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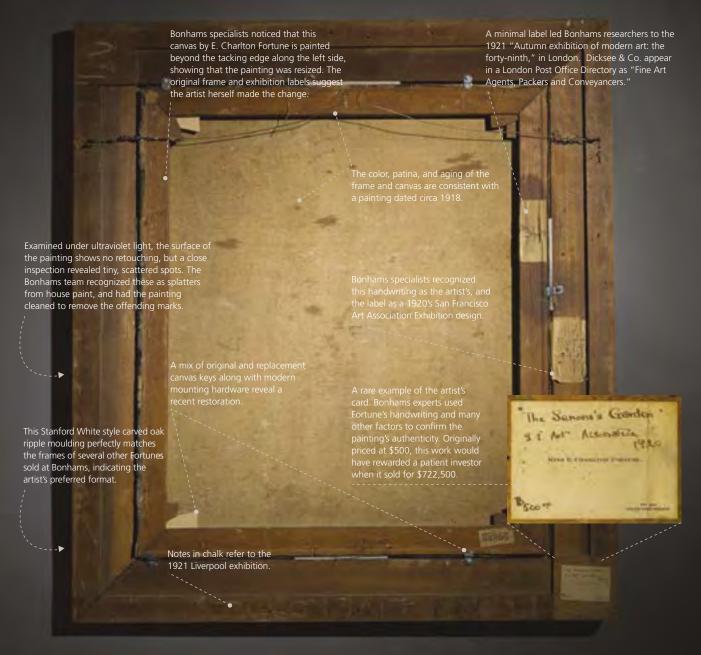
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A Message from the Leaders of San Francisco Opera

Notes from the General Director

Legacy Giving: Critical Insurance for the Future

For opera to thrive into the future, it will have to be supported by three income sources: ticket sales, annual gifts, and legacy (estate) gifts. Over time the ticket sales portion of the income budget, now approximately 33%, will decrease, while the percentages of annual and legacy giving will have to increase.

Just as there are tax advantages to making annual gifts, there are even more attractive tax incentives to making legacy gifts. The fruits of certain legacy gifts can even be enjoyed in a donor's lifetime! As the old adage goes, "You can't take it with you!" I personally have remembered Houston Grand Opera and San Francisco Opera in my will, in addition to providing the wherewithal for my three children to educate their own children. It is important for me to perpetuate causes that have given me great pleasure and inspiration during my lifetime. My particular interest is to provide permanent funds for the recruitment and training of young singers.

The most valuable legacy gifts to San Francisco Opera are those that are unrestricted and can be used at the discretion of the board for appropriate needs. Some legacy donors prefer to donate to our endowment. These funds, currently valued at more than \$165 million, are invested by an investment committee of the board, earning income that is prudently distributed to the Company every year—either for general or specific purposes. These are the legacy gifts that "keep on giving." There are specific and substantial permanent funds within the endowment to support tickets for the underserved, student subscriptions, San Francisco Opera Center (young artist training), maintaining the War Memorial Opera House, traditional Italian opera productions, and new productions of leading-edge works.

It might surprise you that many of our legacy donors have not supported San Francisco Opera significantly through annual giving. At the end of their lives, they surmise, they can make a difference in providing significant support to a cause they treasure. Their gifts include not only cash and securities, but real estate, art, and jewelry—anything reasonably marketable.

Let me be perfectly clear: institutions like San Francisco Opera, Stanford, University High School, and Grace Cathedral will not continue to exist, let alone thrive, without constantly increasing endowments. One of the primary sources of this endowment growth will be legacy giving.

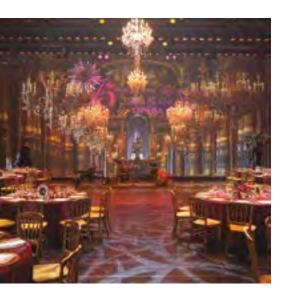
Bel Canto Legacy Society

Established in 1991 during Lotfi Mansouri's general directorship, San Francisco Opera's Bel Canto Legacy Society is a group of opera lovers who have agreed to "go public" with their legacy giving plans. In return, they are invited to an annual "high tea" with entertainment provided by our Adler Fellows, as well as to closed rehearsals and other events with the likes of Bryn Terfel and Susan Graham. There were 60 charter members in the Bel Canto Society 20 years ago. When I arrived in 2006, there were 255. Now there are 500! By the end of my contract in 2016, I have committed to have a whopping 750 **members.** Of course there are those who prefer not to disclose their estate plans, and that is perfectly fine. But I do urge people to "go public," as others are then motivated to follow in their footsteps.

Please refer to our current Bel Canto members at the back of your program. If there is a vibrant San Francisco Opera in 2050, it will be because of these extraordinary people! 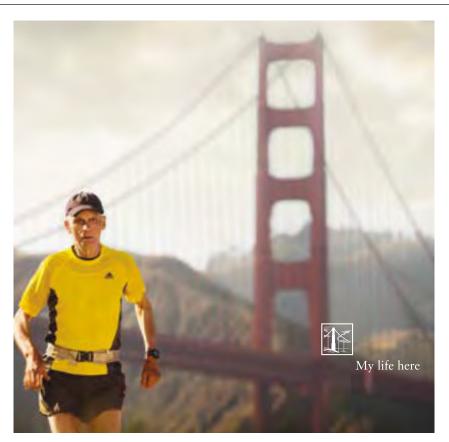


San Francisco Opera Guild Holiday Dinner on Stage

San Francisco Opera and Musicians Union Ratify New Four-Year Contract

In September, the San Francisco Opera Association and the American Federation of Musicians Local 6 ratified a new fouryear agreement for the San Francisco Opera Orchestra effective August 1, 2014 through July 31, 2018. General Director David Gockley commented, "At a time of continued turbulence for this industry, I'm heartened that difficult issues were able to be addressed in a respectful manner, with both sides committed to the future of the



