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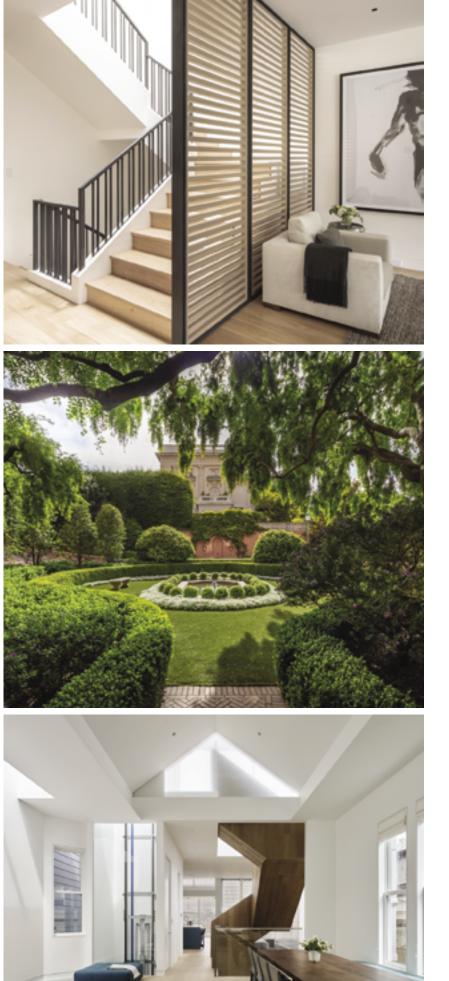




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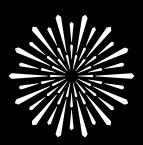
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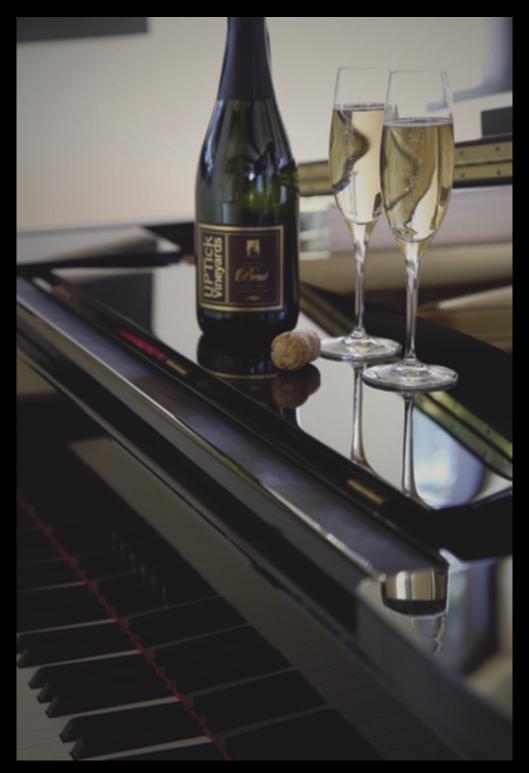




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A MESSAGE FROM

Opera for Life

hat is opera?" Christopher Street, a San Francisco Opera teaching artist, asked a class of fourth graders at Lafayette Elementary School. "A story that is sung," they chorused back in unison.

Any notion that Street's time in this San Francisco public schoolroom would be given over to rote recitation was quickly upended. Once the what-is-opera question was affirmed, Street got the students up to stretch out and shake their limbs, take a few deep breaths, and move their bodies in sync with four-beat, three-beat, and two-beat meters. "Don't confuse it with tempo," he reminded them. "That's how fast or slow the beats go."

Darting over to a whiteboard, the ebullient teaching artist drew some measure lines, notes (quarter, half, whole), and equivalent rests. The students ran through an exercise of clapping on the notes and not on the rests. Street's eyes scanned the room to reinforce rhythmic successes and lightly rib a child or two who clapped on a rest.

"Kids are learnin'. Brains are burnin'," he declaimed, as musical in speech as he was in clap-alongs and singing. Street's loose, jivey manner connected with the class. All eyes stayed on him through 45 eventful minutes. There were lots of grins. The session ended with the students echoing back a tone and then a brief melody Street sang first, as he meandered around tables making close eye-contact with his charges. "Don't worry about a thing," they all learned to sing together. "Because every little thing is going to be all right."

Street's regular visits to this and other classrooms are part of San Francisco Opera's extensive ARIA (Arts Resources in Action) programs, which reach some 23,000 students annually. That's one of the Company's many and diverse education activities, administered by the Opera's ten-year-old Education Department. Together with the Opera Guild, which has been providing opera education since 1939, they engage everyone from babies and toddlers to seniors.

One Sunday morning, children ages 3 to 8 and their parents or guardians gathered in the Veterans Building's Diane B. Wilsey Center for Opera for First Act: *The Little Prince's Adventure*. To pianoaccompanied tunes from Rachel Portman's 2003 opera based on

the Antoine de Saint-Exupéry novella, the young attendees lined up and processed around the room on cue. They carried cardboard birds on sticks that got festooned with ribbons after the children sang along, exchanged a compliment with an adult, or played a child-centric version of Simon Says ("Kid Says"). Flight of various kinds, both literal and metaphorical, was the prevailing theme.

A team of buoyant teaching artists, sporting aviator scarves and goggles and other costume pieces, conducted this "adventure." Alyssa Stone was one of them. "I like to say Exupéry exuberantly," she exulted, adding wordplay to the morning's musical and theatrical festivities.

Zoubin Ghahramani, a father who was there with his four-yearold and eight-year-old daughters, looked on fondly. They had come to this First Act early childhood program, he said, after his younger daughter "couldn't stop imitating" the San Francisco Opera singers she'd heard at the free *Opera in the Park* concert in September.

Four days after *The Little Prince's Adventure*, the same John M. Bryan Education Studio was turned into an opera cabaret with tables, fans of colored light on the walls, live entertainment, and themed cocktails. In this Drinks & Drama evening survey of the current San Francisco Opera season, soprano Rhoslyn Jones opened with a plangent "Stridono lassù" from Leoncavallo's *Pagliacci*. Listeners sipped a Clown Tears (bourbon, lemon, red wine) as she sang. The drink, said mixmeister Tommy Shaw of the Sea Star Bar in San Francisco's Dogpatch neighborhood, was "layered, with a little bit of tartness you might find in the opera."

The opera-drink pairings rolled on, intercut by more singing or commentary by San Francisco Opera staffers. There were photos documenting the Company's long history with *Tosca*, accompanied by the cheekily named Abuse of Power (vermouth, sherry, sparkling wine). A rum punch-based Viennese Waltz ushered *Arabella* into the program.

