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

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Did You Know?

For the Company's current production of *Cavalleria Rusticana | Pagliacci*, incorporating the sights and sounds of the Italian quarter of Buenos Aires, Argentina, the song "Caminito" by Carlos Gardel (1890–1935) sets the scene. The French-born tango singer, actor, and songwriter died tragically in an airplane crash in Medellín, Colombia at the height of his career.

Cavalleria Rusticana composer Pietro Mascagni and *Pagliacci* composer Ruggero Leoncavallo were warmly received in San Francisco during their separate U.S. tours in the early 20th century. In appreciation of the city, Mascagni wrote a piece for piano in February 1903 entitled *Un pensiero a San Francisco* (A *Thought for San Francisco*), which was published in the *San Francisco Chronicle*.

"Vesti la giubba" from *Pagliacci* might be one of the most borrowed operatic arias in American popular culture. Prominently used in the 1987 film *The Untouchables*, an episode of *The Simpsons*, and in the 1984 Queen song "It's a Hard Life," it was also popularized in a '60s-era Rice Krispies advertisement, named one of the top 10 TV commercials of all time by *Entertainment Weekly*.

Queen Elizabeth I, who is the subject of the Company's current production of *Roberto Devereux*, was both an avid arts patron and lover of languages. She was known to be fluent in French, Italian, and Latin, and is also believed to have spoken Spanish, Irish, Welsh, Greek, Flemish—and the now nearly obsolete tongue of Cornish.

Although she was the only English queen who never married, Elizabeth I (1533– 1603) received wedding proposals from King Philip II of Spain, King Eric XIV of Sweden, Archduke Charles of Austria, and French brothers Henry III and Francis, Dukes of Anjou. She died at age 69, the last of the five kings and queens to rule under the Tudor dynasty.

Chorus Concert in November

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SAN FRANCISCO **OPERA** Profile Darin Burnett Production Stage Manager

Since 2009, Darin Burnett has "called shows" for San Francisco Opera from the stage manager's console backstage. To perform this crucial service, he wears a headset, operates innumerable knobs, switches, and levers, and manages every performance detail, ensuring that the show does, in fact, go on. With one eye on the conductor, Burnett follows along in his own heavily annotated score while quietly giving cues to everyone involved in the artistic and technical aspects of presenting the opera. Stage managers are, by necessity, the ultimate multitaskers; Burnett's unflappable calm while synthesizing music, drama, visual elements, technology, stage craft, and an army of personnel into a smooth-running performance is no mean task.



groups at once. "Each channel is its own party line and I'm listening to all of them at the same time. Sometimes it's no big deal, but there are times when you want to rip the headset off your head because your ear just can't take it anymore."

"I am generally not someone who gets riled, even when there is chaos around me," he says. "That comes partly from experience, but I think the key is to focus, clear your head, and always be thinking ahead so that you can not only be in the moment, but also be ready for what is coming next. If you can do that, then you won't be stressed when it's busy or when things go wrong."

A stage manager's opera score typi-

"In a sense, my job is to tell everyone what to do and when," Burnett says. "You're sort of like an air traffic controller: isolated in one place, seeing the big picture and making sure everything is happening safely and on time." In addition to the ability to read music and follow the conductor, the job requires an intangible "it" factor. "You have to be a leader and be able to galvanize people to do what needs to happen," he says.

To observe Burnett calling a show at the console is akin to witnessing a master class on grace and precision under pressure. Every few seconds he gives instructions while simultaneously receiving updates on every detail of how the performance is going. "At San Francisco Opera, we have many different communication channels on our headsets, one each for the lighting design team, spotlight operators, backstage electricians, the carpenters who move the stage elements, sound technicians, stage management, and so on. Everybody is separated by department which is good because I can talk to everybody at once or each group individually." Adding even greater complexity, Burnett constantly listens to all the cally has dozens of tabs and multicolored sticky notes on each page. To the uninitiated, this visual cacophony can look daunting, but to Burnett and his team of stage managers each colored note represents a specific instruction and precisely when it must be delivered. These moments also have warning cues that are issued in advance, a handy system that alerts Burnett if a possible problem is brewing backstage—a broken piece of scenery, a faulty pyrotechnic effect, a singer battling stage fright—so he can troubleshoot promptly and safely before the performance underway is affected. "In opera, the stage manager is giving warnings for everything before it happens. Even before singers make their entrances on stage, we page them over the backstage PA system: 'Ms. so-and-so to the stage, please.'

"The ultimate goal of a good stage manager is to support everyone involved throughout the entire production process and to deliver smooth performances in which all the elements come together seamlessly. Although there are many of us backstage out of sight, we all feel a real sense of pride in hearing the audience react to the performance."


In Honor of John A. & Cynthia Fry Gunn

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All Hail Plácido!

The indefatigable "King of Opera" returns to San Francisco Opera on October 21 for a special sold-out concert

s San Francisco Opera prepares to welcome the world-renowned opera superstar—and local favorite—Plácido Domingo back to the War Memorial Opera House for a program with the Opera Orchestra, his admirers will surely reflect on the tenor's long and remarkable history with the Company. And why not start our recollections with the most remarkable event of all? For many longtime Opera patrons, it's hard to believe that this year marks the 35th anniversary of Plácido's most celebrated appearance here (among many memorable performances): his legendary "saving" of the 1983 season opener by flying cross-country from New York in a private plane as a last-minute replacement in the title role of Otello. As Mr. Domingo himself has remarked, "It was one of those performances: you know, there are 3,000 seats in the War Memorial Opera House, but today there are probably 20,000 people who say they were there that evening."

And those of us who *were* among the lucky 3,000 will certainly never forget it. The gala Opera Ball scheduled to take place after the show was instead held before it, to give Domingo's plane enough time to arrive. A well-lubricated crowd finally sat down to a performance that began at 10:30 p.m., and they remained—loyal and enthralled—until it ended (after four acts and three intermissions) at 2 a.m. (The stage manager's report for that performance is a masterpiece of understatement: "The role of Otello was sung by Plácido Domingo. The performance was delayed because of Mr. Domingo's late arrival.")

What the evening demonstrated above all wasn't only the famous tenor's unsurpassed sense of adventure, but also his admirable professionalism, stamina, and dedication to his fans all this, of course, combined with the matchless vocal talents, viscerally thrilling sound, astounding musical acumen, and vivid onstage charisma that have made his name a household word. In fact, in today's digital age characterized by myriad options for getting one's information, he is arguably the only living classical singer whose stardom extends beyond operatic circles to the "man on the street."

