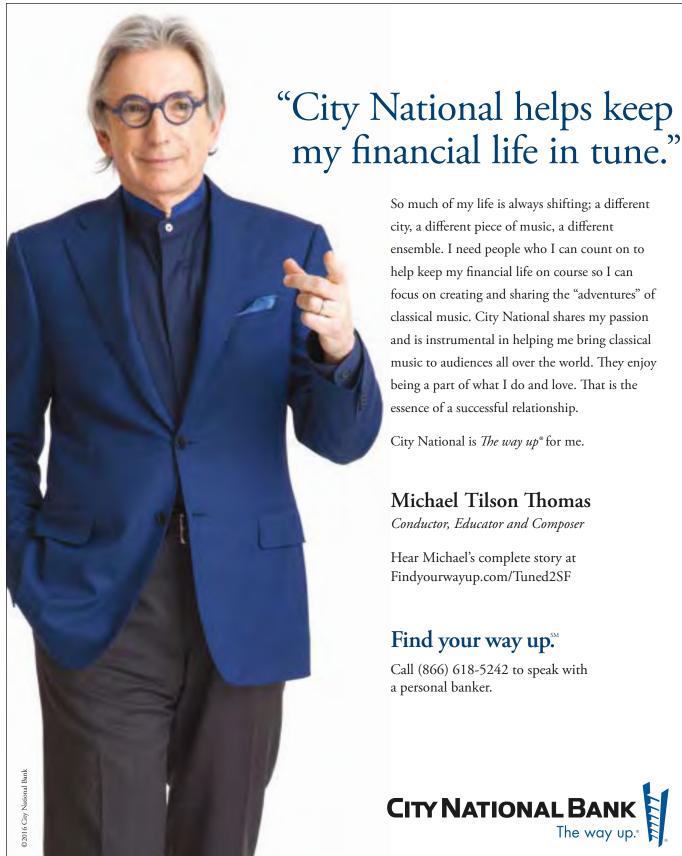

In 1966, the Company presented the first U.S. performances with Marie Collier in the lead role of Emilia Marty. In 2010, Karita Mattila was simply unforgettable as the opera's complex heroine. Olivier Tambosi's evocative production deserves a repeat performance, this time with Nadja Michael—our stunning Salome in 2009—in the starring role. We are also pleased to welcome conductor Mikhail Tatarnikov in his San Francisco Opera debut and a virtuoso cast that will bring this 20th-century masterwork to life.

We owe a debt of gratitude to all who make this great art form possible: our talented artists and staff, and especially you, our audience. You ensure that San Francisco Opera stays where it belongs—at the forefront of the opera world and a cultural treasure in our community. 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San Francisco Opera has lined up an international all-star cast for Richard Wagner's epic *Der Ring des Nibelungen (The Ring of the Nibelung)*—a revival of the visually spectacular production by director Francesca Zambello that premiered at the War Memorial Opera House in 2011.

Widely considered as one of the greatest works ever conceived for the operatic stage, Wagner's mythological saga of gods and mortals returns to San Francisco Opera in three complete cycles in summer 2018. All four operas of the *Ring—Das Rheingold, Die Walküre, Siegfried,* and *Götterdämmerung—*will be presented each in their entirety over the course of one week as the composer originally intended. The cycles' performance dates are June 12–17, June 19–24, and June 26–July 1, 2018.

Headlining the cast are German soprano Evelyn Herlitzius who makes her U.S. debut as Brünnhilde and American tenor Daniel Brenna who makes his San Francisco Opera debut as Siegfried. The cast also includes bass-baritone Greer Grimsely as Wotan, soprano Karita Mattila as Sieglinde, tenor Brandon Jovanovich as Siegmund, bass-baritone Falk Struckmann as Alberich, mezzosoprano Jamie Barton as Fricka, tenor David Cangelosi as Mime, tenor Štefan Margita as Loge, baritone Brian Mulligan as Gunther, and bass Andrea Silvestrelli as Hagen. Donald Runnicles, General Music Director of the Deutsche Oper Berlin, returns to lead the San Francisco Opera Orchestra and Chorus.

San Francisco Opera has a storied history with Wagner's *Ring* cycle which goes back eight decades. For this co-production with Washington National Opera, director Francesca Zambello uses imagery from various eras of American history to illuminate Wagner's legend in which human virtue and nature's sanctuary fall prey to greed and lust.

"The *Ring* is always contemporary. We are presenting a world in some ways familiar to our audience but also one that will feel very mythic as we look to our country's rich imagery," says Zambello. "The great themes of the *Ring*—nature, power, and corruption—resound through America's past and haunt our present."

Antonacci stars in La Voix humaine

San Francisco Opera audiences will never forget her tour-de-force performances in summer 2015's productions of *Les Troyens* and *Two Women*. Italian soprano sensation Anna Caterina Antonacci returns to the Company in March for Francis Poulenc's riveting monodrama *La Voix humaine* at the Diane B. Wilsey Center for Opera.

Told exclusively from the point of view of a woman breaking up with her lover over the phone, La Voix humaine combines Poulenc's urbane music with a libretto by Jean Cocteau. Antonacci has performed the opera to raves, including at New York's Alice Tully Hall where she was praised by the New York Times for a hot-blooded portrayal, "alternately cajoling, charming, frantic, and exhausted."

In San Francisco, Antonacci will pair the opera with a selection of French art songs. This intimate, unique program—part of SF Opera Lab's Season Two—will take place at the Wilsey Center's Taube Atrium Theater on Saturday, March 11; Tuesday, March 14; and Friday, March 17. Notes from the General Director

Making San Francisco A Better City

Something very powerful has happened over the past year. For the first time ever in San Francisco's history, a consortium of arts organizations, ranging from large companies like ours to small community-based artist collectives, has formed a powerful, unified alliance dedicated to improving public arts funding in San Francisco and making San Francisco a better city for us all.

