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Did You Know?

For the Company's current production of *Cavalleria Rusticana | Pagliacci*, incorporating the sights and sounds of the Italian quarter of Buenos Aires, Argentina, the song "Caminito" by Carlos Gardel (1890–1935) sets the scene. The French-born tango singer, actor, and songwriter died tragically in an airplane crash in Medellín, Colombia at the height of his career.

Cavalleria Rusticana composer Pietro Mascagni and Pagliacci composer Ruggero Leoncavallo were warmly received in San Francisco during their separate U.S. tours in the early 20th century. In appreciation of the city, Mascagni wrote a piece for piano in February 1903 entitled Un pensiero a San Francisco (A Thought for San Francisco), which was published in the San Francisco Chronicle.

"Vesti la giubba" from *Pagliacci* might be one of the most borrowed operatic arias in American popular culture. Prominently used in the 1987 film *The Untouchables*, an episode of *The Simpsons*, and in the 1984 Queen song "It's a Hard Life," it was also popularized in a '6os-era Rice Krispies advertisement, named one of the top 10 TV commercials of all time by *Entertainment Weekly*.

Queen Elizabeth I, who is the subject of the Company's current production of *Roberto Devereux*, was both an avid arts patron and lover of languages. She was known to be fluent in French, Italian, and Latin, and is also believed to have spoken Spanish, Irish, Welsh, Greek, Flemish—and the now nearly obsolete tongue of Cornish.

Although she was the only English queen who never married, Elizabeth I (1533—1603) received wedding proposals from King Philip II of Spain, King Eric XIV of Sweden, Archduke Charles of Austria, and French brothers Henry III and Francis, Dukes of Anjou. She died at age 69, the last of the five kings and queens to rule under the Tudor dynasty.

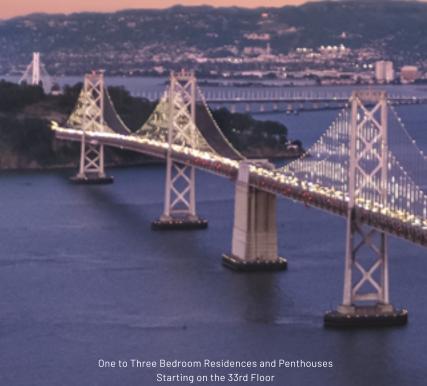

Chorus Concert in November

The San Francisco Opera Chorus will offer a public concert of sacred, secular, and operatic music on **Friday, November 30 at 7:30 p.m.**, in the intimate Taube Atrium Theater of the Wilsey Center for Opera. Under the baton of Chorus Director Ian Robertson, with assistance from Associate Chorus Master and pianist Fabrizio Corona, the 47-member chorus will take center stage in an eclectic blend of musical selections.

The Opera Chorus was established in 1927 by General Director Gaetano Merola who also served as the ensemble's director through 1943. As part of General Director Kurt Herbert Adler's development of the Company, the Chorus became full-time in 1981, working a minimum of 31 weeks, typically from March through early December. The Opera Chorus was the subject of the 1992 Academy Award-winning feature-length documentary *In the Shadow of the Stars* and has been featured in numerous video presentations.

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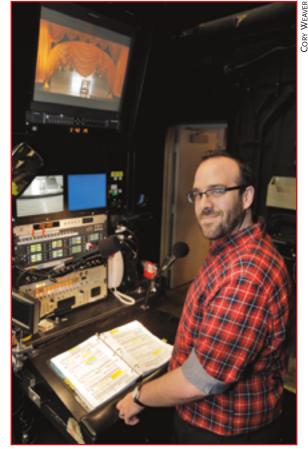

Darin Burnett

Production Stage Manager



Since 2009, Darin Burnett has "called shows" for San Francisco Opera from the stage manager's console backstage. To perform this crucial service, he wears a headset, operates innumerable knobs, switches, and levers, and manages every performance detail, ensuring that the show does, in fact, go on. With one eye on the conductor, Burnett follows along in his own heavily annotated score while quietly giving cues to everyone involved in the artistic and technical aspects of presenting the opera. Stage managers are, by necessity, the ultimate multitaskers; Burnett's unflappable calm while synthesizing music, drama, visual elements, technology, stage craft, and an army of personnel into a smooth-running performance is no mean task.

"In a sense, my job is to tell everyone what to do and when," Burnett says. "You're sort of like an air traffic controller: isolated in one place, seeing the big picture and making sure everything is happening safely and on time." In addition to the ability to read music and follow the conductor, the job requires an intangible "it" factor. "You have to be a leader and be able to galvanize people to do what needs to happen," he says.

To observe Burnett calling a show at the console is akin to witnessing a master class on grace and precision under pressure. Every few seconds he gives instructions while simultaneously receiving updates on every detail of how the performance is going. "At San Francisco Opera, we have many different communication channels on our headsets, one each for the lighting design team, spotlight operators, backstage electricians, the carpenters who move the stage elements, sound technicians, stage management, and so on. Everybody is separated by department which is good because I can talk to everybody at once or each group individually." Adding even greater complexity, Burnett constantly listens to all the

groups at once. "Each channel is its own party line and I'm listening to all of them at the same time. Sometimes it's no big deal, but there are times when you want to rip the headset off your head because your ear just can't take it anymore."

"I am generally not someone who gets riled, even when there is chaos around me," he says. "That comes partly from experience, but I think the key is to focus, clear your head, and always be thinking ahead so that you can not only be in the moment, but also be ready for what is coming next. If you can do that, then you won't be stressed when it's busy or when things go wrong."

A stage manager's opera score typically has dozens of tabs and multicolored sticky notes on each page. To the uninitiated, this visual cacophony can look daunting, but to Burnett and his team of stage managers each colored note represents a specific instruction and precisely when it must be delivered. These moments also have warning cues that are issued in advance, a handy system that alerts Burnett if a possible problem is brewing backstage—a broken piece of scenery, a faulty pyrotechnic effect, a singer battling stage fright—so he can troubleshoot promptly and safely before the performance underway is affected. "In opera, the stage manager is giving warnings for everything before it happens. Even before singers make their entrances on stage, we page them over the backstage PA system: 'Ms. so-and-so to the stage, please.'

"The ultimate goal of a good stage manager is to support everyone involved throughout the entire production process and to deliver smooth performances in which all the elements come together seamlessly. Although there are many of us backstage out of sight, we all feel a real sense of pride in hearing the audience react to the performance."

