but when I drag them into my basket on stage, they're giggling away!

You stand in the "royal line" of Falstaffs, which includes several legendary Italians and a marvelous Welshman...

I know my compatriot Sir Geraint Evans [who sang Falstaff at San Francisco Opera three times] was one of the finest Falstaffs, even alongside Tito Gobbi. I knew I had a baton to carry forward.

Were you advised by Sir Geraint himself regarding this role?

I was a youngster wanting pearls of wisdom, and he gave them to me gladly. He said, "Take care of that first scene—it's the biggest hurdle you have in the piece." And he'd say, "Be careful of the monologue in the third act.

Roger Pines is dramaturg of Lyric Opera of Chicago, where Terfel sang the title role in the premiere of Olivier Tambosi's production of Falstaff in 1999.

On Falstaff: If I put one opera on a pedestal, it would be this one.

Especially try to keep people's interest when you go to the forest, and do it *vocally*. People have an interest in your dynamics, your coloring of the words. Verdi gave us a vehicle, so don't take it for granted, even if you're singing it for the hundredth time in your career."

Those two monologues are hugely demanding...

[Laughs] Thank you for reminding me! Falstaff is such a fast-moving score, so transparent, so light, that the monologues melt into the action happening on the stage. A singer should particularly enjoy them, because Verdi wrote magnificent pieces for you to sing, to play around with, to be flexible with. You can't be the same in each performance—you have to give something different, a new color.

Is there much opportunity for beautiful legato singing?

Not much! Until the forest scene, when he counts [the hours] up to midnight. That's also one of the most *amazing* sequences of chords that Verdi ever wrote.

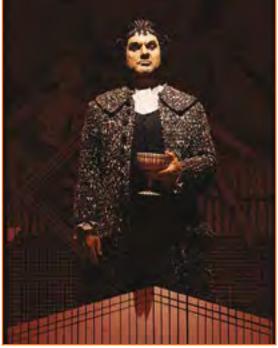
So much of a singer's effectiveness as Falstaff depends on projection of the text.

In my singing it's always been that I'd rather be heard through my diction rather than my singing prowess. Most probably you'll have remnants of my explosive consonants spitting over the orchestra into the audience!

Terfel's previous San Francisco Opera engagements include the title role of Le Nozze di Figaro (1997) and Nick Shadow in The Rake's Progress (2000).

What gives you the greatest musical joy in Falstaff, whether in your character or any other?

I think it's in Fenton and Nannetta's music. That's the *pulse* of the piece—the youth, the love, the absolute carefree attitude of two people besotted with each other.

When onstage in the role, dealing with the fat suit seems so easy for you.

You're never at ease with it. It's the bane of your life—a ball and chain! One good thing about it is that toward the end of a production, you might have left a stone [14 pounds] and a half in the fat suit, because of the amount you sweat. That's something the San Francisco public may not like to read, but it's hard work! At La Scala, he was a rather slim-looking Falstaff. I'm more for the traditional look, having him as fat as you can. He's been on those burgers, he's eaten quite a few pigs straight off those splints. His look, I think, is of a certain importance to an audience's enjoyment of him.

Clearly today your devotion to the opera itself is stronger than ever.

If I put one opera on a pedestal, it would be this one. Of course, gone are the choral tableaux, the monumental arias that bring an audience to their feet. This was a different Verdi with a different cloak, but when you have that fugue, *everybody*'s happy—on top of the fact that we're all counting like mad!

How do you feel at the end of a Falstaff performance?

A mixture of exhaustion and exhilaration, with a sense of joy and happiness. You see it in your colleagues' faces. Most of them are *young* colleagues as well—that's coming from a singer who has been around the block a couple of times, thirty years in the profession. I'm certainly enjoying the fact that I can come back to Falstaff, because I honestly want to be in the *Guinness Book of World Records* for the biggest number of performances of this role. And I'm eternally grateful to San Francisco Opera for inviting me back for a role that I particularly enjoy.

