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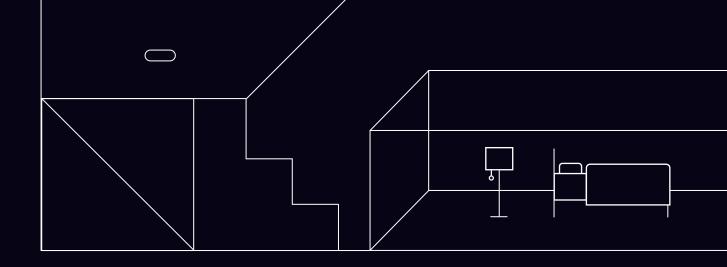
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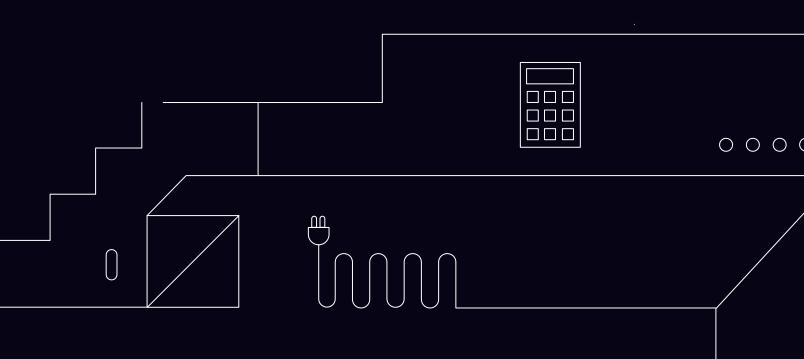


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A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD OF SAN FRANCISCO OPERA

OPERA AT THE BALLPARK RETURNS

On Saturday, September 21 at 7:30 pm, *Romeo and Juliet* will be transmitted live to Oracle Park, the home of the San Francisco Giants, marking the return of *Opera at the Ballpark* for the first time since 2017.

Presented in partnership with the San Francisco Giants, the 2019 *Opera at the Ballpark* allows audiences from around the Bay Area to experience Gounod's romantic opera while seated on the baseball field or in the stands where they can pair live opera with hot dogs, peanuts, and garlic fries.

The performance will be transmitted in high definition live from the stage of the War Memorial Opera House to the 71' x 153' videoboard in Oracle Park. This newly installed screen—twice the resolution and 50' wider and 20' taller than the previous one—will make for a "supersized" operatic evening in one of San Francisco's most picturesque sports and entertainment venues.

This year's offering of *Romeo and Juliet*, the 16th in the series of live simulcasts that have drawn audiences of all ages in excess of 303,000 since 2006, features tenor Bryan Hymel and soprano Nadine Sierra in the title roles in Opéra de Monte-Carlo Director Jean-Louis Grinda's Italian Renaissance-inspired production.

Online registration, which ensures entrance into the ballpark, is available at sfopera.com/simulcast. The simulcast of *Romeo and Juliet* is sponsored, in part, by Taube Philanthropies and Charles Schwab & Co., Inc.

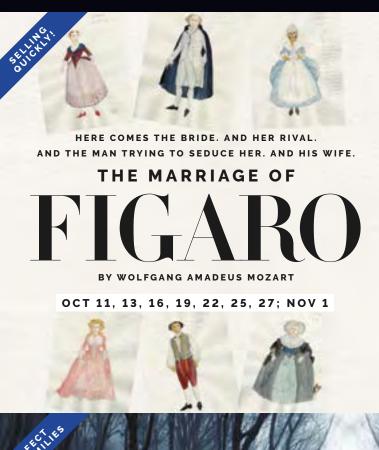
EMERGING STARS COMPETITION WINNER ANNOUNCED

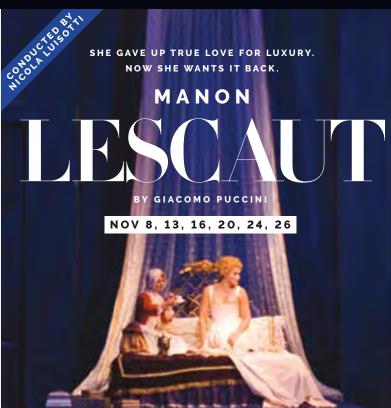
Last month, San Francisco Opera announced Andriana Chuchman as the 2019 winner of the Jan Shrem and Maria Manetti Shrem Emerging Stars competition and named her "Emerging Star of the Year." In her Company debut last fall in Jake Heggie and Gene Scheer's It's a Wonderful Life, the Canadian soprano moved audiences with a portrayal that was filled with heart, beautiful singing, and some great dance moves (remember the "Mekee-Mekee"?).