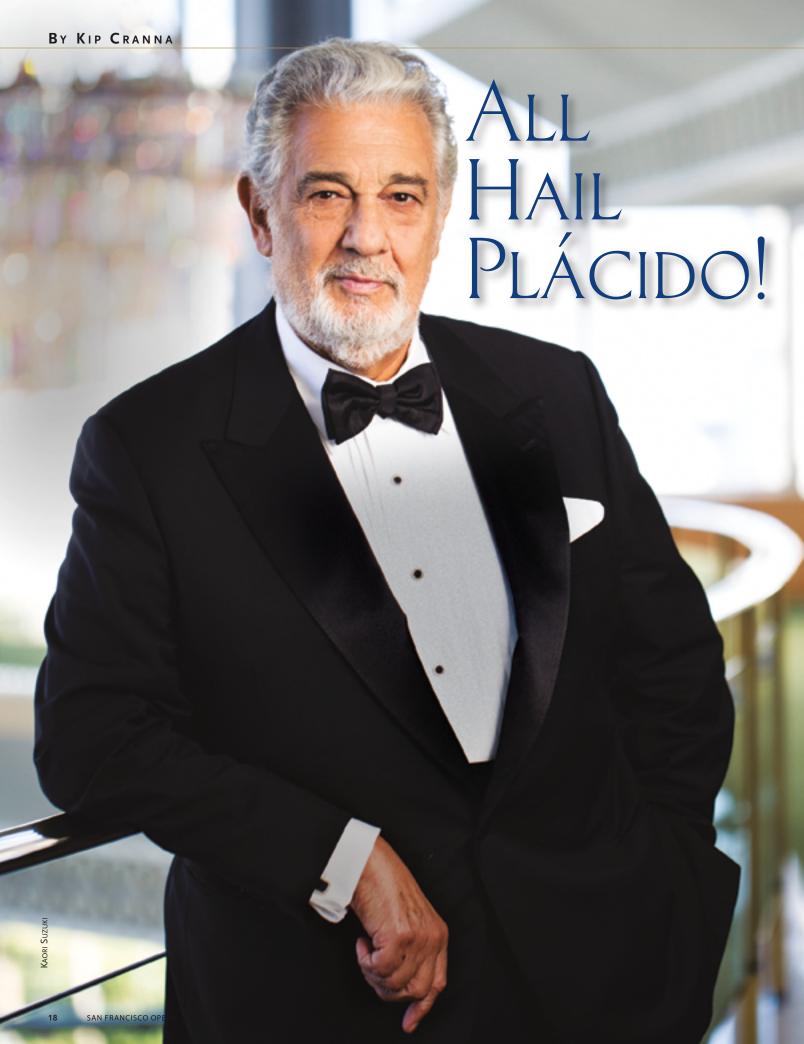

The indefatigable "King of Opera" returns to San Francisco Opera on October 21 for a special sold-out concert

s San Francisco Opera prepares to welcome the world-renowned opera superstar—and favorite—Plácido Domingo back to the War Memorial Opera House for a program with the Opera Orchestra, his admirers will surely reflect on the tenor's long and remarkable history with the Company. And why not start our recollections with the most remarkable event of all? For many longtime Opera patrons, it's hard to believe that this year marks the 35th anniversary of Plácido's most celebrated appearance here (among many memorable performances): his legendary "saving" of the 1983 season opener by flying cross-country from New York in a private plane as a last-minute replacement in the title role of Otello. As Mr. Domingo himself has remarked, "It was one of those performances: you know, there are 3,000 seats in the War Memorial Opera House, but today there are probably 20,000 people who say they were there that evening."

And those of us who were among the lucky 3,000 will certainly never forget it. The gala Opera Ball scheduled to take place after the show was instead held before it, to give Domingo's plane enough time to arrive. A well-lubricated crowd finally sat down to a performance that began at 10:30 p.m., and they remained—loyal and enthralled—until it ended (after four acts and three intermissions) at 2 a.m. (The stage manager's report for that performance is a masterpiece of understatement: "The role of Otello was sung by Plácido Domingo. The performance was delayed because of Mr. Domingo's late arrival.")

What the evening demonstrated above all wasn't only the famous tenor's unsurpassed sense of adventure, but also his admirable professionalism, stamina, and dedication to his fans—all this, of course, combined with the matchless vocal talents, viscerally thrilling sound, astounding musical acumen, and vivid onstage charisma that have made his name a household word. In fact, in today's digital age characterized by myriad options for getting one's information, he is arguably the only living classical singer whose stardom extends beyond operatic circles to the "man on the street."

The 1983 Otello was not Mr. Domingo's first rescue for San

Francisco Opera. His Company debut in 1969 at age 28, as Rodolfo in *La Bohème*, was also an eleventh-hour substitution. (Devotees of the wildly popular "Three Tenors" concerts of the 1990s and early 2000s might be interested in a noteworthy coincidence: each of the three made his San Francisco Opera debut as Rodolfo: Luciano Pavarotti two years before Domingo, in 1967, and José Carreras just a few years later in 1973.) Domingo saved the day for San Francisco Opera yet again in 1971, substituting as Manrico in *Il Trovatore*, opposite the Leonora of Leontyne Price.

Domingo's versatility and can-do spirit were also on display in 1980, this time at an Opera in the Park concert at the bandshell in San Francisco's Golden Gate Park, where a rare September downpour had forced the orchestra to go home. The dauntless tenor gamely agreed to brave the damp, robustly singing with piano accompaniment alongside his *Samson et Dalila* co-stars mezzosoprano Shirley Verrett and baritone Wolfgang Brendel. Domingo even took to the piano at one point to accompany Brendel! (He had supplemented his early career as a singer in Mexico City by working as a ballet pianist.)

Born in Spain and raised in Mexico, Domingo began as a youngster singing with a company founded by his parents that presented *zarzuelas* (Spanish-style light operas)—an art form that has remained one of his persistent loves throughout his career. He performed a program of *zarzuela* highlights at the War Memorial in 1984, joined by Spanish soprano Pilar Lorengar, and included several *zarzuela* selections in his 1990 concert here with soprano Ann Panagulias. His October concert in San Francisco can be expected to feature *zarzuela* hits as well.

A mere glance over Plácido's professional history makes it impossible to imagine a singer with more impressive career statistics. He has racked up more than 3,900 performances of an astounding 150 operatic roles, challenging the notion that the human brain has a finite capacity to memorize. The list now includes baritone parts (to be represented in his upcoming concert), which he began adding in 2009 with Verdi's Simon Boccanegra, as well as newly created roles in the challenging contemporary operas he has championed. His more than a hun-

dred recordings—including "crossover" albums with artists like John Denver, Josh Groban, Susan Boyle, and Harry Connick, Jr.—have earned him 12 Grammy Awards, and his more than 50 music videos have garnered two Emmys. Three commercially available San Francisco Opera recordings feature him, all in French repertoire: videos of Saint-Saëns' Samson et Dalila and Meyerbeer's L'Africaine as well as an audio CD of Massenet's Hérodiade.