The 1983 Otello was not Mr. Domingo's first rescue for San

Francisco Opera. His Company debut in 1969 at age 28, as Rodolfo in *La Bohème*, was also an eleventh-hour substitution. (Devotees of the wildly popular "Three Tenors" concerts of the 1990s and early 2000s might be interested in a noteworthy coincidence: each of the three made his San Francisco Opera debut as Rodolfo: Luciano Pavarotti two years before Domingo, in 1967, and José Carreras just a few years later in 1973.) Domingo saved the day for San Francisco Opera yet again in 1971, substituting as Manrico in *Il Trovatore*, opposite the Leonora of Leontyne Price.

Domingo's versatility and can-do spirit were also on display in 1980, this time at an Opera in the Park concert at the bandshell in San Francisco's Golden Gate Park, where a rare September downpour had forced the orchestra to go home. The dauntless tenor gamely agreed to brave the damp, robustly singing with piano accompaniment alongside his *Samson et Dalila* co-stars mezzosoprano Shirley Verrett and baritone Wolfgang Brendel. Domingo even took to the piano at one point to accompany Brendel! (He had supplemented his early career as a singer in Mexico City by working as a ballet pianist.)

Born in Spain and raised in Mexico, Domingo began as a youngster singing with a company founded by his parents that presented *zarzuelas* (Spanish-style light operas)—an art form that has remained one of his persistent loves throughout his career. He performed a program of *zarzuela* highlights at the War Memorial in 1984, joined by Spanish soprano Pilar Lorengar, and included several *zarzuela* selections in his 1990 concert here with soprano Ann Panagulias. His October concert in San Francisco can be expected to feature *zarzuela* hits as well.

A mere glance over Plácido's professional history makes it impossible to imagine a singer with more impressive career statistics. He has racked up more than 3,900 performances of an astounding 150 operatic roles, challenging the notion that the human brain has a finite capacity to memorize. The list now includes baritone parts (to be represented in his upcoming concert), which he began adding in 2009 with Verdi's Simon Boccanegra, as well as newly created roles in the challenging contemporary operas he has championed. His more than a hun-

dred recordings—including "crossover" albums with artists like John Denver, Josh Groban, Susan Boyle, and Harry Connick, Jr. have earned him 12 Grammy Awards, and his more than 50 music videos have garnered two Emmys. Three commercially available San Francisco Opera recordings feature him, all in French repertoire: videos of Saint-Saëns' *Samson et Dalila* and Meyerbeer's *L'Africaine* as well as an audio CD of Massenet's *Hérodiade*.

As if life as a globe-trotting operatic megastar were not enough to keep him busy, Domingo has made conducting a mainstay of his career as well, beginning with his podium debut for a New York City Opera *Traviata* in 1973. To date, he has conducted over 500 performances, including a run of Wagner's *Die Walküre* this past summer at the famed Bayreuth Festival dedicated to the composer's works.

Putting his creative skills to work behind the scenes, he has had a prodigiously productive life as an opera administrator, acting as artistic director at Washington National Opera at the Kennedy Center from 1996 through 2011, and taking on a similar role at Los Angeles Opera in 2000, where he continues in the post of general director.

Now at age 77, this operatic Renaissance Man shows no sign of slowing down, famously protesting, "If I rest, I rust." This September, he sings a concert marking the reopening of Houston Grand Opera's Wortham Theater Center after a year of flood-damage repairs, then performs a Los Angeles run of Verdi's *Don Carlo* (in the baritone role of Rodrigo). After his San Francisco concert in October, it's on to New York's Metropolitan Opera for the title role in Puccini's comic *Gianni Schicchi*. A long list of Verdi baritone roles fills out the rest of his season ahead, including the elder Germont in *La Traviata* at the Met, La Scala, Covent Garden, and Munich, Simon Boccanegra in Vienna, Macbeth in Berlin, and Nabucco in Dresden, plus Juanillo in Manuel Penella's *El Gato Montés* back in Los Angeles.

It's natural to wonder how he manages to find time for it all-

let alone the energy. He is famous for arriving very late in the rehearsal process for his roles, but rarely seems unprepared thanks to his renowned gift for being a "quick study." As late stage director and former San Francisco Opera General Director Lotfi Mansouri once remarked, "I would personally rather have one day with Plácido than a month with many other singers. He is an artist who makes a stage director look good."

For his most recent production in San Francisco, in the title role of Alfano's *Cyrano de Bergerac* in 2010, Plácido made the unusual advance request to have a TV-style teleprompter available in case he forgot his words, not having sung the opera in recent years. But any need for that memory aid quickly evaporated as his famous powers of score recall sprang into action.

Industry insiders sometimes hear complaints that he can be stretched too thin, and difficult to reach to make management decisions. Yet under his leadership, the companies he has helmed in Washington and Los Angeles have made great strides artistically, for which he can justly claim credit. It helps that he is indefatigable, often getting on a plane after a rehearsal or performance in one city to attend a board meeting, opening night, or donor event in another.

He has also been unflagging in promoting young signers, principally with his international opera competition Operalia, founded in 1993, which has fostered a host of talented artists, including his two co-stars for October's "Plácido Domingo in Concert": soprano Ana María Martínez and tenor Arturo Chacón-Cruz. Other Operalia winners include (to name just a few) Nina Stemme, José Cura, Eric Owens, Joyce DiDonato, Rolando Villazón, Brian Jagde, the late Brian Asawa, and Carmen Giannattasio who will perform next month the title role of *Tosca* in the Company's new production. "I'm proud to say that with Plácido's help early on in my career, next year I will celebrate 20 years of professional singing," says the Italian soprano.

Domingo's unstinting dedication to the opera public continues

to be a model for performing artists everywhere. A former colleague recalls his 2002 tour to Japan in *Otello*—in his final performances of what had become his signature role. Unphased by the taxing demands of the part, he heartily faced an endless line of well-wishers after each performance, spending hours signing photos and programs for each eager fan who had waited for him. This degree of generosity, patience, and respect for the paying public has helped make him a beloved figure world-wide.

