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

# Luisotti to Be Honored at Opera Ball



San Francisco Opera Music Director Nicola Luisotti and his wife, Rita Simonini, have been named guests of honor for **Opera Ball 2017 at the Imperial Palace**, a lavish celebration marking the opening of the Company's 95th season on September 8. "This will certainly be a very emotional year for me," said Luisotti who after nine years steps down as music director at the end of the 2017–18 Season. "I am

very proud of the work we have accomplished during my time with San Francisco Opera. To be acknowledged by the Opera Guild at so prestigious an affair as Opera Ball is a great and touching honor."

Produced by San Francisco Opera Guild and led by Co-Chairs Courtney Labe and Maryam Muduroglu, this year's Opera Ball coincides with the season-opening performance of Giacomo Puccini's *Turandot* and includes a cocktail reception, dinner by Executive Chef Josip Martinovic of McCalls Catering and Events, and a post-performance celebration with dancing in a tented pavilion in the War Memorial Courtyard. Designer J. Riccardo Benavides will recreate for the 750 guests an opulence fit for the Chinese emperor himself. All proceeds benefit the Opera Association and Opera Guild's education programs. # Opera at the Ballpark 2017

On Friday, June 30 at 7:30 p.m., join 30,000 fans for a free and unforgettable night of *Opera at the Ballpark*. For the fifteenth live simulcast in the Company's history, San Francisco Opera partners



with the San Francisco Giants to transmit Mozart's *Don Giovanni* from the stage of the War Memorial Opera House to AT&T Park's 103-foot-wide HD screen.

This summer tradition of fun, garlic fries, and opera under the stars includes Beach Blanket Babylon's Tammy Nelson leading the crowd in "Take Me Out to the Opera." The live simulcast will feature English subtitles and last approximately three and a half hours. ## Charlot D. Malin 1968–2017

In March, friends of San Francisco Opera received the unexpected and tragic news of the passing of Charlot Malin. A former Opera Ball co-chair and San Francisco Opera Guild president from 2014 to 2016, Charlot left an indelible mark on the Company and the philanthropic life of San Francisco. "She was an incredible champion of our Guild Education programs, striving to bring opera to the youth of today," said Guild President Jane Mudge.

Born and raised in Norway, Charlot became a successful Bay Area real estate executive and interior designer. With her husband, Greg, she ran Troon Pacific Inc., which specializes in environmentallysustainable design in residential and commercial properties. In addition, she nurtured an early love for the arts, having attended her first opera in Oslo at age 7, where her father's aunt and cousin sang in *Aida*.

Charlot is survived by her husband and twin sons, Benjamin and Sebastian. In her memory, the Opera Guild has established the Charlot D. Malin San Francisco Opera Guild Education Fund, which will support opera and classical music education programs for Bay Area students and teachers. # Notes from the General Director

### Unveiling Our Own California Story

When I arrived in San Francisco in 2005 my now-wife Kate gave me a copy of Herbert Asbury's book *The Barbary Coast*, a fascinating introduction to the chaotic, opportunistic frenzy that characterized the early years of this iconic city. For someone growing up in the U.K., in which history stretches back across millennia, I was fascinated by the idea that here you could just look over your shoulder and be connected to events, places, and people that literally shaped the formation of a city and state. That fascination was fueled by trips up to Truckee to visit the site of the Donner Party's camp and that disastrous journey of 1846. The frontier history of California is only generations' old and its energy and impact still seethes through this part of the world. It is a pioneering spirit that continues to put this region at the forefront of life-changing technological advances.

This November we unveil a magnificent new opera that will connect us to that immediacy of local history. John Adams' Girls of the Golden West (no connection to Puccini's opera!) takes us into the multifaceted world of gold-mining camps in the early 1850s at the time California was moving from Mexican to American rule. The story is real and firsthand, told by Louise Clappe, the wife of a doctor who spent eighteen months in the communities of Downieville and Rich Bar, high in the Sierra 200 miles northeast of here. Ms. Clappe sent a series of exquisitely detailed letters back to her sister in Massachusetts, writing under the pen name "Dame Shirley." She left us some of the most evocative depictions of life at that time in all its glory, grit, and strain. Peter Sellars, whose relationship with John Adams is one of the towering creative partnerships of the last 50 years, has assembled a libretto using the words of Dame Shirley, enriched with texts from Mark Twain, Frederick Douglass, and some deliciously honest miners' ballads. Through these lenses we are transported into a very authentic portrayal of the Gold Rush in which the urgency for quick wealth collides with racial tensions and the rapid subjugation of the non-white communities. This will be an opera tackling themes that are as present now as they were in 1850. This is an opera of our history and our place, but also our time.


This year marks John Adams' 70th birthday, and Girls of the Golden West will crown the global celebrations of one of the

most important composers of our time. John is a longtime resident of the Bay Area and we are honored that this premiere will be in San Francisco. The eyes of the musical world will be on us this November, and John's opera promises to be a great marker in the storied history of the Company. As we have seen in each of John's works presented here—*Doctor Atomic, The Death of Klinghoffer*, and *Nixon in China*— he finds a dynamic, engaging, and masterful musical language that fits the aesthetic and drama inherent in each piece. *Girls of the Golden West* will be one of his most propulsive and thrilling scores. I do hope you'll join us for this incredibly important moment.