You were most recently at San Francisco Opera during the tenure of Lotfi Mansouri, who passed away in August.

I would look forward to going to San Francisco because I would always meet Lotfi there. I'm incredibly sad not to be seeing him there this autumn. Lotfi gave me wonderful opportunities to sing *Figaro* [1997] and *The Rake's Progress* [2000]. He was always very supportive not only of young singers cutting their teeth, but also of the stalwarts of our operatic profession—he liked to invite them back—and that's a great combination. Every good young golfer likes to play with an older golfer to watch and learn. It's the same in every profession, isn't it?

SYNOPSIS

DER FLIEGENDE HOLLÄNDER

ACT I

Along a craggy coast, a violent storm is raging. Daland's ship has been driven into a bay far beyond his home port, where Senta awaits him. As the storm dies down, the sailors go to rest and Daland orders the Steersman to keep watch.

Left alone, the Steersman grows drowsy and falls asleep. A mysterious vessel appears from the sky. Within the ship, its captain reveals himself to be a cursed being, sentenced to travel the universe endlessly. Only one hope has been given him: he is permitted to land once every seven years, and if during this respite he can find a woman who will be faithful to him until death, the power of the curse will be broken.

On seeing the close proximity of the fantastical ship, Daland reproves the Steersman for sleeping on watch. The ship's captain appears, and Daland invites him aboard. The stranger reveals that he has travelled for many years and begs Daland to grant him shelter for the night. When he learns Daland has a daughter, the stranger offers him priceless treasures if Daland will grant him her hand in marriage. Dazzled by the treasures, Daland enthusiastically agrees.

ACT II

The women of the village, awaiting the return of their men, are working under the supervision of Mary, except for Senta, who is daydreaming of the Flying Dutchman. His legend has always held a bizarre fascination for her. Mary asks Senta why she is not working; the other women remark that she can afford to be idle since she is betrothed to the huntsman Erik. Senta impatiently bids them to stop their foolish chatter and asks Mary to tell the story of the Flying Dutchman again. When she refuses, Senta tells it herself with great emotion.

Suddenly, Senta proclaims it is she who will redeem the Dutchman, and the similarity between the legendary Dutchman and the ship's captain becomes clear. Erik announces the arrival of Daland's ship in port and is angry and jealous to overhear her passionate declaration. Erik reminds Senta about her promise of fidelity to him and asks if she really means to forsake him; Senta asks how anyone could remain unmoved by such anguish as the Dutchman's. Erik then tells her of a vision he has had of a vessel landing on the shore below, of Daland greeting the ship's captain, and of Senta rushing toward the stranger who, embracing her passionately, takes her away with him. Senta's delight with this vision convinces Erik that it will come to pass. He leaves in despair as Daland arrives with the stranger. Senta is transfixed. Daland introduces them and asks both if they will agree to be united. However, neither Senta nor her suitor take the least notice of her father but stand staring mutely at each other. Daland finally leaves them alone, and Senta finds herself in the Dutchman's world of anguish.

The Dutchman wonders whether the longing he feels for Senta is love or merely a desire for release from his curse, and he asks if she will indeed be true to him. She dispels his doubts with the sincerity of her reply. They assure Daland of their intention to be joined.

ACT III

As the sailors celebrate their safe return from sea, the women appear and welcome them with food and drink. They all try to attract the attention of the nearby, silent Dutchman's crew. When there is no response from within the vessel, the women grow afraid and leave, but the sailors, sufficiently fortified, continue their carousing until unearthly voices are heard from the shadowy vessel. Daland's terrified sailors flee as the strange ship dwellers burst into shrill laughter.