Chuchman said, "Debuting at the San Francisco Opera this past season has been one of the highlights of my career so far. Receiving the Emerging Star Award is a huge honour, and a great way to cap off such a special moment. I want to give a huge thank you to my wonderful family, friends, and fans who voted for me! I'm feeling the love! And a special thank you to Maria Manetti Shrem and Jan Shrem for generously supporting this competition."

Earning the most online votes in a field of eight nominated artists from the 2018–19 Season, Chuchman receives a \$10,000 cash prize. Past winners of the award, which was initiated in 2016, are baritone Lucas Meachem and tenors Atalla Ayan and Arturo Chacón-Cruz. 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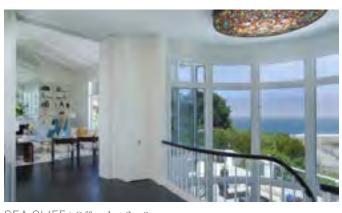

Ticket exchanges for future performances can be accommodated up to one hour before curtain or during the first intermission. No refunds are associated with ticket exchanges, and a fee (plus any price differential) may apply.

ACCESSIBILITY San Francisco Opera is committed to providing easy access for all of our patrons. Please contact the Opera Box Office prior to your visit so that we can ensure your comfort.

For Patrons in Wheelchairs, San Francisco Opera offers wheelchair-accessible seats at a range of prices. All entrances at the War Memorial Opera House are wheelchair accessible. Wheelchair-accessible stalls in restrooms can be found on all floors (except the Main Lobby and 5th floor Balcony levels). Accessible drinking fountains are located on all floors except the Balcony level.

LISTENING DEVICES Assistive listening devices are available at the North and South Lobby coat checks. ID deposit required.

LIVE TITLES: TEXT-TO-VOICE SUPERTITLESHeadsets that provide a spoken version of the supertitles are available at the North Lobby coat check

DINING & REFRESHMENTS Global Gourmet operates pre-show and intermission food and beverage concession services in lobby areas. Beginning two hours prior to all performances, Prelude at the Opera House in the lower lounge offers a changing seasonal buffet, as well as elevated à la carte dishes for pre-performance dining and intermission. The North Box Restaurant on the North Mezzanine (Box) level features locally sourced California cuisine with global influences.

Audiences may enjoy purchased beverages inside the auditorium in the appropriate containers. Outside food and drink are prohibited.

The **SAN FRANCISCO OPERA SHOP**, located in the South Mezzanine lobby, front lobby, and North Dress Circle of the Opera House, sells opera CDs, DVDs, SF Opera merchandise, and gift items. The Shop is open 90 minutes before performances, at intermissions, and afterward. All proceeds benefit San Francisco Opera.

COAT CHECK A coat check for your convenience is located at the North and South ends of the main lobby. For the safety and comfort of our audience, large bags are strongly discouraged and are subject to search.

COURTESY TELEPHONE, for local calls only, is located in the main lobby across from the South passenger elevator.

DRINKING FOUNTAINS are available on all levels except the Lower level, where there is a courtesy water station on the north side. Water bottles are permitted in the auditorium.

OPERA GLASSES may be rented for \$5 at the North Lobby coat check. ID deposit is requested.

LARGE-PRINT CAST SHEETS AND SYNOPSES are available at the coat check stations in the main lobby.

FIRST AID STATION is located on the South Lower level. In case of emergency, please ask the nearest usher to assist you.

LOST AND FOUND items may be claimed at the North coat check during the performance. All unclaimed items are delivered to the War Memorial Performing Arts Center at 401 Van Ness Ave., Room 110, (415) 621-6600 (8 AM-5 PM, Monday-Friday).