I am so inspired by the energy, passion, and dedication that have characterized this consortium. The arts in San Francisco now have a unified vision and energy. The arts have a powerful story to tell in this dynamically changing city.

Arts funding in San Francisco has, for most of the last fifty years, come through the Hotel Tax Fund. In 1961, the Hotel Tax was established with a very elegant logic: tourists staying in hotels should make a small investment in the culture that so attracts people to our city. Part of the early Hotel Tax Fund was also allocated to low-income housing, recognizing the nuanced push-pull between expanded tourism and strained housing prices. This smart hotel tax model went on to be copied by many other cities. San Francisco's Hotel Tax Fund provided robust, growing revenues to the arts and culture but, in 2010, the city began to freeze the cultural allocations and, in 2013, removed them altogether from the more protected security of the Hotel Tax.

More than 70 San Francisco arts and homelessness organizations have now formed an extraordinary group passionately dedicated to improving the quality of life in San Francisco by reaffirming the original purposes of the Hotel Tax. The measure does not increase the tax, but merely ensures it funds two critical areas: the arts and ending family homelessness. We have received endorsements from a broad swath of important supporters, and we learned recently that there will be no formal opposition on the ballot. We are Proposition S, and the message is simple: "Yes on S"!

The Hotel Tax has seen exponential increases in recent years, from \$170 million in 2005 to an expected \$440 million in 2017. Proposition S looks to allocate only half of the projected future growth in the Hotel Tax, thus mitigating the impact on other city

services. Funding increases would be phased in for the next four years, gradually restoring funding to more historic levels for a number of arts-related city agencies. New programs would also be established to ensure a diverse and vibrant engagement with the arts for all city neighborhoods, bringing programming to families and children in areas like Bay View and Central Market who have been historically underserved.

Proposition S will provide critically needed support for organizations of all sizes, whether San Francisco Opera or the Community Music Center in the Tenderloin. Many of these organizations are struggling to remain in the city.

Your participation will be critical to the success of Proposition S. Through your advocacy, your vote, and your generosity, you can help make a once-in-a-generation investment in the arts in San Francisco. Here are a few ways you can participate:

- 1. Vote "Yes on S" by mail or in person by November 8! Be a part of this historic movement to restore and secure funding for the vibrant arts community that so fundamentally defines this great city. We need a two-thirds majority to win, so your participation on Election Day is critical.
- 2. Spread the word. These arts organizations belong to you, the residents of the Bay Area. Help us encourage awareness and support for Proposition S with your friends, family and colleagues. You can find more information at bettersf.com.

This is an unprecedented chance to change the face of arts funding in one of the most culturally important cities in the world. You can play a crucial role in securing the future health of the arts in San Francisco. We are united as an arts sector, and we hope that you, our audiences, will unite in strong support of Proposition S.

Get Involved with Opera CUE

San Francisco Opera's family and community programs have expanded with the February 2016 opening of the Diane B. Wilsey Center for Opera. Located next door to the War Memorial Opera House on the fourth floor of the Veterans Building, the Wilsey Center has provided more opportunities—and space—for the San Francisco Opera Education Department to serve a greater number of Bay Area residents.

Under the new programming arm of Opera CUE (Community. Understanding. Engagement.), the Education Department presented the ARIA Festival on April 30, 2016, an all-day open house for students, educators, and the public. Featuring performances of original student works, workshops, and other activities, the event attracted over 550 children and adults and fully utilized the John M. Bryan Education Studio and state-of-the-art Dianne and Tad Taube Atrium Theater.

Opera CUE also hosted the following programs at the Bryan Education Studio in Spring 2016: CarTUNE Afternoon screenings of classic cartoons filled with classical music; Exploration Workshops for families with children ages seven and older; Overture Workshops for adults; and First Act Workshops with storytelling, movement, music and visual arts for families and children ages six and under. Furthermore, free Opera in an Hour film screenings for opera lovers young and old were screened in the Wilsey Center's Taube Atrium Theater.

All together in the spring of 2016, Opera CUE engaged over 2,000 community members at the Wilsey Center.

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SAN FRANCISCO **OPERA** Profile Geoffry Craig Head of Wardrobe Department



"It's all about the details" says Geoffry Craig who has been the head of the Company's wardrobe department since 1986. "We check every garment, every closure, every hem, every time. That's the job." The magnificent illusion presented onstage at the War Memorial Opera House is possible due to the organizational acumen and thoroughness of Craig and his staff who

dress hundreds of soloists, chorus members, and supernumeraries each season.

Wardrobe is altogether separate from the costume department. Craig explains the difference: "The costume shop creates and fits the costumes on all of the performers. Once the costumes arrive in the theater, they become the responsibility of the wardrobe department. Generally the costumes arrive the day before the first dress rehearsal. We literally unpack the show, read the run-list, and put it onstage."

In 1981, a friend who knew that Craig had experience dressing performers at the Pasadena Playhouse asked if he would like to work on the Company's ambitious new production of *Aida* with Margaret Price in the title role and Luciano Pavarotti as Radames. As things sometimes go in the theater, someone canceled, and Craig was called upon to make his "debut" earlier than expected, dressing *comprimario* singers in the Company premiere of Lehár's *The Merry Widow* with Joan Sutherland.

He emotionally recalls the first principal singer he dressed: Italo Tajo as the Sacristan in *Tosca*. "He was just extremely gracious," says Craig. "He was probably in his late 60s when he was here. He literally did everything for himself. He was old school: did his own makeup, pretty much dressed himself. It is just one of those memories of working with someone really special."