Senta tells Erik she can never be his, but he pleads with her to remember their happy courtship and her promises to him. The Dutchman overhears them and rashly concludes that Senta has broken her vow of fidelity. He bids her farewell, revealing that he is the Dutchman of the legend. Ignoring Erik, her father, and Mary, Senta reaffirms her undying love for the stranger, saying she will follow him and be faithful to him unto death, thus freeing him from his curse. The Dutchman refuses to believe her and leaves with his vessel. In desperation, Senta jumps into the water and drowns.

omposer Richard Wagner (1813–1883) was twenty-📂 nine at the premiere of his Der Fliegende Holländer (The Flying Dutchman), an opera generally regarded as the first flowering of a genius who would follow it with works of more profundity. But as usual with Wagner, an alternate view is equally valid: The Flying Dutchman can also be seen as a reactive culmination of the great cultural flowering of Romanticism. Though his later creations are indeed among the most profound written for any medium, if Wagner had written nothing after The Flying Dutchman he would be still be remembered as a great composer. Enrichment from Wagner's most mature and abstract work, his 1882 Parsifal, is significantly aided by some prior study and knowledge, as its diaphanous textual symbolism and ethereal aural beauty combine into an experience without parallel in the opera house. The Flying Dutchman, however, is the most accessible of his music dramas (Wagner rarely used the word, "opera" to describe his works), and one in which the depth of his future creations can be most easily approached.

There was a time before him and a time after: Richard Wagner remains, in this 200th anniversary of his birth, the most controversial and visionary figure in Western art. He is emblematic of

Patrick Summers is artistic and music director for Houston Grand Opera and principal guest conductor for San Francisco Opera. the "artist," imbuing the word with ambiguous meanings it never before had. And small wonder: from nearly any perspective: political, philosophic, cultural, musical, theatrical, societal, racial, or religious, one can umpire any principle with some example in the life *and* works of the man, as testified by the estimated 30,000 books about him—a number that grows precipitously each year. This accounts for the wide array of visual styles associated with Wagnerian productions, because the composer's ambiguous works can support (nearly) any eccentricity foisted upon them.

Wagner is distinctly uncooperative to write about. It is obvious that he left the world a set creations unparalleled in their intellectual and emotional depth, but he also left us the idea that artists exist at the periphery of a society only they can accurately view, a position that still exacts a cultural toll whenever and wherever public funding for the arts is discussed or whenever art attempts a political statement. Every opera composer since Wagner has either emulated or reacted passionately against him; none could ignore him. Few artists in history were as vilified in their lifetime as Wagner, who fundamentally reordered the foundations of tonal harmony and permanently altered the expectations of what opera could communicate.

His status as this contradictory and pervasive cultural icon was largely posthumous, preceded by a time when he was simply an aspiring composer dreaming of breaking into the dominant poetic

expression of his era. Romanticism rejected the emotional symmetry of the Enlightenment, preferring to traffic in the extremes of human emotion. Nothing in a Romantic-era story was more desirable than solitude with nature, either in a forest or in that grandest of human metaphors, adrift on the sea. Romanticism had little to do with current notions of "romance"; rather, the movement was an attempt to release the imagination, not through reality, but through the portrayal of deep melancholy and heightened emotions that bordered on violence. Apocalyptic storms mirrored hearts in turmoil; craggy coastlines were the settings of jagged relationships. Ancient natural beauty only threw into relief the pain of living and the brevity of it all. The musical apogee of Romanticism was Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 of 1824, music unlike any heard up to that time. The open fifths that begin the work haunted Wagner "as a greeting from the spirit world," and they can be found in The Flying Dutchman's opening measure, conjuring the spirit of the title character's torment.

Wagner's theatrical ideal was Aeschylus, his musical idols Beethoven and—it is easy to forget— Vincenzo Bellini. Following *The Flying Dutchman*, Wagner eventually rejected the established tenets of Romanticism, further steeping himself in what he considered the only eternal art: German and Norse epic literature. From the 1840s onward he set out to revolutionize the opera house from what he considered decorative display and frilly sentimentality. His voracious literary appetite yielded the characters of Lohengrin, Tannhäuser, Hans Sachs, Tristan, Isolde, Parsifal, and Siegfried; characters that would consume the remainder of his complex creative life.