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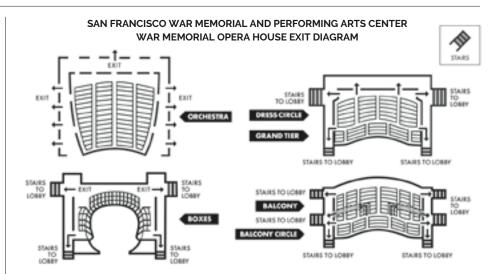
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CHARLES CHIP MC NEAL

DIRECTOR, DEPARTMENT OF DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND COMMUNITY

n August 1, San Francisco Opera established the Department of Diversity, Equity and Community, to broaden the Company's work in developing new audiences and engaging the **public.** At its helm is arts educator, researcher, and civic leader Charles Chip Mc Neal, formerly the senior curriculum and program manager of the opera's education department.

"By establishing a Department of Diversity, Equity and Community,

San Francisco Opera is making a bold move in a time of critical change in our country's history, and certainly in the state of California," Mc Neal says.

Mc Neal, a Bay Area native credits early experiences at the War Memorial Opera House with putting him on the path to leading this department.

Growing up in Berkeley in the 1970s and '80s, Mc Neal was an artistically driven child, dabbling in school plays and folkloric dances. But a field trip he took as a teenager offered him his first glimpse at opera. He ended up in the audience of San Francisco Opera's 1981 Aida, starring legendary soprano Leontyne Price.

"I didn't know there was an African American opera singer until I heard Leontyne Price. I started researching her and realizing, oh my god, this is amazing, and this is a rarity," he says. "I don't know if I would be involved in the classical arts if it weren't for those early experiences."

After high school, Mc Neal moved to New York City, where he studied under renowned acting coaches like Lee Strasberg, Stella Adler, and Uta Hagen. Attending New York University made him the first in his family to go to college.

One of his first breakthroughs as a performer came in



an off-Broadway production of Kiss Me, Kate. "I remember for weeks and months just pinching myself, thinking this is crazy: a little black child from Berkeley, California, doing a show in New York."

But his successes came at a cost. The criticisms he faced as an actor and dancer eroded his self-esteem. "I was told I was too tall, too dark, too unattractive," he says. "That insidiousness, that questioning, that diminutive and oppressive reflection back at you

about who you are can be devastating."

Eventually, after a knee injury, Mc Neal started to shift his focus from performance to education—partially in reaction to those negative experiences. "This business isn't fair. It isn't equitable. So knowing that, if I were going to be in it, how could I bring that dimension? How could I bring that dimension of equity? Of humanity? Of acceptance?"

In his new role as head of San Francisco Opera's Department of Diversity, Equity and Community, Mc Neal seeks to augment SF Opera's legacy of education programming and community engagement through critical dialogues, and inclusive civic practices that focus on policies and strategies that enhance our ability to collaboratively address issues of diversity, equity, and inclusion in the arts.

Ultimately, Mc Neal hopes to create spaces where everyone-regardless of identity-feels "honored and included." Opera, he says, has that power. It's his life's work to break barriers so others can feel that empowerment too.

"If I didn't work to make arts accessible, then I don't know if I would have a purpose," he says. "That is really the essence of what I'm doing."

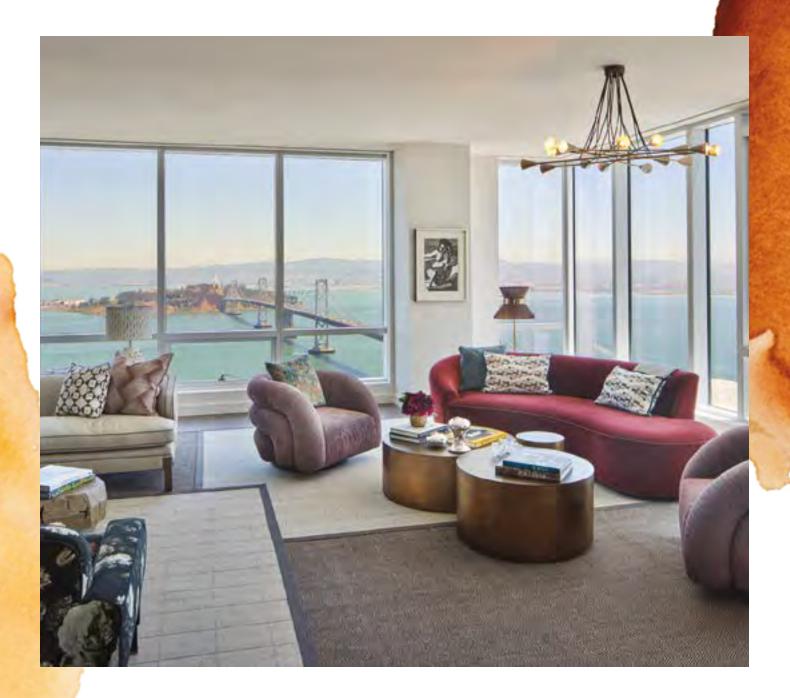
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nce again, the unprecedented generosity of Cynthia and John Gunn has set the stage for a dazzling season at San Francisco Opera. Since 2002, when John joined the Opera Board, the couple has underwritten numerous productions and provided exceptional support for many of the company's innovative endeavors. In September 2008, the Gunns made a historic commitment—believed to be the largest gift ever made by individuals to an American opera company—to help fund the signature projects of General Director David Gockley, including new operas and productions, multimedia projects, and outreach programs, and have proudly continued that support for General Director Matthew Shilvock. This season, the Gunns' inspired generosity is helping make possible five productions—Romeo & Juliet, Billy Budd, Marriage of Figaro, Manon Lescaut, and (R)evolution of Steve 7obs. The Gunns hope that their support inspires others to give. John comments, "Opera is a dynamic art form and all of us play a role in keeping it vital. We must expand our repertoire and our audiences and strive for financial flexibility. And we depend on donors to keep opera alive." John is the former chairman

