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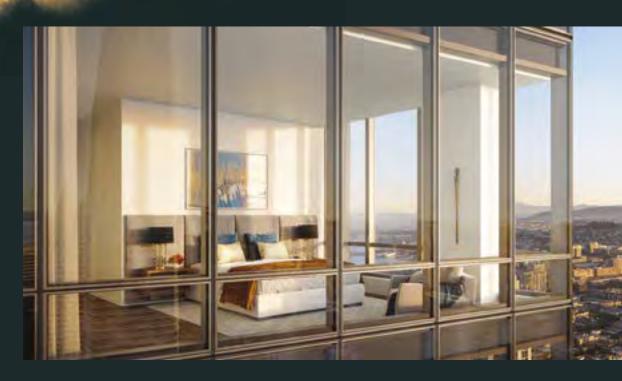
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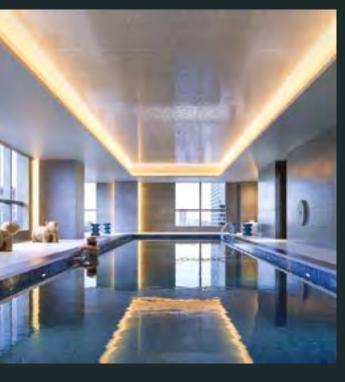
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A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD OF SAN FRANCISCO OPERA

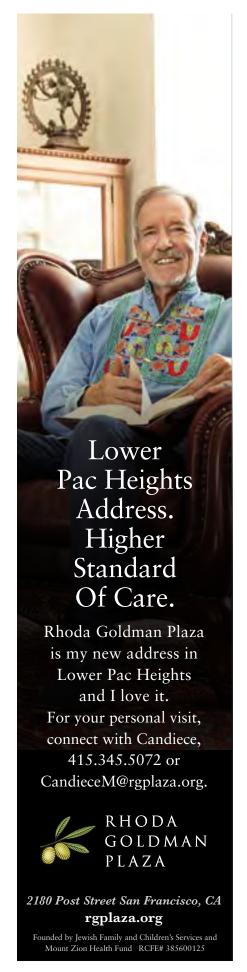

PLÁCIDO DOMINGO RETURNS OCTOBER 6

The incomparable Plácido Domingo returns to the War Memorial Opera House on Sunday, October 6 for a sold-out afternoon concert celebrating the 50th anniversary of his San Francisco Opera debut. Worldrenowned, Domingo is one of the finest and most influential singing actors in the history of opera with a repertory of 151 roles and more than 3,900 career performances. This multifaceted artist who has triumphed in both the tenor and baritone repertory, made his San Francisco Opera debut in 1969 replacing an ailing colleague as Rodolfo in Puccini's La Bohème. He appeared with the Company in over 100 performances of 14 different roles, including the lead in Alfano's Cyrano de Bergerac. His PBS telecasts from the War Memorial Opera House include L'Africaine and Samson et Dalila, and he appeared many times in concerts and recitals at the Opera House, Civic Auditorium, Stern Grove, and Golden Gate Park. In 1994, he was awarded the San Francisco Opera Medal, the Company's highest honor.

For his upcoming concert, Domingo will be under the baton of Spanish conductor Jordi Bernàcer with the San Francisco Opera Orchestra and guest artists to be announced.

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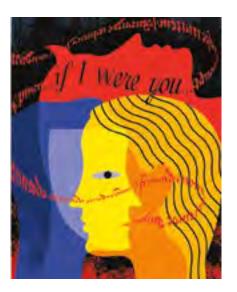

ADLER FELLOW COUNTERTENOR

or nearly four decades, San Francisco Opera Center has shepherded talented young artists toward major operatic careers. Professional opportunities sometimes arise for the artists while they are still under the wing of their mentors in the Center's programs. This was certainly the case with Merola Opera Program graduate and second-year Adler Fellow Aryeh Nussbaum Cohen. In between coachings, language classes, and other training activities, the 25-

year-old countertenor has experienced a rapid ascent, including a win at the Metropolitan Opera's National Council Auditions, Grammy Award recognition, and rave reviews for performances in opera houses, on concert stages, and even an onstage role with San Francisco Ballet.

This month, Nussbaum Cohen makes his San Francisco Opera debut as Medoro in Handel's *Orlando*. Joining the cast as a late replacement, the Brooklyn-born countertenor integrated this thrilling assignment into an already packed schedule through strict planning. "I'm very type A," he said. "For every season I have a Google spreadsheet where I mark out every piece of music I have to know, how long it is going to take to learn and coach it, and the date I need it ready for rehearsals."

The preparation has really paid off. The year began with sessions for his first solo recording followed by six weeks with Lyric Opera of Chicago for Handel's *Ariodante*. The final performance was on a Sunday, and he flew to San Francisco on Monday to begin rehearsals with San Francisco Ballet on Tuesday. After a week of rehearsals and another week of performances, he went directly into rehearsals for Handel's *Saul* with Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra. Once *Saul* wrapped up, Nussbaum Cohen began *Orlando* rehearsals. "There hasn't been much breathing time, but I

can't complain. This has truly been a dream for me."

Nussbaum Cohen feels a special kinship with his part in *Orlando*. "Medoro's affections and actions cause a lot of trouble and heartbreak for others, but he's fundamentally someone who loves very deeply and authentically. A lot of the characters in Handel's operas give the appearance of being pleasant, but they are usually scheming or playing people for political reasons. I'm excited to be portray-

ing a character who is motivated by true love."