Anyone who has been in the rehearsal room with Plácido can attest to his intense commitment to his art. He arrives in the hall on time, greets everyone (with an uncanny ability to remember names in theaters across the globe), and is frequently the last to leave the rehearsal, offering an admirable example of discipline, politeness, and consideration for all. Amusing and endearing anecdotes about the famous tenor abound, but temper tantrums and ego trips do not feature prominently among them.

A gracious social presence adds to the esteem Domingo has earned among his professional associates. Whether taking care that the guest list for a post-performance dinner doesn't exclude a deserving colleague, or offering a fellow staffer a lift, he can be relied upon for a tireless sense of duty that is a rarity in superstars. Nobody is a better candidate for disproving the adage that nice guys finish last.

During his nearly 50-year association with San Francisco Opera, Plácido Domingo has earned a permanent place in the pantheon of the city's beloved performers. He once remarked that "San Francisco is a place where I have been able to do a lot of my main repertoire but also to satisfy my curiosity about new roles." And he, in turn, has helped San Francisco audiences satisfy their craving for inspirational singing coupled with captivating artistry. It will be nice to welcome him back.



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

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SYNOPSIS CAVALLERIA RUSTICANA / PAGLIACCI

This production of the double bill, as conceived by José Cura, takes place in the same neighborhood, among the same villagers, including characters from both operas.

Cavalleria Rusticana

Turiddu, son of the tavern owner Mamma Lucia, has returned from military service to find his fiancée, Lola, married to a prosperous wagon owner, Alfio. As revenge against Lola's betrayal, Turiddu has seduced Santuzza, hoping to make Lola jealous. As a result, Lola has taken up with Turiddu again in an adulterous affair, leaving Santuzza heartbroken.

As the curtain rises, Silvio arrives to open the bar. He discovers his lover, the comedienne Nedda, in the company of her fellow actors, putting up posters advertising their circus. Nedda is married to Canio, a once famous clown.

As Silvio prepares the tables for the Easter Sunday customers, Turiddu is heard praising Lola. Santuzza witnesses Lola's joy upon hearing Turiddu's song. Villagers arrive in the square, some taking seats at Lucia's bar for breakfast. Alfio enters, extolling the pleasures of his wandering life as a wagoner and boasting publicly of his love for Lola and of her fidelity.

Santuzza leaves her house to go to Easter Mass, but she is prevented from entering the church. She has been excommunicated for her affair with Turiddu. Santuzza confides in Mamma Lucia, telling her all that has happened. When Turridu arrives, Santuzza accosts him. He tries in vain to deny his affair with Lola, when she purposefully passes in front of them, leading to a caustic exchange between the two women. Santuzza and Turiddu engage in a storm of recriminations, before Santuzza tells him she is going to have his child. Horrified and afraid, Turiddu breaks away and goes into church.

Santuzza reveals to Alfio that his wife has been unfaithful to him, before realizing that Alfio's fury will doom them all. As worshippers emerge from church, Turiddu publicly toasts Lola's "loves." In accordance with established ritual, Alfio and Turiddu agree to a duel. To shield Santuzza from future recrimination, Turiddu tells everyone that he had promised to marry her to restore her honor. Turiddu bids farewell to his mother and leaves. Santuzza delivers the news that Turiddu has been killed. Lola echoes the tragic news in despair.

Pagliacci

On the following day, an elegant man emerges from the mournful procession for Turiddu's coffin. He is Leoncavallo, the

composer of *Pagliacci*, who expresses the credo of the *verismo* movement. He is supported by Mascagni, his fellow composer, who has been watching the events from the very beginning: "The author has been inspired by real life to tell a story about people with the same joys and sorrows as other human beings." Time stops as Leoncavallo expresses his thoughts.

Six months later, a company of touring actors arrives. The head of the troupe, Canio, announces that the performance will begin at the "23rd hour," that is, one hour before sunset. When a person in the crowd jokingly suggests that Tonio, a fellow actor, is courting Canio's wife, Nedda, behind his back, Canio angrily warns the crowd that the joke isn't funny. Canio goes off to Mamma Lucia's bar to enjoy a drink. People gather in church, leaving Nedda alone with her thoughts.

While Silvio sets the tables, Nedda expresses her dream to be free as soaring birds, sweetly provoking her young lover. Soon afterward, Tonio, who has witnessed Nedda's reverie, declares his passion for her, but, when Nedda mocks him, he tries to force himself on her. She manages to strike him. Silvio arrives and urges Nedda to flee with him. Tonio spies on the lovers and reports the tryst to Canio. A chase ensues, but Silvio manages to escape before Canio can recognize him. Tonio advises Canio to wait until evening for vengeance. Alone, Canio laments his lot as an actor: he must laugh through his tears for the audience's amusement. Mamma Lucia, who has witnessed his despair, consoles him with a drink.

The villagers assemble to see the play. Taking advantage of the commotion, Nedda exchanges a few words with Silvio, assuring him of their midnight elopement. The commedia, based on the familiar tale of Pagliaccio and Colombina, begins. In the absence of her husband Pagliaccio (played by Canio), Colombina (Nedda) is serenaded by her lover, Arlecchino (Beppe). Together they drive away her servant, the buffoon Taddeo (Tonio), and plot to poison Pagliaccio, whose sudden return interrupts their flirting. After Arlecchino has escaped, Taddeo, with pointed malice, assures Pagliaccio of his wife's "innocence." Obsessed with jealousy, Canio forgets he is onstage and demands that Nedda name her lover. She tries desperately to continue the comedy, but the audience begins to comprehend the reality of the situation. Maddened by her continued defiance, Canio first stabs Nedda and then Silvio, who has rushed forward to help her. In absolute despair, Lucia cries, "La commedia è finita." ("The comedy is over.")

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

When I was first commissioned to direct and design *Cavalleria Rusticana* and *Pagliacci*, the idea of molding the double bill into a tribute to the Italian immigration of early 1900s Argentina quickly prevailed. The spirit of these two emblematic works of the *verismo* movement—both excessive and timid, light and dark, affectionate and brutal—seemed very applicable to those uprooted Italian ancestors. Thus La Boca, the Italian quarter of Buenos Aires, for all its history and picture-perfect, multicolored beauty, was the ideal setting. To fit the libretto, I had to resolve to add spaces to the set which do not actually exist: a canteen, a church, Alfio and Lola's house, etc. The rest of the scenery—the square, the windows laced with clothes lines, the parish—all came to be during the planning stages.