As if life as a globe-trotting operatic megastar were not enough to keep him busy, Domingo has made conducting a mainstay of his career as well, beginning with his podium debut for a New York City Opera *Traviata* in 1973. To date, he has conducted over 500 performances, including a run of Wagner's *Die Walküre* this past summer at the famed Bayreuth Festival dedicated to the composer's works.

Putting his creative skills to work behind the scenes, he has had a prodigiously productive life as an opera administrator, acting as artistic director at Washington National Opera at the Kennedy Center from 1996 through 2011, and taking on a similar role at Los Angeles Opera in 2000, where he continues in the post of general director.

Now at age 77, this operatic Renaissance Man shows no sign of slowing down, famously protesting, "If I rest, I rust." This September, he sings a concert marking the reopening of Houston Grand Opera's Wortham Theater Center after a year of flood-damage repairs, then performs a Los Angeles run of Verdi's Don Carlo (in the baritone role of Rodrigo). After his San Francisco concert in October, it's on to New York's Metropolitan Opera for the title role in Puccini's comic Gianni Schicchi. A long list of Verdi baritone roles fills out the rest of his season ahead, including the elder Germont in La Traviata at the Met, La Scala, Covent Garden, and Munich, Simon Boccanegra in Vienna, Macbeth in Berlin, and Nabucco in Dresden, plus Juanillo in Manuel Penella's El Gato Montés back in Los Angeles.

It's natural to wonder how he manages to find time for it all—

let alone the energy. He is famous for arriving very late in the rehearsal process for his roles, but rarely seems unprepared thanks to his renowned gift for being a "quick study." As late stage director and former San Francisco Opera General Director Lotfi Mansouri once remarked, "I would personally rather have one day with Plácido than a month with many other singers. He is an artist who makes a stage director look good."

For his most recent production in San Francisco, in the title role of Alfano's Cyrano de Bergerac in 2010, Plácido made the unusual advance request to have a TV-style teleprompter available in case he forgot his words, not having sung the opera in recent years. But any need for that memory aid quickly evaporated as his famous powers of score recall sprang into action.

Industry insiders sometimes hear complaints that he can be stretched too thin, and difficult to reach to make management decisions. Yet under his leadership, the companies he has helmed in Washington and Los Angeles have made great strides artistically, for which he can justly claim credit. It helps that he is indefatigable, often getting on a plane after a rehearsal or performance in one city to attend a board meeting, opening night, or donor event in another.

He has also been unflagging in promoting young signers, principally with his international opera competition Operalia, founded in 1993, which has fostered a host of talented artists, including his two co-stars for October's "Plácido Domingo in Concert": soprano Ana María Martínez and tenor Arturo Chacón-Cruz. Other Operalia winners include (to name just a few) Nina Stemme, José Cura, Eric Owens, Joyce DiDonato, Rolando Villazón, Brian Jagde, the late Brian Asawa, and Carmen Giannattasio who will perform next month the title role of *Tosca* in the Company's new production. "I'm proud to say that with Plácido's help early on in my career, next year I will celebrate 20 years of professional singing," says the Italian soprano.

Domingo's unstinting dedication to the opera public continues

to be a model for performing artists everywhere. A former colleague recalls his 2002 tour to Japan in Otello—in his final performances of what had become his signature role. Unphased by the taxing demands of the part, he heartily faced an endless line of well-wishers after each performance, spending hours signing photos and programs for each eager fan who had waited for him. This degree of generosity, patience, and respect for the paying public has helped make him a beloved figure world-wide.

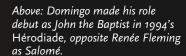
Anyone who has been in the rehearsal room with Plácido can attest to his intense commitment to his art. He arrives in the hall on time, greets everyone (with an uncanny ability to remember names in theaters across the globe), and is frequently the last to leave the rehearsal, offering an admirable example of discipline, politeness, and consideration for all. Amusing and endearing anecdotes about the famous tenor abound, but temper tantrums and ego trips do not feature prominently among them.

A gracious social presence adds to the esteem Domingo has earned among his professional associates. Whether taking care that the guest list for a post-performance dinner doesn't exclude a deserving colleague, or offering a fellow staffer a lift, he can be relied upon for a tireless sense of duty that is a rarity in superstars. Nobody is a better candidate for disproving the adage that nice guys finish last.

During his nearly 50-year association with San Francisco Opera, Plácido Domingo has earned a permanent place in the pantheon of the city's beloved performers. He once remarked that "San Francisco is a place where I have been able to do a lot of my main repertoire but also to satisfy my curiosity about new roles." And he, in turn, has helped San Francisco audiences satisfy their craving for inspirational singing coupled with captivating artistry. It will be nice to welcome him back.