Though he has been a singer for most of his life, the opera bug bit Nussbaum Cohen when he was an undergraduate at Princeton and won free tickets to see Puccini's *La Bohème* at the Metropolitan Opera. "The Zeffirelli production," he emphasized. "My life has never been the same."

Nussbaum Cohen feels the countertenor's high vocal range has always suited him. "As a child, I had been singing soprano and treble in children's choir and my voice dropped when I was twelve. I didn't know what a countertenor was, but I wanted to keep singing in choir so I thought that if I sang alto, I could probably still finagle and hit the notes. That's how it started, and I've just always sung in that register. I didn't really choose to be a countertenor; it kind of chose me."

As an Adler Fellow, this rising star's operatic journey has progressed rapidly through the training he has received and from just being around world-class opera in San Francisco. "I've gained so much from watching opera being made at this level and on this scale. Watching the greatest singers of our time up close as they rehearse and perform, day after day, has been a great supplement to the education I have received. What a joy and honor it has been to soak that in."

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HIDDEN MISSIRO MIDDEN MIDDEN

hen a twenty-four-year-old Beverly Sills arrived in San Francisco for her first engagement with San Francisco Opera in 1953, she went straight to the home of Gaetano Merola, unaware he had passed away suddenly while conducting at Stern Grove the day before. What was to have been an apprenticeship under the wing of an illustrious maestro became a depressing stint in a strange city. Highlights of the trip included cooking frankfurters on the radiator of a questionable Market Street hotel, and jumping in for an ailing Gerhilde, only to suffer a wardrobe malfunction of Walkürean proportions. (A helmet mishap prompted Acting Artistic Director Kurt Herbert Adler to ask her if she was drunk.) Sills returned in 1971, a star in earnest, but that bumpy beginning is exactly what today's well-strung Merola Opera Program seeks to avoid.

Enter Mark Morash, Director of Musical Studies.

Even true fans of the opera may not know the name. When a story about the Merola program or the Adler Fellows goes to press, the spokesperson cited most often is Sheri Greenawald, a vivacious former diva who serves as director of the San Francisco Opera Center, coordinating the development of all the young singers brought under the Company's auspices. But followers of these burgeoning careers know Morash well. They've enjoyed his jovial emceeing at Merola galas, and admired his artful conducting and piano playing at countless performances spanning two decades. For these devotees, Morash is equal parts fixture and blessing.

Observing him in a recent coaching, the Nova Scotiaborn Morash has a paradoxical quality, studious yet carefree, simultaneously giving the impression that every note matters intensely, and not at all. It is the nature of a coaching to stop and start, nevertheless he plays fluidly, reading music on an oversized iPad, deftly tapping his toe on an electronic page-turning device nestled beneath the piano.

An inconvenient comma begins to irritate one of the singers. "Oh that?" Morash says. "Don't worry about it. It's a mistake." (Most coaches know that scores are rife with errors. Few can tell you where they are.) A sustained note at the end of a long phrase becomes problematic. Morash appeases the singer's anxiety with a shrug. "You hold it for as long as you hold it."

Renowned collaborative pianist Martin Katz is familiar with this equanimity. "If he's stressed," Katz says, "he certainly doesn't show it, which is perhaps a prime prerequisite for working in opera. Stuff happens; Mark deals."

It was under Katz's tutelage at the University of Michigan that Morash first began to understand the niche he might occupy in the music world. It is a special talent to work well with singers, and Katz says Morash has got it. "Mark could probably charm birds out of trees, perhaps with only his smile and attitude as tools. He has an amazing ability to help people sing and play their best."

Bass-baritone Christian Pursell, a second-year Adler Fellow, agrees. Whether preparing an entire role, or a difficult passage in an audition aria, Pursell says Morash "knows the character of the piece. And he's not judgmental. If it's been a bad week and I'm behind on something, he's not mean about it. Mark really cares about each and every one of us," says Pursell, who will cover the role of Escamillo in this June's *Carmen*. "If we run into each other in the hallway, he always asks about my projects and how he can help. He's that kind of guy."

Morash exudes an unassuming, just-doing-my-job ethos that allows him to flourish in a building of creative personalities, where storms of temper may roll in as frequently as the afternoon fog. Morash brings his lunch every day, (and composts after, in large white bins that once contained pecans from the farm of the late pianist George Darden, a friend and colleague). Morash, along with his wife, Dallis, has raised two grown children. He has a dog. He likes to go to brunch. No surprise that around the opera house Morash is well liked.

His biggest admirer is Greenawald. Their friendship has stood the test of time, and travel. Morash began in 1998, Greenawald in 2002. Their schedule is grueling. January to April they're training the Adlers. May is prep time for Merola, which runs from Memorial Day to mid-August. Then it's time to get the Adlers ready for the fall season. "If there is a calm month in the Opera Center, and it doesn't ever feel very calm, it's September," Morash says. "But then the applications are coming in for Merola, and in October we go out on the road for auditions." That takes them to Thanksgiving, then on to the Adlers' "Future Is Now" concert. A couple of weeks off for Christmas, and they're ready to start the whole thing again in January.

Former San Francisco Opera General Director Kurt Herbert Adler once said, "If we can find one outstanding singer per year, that's OK. Someone who is really going to develop, who has star quality, then we have done our job."

In auditions, Greenawald listens mainly for what she

calls "the goo," i.e., the intrinsic caliber of the voice itself, while Morash, who has perfect pitch and a love of musical minutia, listens for everything else. Both listen for someone they can feel good about putting on the main stage three weeks after arrival to sing for the general director. And both keep in mind how much will be asked of the singers.