I bombarded my costume designer, Fernand Ruiz, with ideas for costumes which, in my opinion, need not be the gray palette with which *Cavalleria Rusticana* is usually identified, but rather colors and that sense of "improvisation" which can happen when a group of people from humbler backgrounds dress in the best clothes they own. The revelation came when I found a photograph of the *Mural Escenográfico* in Buenos Aires' Lezama Park. Finished in 1999, this piece of street art, which marks the entrance to La Boca, depicts a series of characters that I could perfectly associate with *Pagliacci*.


Cavalleria Rusticana and *Pagliacci* are based on the literary tradition of *il verismo italiano*. Both Giovanni Verga and Ruggero Leoncavallo found their literary inspiration in events created by Life itself (the playwright of playwrights). There are two versions explaining the origin of *Pagliacci*. The first is that Leoncavallo himself, as a young child, witnessed the murder of the comedienne Nedda at the hands of her acting partner (and husband) Giovanni D'Alessandro, who had caught her red-handed in the arms of her lover. The second says that Ruggero Leoncavallo's father related to his son a similar crime which he himself had to adjudicate. To add more complication, there are musicologists who have insinuated that Leoncavallo's piece is "dangerously" similar to a play by Spanish playwright Manuel Tamayo y Baus, entitled *Un Drama Nuevo* (1867). I believe that accusing Leoncavallo of plagiarism is going a little too far. I would rather "accuse" him of having been very well versed in the trends of the theater, which means he was likely aware of Tamayo's work, and was thus influenced. Traditionally, that has always been the case in the creative world and will continue to be.

In principle, the plots of *Pagliacci* and *Cavalleria Rusticana* are fairly similar to one another: the illicit relations of a married woman trigger the jealousy of a betrayed husband. But the relevance of Canio's character to today is overwhelming: an artist in decline, crushed by life and alcohol. Never before today have we seen so much talent thrown away once its "novelty" has worn off: actors who fall from grace after two films, or worse, giants of the stage and screen being relegated to play bit parts so they can keep food on their tables—effectively, background decoration to the briefly shining "star of the moment." The list of victims is tremendously long and not only includes actors. There are singers thrown into dizzyingly fast-moving careers without preparation and athletes who under the pressure to win resort to doping.



The list can be made even bigger; we only need to look carefully around us. The "Canio syndrome" prevails today more than it ever has: "Instead of only our costume, consider our souls, as we too are men of flesh and bone," pleads the author in the Prologue.

The Prologue remains one of the most touching moments of this production for me, its words heard and felt only by the beggar and the paperboy. The use of these characters to narrate a united story animates an essential part of the staging: the presence of the two casts during both operas. With the choice of both operas sharing the same set, the challenge was to establish a socially structured town with its priest, mayor, bartender, barber, grocer, children, etc. So, we see Nedda and the clowns posting the company poster at the beginning of *Cavalleria*, we see Santuzza sporting her seven-month belly in *Pagliac*ci, as well as Mamma Lucia still managing her tavern, assisted by her waiter, Silvio. But my favorite moment remains the ending: hearing Lucia—almost an "oracle" in her own right—shouting "La commedia è finita." It is not just the voice of an old woman, but the voice of Earth, the voice of creation, shouting "Basta!" ("Enough!") to the entire world.

TRUE SOUTH

The Italianissimo Cavalleria Rusticano and Pagliacci ithout any question, the most popular double bill in all of opera is Pietro Mascagni's *Cavalleria Rusticana* and Ruggero Leoncavallo's *Pagliacci*. Audiences have always been moved by the gorgeous music and sure-fire emotional impact of these two works. Both were submitted to a competition in 1890 sponsored by Sonzogno, an important Italian music publisher that sought to develop new talent and repertory. (The rule was that the opera be in one act. The winner was *Cavalleria Rusticana*. *Pagliacci* was not disqualified even though, technically speaking, it is made of two acts that run continuously.)

While there are countless operas set throughout Italy, especially in Venice and Rome, a special group of them takes place in the south, the part of the nation that looms large in the global imagination because many of the immigrants who left Italy came from regions such as Campania (and its capital, Naples), Puglia, Basilicata, Calabria, and Sicily. What's more, Southern Italy has been a setting for many operas by leading composers, including Mozart (Naples in *Così fan tutte*), Bellini (Sicily in *Il Pirata*), Rossini (Siracusa in *Tancredi*), Verdi (Palermo in *I Vespri Siciliani*), and even Wagner in his early comedy, *Das Liebesverbot*, which is set in Palermo.

The way they were originally intended, *Cavalleria Rusticana* takes place in Sicily and *Pagliacci* is set in rural Calabria. Unlike operas that seem to have Southern Italy as a backdrop, *Cav* and *Pag* are entirely informed by the life, suffering, and insistent rhythms of changing seasons and religious celebrations. The fact that *Cav* takes "Rustic chivalry" may require a certain behavioral code toward outsiders or those who do not adhere to the norms and traditions of the village (such as circus people). But if their behavior is out of bounds, retribution is customary. The men in both these operas fight and kill each other over the question of honor (*onore*). As is often the case in opera, a man may lose his life, but it is the heroine (Santuzza in *Cavalleria Rusticana* and Nedda in *Pagliacci*) whose sufferings we connect to most. Their reactions are part of the powerful storytelling and music which these composers knew how to deploy with great effect.

The style of these works is often referred to as *verismo*, a term that has been corrupted through the decades. The word derives from *vero* or *verità*, both of which connote truthfulness but may also imply reality. In our own times, in which "reality television" seldom has much to do with truthfulness or realism, it is hard to know what to believe. Scholars who say that *verismo* began in 1890 with these two operas ignore the fact that realism and truthfulness existed in earlier operas, most notably *La Traviata* (1853) in which Verdi dealt with contemporary characters and used his opera as a mirror to his audience and suggest that they were being hypocritical as judges of morality.

Perhaps a better way to think of *verismo* is to view characters in its operas as having to deal with the rigors of everyday life, including poverty, illness, and violence. As often as not, the language of the libretto will include simple words and direct speech and might be spoken in dialect. This stands in contrast to the more literary

place on Easter Sunday and *Pag* is set on Ferragosto (August 15, the celebration of the Assumption of the Virgin into Heaven) is no coincidence. The religious underpinnings amplified audience perceptions of these works' characters when the operas were new. Because these are holidays when families gather, the townspeople in both operas impart an important sense of cohesive community.