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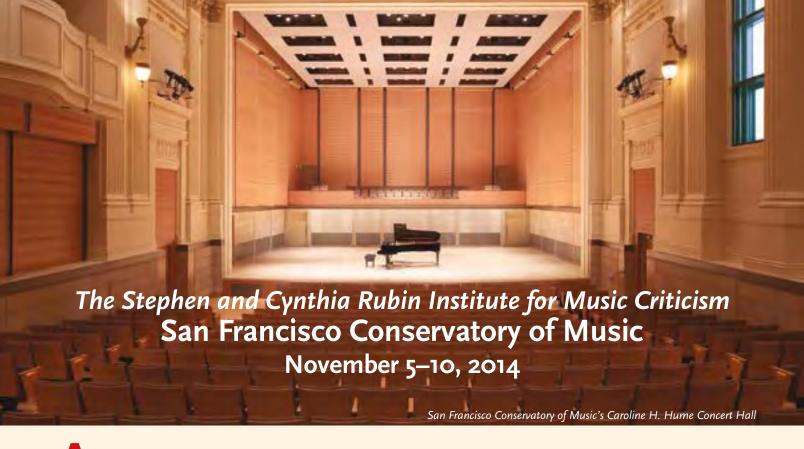
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lex Ross, music critic for *The New Yorker*, said, "Music is inconceivable without language. We have a desperate need to talk about musical experiences, even if we can only say we 'have no words.'" He made this statement at the inaugural Rubin Institute for Music Criticism in 2012.

The first program of its kind focusing on music and music criticism, the Rubin Institute is a biennial gathering that brings together before the public national music journalists, renowned musicians, and aspiring young writers, combining the wisdom and insight of today's highly esteemed critics, the artistry and daring of acclaimed musicians, and the energy and promise of tomorrow's music journalists. This year's institute held at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music comprises a weeklong series of public events including performances, keynote addresses by critics, critical review, and discussion panels.

Founded in 2011 by Stephen Rubin, President and Publisher, Henry Holt & Co., the inaugural edition of the Rubin Institute was held at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music in 2012 and featured performances by the Cleveland Orchestra, pianist Jeremy Denk, Apollo's Fire, and the International Contemporary Ensemble (ICE).

With public concerts by acclaimed musicians from the opera, chamber, and orchestral stages, the 2014 performances are reviewed by a select group of student writers (Rubin Institute Fellows). Their work is critiqued in private workshops and public sessions by a panel of highly esteemed national music critics and journalists. Leading up to the Institute, the twenty student writers work with a preparatory team at each of their nominating universities.

San Francisco Conservatory of Music, San Francisco Opera, San Francisco Symphony, Cal Performances, and Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra invite you to join us as we partner for the biennial Stephen and Cynthia Rubin Institute for Music Criticism November 5–10, 2014. Solely devoted to the art of classical music criticism, the Institute brings together the nation's most dis-

tinguished music journalists and writers, and aspiring young writers (Rubin Institute Fellows) for a keynote address, lectures, public performances, discussion panels, and critical reviews. The week-long event culminates in the awarding of both the \$10,000 Rubin Prize in Music Criticism to one of the Fellows for demonstrating outstanding promise in musical criticism, and the \$1,000 Everyone's a Critic Public Audience Review Prize for the best review by an audience member of a concert performed during the Institute.

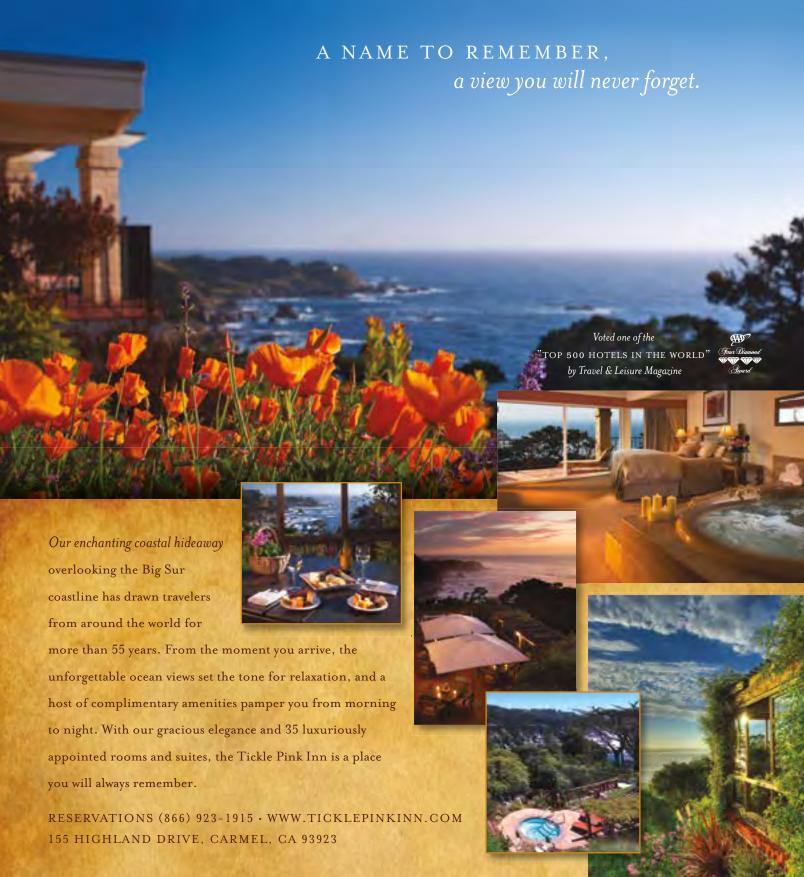
You are invited to attend the November 8 performance of *Tosca*, featuring a pre-performance lecture by *Washington Post* critic and writer Anne Midgette, and submit a 400-word critical review to the Rubin Institute to compete in the Audience Prize. *San Francisco Chronicle* Music Critic Joshua Kosman chairs the Everyone's a Critic Public Audience Review Prize judging panel, which includes writer/critics Robert Commanday, Wynne Delacoma, and Steven Winn.