While no one is likely to study the long-term implications of opera-specific cocktails—entertaining and instructive as the Drinks & Drama evening was—there's plenty of research about the effects of music education in schools. While somewhat controversial, claims for music's power to enhance language development, math skills, spatial and temporal thinking, even test scores and IQ, have been widely reported.

San Francisco Opera wasn't thinking quite that globally in 2008, when then-General Director David Gockley created a new Education Department and recruited Ruth Nott from New York's Metropolitan Opera Guild to run it. But there were some carefully strategic objectives concordant with a philosophical evolution in the city's public schools.

"The San Francisco Unified School District was defining its arts master plan at that time," current General Director Matthew Shilvock recalled. "It was quickly apparent that the Opera could have a transformational impact if we connected the full scope of the Company to the schools. The idea was that opera needed to be so integral to the school district's mentality and core curriculum that they would become fundamental—tied as much as science and technology as to the humanities."

Nothing illustrates that principle in action more clearly than the mini-operas written and performed by elementary school students through the ARIA Network Program. Based on books and issues studied in the classroom, these short operas in various musical styles

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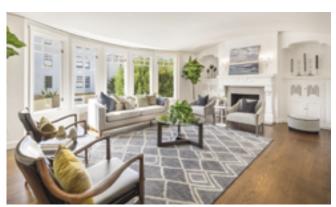

have addressed the state's Gold Rush history, global warming, bullying, and Native American life, among other subjects and themes.

"I hear the Captain calling / I hear a baby bawling," went a lyric from one mini-opera about immigration, created by fifth graders at San Francisco's Argonne Elementary School. "What is happening back home / I'm on this boat alone."

Ra Prum, a fourth-grade teacher at Lafayette Elementary who has participated in the program for seven years, sees these student-made operas as "21st-century learning that's completely Common Core." Prum tracks student gains in research, collaboration skills, emotional growth, understanding of story structure, and technological proficiency to the ARIA program. "One mom told me that a girl who never talked about school at home Skyped with her grandmother," said Prum, "and sang and acted out the whole opera for her."

Under Education Director Nott's leadership, programs in

students annually in 200 Bay Area schools. Opera à la Carte tours 45-minute adaptations of operas to schools (grades 4–8), where professional singers are supported by a student chorus and actors in speaking roles. In Opera Scouts, a weekly afterschool program, students ages 12 to 18 receive training, attend workshops and master classes, and learn such "life skills" as communication, confidence, and conflict management. There's Sing a Story in K–3 classrooms, the Summer Conservatory Training program for ages 10–18, and Voices for Social Justice!, a 12-week program for grades 4–8 that links music to issues of empathy and empowerment.

Education, as Nott and Altman concur, is a lifelong process. Thousands of adult ticket buyers attend pre-performance talks at the Opera House. Others take in lectures at senior centers and colleges. Last fall, the audience numbered 109 for a San Francisco Opera performance of arias and scenes at San Quentin State Prison.

schools and elsewhere have grown and flourished over the years. They include K–12 Opera ARIA Networks and Residencies built around ongoing visits by teaching artists; school group trips to final dress rehearsals of San Francisco Opera productions; engaging community programs for families, adults, university students, and seniors that reach over 35,000 people annually; and Opera in an Hour movie screenings in classrooms and at free family events in locations throughout the Bay Area.

Created by San Francisco Opera's Education and Media Departments, the films deliver music and narrative in a bright fashion. They make the case that opera can be accessible without being dumbed down. *The Barber of Seville* film, for example, takes flight with Figaro's full, florid opening aria, sung in sparkling English by baritone Joo Won Kang.

The Guild-sponsored programs, under Creative Director Caroline Altman's guidance, are similarly robust, serving over 50,000

Arriving in San Francisco just as the 2008 recession hit, Nott had to struggle for funding early on, as the Company tightened its collective belt. Now on a budget nearing \$1 million, she and her Education Department staff of five full-timers, two part-timers, and 20 teaching artists are on firmer ground.

"As a cultural institution in this community, we should be contributing to the greater good," said Nott. "After a program, people who go to the opera look and listen in a new way—a way that gets us connected to each other."

Making opera available in a hands-on way to students is essential, especially when some schools have sharply curtailed or eliminated music and art classes. "If we don't do it," added Nott, "we are losing multiple generations of people who love and appreciate what opera can be."

"Education is our primary mission," said Altman, creative director of the Guild. Up until 1995, the Guild funded fully-staged opera

productions for students. Beginning in 1996, opportunities for students to attend the opera increased by opening mainstage dress rehearsals for them. Today, with an education budget of \$500,000, a full-time staff of five, and a roster of 40 teaching artists, the Guild spreads its resources to schools and neighborhoods around the Bay Area and as far away as Eureka, Tracy, and Martinez.

This year's Opera à la Carte production of Donizetti's *The Elixir* of Love is booked to visit more than 100 schools, with four separate casts on the move. Students in the 2018–19 Hero Project will create songs and short scenes devoted to inspiring figures, historical or present day, of their choosing. The results will be presented in a Hero Festival performance in March. Voices for Social Justice! participants have created music narratives about the gang violence, racial inequality, and Donald Trump's proposed border wall.

"I really care about developing thinking, well-rounded people," said Altman, "effective citizens and voters who understand the importance of artists in any community. Witnessing and creating musical narratives can foster problem-solving, spur appreciation of the history and language of other cultures, and stand up for long-form storytelling in a sound-bite age." She added, "I think our work is the nurturing of the whole person, through empathy, compassion, and collaboration."

There's no substitute for being in the room when those principles are put into action.

Just after recess one October morning, the seventh and eighth graders at San Francisco's St. Gabriel School filed into the gymnasium/auditorium for a performance of *The Elixir of Love*, trimmed to 45 minutes. Led by Ben Brady, one of the three professional singers on hand to enact the opera's love-triangle plot, the audience rehearsed the chorus they had learned in their music classes over the past few weeks. Then it was on to the show.

With a clutch of St. Gabriel students onstage to handle the speaking roles they had studied in advance, this *Elixir* was a

tonic blend of singing, a few anachronisms in the script (references to eBay and Gatorade), and some impromptu mugging by the students. Instead of snickering at their classmates, the St. Gabriel audience seemed rapt by the music. Many, as Altman speculated, may never have heard a bel canto aria or ensemble before. Here up close to the singers, they heard a lot of delicious runs, trills, and vocal ornaments. "Let's sing a rousing chorus in honor of the bride," they sang back when cued.

In a brief question-and-answer period, one student sounded slightly awed. "How," she asked, "did you learn all those notes?"