and CEO of Dodge & Cox Investment Managers. He joined the firm in 1972, the year he received his MBA from Stanford Business School and married Cynthia, who graduated from Stanford with an A.B. in political science in 1970. Early in her career, Cynthia was the editor and director of The Portable Stanford book series for ten years. She edited twenty-eight books by Stanford professors on a vast array of topics, including *Economic* Policy Beyond the Headlines by George Shultz and Ken Dam. In addition to their support of San Francisco Opera, the Gunns are active members of the community. John chairs the advisory board for the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research, is Vice Chairman of the Board of Stanford Hospital Care and is a former trustee of Stanford University. Cynthia currently serves as an overseer of Stanford's Hoover Institution and a trustee of the San Francisco Fine Arts Museums and has been a member of the advisory board of Family and Children Services and the board of the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health. Opera lovers are grateful to Cynthia and John and applaud their commitment to keeping San Francisco Opera a leading-edge company.



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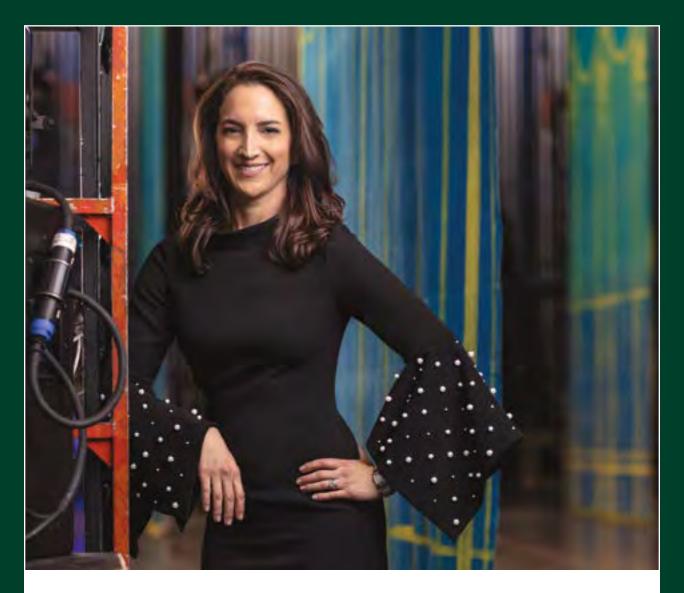
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Diane B. Wilsey (Opening Weekend Grand Sponsor, Romeo & Juliet)

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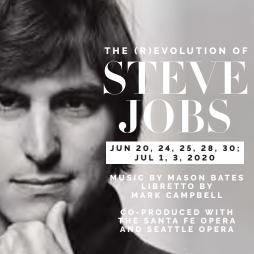

PROLOGUE

Captain Vere, an old man, is haunted by a moment in his life when he was tested and found wanting.