The 2014 Rubin Institute Writers Panel includes Anne Midgette; Tim Page, professor, journalism and music, University of Southern California; John Rockwell, writer and arts critic; Alex Ross, *The New Yorker* magazine critic and author; Heidi Waleson, *Wall Street Journal* critic and author; and Rubin Institute benefactor Stephen Rubin, President and Publisher of Henry Holt & Co. Anthony Tommasini, *The New York Times* chief music critic, will give the November 5 opening keynote address.

For Midgette, the importance of the Rubin Institute is clear. "We need creativity more than ever, simply to find new outlets and new forms of expressing ourselves."

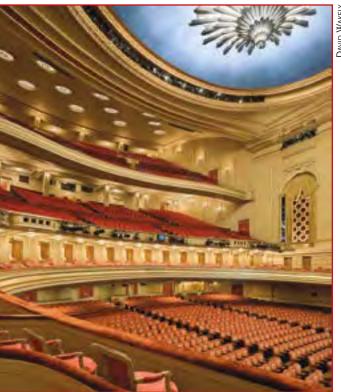

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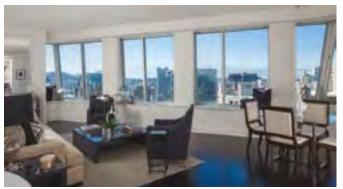

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John A. & Cynthia Fry Gunn



nce again, the unprecedented generosity of Cynthia and John Gunn has set the stage for a dazzling season at San Francisco Opera. Since 2002, when John joined the Opera Board, the couple has underwritten numerous productions and provided exceptional support for many of the company's innovative endeavors.

In September 2008, the Gunns made a historic commitment—believed to be the largest gift ever made by individuals to an American opera company—to help fund the signature projects of General Director David Gockley, including new operas and productions, multimedia projects, and outreach programs. This season, that gift is helping make four productions possible—Norma, La Bohème, The Trojans, and Two Women (La Ciociara).

Earlier this year, John also shared his considerable insights at the 2014 conference of OPERA AMERICA, the national service organization for opera. As he told attendees, "Opera is a dynamic art form and all of us play a role in keeping it vital. We must expand our repertoire and our audiences, and strive for financial flexibility. And we depend on donors to keep opera alive."

John is the former chairman and CEO of Dodge & Cox Investment Managers. He joined the firm in 1972, the year he received his MBA from Stanford Business School and married Cynthia, who graduated from Stanford with an A.B. in political science in 1970. Early in her career, Cynthia was the editor and director of The Portable Stanford book series for ten years. She edited twenty-eight books by Stanford professors on a vast array of topics, including *Economic Policy Beyond the Headlines* by George Shultz and Ken Dam.

In addition to their support of San Francisco Opera, the Gunns are active members of the community. John is the chair of the advisory board for the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research (SIEPR), serves as a trustee of Stanford University, and is on the board of directors of Stanford Hospitals and Clinics. Cynthia is an overseer of Stanford's Hoover Institution, a member of the advisory board of Family and Children Services, and serves on the boards of the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health and the San Francisco Fine Arts Museums.

Opera lovers are grateful to Cynthia and John, and applaud their commitment to keeping San Francisco Opera a leading-edge company.

newcomers to San Francisco Opera every year.

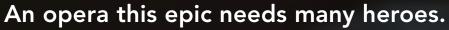

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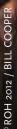

TOSCA

ACT I

Cesare Angelotti, a political prisoner, has just escaped from the jail at Castel Sant'Angelo and seeks refuge in the church of Sant'Andrea della Valle. A Sacristan enters followed by the painter Mario Cavaradossi, who climbs the scaffold and begins to work on his painting, a portrait of Mary Magdalene. Angelotti comes out of hiding and asks for his friend Cavaradossi's assistance as the voice of the painter's beloved, the famous opera singer Floria Tosca, is heard. She enters demanding to know why she was kept waiting and suspects Cavaradossi of talking to another woman. He reassures her of his love, and the pair agrees to meet that evening.

A cannon shot is heard announcing Angelotti's escape, and the friends flee. The Sacristan gathers choristers around him, telling them they must rehearse for a special performance for which Tosca will be the soloist. At that moment, the Roman chief of police, Baron Scarpia, arrives searching for Angelotti. Scarpia soon realizes that Cavaradossi had aided Angelotti's escape; he convinces Tosca, who has just returned, that Cavaradossi has fled with another woman. Scarpia hopes Tosca will then lead him to Cavaradossi, and thus to Angelotti. He vows to ensnare them all.

ACT II

Dining alone in his quarters, Scarpia receives word that Cavaradossi has been arrested. He summons Tosca from her concert in the courtyard below, and she is shocked to see the captured Cavaradossi. Scarpia tries to get the location of Angelotti's hiding place from Tosca, but she insists that she knows nothing. As Cavaradossi is tortured in the next room, she reveals the secret and asks Scarpia for Cavaradossi's freedom in return. Delirious from torture, Cavaradossi hears Scarpia order his men to Angelotti's hiding place, curses Tosca, and cries defiance at the tyranny of Scarpia.

Tosca pleads for her lover's life, and Scarpia offers her an exchange: if she will give herself to him, he will give Cavaradossi back to her. In despair, she pleads for mercy but realizes she must agree to the bargain. Scarpia tells Tosca there must be a mock execution and circuitously orders his henchman to make prepara-

tions for a real one. At Tosca's request, he then writes a safe-conduct pass for her and Cavaradossi and prepares to claim his prize. She grabs a knife from the table and stabs him, then takes the pass and goes to find Cavaradossi.

ACT III

Outside the prison, Cavaradossi bribes the jailer for permission to write a farewell letter to Tosca and recalls pleasant memories of times they spent together. She hurries in, explaining that there is to be a mock execution in which he is to pretend to die. She also tells him about Scarpia's murder and of the safe-conduct pass that will get them out of Rome. The lovers ecstatically plan for the future but are interrupted by the arrival of the firing squad. Tosca urges Cavaradossi to fall convincingly. Tosca urges Cavaradossi to fall convincingly. She bids him to wait until they are gone and then asks him to rise and come away with her. Tosca is horrified to discover that the execution was real after all, and distant shouts announce Scarpia's murder. As the soldiers rush in to seize Tosca, she climbs to the fortress parapet and leaps to her death.