A key to understanding the traditional life of rural Calabria and Sicily comes in acknowledging the citizenry's great need for structure. This is provided, above all, by family, but also by church and occasionally by outside individuals. Since ancient times, southerners have sought protection from troubles such as poverty, plague, earthquakes, drought, and foreign occupation. While prayer may resolve some of these problems, others are said to require intervention from so-called men of honor. This might partly explain the origin of the Mafia, which was originally a form of protection, not a criminal organization. Loyalty was expected by the family or individual who provided protection.

You can find these sentiments in subtle ways in both operas.

usage found in works about larger-than-life characters.

Cavalleria Rusticana (Rustic Chivalry) is based on a novella by Giovanni Verga that became a famous play. For audiences in the 1880s in central and northern Italy, seeing characters in native costume, speaking in dialect and drinking wine from large jugs, was akin to watching a documentary on a foreign civilization. Italy only unified as a nation in the 1860s and northern cities such as Milan or Turin had much more in common with Paris than with Naples or Palermo.

Cav premiered in Rome in 1890 and even that city, only recently made the capital of a united Italy, had little in common with life further south. The opera is about Santuzza, whose name is a Sicilianized one that implies "saint gone wrong." She is a good woman who has been excommunicated because of her relationship (and pregnancy) with Turiddu, who has abandoned her for a married woman. Turiddu's mother, Mamma Lucia, owns a tavern that sells powerful wine (Turiddu describes it as "generoso"), and she is the one person who talks to Santuzza, in part because she senses that her son is endangered because of his recklessness.

Pagliacci (*Clowns*) is the story of an itinerant group of commedia dell'arte performers who pitch a tent in Montalto, Calabria on Ferragosto and announce to the locals that there will be a show an

hour before sunset ("un grande spettacolo a ventitre ore"). Circuses in Italy date back to at least the time of the Roman Empire. Until very recently, small circus troupes would ply the backroads of rural Italy, going to towns without theaters.

The iconography of *Pagliacci* is central to Federico Fellini's classic film *La Strada* (1954), a story of traveling players in the rural south. A mix of Canio and Tonio, the cruel and jealous Zampanò (whose name must derive from *zampogna*, the shepherd bagpipe one hears in the opera) travels with Gelsomina (Nedda in the opera), a timid woman whose pathos and humanity elicit sympathy from everyone except Zampanò. The expression of caring from a happy-go-lucky character called the Fool (the counterpart of Silvio in the opera) leads to Gelsomina's tragic demise.

In rural Calabria, Ferragosto is a rare day off for poor people who must work seven days a week to earn a living. When the touring troupe of comic players arrive to perform, the entire town gathers in great anticipation and watches the clowns (*pagliacci*) act out a comedy about infidelity. In fact, this is what has been happening in real life as Canio, the lead actor, knows that his wife Nedda has been having an affair with Silvio, a younger man. The audience onstage watches with excitement and then horror as reality merges with the story being told by the performers. Comedy turns to tragedy as Canio kills Nedda and then Silvio.

Initially, many opera companies chose *Pagliacci* to start the evening that concluded with *Cavalleria Rusticana*. While it has been customary for more than a century to pair these two operas

for an evening program, they are not always presented that way. At its first performance in the Metropolitan Opera House in 1891, *Cavalleria Rusticana* was preceded by Gluck's *Orfeo ed Euridice*. The Met first paired *Cav* and *Pag* in 1893. It has been presented with works as diverse as Rimsky-Korsakov's *Le Coq d'Or* and, even, Humperdinck's *Hänsel und Gretel*.

Pagliacci is often presented on its own or has been paired with a ballet or operas as diverse as Puccini's dark comedy *Gianni Schicchi* or Richard Strauss' lurid *Salome*. Both operas are audience favorites. Purists insist that *Cav* is the superior work because of its flawless construction and gorgeous music. Others prefer *Pagliacci* for its powerful final scene. In the not-too-distant past, companies such as the New York City Opera liked to stage *Cav* and *Pag* as either a matinee or evening performance on a weekend with *Carmen*. Why? Because all three works usually include a horse. By presenting them all in the same day, the company only paid one horse rental fee and saved on insurance and stage personnel.

However they are presented and for whatever reason, *Cavalleria Rusticana* and *Pagliacci* are a pleasure to rediscover and enjoy. While no work of art can be called perfect, these two masterpieces come very close. And they remind us that opera can uniquely represent a special kind of truth that is at its most rewarding and gratifying when we don't attempt to analyze it but simply give ourselves over to the music and story.

Testimonies of Passion and Pride: (AVALLERIA RUSTICANA and PAGLIA(CI in SAN FRANCISCO

or more than a century, *Cavalleria Rusticana* and *Pagliacci* have been regular presences in the opera houses of California and around the world. If we dig deeper into San Francisco history, we discover fascinating tales of touring composers and ambitious dreams of enterprising immigrants—down to the very roots of San Francisco Opera.

Mascagni and Leoncavallo Go West

By the turn of the 20th century, both Pietro Mascagni and Ruggero Leoncavallo had achieved a high level of fame in their home country. The two composers shared similar career trajectories: both were prolific and ambitious artists who strived for global recognition beyond their most popular works, *Cavalleria* and *Pagliacci*. When the opportunity arrived, they both enthusiastically embarked upon tours of the U.S.

For Mascagni, the opportunity arose in 1902, when he first signed a contract for a North American tour. He traveled to New York first, then Chicago, and reached California in February 1903, after an invitation from San Francisco manager Will Greenbaum. "The greatest of living opera composers had to come to the Golden Gate to discover America," leading drama critic Ashton Stevens proudly reported in *The San Francisco Examiner*. In fact, his visit marked a celebratory moment for Italian immigrants as well as the Bay Area music community. In *Sunset* magazine, celebrated playwright and scholar Porter Garnett declared that it was in the Bay Area that the Italian composer had risen to to his well-deserved glory: "Mascagni represents the new move-

ment and San Francisco has discovered him." When the composer was made honorary member of the Bohemian Club, Garnett himself wrote a poetical greeting to the maestro from "that sweet land where Palestrina strove / Where proud Rossini sang and Verdi wrought."