Wagner worked hard to sculpt his personal narrative. In 1839, fleeing creditors in Riga, Russia, where he had been general music

director for two seasons, Wagner sailed on the Thetis towards London. Rough seas forced them to shelter in the port of Sandvika, Norway, which became the setting of The Flying Dutchman, the name of which we hear in the work's opening moments. He tried, retroactively, to claim that this harrowing sea voyage inspired him to write The Flying Dutchman, which remains part of the lore of the work to this day. In actuality, he had sketched most of the text and some of the music already, though the voyage did contribute artistic inspirations: the antiphonal "Ghost" chorus was inspired by Wagner hearing the echoes of the ship's crew at port in Sandvika. Wagner's original libretto set the work in Scotland, a common setting of Romantic-era art, as it was the farthest-flung outpost of Europe and held great mystery and adventure in its highlands and foggy moors. Did Wagner change the opera's setting to Norway simply to distance his creation from his main source, Heinrich Heine's 1833 retelling of the ancient Dutchman legend, or was he inspired simply by his unsettling nautical escape from Riga? Wagner acknowledged Heine's influence, strongly at first, much more grudgingly as his career took flight. There is some logic in simply thinking that Wagner liked the alliteration of the Norwegian names more than the Scottish. As usual, with Wagner, the truth is murky.

The legend of the Dutchman is as old as seafaring, and multiple permutations reemerged during the Industrial Revolution, as the tale of the mariner doomed to wander the seas aligned perfectly with the metaphor of mankind adrift in a soulless world of evermore sophisticated machinery. The basic story, while not specifically religious, is a parable of belief, for the wheels of the plot turn on rules and consequences: the Dutchman is able to come ashore

only once every seven years, and if he can find a woman who will be faithful to him for life, his sin will be cleansed, his soul redeemed, and his watery curse ended. In most versions of the story, including Wagner's, the title refers not to the man himself, but to his ship. Over time, several themes were superimposed on the tale, each reflecting a cultural shift of its time: in the late eighteenth century the story took on elements of crime and punishment, that the crew of the Dutchman was comprised of criminals doomed to never make landfall—shades of the British colonies in America, the loss of which in the 1770s left Britain with no place to send its prisoners, hence the brutal voyages of the "first fleet" from Britain to Australia. The most famous English-language version of the tale is Samuel Taylor Coleridge's The Rime of the Ancient Mariner, from 1798, pocked with allusions that entered the ninteenth-century lexicon: "Water, water everywhere, and all the boards did shrink; water, water, everywhere, nor any drop to drink."

Beyond the legend itself, several works played important roles that culminated in Wagner's opera. Goethe's vast novel, Faust, written and revised over decades, can be felt hovering over nearly every Romantic era story that followed it, and allusions to Faustian bargains are subtly found in The Flying Dutchman. The youthful Wagner was fascinated with ghost stories and by what might now be termed, "the occult," and in this he was of his time, for supernatural stories enjoyed wide popularity in the early years of Romanticism. Novels by Mary Shelley (Frankenstein, 1818) and her husband Percy Bysshe Shelley (Prometheus Unbound, 1820) set off decades of books about the dangers of modern science, and shades of both are cast upon The Flying Dutchman.

Elements of two operas Wagner conducted as a young man can also be found in his Dutchman. Now known only to connoisseurs, Heinrich Marschner's 1828 opera, Der Vampyr (The Vampire), was thought one of the great works of its day, and Marschner was one of the few of Wagner's fellow composers he didn't publicly trounce. More well-documented is the influence on Wagner of Weber's Der Freischütz (1821), an opera aligned with Wagner's infatuation with the supernatural and that remains in the active repertoire of many German-speaking opera houses.