ACT I

SCENE 1 Years earlier, on board the HMS *Indomitable*, a British man-of-war, during the French wars of 1797, sailors are at work. A boarding party returns from a passing merchant ship, the *Rights o' Man*, with three men impressed for naval service. John Claggart, master-at-arms, interviews them but only the last, Billy Budd, pleases the officers, despite his stammer. But his impassioned farewell to the *Rights o' Man* is misunderstood as a revolutionary declaration, and Claggart, responsible for discipline, is told to watch Billy. He sets his corporal, Squeak, to harass Billy. A Novice returns from a flogging, and Donald and Dansker caution the new recruits that no one escapes punishment. They warn against Claggart while declaring their devotion to Vere.

SCENE 2 A week later, Vere meets with two officers in his cabin and they discuss the recent naval mutinies at Spithead and the Nore. Vere discounts their fears about Billy's influence on the men. Another officer arrives to announce that they are in enemy waters.

SCENE 3 Below the decks, the same evening, Billy discovers Squeak meddling with his kit-bag and they fight. Claggart arrives and has Squeak arrested. Alone, Claggart voices his determination to destroy Billy. He forces the Novice to try to bribe Billy into leading a mutiny. Billy awakens to hear the Novice's proposal. Furious at the idea of mutiny, he can only stammer. Dansker tells Billy that Claggart is behind it all, but Billy refuses to believe him.

ACT II

SCENE 1 Some days later, Claggart is telling Vere that there is a dangerous sailor aboard, when a French ship is sighted. The crew is called to action stations and a shot is fired, but the wind fails, the mist returns and the chase is abandoned. Claggart returns to Vere and again accuses Billy of planning a mutiny. Vere orders both men to his cabin.

SCENE 2 Billy arrives in Vere's cabin to be confronted by Claggart's false accusation of inciting mutiny. Unable to speak to defend himself, Billy strikes Claggart, who

falls dead. Vere summons his officers to an immediate drumhead court martial, knowing that the penalty for striking a superior officer is death. Aware of the injustice of the death sentence in this instance, the officers appeal to Vere for guidance; he remains silent, the officers reluctantly resolve that Billy should be hanged at dawn.

SCENE 3 The next morning, shortly before dawn, Billy awaits his execution.

SCENE 4 On deck, at four o'clock the same morning, the crew assembles to witness the hanging. Billy's final words are "Starry Vere, God bless you!" After the hanging the crew turn on the officers in anger. When they are ordered below, their rebellion subsides into sullen obedience.

EPILOGUE

Vere, now an old man, knows he failed Billy and himself: he could have saved him. He receives Billy's last words as a kind of benediction, redeeming him at last.

Latecomers may not be seated during the performance after the lights have dimmed.

Patrons who leave during the performance may not be reseated until intermission.

The use of cameras, cell phones, and any kind of recording equipment is strictly forbidden.

was brought up beside the sea, and Britten's music has always moved me; and I was particularly keen that the first opera that I directed should be in English. I've seen *Billy Budd* many times in the past and have always been struck by the extraordinary depth of character in the piece. That's what I enjoy most when excavating text in the theatre.

It was clear to me in starting the process with the designers and eventually with the singers that the sea is ever-present in the music of *Billy Budd*, as it also is in *Peter Grimes*. Britten has this brilliant capacity to conjure up the huge, surging sound of the sea through the orchestra. Therefore, I wanted to leave the sea to the orchestra and focus on creating the claustrophobic, violent, capricious shipboard world that these characters inhabit.

That's why we took a cross-section of a great ship and went right into the center of it, lower deck, mid-deck, top-deck, and focused on this world—this beehive, in a way—all the crew working away within the framework of a mighty sea. Our job was to help the audience understand the hideous circumstances in which all of these people lived.

In the critical literature on both Melville's novella and of Britten's opera, there's much dissecting of the subtext—everything ranging from Christian symbolism to homoeroticism. Of course all of these things are key to a successful understanding of the piece, but I only want them to come out in a way that feels very organic, very much part of the overall piece. And I think that comes from a dialogue with the artists you are in the room with.



SETTING SAIL WITH BILLY BUDD

A SELECTIVE OVERVIEW OF THE OPERA'S PRODUCTION HISTORY

he late *New Yorker* critic Andrew Porter deemed *Billy Budd* "musically the richest and most arresting" of Benjamin Britten's fifteen operas. It is also arguably his most provocative and challenging. While the novella *Billy Budd* became enshrined in the canon shortly after the belated publication of Melville's unfinished text in 1924—boosted by a dramatic reappraisal of the author following a long period of neglect—the opera has taken more time to find a place in the repertory. A major reason for this slower pace of acceptance is the success with which the composer and his collaborators have transferred the multitiered, unresolvable ambiguities of Melville's fiction to the medium of opera.