As we move through the summer, John is putting the finishing touches to the score, our scene shop in Burlingame is building what will be an extraordinary visual world, the costume shop is creating authentic period clothes, and out young, diverse, and engaging cast is preparing for preliminary rehearsals in August. They are depicting a world which, no matter how exhausting, challenging, or tense it may have been, always remained for Dame Shirley a world of majestic beauty.

Deep in the shadowy nooks of the far-down valleys, like wasted jewels dropped from the radiant sky above, lay half a dozen blue-blossomed lagoons, glittering and gleaming and sparkling in the sunlight as though each tiny wavelet were formed of rifted diamonds. —The Shirley Letters

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### Three's Family

In a remarkable coincidence of casting, this summer's production of *Rigoletto* features three family members sharing the stage. Tenor and second-year Adler Fellow **Pene Pati**, who debuts the role of the licentious Duke of Mantua, is performing alongside his wife, soprano and second-year Adler Fellow **Amina Edris** (Countess Ceprano), and his brother, first-year Adler Fellow and tenor **Amitai Pati** (Matteo Borsa). Although this is the first time that the three will sing together at the War Memorial Opera House, they have a long record of collaboration. For instance, in their native New Zealand, Pene and Amitai perform in the popular singing group Sol<sub>3</sub> Mio.

## Attila and Mefistofele on KQED TV

San Francisco Opera and KQED TV continue a longstanding partnership with high-definition broadcasts of two of the Company's most spectacular recent productions: Verdi's *Attila*, a gripping portrayal of a warrior tormented by internal doubts, and *Mefistofele*, Boito's magnificent retelling of Goethe's *Faust*.

Hosted by mezzo-soprano Frederica "Flicka" von Stade and General Director Matthew Shilvock, the operas will air on KQED 9 in the original Italian with English subtitles and feature Music Director Nicola Luisotti leading the San Francisco Opera Chorus and Orchestra. For *Attila*, mark your calendars for Thursday, August 3 and for *Mefistofele*, Thursday, August 24. Both broadcasts start at 9 p.m.

Myron Marx's medical training as a radiologist and his love for opera intersected unexpectedly one night in 1987 at the War Memorial Opera House. A singer had fainted onstage, and Marx, who was in the audience, left his seat to see if he could be of assistance. He was ushered into a dressing room where he examined the patient and recommended the crew lower the singer's head and raise his feet. The singer revived. "He made his curtain call 20 minutes later," Marx recounts.

Two weeks later, Marx was in the audience when a soprano twisted her ankle during a performance and limped about in obvious pain through the remainder of the scene. He again rushed to the stage door to offer his help. Then-General Director Terence McEwen and Artistic Administrator Sarah Billinghurst appreciated Marx's assistance during each incident and asked if the native New Yorker would volunteer to be the Company's on-site doctor during performances. It was the beginning of what he calls the Performance Program, a cadre of medical professionals who attend the opera and are available when needed. "I arrange to have a doctor in the house at each performance in the same rear orchestra seats on the aisle," he says. "We have a silent beeper and a fairly well-equipped medical bag backstage. If we are needed during a performance, we are called."

Many of the calls are mundane: colds, fatigue, aches, or sprains. "Every call is different. There have been real emergencies where singers don't feel they can continue. In situations like that, we work closely with the opera staff and the conductor to make a decision." Marx recalled one singer who wrenched his back so severely during a scene that a cancellation seemed unavoidable. "We had a massage therapist on site within 15 minutes. Luckily it was a long opera and the artist was able to receive treatment before going back on," he says. "He finished the opera, and he was magnificent!"

In many situations, Dr. Marx provides comfort just by being present and attentive. "At the end of *La Traviata*, Dr. Grenvil goes in and just takes Violetta's pulse. It is intensely reassuring, even if it doesn't save her." Bedside manner is as essential in his work as anything in his medical bag. "The pressure riding on these artists is quite high. They have a difficult job, and they want to be in top form.

"We are not here for the audience because the War Memorial is a city facility and there is an EMT on duty for patrons, but the EMT knows we are here and occasionally we are called *in extremis* until 911 arrives."

When Marx and his team began working at performances, there was a doctor, Ernie Rosenbaum, who assisted artists and their families while they were in town for rehearsals. Marx eventually assumed those duties as well. "If I can't handle a problem by phone or giving a prescription, I know a lot of physicians in town, and I can get the artists seen tomorrow if necessary." Each fall, he also administers flu vaccinations to the entire Company.

Marx makes the schedule of who presides over which night. (Look for him on Saturday nights.) "All of this is volunteer," he notes. "All of the doctors are dedicated and love the art form. I feel it's an enormous honor to have a foot in the door because it is important to me to not just be a fan, but a part of the process and to help where I can."

Lazer has also introduced tens of thousands of people to opera through the successful promotion of simulcasts and other major outreach campaigns. "No one could be more dedicated to and passionate about the art form and the Company than Marcia. To say we will miss her incredible knowledge, generosity as a colleague and friend is an enormous understatement," said Lynch.

Lazer's extensive professional experience includes senior positions with the

Metropolitan Opera, Los Angeles Opera, South Coast Repertory, and Center Theatre Group. She holds a master's degree in musicology from Yale University and a bachelor's degree in music history from Wellesley College.