The composer presented a series of performances at different venues—such as the Alhambra Theater and the Mechanical Pavilion during what the *San Francisco Chronicle* labeled the "Mascagni season." He conducted his own works (especially the beloved Intermezzo from *Cavalleria*) and those of diverse artists, from Rossini to Tchaikovsky and Wagner to Goldmark. The highlight of Mascagni's visit was a series of performances of *Cavalleria* at the Tivoli Opera House, accompanied by non-operatic works such as his *Hymn of the Sun*. The concerts were a success, and in the *Examiner*, Stevens wrote: "No other leader has ever been bravoed and boot-thundered and handcrashed by San Franciscans as Mascagni was last night [...] One person more packed into the theater would have cracked the old building that for more than 22 years has been the most faithful music teacher of the West."

In 1906, only three years after Mascagni had left the West Coast, Leoncavallo arrived in New York, eager to immerse himself in American culture and to gather materials to compose a work set in the U.S. "I want to go to the theatres," the composer declared, "to see the people and meet and talk with them, to learn their ideas and ideals, and see if I can capture them in words and music." Although his American opera never became a reality, it was with the same enthusiasm that he traveled back to the U.S. in 1913, when he arrived in San Francisco.

Leoncavallo's major engagement during his California tour was at the Tivoli Opera House, after having been appointed musical director of the Western Metropolitan Opera Company. The company's managing directors, Ettore Patrizi and Eugene D'Avigneau, planned to present a "grand opera season" in October and November 1913. In this context, Leoncavallo conducted a series of concerts of his own works, such as the Intermezzo from *Maïa* and the Overture to *Roland von Berlin*, as well as other popular pieces—including *Cavalleria* in a double bill with his own *Pagliacci*.

The West Coast tours of the two Italian maestros were overwhelming successes, and their California experience inspired them to dedicate original compositions to places and people that welcomed them so generously. In 1903, Mascagni wrote the piano miniature Un pensiero a San Francisco (A Thought for San Francisco), published in the San Francisco Chronicle, while in 1913 Leoncavallo

started work on the song, "O California, Italia dell'America" ("O California, Italy of America"). These pieces are a testament to the Californian warmth that welcomed the two artists.

An Operatic Home for San Francisco

Mascagni and Leoncavallo both hoped to return to the U.S. They never did, but their celebrated one-act operas became a staple in repertoires all over North America and the world. San Francisco Opera boasts a long performance tradition of these two works—one as old as the Company itself. In fact, *Pagliacci* was part of the inaugural 1923 season at the Civic Auditorium, in a double bill with Puccini's *Gianni Schicchi*, while *Cavalleria* was first presented there in 1927. The two operas were later performed as a double bill during the first season in the newly completed War Memorial Opera House, where the company made its permanent home in 1932.

A deeper legacy ties one of these works, *Pagliacci*, with the history of San Francisco Opera, even before the Company existed. To unearth these operatic roots, we need to travel back to when another Italian sailed to the U.S. to make the Bay Area his home: Gaetano Merola, the conductor from Naples, who, in the early 1900s, first came to the West Coast as a touring conductor, later to become the founder and first general director of San Francisco Opera from 1923 to 1953.

Conscious of Californians' profound passion for opera, Merola first saw the actual potential of a Bay Area opera season in 1921 during a quintessential American event: the football match between Stanford and the University of California, Berkeley known as the Big Game (a popular event to this day). "When he heard the band down on the field," Arthur Bloomfield wrote in his authoritative history of

San Francisco Opera, "he was immensely stirred. The acoustics were surprisingly impressive. With tenors more on his mind than quarterbacks, Merola decided the [Stanford Stadium] had excellent possibilities for opera. It reminded him of Verona's celebrated Arena, and the Baths of Caracalla in Rome." With the broad financial support of the Italian immigrant community and philanthropists who trusted in his vision, Merola gathered the necessary funds and permits to organize a series of performances in the 17,000-seat stadium. A stage was built, and special trains from Palo Alto were organized to ensure patrons reached the performances. Merola borrowed the orchestra from the San Francisco Symphony and put together a chorus. As for the repertoire, three operas were planned, and Merola had no doubt: the inaugural performance on June 3, 1922 would be Pagliacci, followed by Carmen on June 7 and 16, and Faust on June 10.

Ads in the Stanford Illustrated Review spoke of a "grand opera" festival and

boasted the size of the enterprise: "These operas will be produced on a gigantic scale." For the performance of *Pagliacci*, the stadium wasn't full (6,000 attended), but the audience grew with each performance. All three operas were met with wide acclaim, despite the fact that the financial burden turned out to be heavier than expected, resulting in a deficit.

The most significant outcome of this enterprise was that the festival's success—cultural if not financial—cemented the idea that San Franciscans were eager and ready to have their own operatic home.

About a month later, in a front-page article titled "Brilliant Grand Opera Season Assured," the *Pacific Coast Musical Review* published a statement by Merola. The conductor admitted that better financial support was necessary to make an opera house sustainable, but he had no doubt that the Bay Area would become a prestigious music center thanks to the patronage of cultural entities and music lovers. He went on to announce the first season of San Francisco Opera at the Civic Auditorium—including, once again, *Pagliacci*.

And indeed, Merola was right: since the first al fresco *Pagliacci* in Stanford Stadium, San Francisco Opera has continued to shine as an international center of artistic excellence. Because of the support of Bay Area music lovers and beyond, as well as the enterprising vision of artists and music professionals, the dream of an operatic home for the Bay Area has been a reality for almost a century.

Callegari has led performances at Carnegie Hall, the Canadian Opera Company in Toronto, the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam, Bavarian State Opera in Munich, Deutsche Oper and Staatsoper in Berlin, Teatro alla Scala, Israeli Opera in Tel Aviv, La Monnaie in Bruselles, Dresden Semperoper, Gran Teatre del Liceu in Barcelona, La Fenice in Venice, Maggio Musicale Fiorentino, Teatro Massimo in Palermo, the Metropolitan Opera in New York, New National Theatre in Tokyo, Opéra Bastille in Paris, Teatro dell'Opera in Rome, and the Vienna State Opera, among other companies. He has conducted several world premieres, including Alice by Giampaolo Testoni at the Teatro Massimo in 1993 and Oedipe sur la route by Pierre Bartholomée at La Monnaie in 2003. Upcoming engagements include Norma, Rigoletto, and L'Elisir d'Amore at the Bavarian State Opera and *Turandot* and Madama Butterfly at La Fenice.



