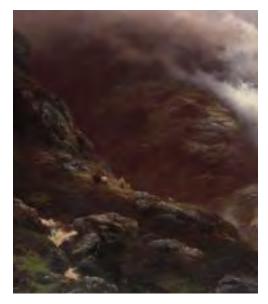

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## SAN FRANCISCO OPERA



On September 22, 2015, Matthew Shilvock was announced as San Francisco Opera's general director designate and assumes his position as the Company's seventh director on August 1, 2016. Shilvock joined San Francisco Opera in 2005 and has served as the Company's associate general director since 2010.

As associate general director, Shilvock manages and leads five departments: Music Operations (orchestra, chorus, dancers, commissions); Electronic Media; Education; the San Francisco Opera Center (professional artist training programs); and Rehearsal. Since March 2015, he has also served as interim director of development. He has led some of General Director David Gockley's signature initiatives over the past decade including the creation of vanguard media and education programs that have dramatically expanded the Company's local and international reach. He successfully negotiated a media rights framework across the Company that made possible commercial releases on DVD, television and the internet. He managed the development of the free live opera simulcast program, which to date has attracted audiences of more than 240,000 to San Francisco's AT&T Park and other civic venues. As the Company's lead negotiator with the American Guild of Musical Artists and American Federation of Musicians, he has worked with the Company's labor partners to sustain a positive, solution-oriented approach, while realizing significant annual savings. He has worked closely with Gockley, the board of directors, and the Company's senior executive team to develop strategic frameworks to stabilize the Company's finances.

For the Company, he has produced community events including San Francisco's official remembrance of the tenth anniversary of the 9/11 attacks in partnership with the City of San Francisco and San Francisco Interfaith Council, and a collaborative performance of the Verdi Requiem with the Teatro di San Carlo, Naples and the Italian Consulate in 2013. With oversight of cross-departmental senior teams in both stage and patron areas, Shilvock is a strategic leader and motivator who is passionate about connecting audiences with the emotional core of opera and empowering staff through a supportive, creative, and fiscally responsible workplace.

## SAN FRANCISCO OPERA



I realize I am on my way out to pasture when editors start asking for my top ten list of this or that. This one was initiated by the editor of this magazine who asked me to list ten operatic events that made an unusually large impression on me over the years and why. Being in

general the accommodating type, here goes...

- 1. My very first opera was *The Tales of Hoffmann* in the fall of 1963 at Sarah Caldwell's indomitable and now defunct Opera Company of Boston. The opera was performed in English with Beverly Sills as the heroines, Norman Treigle as the four villains, and John Alexander in the title role. It was a life-changing experience for a young would-be baritone who was mulling the decision whether or not to pursue a career as an opera singer. The performances were so compelling, the characters so believable, the music so gorgeous. No opera caricatures standing there singing in a foreign language. I was hooked!
- 2. My introduction to New York's Metropolitan Opera was an auspicious one: Birgit Nilsson as *Elektra* in the Richard Strauss opera in the fall of 1966. The great Swedish soprano was in her prime and when she blasted out her top notes, my fillings came loose! It was my first Germanic opera and modernist to boot. The dissonant harmonies and the extreme expressions required of the voice were wrenching, the polar opposite of Offenbach's tuneful *Hoffmann*.
- 3. Uptown at Lincoln Center Plaza, New York City Opera had installed itself at the newly opened New York State Theater. I clearly remember a somewhat perverse production of *La Traviata* staged by maverick director Frank Corsaro, starring the gorgeous Patricia Brooks. Corsaro surprised everyone when Alfredo re-entered through a window at the end of Act I and he and Violetta made crazy love on the floor as the curtain came down. I was told that if the composer had been present he would have screamed out in protest, but I liked the gutsiness of Corsaro's direction and it certainly got everyone talking. While tame compared with today's directorial excesses, I sense it was the beginning of the "age of the director."
- 4. On an early scouting trip to Europe once I became head of Houston Grand Opera, I found myself crossing over to East Berlin via Checkpoint Charlie. The purpose was to see a production of *Porgy and Bess* at the very progressive Komische Oper directed by the legendary Götz Friedrich, whose American debut I would present some five years later. I subsequently learned that they were not authorized to present the

opera by the copyright owners and had somehow smuggled a set of scores and orchestra parts behind the Iron Curtain. The result was a revelation: a fully operatic version of the piece with the theater's white singers and chorus playing the denizens of Catfish Row, with several characters appearing in clown make-up. It made me intent on producing an operatic *Porgy and Bess* in the U.S.

Notes from the General Director

- 5. My Houston years produced a lot of high spots, but very few like our 1975 production of *Der Rosenkavalier* featuring the first Octavian of the young Frederica von Stade under the baton of Edo de Waart and with the staging of John Cox. We cast it impeccably, down to the last lackey, and the result was a new level of quality for the young company that we could never again retreat from. To this day I can't listen to the Act III trio without drowning in tears.
- 6. Jon Vickers's towering portrayal in the title role of Britten's *Peter Grimes*, seen in Houston, San Francisco, and Chicago, was perhaps the greatest individual performance in my opera-going experience. It also convinced me that Britten's opera was the greatest addition to the international repertory since Puccini's death in 1924.
- 7. The Centennial (1976) Bayreuth *Ring* directed by Patrice Chéreau and conducted by Pierre Boulez, which I saw in 1977, was first shocking to the public but later accepted as the most influential *Ring* in history. Set as it was during the Industrial Revolution, and pitting the working and capitalist classes against each other, it showed me that brilliantly, thoroughly conceived re-settings can work really well.
- 8. London's 2004 Royal Opera House production of Shostakovich's 1934 opera-noire *Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk*, staged by Richard Jones, made a huge impression on me. I only regret that I never had the chance to produce it.
- 9. Yet another Bayreuth production makes my top ten. It is the Stefan Herheim 2008 *Parsifal*, a many layered concoction, each layer more brilliant than the next. The result: a synthesis of the anxiety, doubt, desperation, and longing inherent in the music. A masterpiece of the director's art, and the antithesis of the latest *Ring* in the Master's shrine, which I could not describe without the use of expletives.
- 10. The last of this group certainly must include last June's SFO production of *The Trojans*, especially the towering performance of Susan Graham as Dido. It was a tour-de-force that cannot be over-praised. Beyond that, every component of this great company was in top form, resulting in one of the perfect operatic realizations in memory.