The Rest of the Story: Tosca's Historical Background

ictorien Sardou (1831–1908) would be all but forgotten today, even in his native France, were it not for the extraordinary success of Puccini's opera based his 1887 play *La Tosca*. Sardou was an avid historian who took pride in the wealth of factual detail he poured into his plays. In fact the overwhelming supply of erudition relative to the French Revolution and the Napoleonic Wars that overburdens *La Tosca* makes the play a tough slog for modern readers.

Sardou wrote the work as a vehicle for the famously temperamental French actress Sarah Bernhardt, yet the heroine does not make her entrance until forty-five minutes into the play. But the play's heated melodrama and vivid characters enabled its drawbacks to be overlooked by opera librettists and composers, including the aged Verdi, who at eighty-one allowed that he would have made *La Tosca* into an opera had he been younger.

Puccini saw the play with Bernhardt in the lead no fewer than three times—the first in Milan in 1889, while he was still finishing preparations for his second opera *Edgar*. He was certain he had found the makings of a future opera project. But years would pass before he could get to it, by which time *Manon Lescaut* and *La Bohème* had made him famous. Sardou had at first had seemed willing to grant Puccini the rights to his play, but later changed his mind and gave them instead to one of Puccini's rivals, Alberto Franchetti.

Exactly how Puccini managed to retrieve the rights from Franchetti is the subject of somewhat conflicting stories that needn't detain us. Suffice it to say that Puccini gave the task of

distilling Sardou's wordy play into a usable form to the literary team of Luigi Illica and Giuseppe Giacosa. They had worked on the *Manon Lescaut* text and created the brilliant libretto for *La Bohème*. The pair successfully captured the dramatic essence of the story, telescoping its five acts into three, and the opera premiered in Rome in 1900—exactly one hundred years after the action of the story takes place there.

Despite being firmly based on the aftermath of the French Revolution, the opera itself includes no actual historical characters. But real-life fig-

ures appear in Sardou's play, and even the fictional ones may be partly based on actual people. Harvard musicologist

Deborah Burton has found evidence that Baron Scarpia, Tosca, and Angelotti may have been based on historical figures of the time. Burton also uncovered the story of an unfortunate prisoner named Palmieri, whose execution was real, not "simulated" as Scarpia suggests to Tosca.

In both play and opera, Tosca is a tempestuous, beautiful, deeply religious opera singer. The aristocratic painter Cavaradossi, we know from the play, has a French mother and lived in France at the time of the Revolution, hence his "republican" (i.e., pro-Napoleon) leanings. He is painting the portrait of Mary Magdalene for the Church of Sant' Andrea delle Valle not out of religious convic-

tion, but to allay suspicions about his revolutionary leanings. Although the onstage characters are essentially fictional, two important historical personages are mentioned in the opera. The first, of course, is Napoleon, referred to as "Bonaparte." His troops invaded Italy several times, beginning in 1797, and were countered primarily by forces of the Austrian Empire, which dominated most of Italy in the 18th century. This conflict provides the primary backdrop for the story. But another, less obvious reference in the opera is to a figure no less significant. In Act II, Scarpia scornfully assures Tosca that by the time she runs to seek intercession from "the Queen," her beloved Cavaradossi will already

be a corpse. The royal lady in question is not the Queen of Rome—there was no such person—but the queen of the "Kingdom of the Two Sicilies," i.e., Naples. (The year is 1800, long before Italy became a unified country in the 1860s.)

Queen Maria Carolina was the wife of Ferdinand IV, King of Naples and Sicily, who was descended from the same Bourbon dynasty as the late French king (and guillotine victim) Louis XVI. (Naples had sided with Britain and Austria to oppose Napoleon's invasions.) Ferdinand and Maria had a foothold of sorts in Rome at the Palazzo Farnese, a Bourbon family inheritance. It is here that Act II of the opera takes place, during and after a concert—with the queen in attendance—celebrating the supposed military victory over Napoleon at the village of Marengo in Northern Italy.

The headstrong Maria Carolina was herself Austrian, the daughter of the Hapsburg Empress Maria Theresa and the sister of Marie Antoinette, who had also met her fate at the guillotine. Thus there can be no doubt that the formidable Queen of Naples had little regard for French "Republicanism," nor for Napoleon—its principal representative at the time.

The queen's husband Ferdinand was a feeble leader, and she ruled him with an iron hand. The tug-of-war over Rome began in 1797, when Napoleon invaded the city for the first time. Rome was declared a republic—the government of which the fictional Angelotti would have been a part. Encouraged by his queen, King Ferdinand attempted to invade the Roman Republic but was driven back. The French-led counteroffensive then pushed them back to Naples, sending its royal pair fleeing to Sicily. Naples was declared the "Parthenopean Republic," but the two French-style republics in Rome and Naples were to be short-lived. By June of 1799 the monarchy had been restored to Naples.

The Roman republic fell a few months later, in September of 1799, and the Bourbon monarchs from Naples took the opportunity to assert their authority over Rome. Republican sympathizers were locked up in Castel Sant'Angelo—the Castel of the "Holy Angel" (i.e., St. Michael, whose statue sits atop the fortress)—where Act III of the opera takes place.

In his 1950 book about the Palazzo Farnese, Raoul de Broglie describes the actions of Queen Maria Carolina's civil commander:

Under the pretext of establishing order, he filled the prisons with honorable citizens.... Soldiers of the Neapolitan army pillaged the homes of all partisans of the Republic. They shot and killed all who resisted. To flush out suspects, he multiplied the number of police and spies.... A special state tribunal was even created to judge suspects according to the rules and traditions of Naples. The principal agents of the police forces of The Two Sicilies poured into Rome and established themselves in the king's own residence, the Palazzo Farnese.

The action of the opera takes place amid this tense political atmosphere. (For an interesting read about this period, try Susan



Sontag's 1993 novel *The Volcano Lover*, based on the true story of the British ambassador to Naples and his wife, who became a confidante of Maria Carolina.)