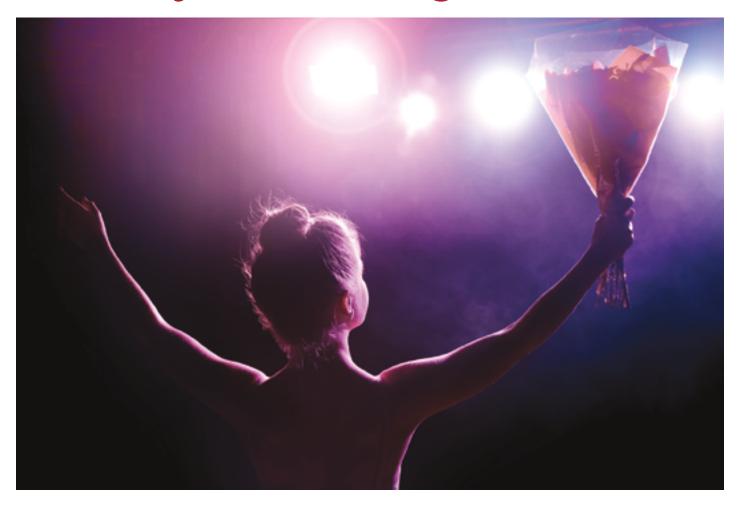

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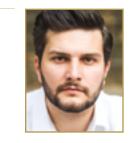
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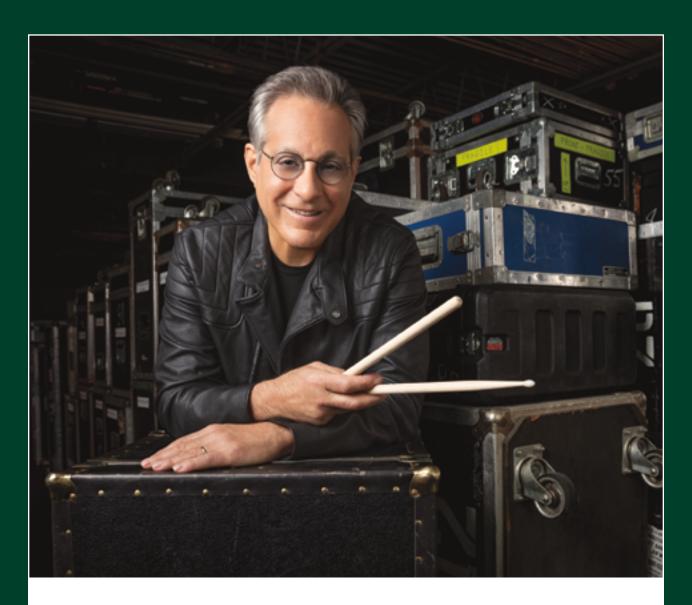

ROBERTO DEVEREUX

Queen Elizabeth I has sent her beloved Robert Devereux, the Earl of Essex, to lead a military expedition to Ireland. Against the Queen's orders, Robert has signed a peace treaty with the Irish rebels. Jealous of his favorable position with the Queen, her advisors seize the opportunity to push through a charge of treason against him.

ACT I

Parliament prepares to discuss charges against Robert Devereux. Sarah, the Duchess of Nottingham and close friend of Queen Elizabeth, is plagued with guilt for being romantically involved with Robert prior to her marriage. Elizabeth arrives and expresses her love for Robert, and confides to Sarah that she suspects Robert of being unfaithful. The Queen is interrupted by a visit from Lord Cecil and Sir Walter Raleigh who convey Parliament's frustration over her leniency towards Robert. To stall Parliament, she demands more proof of guilt before making a decision. When a page arrives with a request from Robert to meet with the Queen, her heart is stirred with a hope that their affection will be rekindled and she agrees to the visit.

Elizabeth meets Robert in private and tenderly reminds him of the ring she gave him, a special token that will guarantee his safety if he sends it back to her. Robert accidentally reveals that he is in love with another woman. Seeing Elizabeth's initial anger escalate to fury, he tries to deny everything but the damage has been done: Elizabeth is set on vengeance against Robert and the unknown woman who has won his affection. With Elizabeth infuriated, Robert's only remaining ally is the Duke of Nottingham (Sarah's husband). Nottingham discloses to Robert that he observed his wife sobbing while embroidering a blue scarf and expresses his concern over his wife's secret suffering. Their exchange is interrupted by Lord Cecil who summons Nottingham on behalf of the Queen to a meeting of Parliament to decide Robert's sentence. Nottingham vows to save his friend.

Robert cannot resist seeing Sarah while Nottingham is out. He berates her for getting married while he was at battle. She explains that, after her father's death, the union was ordered by the Queen to ensure her financial stability. Sarah also reminds him of his previous royal affection by pointing to his ring. They acknowledge their mutual love but realize that they can never be together. As a parting gift, Sarah gives her blue embroidered scarf. Robert accidentally leaves Elizabeth's ring.

ACT II

In the Great Hall at Westminster, Parliament reaches a decision and Lord Cecil informs the Queen of the verdict: the death penalty. Only Elizabeth's signature is needed for the execution. She dismisses the court for a private meeting with Sir Walter Raleigh, one of her trusted spies. Walter informs the Queen that Robert was arrested with a blue scarf hidden under his shirt. Upon careful examination, Elizabeth notices love knots embroidered into the scarf, which confirm her suspicions, and fuels her agreement to sign Robert's death warrant. Nottingham begs the Queen to have mercy on Robert. His pleas are silenced when Robert is brought in and Elizabeth reveals the blue scarf demanding to know its owner. Recognizing the scarf as belonging to his wife, Nottingham is horrified at Robert's betrayal. In a fiery jealous rage, the Queen signs the death warrant.

ACT III

Sarah receives a letter from Robert asking for Elizabeth's ring as a means of preventing his execution. Nottingham returns and accuses Sarah of infidelity, ordering all doors locked to prevent Sarah from returning the ring.

Alone in the Tower of London, Robert reflects with regret upon his life of lies and indiscretions. He remains hopeful that Elizabeth will receive the ring and pardon him. The guards arrive and Robert allows himself to be led to his execution without protest. Elizabeth is deeply conflicted about having signed Robert's death warrant. She desperately hopes Robert will return her ring to spare his life. To her horror, Cecil enters and informs her that Robert is being led to his execution. At that exact moment, Sarah bursts in and unable to speak, hands the ring to Elizabeth, confirming herself as the Queen's rival. It is too late: a cannon shot is heard signifying the fatal blow has been delivered and Elizabeth lashes out at Nottingham and Sarah for their part in Robert's death. Haunted by visions of Robert's severed head, Elizabeth longs for death. She declares James VI of Scotland the new King of England.