### SAN FRANCISCO OPERA REMEMBERS Robert Commanday 1922–2015

Robert Commanday, considered by many to be the dean of classical music in San Francisco and whose writing filled the pages of *The San Francisco Chronicle* for nearly three decades, passed away in September. Commanday served as music critic of the newspaper from 1964 to 1993, the second chapter in a remarkable career. Before joining the staff of the newspaper, he had spent some two decades as a choral conductor and music educator, and after leaving *The Chronicle* he helped revolutionize the online world of music criticism by founding the website San Francisco Classical Voice (www.sfcv.org).

He received his musical training at Harvard University and the Juilliard School, and during the 1940s he taught at Ithaca College and the University of Illinois. He spent the 1950s at UC Berkeley, earning a master's degree in musicology, teaching and leading the Glee Club and Treble Clef. From 1961 to 1965, he was the chorus director for the Oakland Symphony.

Commanday is survived by his wife, Mary; his son David, conductor of the Heartland Festival Orchestra in Peoria, Illinois; daughter Michal; granddaughter Elisabeth, who served on the editorial staff at San Francisco Opera; stepson Tom Stevens; and stepdaughter Anne Stevens. His stepson, J. Christopher Stevens, was the U.S. ambassador to Libya who was killed in Benghazi during the attacks of Sept. 11, 2012.



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## SAN FRANCISCO **OPERA** Profile Gregory Henkel Director of Artistic and Music Planning



### Tell us about your career to this point, and what brought you to San Francisco Opera.

I was trained as a singer, and both of my degrees are in opera. To make my way through conservatory, I worked at Morgan Stanley in the mailroom (all great stories start in the mailroom, I suppose). I became an assistant in investment management and the bulk of my work was in project management, which is essentially what I do today. While I was on Wall Street, I was able to pop in my headphones and listen to music all day long. I used to listen to at least two operas and two recital discs every day. I amassed a huge repertoire that way and became obsessed with listening.

I decided to move to Chicago and pursue graduate school. My teacher recommended that I visit Lyric Opera of Chicago. I was offered a job as an audition coordinator there, which I turned down and I, then, offered to be an intern there. I got a lot of exposure and Bill Mason, Lyric's general director, sat me down and told me that I had a lot of options open to me in terms of a career in opera. I held a number of positions at Lyric and I became the assistant to the artistic director, Matthew Epstein.

I eventually was hired by Los Angeles Opera as artistic planning manager, and after a week of being there became casting director. When I arrived there in August 2005, I immediately began casting the following season, all of which was a great learning experience.

And then one day I got a call from David Gockley for my position, and I couldn't turn down the opportunity to work for a general director who has been at it for as long as he has, at this storied company, and in this beautiful city. I began in June 2008.

#### What goes into casting artists for our productions?

It's very instinctual, which makes it hard to explain. Sometimes I weirdly hear in colors and I'm trying to match the color of a voice to the color of a character as well as the other colors in the piece. The way I often describe it is as a tapestry: every thread has to be in the absolute right place. It comes down to everyone being a star in his or her own category. It's a mix of finding the right voice along with the personality that will also match the other colors and personalities in that performance, as well as the working personality. I look for people who are dynamic music makers and who understand life on the stage.

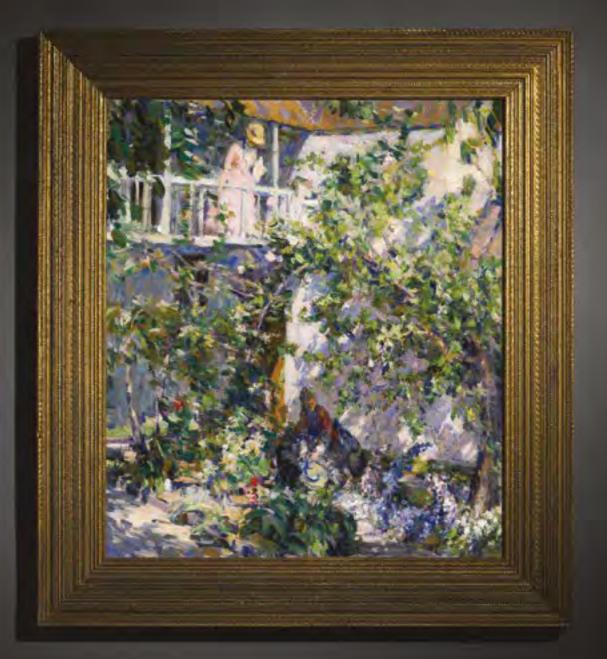
My father is a chef, and I liken what I do to being a sommelier who knows which wines to pair with different meals, and when to open a bottle. Planning a season is like planning a ten-course meal.

#### Any favorite memories here?

The Trojans was a cathartic experience and life-changing in many ways. Our current production of *Sweeney Todd, II Trittico* in 2009, *Porgy and Bess* in 2009, the *Ring* cycle in 2011, *Nixon in China* in 2012, *Show Boat* in 2014. And all of the exciting Verdi and Puccini productions that Nicola does. At the end of the *Madama Butterfly* in 2014, I couldn't breathe afterwards. I will never forget that.