San Francisco students participated in another way in a pair of Side-by-Side rehearsals, one for high school singers from the Ruth Asawa School of the Arts and the other for A.P. Giannini middle schoolers. Both Education Department rehearsals took place in different spaces at the Wilsey Center, where members of the San Francisco Opera Chorus sat next to and sang with the students.

The high school session was serious and focused. After some vocal warm-ups, the combined forces launched into a chorus from Smetana's *The Bartered Bride* with San Francisco Opera Chorus Director Ian Robertson on the podium. "Remember it's a folk tune chorus," Robertson said at one point, then reminded them of a marking: "Poco marcato."

Student singer Alicia Naylor-Guerrero looked a little wonderstruck on a break. "I was kind of intimidated at first," she said of singing with the San Francisco Chorus members. "Their voices are so mature. But it felt kind of magical. It made me want to pay more attention to dynamics and phrasing."

Things weren't quite so disciplined across the hall, where the middle schoolers and Chorus members were finishing up the madrigal "All Ye Who Music Love." Scrambling for the snacks outside, several of the students buzzed about how loud the professional singers were. One of them, Nathan Kwan, stopped to put a finer point on the matter: "It's powerful. They really project. We were trying to blend, but it's a big echoey room."

Kwan headed for the exit, then turned back. "By the way," he said, "I'm a tenor."

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IN MEMORIAM



MONTSERRAT CABALLÉ, Soprano

Renowned for her incandescent pianissimos and distinctive warm tone, the Catalan soprano appeared on the War Memorial Opera House stage for the first time in the title role of Puccini's Turan*dot*, opposite the Calaf of Luciano Pavarotti. Of her 1977 Company and role debut, the San Francisco Examiner remarked Caballé's "mellow, long-lined, richly-colored singing was nothing short of extraordinary. ... Her 'In questa reggia' narrative, reflective at first, built to higher and higher layers of intensity without apparent effort." Over a decade of appearances followed with San Francisco Opera, including the title

role of *Tosca* in 1978, Elisabetta in *Roberto Devereux* in 1979, the title role of *Semiramide* in 1981 (seen here), Amelia in *Un Ballo in Maschera* in 1982, the title role of *La Gioconda* in 1983, and Elvira in *Ernani* in 1984 for a total of 33 performances, along with concerts in 1984, 1986, and 1987. For many local fans, her unforget-table performances of *Semiramide* with Marilyn Horne are what forever secured her the title of "diva."



DEBBIE HENRY, Oboist

A member of the San Francisco Opera Orchestra for over 40 years, oboist Debbie Henry was a dedicated musician who gave everything to her job. Her playing was characterized by impeccable control, lovely tone, and, most of all, soulful expression. In addition to performing, she founded the chamber music series Anchor Chamber Players, loved to sew for her friends and colleagues, and

was an animal lover whose suburban backyard was home to chickens, geese, rabbits, cats, chickens, and a chinchilla. She passed away earlier this year after a 13-year battle with multiple myeloma. Principal Oboist Mingjia Liu recounts of Debbie: "She was sweet yet strong, honest and caring, resolute and daring. She was Brünnhilde in the real world. I am proud to say that I have worked side by side with a true Valkyrie."

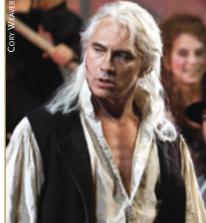


BARBARA K. JACKSON, Philanthropist

Opera was Barbara's greatest passion, and over the course of more than 15 years she sponsored dozens of San Francisco Opera Adler Fellows and Merola Opera Program participants. She also sponsored the annual Adler finale concert, *The Future Is Now*, for ten consecutive years and was the 2009 recipient of San Francisco Opera's *Spirit of the Opera* award. She passed away peacefully in her home on September 7, just one month shy of her 100th birthday. "The moment I met Barbara we were instantly family. She was my Grandma, and her love and support changed my life," says tenor and former Adler Fellow Brian Jagde. "Knowing she was sitting in the front row gave every performance more meaning. She was one of the most extraordinary people I've ever known, and she helped to make San Francisco feel like home for me."

DMITRI HVOROSTOVSKY, Baritone

Dubbed the "silver-maned baritone from Siberia," Dmitri Hvorostovsky appeared in six roles at San Francisco Opera: Figaro in *The Barber of Seville* (1996), the title role of *Don Giovanni* (2000), Grigory Grigoryevich Gryaznoy in *The Tsar's Bride* (2000), Giorgio Germont in *La Traviata* (2004), the title role of *Simon Boccanegra* (2008), and (seen here) Count di Luna in *Il Trovatore* (2009). He also brought his burnished baritone, incompa-



rable dramatic presence, and breathless legato to such varied parts as Eugene Onegin, Valentin in *Faust*, and Belcore in *L'Elisir d'Amore*, among many others. His career was sadly cut short last November at age 55 after a heroic two-year battle with brain cancer. There "have been many beautiful voices," the soprano Renée Fleming said, "but, in my opinion, none more beautiful than Dmitri's."

JANE BERNSTEIN, Philanthropist A passionate supporter of contemporary opera at San Francisco Opera, Jane Bernstein sponsored with her husband, Opera Board Member Bob Ellis, many of the Company's most trailblazing productions, including Saint François d'Assise, The Ballad of Baby Doe, Doctor Atomic, and Girls of the Golden West, as well as the 2011 premiere of Francesca Zambello's Ring cycle. As someone who

had a passionate zest for life, Jane adventured around the world, uplifted children in need in Cambodia, nourished culture, and inspired positivity. In addition to San Francisco Opera, she cared deeply about Opera Parallèle, OPERA America, and the importance of art in this country. "Jane believed that art should always be forward-looking and connected to today's world in meaningful ways," said Company General Director Matthew Shilvock. "All of us at San Francisco Opera join together in celebrating the life of a visionary light in our world."

KRISTINE CIESINSKI, Soprano

Tragic news emerged last summer from Wyoming's Grand Tetons regarding opera singer Kristine Ciesinski. A resident of the Teton Valley community and an avid pilot and flying instructor, she perished in a glider accident at age 65. In her earlier career as a soprano, Ciesinski's most performed roles were Katerina in Shostakovich's *Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk* and the title role of *Salome*, a part she sang in 18 different productions. As a



singer at San Francisco Opera, she performed as Gutrune, Third Norn, and Gerhilde in the Company's 1999 *Ring.* Among her family, she is survived by her husband, British bass-baritone Norman Bailey, as well as her sister, stage director and mezzosoprano Katherine Ciesinski who also sang with San Francisco Opera in the early 1990s.