"I can't say how much my time at San Francisco Opera has meant to me and how much I will miss being of this great company," said Lazer. "It's been a great pleasure and honor. And I look forward to being part of the audience for many years to come."



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# Celebrating Years of Merola

The program for young opera artists has changed the face of opera training



nyone who's spent time around the Merola Opera Program has a story to tell. Many of them shine with happy, promise-filled endings.

Sheri Greenawald, who has led the San Francisco Opera Center's singular and widely esteemed summer training program for emerging singers since 2002, is fond of one account set at a 2015 master class taught by bass-baritone James Morris. After listening to Kihun Yoon soar through Wotan's Farewell in Die Walküre, Greenawald recalled, Morris paused before delivering his pithy remark: "I'm glad you weren't around when I was coming up in the profession!"

Former San Francisco Opera General Director David Gockley had a vivid Merola moment at the 2008 Grand Finale, a showcase concert of arias and ensembles that brings the program to a glittering end in August. Knocked out by soprano Leah Crocetto's account of "Tu puniscimi, o Signore" from Verdi's Luisa Miller, Gockley turned to a companion and vowed to mount a main stage San Francisco

> Opera revival of the piece with Crocetto in the title role. And so he did, presenting it as the 2015 season opener.

In a life-imitates-art romance, tenor Alek Shrader fell for his wife-to-be, mezzo-soprano Daniela Mack, when they were both OPERA PROGRAM cast in a 2007 Merola pro-

duction of Rossini's La Cenerentola. "It was indeed my best summer ever," said Shrader of that charmed musical match.

Not every Merola memory is all sweetness and light. The program, which is marking its 60th anniversary this year, is so rigorous and demanding it's routinely compared to boot camp. Soprano Elza van den Heever (Merola 2003 and '04) remembers sitting in an Opera House stairwell weeping, the arms of fellow "Merolini" Joseph Kaiser wrapped around her in a consoling bear hug. "Maybe I was a girl who had a lot of potential, but I didn't know what I was doing," she recalled. Persuaded by coach Dolora Zajick (Merola 1983) that she was in fact a soprano rather than a mezzo, van den Heever had to "re-teach my little feet how to walk." It was all pretty overwhelming.

To say she rose to the challenge is putting it mildly. Reached in Texas, where she was rehearsing the title role in Dallas Opera's Norma, van den Heever is one of many name-recognition stars who had a formative experience in Merola. "It was the first time I spent with a group of singers who were all incredibly talented," she said. "Yes, it made me feel insecure, but it was also tremendously empowering to think I might actually belong there." Others who found out they belonged over the years include such distinguished Merola grads as Thomas Hampson (1980), Deborah Voigt (1985), Anna Netrebko (1996), Joyce DiDonato (1997), Rolando Villazón (1998), and Nadine Sierra (2010).

Beverly Sills put it this way: "Until the Merola Program got going, there was no place in this country where you could learn your craft in terms of performing." Merola broke through that confining mold.

Right from the start, in 1957, Merola has offered a kind of full-body baptism into the operatic world. Unlike many other summer training programs, which give young singers instruction and coaching but very little performance experience outside the chorus, Merola made significant and meaningful stage time an integral component. As quoted in *Voices Heard Round the Word*, Tracy Grant's 50thanniversary book about the program, Beverly Sills put it this way: "Until the Merola Program got going, there was no place in this country where you could learn your craft in terms of performing." Merola broke through that confining mold.

Named in honor of San Francisco Opera founder and General Director Gaetano Merola, the program was the brainchild of his successor as general director, Kurt Herbert Adler, and Company patron James Schwabacher, himself a gifted singer. The program ran for four weeks in that inaugural summer.

Endorsed and expanded by subsequent general directors, Merola will welcome 29 artists this summer—23 singers, five apprentice coaches and one apprentice stage director—for an intense and immersive 11 weeks.

Greenawald and her colleague

Mark Morash, the director of musical studies for San Francisco Opera Center, spend months sorting through applications and traveling around the country to audition over 500 singers in order to select each summer's Merola class. For someone like Toni Marie Palmertree, who had given up singing for eight years before trying again, being chosen for Merola in 2015 was a life-changing endorsement. "On paper I looked like one of the worst candidates possible," said Palmertree.

"Sheri and Mark heard something. They had suggestions for repertoire. They knew my voice better than I did."

"Sheri has an extraordinary ear for talent," said Matthew Epstein, whose wide-ranging operatic career includes stints as general director of the Welsh National Opera and artistic director of the Lyric Opera of Chicago. "And she really gets it as a special developer of talent. There is nothing as good for young









singers as performing. It puts them in situations where they can learn the most. I don't think the program has a rival in the country."

"Not everyone cares as much as Sheri about what happens to young singers," added Gayletha Nichols, the executive director of the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions. "You can't just mother them. You truly need to know what they need, when to pressure them and when to support them through a tougher period."

Greenawald's cozily chaotic office, on the fifth floor of the Opera House, looks like some opera-mad

fan's clubhouse. Pictures and press clippings of Merolini past and present share the crowded wall space with a dense color-coded schedule for this summer's classes and rehearsals, as well as several broadsheet newspaper shots of the exultant Golden State Warriors star Stephen Curry.