The dial has moved over the years from a theoretical pedagogy to a highly practical approach. "It's a fine line to walk when they're asked to do too much, or if they're sitting on their hands," Morash says. "These singers are racehorses. They don't get better sitting in the barn. You have to keep them challenged so they're always upping their game, without overwhelming them."

To Adler's point, they also take the long view.

"We pride ourselves on taking voices that are unconventional for a young artist program," Morash says. "It's easy to take the nice, compact voices that can execute all the musical details everybody wants. But there's somebody coming right down the pike who can do the same thing. We take voices for whom it's a longer trajectory. Otherwise there'll be nobody to sing the big roles. If it's a voice that's not going to really launch till it's forty, if the material is there, we want it."

In choosing Adlers from among the Merola, many minds come together. General Director Matthew Shil-

vock, Managing Director, Artistic, Gregory Henkel, and Head of Music Staff John Churchwell, as well as Administrative Director Chris Bragg, Greenawald, and Morash also receive input from Master Voice Teacher César Ulloa, and will in the future also have the counsel of mezzosoprano Susanne Mentzer. "In a big opera company things tend to be by committee," Morash says. Far from minding this communal aspect, it's clear Morash thrives on the social synergy that makes opera.

Morash is a Merola alum, Class of '87. For him, the summer was epiphanic. He left knowing what he wanted to do for the rest of his life. "I tell the Merola on their first day, 'If we can do for you what Merola did for me, we'll have succeeded."

"He loved the music," says soprano Janet Williams, a Merola classmate from that summer who went on to an international career and now teaches at the Hochschule für Musik in Berlin. "He's one of my favorite memories of the Merola program," she says, describing the young Morash as "serious, but fun."

Music was fun for Morash from the beginning. At three or four he was picking out melodies on the piano by ear, emulating his mother, who played favorites and accompanied sing-alongs as a regular part of the family's vibrant social life.

"As a child," Morash says, "I was not the kid practicing two hours every day, but I probably played that much or more lots of days, for enjoyment." Soon he was in demand, playing in churches and for the community.

Playing by ear is more than a parlor trick. It's a core skill for someone who must enhance a perhaps antiseptic piano score into something that the singers will recognize when they perform with the more sonorous orchestra.

Playing violin in the Nova Scotia Youth Orchestra was Morash's invitation to that world of sound. It also introduced him to "the first real musician I ever met," a Czech violinist named Jan Wicha, who had settled in Canada after fleeing the Prague Spring.

Those early years of precocity left their mark. Morash is comfortable in front of an audience, possessing his own brand of warm-hearted stage charisma and a tasteful showmanship. At a recent recital of Adler Fellows Mary Evelyn Hangley and Christopher Oglesby, he gives a short but gripping introduction to Britten's "Still Falls the Rain," describing the Blitz to evoke a vivid wartime mood. "I wanted to drop everybody in it," he tells me later, "to be ready at the downbeat." For the brief instrumental outro of Fauré's "En Sourdine," Morash's light touch allows the beauty of the music to sneak up on the audience, much like the surprising, nocturnal song of the nightingale just mentioned in the lyric.

When I arrived at his studio for our first meeting, Morash is quick to say he cannot imagine what I will find to say about him. His comment is something more than humility. It is recognition that perhaps the most significant and lasting impact he will have on the art form he so cherishes, is not the man himself, but rather his influence on the musical minds of countless singers and colleagues. It is an artistic sensibility which once passed on, will be manifest in opera houses the world over for generations to come.

On that fateful moment when Merola died at the podium, the aria being sung was "Un bel di" from *Madama Butterfly*. The exact line was "Io senza dar risposta me ne starò nascosta." *I give no answer, but remain hidden.* Like his foot moving swiftly under the piano, or the hours upon hours of preparation and encouragement he pours upon the stars of tomorrow, Morash's contribution to the opera is made mostly in modest rooms, and in micro-installments, his quotidian importance vanishing almost magically as others take the curtain call. Perhaps in the end, an essential artist like Morash is as the nightingale: at the moment of greatest glory, he remains hidden.

He joined the firm in 1972, the year he received his MBA from Stanford Business School and married Cynthia, who graduated from Stanford with an A.B. in political science in 1970. Early in her career, Cynthia was the editor and director of The Portable Stanford book series for ten years. She edited twenty-eight books by Stanford professors on a vast array of topics, including *Economic Policy Beyond the Headlines* by George Shultz and Ken Dam. In addition to their support of San Francisco Opera, the Gunns are active members of the community. John chairs the advisory board for the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research, is Vice Chairman of the Board of Stanford Hospital Care and is a former trustee of Stanford University. Cynthia currently serves as an overseer of Stanford's Hoover Institution and a trustee of the San Francisco Fine Arts Museums and has been a member of the advisory board of Family and Children Services and the board of the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health. Opera lovers are grateful to Cynthia and John and applaud their commitment to keeping San Francisco Opera a leading-edge company.

CARMEN

ACT I

Outside a cigarette factory, soldiers alleviate their boredom by preying on the innocent Micaëla, who is searching for Don José, her childhood sweetheart. When the factory bell rings all the men press forward to see the infamous Gypsy Carmen. She sings the habanera which enchants the corporal José. The factory women go back to work and Micaëla returns bringing greetings from José's mother, who misses her son.

Suddenly a fight, started by Carmen, breaks out in the factory. Captain Zuniga, inflamed with jealousy at Carmen's flirtation with José, orders her arrest and commands José to escort her to prison. She promises José a rendezvous later that night if he lets her escape. José feigns being thrown to the ground, enabling Carmen to run off with the Gypsies. Zuniga sees through the ruse, and is happy to send him to prison so he can have Carmen to himself.