J.D. McCLATCHY, Librettist

J.D. McClatchy is perhaps best remembered in San Francisco as the librettist of the 2013 world premiere opera *Dolores Claiborne*, a collaboration with composer Tobias Picker. A finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in poetry, "Sandy" was also an editor, translator, and veteran of the opera stage who had written libretti for more than a dozen composers, beginning with William Schuman in 1989 (A Question of Taste) and including Ned Rorem (Our Town), Picker (Emmeline), Lowell Liebermann (Miss Lonelyhearts), and Elliot Goldenthal (Grendel). He also wrote the libretto for the Metropolitan Opera's condensed English-language production of The Magic Flute. "The task of both librettist and composer is to make the singers thrill and move their audience," he once said. "Theirs is the hardest task of all. I'm nervous in front of a typewriter. What would I do if I had to worry about hitting a B-flat in front of 3,000 people?"



ARIEL BYBEE, Mezzo-soprano

A prolific performer and beloved teacher, American mezzo-soprano Ariel Bybee began her extensive career at the Metropolitan Opera in 1977 where she ended up singing 466 performances in every season until her final performance there in 1995 as Flora in *La Traviata*. But it's at San Francisco Opera where Bybee got her start. Her talents were discovered by General Director Kurt Herbert

Adler at the San Francisco Opera National Auditions while she was still a music teacher in Utah and California, and he invited Bybee to sing in San Francisco for five seasons in 15 roles, including as Musetta in *La Bohème* (seen here), Ines in *La Favorita*, and the title role of *Carmen* for Spring Opera Theater. "Hats off, gentlemen, a Carmen! Her name is Ariel Bybee," *Los Angeles Times* critic Martin Bernheimer breathlessly wrote in 1973.

CAROL NEBLETT, Soprano

Born in Modesto, Calif. on February 1, 1946, soprano Carol Lee Neblett was particularly celebrated for her performances as Minnie in Puccini's *La Fanciulla del West* (seen here), a role that she brought to San Francisco Opera in 1979, opposite Plácido Domingo as Dick Johnson. She had also performed for the Company as Elettra in *Idomeneo* (1977), Chimène in *Le Cid* (1981), Chrysothemis in *Elektra* (1984), Amelia in *Un Ballo in Maschera* (1985), and Elena in *Mefistofele* (1994). International



fame surrounded Neblett for most of her career, including during a notorious 1973 nude scene in the title role of *Thaïs* at New Orleans Opera and several performances on Johnny Carson's *Tonight Show*. For the last 13 years of her life, Neblett was a member of the faculty at Chapman University in Orange, California and maintained a private voice studio in Los Angeles.



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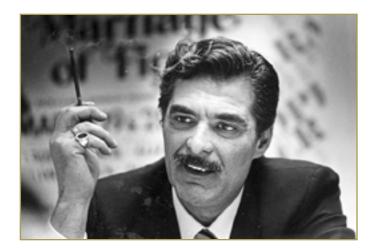
IN MEMORIAM continued



CANDIDA ARIAS, Chorister

Born and raised in the Philippines, Candida Arias was recognized from an early age for her vocal gifts. With her husband, Camilo, and three sons, Candida emigrated to San Francisco in 1969. A year later, she joined the San Francisco Opera Chorus where she remained for 25 years a valuable member of the ensemble. In 1982, she appeared as a Nun in the Company's John Dexter pro-

duction of *Dialogues of the Carmelites*. She also gave concerts in the Bay Area, as well as sang in countless weddings, church services, and community events—often with her husband, Milo, as her trusty accompanist. A generous and deeply devout person, she served as a mentor to many aspiring young singers.



TITO CAPOBIANCO, Director

"Groundbreaking" and "influential" are often the words used to describe the work of Argentine-born director Tito Capobianco. Beginning with Faust in 1962, he staged at San Francisco Opera winning productions of Cavalleria Rusticana, La Fille du Régiment, Otello, Pagliacci, Manon, Maria Stuarda, Lucia di Lammermoor, Norma, La Traviata, Thaïs, and I Puritani. As a longtime presence at New York City Opera, he directed landmark productions starring Beverly Sills, including Giulio Cesare and Donizetti's Tudor trilogy. (New York Times critic Harold Schonberg lauded the Giulio Cesare production for casting "a spell.") Later in his career, Capobianco went on to serve as the general director of San Diego and Pittsburgh Operas.

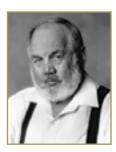


FRANCES ESCOBAR, Volunteer

Frances Fumiko Hosoya Escobar was a much beloved volunteer at San Francisco Opera who for over three decades helped in the artist lounge, serving refreshments to musicians, chorus members, and dancers. Most recently, she assisted in the Company's administrative offices. Music was her lifetime passion. In 1944, Frances graduated from the prestigious Tokyo (Kunitachi) College of Music. With the help and sponsorship of her American GI friends, she traveled to this country to continue her studies. She moved to San Francisco in 1958 and married Sixto Escobar whose life was tragically cut short. Her skill with numbers and work at Macy's department store helped her in raising her two daughters. As a singer with the Ina Chalis Opera Ensemble and several church choirs (including Calvary Presbyterian Church and with Masterworks Chorale), she shared her infectious love for the arts with her family and many friends all over the world.

DALE EMDE, Chorister

Tenor Dale Emde began singing with the San Francisco Opera Chorus in 1954. Over the course of a long and distinguished career at the Company, the World War II veteran appeared in various solo roles, including as Giuseppe in *La Traviata* (1980), a Voice in *La Gioconda* (1983), an Animal Vendor in *Der Rosenkavalier* (1985), and



Augustin Moser in *Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg* (1986). In addition, he sang with the San Francisco Symphony and formed his own small touring opera companies, performing such works as Arthur Benjamin's *Prima Donna*, Aaron Copland's *The Tender Land*, and Gian Carlo Menotti's *Amahl and the Night Visitors*. A man of many talents, Emde was a picture frame maker and owned an art gallery in Pacifica for more than three decades.

American opera is alive and well in the imagination of Jake Heggie

n the multifaceted world of music theater, opera has always occupied the higher ground. It's almost as if the very word has served to elevate the form and willfully set it apart from that branch of the genre where characters are wont to speak as well as sing: the musical. But where does that leave Bizet's *Carmen* or Mozart's *Magic Flute*? And why is it so hard to accept that music theater comes in a great many forms and styles and that through-sung or not, there are stories to be told in words and music and more than one way to tell them? Will there ever be an end to the tedious debate as to whether Stephen Sondheim's *Sweeney Todd* or Leonard Bernstein's *Candide* are musicals or operas? Both scores are inherently "operatic" for sure, but does performing them in an opera house as opposed to a Broadway theater make them any more or less important?