If dribbling and ball control are the essential, endlessly honed skills for a basketball player, language, argues Greenawald, is the equivalent for singers. "If I were running a conservatory," she said, "the kids would never sing in a foreign language until they'd studied it. If you don't know the shape of the vowel, let alone what the

word means, forget about it."

Even when she's laying down the law (acting, movement, and historical knowledge of the period are among her other preoccupations), Greenawald sounds ebullient and upbeat. Her bright eyes, mobile demeanor, and closecropped hair and bangs lend the former soprano an elfin, ageless buoyancy. It's no mystery why so many young singers, past and present, take to her.

Merola wouldn't have lasted 60 years without a sound organizational

structure and sustaining ethos. On a budget that has grown from \$1.7 million in 2011 to \$3 million today, the program has its own offices, staff, and board. Merola contracts with San Francisco Opera to run the program. Executive Director Jean Kellogg oversees a support system that includes everything from housing the Merolini to help with headshots to \$12,000 in career development grants for up to five years after a singer's Merola summer is through.

A loyal patron group adds a boosterish enthusiasm for all things Merola that Gayletha Nichols compares to the fan base for a beloved minor league baseball team. One supporter takes the entire Merolini class to dinner at Max's Opera Cafe every year. "And, boy, do they eat," noted a grinning Greenawald. Others open their homes to the singers, help them buy gowns and tuxes, and attend every performance and master class to cheer on their favorites. Audiences at Merola events can feel the love.

Now, thanks to a first-ever Merola commission, they can look forward to *If I Were You*, composer Jake Heggie and librettist Gene Scheer's *Faust*-inflected tale based on a novel by Julien Green. It receives its world premiere with an all-Merola cast in 2019.

While some programs, like the touring Western Opera Theater productions, have gone by the wayside, the career-enhancing San Francisco Opera Adler Fellows program remains firmly entrenched. Merola singers who are awarded one of these prestigious multiyear posts will receive further training and performance opportunities in main stage Company productions. Many careers have been launched along this trajectory.

Competitive as it is to be chosen as a Merola singer, only some become Adlers and only a very few achieve stardom. As in any field, the opera pinnacles can seem punishingly narrow. Still, even if they don't have stage careers, many Merola alumni continue to work in opera, as administrators, teachers, and coaches.

No matter where it leads, a Merola summer is often its own transformative reward. Soprano Henrietta Davis (Merola 1976) was 20 years old when she was selected for the program. "I must have been the youngest one, and I was extremely shy and nervous," she said of that summer 41 years ago. Lots of memories came flooding back—being coached by Warren Jones, doing a stone-cold audition for General Director Adler, singing at Stern Grove.

As it happened, Davis got a big break in the midst of her Merola studies. Houston Grand Opera was auditioning for its *Porgy and Bess* at the time. Davis took a shot and won the role of Clara. She went straight from Merola to the show. But it wasn't so much that success she dwelled on, as it was the preparation that got her there.

"The camaraderie and being part of a group of excellent singers was pivotal," said Davis. "Knowing that everyone had faith in me to be in the program, even when I didn't always feel it myself, gave me the inspiration to be as good as I could be. No, more than that: It gave me the drive to aim for awesome every time."

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

John is the chair of the advisory board for the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research (SIEPR), serves as a trustee of Stanford University, and is Vice Chairman of the board of Stanford Hospital Care. 

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

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## SYNOPSIS

## RIGOLETTO

#### ACT I

The Duke of Mantua surveys his court to choose a woman with whom to pass the night and selects Countess Ceprano. She is flattered but nervous; her husband is present. This leads to an impasse. Marullo enters with news for his fellow courtiers that Rigoletto, the jester, has a mistress in town. The Duke then discusses his dilemma with Rigoletto who suggests the following alternatives for Count Ceprano: prison, exile, or beheading. Ceprano and the courtiers are outraged and swear vengeance on Rigoletto. Count Monterone, an old nobleman, comes to denounce the Duke and his dissolute court. With the Duke's consent, Rigoletto mocks the old man and his dishonored daughter. Monterone curses both Rigoletto and the Duke for laughing at a father's grief. Rigoletto suddenly fears for the safety of his own daughter, whom he has kept carefully hidden from the court.

Later that evening, Rigoletto is accosted by Sparafucile, who offers his services as a killer. Rigoletto spurns his offer and then reflects on their encounter. He sees Sparafucile as his alter ego: one kills with a sword, the other with words. Monterone's curse continues to haunt him.

Rigoletto returns home and greets his daughter, Gilda, declaring that she means the world to him. She reciprocates his feelings but questions why he has kept her concealed. He fears the courtiers and warns the nurse to guard Gilda carefully. Hearing a noise in the street, he goes out to investigate. The Duke, disguised as a student, enters and is astonished to discover the girl he has seen in church is Rigoletto's daughter. He and Gilda declare their love. Then, fearing Rigoletto's return, he leaves. Left alone, Gilda rhapsodizes on the false name of the "student," Gualtier Maldè, while outside the courtiers gather to kidnap the woman they believe to be Rigoletto's mistress. To exact their revenge on the jester, they will present the girl to the Duke. Rigoletto returns to find the courtiers near his house, but they fool him into thinking they have come to abduct Countess Ceprano who lives next door. Too late, Rigoletto discovers the trick.