EKATERINA SEMENCHUK

(St. Petersburg, Russia) **Santuzza** Russian mezzosoprano Ekaterina Semenchuk made her San Francisco Opera

debut in 2015 as Federica in *Luisa Miller* and in 2016 she returned as Amneris in *Aida*. Her recent engagements include Eboli in *Don Carlo* at Milan's Teatro alla Scala and Royal Opera, Covent Garden; Amneris in Tokyo and Madrid; her role debut as Santuzza at the Metropolitan Opera; and La Principessa in *Adriana Lecouvreur* at the Verbier Festival and in Baden-Baden. Career highlights encompass Marina in *Boris Godunov* at the Metropolitan Opera; Azucena and Amneris at La Scala; locasta in *Oedipus Rex* and Ascanio in *Benvenuto* *Cellini* at the Théâtre des Champs-Élysées; the title role of *Carmen* at Arena di Verona; Didon in *Les Troyens* at the Mariinsky Theatre, Carnegie Hall, and in Vienna and Tokyo; Laura in *La Gioconda* and Dalila in *Samson et Dalila* at Rome Opera; and Eboli and Azucena at the Salzburg Festival. HAROUTOUNIAN (Metsamor, Armenia) Nedda Soprano Lianna Haroutounian made her San Francisco Opera debut in 2014's *Tosca* and

in 2016 she returned as Cio-Cio-San in Madama Butterfly, a role she has also recently sung to great acclaim at Hamburg State Opera and Seattle Opera. She has performed Elisabetta in Don Carlo at Deutsche Oper, Berlin State Opera, and Royal Opera, Covent Garden. Her operatic appearances also include Tosca for her Palau de les Arts Reina Sofia debut in Valencia, Leonora in Il Trovatore at Covent Garden, Amelia in a concert performance of Simon Boccanegra at Amsterdam's Concertgebouw, and Amelia in Un Ballo in Maschera in Bern and Tours. Upcoming performances include her house debuts at the Vienna State Opera and Barcelona's Gran Teatre del Liceu as Madama Butterfly, and she will return to the Teatro Real in Madrid as Leonora in Francisco Négrin's new production of *II Trovatore*. 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Other Company appearances include Madelon in Andrea Chénier, Grandmother Buryjovka in Jenůfa, Erda in Das Rheingold, and Preziosilla in La Forza del Destino. She has also made recent returns to Houston Grand Opera as Ježibaba in Rusalka and to Pittsburgh Opera as Baba the Turk in The Rake's Progress. Grove is a frequent guest at the Lyric Opera of Chicago where she has sung Marthe in Faust, Margret in Wozzeck, the Witch in Hänsel und Gretel, the Nurse in Die Frau ohne Schatten. Amneris in Aida, Erda in Götterdämmerung, and Countess Geschwitz in Lulu. At the Metropolitan Opera, her performances include Erda in Götterdämmerung and Das Rheingold, Magdalene in Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg, Madelon, Pantalis in Mefistofele, Emila in Otello, and Cornelia in Giulio Cesare. Sought internationally for his interpretations of the dramatic Italian repertory, Berti has performed Pinkerton (*Madama Butterfly*) at the Metropolitan Opera, Covent Garden, Deutsche Oper Berlin, and in Paris, Naples, and Florence. Borsa in 2017's *Rigoletto* and appeared last season as Gastone in *La Traviata*. As a participant of the 2016 Merola Opera Program, he performed his first principal role as Ferrando in *Così fan tutte*. Pati won the Lexus SongQuest in 2012 and the Waiariki Institute of Technology NZ Aria in 2015. Pati, along with his brother Pene Pati and their cousin Moses Mackay, comprise the highly successful New Zealand vocal trio SOL3 MIO, which mixes both classical and contemporary music. He can also be heard this season as Lord Cecil in *Roberto Devereux* and as part of the Angel Quartet in Jake Heggie's *It's a Wonderful Life*.



DIMITRI PLATANIAS (Kalamata, Greece)

His principal dance repertoire includes Balanchine's Apollo, Romeo and Juliet, Giselle, Swan Lake, Nutcracker, Serenade, Esplanade, and Carmen.



JOSÉ CURA (Rosario, Argentina) Production and Set Designer Internationally acclaimed tenor José Cura made his San Francisco Opera debut as Don José a addition to singing

in Carmen in 1996. In addition to singing, he is a composer, conductor, opera director, and stage designer. After studying composition and orchestral conducting in his hometown of Rosario, Argentina, Cura moved to Buenos Aires in 1984 and worked for four years in one of the professional choirs at the Teatro Colón, where his voice developed as one of the great tenors of the Italian and French repertoires. In 1999, José Cura resumed his conducting career, working with top orchestras such as the London Philharmonia, London Symphony, Vienna Philharmonic, and Hungarian Philharmonic, among others. 2007 saw the world premiere of *La Commedia* è finita, a creative re-imagining of Pagliacci, which marked the beginning of his career as a stage director and designer. Praise by audiences and critics for his productions of Samson et Dalila. La Rondine. Cavalleria Rusticana and Pagliacci sealed his stature as a director of distinction. His productions of *Turandot* at the Opéra Royal de Wallonie in 2016 and Peter Grimes in Bonn in 2017 also received acclaim. Upcoming directorial productions include *Nabucco* at Prague's National Theatre and La Fanciulla del West at Estonian National Opera. Next summer, he sings Cavaradossi in Tosca at Oper Köln.



JOSE MARIA CONDEMI (Buenos Aires, Argentina) Revival Director Jose Maria Condemi made his San Francisco Opera debut in 2005 with

Così fan tutte, and he has returned to direct productions of Carmen, Madama Butterfly, Faust, Tosca, Un Ballo in Maschera, and the world premiere of Nolan Gasser's The Secret Garden. Other notable engagements include Ernani and Tristan und Isolde at Lyric Opera of Chicago; Aida at Houston Grand Opera; Orphée et Eurydice and La Bohème at Seattle Opera; Osvaldo Golijov's Ainadamar and Don Giovanni at Cincinnati Opera; André Previn's A Streetcar Named Desire at Kentucky Opera; and Carmen at Central City Opera and Lyric Opera of Kansas City. Condemi is the Carol Franc Buck Distinguished Chair at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. He was also the artistic director of Opera Santa Barbara from 2010 until 2015 where he oversaw artistic planning and its studio artists program. Upcoming engagements include *Rigoletto* at New Orleans Opera, *Le Nozze di Figaro* at San Francisco Conservatory of Music, and Robert Xavier Rodríguez's *Frida* at Florida Grand Opera.