I also think the generosity of the audiences here is amazing. Especially when European artists come and seeing their faces during their bows, or American artists who have been in Europe for a long time, they are shocked by the adulation they get. It's beautiful to watch.

### ...back to front.

Bonhams specialists noticed that this canvas by E. Charlton Fortune is painted beyond the tacking edge along the left side, showing that the painting was resized. The original frame and exhibition labels suggest the artist herself made the change. A minimal label led Bonhams researchers to the 1921 "Autumn exhibition of modern art: the forty-ninth," in London. Dicksee & Co. appear in a London Post Office Directory as "Fine Art Agents, Packers and Conveyancers."

Examined under ultraviolet light, the surface of the painting shows no retouching, but a close inspection revealed tiny, scattered spots. The Bonhams team recognized these as splatters from house paint, and had the painting cleaned to remove the offending marks.

This Stanford White style carved oak

it inside and out.

labels and materials.

ripple moulding perfectly matches the frames of several other Fortunes sold at Bonhams, indicating the artist's preferred format. A mix of original and replacement canvas keys along with modern mounting hardware reveal a recent restoration. this handwriting as the artist's, and the label as a 1920's San Francisco Art Association Exhibition design.

The color, patina, and aging of the frame and canvas are consistent with a painting dated circa 1918.

A rare example of the artist's card. Bonhams experts used Fortune's handwriting and many other factors to confirm the painting's authenticity. Originally priced at \$500, this work would have rewarded a patient investor when it sold for \$722,500.

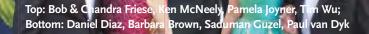


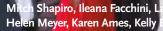

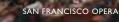

nce again, the unprecedented generosity of Cynthia and John Gunn has set the stage for a dazzling season at San Francisco Opera. Since 2002, when John joined the Opera Board, the couple has underwritten numerous productions and provided exceptional support for many of the Company's innovative endeavors.

In September 2008, the Gunns made a historic commitment—believed to be the largest gift ever made by individuals to an American opera company—to help fund the signature projects of General Director David Gockley, including new operas and productions, multimedia projects, and outreach programs. This season, the Gunns' inspired generosity is helping make possible four productions—*Sweeney Todd, Lucia di Lammermoor, Carmen,* and *Don Carlo*.

John shared his considerable insights at the 2014 conference of OPERA America, the national service organization for opera. As he told attendees, "Opera is a dynamic art form and all of us play a role in keeping it vital. We must expand our repertoire and our audiences, and strive for financial flexibility. And we depend on donors to keep opera alive."

John is the former chairman and CEO of Dodge & Cox

Investment Managers. He joined the firm in 1972, the year he received his MBA from Stanford Business School and married Cynthia, who graduated from Stanford with an A.B. in political science in 1970. Early in her career, Cynthia was the editor and director of The Portable Stanford book series for ten years. She edited twenty-eight books by Stanford professors on a vast array of topics, including *Economic Policy Beyond the Headlines* by George Shultz and Ken Dam.

In addition to their support of San Francisco Opera, the Gunns are active members of the community. John is the chair of the advisory board for the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research (SIEPR), serves as a trustee of Stanford University, and is on the board of directors of Stanford Hospitals and Clinics. Cynthia is an overseer of Stanford's Hoover Institution, a member of the advisory board of Family and Children Services, and serves on the boards of the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health and the San Francisco Fine Arts Museums.

Opera lovers are grateful to Cynthia and John, and applaud their commitment to keeping San Francisco Opera a leading-edge company.

## Jan Shrem & Maria Manetti Shrem

s Jan Shrem explains, "For Maria, it is all about the artists. Though I had loved opera for years before I met her, it was Maria who opened my eyes to the dedication and sacrifice of the artists." With the renewal of another magnificent three-year commitment, Jan and Maria have expanded their support of opera artists through the establishment of two new funds in addition to the *Great Interpreters of Italian Opera Fund*. 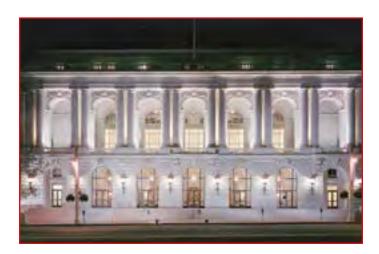

### SYNOPSIS

## LUCIA DI LAMMERMOOR

In a feud between the Scottish families of Ravenswood and Lammermoor, Enrico Ashton of Lammermoor wrongfully holds the estates of Edgardo Ravenswood. In addition, Enrico's political activity against the king has placed him in a perilous situation, and he has resolved to reestablish his family's position by marrying his sister Lucia to Lord Arturo Bucklaw.

### ACT I

Normanno orders his henchmen to discover the identity of the man whom Lucia is secretly meeting each day before dawn. Enrico is frustrated because he cannot persuade his sister to accept a marriage that will save him politically, and Normanno tells him his suspicions concerning Lucia's lover. Enrico's outburst is interrupted by the return of his men confirming that Lucia's lover is in fact his enemy Edgardo.

Lucia awaits Edgardo in the woods by a fountain whose legend of a bloody phantom alternately fascinates and repels her. Edgardo arrives with the news that he must leave for France. He tells Lucia that before departing he wishes to ask Enrico for her hand in marriage. Terrified of her brother's reaction, Lucia begs him not to. She tries to calm him when he renews his vows of vengeance upon her family. They solemnly pledge their troth by exchanging rings and vows of eternal fidelity, promising to write during their separation.