Paris was the most active operatic center for new works during Wagner's formative years, and one forgotten opera he heard there played a unique role in The Flying Dutchman. La Dame Blanche (The White Lady), provided the opening musical phrase of Dutchman's famous "Spinning" chorus, which Wagner stole with precision but made better, and also an aria of La Dame Blanche's leading lady bears close resemblance to what Wagner would make more memorable in his ballade aria for Senta.

For all of the influence of French opera comique and the German Romantic movement, The Flying Dutchman owes its first performances, as do so many works we now know and love, to the advocacy of an important singer, one of the most renowned of her era, Wilhelmine Schröder-Devrient (1804-1860) who premiered the role of Senta. Wagner wrote in his autobiography that witnessing her early performances as Leonore in Fidelio inspired him to pursue a life in composition. Scholars closely examining the peregrinations of both have determined he could not have seen her as Leonore when he was sixteen, as he claimed throughout his life. But he certainly saw her later as Romeo in Bellini's I Capuletti e i

Montecchi, and he conducted her in many roles in the early 1830s. Her greatness as a singer was eclipsed for a time following the posthumous publication of her prurient memoirs. They were, Wagnerian-style, almost entirely fabricated, but their sexual frankness ensured their popularity. For a brief time it was the book no one admitted buying, but that everyone privately read.

Conceived as a character of the utmost nobility, Senta can seem simply a pawn for the men in the drama: her father, Daland, feels a bit too eager to sell her, and the Dutchman wants her for his own redemption before he knows her. But The Flying Dutchman transcends the plot norms of its era with the only operatic quality that is ever transcendent: its dazzling score. Wagner wrote extraordinarily pictorial music several generations before the cinematic era, prompting various commentators to opine that Wagner, had he lived in the twentieth century, would have been a renowned film composer—a profession difficult to align with a man who dominated everything and everyone in his orbit. Rarely has a composer summoned more musical energy in a shorter time than Wagner did in this opera: listen to the inexorable drive to the end of the work with the arrival of the "Ghost" chorus. Or the rousing "Sailors" chorus that opens the final scene, or the huge choral conversation between the men and women, something never before

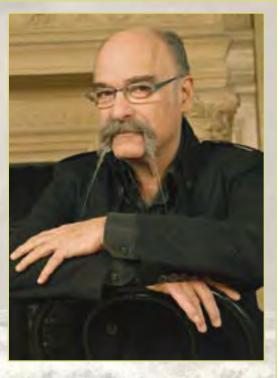
seen to such an extent on the opera stage. The opera alternates between rousing nautical tunes and Bellini-inspired arching melodies that limn the work with fragility. Angels permeate the libretto of *The Flying Dutchman*, and they find metaphysical musical expression throughout it, most poignantly in the opera's final sung text, by Senta, "Preis' deinen Engel und sein Gebot! Hier steh' ich treu dir bis zum Tod!" (Praise your angel and his vows. Here I am, true to you until death.)

Though it is counterintuitive to a man about whom there is so much opinion and documentation, there is ultimately no way to "know" Wagner nor is there a definitive way to perform him because his art provokes inquisition and a continuation of life's artistic search; it has nothing in it that approaches the static. For as long as we value in our culture the qualities of introspection, curiosity, and our unique ability to think about thinking, Wagner's works will find their way, as they always have, into our definition of ourselves. That a person of such questionable integrity could invent works of such depth and value is perhaps a sign of cautious hope, and should give us pause. Many artists would be surprised at the longevity of their creations. Wagner, though, would likely feel about himself much as we do here in 2013: that it is difficult to recover from the unsettling wonder he set forth.

FROM THE DIRECTOR Petrika lonesco

The Flying Dutchman is really Senta's story of obsession, so our production takes place in her mind. The aesthetic is rooted in modern cinema—which is bridging the gap between reality and fantasy more and more—but the larger issues that have always been the core of this very human drama are ever present. One of my inspirations was Steven Spielberg's *Close Encounters of the Third Kind*, when Richard Dreyfuss's character becomes obsessed with subliminal images of a mountain-like shape and begins to sculpt it. In our production, Senta, who is desperately searching for an escape from her provincial microcosm, becomes fixated on the legend of the Dutchman as a release from her suffering.