To some, it clearly does. When Andrew Lloyd Webber created a "rock opera" with *Jesus Christ Superstar*, he was surely mindful of how the juxtaposition of "rock" and "opera" might give his fledgling stage work a loftier street cred. When Leonard Bernstein was in the throes of writing arguably the greatest of all musicals— *West Side Story*—we know now from the exchange of letters to and from his collaborators, Arthur Laurents and Jerome Robbins, how vehemently they resisted his desire to "operatize" the piece, to maximize the effect of the sung music, for instance, to have Maria true only to himself and that his unapologetic fondness for and love of the American stage at its most lyric would dictate how he would write, in the only way he knew how: tonally, gratefully, generously, from the heart.

Dissenting voices have accused him of not pushing the envelope, of rejoicing in the past and not the future, of veering too close to Broadway (as if that were a bad thing) and courting popular appeal. But where Bernstein, it could be argued, spent too much precious time quietly seeking the approval of his cuttingedge contemporaries (with even a work like *A Quiet Place* betraying a certain determination to toughen up his act), Heggie has written only the music he wanted—needed—to write. He is often asked if and when he might one day write a musical and his response is: "What do you think I've been writing for the last two decades?" Case made. Case rested.

Heggie's musical roots were sunk unfathomably deep when during his time at UCLA, he studied with Johana Harris, widow of that flinty American icon Roy Harris and one of the finest pianists of her generation. She was by his reckoning a hugely inspirational teacher and her husband's breadth of vision clearly rubbed off on both of them. A personal relationship ensued. Other names leap out from those UCLA years: movie music dynamo David Raksin (remember *The Bad and the Beautiful?*) and Henry Mancini in

sing her final speech over the body of Tony. That was the "aria" that never was. And rightly so.

But when you consider how marginalized Bernstein felt by his peers (and having interviewed him the year before he died, I know this to be true), and how his remarkable Broadway work was seen as a handicap to his acceptance by the contemporary music establishment of the day, you begin to understand why he was so receptive to the idea that *West Side Story* was more of an opera than a musical and that by entrusting it to the leading soprano and tenor of the day (in that misguided and now discredited 1984 Deutsche Grammophon recording) would somehow enshrine it for the ages. It was a wrong-headed betrayal of its Broadway origins. And calling it an opera did not make it any more of a masterpiece.

Yet Bernstein could see even then how the legacy of the American musical could and would evolve. I remember him saying on the day that we met that he fervently hoped that through the creative endeavors of figures like Stephen Sondheim, there would slowly but surely emerge a particular kind of American opera.

In that, he would surely have found kinship with Jake Heggie. They did meet, it seems, but not before Heggie's operas—led, of course, by the astonishing San Francisco Opera commission *Dead Man Walking*—had found unprecedented international success. Bernstein would perhaps have seen a bittersweet irony in the fact that Heggie, from the very start of his creative journey, had been whose name an award was created. (Heggie was the recipient in 1987.) Add to that the unexpected twist of a career-changing appointment as San Francisco Opera's Public Relations Associate and a self-confessed passion for Barbra Streisand and you clearly have a man for whom the theater would always be home.

But in the beginning, there was Song. Heggie's many songs (to date, nearly 300 of them) were the embryos from which his big stage pieces would grow. They were self-contained dramas, always very specific, always telling a story. He has spoken of making a journey of any poem—sometimes a physical journey, always an emotional one. And that emotional connection has informed all his work with words. His great gift is in finding the natural music of those words and if a song suggests a foray into jazz or blues or even pop culture, his instincts are as sound as they are illuminating. In his dramatic song cycle *Into the Fire*—written for his muse-in-waiting, mezzo-soprano Joyce DiDonato—he traverses the tragic life of the sculptor Rodin's mistress and kindred spirit, Camille Claudel. Heggie's music is in perfect harmony with the way in which Claudel's sculptures move—or rather, dance.

Above all, his vocal lines—so naturally leavened in rhythm and rhyme, ebb and flow—are so grateful to sing. He is that rare thing: a born melodist. Small wonder that during his time at San Francisco Opera, the music he shared with luminaries such as Frederica von Stade quickly found favor. Without wishing to make Cory Weaver / San Francisco Opera

too sweeping a generalization, the musical language of contemporary opera can so often be at odds with the subject matter, by which I mean the particular color and cast of the setting, the specifics of time, place, mood, and situation. The musical syntax we've come to know all too well can sound much the same from piece to piece: vocal chord-stretching pyrotechnics that make little or no concession to individual characters, or indeed, operas. Heggie doesn't hide behind the fanciful or the tricksy or the unsingably "cutting-edge" but rather serves and illuminates his texts through the honesty and elegance of his vocal writing.

DiDonato and it achieved what might have seemed impossible for anyone who has seen and ultimately thrilled to the play. It musicalized the text in such a way as to make it inconceivable that the music hadn't been there all along. It was later adapted for Kiri Te Kanawa. You see, singers know when they happen upon vocal gold.

Happening upon the appropriate musical color for his pieces is again key to their success. Though his musical voice is always apparent, the accent shifts. So we have the gospel elements in *Dead Man Walking*; the male chorusdriven, sea-shanty tang of *Moby-Dick*; the Italianate bel canto spoofing (so skilled in its affection and execution that it sounds like the real thing) in *Great Scott* (another vehicle, and then some, for DiDonato); or the homespun hue of *It's a Wonderful Life* with its magical celestial waltz so redolent of another of the American lyric stage's most glorious creations, Richard Rodgers' *Carousel*.

When a work is through-sung, the onus is on the composer to find ways of sustaining dramatic tension and pointing up all the emotional climacterics. Ask Andrew Lloyd Webber why he chooses the through-sung rather than the Sondheim-preferred book-song format (some would say a far more exacting skill), and he'll tell you that it's important to him that the music drives the narrative. In his case, underscoring and reprise carry forward the emotional memory; with Heggie, it's a more subliminal network of leitmotifs that trigger our emotional responses.

It's also the way in which speech becomes song and

the way song takes us to the next level of intensity. Of course, it helps when you work with two of the best and most composerfriendly librettists imaginable: Terrence McNally (linking back to the Great White Way where he gave us one of the finest books ever written for a Broadway musical, *Ragtime*) and Gene Scheer whose ear for poetry lends a very particular dynamic. In *It's a Wonderful Life*, one might single out his collusion with Heggie in the Stephen Foster-like fireside song intimated in Mary Hatch's farewell to Bedford High or George and Mary's rapturous duet at the close of Act I where we are truly in thrall to Frank Capra's warm embrace. These lyric "blossomings," be they in the voice or orchestra, are an enduring characteristic of Heggie's musical language. Sometimes they are fleeting in nature, filling a phrase or even just a word. But they stay with you. You may not be immediately aware that they do, but you'll know them when they creep up on you again.