### ACT II

In his fury at his sister's betrayal, Enrico has concluded marriage preparations for the union of his sister with Arturo. Despite his insistence, Enrico has failed to secure Lucia's consent to this arranged marriage. Lucia remains obstinate even when presented with a letter, forged in Edgardo's handwriting, announcing his marriage to another woman. Enrico explodes in rage against his sister. At Raimondo's fervent pleading, the exhausted Lucia finally gives in.

The wedding party has assembled and Lucia has scarcely signed the marriage contract when Edgardo bursts in demanding an explanation. Upon seeing the contract with Lucia's signature, he curses her and her family forever. Enrico finally places his sister's hand in Arturo's.

### **ACT III**

In a tower of Edgardo's gloomy castle, Enrico arrives at night to challenge him to a duel the next morning.

The wedding celebration is in progress when Raimondo brings the terrible news that Lucia has slain her bridegroom and has gone mad. In her delirium, Lucia wanders and imagines a wedding ceremony with her beloved Edgardo. Enrico returns and finds his sister insane. He suffers remorse as she loses all reason while begging Edgardo to pray at her tomb.

Unaware of all that has happened, Edgardo imagines Lucia's happiness with Arturo and berates her for her infidelity. A party of mourners brings word of Lucia's misfortune. As Edgardo sets off to see her one last time, Raimondo stops him with the news of Lucia's death. In his grief, Edgardo stabs himself with the hopes of being reunited with Lucia in heaven.

## **Director's Note**

ike so many tragic horror stories, Lucia di Lammermoor is a cautionary tale, in this case a warning of the destructive power of blind ambition. Our title character is a delicate, warm, and emotional girl surrounded by cold and callous people. She is mistreated and manipulated to such a degree that she disconnects with her cruel reality and commits a horrific crime. This desperate, violent act is her ultimate rebellion, the only way to show an uncaring world that the desires of a committed heart cannot and must not be denied.

Lucia's brother Enrico embodies the ethos of this world; selfobsessed, paranoid, and cold, willing to sacrifice his own sister to save himself. The hangers-on, counselors and advisors that surround them both are only focused on their own narrow, selfish needs. Even Lucia's lover, Edgardo, treats her harshly. He coerces her into their sudden, secret marriage, abandons her to pursue his own ambitions, then publicly berates and humiliates her without pausing to hear her side of the story.

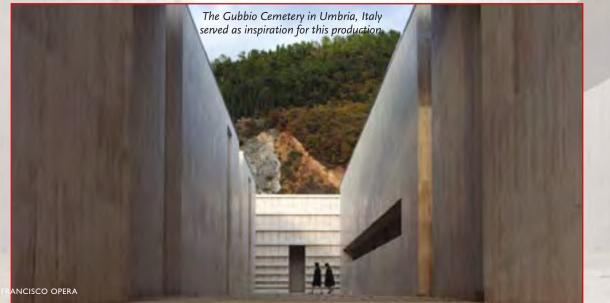
It is obvious from the outset that Lucia doesn't do well in this oppressive atmosphere. She is highly suggestible and extremely sensitive to her own and others' feelings. So much so, that she seems to have affinities for the extra-sensory: the spirit world, in other words. At her very first appearance, she sings passionately of the powerful hold that the departed soul of a past tragic figure has over her. It's as though Lucia goes through life with a fixation on death, treading with one foot on either side of the divide.

Her commitment to the infinite includes, of course, her yow of love. However, her heart's eternal desires stand no chance against the power of her family's shortsighted selfishness. One character after another dismisses her, ignores her pleas, mocks her feelings, and forces her to follow their will. After being pulled, pushed and betrayed by one uncaring narcissist after another, she finally snaps. Her madness, then, is an emotional release from a world that is highly controlling and coldly rational, a release of passion both terrifying and ecstatic at the same time. The repercussions are profound; it's only after the tragedy that everyone realizes they

share responsibility for pushing her beyond sanity. Edgardo feels it most of all, and commits an equally desperate, mad act-suicide-to atone for it and attempt to join her in eternity.

Our setting is modern-mythic Scotland, a dystopian near future where the lines are blurred between family, country and corporation. Enrico Ashton is struggling to compete at the highest levels of business and politics, and success or failure feels like a matter of life or death to him. The responsibilities of salvaging his family name and fortune become a tremendous burden, and these desperate ambitions blind him to the repercussions of his actions. He feels that the merger with Arturo Bucklaw's nouveau riche family will ensure his survival, his hold on power, his success. These are the only things that matter to him. It's only after he comes face-to-face with the horror he engineered that he realizes the destructive force he exerted upon the very family he was desperate to save.

In our production, the Lammermoor estate is entirely Enrico's world; hard, cold, and intimidating. More suggestive of a corporate headquarters than a family home, this environment exists to intimidate and coerce. It doesn't comfort its inhabitants but exerts inexorable pressure on them, the highly sensitive Lucia especially. To her it also has the look and atmosphere of a mausoleum, which offers her a kind of solace. She seeks refuge in the grounds between her ancestral home and the Ravenswood estate, a memorial garden, where she feels drawn to and connected with the spirits of the departed. She is the only one who pays homage to her heritage, who feels the impact and understands the importance of those who came before her. This, then, is one of the great themes of this story and our setting of it. If we ignore our past, the foundations of love and support of earlier generations, we imperil our future. If we pursue our ambitions by using family members like pawns on a chessboard, pressures will inevitably build and the insanity of treating life like a game will be exposed. Most importantly, if we ignore the passionate commitments of a sensitive heart, that heart may be broken so completely that it causes unimaginable tragedy. 🀖



### "So, you have ta'en up your bonny bridegroom?"

### Gaetano Donizetti and Lucia di Lammermoor

Ashley Putnam in the title role of the 1981 production

Our theaters go bad to worse... The operas flop, the public hisses, our audience is scarce.... Now at the San Carlo, we will have Persiani's old opera Danao, then my Lucia di Lammermoor which is now finished.... The crisis is near, the public has indigestion, the theater management is falling apart, Vesuvius is smoking, and the eruption is near.

o wrote Gaetano Donizetti on July 16, 1835, sourly noting the current difficulties besetting the theater scene in Naples. Rehearsals for the season had broken off. Singers refused to work until they were paid. Donizetti, in his position as music director of the Royal Theaters of Naples—the San Carlo and the Fondo—managed to squeeze money out of the theater management, now perilously close to bankruptcy. The rehearsals began anew, and the premiere of his opera on September 26 was no longer threatened.