Rather than manage the artists, Craig now manages the dressers. He takes pride when his team is acknowledged, especially by the artists who rely on them. "You create this relationship with the artist; they depend on you. It's a trust position," he says,

"You're in the room with them and you're dealing with confidentiality. Part of the job is being a confidant."

Another major aspect of the job is managing the details and logistics of costume changes, minor repairs, and keeping each outfit intact for an opera that will be performed many times over several weeks in repertory. "We have an inventory of every item that is sup-

posed to appear on stage, and it is our responsibility to make sure that each item is there when it's needed." Underwear is the responsibility of the performer, but each layer of clothing on top of that is assisted by the dresser who follows the inventory. Costumes are pre-arranged on the rack so that dresser and performer can negotiate costume changes quickly and without having to wonder if they remembered everything or left out any details. Leaving nothing to chance, Craig and his team work to achieve the director's vision, ensure the performer's comfort, and make each performance look extraordinary and breathtaking.

"Some performers depend on the costume to get into the character. The structure of the garment, in some cases, determines their movements on stage," says Craig. "If the performer is comfortable in the role, the costume only adds to their performance. If they are uncomfortable in the role, it doesn't matter what you do, because the costume is going to be an issue."

When asked if there were any productions during his tenure that tested the limits of his foolproof organizational system, Craig did not hesitate: "War and Peace. There were 135 supernumerary men in the show—the Russian and French armies! We had to dress them in the Zellerbach rehearsal space and then march them in formation to the opera house and out onto the stage." How about Wagner's Ring? "With Siegfried, it's seven costumes and a bear," he says. "The only show that is really big is Götterdämmerung and it is huge!"

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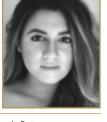

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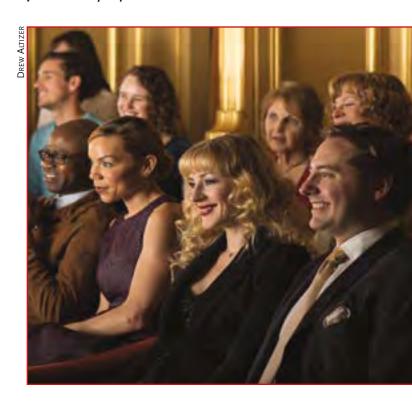

nce again, the unprecedented generosity of Cynthia and John Gunn has set the stage for a dazzling season at San Francisco Opera. Since 2002, when John joined the Opera Board, the couple has underwritten numerous productions and provided exceptional support for many of the Company's innovative endeavors.

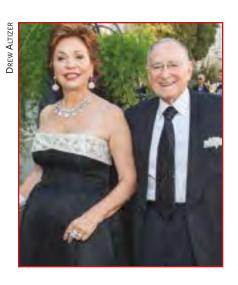

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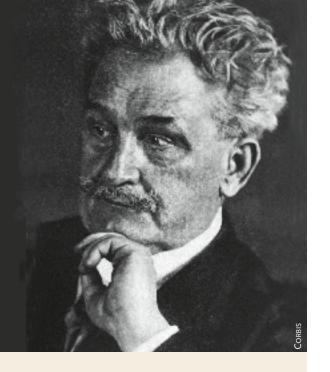

VĚC MAKROPULOS

More than 300 years ago, an alchemist named Makropulos was employed by the Habsburg Emperor Rudolf II to create an elixir to give the Emperor eternal life. Not trusting Makropulos' finished potion, the Emperor forced him to administer it to his own daughter, Elina. When she became seriously ill, Makropulos was put in prison, but Elina eventually recovered and escaped. What was not apparent at the time was that the elixir actually worked, granting Elina some 300 additional years of life. During the time that she has lived, Elina has had many identities, many names (always with the initials E.M.), and many affairs. One of her more passionate affairs was with Baron Josef Ferdinand Prus, by whom she had a son. While Prus left his estate in writing to this illegitimate son, the will has long gone missing and there has ensued a century-long dispute between two branches of the family, Gregor and Prus, over rights to the estate.

ACT

At Dr. Kolenaty's law office in Prague, the clerk Vítek is filing papers concerning the long-standing case of Gregor v. Prus. Albert Gregor, the plaintiff, enters to inquire about the case's progress, followed shortly by Vítek's daughter, Kristina. She is a voice student and speaks enthusiastically about the great prima donna, Emilia Marty.

Kolenatý enters his office with none other than Emilia Marty. She has come to learn about the Gregor v. Prus case and displays a remarkable knowledge of it. Marty claims that Baron "Pepi" Prus, who was believed to have died childless in 1827, was in fact the father of Ferdinand Gregor, whose mother was the famous singer Ellian MacGregor. (As this could not be proven at the time of the death of Pepi Prus, the Prus estate passed to a cousin.) Marty claims to know of documents in the vaults of the current Baron Prus that will settle the matter conclusively. Kolenatý does not believe her and cannot imagine how she could know this information, but Gregor insists that he look into the matter.

After Kolenatý has left, Gregor offers Marty a reward if this information helps him to win his case. She scorns his offer of money but asks if he might procure for her a sealed envelope that she knows to be among the papers in Prus' vault. Kolenatý returns along with Baron Prus, having found Pepi's will, his love letters to Ellian MacGregor, and the sealed envelope. Prus points out that it is still necessary to produce written proof that Ferdinand MacGregor was indeed the son of Pepi Prus before Gregor can legally claim the disputed property. Marty announces that she can produce this, and leaves the men astonished once again.