#### ACT II

The Duke, unaware of what has occurred, laments the fact that when he returned to Gilda's house he found it deserted. The courtiers describe how they kidnapped Rigoletto's mistress, and the Duke leaves to go find her. When Rigoletto enters, a remark from the page alerts him to Gilda's whereabouts. He rages at his tormentors but is soon reduced to begging them for pity. When Gilda bursts onto the scene, Rigoletto orders the courtiers to leave him alone with his daughter. She explains how she met the Duke, whom she had taken to be a student, at church. Rigoletto comforts her. Monterone, on the way to his beheading, laments that no one has yet struck down his daughter's seducer. Rigoletto promises to do so. Gilda begs mercy for the Duke.

#### ACT III

Rigoletto has brought Gilda to Sparafucile's inn to show her the real nature of the man she loves. The Duke, once again incognito, flirts with Sparafucile's sister, Maddalena. Gilda laments his faithlessness, but still continues to love him. Rigoletto sends her home and hires Sparafucile to kill the Duke. Maddalena urges her brother to spare him, and he agrees, provided another victim can be found as a substitute so that he can keep his pact with Rigoletto. Gilda, unable to follow her father's orders, returns and presents herself as the victim after overhearing the conversation. Rigoletto returns to collect his victim and is given a body. Hearing the Duke's voice in the distance, he quickly uncovers the wraps and finds the dying Gilda. Monterone's curse has been fulfilled.

The performance will last approximately two and a half hours. revolutionary opera"—that is how Verdi would describe *Rigoletto* in the years to come after its premiere. At first sight this seems like an exaggeration. There are no revolutions in Italian opera comparable to the one accomplished in Germany by Wagner's *Das Rheingold*, which dates from the same decade. Audiences throughout the Italian peninsula had a set of expectations which no composer could afford to disregard. Yet within these limits, Verdi's 17th opera did indeed blaze a number of fresh trails, thereby acquiring a stamp of modernity that remained to impress listeners even in the years preceding the Verdi renaissance in the 1920s, when the composer's reputation was at a low ebb and only *Otello*, *Falstaff*, and the Requiem were thought worthy of serious attention.

The subject of Victor Hugo's play *Le Roi s'amuse* (literally, *The King Amuses Himself*) first occurred to Verdi in 1849, the year in which he set up as a man of property, freed from the theatrical rat race and able to write merely when he felt inclined to do so. He proposed it to Vincenzo Flauto, impresario of the Teatro San

Carlo, Naples, as a possible successor to *Luisa Miller*, already scheduled for the current autumn season—"a fine drama with marvelous situations" was how he put it. His suggestion was duly passed on to Salvatore Cammarano, the theater's resident poet who, however, had his doubts ("I've read *Le Roi s'amuse* again. ... but what about the censorship?"). In such matters Cammarano was nothing if not a realist. As one who had removed the religious and political stings from Voltaire's *Alzire* and Schiller's *Kabale und Liebe* for Verdi's benefit in *Luisa Miller*, he realized that Hugo's piece was far more dangerous than either.

After a stormy reception at its first night in 1832, Hugo's play had been suppressed by the government on the grounds of immorality. That such a critical portrait of royalty should be permitted in conservative Naples, ruled by a Bourbon monarch, especially in the years following the defeat of the 1848 uprising, was unthinkable. Even in Venice, under the comparatively tolerant regime of the Austrians in 1844, royal dignity was jealously guarded. In Verdi's *Ernani*, another Hugo subject that had its premiere that

year at the Teatro La Fenice, the character of Don Carlo [Charles V], King of Spain, had to be softened in respect of the original play.

Anyway, it was at Venice that Verdi decided to stage his opera once the Neapolitan contract had fallen through, with Francesco Maria Piave, not Cammarano, as his collaborator, to whom he waxed ever more enthusiastic. "It's a subject which, if the police would permit it, would be one of the greatest creations of modern theater. Who knows? They permitted *Ernani*; they might permit this too, and here there wouldn't be any conspiracies."

What were the qualities that attracted Verdi so strongly to *Le Roi s'amuse*? First of all, surely, the "divided nature" of the protagonist. Up to then his leading characters had been relatively monochromatic, actuated by similar impulses throughout. The court jester Triboulet gave him the opportunity of filling out a personality in all its human contradictions. Then, too, the play is a drama of paternity, a relationship which never failed to evoke a deep response from a man who had lost both his children in their infancy; hence his long held but ultimately unrealized ambition to write a *Re Lear*. Lastly, there was his desire, expressed earlier on, to "unite the comic with the terrible in Shakespeare's manner." The subject of a court jester would allow him to do precisely that.

But it was not all plain sailing. Piave, resident librettist and stage director at Venice's Teatro La Fenice, evidently received assurances by word of mouth (though it is not clear from whom) that the subject would meet with no objection. Accordingly, he set to work on the scenario of what Verdi insisted should be called *La maledizione di Vallier* or, for short, *La Maledizione* (The Curse).

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

The text of *La Maledizione* was duly dispatched to the Venetian authorities, and the prospect appeared sufficiently favorable for Verdi to begin the composition. Then barely three weeks before the opening of the opera season, the blow fell. A decree from the military governor forbade the subject absolutely and "regretted that the poet Piave and the celebrated Maestro Verdi have not been able to choose some other field in which to exhibit their talents." It was not to be resubmitted in any form whatsoever.