Dr. Evan Baker is an educator, writer, and lecturer on operatic history and production. He contributes regularly to several publications, including San Francisco Opera Magazine. Despite these conditions, *Lucia di Lammermoor* would be Donizetti's fiftieth [!] opera in seventeen years. Donizetti did not achieve acclaim until 1830 with his thirtieth opera, *Anna Bolena* at the Teatro Carcano, followed two years later by *L'Elisir d'Amore* (his thirtyninth opera) this time at the Teatro alla Canobbiana. He scored another hit with *Lucrezia Borgia* (his forty-fourth) in 1833 at the Teatro alla Scala. Ironically, Donizetti achieved his first great successes in Milan; only with his *Lucia di Lammermoor* did he finally achieve a resounding success in Naples, where he had worked since 1828. In all, Donizetti composed seventy operas before dementia ended his career in 1843; he died from syphilis five years later at age fifty-one.

Salvadore Cammarano (1801–1852), stage director and house librettist for the San Carlo, received the assignment to write the libretto

for Donizetti's newest opera. *The Bride* of Lammermoor by Sir Walter Scott (1771–1832), published in 1819 as part of the "Waverley Novels," served as the source for what became Cammarano's first great success. He went on to write over thirty-five librettos, of which eight were for Donizetti and four for Giuseppe Verdi, with his last and equally successful libretto (albeit posthumous) being the immortal *Il Trovatore*.

Cammarano's treatment of The Bride of Lammermoor is a marvel of adaptation. Although four previous composers wrote operas based on Scott's novel, probably neither Cammarano nor Donizetti was familiar with the earlier works. Although Cammarano excised many of the major characters, the essence of the story remained the same: thwarted love and societal pressures placed upon an already fragile mind. At the same time, the "romantic" atmosphere of the dark, spooky, and exotic Scottish highlands complete with phantoms and, even more terrible, curses remained prominent. Lady Ashton, Lucy's mother, a strong-willed and manipulative woman

who thinks only of the family's position in society and its honor, is the evil personified in the novel. For the opera, Cammarano deleted Lady Ashton and transformed Lucy's brother Henry into the chief antagonist, Enrico. To save his political and financial fortunes, Enrico is determined to marry Lucia to Arturo Bucklaw. If she does not, Enrico will curse her and return to haunt her. He does not hear her plaintive but crucial question, "...and me? What of me?" To trick her into signing a bridal contract, Enrico produces a forged letter from Lucia's beloved Edgardo supposedly renouncing his love for her. Her psychological reaction is taken from Walter Scott's Lucy: "'To sign and seal!' echoed Lucy, in a muttering tone, as the door of the apartment closed—'to sign and seal—to do and die!'" In Act I, scene 2 Lucia and Edgardo pledged not only their love and betrothal to each other, but also exchanged rings, which, according to a note in the libretto, had the force of marriage. Should that troth be broken, both lovers would be cursed, hence Lucia's despair for not only her love but also shattering her mind.

One of the many famous and easily identifiable scenes in opera—such as the *Habanera* in Bizet's *Carmen* or Wagner's "Ride of the Valkyries"—is Lucia's public mad scene at the end of Act II, which has no equivalent in Scott's novel. A wedding celebration does take place, and a scream is heard from the apartments where Bucklaw and Lucy have retired. The Ashtons rush to the rooms, where they find the gravely wounded Bucklaw (he does not die) and, as described in the novel:



[They] discovered something white in the corner of the great old-fashioned chimney of the apartment. Here they found the unfortunate girl seated, or rather couched like a hare upon its formher head-gear disheveled, her night-clothes torn and dabbled with blood, her eyes glazed, and her features convulsed into a wild paroxysm of insanity. When she saw herself discovered, she gibbered, made mouths, and pointed at them with her bloody fingers, with the frantic gestures of an exulting demoniac.

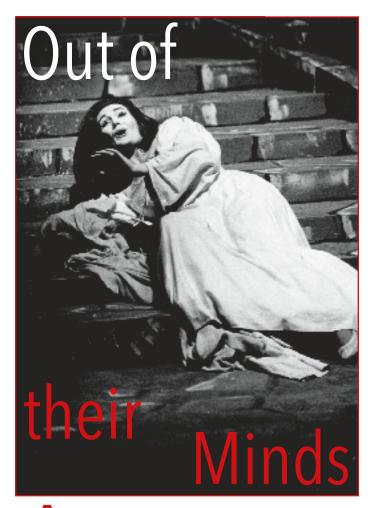
Female assistance was now hastily summoned; the unhappy bride was overpowered, not without the use of some force. As they carried her over the threshold, she looked down, and uttered the only articulate words that she had yet spoken, saying, with a sort of

grinning exultation, "So, you have ta'en up your bonny bridegroom?"

Lucy is not heard from thereafter in the novel. No public display of madness or singing of "sweet sounds," no viewing of phantoms. Nor does she call for her beloved Edgardo. Cammarano's skill at transforming this episode into an opera scene combined with Donizetti's music created one of the most theatrical and musically thrilling scenes in opera.