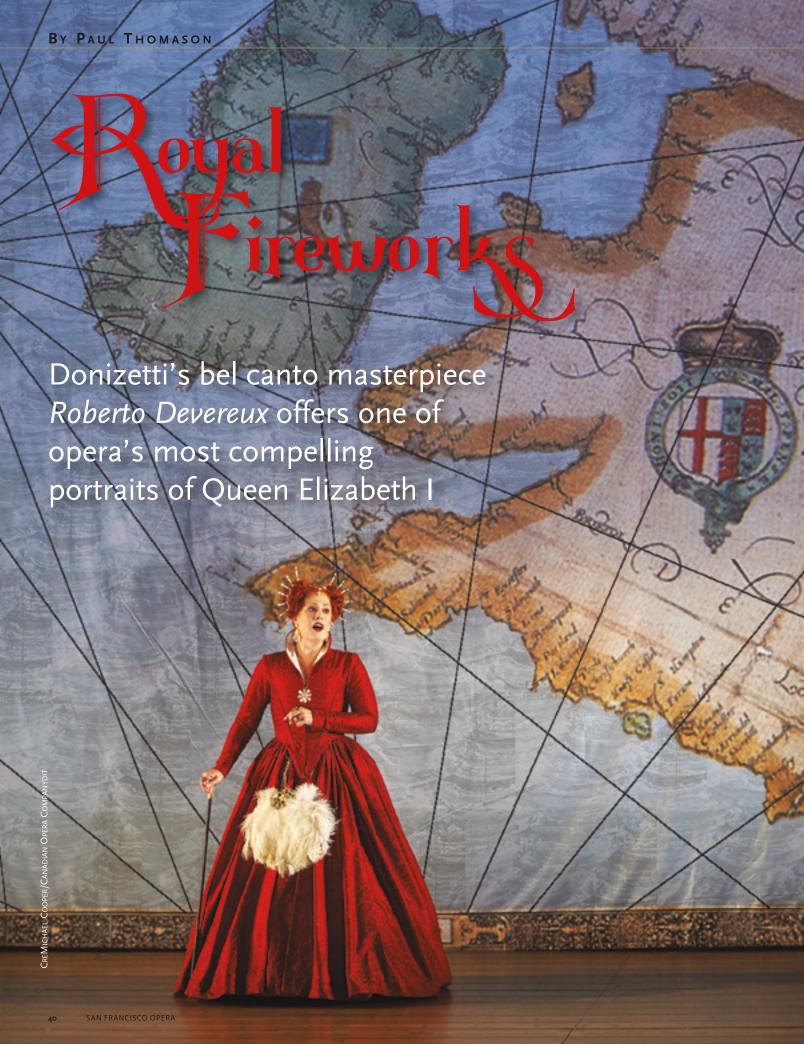

hree days after the premiere of *Roberto Devereux* on October 28, 1837, Gaetano Donizetti wrote to the publisher Tito Ricordi, "It is not up to me to tell you how it went, for I am more modest than a whore, and therefore I would blush. But it went very, very well indeed." In fact, the audience at Naples' Teatro San Carlo had been extremely enthusiastic, and for more than 40 years the opera was given in a number of theaters, even reaching New York in 1849.

Donizetti must have been gratified by the acclaim for his new work since it had been written during some of the darkest days of his life. Four months earlier, on June 17, 1837, his wife, Virginia, gave birth to a son who died an hour later. Six weeks after that, Virginia herself died at age 28. Donizetti was so overwhelmed with grief that his friends were afraid of what he might do to himself and moved him to the home of a friend where he remained in bed for several days, unable to get up. For the rest of his life, he never again spoke or wrote Virginia's name. The cause of her death is something of a mystery. Cholera was rampant in Naples at the time. Donizetti himself blamed measles, but that is unlikely. Far more probable is that she died of syphilis contracted from her husband who had, himself, become infected before their marriage. (Donizetti would die of the disease in 1848.) Somehow, he eventually found the inner strength to begin work on his new opera that was scheduled to begin rehearsals within a few weeks.

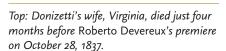
The libretto was by Salvadore Cammarano who had first worked with the composer two years earlier on *Lucia di Lammermoor*. In all, he would provide eight libretti for Donizetti before working with Verdi on four operas, including *Luisa Miller* and *Il Trovatore*. For *Roberto Devereux*, Cammarano had the advantage of having not only François Ancelot's 1832 Parisian play *Elisabeth d'Angleterre* but also Felice Romani's libretto for *Il Conte d'Essex*, Saverio Mercadante's opera that had been unsuccessful at its 1833 premiere in Milan. If the drama is not exactly historically accurate (see accompanying article), the characters are sharply defined, especially the multifaceted portrait of Elisabetta who towers above everyone else, and the situations in which they find themselves create riveting drama. Cammarano gave Donizetti plenty of opportunities throughout to write gripping music conveying the shifting emotions the characters are experiencing—opportunities Donizetti exploited fully.

oberto Devereux was not the first time Teatro San Carlo experienced the premiere of an opera about England's Queen Elizabeth I, nor was it the first time Donizetti had composed an opera with her as a major character. Twenty-two years before Roberto Devereux, Gioachino Rossini had written Elisabetta, Regina d'Inghilterra. It was the first of a remarkable string of operas Rossini would write for the San Carlo, and the first to star Isabella Colbran who would later become his wife. Unlike Devereux, Elisabetta ends happily when the Queen forgives the man she loves, the Earl of Leicester, for marrying another woman and publicly blesses their union.

Donizetti wrote three operas in which Queen Elizabeth I is a character—all, oddly enough, for the Teatro San Carlo. The first was *Il Castello di Kenilworth (Kenilworth Castle*) in 1829. The plot revolves around the Earl of Leicester's attempts to keep his marriage a secret from Elizabeth or Elisabetta who, though she loves him, gives her blessing to the marriage at the end. (Joan Sutherland recorded an aria from the opera on her 1985 *Bel Canto Arias* album.)

Better known today is *Maria Stuarda*, written for Teatro San Carlo in 1834 but banned after the dress rehearsal by the King of Naples himself. Perhaps it was because the Queen, Maria Cristina, was a direct descendant of Mary Stuart who is beheaded at the end of the opera. Perhaps it was also the notoriety that had been attached to the opera after the first orchestra rehearsal.

In the second act, the two queens confront each other. Eventually things turn ugly and Mary—sung by Giuseppina Ronzi-de Begnis—denounces Elisabetta—Anna del Sere—in scathing terms, ending with calling her a *vil bastarda* (vile bastard). Del Sere apparently felt that Ronzi had delivered the caustic phrases a little too personally and lunged at her rival soprano, pulling her hair and pummeling her with her fists. There were even reports of biting. Ronzi fell to the floor, then got up and charged del Sere to repay her in kind. Del Sere fainted and had to be carried home. Ronzi thought Donizetti was out of earshot and complained, "Donizetti protects that whore of a del Sere." To which Donizetti promptly replied, "I do not protect any of you, but those two queens were whores, and you two are whores." The censors demanded some

But then the King banned the opera. The music was fitted to a new text that had nothing to do with English history and was presented as *Buondelmonte*. The original *Maria Stuarda* was finally given at Milan's La Scala in 1835. (The American stage premiere of *Maria Stuarda* was given by San Francisco Opera on November 12, 1971 with Joan Sutherland as Mary Stuart and Richard Bonynge conducting.)