The actual events referred to in *Tosca* enable us to date the action to a specific day: June 17, 1800. Three days prior, Napoleon invaded Italy again and was nearly defeated by the Austrians at Marengo. The premature reports of this supposed victory over the French (announced by the Sacristan in the opera) spark the celebration at the close of Act I, as the church quickly organizes a *Te Deum*, the traditional liturgical celebration of a military victory.

But within hours of that first, erroneous report, a second dispatch arrived with the news that Napoleon staged a surprise counter-attack and had in fact been victorious at Marengo. Scarpia's henchman Sciarrone rushes in to report this reversal in Act II, giving rise to Cavaradossi's rash outburst of "down with tyranny" exultation, so angering Scarpia that he seals his own doom.

Had he lived, Cavaradossi would have been in for some bitter political disillusionment. Although Napoleon did eventually conquer Rome a second time, in 1806, he had by then forgotten about republicanism, declaring himself emperor and annexing the Papal States to the French Empire. The papacy was finally restored in 1814, shortly before Napoleon's final defeat at Waterloo.

King Ferdinand of Naples was also driven out by Napoleon a second time, but was eventually restored to his throne once more, in 1816. By then, however, his queen Maria Carolina had fled home to Austria and died there. Ferdinand ruled on another nine years until his death in 1825. Both in Rome and Naples, absolutism in government would remain in place for decades to come.

The Napoleonic Wars failed to bring Cavaradossi's longed-for republican freedoms, but they changed the face of Europe nonetheless, and provided the historical underpinnings for one of the most gripping dramas in the operatic repertoire.

The Play That Started It All

hen French playwright Victorien Sardou wrote La Tosca in 1887 he did so for the simplest of reasons: it was to be a star vehicle for Sarah Bernhardt, the most famous actress of La Belle Époque. They had collaborated twice before, with moderate success, on the plays Féodora (1882), and Théodora (1884). But unlike those largely forgotten dramas, La Tosca would soon, and unexpectedly, set the world on fire—both as a play and as the immortal opera based upon it.

Even before it opened, Sardou's *La Tosca* was igniting scandal. Author Ernest Daudet accused Sardou of plagiarism, claiming he had written a play set during the same time period featuring a famed opera singer—a play that Bernhardt had read years before. And in the weeks preceding its premiere, Bernhardt angrily threatened to walk out when she learned that Sardou had sold the rights for the first American production of the play to the actress Fanny Davenport.

The day of *La Tosca's* premiere, the Parisian journal, *Gil Blas*, infuriated the play's producers by publishing a complete description of the plot. (Sardou later sued the paper successfully.) And at the end of the opening night performance, a near-riot ensued when the actor Pierre Berton (Bernhardt's sometime lover who was playing Scarpia) came on stage to introduce the author. The audience would have none of it, shouting, "Bernhardt, Bernhardt!" Berton pleaded with Bernhardt to come out, but she refused to do so until Sardou had been introduced. After he took a bow, Bernhardt appeared to thunderous applause and cries of "Vive Sarah!" And the brouhahas were only beginning to brew.

Because of the high visibility of *La Tosca's* lead actress, famous names weighed in as the production toured Europe. George Bernard Shaw called the play, in which all four main characters meet violent ends, a "clumsily constructed, empty-headed turnip ghost of a cheap shocker," adding presciently: "Oh, if it had but been an opera!" Oscar Wilde disagreed, saying he found the plot moving, calling it, "a terrible human tragedy."

When the production arrived in America, the reaction was even more polarized. Particularly disturbing to audience members at opening night was Tosca's suicide, causing star Fanny Davenport to change the ending in subsequent performances. (Rather then hurl herself from the parapet, Tosca instead faces the firing squad even as she grieves over Cavaradossi's lifeless body.) And drama critic William Winter, in excoriating the production, warned American women not to see *La Tosca* while pregnant. Some scenes, he wrote, were "not only shocking to the nervous system and grossly offensive to persons of true sensibility, but... might inflict irreparable injury on persons yet unborn."

Despite the firestorms it created, *La Tosca* was enormously successful, with an incredible 3,000 performances in France alone. It played around the world for thirty years, eventually making Sardou a rich man. Then as now, controversy sells.

(Sadly, the drama would continue backstage years after its premiere. In a 1905 performance of *La Tosca* in Rio de Janeiro, Bernhardt injured her right knee as she jumped off the parapet.

Complications set in, and ten years later, due to gangrene, her entire right leg was amputated.)

Yet if critics and audiences found fault with Sardou's insistence on sex and violence, few could find fault with his historical research on the period in which *La Tosca* takes place. The playwright had a lifelong fascination with not only the French Revolution but the wars that followed, thanks in part to the fact that his grandfather had served as a surgeon with Napoleon's army in Italy. Despite a youth and young adulthood plagued by poverty and illness, the author managed to collect a private research library of more than 80,000 books, including many that depicted late 18th-century Rome, where *La Tosca* is set. No fewer than six of his other plays were set in that tumultuous era, before an accord was forged that would unify the city-states of Italy under a central government.

Law was an elusive term during those years, with corruption and violence the rule of the day. Against this backdrop came the plot for *La Tosca*, in which Italian patriots like Cesari Angelotti were imprisoned while corrupt cops like Baron Scarpia ran amok.

Given his minor historian status, Sardou actually placed real people in his play in minor roles: Queen Maria Carolina, Prince Diego Naselli, and the composer Giovanni Paisiello. And although all four main characters (Cesare Angelotti, Mario Cavaradossi, Floria Tosca, and Baron Scarpia) are fictional, they are said to have been influenced by historical figures.

According to historian Susan Vandiver Nicassio, the character of the political refugee Cesare Angelotti was partly based on Liborio Angelucci, who had briefly been a consul of the Roman Republic; another influence on the choice of his name may have been Nicola Antonio Angeletti, a prominent Italian revolutionary. As for Tosca's freethinking artist lover, Mario Cavaradossi, it's been speculated that Sardou was influenced in the naming process by the very similar name Caravadossi, which is that of a noble Italian family from Nice, some of whom fought in the Italian Wars of Independence.