But Piave did not give up hope. He re-worked the text, preserving his original meters but changing the king into a subordinate nobleman, who would take on the opera's title. It is in *II Duca di Vendôme* that we first encounter the names Rigoletto, Gilda, Maddalena, and Giovanna. The Duke himself is single, so there is no question of adultery. Moreover, he is not enticed to Sparafucile's inn, but drops in merely to seek shelter from the coming storm. There is no sack for Gilda's body and no hump on Rigoletto's back.

Surprisingly, in view of the earlier ban, the police gave their approval. It was Verdi who objected to the elimination of Hugo's most daring strokes, and above all to the decision not to make Rigoletto a hunchback. "I find it very fine," he wrote, "to represent this character, outwardly deformed and ridiculous, inwardly impassioned and full of love. I chose the subject precisely for all these qualities and these original features, and if they're removed I can no longer write the music. If you tell me that the notes will fit this drama just as well, I can only reply that I don't understand such reasoning, and I tell you frankly that, good or bad as my notes may be, I don't write them at random; I always manage to give them a character."

Nevertheless, the chief hurdle had been surmounted. The bones of Hugo's drama were still discernible beneath the surface trappings; and it was a short step to the definitive version in which—with a further alteration of names and locale—the original situations were restored.

The premiere took place on March 11, 1851 and was an instant success, of which the somewhat cautious reviews in the press give very little idea. So, the opera had no difficulty in circulating. But, over the next decade, few audiences south of Lombardy-Venetia were allowed to hear the opera as Verdi and Piave had written it. Indeed, the various adaptations that prevailed make *II Duca di Vendôme* seem a model of fidelity to Victor Hugo. One can sympathize with Verdi's observation that when certain theaters perform his works they ought to print under the title "Words and music by" ...and fill in the name of the censor. "How would you like it," he

wrote to his friend, the sculptor Vincenzo Luccardi, "if someone tied a black ribbon around the nose of one of your statues?"

Fortunately, the unification of Italy put an end to censorship, thereby allowing *Rigoletto* to make its full effect. With Verdi, new and unusual situations never failed to provide new musical solutions. To convey the full range of the jester's character, he has recourse to a recitative ("Pari siamo") which has all the importance of an aria, while encompassing a far wider variety of mood. Rigoletto's own formal solo ("Cortigiani, vil razza dannata"), the opera's centerpiece, is in one movement only, articulated in three sections. In the first, he inveighs passionately against the courtiers who have abducted his daughter with his own unwitting connivance; in the second, he pleads with one of them; in the last, he throws himself on their mercy; and it is just at this moment of abject humiliation that the music carries him to heights of nobility that make us forget his deformity, both moral and physical.

Certain of the opera's innovations are foreshadowed elsewhere. The duettino between Rigoletto and Sparafucile, during which neither sings together, has a precedent in that of the two spies in Donizetti's *Lucrezia Borgia* (Hugo again, with another unappealing protagonist); but the strange, phosphorescent scoring gives it a sinister quality all its own. The use of a wordless chorus to portray the moaning of the wind can be found in Auber's comic opera *Haydée*, but merely as background to a lighthearted refrain. Where *Rigoletto* most notably breaks fresh ground is in its treatment of time. Occurrences of the "expanded moment," so common in Italian opera of the time during which the action freezes just where one expects it to move forward, are here reduced to two only: the general dismay (brief enough) following Monterone's curse, and the Duke's cabaletta ("Possente amor mi chiama") with its conventional repeat. No model exists for the design of Act Three, in which the drama never halts for a moment. Even during the famous quartet ("Bella figlia dell'amore") we are aware of the passing of time. Can we say the same of similar ensembles: "Mir ist so wunderbar" (Fidelio), "A te, o cara" (I Puritani), or even "Selig, wie die Sonne" (Die Meistersinger)? Most certainly not. In Italian opera of the past, storms have been either preludes (as in I Puritani, Act Three) or interludes (as in Il Barbiere di Siviglia). The storm in Rigoletto develops concurrently with the action, interspersed with "cutaway shots" of the singers, who then join with the orchestra to reinforce the climax in the terzetto, "Se pria ch'abbia il mezzo." No Italian composer had created so powerful a fusion of tone-painting and drama. The ploy of using a song (the king's "Souvent femme varie") as a dramatic prop belongs, of course, to Hugo. The problem lies in giving it the same force in a context in which everything is sung. Verdi solves it by devising a popular, catchy melody ("La donna è mobile") which stands out from the surrounding music, while never jarring with its basic idiom. Nothing is more chilling than the moment when it impinges on the ear of the avenging father.

Such, then, are some of the qualities that set *Rigoletto* well ahead of its time. Some years later Verdi, when asked which he considered his best opera, is said to have replied, "Speaking as an amateur, *La Traviata;* speaking as a professional, *Rigoletto*." Intending no disparagement to the former, we can see what he means.

# HEART AND SOUL

Hawaiian baritone Quinn Kelsey returns to perform one of his signature Verdi roles

hat makes Quinn Kelsey's Verdi singing so compelling is not just the size of his voice or the finish of his technique, although both are impressive. It's his heart," gushed *Opera News* magazine. "Most baritones snarl their way through Rigoletto's 'Cortigiani.' ... When Kelsey sings the aria, you hear the pain behind the anger; the man's vulnerability is evident in every phrase. It is a much more human presentation of Rigoletto's character—and a much more satisfying one."