ACT II

After a performance, a stagehand and a cleaning woman discuss Marty's singing. Prus comes backstage looking for Marty, and Kristina and Janek (Kristina's sweetheart and the son of Prus) enter, as well as Gregor and Vítek who come to congratulate the singer. Marty's directness insults Janek and Gregor, yet when the half-senile Hauk-Šendorf enters and remarks on how much she reminds him of his love of fifty years past, the Spanish dancer Eugenia Montez, Marty speaks to him in Spanish and accepts him with open arms. Exhausted, she dismisses everyone but Prus who proceeds to question her about other documents and love letters he has found in his vaults. He notes that since the love letters to Pepi Prus are only signed with the initials "E.M.," it cannot be proven that Ellian MacGregor was indeed Ferdinand Gregor's mother. Furthermore, he reveals that his mother gave her name as Elina Makropulos at Ferdinand's baptism; Marty is astonished that Prus is on the trail of her true identity. She then realizes that the signed proof she sent Kolenatý, confirming that Ferdinand Gregor was the son of Ellian MacGregor, is not valid. Desperate for the sealed envelope in Prus' possession, Marty asks him to name his price for it, but he does not respond to her offer and leaves.

Gregor makes protestations of love to Marty, but in exhaustion she falls asleep. Gregor leaves and Marty awakens to find Janek

staring at her in fascination. She asks him to steal the sealed envelope from his father, and he agrees. Prus catches them, dismisses Janek, and agrees to give her the document in exchange for a night of love.

ACT III

It is early morning and Marty and Prus are in her hotel room. Marty demands the sealed envelope from him, and he angrily gives it to her. A maid enters and explains that Prus' servant is downstairs with a message. He hurries out and returns with the news that his son, Janek, has just killed himself out of love for Marty. She coldly remarks that lots of people kill themselves and Prus leaves in a rage. Hauk-Šendorf enters ready to take Marty to Spain with him. Marty agrees and begins to pack, but they are interrupted by the arrival of Kolenatý, Gregor, Kristina, Prus, and Vítek. Kolenatý, suspicious that Marty is a fraud, produces the letter she sent him claiming to be from Ellian MacGregor, noting that it is in the same handwriting as that of Marty herself. Marty excuses herself, and while she is away, they search her personal belongings and discover correspondence bearing various names: Emilia Marty, Ellian MacGregor, Eugenia Montez, Elsa Mueller, Ekaterina Myshkin, and Elina Makropulos.

Marty returns with a bottle of whisky, which gives her courage to confess her real identity: she is actually Elina Makropulos, born in Crete in 1575. To the disbelief of everyone in the room, she explains how her father was made to administer the longevity potion to her as a child. She has lived ever since, in different countries under different names, but now feels her strength failing and requires the formula (the sealed envelope) to rejuvenate herself. She collapses and upon reviving realizes that she does not want the potion after all, for her life has been marked by boredom and loneliness. She offers the formula to Kristina and sinks happily into death.

Unraveling THE MAKROPULOS CASE

ome mysteries are more puzzling than others. At first encounter, the secrets of The Makropulos Case appear buried as deeply as the secret its enigmatic heroine conceals until the final moments. The audience shares in the guesswork of those who try to grasp Emilia Marty's intentions until, like them, we stand awed before her revelation, grateful for our mortality even as we dread its approach. No one can leave The Makropulos Case unmoved. Yet, overwhelming as the opera's final ten numinous minutes may be, Janáček intended his conclusion not as a stand-alone episode, but as the drama's culmination. If his purpose is not more immediately apparent than Emilia's, the reason lies in a plot revealed less by onstage action than by conversation, and also in the subtlety of Janáček's technique. In fact, The Makropulos Case unfolds in a continuous trajectory, its profundities delivered so deftly we may fail to recognize them until we realize we are engulfed. This mystery is about ourselves.

In 1922, Janáček attended a Prague performance of a new play by Karel Čapek—Věc Makropulos, to use the Czech title, Věc meaning case or affair, or even thing. Čapek (1890–1938) enlisted science fiction to ponder philosophical questions. In an earlier drama, the dystopian R.U.R. (in which he coined the word "robot"), automatons revolt against their inventors, who engineered their mechanical assistants to free themselves from the petty work that stands between humans and greatness. Here, by almost a century, Čapek anticipates and challenges the argument that artificial intelligence and singularity will ensure human perfection. For Čapek believed in human

limitations, and he re-asserts that creed in *Věc Makropulos*, exposing the age-old quest for eternal life as a pointless exercise. In *Back to Methuselah*, which also premiered in 1922, the same year as *Věc Makropulos*, Bernard Shaw argued that an extended lifespan would advance civilization. Čapek arrived at a different conclusion. Removing life's endpoint, he suggests, erases the impetus to live. In Čapek's play, Janáček spotted material for an opera.

Janáček understood elixirs of youth. In 1917, at age 63, after years in a marriage whose trials had long since displaced its rewards, he fell desperately in love with Kamila Stösslová, a married woman almost four decades his junior. With Kamila he maintained an impassioned, mostly one-sided, and (it is believed) purely emotional affair, conducted mainly through hundreds of letters, and ending only with his death in 1928. Kamila inflamed him with a renewed sense of his possibilities, and from that confidence came most of his greatest music.

Čapek, surprised that Janáček wished to set a play filled with little action and much talk, nonetheless gave the go-ahead and told Janáček he was free to refashion the story. The composer himself crafted the libretto, reworking it three times, turning Čapek's bitter comedy into a meditation on life and death. He also cut some of the connective tissue that helps theater viewers navigate the plot. To an English-language audience approaching the work with no help besides a supertitle translation, Janáček's opera can be a tough case to crack.

So tough that *The Makropulos Case*, completed in 1925 and first staged the next year (in Brno, capital of Janáček's native

Backstory, Part 2: Early in the 19th century, as the opera singer Ellian MacGregor, Elina fell in love with the Bohemian nobleman Josef Prus and bore him a son, Ferdinand Gregor (surname borrowed from "MacGregor"), who was to inherit the Prus estate. On his deathbed, the delirious Baron Prus named another heir. Finding no written will, the Prus family challenged Ferdinand Gregor's claim.