As for the immortal heroine, Floria Tosca, little is known about Sardou's inspirations for the character: an orphan with a voice like an angel, who is ushered into the world of opera by no less than the Pope. She is entirely fictional. And it's been written that Sardou took a very long time to give her a name, settling finally on Floria Tosca—perhaps as an homage to Saint Tosca, a revered figure in Verona, the character's home town.

In a final controversy for Sardou's play, Puccini's librettists (Luigi Illica and Giuseppe Giacosa) attempted to alter the ending for the operatic adaptation, with Tosca going mad rather than committing suicide. But Sardou would have none of it, and the grand finale remained—one of the most dramatic climaxes in all of opera.

Toscas Roman Monuments

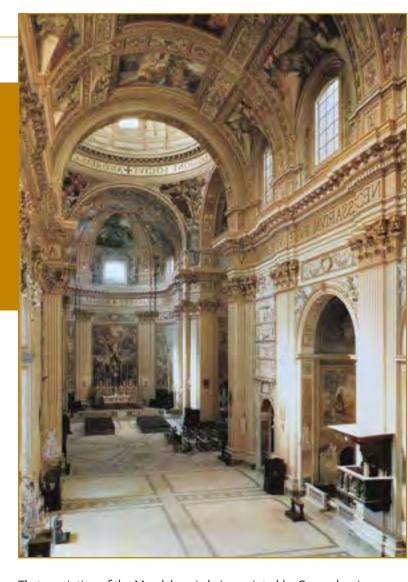
he Roman setting of *Tosca* highlights three great monuments: the Church of Sant'Andrea della Valle in Act I; the Farnese Palace in Act II; and the Castel Sant'Angelo in Act III. All three locations have long histories and lore. The Church of Sant'Andrea della Valle is the backdrop for a parody of religious piety while the Farnese Palace evokes political repression of the state, and Castel Sant'Angelo becomes the violent venue for betrayal. Some selected historical details—no doubt important for a masterful Roman background—are telling for Victorien Sardou's original play as well as for Giacomo Puccini's distillation of these settings into his powerful opera plot.

The Church of Sant'Andrea della Valle is a magnificent Baroque church occupying an ancient site that became vital in the changes between late Republican and early Imperial Rome during the time of Augustus 2,000 years ago. Fittingly, the church is set in Puccini's opera during a time pitting new Bonapartist Republican sentiments against imperial powers. Its location places the church in the very heart of modern Rome, between the Vatican, the Capitoline Hill, the Tiber River, and the Pantheon.

Some of the greatest Baroque architects and artists either worked on the exterior of the church building or decorated its interior. Architects Carlo Maderno, Carlo Rainaldi, and Carlo Fontana either helped build the church or contributed to its great façade between 1656 and 1665. The noted artists who painted the interior include Giovanni Lanfranco (1582–1647), who painted the wonderfully illusionistic *Glory of the Virgin* on the dome interior, and Domenichino (1581–1641), who painted the well-known martyrdom and execution of St. Andrew on the ornate church ceiling. Both Lanfranco and Domenichino—often called the Raphael of the seventeenth century—were assistants to one of the greatest Baroque masters, Annibale Carracci (1560–1609).

The same dramatic pathos and emotional turmoil paralleled in Puccini's opera are easily evident in the famous Baroque paintings of one of Rome's most important Baroque churches.

Patrick Hunt is a classical archaeologist and professor at Stanford University. His book, Ten Discoveries that Rewrote History, was published in 2007.



That a painting of the Magdalene is being painted by Cavaradossi inside this church in Act I is not surprising: Mary Magdalene was the veritable saint of the Baroque and commensurately appropriate for the implied Romanticism of the dramatic date, 1800. Domenichino's popular depiction of St. Andrew's life and martyrdom in the church is symbolically answered in the opera's finale by Cavaradossi's "martyrdom." Puccini's use of a famous church to slyly evoke false piety in a revolutionary time is perfect: none of the title characters behave exactly appropriately inside the Church of Sant'Andrea della Valle, where the escaped but doomed Angelotti finds temporary sanctuary—an old mandate of mercy that churches traditionally offered. Interestingly, there is an old Roman statue outside the church that became known as Abbot Luigi because it resembled a sacristan of the Sant'Andrea della Valle church. His head has been lost and replaced countless times in various Roman political upheavals.

The Farnese Palace is one of Rome's most storied buildings, but with a checkered past. It occupies a large city block near the Tiber River along the Lungo dei Tibaldi. Originally begun in 1514 by the distinguished architect Antonio da Sangallo with work by no less than Michelangelo from 1546 onward, it was completed in 1574. The most significant decoration of the palace interior was masterminded by the Baroque artist Annibale Carracci, the Galleria Farnese that illustrated the mythology of Ovid's *Metamorphoses*,

created from 1595 onward. Carracci was assisted by Lanfranco and Domenichino, also in Sant'Andrea della Valle as already noted, thus adding some Baroque artistic symmetry to the locations employed in the opera for the *cognoscenti* who knew Rome.

The Farnese Palace was passed back and forth between various ruling factions. It was inherited by the Infante Charles, son of Philip V of Spain (great-grandson of France's Bourbon King Louis XV) and Elizabeth Farnese in 1734, and afterwards became the residence of the Neapolitan Bourbon stronghold to the time of Napoleon and the setting of the opera. During the Bourbon period, with battles over who would control Rome, the Farnese Palace was an unpleasant symbol of foreign occupation, whether by Republicans or Neapolitans. Placing Scarpia's office at the Farnese Palace is a deft touch spelling out police abuse of power in a palace administration riddled with nepotism and corruption. The Farnese Palace became the French Embassy in 1871, leased for one lira every ninety-nine years. As the symbol of Bourbon absolutism, the Farnese Palace serves as the perfect setting for Scarpia's machinations.