Ostensibly, Donizetti did not hold Ronzi's behavior—or her cutting remarks—against her because she created the role of Elisabetta in Roberto Devereux three years later. It was the last of the five operas he wrote specifically for her in which she performed. (He later wrote the part of Paolina in Poliuto for her, but she was unable to appear in it.) Since Ronzi did sing Anna Bolena (originally written for Giuditta Pasta), she was the first soprano to sing all three operas known today as Donizetti's Tudor trilogy, although she sang Elisabetta rather than the title role of Maria Stuarda. The idea of a soprano singing Anna Bolena, Maria Stuarda, and Elisabetta in Devereux as a cycle seems to be a 20th-century invention with Beverly Sills (in the U.S.) and Leyla Gencer and Montserrat Caballé (in Europe) doing so. In 1964, Gencer sang the first performance of Roberto Devereux given since 1882 and did so at the theater that saw its world premiere.

oberto Devereux is a bel canto opera, firmly in the tradition of arias and duets that are structured in a certain way: recitative, then a slow, lyrical number followed by a cabaletta, a faster showpiece. But Donizetti brings a new dramatic urgency to this blueprint. Vocal embellishments are not used just to show off the singer's voice but are employed throughout to add emphasis to the drama. For instance, in the sec-

ond act, Elisabetta confronts Roberto after being given the scarf that was taken from him when he was arrested, a scarf that proved to Elisabetta he loves another woman (even though he has denied it). Rather quietly, she reminds him of his denials. "'No,' you answered. 'No, no." There is a long silent pause, and then she explodes, "You're faithless, a villain, a liar." Each accusation is embellished with a descending octave sixteenth-note run, each note like an angry slash of a knife. The coloratura amplifies Elisabetta's fury far more than if she just sang the two notes of the descending octave.

Another characteristic of bel canto opera is the emphasis on conveying the drama through the voice itself, rather than the orchestra. Time and again, Donizetti asks the singers to sing a cappella at key moments, allowing the singer the freedom to shape the drama. A few minutes after Elisabetta confronts Roberto, she tells him his life is in peril, but she will spare him if he names her rival. There is a long pause, then she sings the word "Parla" ("Speak"). There is another pause and she repeats "Parla," drawing out the word this second time. Both times she is singing a cappella. It is a brilliant stroke on Donizetti's part to silence the orchestra, leaving Elisabetta totally exposed, the voice mirroring her emotional state at that moment. It also allows the soprano great leeway in how she sings those words. Does she beg? Demand? Is she a wounded woman pleading with the man she loves? Is she utterly furious with him? When Roberto does not respond to her first "Parla," does she change the way she sings the word a second time? By making those two words a cappella, Donizetti opens a world of nuance for the soprano to plunder.

"The second act of *Roberto Devereux* achieves, in its very own Italian way, the Wagnerian ideal of music drama," writes William Ashbrook in *Donizetti and His Operas*. It consists of only three numbers, but the drama moves like a whirlwind, culminating in a rousing ensemble only moments after Elisabetta's "Parla." As the



orchestra quietly plays rather ominous music, Elisabetta intones on the same note, "The Council of Peers has handed me this man's death sentence. I am"-and then she and the orchestra move up one half step-"signing it."

It is a chilling moment that continues as she says that the sun has already started rising in the sky and when it reaches its peak, the ax will fall. Very gradually as she pronounces this death sentence, her vocal line and the orchestra creep up, as if mirroring the rise of the sun. Then she looks at Roberto and sings "Và" ("Go"). That "Và" is another a cappella moment, allowing the soprano to put her own stamp on the drama. Is she enraged? Filled with regret? Sorrowful? Does she speak the word rather than sing it? There is another moment of silence, and then she completely detonates: "Go! Death hangs over your head! Dishonor descends over your name!" Her jagged vocal line starts low, lunging its way up to a high A above the staff which is approached as a leap from the Csharp below, giving that climactic A the impression of a lightning flash. Eventually, Roberto and Nottingham join in, followed by the chorus, creating a sensational ending to the act.

onizetti gives new importance to the orchestra in Roberto Devereux, without ever forsaking bel canto tradition. For instance, in the middle of the Act III en Sara and her husband, Nottingham, the orchestra begins to play a rather sinister march, letting us know the soldiers are even then going to the Tower of London to retrieve Roberto for his execution. The next scene takes place in Roberto's cell in the Tower, and the orchestra sets the stage with a lengthy introduction, reminiscent of the opening of Florestan's aria in Beethoven's Fidelio and looking forward to the way Verdi would introduce Ulrica in Un Ballo in Maschera.

It all culminates in Elisabetta's great final scene, one of the crown jewels in all of bel canto opera. She desperately hopes Roberto will send her the ring so she can spare his life. But when Sara finally rushes in with the ring, it is too late. Donizetti brilliantly captures the shifting emotions rushing through Elisabetta at that moment. "Elisabetta was full of shrill sound and unbridled fury," Beverly Sills once explained. "She'd lost the only man she'd ever loved, and she knew it all too well. The Queen of England had suddenly become a bitter, heartbroken old lady. She'd continue to be the most powerful woman in the world, but the rest of her days would be filled with frustrated, relentless rage."

It is a long journey from the Elisabetta at the beginning of the opera who is filled with love for Roberto and eagerly looks forward to seeing him. "The role of Elisabetta, I think, is the most taxing in the entire soprano bel canto repertoire," said Beverly Sills. William Ashbrook summed it up quite accurately when he wrote, "In Elisabetta, [Donizetti] created a complex tragic portrait that can, without any embarrassment, be placed beside Bellini's Norma."

Director's Note

e have in the 21st century become acclimatized to a specific view of Queen Elizabeth I through film and television, not to mention countless biographies. The consensus is of a remarkable woman who advocated religious tolerance yet was able to guarantee the success of her Protestant faith as the official church in England. She was a woman who bravely survived the vagaries and dangers of her early life to become a major player on the world stage. Her career saw the arts in England blossom as never before. She was renowned and loved for putting her country before her personal happiness and died having presided over a Golden Age.

This Anglocentric view would have been utterly incomprehensible to an Italian of Gaetano Donizetti's time and background: Elizabeth would have been perceived, at best, as an equivocal character. She had kicked Catholicism out of England and was, therefore, a heretic. In the eyes of Catholics, she was illegitimate, as her father Henry VIII had never obtained an annulment from the Pope to end his first marriage to marry his second wife (Elizabeth's mother), Anne Boleyn. Even in her own day, Elizabeth was much mocked in England and across Europe for her virgin status. Sixteenth-century attitudes saw a woman who would not be guided by her husband as unnatural and highly suspect. In fact, there was something positively ungodly about a woman exercising power without a husband's restraint, and the same could be said of early 19th-century attitudes towards women.

Elizabeth's flirtations with Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester,

and his stepson Robert Devereux, Earl of Essex (among others) opened her to the charge of wantonness. She became the almost comic stereotype of the aging woman: rouged, powdered, and bewigged to hold back the ravages of time; a figure of ridicule, as well as of tragedy. Her death was a cause for rejoicing throughout Catholic Europe.