The opera is set in Prague, early in the 20th century. The Gregor-Prus lawsuit is still an ongoing battle, waged by the families' descendants, Albert Gregor and Jaroslav Prus. The diva Emilia Marty, a cold-hearted and cynical beauty, takes unusual interest in the suit and somehow knows its details—including the location of the baron's will. She needs someone to retrieve it, for sequestered with the will is a document lent to the baron, but which he never used: the elixir's formula. Marty knows all this because she is in fact Elina Makropulos—aka Ellian MacGregor, among others. (That she was 16 when she drank the potion guaranteeing her 300 more years and now claims her age as 337 is a detail best overlooked.) Desperate for the potion to extend her life, she feels her past overtaking her. In Gregor and Prus, who are intrigued by her beauty, and in the young lovers Kristina and Janek, she encounters emotions she can no longer feel. She has been corroded by the years. Having exhausted her desire to continue, she relinquishes her hold on the formula, at last reclaiming her humanity by succumbing to it and its inevitable consequence.

Whether the aging composer was coming to terms with his own mortality here is an open question. What we do know is that Janáček worked at a high level of Kamila-inspired intensity ("I wrote like a machine!") as he brought the Byzantine scenario to life with

the power of his mature style, by turns angular and lyrical, always radiant and stripped of sentimentality. This opera is a study in how music transforms words, making even a prosaic text resonate.

The Act I introduction opens with a nervous ostinato in winds, trumpets, timpani, and low strings. Over this, we hear the first identifiable melodic line, a sighing, minor-mode theme. Its mood is apprehensive, but its shape foreshadows the consoling Act III chorale that will dispel the opera's many tensions. Alternating with this anxious music is a second theme, lyrical and full-bodied, its contours and spirit anticipating the Act III transition to the conclusion, played there *forte* over pounding timpani. Between these two themes comes a curious fanfare for offstage brass. We will hear fanfares again, always associated with Emilia Marty's beginnings, back in the court of Emperor Rudolf.

Janáček enlivens the most routine passages. Listen as, early in Act I, the brisk orchestral underpinning keeps the action moving while the lawyer Dr. Kolenatý explains the suit *Gregor contra Prus*. Given the composer's characteristic attention to the rhythms of language, we can almost forget the characters are singing, so closely do their musical phrases mimic speech.

The real magic of Janáček's musical structure is found in the correspondences he establishes across the opera's span. Early in Act II, Marty asks if Kristina and Janek have been "to heaven" yet. Have they made love? Contemptuous, she all but spits out the question. Then, as Marty assures Kristina that sex is not worth the effort, Janáček introduces a sad, six-note figure. Here it is associated with Emilia's ennui. Minutes later it becomes a quirky, off-center tune that underscores the randy joie de vivre of Hauk, who

recognizes Emilia from the days when she was the Spanish dancer Eugenia Montez, his lost love. In Act III, the "ennui" figure recurs as Emilia tells Gregor she has arrived at her end, and again as the name *Elina Makropulos* is uttered. Then, at "there's nothing more," the theme transforms into a wistful melody so filled with dramatic potential that it can be translated into the last thing we hear in this opera, a final reaffirming statement as Emilia dies, having regained her identity as Elina.

Janáček's tight thematic web, though not obvious, is part of his music's fascination. One motif generates another. For his purposes, Janáček said, Wagnerian leitmotif "has not sufficient resource and flexibility within itself to reveal the constantly changing emotions and motives of the character[s]." Flexibility. Few things here are repeated just as they first appear. Those fanfares that recall the days of Rudolf II are exceptions. Often they are repeated literally, for what is past objects to editing. Yet as Emilia reaches her final moments, entering new territory, the fanfares evolve. Now they sound in the strings and orchestral brass, their intensity building until manic strings alone take over. The brass rejoins them. Then all is swept away by the broad, organ-toned orchestral affirmation, punctuated by trumpet flourishes, as the ennui theme transfigures into the greatest of the opera's fanfares. It announces we have come full circle and heralds our arrival, with Elina Makropulos, at the end.

Charles Mackerras (San Francisco Opera Principal Guest Conductor from 1993 to 1996) championed Janáček and recorded *The Makropulos Case* twice. His Decca recording, made with the Vienna Philharmonic, is sung in Czech and features Elisabeth Söderström as Emilia Marty. This is currently available for download at deccaclassics.com and is also part of a multi-disc set that includes four other Janáček operas (minus libretti).

Mackerras' later Chandos recording, a production of the English National Opera, features Cheryl Barker as Marty. This is sung in English, a helpful way of getting to know the opera, though English fails to convey the elegance of Janáček's setting. In a recorded interview that fills out the second disc (of two discs), Mackerras discusses his relationship with Janáček's operas and speaks about *Makropulos*.



NADJA MICHAEL REVEALED



itting next to soprano Nadja Michael, you can actually feel the electricity emanating from her. It's an apt sensation from an artist renowned for her searing performances as Lady Macbeth, Kundry, Judith in Bluebeard's Castle, and Salome—the latter of which she performed in San Francisco in 2009 to ecstatic praise. In conversation, you discover that Michael's life story is as gripping as her dramatic portrayals on stage.

Born and raised in former East Germany, she was smuggled to the West in the trunk of a car during the final months of the Iron Curtain. Trained afterward in Stuttgart and at Indiana University, she began her career as a contralto before discovering that her voice and dramatic sense were better suited for some of the biggest and most challenging roles in the operatic repertoire.

Emilia Marty in Janáček's *The Makropulos Case* is one such role. Michael finds the tortured, perennially youthful heroine not only intellectually stimulating but also extraordinarily moving.