Opera is also about "elaborations." It's one of the reasons Stephen Sondheim gives for not liking it. He repeatedly says that he is interested in serving only the moment, not elaborating on it. I once jokingly suggested that his *Liebestod* (Isolde's transfiguration at the climax of Wagner's *Tristan und Isolde*) wouldn't be much fun, that it would all be over in 30 seconds. That amused him.

Heggie rises to those elaborations. Anyone who has ever seen and been floored by *Dead Man Walking* will remember above all the scene in the appellate court where the victims and perpetrator's families are gathered. From the line "You don't know what it's like," Heggie fashions a searing sextet where everyone's pain is voiced. All are victims. And only in opera can they be heard at once. It's as powerful a piece of writing as I know in 21st-century opera and Heggie's detractors should be directed straight to it.

But there is more. In *Great Scott*, Heggie writes comic opera with heart. Wagner, Verdi, and Britten might come back to tell you how hard that is. In *Great Scott*, it is the fictional Italian master Vittorio Bazzetti whose ghost appears to opera superstar Arden Scott (DiDonato), spurring her on to shine in his long-lost opera *Rosa Dolorosa, Figlia di Pompei*. But the 11 o'clock number (to use Broadway parlance) of Heggie's opera turns comedy to aspiration, celebrating the craft in all its glory in a quartet which might well become known as Heggie's *Rosenkavalier* moment.

"It's always the song, not the singer," reads McNally's text and as that sentiment gains traction, my thoughts turn to the ghost of Bazzetti and his withering dismissal: "American Opera—I didn't think there was such a thing." There sure is, and it's alive and well in the imagination of Jake Heggie.

Just after the remarkable 2010 premiere of Moby-Dick, my great friend Patrick Summers invited me to create a holiday piece for the Houston Grand Opera. Patrick has been one of my closest artistic partners through the years and has led the world premieres of my operas Dead Man Walking (2000), The End of the Affair (2004), Three Decembers (2008), Moby-Dick (2010), and Great Scott (2015). He said he was looking for a work that opera companies could produce in big or small houses while the ballet was performing Nutcracker.

We considered beloved stories that return every Christmas that would make sense as an opera. (Charlie Brown was out. So were Frosty the Snowman and the Grinch.) I sought an American story that was innately operatic but had yet to be developed for the opera stage. I don't know when It's a Wonderful Life actually came to mind, but I knew it was exactly the story I wanted to pursue: an American classic about the ripple effect of good deeds in a community. Isn't that a message we always need?

Filled with beloved characters, it is a journey of extraordinary transformation with a sense of wonder, magic, mystery, and high stakes. The story has romance, humor, and big, open-hearted emotions that offer a world of musical possibilities. HGO said yes, and so did my most frequent collaborator, the brilliant librettist Gene Scheer. And then, much to my immense joy, the San Francisco Opera-my beloved home company-also jumped on board! The spectacular production team from Moby-Dick also joined in. So with all that talent and possibility in place, all we had to do was write it. Easy, right?

The greatest challenge of the project is that the story exists only as an iconic movie. Director Frank Capra used Philip Van Doren Stern's story "The Greatest Gift" as source material for his movie, but there is no novel in the library called It's a Wonderful Life. Every reference we have is from that indelible movie. But you can't put a movie on the opera stage. So how could we honor the

source, reconceive the story as an opera, and bring the audience with us? The job was immense.

Gene set to work inventing theatrical devices that could take us through the story. He came up with the idea of a magical attic with many doors representing all the days of George Bailey's life. That led to other discoveries and possibilities: a hat for Clara to stop time, a dance called the Mekee-Mekee, a quartet of angels to guide Clara, a spoken dialogue scene without music to represent the world without George Bailey, and so on.

Once the libretto was in good shape, I set to work. Due to my own overwhelming schedule, I pushed the deadline and wrote the opera in a very short time period, from January to June 2016. My collaborators were very understanding, but by pushing that deadline, I put them all in a difficult position. We were fortunate to have an enormously helpful workshop at University of Colorado

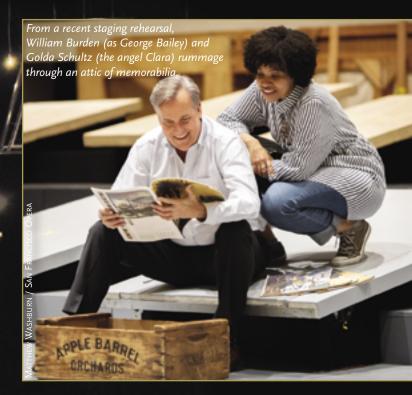
Boulder through the fabulous CU NOW program (Leigh Holman, director). A few rewrites and then I orchestrated in July and August 2016. The piece received its premiere on December 2. It was a beautiful, very successful (sold-out!) premiere run of performances. We were all pleased. But, we also recognized there was still work to do—as there always is after an initial run!

The last character to appear for any opera is the audience. New operas don't get previews during which the creative team gets to make changes and see how they work with an audience. New operas are shot out of a cannon at the audience on opening night. By this time, Indiana University had joined as a co-producer. This was excellent news, because it meant we could try out changes so that the piece would be in great shape for San Francisco.

For the Indiana University production in November 2017, we cut almost 15 percent of the opera and made some rewrites starting with the opening music for the opera. The prelude went from being mysterious and otherworldly to an explosion of holiday joy. We cut down the time it took Clara to get from the Heavens to Earth. We cut the character of Mr. Gower, the pharmacist. (I've never cut a character from an opera!) His scene seemed to block the dramatic flow, and we decided to focus more on Young George rescuing his brother Harry. Then we expanded the Act I arias for George and Mary so that they would really take flight and let us deep into the hearts of those characters. In Act II, we added a new duet between Clara and Mary as well as a duet scene between Mr. Potter and George. Even after having composed eight operas, every day seems to be a school day.

We were all confident with the new material and the Indiana performances went very well, but then we realized the set would need to change to reflect the new material! Thanks to General Director Matthew Shilvock, several incredibly generous donors, our HGO partners, and the SFO family, the director and design team were able to revise the production for San Francisco. Among other things, they removed the mirrored doors of the original and painted the deck a lighter color to better catch new projections and light. There are other surprises, but I don't want to give everything away!

Two years after the premiere in Houston, we are all eager for the final character—you, the San Francisco Opera audience—to show up to experience this exciting new vision of the opera. Personally, it is immensely gratifying to bring it home here in the place where it all started for me. A wonderful life, indeed. Welcome!