FERNAND RUIZ (Seville, Spain) Costume Designer Making his San Francisco Opera debut, Fernand Ruiz is the head of the costume department at

the Opéra Royal de Wallonie in Liège, Belgium where he designed the original costumes for this production of *Cavalleria Rusticana | Pagliacci*. Other productions for the same company include Otello, Cimarosa's II Matrimonio Segreto, II Barbiere di Siviglia, Donizetti's Rita and II Campanello di Notte, and the Beaumarchais play Le Barbier de Séville. Upcoming engagements include Aida and Anna Bolena at the Opéra Royal de Wallonie and L'Elisir d'Amore at Opera de Toulon.



OLIVIER WÉRY (Liège, Belgium) Original Lighting Designer Making his San Francisco Opera debut, lighting designer Olivier Wéry has been engaged

at the Opéra Royal de Wallonie in Liège for over 20 years. Among his work for the Belgian company are productions of Tosca, Don Carlo, Andrea Chénier, La Forza del Destino, The Magic Flute, this current production of Cavalleria Rusticana/Pagliacci, and Turandot (another collaboration with director José Cura). He has also collaborated on productions of Don Pasquale and Nabucco at the Opéra de Nice, Rossini's La Gazzetta at Israeli Opera, and Andrea Chénier at the Opéra de Monte-Carlo, among other engagements.



JUSTIN A. PARTIER (San Francisco, California) **Revival Lighting** Designer The recently named lighting director at San Francisco Opera, lustin A. Partier has

designed numerous operatic and musical theater productions throughout the United States. Career highlights include Argento's Postcard from Morocco at the Merola Opera Program, the Verdi Requiem at San Francisco Opera, Fascinating Rhythm at the Transcendence Theater Company, Rich Girl at Florida Studio Theater, and Mary Poppins, Kiss Me, Kate, and Singin' in the Rain at the Merry-Go-Round Playhouse in Auburn, New York. Partier has also served as associate or assistant lighting designer for numerous San Francisco Opera productions, including Dolores Claiborne, Falstaff, and Mefistofele.



IAN ROBERTSON (Dundee, Scotland) **Chorus Director** Recipient of the San Francisco Opera Medal in 2012, Ian Robertson has been chorus director and conductor with

San Francisco Opera since 1987, having prepared more than 300 productions for the Company. He was awarded the Olivier Messiaen Foundation Prize in 2003 for his artistic contribution to the preparation of the Company's North American premiere of Saint François d'Assise. Robertson has also conducted ten mainstage productions with the Company. Other North American opera credits include productions with Sarasota Opera, Edmonton Opera, and Philadelphia's Curtis Opera Theatre. Before joining San Francisco Opera, Robertson was head of music and chorus director of Scottish Opera. He currently serves as artistic director of the San Francisco Boys Chorus.

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(San Francisco, California) Choreographer Lawrence Pech is in his 23rd season as dance master and resident choreographer for San

Francisco Opera. He has created period and interpretive dances on more than 60 productions with the Company. Pech received his formal training from American Ballet Theatre (ABT) and was invited by Mikhail Baryshnikov to join that company in 1980. Pech founded two of his own dance companies and has choreographed more than 50 ballets, 30 musicals, and numerous self-produced evenings of music and dance around the world.





A JIGSAW PUZZLE OF INFINITE POSSIBILITIES

When we announced the 2018–19 Season last January, I experienced something akin to what I imagine a singer feels when they pick up a review. It was a raw, personal, apprehensive moment. Here were artistic choices suddenly under the microscope, being scrutinized by a wonderfully passionate and knowledgeable audience. How would the critics and the public react?

This season is the first programming of the new administration. Only *It's a Wonderful Life* was in existence prior to my announcement as general director in 2015. Otherwise, we had a blank canvas, and you are about to experience the choices that we made!

Programming a season at San Francisco Opera means carrying forth the mantle of a stage that has quite literally shaped operatic history. What lies ahead must honor and further the exceptional legacy of what has gone before. We have been a company of life-changing experiences, of breathtaking excellence, of bold risk taking. We must continue to be that company. We must celebrate the absolute best in our art form, and we must do so across a fantastic swathe of repertoire, styles, and aesthetics.

That is the enormously exciting (and daunting) opportunity that a blank season presents. How do we go about filling it?

Season planning takes the convictions of artistic aspirations, passes them through lenses of feasibility, and determines whether the elements you need are available.

SIMON PAULY

First, season planning is not a solo endeavor. It touches every single aspect of the Company, and I am so proud that our planning is undertaken by a group of people who understand the art and craft of this art form with such nuance, and who come together with openness and collegiality, examining artistic possibilities from every angle.

Those angles include such facets as: What balance of titles will be most compelling for our audience? How do we utilize our extraordinary resources to the greatest impact? How do we create a variety of visual and aural worlds that will engage audiences in powerfully different ways? What are the stories that will resonate with our community? How will different productions fit together backstage? Are we creating a season that we can afford financially?

Those are some of the filters we apply, but what titles make it into the cauldron to begin with? There are a number of places from which inspiration can come. There are the titles that are burning needs and wants for the Company—titles that we've not done in many years and that allow our talents to shine (e.g., *Arabella*). There are the titles that can be strong investments for our future (*Tosca*). There are opportunities to partner with other companies (*It's a Wonderful Life*). There are intriguing curiosities that offer new perspectives to audiences (*Orlando*). Where can we take risk? Where can we be the most creative expressions of ourselves? Where do we lead? Where do we join others?

These are all facets in play as we plan for future seasons, as we think about what projects are right for which artists, as we talk with fellow companies and develop partnerships. Then there is the reality check of who and what is available. Is the right cast available for the roles? Is there a production that will work aesthetically and logistically with the other productions of the season? Will the flow of repertoire fit into our calendar?

Season planning takes the convictions of artistic aspirations, passes them through lenses of feasibility, and determines whether the elements you need are available. There is a magical moment when everything locks in. Our brochure goes to print, we announce the season, and then bring everything to life on the stage. The hope is that what results are moments of transformative impact for you, the audience. It's really very simple!

I can't wait to hear what you think! 🂮






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




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
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