As the youngest of five children, you grew up in a village ten miles outside of Leipzig. Can you describe what your childhood was like, living during the time of a very repressive regime?

It's true, it was repressive. But when you are little, it's your parents who suffer from that. We as children lived out our lives and would take our bikes and spend time in the woods. We had to work every weekend in the fields with our parents, but it was also fun. Beautiful, really. My parents though had a really tough time as my father was not a conformist.

After the Second World War, my grandmother was put in prison, not because she was a criminal, but because she was denounced for being associated with some wealthy people—which wasn't even true. So she was in prison and then she came out. Near that same time, my father was already married to my mother, my brother was born, and they put my father in prison for two years. As a result, neither my father, nor my siblings nor I could get permission to study at a university.

Since I was three years old, my dream was singing. It was not because of education, not because of strong cultural surroundings. I come from a very simple background, but I inherited the love of music from my mother. My mother loved popular music, and sang in an amateur chorus. We had also LPs of choral music and Bach. We hadn't been educated in this but we were listening to it; it was beautiful, those pure voices. And we had an accordion and piano.

I used to do a lot of sports until I was 14, including competitive swimming. And then my parents took me out of this sports school. My parents saw what it would turn into. They saw the Olympic swimmers; they saw them looking and talking like men. My parents didn't want that. I was actually very sad, because I didn't understand. But later I saw that it wasn't my way. I took that as an opportunity to apply for a school which taught music education to children. And there I began voice training.

At what point in your teens did you decide to defect?

I'm a free spirit by nature. And when you get older, you want to be creative, experiment, be different. You start to question things and the world all of a sudden becomes very small. The directive under communism was to never stick out—just be gray. In sports you can stick out, but nothing else, including art, philosophy, and science. For me it was clear at a rather early age that I needed to get perspective.

At 16 I went to Budapest with a friend of mine, and there I got to know a woman from Frankfurt am Main. Her husband, Tony, was Hungarian but grew up in England. He was interested in us girls from East Germany and how life is there. He and his wife really opened my mind. "We will help you... you can come to West Germany if you like," they said. I went back to Budapest a half year later, but this time, with my boyfriend for the final departure from Budapest to Vienna. The both of us were smuggled in the trunk of a Wartburg [an East German manufactured car], driven by a Hungarian whose father was a diplomat. In those days, no one really had cars.

You eventually settled in Stuttgart where you continued to study voice and received positive notices from scholarship committees and voice coaches. What were those early years of finding your voice like?

I would say it was a natural progression. My voice had always been a big voice. It was never fulfilling to be in the lyric repertoire. I always had a huge vocal range—very low, very high, but I just could not yet use the top in the manner of a dramatic soprano; I was too young. You have to have the endurance and the conditioning. At the time, people were saying, "Finally you will be Elektra, but now, you better sing this, this, and this." During those earlier years, I did all the mezzo repertoire you can imagine, including a lot of Dalilas and Ebolis.

When you listen to many of the high dramatic sopranos of the past such as Gwyneth Jones and Eva Marton, they have this similar range: the very low voice based in the middle and then a dramatic top. It's really not my choice of repertoire; the repertoire has chosen me because of certain needs of the voice.

After Stuttgart you came to this country to study at Indiana University. Can you describe that time of transition?

At first, I didn't sleep for a couple of months. I became very thin because I was so excited to be there in Bloomington. In this country, I love that people want to make life easy for you in a good way; they are polite and make compliments. People are so aware that we are all here together and everybody has their burdens, so why not be as nice to each other as possible. There is a lot of generosity in the U.S., and you love big voices. And that was for me, amazing. Because in Germany, it was, "Okay, so she has a big voice." In Bloomington, it was, "WOW! She has a big voice!"

A big voice and a very wide repertoire that currently encompasses Shostakovich's Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk, Cassandre and Didon

in Les Troyens, and Tosca. What new roles are you learning? Is there a Brünnhilde in your future?

I'm leading to that! I just debuted as Ortrud [in *Lohengrin*] with Anna Netrebko and conductor Valery Gergiev. Now I will do Isolde and Elektra with Gergiev. And after Isolde comes Brünnhilde.

Let's turn our attention to Emilia Marty in *The Makropulos Case*. What does this particular role mean to you?

First of all, for me, Janáček's music is just out of heaven. What makes *Makropulos Case* so exceptional, is of course that it has no real arias. It's a conversation piece—even more so than in other Janáček operas. Until the very last scene, there's a lot of *parlando* or speaking style of singing with some segments of phrases. But when the final scene comes, it really hits. There are long phrases, very dramatic and subtle at the same time. And very deep.

Second, the opera's topic is extremely modern, because it is not only the question about eternity and its costs. I see even more the debate about the position of a woman in society. Director Olivier Tambosi and I have had a long discussion about how to play a 300-year-old woman who has acquired so much wisdom and experience but has also had to detach herself from many aspects of what makes us human. From the very first moment Emilia Marty enters the stage, all the men are hitting on her. And why? Because she is strong. They feel that there is an extra skill