That the massive Castel Sant' Angelo stands as one of Rome's most easily recognized landmarks along the north bank of the Tiber, just east of the Vatican, is less important for the opera than its incredibly long history as funerary monument, fortress, and prison. Originally constructed as the Roman Emperor Hadrian's mausoleum and completed around AD 139, the core of the structure remains while its exterior has seen immense changes. It was an artificial mausoleum mountain designed to be over 160-feet high, serving as the repository of the ashes of Hadrian and, ultimately, as the resting place of the emperor Caracalla in AD 217. The ancient historian Procopius recorded in horror around AD 537 how the later Romans, who began converting it into a fortress, hurled its colossal bronze and marble statuary off its ramparts at the invading Goths.

Castel Sant'Angelo became a medieval symbol of refuge for Rome with Saint Michael the Archangel as civic protector. Castel Sant'Angelo was a stronghold of popes, including Benedict IX (1032-48) and the infamous philistine pope Alexander VI Borgia (1492-1503)—father of Lucrezia. With the conflated patchwork of other popes who built and strengthened the Passetta (passageway) to connect it to the Vatican in times of trouble. Castel Sant'Angelo became the ultimate focus of countless sieges up to and beyond the Sack of Rome by Charles V and his Spanish troops in 1527. At that instant, along with thirteen cardinals and up to 3,000 religious fugitives, Pope Clement VII himself was holed up for

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weeks. By his own bravo account, the goldsmith and sculptor Benvenuto Cellini was anecdotally credited with firing the unreliable new cannons from the fortress at the mercenary troops of Charles V, even pushing the cannons over the parapet onto the besiegers when ammunition ran out.

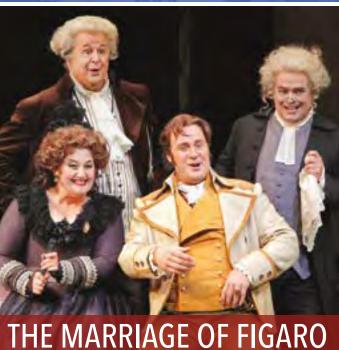
Continuing its looming presence as a prison, Castel Sant' Angelo was reused as a fortress for torture exactly as Puccini reinvigorates its age-old funerary associations. In fact the opera's plot mirrors the multifaceted use of this historical building in that the final climax occurs back at Castel Sant'Angelo, from which Angelotti escaped at the beginning of the drama. Even Dan Brown's book Angels and Demons, which sensationalizes Castel Sant'Angelo as a potboiler climax of Illuminati intrigue, can hardly be far off the historical mark. Floria Tosca's tragic leap from the high parapet of this embattled monument towering over Rome is an echo of real life—many real people either leapt or were hurled from its heights over the Eternal City.

While none of these historical and artistic details about the Roman monuments are necessary to the plot of the opera, they are nonetheless accessory to the drama of Rome itself as the Eternal City and the opera's setting therein. Like many other artists and literati inspired by the City of Rome through the millennia, Victorien Sardou and Giacomo Puccini chose famous Roman settings that would rightly display their dramatic visions. Although George Bernard Shaw lampooned Sardou's bourgeois dramas as "Sardoodledom," Puccini's music—with a succinct libretto by Luigi Illica and Giuseppe Giacosa—makes the best use of the history of these three illustrious Roman monuments. When Tosca premiered on January 14, 1900 in Rome in Teatro Constanzi, the storied fame and notoriety of these monuments would hardly be lost on that Roman audience.

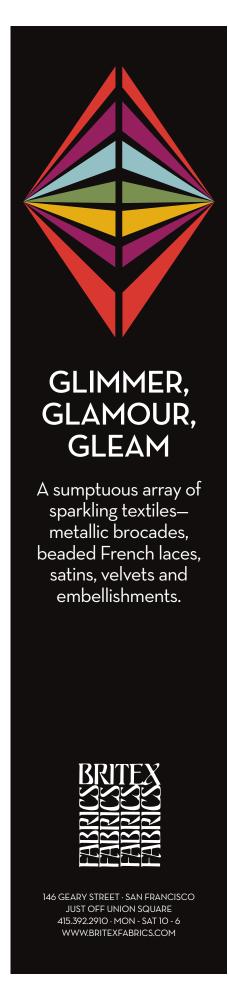
BRIAN JAGDE (Piermont, New York) Mario Cavaradossi Tenor Brian Jagde made his San Francisco Opera debut in 2010