ACT II

In a late night tavern Carmen dances with her friends Frasquita and Mercédès. Captain Zuniga watches, yearning to have a liaison with Carmen later. Escamillo, the famous toreador, arrives to entertain his fans. Carmen rejects his advances. She also wards off Zuniga's hopeful proposition, eager to get everyone out of the tavern.

Dancaïro, leader of the smugglers, urges Carmen to assist them in carrying contraband across the border, but she refuses, sending her friends away when she hears José approaching. Carmen owes José a debt of gratitude for her freedom and she dances alone for him. At the sound of the bugle call, José, who has been demoted, says he must return to the barracks. Carmen laughs at his obedience to authority. Zuniga bursts in hoping to finally have that rendezvous with Carmen. The jealous José flings himself at his superior officer, but the smugglers enter and separate them. José is left with no choice but to join them.

ACT III

Forced into hiding with Carmen, José thinks with remorse of his mother. Carmen has grown tired of him, and they quarrel bitterly. Carmen refuses to be ruled by any man. She reads her future in a deck of cards and only sees death. The smugglers lead their women off to distract the border guards.

Micaëla has braved a dangerous journey to bring José news of his mother's illness. But before she can find him Escamillo arrives, and she hides as Escamillo and José fight over who should posses Carmen. The returning smugglers pull them apart. Micaëla's presence is discovered and she tells José that his mother is dying. José, stricken with grief, tells Carmen that he is going away, but that they will see each other again.

ACT IV

An excited crowd awaits the bullfight parade. Escamillo arrives with Carmen, resplendent as his consort. Frasquita and Mercédès warn Carmen that José is hiding, wild-eyed with jealousy, in the crowd. Carmen says that she will tell him that their relationship is over. The bullfight is about to start and everyone goes into the arena. Carmen deliberately waits to confront José. He begs her to come back to him. She defiantly declares that she was born free and will die free. Just as Escamillo defeats the bull, José finally possesses Carmen, in a fatal embrace. He falls sobbing over her corpse, admitting his guilt.

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THIEVES, GYPSIES, CIGAR-MAKERS

hen Napoleon's French army invaded Egypt in 1798 it eventually brought about an important change in French culture, one that was repeated (albeit on a smaller scale) by the Peninsular War (1807-14).

One result of the four-year French occupation of Egypt was *Description de l'Égypte* which initially appeared in 1809 and eventually grew to include 24 volumes, lavishly documenting Egyptian culture in every aspect and profoundly influencing the arts in France. But the invasion also energized serious academic interests in religion, linguistics,

archeology, and anthropology among others. "Oriental" became the rage: in music, painting, literature, architecture, the decorative arts, fueled by travelers who could actually visit Egypt for themselves, and also the popular press. After the Peninsular War many Spaniards who had allied with France, thinking that would bring modernization and liberty to their country, including ending the Spanish Inquisition, were exiled to France, bringing their culture with them.

In the preface to his 1829 collections of poems, *Les Orientales*, Victor Hugo wrote that the Orient had become a "sort of general preoccupation," and done so without him

quite realizing it. (In other words, he had been seduced by the Orient, an important part of "Orientalism.") "Oriental colors ... imprint themselves on all his [Hugo's] thoughts, all his dreams; and his dreams and his thoughts found themselves, in turn, and almost without having wished it so, Hebraic, Turkish, Greek, Persian, Arab, even Spanish, because Spain is still the Orient; Spain is half African, Africa is half Asiatic."

Since Egypt and the Near East are also the land of the Bible, Biblical stories became overlaid with the exotic (and often erotic) hue of this new obsession. For instance, the story of Salome dancing before Herod and demanding the head of John the Baptist was the basis for Gustave Moreau's painting L'Apparition (1876), Flaubert's story Herodias (1876-77), and Massenet's opera *Hérodiade* (1881). Massenet's Esclarmonde (1889) and Thais (1894) are further examples of Orientalist opera, as are Delibes' *Lakmé* (1883) and Saint-Saëns's Samson et Dalila (1877), to name just two. Though it is important to remember a quip leveled at Ravel's 1911 opera L'Heure Espagnole, that it is "Spain seen from the heights of Montmartre." However exotic this music, painting, and literature might seem, it was always French music, painting, and literature, tinged with some foreign color and designed to be enjoyed by French consumers.

One of the numerous publications that specialized in articles from or about exotic places was the *Revue des Deux Mondes*. In 1855 it published a few of Baudelaire's *Les Fleurs du Mal* poems; Henri Murger, whose *Scènes de la Vie de Bohème* became the basis for the libretto of Puccini's *La Bohème*, was an occasional contributor. And in 1845 the *Revue* published the first version of a novella by Prosper Mérimée called *Carmen*. Originally it produced only moderate interest, but over time it gained more admirers, one of whom was the composer Georges Bizet.

In 1872 the co-directors of the Opéra-Comique, Camille Du Locle and Adolph de Leuven, suggested that Bizet write an opera for them, collaborating with the experienced librettists Ludovic Halévy and Henri Meilhac whose work with Offenbach was so successful. The directors made several suggestions for possible subjects, but Bizet insisted on Mérimée's *Carmen*. Halévy and Meilhac were enthusiastic and Du Locle approved, but de Leuven was scandalized. "*Carmen*!" he exploded. "Mérimée's *Carmen*? Isn't she killed by her lover?—And that background of thieves, gypsies, cigar-makers!—At the Opéra-Comique, a family theater! The theater where marriages are arranged! Every night five or six boxes are taken for that purpose. You will frighten off our audience.—It's impossible!"