San Francisco Opera Music Director Nicola Luisotti, who has collaborated frequently with Kelsey, concurs. "His portrait of Rigoletto draws a tender and angry father with such an incredible, gorgeous voice," said Luisotti. "I can easily say that he represents today one of the best baritones in the world."

A native of Honolulu (his father is of European descent and his mother's family is half-Hawaiian and half-Filipino), Kelsey quickly ascended up the ranks of the Merola Opera Program (2002) and Lyric Opera of Chicago's Ryan Center for American Artists (2003–06). At 39, he is at the top of his game and one of the few singers of Hawaiian ancestry to have risen to prominence in the opera world.

You come from a musical family. Is that where your voice comes from? As you look back at your career, what do you believe were the crucial turning points? I've been terribly blessed. After high school I didn't know anything about music conservatories. So I just decided to stay home and register at the local university, University of Hawaii at Manoa. It was one of the smartest things I could have done; I don't know whether I'd have the same opportunities if I had gone away. I was hired as a soloist at a really great church, Central Union Church in Honolulu, where my folks and sister are soloists now. The quick frequency of different music built up my musicianship skills, and then I was one of the first young singers in the musical community accepted into the Hawaii Opera Theatre's Orvis Opera Studio. Among the guests who were brought to work with us were Mark Morash [director of musical studies at the San Francisco Opera Center], Richard Pearlman [then-director of the Lyric Opera of Chicago's apprenticeship program], Marilyn Horne, and Denyce Graves. The timing couldn't have been more perfect. It just built my path from the end of college through the years of study at the Chautauqua Institution, here at Merola, and then off to Chicago. As I did one, the next opportunity came along.

#### You've said that your Hawaiian heritage and culture are very important to you. How have they influenced your musical life?

Over the years, I've noticed that classical singing is something relatively easily accessed by people of Polynesian or Pacific Island background because of the fact that all these cultures in the Pacific Islands have a strong oral tradition. It allows the individual to merge with the training, concepts, and the techniques in some ways more easily than for some of their counterparts who are not of their culture. The classical music community in Honolulu is pretty small, so you know everybody: the young singers, teachers, and where the vocal studios are around town. I



remember there was one studio in one of the community colleges, and the teacher turned out this semi-constant group of singers of whom the majority was of Pacific Island background. They seemed to pick it up rather quickly, excel, and build on it.

There are a number of singers who've come out of Hawaii that never made careers for themselves, but there was no doubt they had the raw materials to pursue classical singing if they chose. The other side of Pacific Island culture is this strong idea of family, and so that makes it so difficult to leave, as one ultimately needs to do to advance into an opera career. It was hard for me.

## Yet it seems that you've made that transition relatively smoothly, particularly as a Verdi baritone. Does it ever feel confining to be identified as a certain kind of singer?

To be labeled a Verdi baritone I actually take it as a huge honor, because I know how specific a voice has to be in order to be considered one. There is a certain shape that sets it apart from a lyric baritone because of the way Verdi wrote that voice in his operas; it has a kind of different weight to it. The more Verdi roles that I began to take on, the more I realized that yes, they're all built for me. They're not totally the same, but I can sing them all in a way that doesn't overtax me. And so if nothing else, I look forward to the one I've haven't done yet: Simon Boccanegra, Macbeth, Iago in *Otello*, Ford in *Falstaff*.

That's not to say, I won't be doing anything else. I really enjoy singing French repertoire, and I do a good amount of German lieder. I think it's healthy to start over in a different direction from what you're used to. In a way, it's like giving yourself a tune-up, to apply a different language or style of singing to your vocal mechanism and challenge it. Right now, it's mostly Verdi and bel canto. Hopefully, there's no reason why I can't do Russian repertoire or Wagner and Strauss.

#### Rigoletto has become one of your signature roles. He's also one of Verdi's most complicated—and Shakespearean—creations. How do you get into this tragic character?

He definitely stacks his professional life on top of his personal life, and they affect one another to a very extreme degree. On the one hand, Rigoletto is this scalding character who makes his living Quinn Kelsey as Ezio in the Company's 2012 production of Verdi's Attila.

verbally attacking everyone in the court. This is his job; this is why the Duke loves him. But he goes after all these people to such a very harsh degree, he's loading up all of the negativity to come crashing down on himself later, and his whole world falls apart.

Whenever I do this role—this is my eighth or ninth production—I always give enough space and consideration of other interpretations. I don't know that I'll ever be able to say 100 percent that I have it figured out. There always should be wiggle room for new ideas

and things that I haven't thought.

## You're also here this summer to perform in Merola's 60th anniversary concert. As an alumnus, what was Merola like for you?

It was such a wonderful next progression from where I had come. Merola was the entire summer of being allowed to just focus on training and development, and everything one could do to prepare for a career and hone your craft with a huge handful of master classes and coaching opportunities.