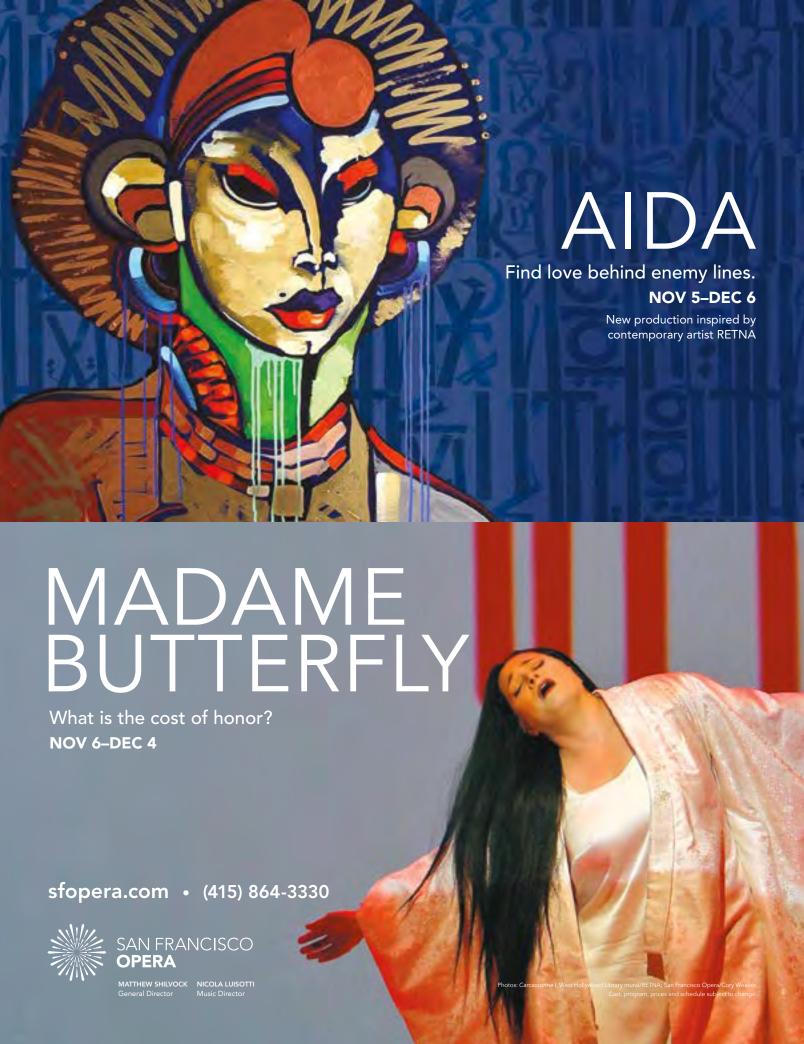
somehow, there is something, and that mirrors society in a spooky way to me.

Janáček was a feminist. He loved the heroines in his operas and experiencing their difficulties in a male-dominated society. How do women survive? What difficulties and transitions do they have to face? What does age mean? What does giving birth mean? Here in *Makropulos Case*, Emilia becomes a vehicle for higher truth. In the end she becomes a higher human being, because she has suffered all wounds imaginable and, at the same time, that makes her so sympathetic. I love her, because she has lived everything. Nothing can surprise her.

And she has had 300 years to perfect her vocal technique—every singer's dream! What are the vocal demands for this role? Is stamina its biggest requirement, saving just enough energy for the final scene, Emilia's apotheosis?

Actually, I think it is the language. The Czech language requires a lot of concentration, and Janáček's music isn't Mozart; it requires a lot of concentration to be in sync with the conductor. I have to concentrate so much on the words and meaning and music, I have to count at a certain point.

Maybe that's why I don't think of preserving energy, because it just happens naturally. I go into the part, and then the part just takes over.



ARTIST PROFILES



MIKHAIL TATARNIKOV (St. Petersburg, Russia) Conductor Making his San Francisco Opera debut as conductor of The Makropulos

Case, Mikhail Tatarnikov was appointed musical director and principal conductor of the Mikhailovsky Theatre, one of Russia's oldest opera halls, in 2012. Tatarnikov made his debut as a conductor at St. Petersburg's Mariinsky Theatre in 2006 with the premiere of the ballet Metaphysics set to Prokofiev's Second Symphony. In 2007, he conducted his first opera, a new production of Prokofiev's The Love for Three Oranges. He has subsequently conducted a wide range of operas and concerts. In past seasons, he has conducted at Teatro alla Scala, Bavarian State Opera, Théâtre Royale de la Monnaie, Opéra de Bordeaux, Latvian National Opera, Bergen Opera, Komische Oper Berlin, and the Mariinsky Theatre, including Russia's first-ever performance of *Billy Budd*. Future operas include Manon Lescaut at Deutsche Oper Berlin, The Gambler at Opéra de Monte-Carlo, concerts with the Seoul Philharmonic and Seattle Symphony, and concert performances of The Demon at La Monnaie, the St. Petersburg Philharmonic, and the Mikhailovsky Orchestra.



NADJA MICHAEL (Leipzig, Germany) Emilia Marty Born and raised in former East Germany, soprano Nadja Michael emigrated to the West soon after leaving school

and studied singing in Stuttgart and at Indiana University Bloomington. She has risen to international prominence in leading theaters, including Munich's Bavarian State Opera; Vienna State Opera; Royal Opera House, Covent Garden; Théâtre Royale de la Monnaie in Brussels; Teatro San Carlo in Naples; Deutsche Oper Berlin; Teatro al Fenice in Venice; Théâtre du Capitole in Toulouse; Arena di Verona; and at the Glyndebourne and Salzburg Festivals. Her repertoire

includes some of the most challenging roles for a dramatic soprano: the title role of Médée: Leonore in Fidelio: Marietta in Die Tote Stadt; the title role of Tosca; Cassandre and Didon in Les Troyens; and the title role of Salome. In 2009, Michael made her American and San Francisco Opera debuts as Salome. She then returned to La Monnaie as Iphigénie in Iphigénie en Tauride. Michael sang Elisabeth and Venus in Tannhäuser at the Deutsche Oper Berlin and appeared as Salome in Hamburg. In June 2010 she starred in the title role of the Bavarian State Opera's new production of Mayr's rarely performed Medea in Corinto. In 2011 she made her debut as Marie in Wozzeck at Berlin State Opera. Recent engagements include Judith in Bluebeard's Castle at the Metropolitan Opera; Emilia Marty at the Bavarian State Opera; Lady Macbeth in Verdi's Macbeth in Amsterdam; and Ortrud in Lohengrin at the Mariinsky Theatre. Later this season, Michael returns to the Bolshoi to sing the title role of Shostakovich's Katerina Izmailova. She will also perform Salome in Stockholm and the title role of Elektra in Naples.