Halévy, who had been sent to cajole de Leuven into agree-

ing to the subject, quickly explained their *Carmen* would be "softened, toned down." Among other changes they had introduced "a pure opéra-comique character, a very innocent, very chaste young girl." (That was Micaëla who does not, in fact, appear in Mérimée's story.) He also admitted that, yes, there were Gypsies but they would be "comic" Gypsies. And as for Carmen's death, he claimed people would hardly notice it because, unlike Mérimée's ending that happens in the woods with only Carmen and Don José present, in the opera it would be "sneaked in at the end of a very lively, very brilliant act, played in bright sunlight on a holiday with triumphal processions, ballets, and joyous fanfares."

De Leuven was finally worn down and surrendered, but as Halévy left his office, the co-director begged, "Please try not to have her die. Death on the stage of the Opéra-Comique! Such a thing has never been seen! Never!" Six month later de Leuven resigned, largely because of his continued opposition to Carmen. As musicologist Susan McClary points out, the subject was about as sensational as possible at the time: "the humiliation and degradation of male, white authority at the hands of a woman of color." And the woman of color not only smoked, she picked up and discarded lovers whenever she liked. She is both heroine and villain, another source of horror to the audience at the time. Like Mozart's Don Giovanni, she is true to herself to the very end, even though she knows what it will cost her. That was, perhaps, her greatest sin for early audiences, her refusal to give up her freedom either to society's laws, or to a man.

There were numerous delays with the project but Bizet finished the orchestration during the summer of 1874 and rehearsals began that September. The soprano Célestine Galli-Marié had been invited to create the role after two other singers had turned it down. ("Carmen? What's that?" she had asked at the time. She had never heard of Merimee's story.) A critic praised her debut in 1862 in Pergolesi's La Serva Padrona by writing, "She is small and graceful, moves like a cat, has an impish, pert face, and her whole personality seems unruly and mischievous ... She sings in a full, fresh voice, piquant and mellow."

She and the tenor creating Don José, Paul Lhérie, were ardent believers in the project, siding with *Carmen*'s creators against theater officials who constantly demanded the story be toned down. The chorus was used to walking on stage en masse and staring, motionless, at the conductor while they sang, and strongly resisted being asked to move while singing—to say nothing of smoking cigarettes and fighting. The orchestra pronounced parts of the score unplayable and it was only after extra rehearsals that they

(grudgingly) admitted Bizet might know what he was doing. But Bizet's music *did* sound very new to audiences at the time. It was so specific in its color and tone that it could only have been written for *that* specific moment in the opera, something early listeners often found difficult to follow. American composer Ned Rorem once wrote, "Had I never heard the orchestration but only seen it [by looking at the score], I'd say it couldn't work. I would be wrong. The chances we are taught to avoid when scoring for voices with instruments seem not to be chances to Bizet. Balances or areas on the page that look top-heavy or empty are to the ear always right; the scoring is unstintingly crystalline."

Bizet, who never visited Spain, did try to bring some authenticity to the music he wrote for *Carmen*, for instance

in Carmen's first aria, the "Habanera." The Habanera is actually a dance from Havana, and Bizet had based his music on a song by Sebastián Yradier, "El Arreglito." (Bizet had a copy of the song in his library.) Yradier was a popular figure in Paris. He was Spanish, but his pseudo-folk music compositions were largely drawn from what he called "Creole" music that he had heard in Latin America. What Bizet apparently thought was a Spanish folk song was actually African-Cuban. Yradier's music was a regular part of the programs sung by one of Bizet's neighbors, an extraordinarily interesting woman named Céleste Mogador, in the Parisian cabarets—another black mark against *Carmen*, that music from such sordid places would be performed at the Opéra-Comique.

The audience that attended *Carmen*'s first performance on March 3, 1875, was not the usual Opéra-Comique gathering. Du Locle had warned off the usual family parties. Composers Gounod, Thomas, Delibes, Offenbach, Massenet, Lecouq, and d'Indy (then a student) were there. Fans of Meilhac and Halévy's other work were there, along with various Offenbach stars, as were a number of singers from L'Opéra, including Jean-Baptiste Faure. There were numerous music publishers and a gaggle of *boulevardiers* who were hoping for the rumored scandal.

The first act was warmly received, with hearty applause greeting both Carmen's "Habanera" and the duet for Don José and Micaëla. The entr'acte was encored and the second act began amid genuine enthusiasm. The Toreador's song was an enormous hit ("So they want trash? All right, I'll give them trash," Bizet had said when composing it), and the smuggler's quintet delighted the audience. But Don José's Flower Song and duet with Carmen were not well received, and the absence of a ballet disturbed the audience. In the third act only Micaëla's aria was applauded and act four flopped totally. The (now infamous) reviews were savage, in part because the director of the theater had not paid off the critics to ensure their enthusiastic praise. It is true Carmen had 48 performances during its first six months, but the attendance was poor and boxoffice receipts did not cover the cost of the production.

It was only when *Carmen* was given in Vienna on October 23, 1875, with recitatives rather than the original dialogue, that it found its audience and became the popular, enduring classic it is today. Bizet never knew of his (eventual) great success. He died on June 3, 1875 on the evening of *Carmen*'s thirty-third performance. He was 36 years old.