Senta is suffocating in a very small world: an absent mother and a father who sees her as merchandise, subject to the jealousy of her fiancé, and a slave to women bound to a tedious, dreary existence. How many Sentas are there today who hang posters on their walls of their mythical idols—celebrities, rock stars and fantasize about being whisked away to a fabulous life? She has become morbidly consumed with fantasies of death and wishes to sacrifice herself to the



"star" of her day in order to make him real, and thus partake in the larger human adventure of love and passion.

Senta's compulsive imagination makes it possible for the supernatural to permeate reality. As a director, my objective was not to depict neurosis or confirm the existence of the supernatural, but to make these phenomena seem possible. Her faith in the existence of the Dutchman strengthens the authenticity of her character. She adheres to the myth, and Wagner allows the audience to succumb to those same fantasies.



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Behind Wagner's Tale of The Flying Dutchman

The Flying Dutchman, published in Collier's Weekly, December 8, 1900 (oil on canvas), by Howard Pyle (1853–1911) Heine here applies his celebrated genius for irony to the tale of the wretched mariner whose defiant pride has doomed him to sail forever on a phantom ship. (In both Heine and Wagner, "the Flying Dutchman" refers not to the protagonist, who is unnamed, but to his doomed ship.) Heine's bathetic parody of Romantic pathos was so effective precisely on account of the popularity of this relatively modern variant of an ageless legend (a principle that can still be seen operating in the success of films like the *Pirates of the*

he faithful woman hurls herself into the sea and the curse on

the Flying Dutchman is lifted, he is redeemed, and we see the ghostly ship sinking to the bottom of the sea. The moral of this piece, for women, is that they should beware of marrying a Flying Dutchman; and we men should draw from it the lesson that women, at best, will be our undoing."

It might not be unreasonable to assume this quotation comes from a critic hostile to Wagner. Or perhaps it represents a merry ribbing of the unintended absurdities that never seem far from the surface in his operas, a la Anna Russell? ("The scene opens in the River Rhine. *IN* it.") Yet this sardonic wink at the climactic scene of *The Flying Dutchman* is actually taken from the chief *source* Wagner used for the opera in which, as consensus has it, he began to realize his authentic voice for the first time.

That source is "The Fable of the Flying Dutchman," an episode contained within the longer unfinished novel Aus den Memoiren des Herren von Schabelewopski (From the Memoirs of Herr von Schnabelewopski), which was published in late 1833— eight years before Wagner composed the bulk of his opera. Its author is the great German-Jewish writer Heinrich Heine (1797-1856), and his narrator recounts this story as the plot of a play he has witnessed; his retelling of what he sees onstage moreover embeds an erotically titillating episode involving a seductive fellow audience member (her sexually loose behavior making her a kind of anti-Senta).

Caribbean franchise). The meme of the Cursed Sailor and his crew likely took shape as European empires expanded their maritime trade activities. While it had made the leap from oral folk tale to literature only recently, the culture was already saturated with this meme when Heine added his cynical depiction of "Mrs. Flying Dutchman"—already by 1826 the London playwright Edward Fitzball could score a hit with a partially farcical, over-the-top melodramatic treatment of this material.

Everyone loves a good ghost story, of course, and Shakespeare and Stephen King alike know how to captivate their audiences with a chilling yarn that can simultaneously provide entrée into something more profound. But the Dutchman motif proved especially alluring in the emerging era of Romanticism. From poets such as Samuel Taylor Coleridge (*The Rime of the Ancient Mariner*) and Thomas Moore to popular German storytellers of the early nineteenth century, it quickly made a trans-Atlantic crossing and became a theme frequently encountered in American letters. Examples include the writings of Washington Irving, James Fenimore Cooper, and Edgar Allan Poe (both "MS Found in a Bottle" and *The Narrative of Arthur Gordon Pym* introduce Poe's own fascinating twists on this material).