I was fourteen years old when I first saw *It's a Wonderful Life*. It was a Friday night in the middle of December (yes, I remember). Around midnight, I was manually turning the dial on our black-and-white TV set, going through the seven available stations, and I happened upon the movie, which was just beginning. I did not know the story. I had not heard of the film. By the end, like millions of others since its 1946 release, I was smiling giddily and sniffling through a flood of tears.

When Jake called me and suggested we take on an operatic adaptation of this classic movie, I thought about seeing the film for the first time. I knew that, for most people who would see the opera, the story is as well known as almost any tale from American folklore. The classic scenes, the great lines, the images of Jimmy Stewart, Donna Reed, Lionel Barrymore, and the rest are part of our shared consciousness, almost a kind of secular scripture. I knew that this deep familiarity would provide unique challenges.

Opera requires all source material to be reinvented in ways that bring music to the emotional center of the theatrical experience the marrow of the matter. To make this happen for *It's a Wonderful Life*, we would have to find ways to honor the spirit of the film while at the same time making cuts and boldly reimagining the story.

The first task in constructing a libretto is not that dissimilar to creating an outline for a silent film. Because it couldn't rely on language to communicate all the details about the characters, silent film depended on telling a story with large, active, and dramatic gestures. The subtlety of great silent films came from the marriage of those dramatic performances to the magic of the camera.

In opera, the magic is in the music. And the challenge is to give just enough language to leave room for the music to breathe and reinvent the story. For this reason, a table read of an operatic libretto should always feel incomplete. The task of the librettist is to be a minimalist, to write language that requires music to fulfill its dramaturgical function.

When the Count in *The Marriage of Figaro* begs for forgiveness with the line "*Contessa perdono*," there is a radical simplicity and directness to the text. But in the music that communicates it, we feel an earthquake of emotion as we recognize an imperfect man trying to take a tentative first step in reinventing himself.

Jake and I are constantly trying to make sure that our storytelling puts the human voice at the center of the operatic experience. I suppose that seems self-evident. And yet ... it is always a challenge to get the balance just right and find ways to avoid relying too much on language. Our aim is to create opportunities for



the glories of singing to communicate the soul of the story.

This is not to imply that the language of a libretto is not crucial. Every word matters, just as every note matters. But the principal function of those words is to provide a foundation for music that expresses the truth at the heart of each moment on stage. Whether it is silliness and joy, as when George dances with his family in the attic, or each character's heartfelt expression of what life's greatest adventure might be, the goal is to find just the right music and

vocal expression to allow the audience to experience viscerally what each character is feeling.

> The film version of *It's a Wonderful Life* has such a beautiful script. As you will hear throughout the opera, I wove much of that great dialogue into the libretto. Those familiar with the film will certainly recognize iconic lines like, "The moonbeams will shoot out of your fingers and toes." That is a line that inspires music.

That said, however, the greatest poetry in the film blooms out of the indelible images that Frank Capra crafted to create the visceral feelings of hope and dashed dreams. Think of the close-up of George's face when he hears that his brother Harry has taken a job at his new father in-law's factory, trapping George at home. Or think of the brash, honky-tonk town of Pottersville, in a world in which George Bailey has never been born. For

an operatic stage work, we needed to find musical correlates for these moments —and for *every* moment that would allow the music to be the poetry that communicates George's emotional journey.

On the screen, George's disappointment is communicated with a close-up. In the opera, George sings his frustration and despair in a newly expanded aria. And to us, a world without a A world without a George Bailey in it is a world without a soul, a world without ... music. To rediscover our world, to live again, George must find his voice and sing himself back into existence.

In distilling this classic Christmas story for our newly crafted production in San Francisco, Jake and I have cut material that, to us, did not sing enough, and we have expanded moments that could sing more. We have added new duets and solo music throughout the score in order to more fully allow this adaptation to fulfill the promise of being a truly operatic telling of a classic tale.

It is a risky thing, taking on a beloved classic—even more, one of *my* beloved classics. But having worked with Jake for so long, I knew he would distill the time-honored themes of this story into inspired music, allowing a familiar story to take on a new form, to be told and felt in

a new way. The idea is not to *improve* on the source, but rather to illuminate the material from a new angle, to enable us to experience the characters and themes deeply and differently, to love them again as if for the first time.

"No one is a failure who has friends." If you've seen the movie as many times as I have, you already know that this is the place where George will end his journey. But my hope is that our reimagining of Frank Capra's classic movie in the opera you're about to experience will connect you anew to a sense of wonder. And if this is your first encounter with *It's a Wonderful Life*, or you've only stumbled upon it once on TV at some half-remembered point along the way, I hope our opera allows you to feel this beautiful story in a way that is as meaningful as it was for me on that long-ago December night.

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ARTIST PROFILES



JAKE HEGGIE (San Francisco, California) Composer Jake Heggie is the composer of the acclaimed operas Dead Man Walking, Moby-Dick, It's a Wonderful

Life, Great Scott, Three Decembers, Two Remain, To Hell and Back, and At the Statue of Venus, among others. He is currently at work on the opera If I Were You, to a libretto by Gene Scheer based on the Faustian story by Julien Green and commissioned by the Merola Opera Program for summer 2019. He is also composing a dramatic song cycle for Violins of Hope and a song cycle for baritone Joshua Hopkins based on new poetry by Margaret Atwood. Heggie has composed nearly 300 art songs, as well as chamber music, choral, and orchestral works. His operas have been produced on five continents. *Dead Man Walking* received its 60th international presentatino earlier this year at London's Barbican Hall in a production starring Joyce DiDonato and Michael Mayes with the BBC Symphony and Chorus. Moby-Dick, a San Francisco Opera co-commission, has received a dozen international productions since its 2010 premiere at the Dallas Opera. San Francisco Opera's production was telecast internationally as part of Great Performances' 40th anniversary season and released on DVD (EuroArts). Heggie is a frequent guest artist and master teacher at universities and conservatories internationally. He lives in San Francisco with his husband, Curt Branom, a star of the long-running show Beach Blanket Babylon.



GENE SCHEER

(New York, New York) Librettist Gene Scheer has collaborated on many projects with Jake Heggie, including the San Francisco Opera co-commission

Moby-Dick; the San Francisco Opera cocommission Three Decembers; the lyric drama To Hell and Back for Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra; the opera Two Remain which premiered at the Atlanta Opera earlier this year; and the song cycle Camille Claudel: Into the Fire, premiered by Joyce

DiDonato and the Alexander String Quartet. Other collaborations include the 2012 opera Everest written with Joby Talbot for the Dallas Opera; the 2012 Grammy-nominated oratorio August 4th, 1964 with Steven Stucky for the Dallas Symphony Orchestra; the operatic adaptation of Cold Mountain with Jennifer Higdon, which premiered at the Santa Fe Opera in 2015; and An American Tragedy with Tobias Picker, which premiered at the Metropolitan Opera in 2005. A composer in his own right, Scheer has written several songs, including for Renée Fleming, Stephanie Blythe, Denyce Graves, and Nathan Gunn. The libretto for It's a Wonderful Life is dedicated to his wife, Kristina Scheer-Lechowski.