When I was asked to direct Donizetti's Tudor trilogy of *Anna Bolena*, *Maria Stuarda*, and *Roberto Devereux*, I was attracted by the possibility of creating a chronicle of the life of Elizabeth along the lines of Shakespeare's history cycles. Collectively, they paint a much more complete—if historically inaccurate—portrait. Donizetti's skill in creating a consistent character over the course of the second and third operas is considerable. The composer creates a character that is, by turns, witty and willful, commanding and vulnerable, politically

astute and personally unsure, a woman in charge of the destiny of her country but incapable of ruling her own heart.

Intriguingly, by presenting her loves in both *Maria Stuarda* and *Roberto Devereux* as the two Roberts (Dudley, Earl of Leicester and his stepson Devereux, Earl of Essex), Donizetti creates the idea of a woman trying to recapture the earlier magic of her love for the first Robert with the much less worthy second. By depicting the collapse of the marriage of Elizabeth's parents in *Anna Bolena* to such devastating effect, he also provides a possible motive for Elizabeth's decision never to consent to marriage.

We (myself and Belgian set designer Benoît Dugardyn who sadly died earlier this year) have set these operas in one performing space, namely the Globe Theatre, as a metaphor for Elizabeth's life and court. The operas mirror the Shakespearean idea of the monarch being like an actor on a stage, each having to perform before an audience and each having both public and private personas with the chorus acting as spectators to history. By the end of the Elizabethan era, theater was performed indoors as well as outdoors, with the masque and its spectacular effects beginning to supersede purely textual theater. We have tried to create a narrative between the factual and the fictional, between the 16th and 19th centuries.

The Private Lives of Elizabeth and Essex.

n 1967 when the American soprano Beverly Sills read through the libretto of *Roberto Devereux* for the first time, she was stopped by Queen Elizabeth I's line: "It would have been better for you to incite the wrath of the gods than to incite the wrath of the descendant of the terrible Henry VIII." She turned to her husband and said, "This is really a Bette Davis role with high notes."

Making the connection between a crucial moment for Elizabeth I in the opera and Bette Davis's famous portrayal on film was a logical one. Michael Curtiz's 1939 The Private Lives of Elizabeth and Essex starred Bette Davis, Errol Flynn, and Olivia de Havilland and was an enormous hit, receiving five Academy Award nominations. Davis went on to play Queen Elizabeth I in a second film, The Virgin Queen in 1955.

Elizabeth I has been portrayed in film and on television more often than any other British monarch, going back to 1912 with Sarah Bernhardt's Les Amours de la Reine Élizabeth (The Loves of Queen Elizabeth), which had its own connection to the world of opera. Playing Essex to Bernhardt's

Elizabeth was Lou Tellegen whose second marriage was to the American operatic diva Geraldine Farrar.

Some other notable examples of Elizabeth I in American and British film and television include:

- >> Florence Eldridge played Elizabeth I to Katharine Hepburn's Mary, Queen of Scots in Mary of Scotland (1936).
- Flora Robson played Elizabeth in two films: Fire Over England with Laurence Olivier and Vivien Leigh (1937) and The Sea Hawk with Errol Flynn and Claude Rains (1940).
- In 1953, Jean Simmons starred as Elizabeth I in Young Bess opposite Stewart Granger and Deborah Kerr.
- >> Irene Worth was Queen Elizabeth I in the 1962 film Seven Seas to Calais.
- Cate Blanchett has been Elizabeth in two films: portraying the younger Elizabeth in 1998's Elizabeth and the older queen in 2007's Elizabeth, The Golden Age.
- In 1998, a second film involving Elizabeth, Shakespeare in Love, won seven Academy Awards, including one for Judi Dench as Elizabeth I.
- In 1971 Glenda Jackson was Elizabeth in the film Mary, Queen of Scots, playing opposite Vanessa Redgrave as Mary. That same year Jackson starred in the BBC's six-part series Elizabeth R. The acclaimed series traced the queen's life from the reign of her brother Edward VI to her death, and Jackson's performance won her two Emmy Awards. Redgrave went on to play the older version of Elizabeth in the 2011 film Anonymous with her daughter Joely Richardson playing the younger Elizabeth.
- When Elizabeth R hit American television in 1972 on Masterpiece Theatre, it was not the first TV series about Elizabeth I to appear in the U.S. In 1968, Judith Anderson starred in the American television series Elizabeth the Queen with Charlton Heston as the Earl of Essex.
- In 2005, there were two mini-series about Queen Elizabeth. Helen Mirren played her in Elizabeth I; Anne-Marie Duff did so in The Virgin Queen.
- The TV series *The Tudors* (2007–2010) cast three different actresses to play Elizabeth: Kate Duggan (Season 2), Claire Macaulay (Season 3), and Laoise Murray (Season 4).
- In the 1980s, the British comedy series Black Adder included Richardson as Elizabeth I.
- A rather unusual version of Queen Elizabeth I occurred in the 1992 film *Orlando* (based on Virginia Woolf's novel) when she was portrayed by male actor Quentin Crisp.

hough all the characters in Donizetti's Roberto Devereux really lived, many of the relationships in the opera, as well as key plot points, are fiction.

Robert Devereux, the farl of Essex, was quite a different man from the one in the opera. Donizetti's Roberto is an admirable man who goes to his death rather than reveal the name of the woman he loves, thereby compromising her. Historically, the man was an often charming and lovable, but ultimately self-serving rogue who never understood he could not tame the Queen. "This last of the Tudor's over-mighty subjects" is S.T. Bindoff's description in *Tudor England*. "There was that unique complex of charms—the beautiful face and body, the brilliant personality and style—which first captured royal favor and then time and again recovered it after follies which would have doomed a less ornamental offender. ... Essex died as he had lived, a man of one idea, the idea of his own aggrandizement."

There is absolutely no doubt of Elizabeth's affection for him, despite the fact she was a generation older, or that she repeatedly forgave him for his misdeeds. "I know but one friend and one enemy my Lord [Essex] hath; and that one friend is the Queen and that one enemy is himself" was the way one courtier of the time put it. She was dazzled by his looks, his quick wit, his often-brilliant mind, his daring and prowess on the battlefield, and by the

way he seemed to know exactly how to charm and flatter her. In the opera, Essex's greatest mistake was against Elizabeth the woman, which is the opposite of history. The real Queen Elizabeth signed his death warrant because of his treason against the Crown, though Elizabeth the woman never got over it. In All the Queen's Men, Neville Williams writes, "As a result of his own crass self-destruction Elizabeth had lost the only man she had really cared for since [Sir Christopher] Hatton's death. At court the most troublesome faction of the whole reign had been annihilated and Robert Cecil remained at last in undisputed command."