The Dutchman's eerie fate gratified a craving for tales of supernatural crime and punishment that also found expression in the work of several of Wagner's predecessors: most notably, the German Romantic operas of Carl Maria von Weber and Heinrich Marschner (who composed one on a faddish vampire story) and Giacomo Meyerbeer's early French grand opera *Robert le Diable*.

Nor was Wagner without precedent in recognizing in his cursed protagonist a resonant metaphor for deeper existential questions. The Gothic sense of alienation from ordinary society that is key to Wagner's portrayal of the Dutchman taps into related currents of darker Romantic angst about modernity—as seen, for example, in Lord Byron's world-weary anti-hero Manfred and Mary Wollstonecraft Shelley's precocious novel *Frankenstein*, or, *The Modern Prometheus*. In addition, as Dieter Borchmeyer remarks in *Drama and the World of Richard Wagner*, the Dutchman of lore can be viewed as "a symbol of the hubristic spirit of discovery that transgressed the boundaries of knowledge and experience" dictated by religion" and "is thus the maritime equivalent of Faust."

It's not by coincidence that during his exile in Paris, Wagner abandoned work on a Goethe-inspired *Faust Symphony* not long before embarking on *The Flying Dutchman*. (He later published what he had completed as an independent concert overture.) The composer himself analyzed this move toward "the specificity of the drama" as a liberation "from the mists of instrumental music."

Wagner's intense attraction to the Dutchman legend can hardly be explained as an attempt to exploit a topic made fashionable by popular culture. In fact, hot on the heels of his first commercial success with *Rienzi*, the more artistically adventurous *Flying Dutchman* initially earned a lukewarm reception (there were only four performances of the original Dresden production).

Another angle from which to consider the tale's grip on the composer's imagination, according to Joachim Köhler's controversial biography *Richard Wagner: The Last of the Titans*, is arguably an inner need to exorcize "the traumatic experiences of horror and the fear of ghosts that kept him awake at night"—terrors that in Köhler's portrayal had been imprinted on him as a sensitive child. And in a fascinating essay on *The Flying Dutchman* in the context of the operatic genres of its time, Wagner expert Thomas Grey writes that the composer turned the "melodramatic" claptrap associated with the story—"with its mysterious portraits, invisible voices, *ersatz* folk ballads, and sentimental 'romances'"—into "an allegory of Romantic alienation, love, and redemption." In doing so, "Wagner was aiming to rehabilitee this ailing branch [the "homely genre" of German Romantic opera] of his artistic patrimony."

Yet what drew Wagner so compulsively to the satirical version of the legend set forth by the notoriously anti-Romantic Heine, whose ironic posture he simply stripped away? Heine, in fact, exercised a far-ranging influence on Wagner's future career. The aspiring young artist had been befriended by the poet, a fellow exile in Paris who welcomed him into his circle (and quite possibly even helped Wagner polish his French prose in the scenario he pre-

pared for submission to the Paris Opera). Köhler points out that "virtually all the mythological themes that were to be associated with Wagner's name were already touched on" in Heine's writings (such as the Grail legends, the tale of Tristan and Isolde, the riding Valkyries, and Tannhäuser's excursion into the forbidden Venusberg). And in his earlier autobiographical accounts, Wagner credited Heine for giving him "all I needed to adapt the [Dutchman] legend and use it as an operatic subject"—though Wagner's metastasizing anti-Semitism likely underlay his later suppression of any reference to his debt to Heine.