#### Any significant memories from that time?

Right after I finished Merola, it was the last year of the Western Opera Theater tour, 29 performances of Schaunard in *La Bohème*, a western and eastern U.S. tour. We went from a conventional stage to a ten-by-ten-foot portable stage. I don't think that you could have a hotter group of singers than that group, because of all the spaces we had to conform to. By the end, we could have done it in a bathtub. Later, in 2003, I did a production of *Bohème* and everyone showed up with their music scores. It was so burned to my memory, I could hum everyone else's parts. I had it so baked in my mind.

## What have you learned that you would like to pass on to young singers?

It's not an easy business. There's a lot more to it than just getting on the stage, putting on the makeup and fancy costume, and making the pretty noise that everyone claps for. Most people only see the bright, positive side of things. It turns out that singers have a hard time trying to have a personal life. You don't have the support system that people who work in the office five times a week do. It can also be very exhausting besides actually learning the music, going to rehearsals and singing. There's packing up and leaving home and unpacking in a strange place, dealing with language barriers, work visas, and taxes... so many different variables.

So all in all, what it comes down to, in my opinion, is how badly do you want it? And if you do want it badly enough, what is it going to take to get to a place in a career to where you want to be? Those are the questions that you have to answer. It's not easy at all, but if you want it badly enough, at the right times the results and payoffs can be very fulfilling.

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
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## ARTIST PROFILES



NICOLA LUISOTTI (Viareggio, Italy) Conductor Maestro Luisotti has

been music director of San Francisco Opera since 2009 and has conducted over 40 operas and concerts

since his Company debut in 2005. Luisotti, who holds the Caroline H. Hume Endowed Chair, recently conducted the Company's Aida, Andrea Chénier, Opera in the Park concert, and Don Carlo. During the 2016-17 season, he led Pagliacci at Teatro Regio di Torino, La Traviata at the Metropolitan Opera, as well as conducting the Metropolitan Opera National Council Grand Finals Concert. Other recent engagements include a symphonic concert at Amsterdam's Concertgebouw, *Rigoletto* at Madrid's Teatro Real and Milan's Teatro alla Scala, Il Trittico and La Traviata at London's Royal Opera, Covent Garden, and Rigoletto at Paris' Opéra Bastille. In addition, Luisotti has received international acclaim from press and public alike with performances at Vienna State Opera, Genoa's Teatro Carlo Felice, Venice's La Fenice, Bologna's Teatro Comunale, Munich's Bavarian State Opera, Frankfurt, Stuttgart, Dresden, Hamburg, Valencia, Los Angeles Opera, Seattle Opera, and Tokyo's Suntory Hall. He was recently appointed associate director at Madrid's Teatro Real.



#### JORDI BERNÀCER

(Alcoi, Spain) **Conductor** Spanish conductor Jordi Bernàcer joined the Company in August 2015. As resident conductor, he serves as musical assistant to

Music Director Nicola Luisotti, in addition to participating in a wide range of musical and rehearsal activities. Bernàcer's conducting credits include last year's Aida, Madama Butterfly, and Carmen with San Francisco Opera; the 2016 Adler Fellows Gala The Future is Now; La Traviata at Teatro Massimo in Palermo; *Rigoletto* at the Teatro Real in Madrid; Tosca, Rigoletto, and Cavalleria Rusticana at the Teatro di San Carlo in Naples; Manon, Manon Lescaut, Luisa Fernanda, and Simon Boccanegra (the latter two with Plácido Domingo) at Valencia's Palau de les Arts Reina Sofia; Tosca with Los Angeles Opera; Carmen in Teatr Wielki in Poland: I Puritani in Modena's Teatro Comunale Luciano



Edris holds a bachelor's degree in music from University of Canterbury, a master's degree in music from Wales International Academy of Voice, and a post-graduate diploma from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. Her upcoming Company engagements include Trainbearer in *Elektra* and Annina in *La Traviata*.



BUFFY BACGOTT (Fair Oaks, California) Giovanna A member of the San Francisco Opera Chorus, mezzosoprano Buffy Baggott recently appeared as Kostelnička's Aunt



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in Jenůfa, Maria in the Company's world premiere of Marco Tutino's Two Women, and Hecuba/Ghost of Cassandra in Les Troyens. She has sung roles with Lyric Opera of Chicago, Los Angeles Opera, Canadian Opera Company, and the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. Other Bay Area credits include performances with the Stockton Symphony, Opera San Jose, Sacramento Opera, and West Edge Opera. He was awarded the Olivier Messiaen Foundation Prize in 2003 for his artistic contribution to the preparation of the Company's North American premiere of Saint François d'Assise. Robertson has also conducted ten main stage productions with the Company. The **OPERA BOX OFFICE** is located in the Opera House, 301 Van Ness Avenue, and is open Monday 10 AM-5 PM, Tuesday through Saturday 10 AM-6 PM, and through the first intermission on performance days. Tickets may also be charged by phone at (415) 864-3330 or ordered online at sfopera.com. We accept American Express, VISA, MasterCard, and Discover.

If you are unable to use your tickets to a particular performance, you may exchange them for tickets to another performance, subject to availability, or donate them back to the Opera. Ticket exchanges for future performances can be accommodated up to one hour before curtain or during the first intermission. No refunds are associated with ticket exchanges, and a fee (plus any price differential) may apply.

**ACCESSIBILITY** San Francisco Opera is committed to providing easy access for all of our patrons. Please contact the Opera Box Office prior to your visit so that we can ensure your comfort.



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
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