Cecil is a minor character in the opera but, true to life, one that is implacably opposed to Robert Devereux. Sir Walter Raleigh is also a minor character but one who gives Elizabeth the blue scarf taken from Devereux, a scarf that proves to Elizabeth that her Robert does indeed love another woman. Historically, there was no blue scarf and while Raleigh often quarreled with Dev-



ereux, he does not seem to have been the lifelong bitter enemy Robert Cecil was.

Factually speaking, there was no relationship, certainly no love affair, between the wife of the Earl of Nottingham and Robert Devereux. In the opera, her name is Sarah; in real life, it was Catherine. She was a generation older than he was, and one of Elizabeth's closest confidants. The two women were cousins, and when Catherine died, just weeks before the Queen, Elizabeth sank into a deep depression.

Historically, the Earl of Nottingham (he becomes a duke in the opera) was not the close friend to Essex that he is in the opera, but neither was he an enemy. That changed when Essex led an armed rebellion and tried to force a change in the government. It was Nottingham who led the force that quashed the uprising and he was one

of the commissioners at Essex's trial. He was present at Eliza-

beth's deathbed in 1603, and according to some accounts pressed her on the matter of succession, to which Elizabeth indicated James should succeed her. Certainly Elizabeth did not name James as her successor when Essex was beheaded as happens in the final scene of the opera.

The timing of the historic events is different in the opera than they actually occurred. In the opera, Devereux returns from Ireland and is beheaded 24 hours later. In fact, when he returned to London in 1599 (against the Queen's orders), there were several months of inquiries, various versions of house arrest, and it was clear Elizabeth was angry with him. But it was only when he attempted to seize power through an armed revolt that he was arrested for treason and beheaded in 1601. He was 34 years old.

And then there is the matter of "the Essex Ring" as it has come to be known. On July 31, 1927, the *New York Times* carried the headline "Elizabeth's Ring Comes Back." The article said: "Queen Elizabeth's ring, which she vainly awaited as a sign that the Earl of Essex implored her mercy, is coming back to her at last where she lies in Westminster Abbey. ... The golden circlet that was to protect the impetuous noble if he was ever in trouble arrived lately in Christie's auction rooms in London. The successful bidder, moved by the romance of the love and quarrels of the aged Queen and young Robert Devereux, has obtained authority to place it, in a casket, upon the tomb of the Virgin Queen."

Most historians consider the story of the ring to be fiction, primarily because there is no reference to it in any of the contemporary accounts of the trial and beheading of Essex. In fact, the first reference to it in print seems to occur almost a century after the events, in 1695, in a novel entitled *The Secret History of the most renowned Queen Elizabeth and the Earl of Essex, by a Person of Quality.* It might not have been historically accurate, but the ring—and the relationship it represented—makes one hell of an operatic plot.

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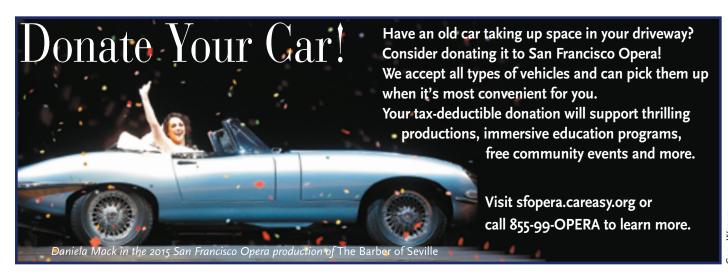

Tickets may also be charged by phone at (415) 864-3330 or ordered online at sfopera.com. We accept American Express, VISA, MasterCard, and Discover.

If you are unable to use your tickets to a particular performance, you may exchange them for tickets to another performance, subject to availability, or donate them back to the Opera. Ticket exchanges for future performances can be accommodated up to one hour before curtain or during the first intermission. No refunds are associated with ticket exchanges, and a fee (plus any price differential) may apply.

A JIGSAW PUZZLE OF INFINITE POSSIBILITIES

When we announced the 2018–19 Season last January, I experienced something akin to what I imagine a singer feels when they pick up a review. It was a raw, personal, apprehensive moment. Here were artistic choices suddenly under the microscope, being scrutinized by a wonderfully passionate and knowledgeable audience. How would the critics and the public react?

This season is the first programming of the new administration. Only *It's a Wonderful Life* was in existence prior to my announcement as general director in 2015. Otherwise, we had a blank canvas, and you are about to experience the choices that we made!

Programming a season at San Francisco Opera means carrying forth the mantle of a stage that has quite literally shaped operatic history. What lies ahead must honor and further the exceptional legacy of what has gone before. We have been a company of life-changing experiences, of breathtaking excellence, of bold risk taking. We must continue to be that company. We must celebrate the absolute best in our art form, and we must do so across a fantastic swathe of repertoire, styles, and aesthetics.

That is the enormously exciting (and daunting) opportunity that a blank season presents. How do we go about filling it?

Season planning takes the convictions of artistic aspirations, passes them through lenses of feasibility, and determines whether the elements you need are available.

First, season planning is not a solo endeavor. It touches every single aspect of the Company, and I am so proud that our planning is undertaken by a group of people who understand the art and craft of this art form with such nuance, and who come together with openness and collegiality, examining artistic possibilities from every angle.

Those angles include such facets as: What balance of titles will be most compelling for our audience? How do we utilize our extraordinary resources to the greatest impact? How do we create a variety of visual and aural worlds that will engage audiences in powerfully different ways? What are the stories that will resonate with our community? How will different productions fit together backstage? Are we creating a season that we can afford financially?

Those are some of the filters we apply, but what titles make it into the cauldron to begin with? There are a number of places from which inspiration can come. There are the titles that are burning needs and wants for the Company—titles that we've not done in many years and that allow our talents to shine (e.g., Arabella). There are the titles that can be strong investments for our future (Tosca). There are opportunities to partner with other companies (It's a Wonderful Life). There are intriguing curiosities that offer new perspectives to audiences (Orlando). Where can we take risk? Where can we be the most creative expressions of ourselves? Where do we lead? Where do we join others?

These are all facets in play as we plan for future seasons, as we think about what projects are right for which artists, as we talk with fellow companies and develop partnerships. Then there is the reality check of who and what is available. Is the right cast available for the roles? Is there a production that will work aesthetically and logistically with the other productions of the season? Will the flow of repertoire fit into our calendar?

Season planning takes the convictions of artistic aspirations, passes them through lenses of feasibility, and determines whether the elements you need are available. There is a magical moment when everything locks in. Our brochure goes to print, we announce the season, and then bring everything to life on the stage. The hope is that what results are moments of transformative impact for you, the audience. It's really very simple!