WILLIAM BURDEN (Miami, Florida) George Bailey Tenor William Burden made his San Francisco Opera debut in 1992 as Count Lerma in Don Carlo, and he has returned

as Laca in Jenufa, Tom Rakewell in The Rake's Progress, Dan Hill in Christopher Theofanidis' Heart of a Soldier, and Peter in Mark Adamo's The Gospel of Mary Magdalene, among other roles. He has also appeared at the Metropolitan Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago, Seattle Opera, Opera Philadelphia, Santa Fe Opera, Milan's Teatro alla Scala, Glyndebourne Opera Festival, Paris Opéra, Munich's Bavarian State Opera, Netherlands Opera, Canadian Opera Company, and the Saito Kinen Festival. His repertoire includes the title roles of Les Contes d'Hoffmann, Pelléas et Mélisande, and Béatrice and Bénédict; Loge in Das Rheingold; Captain Vere in Billy Budd; Aschenbach in Death in Venice; Don José in Carmen; Edgardo in Lucia di Lammermoor; and Lensky in Eugene Onegin. 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GOLDA SCHULTZ (Bloemfontein,

South Africa) Clara Making her San Francisco Opera and role debuts as Clara, soprano Golda Schultz is a graduate of the

Juilliard School and a former member of the ensemble of Munich's Bavarian State Opera where she appeared in a wide variety of roles, including Sophie in Der Rosenkavalier, Fiordiligi in Così fan tutte, Liù in Turandot, Musetta in La Bohème, Micaëla in Carmen, Freia in Das Rheingold, and Pamina in The *Magic Flute*. After a successful Salzburg Festival debut as Sophie in 2015, Schultz returned in summer 2017 as Vitellia in La Clemenza di Tito. CHRISTIAN PURSELL (Santa Cruz, California) Angel First Class First-year San Francisco Opera Adler Fellow and a national semifinalist in the 2015 Metropolitan Opera National Council

Auditions, bass-baritone Christian Pursell made his San Francisco Opera debut in September as Sir Walter Raleigh in *Roberto Devereux*, and he most recently appeared as a lailer in Tosca and Count Lamoral in Arabella. He also earned recent acclaim for his performances in the world premiere of Gregory Spears' Fellow Travelers at Cincinnati Opera. 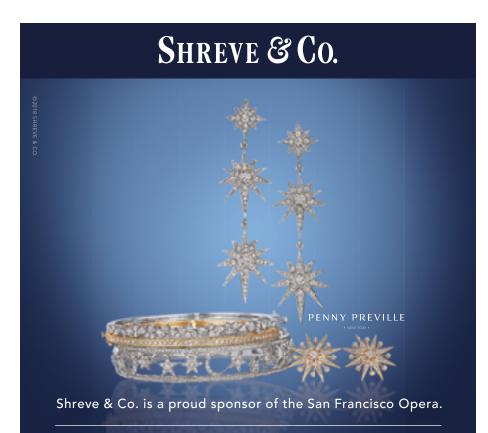

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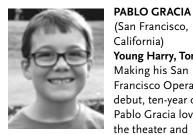


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(San Francisco, California) Young Harry, Tommy Making his San Francisco Opera debut, ten-year old Pablo Gracia loves the theater and

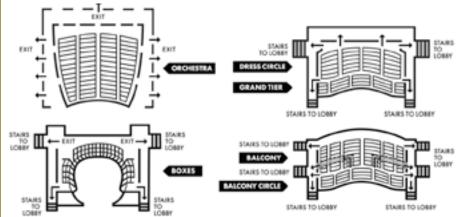

 $\star \star \star$ We'll take a cup of kindness yet, for auld lang syne. $\star \star \star$

So ends not only one of the great poems of Robert Burns, but also *It's a Wonderful Life*, our new holiday opera by Jake Heggie and Gene Scheer. The poem is a wistful evocation of "times gone by" (a rough translation of "auld lang syne"), and it reminds us that, through the coming together of people in good deeds, we can honor the best of the past and, from it, make good the future.

The holidays are synonymous with community: people gathering in the darkest months of the year and sharing in light and joy to banish the chill of winter. That holiday spirit is particularly embodied in the idea of traditions: the stories that are told, the foods that are eaten, and the songs that are sung. There is something incredibly comforting when a group of people starts singing holiday music together, deeply embedded in a shared tradition. We are transported back to the magic of holidays of our youth, and the world once again seems in harmony. As Bess Streeter Aldrich writes in *Song of Years*:

Christmas Eve was a night of song that wrapped itself about you like a shawl. But it warmed more than your body. It warmed your heart ... filled it, too, with melody that would last forever. $\bigstar \bigstar \bigstar$

My own holiday traditions were deeply musical. As the son of a local vicar, there was a constant flow of holiday services and concerts and, playing the organ, I was right amidst it all. The memories of school concerts, of playing in brass quintets in festive shopping malls, of carol singing around our neighborhood, of playing pieces like Hely-Hutchinson's *Carol Symphony* in our youth orchestra. Those memories are as vivid as anything I can recall, and it is because of the emotional bond that is forged by coming together as a community in shared song.

The story of *It's a Wonderful Life* is a reminder of the role of community in living a full and impactful life. For George Bailey, the holidays have become a time of anxiety and disillusionment, a painful void in which he sees nothing but self-failure. Through the guide of an angel, George comes to realize just how meaningful his selfless acts of community have been. He may not have lived out his dreams, but he has enriched the lives of everyone around him and uplifted his town.

As we prepare to celebrate both the holidays and this lyrical new opera, we are privileged to be doing so with the partnership of two incredible organizations who are bringing great meaning to our own community. Compass Family Services and Community Housing Partnership do powerful work to end homelessness in our city, empowering people and families to secure stable and self-sufficient futures. We have joined with them in our "Earn Your Wings" initiative in a celebration of what it means to do good for others. Through the shared experience of music making over the holidays, we are encouraging audiences to become more familiar with the work of these vital organizations, and, in doing so, be a part of the interconnectedness of this incredible city.

At the end of this opera, we will be inviting you, the audience, to join us in shared music making. As you fill this hall with song, I hope that it is both a magical harkening back to the traditions of your own holidays, and an affirmation of the centrality of community in forging a better world. We'll take a cup of kindness yet.