Donizetti was pleased with the reactions to the premiere on September 26, 1835. In a letter to Giovanni Ricordi, he proudly wrote:

It has pleased very much, if I can believe in the applause and the compliments I have received. I was called out many times, and a great many times the singers, too.... The second evening I saw a thing most uncommon in Naples: namely, at the finale after the great cheers for the *adagio* [the great sextet], Duprez in the curse caused himself to be applauded to the heights.... Every number was listened to in religious silence and spontaneously hailed with shouts of *Evviva*!...



llied to words in the medium of opera, music can take us to areas of experience that elsewhere might be uncontainable. Music inhabits a terrain beyond reason, and so is capable of depicting madness—and opera composers from Christoph Willibald Gluck to Alban Berg have allowed audiences entry to a world more usually associated with the analyst's couch.

We can follow Gluck's Orèste, in *Iphigénie en Tauride*, through the psychic disintegration attendant on matricide, or the hallucinations of Berg's *Wozzeck*, driven to murder by an abusive society. Yet the most famous association of music with mental instability lies in a phenomenon known as the "mad scene." The term is associated with climactic moments in Romantic opera in which the heroine loses her mind and expresses this in an aria of phenomenal difficulty.

The best-known example is the mad scene from Donizetti's *Lucia di Lammermoor*, first performed in 1835. Yet Donizetti was after more than vocal display. His aim was to present a cogent portrait of mental collapse, of which Lucia's aria was the culminating expression.

Working in the century after the French Revolution, Donizetti was dealing with ambivalent attitudes to female sexuality. Lucia is driven

insane by three men—her lover, her brother, and a priest—all acting in response to her attempts to control her own destiny. Her madness, meanwhile, takes the form of fantasies of the sexual life she might have led had she been allowed to determine it herself.

The opera is set in Scotland in the years that saw the fomentation of the Jacobite rebellion. Lucia's madness is also consequently emblematic of a country riven with factionalism. Her family, the Ashtons, led by her brother Enrico, are disgraced royalists, who can only reclaim their status by arranging a marriage between Lucia and Arturo, scion of an influential Edinburgh clan. Lucia, though, has fallen in love with Edgardo Ravenswood, an enemy Jacobite, and is prepared to brave political and familial danger to meet him in secret.

Edgardo, far from being conventionally heroic, is prone to the violence that dominates his own family history. One of his ancestors killed his mistress and dumped her body in his fountain. Lucia, in her opening aria, claims to have seen the woman's ghost. Donizetti, with unerring dramatic instinct, leaves it open as to whether this is the first sign of madness or a metaphysical portent of disaster. It is by the same fountain, however, that Edgardo, finicky about Lucia's devotion, forces her through a ceremony of exchanging rings and tells her they are married in the sight of God.

In his absence, the Ashtons break down Lucia's resistance to the wedding. Enrico intercepts her correspondence with Edgardo and fabricates evidence that her lover has been unfaithful. He is aided by the chaplain Raimondo, who lectures her about family duty. Lucia—"now exhibiting the first symptoms of mental disorder," according to the stage directions—capitulates. The wedding is interrupted by the return of Edgardo, who, believing Lucia to be unfaithful, wrenches his ring from his finger and curses her.

Lucia's descent into madness follows. On her wedding night, she kills Arturo with his own sword, and is later found by Raimondo muttering: "Where is my husband?" This leads to the mad scene itself. Lucia imagines Edgardo's voice calling her to join him at the fountain, but the phantom of his ancestor's murdered mistress rises before her. In terror, she then imagines herself and Edgardo fleeing to a church where a minister is waiting. The section that follows is often described as a fantasy of her wedding to Edgardo, though the sensuality of the libretto indicates that she is fantasizing about sex with Edgardo during their own wedding night.

The implications of the scene, however, point beyond a depiction of mental crisis to a crisis in musical structure. Major operatic arias in Donizetti's day had become formalized to the point of ossification. Donizetti, however, cannily depicts madness by blurring the dividing lines between the conventional sections and introducing distorted reminiscences of material heard previously in the opera.

The absent Edgardo's voice is represented by a solo flute [for this production, glass harmonica] that summons Lucia with a twisted version of the music associated with the haunted fountain, then tenderly recalls their earlier duet, and finally twines itself sexually around her voice. Its progress is shattered when Lucia catches sight of Enrico, which forces her to recall the disrupted marriage ceremony. In the final section, she imagines herself united with Edgardo in heaven as both her voice and the flute seem to leap away from the earth.

Lucia's scene is often regarded as a prototype, which is not necessarily true. Donizetti's first great mad scene, similar in stance and style, is found in Anna Bolena, his unhistorical take on the life of Anne Boleyn, the work that put him on the musical map in 1830. His greater contemporary, Vincenzo Bellini, was already active on the operatic scene. Bellini shared many of Donizetti's preoccupations, though there were differences in attitude and methodology. His brief career opened and closed with the mad scenes of Il Pirata in 1827 and I Puritani in 1835. At the mid-point came La Sonnambula in 1831, in which sleepwalking is portrayed as a form of mental disturbance.

In his depictions of madness, Bellini is more intensely feminist than Donizetti, viewing it as a female response to male brutality. In Il Pirata, Imogene, trapped in an enforced marriage, is confronted by her former lover and sinks into derangement when both men accuse her of sexual betrayal, and her lover then kills her husband. Amina's nocturnal wanderings in La Sonnambula take her into the wrong man's bedroom, leading first to rejection by her fiancé Elvino, then to a second dangerous sleepwalking episode.