"One must be able to joke about the most sublime of things," declared Wagner (as reported by his wife Cosima in her diaries). Borchmeyer adds that "as early as 1840 [before he had even completed his *Dutchman* libretto] he had written French parodies of Senta's Ballad and the Sailors' Chorus, showing how tragic themes immediately evoked parodic associations in his imagination." (When you get down to it, "The Ride of the Valkyries" is not such a great distance from vaudeville.) By way of making sense of Wagner's transformation of the satirical source he discovered in Heine into a primal existential drama, Borchmeyer suggests that "the subject has reacquired its former tragic seriousness, having lived through the experience of its own comic negation...which explains why, in turn, Wagner's music dramas have repeatedly invited writers to parody them."

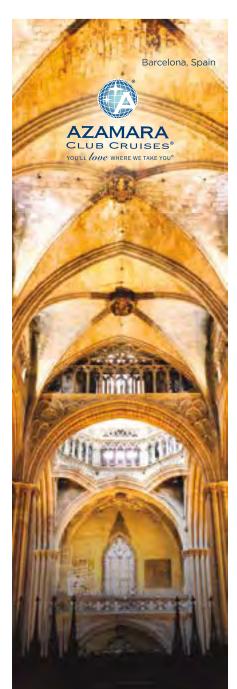

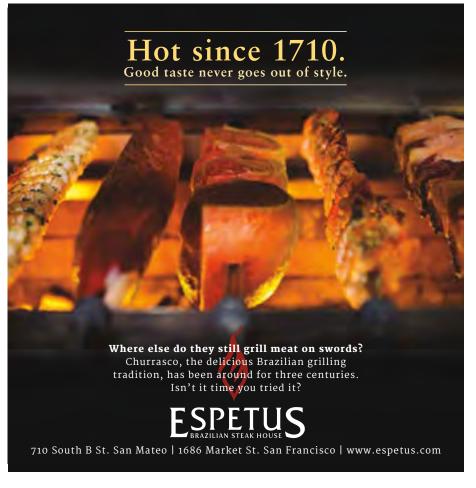

He was awarded the Olivier Messiaen Foundation Prize in 2003 for his artistic contribution to the preparation of the Company's North American premiere of *Saint François d'Assise*. Robertson has also conducted nine main-stage productions with the Company. Other North American opera credits include productions with Sarasota Opera, Edmonton Opera, and Philadelphia's Curtis Opera Theatre. Before joining San Francisco



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Opera, Robertson was head of music and chorus director of Scottish Opera.

LAWRENCE PECH is in his seventeenth season as dance master and resident choreographer for San Francisco Opera. He has created period and interpretive dances on more than forty productions with the Company for operas ranging from the baroque to the contemporary. Pech received his formal training from American Ballet Theatre (ABT) and was invited by Mikhail Baryshnikov to join that company in 1980. In 1986, he joined San Francisco Ballet, where he became a principal dancer in 1989. His successful struggle with cancer was featured in the ballet Blue Lair that aired on KQED in 1991. Pech founded his own dance company in 1995 and has choreographed more than fifty ballets, thirty musicals, and numerous self-produced evenings of music and dance around the world.

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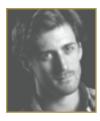
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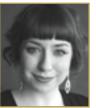


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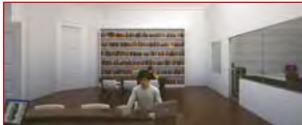

DRINKING FOUNTAINS are available on all levels except the Lower level, where there is a courtesy water station on the north side. Water bottles are permitted in the auditorium.

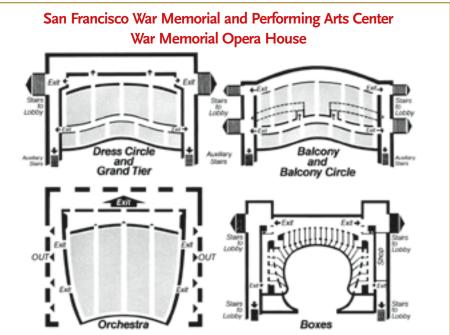
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