IRRESISTIBLE CARMEN

armen is one of my favorite characters, even after all **these years.** I directed my first production of Bizet's opera more than three decades ago, and it's been fascinating to keep revisiting her character, especially as the larger cultural conversation around gender, sexuality, and power continues to evolve. The #MeToo movement, which shines a spotlight on the prevalence of sexual harassment and assault, has been a call to reconsider the implicit messages around sexuality and consent in the standard repertory, which is full of predators and victims.

I find it fascinating that Carmen—who is neither predator nor victim—has been such a controversial figure. I would say that Carmen is a truly modern woman. She embraces her sexuality, she pursues her desires, and she achieves her ends using charm and wit alone. Unlike some of the more notorious #MeToo stories that have come to light, Carmen is not in a position of power over the men she pursues. In fact, the opposite is true.

Carmen is an outsider's outsider. She's affiliated with a band of roving thieves, which puts her outside the bounds of an ordered society. Outlaw societies operate by their own set of rules, yet Carmen refuses to play by these rules, as well. And to top it all off, she's a woman, which theoretically puts her in a disadvantage in any social hierarchy, "civilized" or not. However, other people's ideas about hierarchy are irrelevant to Carmen.

Carmen's relationship with Don José is complicated. Yes, to a certain extent she uses her sexuality to get him to do what she wants, but she is also guided by sheer intelligence and genuine—albeit shifting—feelings for José. I believe she does love him, at least for a while—enough to refuse an important job.

Another thing I find refreshing about Carmen is her honesty. If men are deceived by her, it's because they choose to be. In public and in private, she tells everyone exactly who she is and what they can expect. She does not

> set out to destroy Don José; in fact, she does her best to use the truth to free him from his obsession.

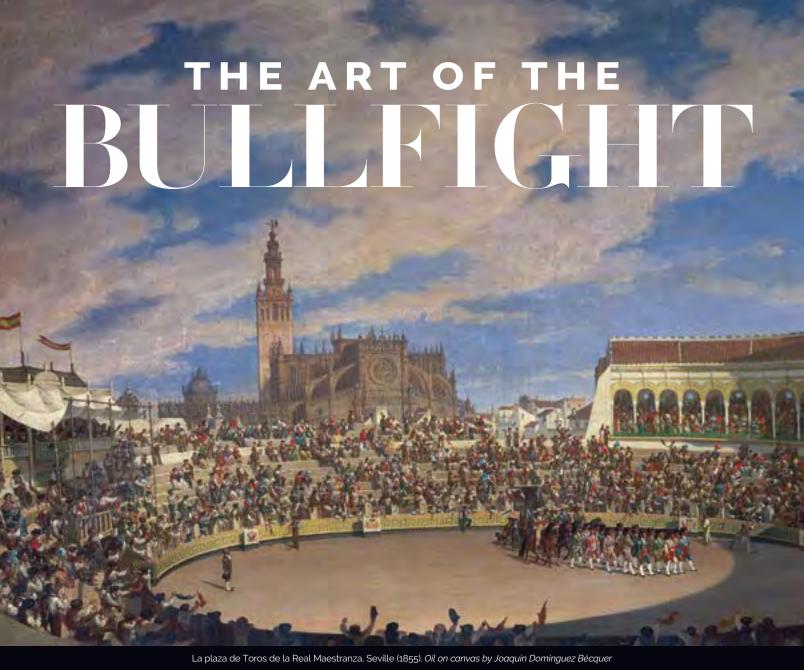
Carmen lives life on her own terms, even when she knows it will be her undoing. In this way, she is different from all those other female characters who die at the end of their operas. Carmen is not consumptive or kept or backed into a corner, physically or metaphorically. As the opera draws to a close in Act Four, a different kind of character

might have heeded Frasquita's warning and fled to safety. Or perhaps she might have called on Escamillo, who have would undoubtedly delighted in confronting José.

But not Carmen. For every choice she makes, she is aware of the consequences, and she is fully prepared to face them on her own. "I was born free and I will die free," she says—and that's exactly what she does. I think she is the ultimate feminist. When you study the score, you see her strength, and it's her strength, her intelligence, her will, her honesty that I want to put center stage in this production.

In telling Carmen's story, I think it's important to land in a period where we can we can see the aspects of class and social hierarchy that are so important to Mérimée's novella. A setting with a certain elegance really puts the world of the Gypsies into relief and immediately establishes the "outsider" status of Carmen and the rest of her band. Certainly, Bizet does that in his music, with the children's military drills setting up a stark contrast to Carmen's "Habanera."

"Love is a wild bird that no one can tame," Carmen sings. "No use to call him if he doesn't want to come." Her description of love could just as well be a description of herself—maddening, powerful, and utterly irresistible.

f you want a more complete picture of Spanish culture, study bullfighting. Famous writers of various nationalities have eloquently expressed that sentiment from Federico García Lorca to Ernest Hemingway, most notably in the American author's *Death in the Afternoon*. "It is impossible to believe the emotional and spiritual intensity and the pure, classic beauty that can be produced by a man, an animal and a piece of scarlet serge," Hemingway wrote in 1932.

Although he never visited the country, Georges Bizet (along with *Carmen* co-librettists Henri Meilhac and Ludovic Halévy) knew that no story set in Spain would be complete without channeling the passion and mythos

intrinsic to the bullfight—or *toreo* as it is known in Spanish-speaking countries. That fascination continues today with films such as *Blood and Sand*, based on Vicente Blasco Ibáñez's best-selling novel, and Pedro Almodóvar's *Matador*.