Where both Lucia and Anna Bolena live out fantasies of an alternative erotic reality. Bellini's heroines focus on the obsessive repetition of present emotional pain. Imogene's mind is lost in visions of her lover's execution for the murder of her husband; Amina re-enacts Elvino's desertion. Bellini's musical methodology differs, too. The madness of both heroines is conveyed in vast melodies with no thematic repetition, a procedure that Verdi followed in Lady Macbeth's Sleepwalking Scene.

In I Puritani, however, Bellini comes closer to Donizetti's model. Set in England during the Civil War, the opera has its heroine, Elvira, caught between Arturo, the Cavalier who loves her, and Riccardo, the vindictive Roundhead who drives her insane by telling her that her lover has betrayed her. Her madness, like Lucia's, consists in acting out erotic fantasies, though Bellini brings her on stage garlanded with flowers. The nod to Ophelia in Shakespeare's Hamlet is obvious.

The Romantics found Ophelia fascinating, though at the same time they drew away from the swirl of obscenities Shakespeare wrote for his character. When she made it to the operatic stage, in Ambroise Thomas's Hamlet, first performed in Paris in 1868, she did so in an un-Shakespearian form. Thomas's Hamlet has been castigated as a travesty, most frequently for the excision of Rosencrantz, Guildenstern, and Fortinbras. The crucial change, however, lies in the way Thomas makes both Gertrude and Polonius co-conspirators in Claudius's plot to murder Hamlet senior, which allows him to rewrite Shakespeare along the lines of Lucia di Lammermoor.

The moment Hamlet has divested himself of "Frailty, thy name is woman," he collides with Ophelia during Claudius's coronation

celebrations, and like Donizetti's Edgardo makes her swear an oath of absolute fidelity. His discovery that Polonius was complicit in his father's murder leads to a brutal public rejection of Ophelia, during which he, too, tears off her ring. Her own mad scene is modelled on Lucia's, though in place of Donizetti's sexual fantasies, Thomas substitutes prudish dreams of a contented marriage, while an off-stage chorus, coaxing Ophelia to drown herself, replaces Lucia's flute.

Ophelia's aria is usually regarded as the last important piece in the genre, which it isn't, quite. Schoenberg's soprano monologue Erwartung, written in 1909, is effectively a mad scene without an opera, as a distraught woman relives the murder of the man she loved. Schoenberg's antecedents are usually cited as Wagner, Brahms and Mahler, but Erwartung's methodology has much in common with Donizetti and Bellini. Conventional operatic structures-and with them tonality-have now totally collapsed. Bellini's equation of madness with unrepeating melody is paralleled by Schoenberg's insistence on athematic material, in which no phrase occurs twice.

Marie Pappenheim, a Viennese psychiatrist who studied with Freud, wrote the libretto for Erwartung. Freud's own work links madness with the leakage into consciousness of frustrated sexuality, or with the repetitive abreaction of trauma in a manner curiously pre-empted by Donizetti and Bellini. Freud mentions neither composer, but listening to their mad scenes, one can't help but be amazed that both composers understood Freudian theory before it even existed.

### ARTIST PROFILES



#### NICOLA LUISOTTI (Viareggio, Italy) Conductor

Nicola Luisotti has been music director of San Francisco Opera since September 2009 and he holds the Caroline H. Hume

Endowed Chair. This season he leads Luisa Miller, Lucia di Lammermoor, and Don Carlo. Luisotti's other engagements during the 2015–16 season include symphonic concerts with the Netherlands Radio Philharmonic Orchestra and in Germany with the Hamburg Philharmonic as well as Rigoletto with Madrid's Teatro Real; Il Trittico and La Traviata with London's Royal Opera, Covent Garden; and Rigoletto with Paris Opera. Called "both an original thinker and a great respecter of tradition" by Opera News, which featured him on the cover of the July 2011 special issue on conductors, Luisotti made his Company debut in 2005 conducting La Forza del Destino and returned in November 2008 to conduct La Bohème. As the Company's music director, he has led acclaimed performances of 25 productions, including the world premiere of Marco Tutino's Two Women in 2015. Maestro Luisotti has garnered enthusiastic praise from both audiences and critics for his work at the world's leading opera companies including Milan's La Scala; the Royal Opera, Covent Garden; the Metropolitan Opera; Paris Opera; and the Vienna State Opera. Equally at home on the concert stage, Luisotti served as principal guest conductor of the Tokyo Symphony from 2009 to 2012 and has also established growing relationships with the orchestras of London (Philharmonia Orchestra), Genoa, Budapest, Turin, Munich (Bavarian Radio Orchestra), Palermo, and Rome (Santa Cecilia Orchestra), as well as the Berlin Philharmonic, San Francisco Symphony, and the Atlanta Symphony. The conductor's discography includes a complete recording of *Stiffelio* (Dynamic) and the critically acclaimed Duets (Deutsche Grammophon), featuring Anna Netrebko and Rolando Villazón. He is also on the podium of DVD recordings of the Met's La Bohème, with Angela Gheorghiu and Ramón Vargas (EMI), and San Francisco Opera's Mefistofele with Ildar Abdrazakov and Patricia Racette (EuroArts).