CHARLES WORKMAN (Little Rock, Arkansas) Albert Gregor Making his San Francisco Opera debut, Charles Workman is a

versatile artist whose early career saw him in the forefront of Rossini and Mozart tenors and who has more recently garnered praise for his performances in dramatic and Heldentenor roles, as well as in early music, French repertory, and 20th-century and contemporary music. Following initial debuts at the Metropolitan Opera, Workman moved to Europe in 1995 where he has performed to great success with the leading opera companies and orchestras including the Paris Opéra, London's Royal Opera, Covent Garden; Milan's Teatro alla Scala, Moscow's Bolshoi, Madrid's Teatro Real. Deutsche Oper Berlin, and the companies of Geneva, Zurich, Lyon, Munich, and Prague. Upcoming engagements include The Drum Major in Wozzeck for Geneva; Nobile in Thomas Adès' The

Exterminating Angel for Covent Garden; Edmund in Lear for Salzburg Festival; various roles in Jeanne d'Arc au bûcher in Madrid; and Bacchus in Ariadne auf Naxos and Skuratov in From the House of the Dead for Munich's Bavarian State Opera.



STEPHEN POWELL (West Chester, Pennsylvania) Baron Jaroslav Prus Baritone Stephen Powell made his San Francisco Opera debut in 2007 as Sharpless in Madama

Butterfly, a role he has performed with New York City Opera, San Diego Opera, Los Angeles Opera, Arizona Opera, and New Orleans Opera. He most recently appeared with the Company in 2010 as De Guiche in Cyrano de Bergerac. Last season, Powell returned to Opera Philadelphia as Giorgio Germont in La Traviata. Minnesota Opera as Scarpia in Tosca, and Michigan Opera Theatre in his first performances as the title role of Macbeth. He was also soloist in the world premiere of a work by Jonathan Leshnoff with the Kansas City Symphony. The American baritone's other recent credits include Germont with Los Angeles Opera, Arizona Opera, and New Orleans Opera; Figaro in Il Barbiere di Siviglia with Hawaii Opera; Miller in Luisa Miller with the Cincinnati May Festival; and Count Almaviva in Le Nozze di Figaro with Indianapolis Opera and Opera Company of North Carolina. Powell's roles with the Metropolitan Opera have included Ping in Turandot and Shchelkalov in Boris Godunov. Other career highlights include Jokanaan in Salome and the title role of Eugene Onegin with Cleveland Opera; Marcello in La Bohème with Lyric Opera of Chicago and in concert with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra; Valentin in Faust with Opera Philadelphia; Giorgio Germont with Portland Opera and Utah Opera; and Guglielmo in Così fan tutte with Florida Grand Opera, the San Diego Opera, and at the Teatro Municipal in Rio de Janeiro. Future engagements include Germont at Seattle Opera and San Diego, as well as Oliver Jordan in the world premiere of William Bolcom's Dinner at Eight at Minnesota Opera.

With a repertoire encompassing 50 roles in a wide variety of styles from Mozart to Strauss, Travis has been a frequent guest artist at the most prestigious opera companies in the world, including the Metropolitan Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago, Houston Grand Opera, Washington National Opera, Los Angeles, Santa Fe Opera Festival, Teatro dell'Opera di Roma, Spoleto Festival USA, Saito Kinen Music Festival, Teatro Regio in Torino, Teatro Carlo Felice in Genoa, Berlin Komische Oper, and the New Israeli Opera in Tel Aviv. Last season, he performed the roles of the Music Master in Ariadne auf Naxos with Minnesota Opera, Sacristan in Tosca with the Dallas Opera, Frank in Die Fledermaus with the Seiji Ozawa Music Academy, and La Gazza Ladra and La Bohème both with the Glimmerglass Festival. This summer, Travis will return to San Francisco Opera as Benoît and Alcindoro in La Bohème. Future engagements include a return to the Dallas Opera for La Traviata and the role of Doctor Bartolo in The Barber of Seville with Kentucky Opera.

at San Francisco Opera, American tenor Joel Sorensen made his Company debut in 2004 as The

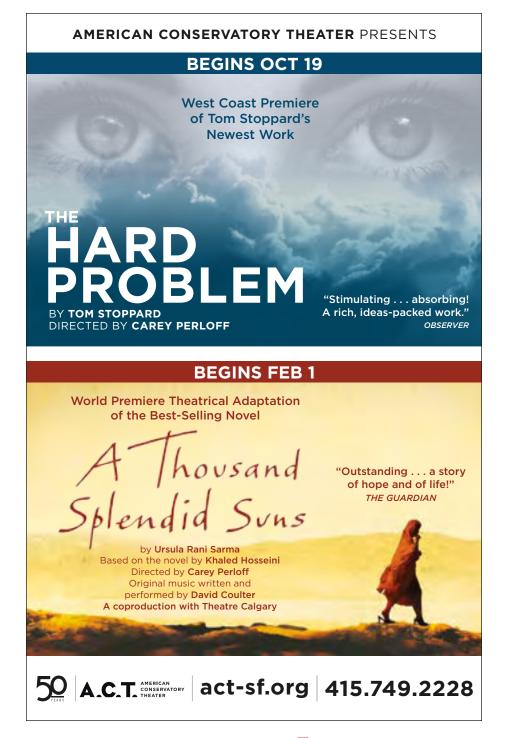

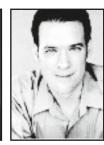