Yet for outsiders there are still a number of misconceptions surrounding this vital aspect of Spanish culture. First, as Edward F. Stanton writes in his comprehensive *Handbook of Spanish Popular Culture*, bullfighting is neither sport nor entertainment. It is ceremony, a way of life deeply rooted in Spanish society—in effect, a solemn and sacred dance of life and death. What's more, bullfighting is theater, as cathartic as ancient Greek tragedy. Not a

competition between man and bull, but, as Stanton writes, "a mutual participation in a prescribed ritual, or as some have suggested, a kind of sublimated lovemaking."

But isn't bullfighting inherently cruel and savage, in which the bull or (less likely) the man must die? Spaniards also fervently debate the question. "Take away the bull and we'll see what is left," wrote Spanish author Antonio Gala. "Would we recognize ourselves without the passion for and against the bull?" For the bull is the country's most identifiable symbol. As early as the first century A.D., the Iberian Peninsula was described by the Greek geographer Strabo as a dried, stretched bull's hide. Cattle still populate the Spanish countryside—in actuality and as 20-foot-tall, black billboards in the shape of a fighting bull (toro bravo). Originally advertisements for Soberano (Sovereign) brandy, these billboards have become national artistic monuments.

Fans will trace the origins of Spanish bullfighting as far back as ancient cave paintings and Roman hunts, although the historical record isn't so certain. What we do know is that for centuries, the Catholic Church in Spain registered its displeasure with bullfighting's pagan associations, including one edict dating from 447 A.D. Two popes even attempted to outlaw the spectacles in the sixteenth century. During the age of the Enlightenment, Spanish monarchs also tried to prohibit the bulls, yet with little success. Government policy changed entirely during the dictatorship of Francisco Franco (1939–1975), when bullfighting was promoted owing to its strong connection to Spanish tradition. Today, in spite of protests by animal rights advocates and increasing government regulations, bullfighting remains popular.

According to one count, there are approximately 8,000 bull-related events celebrated each year in Spain. These include not just the formal bullfight or *corrida de toros*, but the *encierro* or running of the bulls immortalized by Hemingway in *The Sun Also Rises*; *capeas*, the informal caping of calves, cows, or bulls during fiestas in thousands of town squares; and *recortadores* or competitions of bull-dodgers practiced by amateurs. In contrast, bullfighting is a centuries-old profession. Nowadays most bullfighters or *toreros* are trained in formal bullfighting schools, including one in San Diego. In 1976, it became legal for women to be professional bullfighters in Spain.

In Bizet's *Carmen*, there are notable inaccuracies about bullfighting, including the very term *toreador* which does not exist in Spanish. (It was purportedly invented by Bizet so that the syllables of the word would correspond with the music for the Toreador Song.) However, as Stanton

notes in his history of bullfighting, "the most marginal ethnic group in all of Spain, the Gypsies, have made up a disproportionate percentage of matadores," particularly in more recent times. The hot-blooded Carmen has met her match not with the cool and aloof Don José but with the brave Escamillo.

In the end, passion, dignity, and tradition have become synonymous with Spanish bullfighting. Without bullfighters, as the aficionado Fernando Claramunt López remarked, "Spain would be like any other place in the world. They are modern man's last connection to the ancient, heroic past."

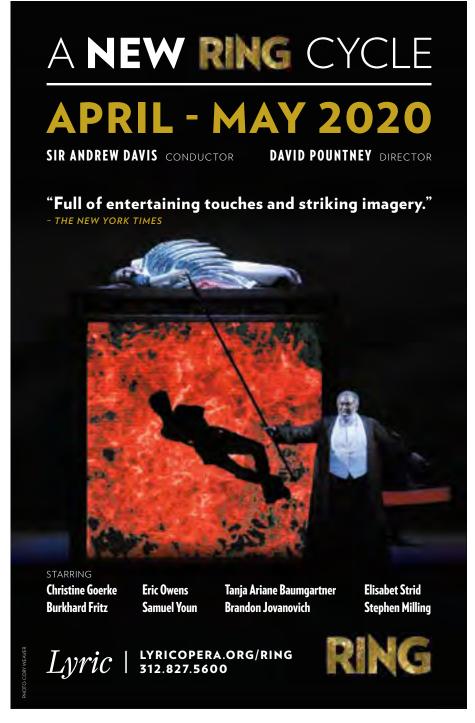

He is an adjunct faculty member at the University of California Santa Cruz and St. Mary's College of California and teaches combat-related courses at Berkeley Repertory School of Theater.

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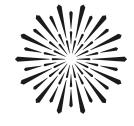

The **OPERA BOX OFFICE** is located in the Opera House, 301 Van Ness Avenue, and is open Monday 10 AM-5 PM, Tuesday through Saturday 10 AM-6 PM, and through the first intermission on performance days. Tickets may also be charged by phone at (415) 864-3330 or ordered online at sfopera.com. We accept American Express, VISA, MasterCard, and Discover.

If you are unable to use your tickets to a particular performance, you may exchange them for tickets to another performance, subject to availability, or donate them back to the Opera. Ticket exchanges for future performances can be accommodated up to one hour before curtain or during the first intermission. No refunds are associated with ticket exchanges, and a fee (plus any price differential) may apply.

ACCESSIBILITY San Francisco Opera is committed to providing easy access for all of our patrons. Please contact the Opera Box Office prior to your visit so that we can ensure your comfort.

For Patrons in Wheelchairs, San Francisco Opera offers wheelchair-accessible seats at a range of prices. All entrances at the War Memorial Opera House are wheelchair accessible. Wheelchair-accessible stalls in restrooms can be found on all floors (except the Main Lobby and 5th floor Balcony levels). Accessible drinking fountains are located on all floors except the Balcony level.