#### NADINE SIERRA

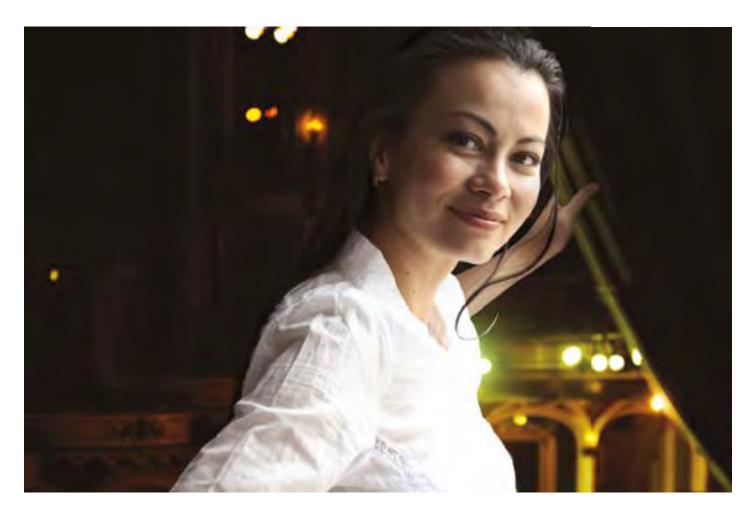

(2015). He performed with the 2014 Merola Opera Program excerpts as Goro (Madama Butterfly), Don José (Carmen), and the Duke of Mantua (Rigoletto). Former artistic director of Edmonton Opera, he has directed productions throughout his native Canada, including at Vancouver Opera, Opera Lyra Ottawa, Montreal Opera, Manitoba Opera, Calgary Opera, and Opera Hamilton. He has also directed many productions in the United States, including new productions and return engagements at Opera Philadelphia, Boston Lyric Opera, Hawaii Opera Theatre, Arizona Opera, Tulsa Opera, and many others. Cavanagh made his Covent Garden debut in 2006, directing a new chamber opera, The Midnight Court. He has developed and staged many new pieces, and he is in high demand as a dramaturg. As a librettist, Cavanagh has enjoyed critical and popular success with seven of his own operas. Recent and upcoming highlights include a return to Lyric Opera of Kansas City for L'Italiana in Algeri, a new production of Carmen at Minnesota Opera, and a debut at the Royal Swedish Opera with Nixon in China.



#### ERHARD ROM (Seattle, Washington) Set Designer Erhard Rom was

named as a finalist in the "Designer of the Year" category of the 2015 International Opera Awards in

London. He has designed settings for more than 200 productions across the globe, and his design work has been displayed in the Prague Quadrennial exhibition and at the National Opera Center in Manhattan. He teaches design at Montclair State University in the department of theater and dance. His credits include San Francisco Opera (*Susannah* and *Nixon in China*) and productions with Wexford Festival Opera, Seattle Opera, Vancouver Opera, the Glimmerglass Festival, Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, Minnesota Opera, the Bord Gáis Energy Theatre in Dublin, Fort Worth Opera, Boston Lyric Opera, Florida Grand Opera, Opera Colorado, Opéra de Montréal, the Atlanta Opera, Wolf Trap Opera, Opera Boston, Lyric Opera of Kansas City, Syracuse Stage, Geva Theatre Center, Indiana Repertory Theatre, Folger Shakespeare Theatre, Shakespeare Santa Cruz, Merrimack Repertory Theatre, and the Woolly Mammoth Theatre in Washington, D.C. In 2014 he designed the European premiere of Kevin Puts's opera, Silent Night. The production was awarded two accolades at the 2015 Irish Times Theatre Awards Ceremony, including the audience choice award and best opera production of 2015. Future engagements include the world premiere of The Shining for Minnesota Opera and Nixon in China for the Royal Swedish Opera in Stockholm.



MATTIE ULLRICH (Peekskill, New York) Costume Designer Mattie Ullrich makes her San Francisco Opera debut with her costume designs for Lucia di Lammermoor. Recent

career highlights include Satyagraha at Ekaterinburg Opera and Ballet; Don Giovanni for Norwegian Opera and Ballet; I Due Foscari the Royal Opera, Covent Garden, Vienna's Theater an der Wien, Valencia's Palau des Artes, and Los Angeles Opera; The Oresteia for the Bard SummerScape Festival; Le Roi Malgre Lui for the Wexford Festival; Nabucco with Washington National Opera, Florida Grand Opera, and Montreal Opera; Zaide for Wolf rap Opera; and Eliogabalo for New York's The Box. Other career highlights include creating costumes for the theater in New York City, like The Starry Messenger, The Pride, Wicked, Fault Lines, Things We Want, and Bad Dates. In 2010 she designed the costumes for a reworking of Stephen Schwartz's musical Working, performed in Chicago and New York City. She was awarded the European Opera Prize for her collaboration with director Thaddeus Strassberger for La Cenerentola, performed in Ireland and Germany. She received her education from University of North Carolina School of the Arts where she studied costume design, draping, tailoring, hat-making, and dyeing.

(San Diego, California) Lighting Designer Resident lighting designer for San Francisco Opera, Gary Marder made his Company debut in *Mefistofele* (2013) and in the 2014–15 season his lighting designs were seen in Susannah, Un Ballo in Maschera, Tosca, La Cenerentola, and Le Nozze di Figaro. Before joining San Francisco Opera, Robertson was head of music and chorus director of Scottish Opera.

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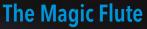
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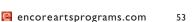

**DRINKING FOUNTAINS** are available on all levels except the Lower level, where there is a courtesy water station on the north side. Water bottles are permitted in the auditorium.

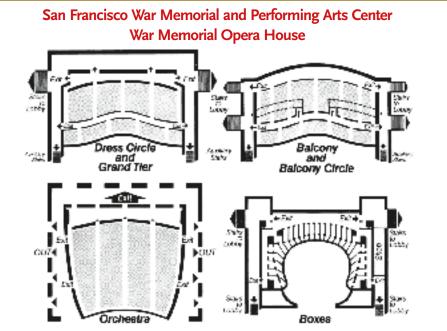
**OPERA GLASSES** may be rented for \$5 at the North Lobby coat check. ID deposit is requested.