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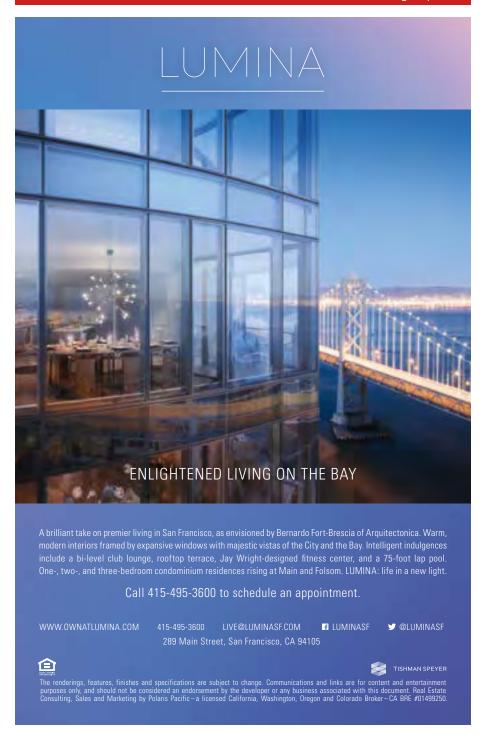
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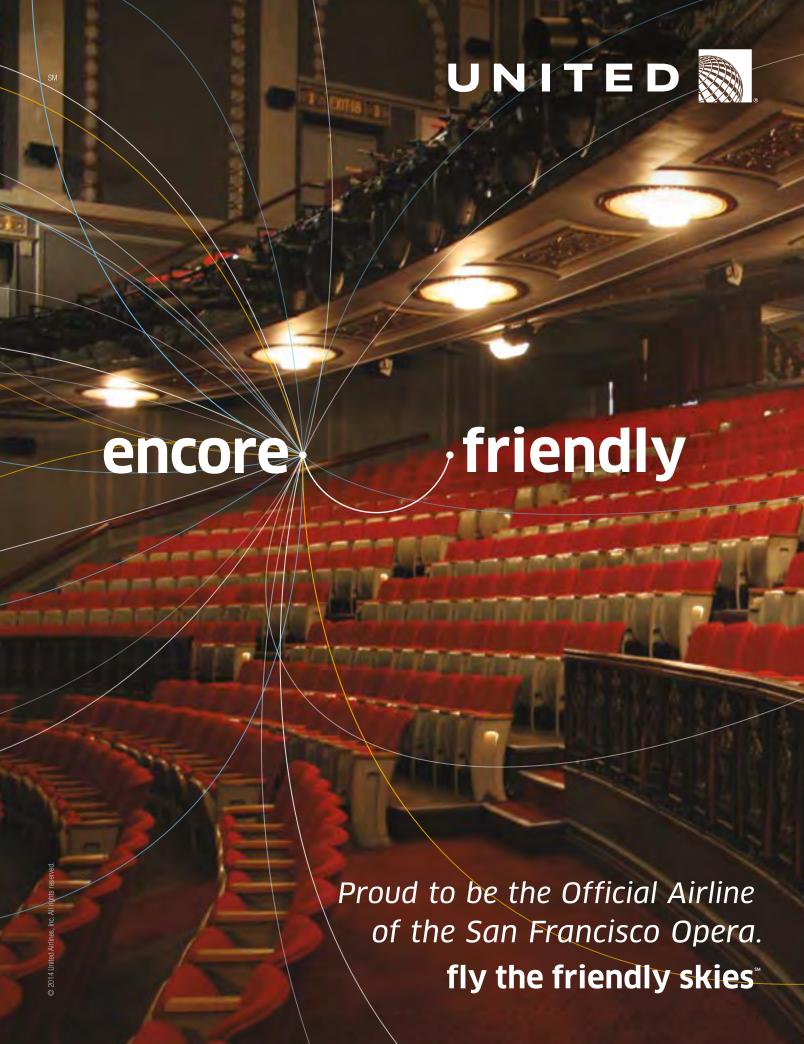
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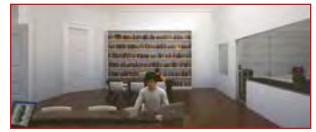
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n 2010, General Director David Gockley announced the establishment of **The Diane B. Wilsey Center for Opera** on the fourth floor of the Veterans Building, in the space formerly occupied by the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art. 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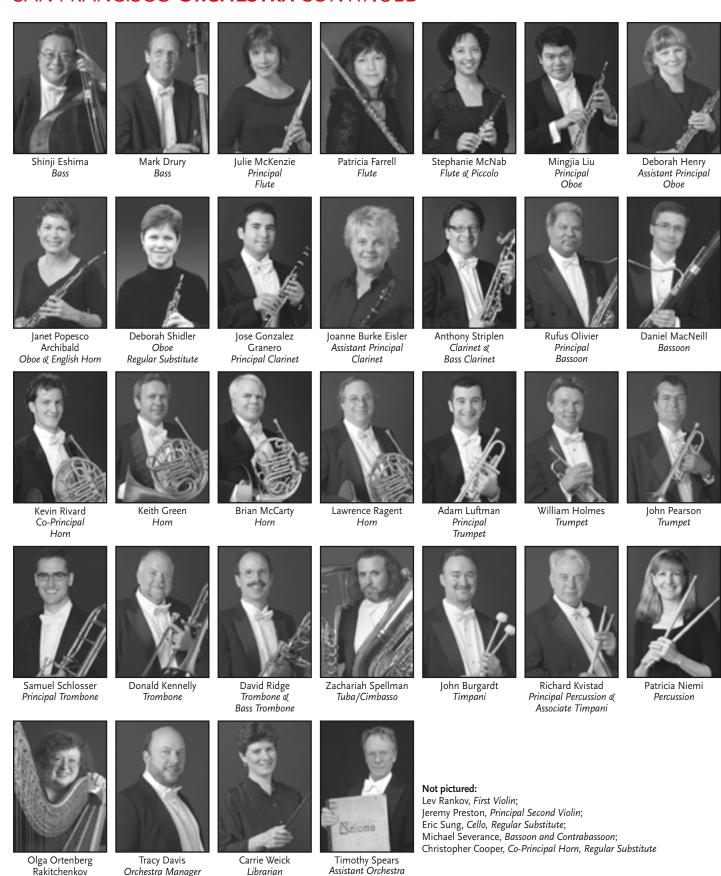
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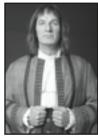

DINING AND REFRESHMENTS The Patina Group serves an elegant hot buffet in the lower lounge of the Opera House beginning two hours prior to all performances. Lighter fare is also served before performances and during intermissions at Patina's Café Express (Lower level) and Dress Circle Café. Call (415) 861-8150 or visit opentable.com for reservations or to pre-order. Patrons dining in the Opera House may enter through the North Carriage entrance (adjacent to the War Memorial courtyard) up to two hours prior to curtain.

The **SAN FRANCISCO OPERA SHOP**, located on the South Mezzanine level of the Opera House, sells opera CDs, DVDs, SF Opera merchandise, and gift items. The Shop is open 90 minutes before performances, at intermissions, and afterward. All proceeds benefit San Francisco Opera.

COAT CHECK For the safety and comfort of our audience, all large parcels, backpacks, luggage, etc. must be checked at the Opera House coat check, located at the North and South ends of the Main Lobby.

COURTESY TELEPHONE, for local calls only, is located in the main lobby across from the South passenger elevator

DRINKING FOUNTAINS are available on all levels except the Lower level, where there is a courtesy water station on the north side. Water bottles are permitted in the auditorium.

OPERA GLASSES may be rented for \$5 at the North Lobby coat check. ID deposit is requested.

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FIRST AID STATION is located on the South Lower level. In case of emergency, please ask the nearest usher to assist you.

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