LISTENING DEVICES Assistive listening devices are available at the North and South Lobby coat checks. ID deposit required.

LIVE TITLES: TEXT-TO-VOICE SUPERTITLESHeadsets that provide a spoken version of the supertitles are available at the North Lobby coat check

DINING & REFRESHMENTS Global Gourmet operates pre-show and intermission food and beverage concession services in lobby areas. Beginning two hours prior to all performances, Prelude at the Opera House in the lower lounge offers a changing seasonal buffet, as well as elevated à la carte dishes for pre-performance dining and intermission. The North Box Restaurant on the North Mezzanine (Box) level features locally sourced California cuisine with global influences.

Audiences may enjoy purchased beverages inside the auditorium in the appropriate containers. Outside food and drink are prohibited.

The **SAN FRANCISCO OPERA SHOP**, located in the South Mezzanine lobby, front lobby, and North Dress Circle of the Opera House, sells opera CDs, DVDs, SF Opera merchandise, and gift items. The Shop is open 90 minutes before performances, at intermissions, and afterward. All proceeds benefit San Francisco Opera.

COAT CHECK A coat check for your convenience is located at the North and South ends of the main lobby. For the safety and comfort of our audience, large bags are strongly discouraged and are subject to search.

COURTESY TELEPHONE, for local calls only, is located in the main lobby across from the South passenger elevator.

DRINKING FOUNTAINS are available on all levels except the Lower level, where there is a courtesy water station on the north side. Water bottles are permitted in the auditorium.

OPERA GLASSES may be rented for \$5 at the North Lobby coat check. ID deposit is requested.

LARGE-PRINT CAST SHEETS AND SYNOPSES are available at the coat check stations in the main lobby.

FIRST AID STATION is located on the South Lower level. In case of emergency, please ask the nearest usher to assist you.

LOST AND FOUND items may be claimed at the North coat check during the performance. All unclaimed items are delivered to the War Memorial Performing Arts Center at 401 Van Ness Ave., Room 110, (415) 621-6600 (8 AM-5 PM, Monday-Friday).

TAXI SERVICE Patrons desiring a taxi after a performance should come to the Grove Street Taxi Ramp located on the south side of the Opera House. Accommodations are provided on a first-come, first-served basis, and cannot be guaranteed as service is based on availability of licensed taxis. Staff will be on hand to assist.

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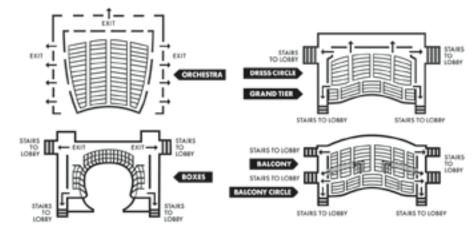
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TRUSTING IN THE FUTURE OF OPERA

pera companies should exist in a symbiotic relationship with the communities they serve: they have over time been the beating heart of cities, the gathering place for peoples, and an expression of the zeitgeist of a community. However, such a relationship between opera and community is not a given. It only happens when the community trusts that the company is producing work of meaning and value.

As we approach our centennial in 2022–23, it is imperative that we build trust between opera and community. To that end, the board and staff, headed by the board's Vice President, Lisa Erdberg, have been working on the creation of a new mission and vision for San Francisco Opera—a clear expression of why we exist and what we value. I'm so excited by what has transpired a strategic framework to guide us into our next century.

Our new mission statement is a credo, a heartfelt expression of our essential purpose:

We believe opera is a uniquely compelling, entertaining and emotionally thrilling art form. Our mission is to bring together growing audiences to experience opera's transformative power.

It's a celebration of the power of opera to move people to deep emotions, to thrill with spectacle, and to connect audiences, existing and new, in singular moments of soaring art. This is the fundamental promise of our art form.

Then comes our new vision statement. This is an aspirational expression of where we're heading in the coming decade. It is bold and succinct:

To crack the code on producing big art in the 21st century.

It expresses a fundamental need:. how do we ensure that the "big art" uniqueness of what we do is sustained and furthered in this new century? We tell big stories on a big stage with big emotions and a big impact. We are privileged to produce opera on one of the largest canvasses



in the world and we need to find the replicable way to do that in the 21st century.

Being successful in this vision will require both respect for the legacy of excellence that has so defined our first hundred years, and a vision and courage for what we can become in a new century.

The mission and the vision are the key elements of our strategic framework. But we also articulated six values that will guide our priorities in the course of the next decade:

- · Pioneering new approaches to producing largescale opera
- Striving for the highest standards of artistic integrity and excellence
- Fostering a positive, collaborative, diverse, inclusive organization
- Developing new audiences and creating dynamic audience relationships
- Creating impactful reciprocal connections with the community through education and engagement
- Upholding fiscal rigor and sound management as prerequisites for creativity

Finally, and something I'm particularly excited about, is an expression of our personality: what we stand for, what defines our identity as an organization, and what guides every interaction we have:

Creative, Bold, Inspiring, Welcoming, Excellent

These are the personality traits that you should expect from us at all times and I urge you to let us know if we're falling short in any area, or if you experience something that you feel particularly exemplifies these traits.

This is just the beginning of our journey. There is much exciting art and work ahead as we look to ensure that we are the beating heart of our community. This new strategic framework is a wonderful encapsulation of our commitment to forge a bold new path ahead and I look forward to being on this thrilling journey with you. 🦚

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