From the perspective of directors and designers, a merely realistic presentation of *Billy Budd*'s 1797 British

naval setting, however technically impressive, would reduce Britten's unsettling masterwork to a superficial period piece—an Aubrey–Maturin tale set to music. Any honest attempt to grapple with the substance of this opera must balance the literal mise-en-scène with its multiple layers of significance—psychosexual, social, jurisprudential, metaphysical, even theological. These layers are interconnected but in some ways also contradictory, thereby reflecting the divergent outlooks of Britten and his librettists, E.M. Forster and Eric Crozier (and of Melville).

In the face of these challenges, it is all the more remarkable that *Billy Budd* has fared so well in its production history. The producer Basil Coleman and designer John Piper articulated their intention to bring out both realistic and allegorical-symbolical dimensions—what they termed the

opera's "dual planes"—in discussions before their staging of the world premiere at London's Royal Opera in 1951. They accomplished this by contrasting realistic shipboard details with a suggestive pitch-black background hinting at the mythic, open-ended aspects of the opera.

In response to some stern objections from eminent critics, Britten used the occasion of a BBC broadcast in 1960 to prepare a substantial revision, streamlining *Billy Budd* from its original four acts (with three intermissions) to the tighter two-act version most frequently encountered since. Again, Coleman and Piper were charged with preparing the revised *Billy Budd*'s stage premiere (at the Royal Opera in 1964). According to Porter, Britten wanted less "shipboard detail," so Piper's designs were "stripped and simplified." Still, with its balance between realism and abstraction, the overall approach of the original Royal Opera productions (for the four- and two-act versions alike) established a kind of template for stagings of *Billy Budd* that has had a long afterlife.

The gap between the 1951 and 1964 London *Billy Budds* is a characteristic of the opera's reception history. Landmark productions have typically been followed by periods of hiatus. In the United States, *Billy Budd* was initially seen in 1952 as a live NBC-TV transmission of excerpts from the score (limited to 90 minutes)—the first Britten opera to be televised and, in its own right, an important chapter in the history of the medium of television opera. A single performance took place later that year at Indiana University, but it was not until 1970 that the two-act version received its U.S. stage premiere at Lyric Opera of Chicago. (A concert performance of the revised opera was led by Georg Solti at Carnegie Hall in 1966.)

There was another gap before the next flurry of state-

side interest in *Billy Budd*, which was presented in company premieres almost simultaneously at San Francisco Opera and the Metropolitan Opera in September 1978—to some extent stimulated by landmark stagings of *Peter Grimes* in America (including SFO's company premiere of the opera, produced by Geraint Evans, in 1973).

The first *Billy Budd* at the War Memorial Opera House was directed by Ande Anderson, who had worked with Britten on the original London production (he also staged the Chicago premiere). It represented "more or less a reconstruction of the 1951 approach," according to the scholar Mervyn Cooke. In his joint review of the bicoastal *Billy Budds*, Porter wrote that the sets effectively rebuilt Piper's original designs "on a larger scale and provided [them] with projections of changing sea and skies."

Incidentally, a line Porter quoted from Melville's tale acquires a poignant dimension if we recall that just a few months before San Francisco's 1978 premiere, the rainbow flag had first been introduced at the Pride Parade: "Who in the rainbow can draw the line where the violet tint ends and the orange tint begins?" Despite recurrent critical hedging about the significance of gay subtexts in both the novella and the opera, Forster was especially outspoken about his interpretation in a letter in which he found fault with Britten's music for Claggart's monologue ("O beauty, o handsomeness"): "I want *passion*—love constricted, perverted, poisoned, but nevertheless *flowing* down its agonizing channel; a sexual discharge gone evil."

Meanwhile, the Met expanded on the production John Dexter had first tried out in 1972 at Hamburg Staatsoper, using William Dudley's striking visualization of the HMS *Indomitable*, against a black background, as a vast lateral cross-section. Hydraulic stage technology allowed the ship's levels to rise and fall, expand and contract, thus creating spaces in which Dexter could carefully delineate "the symbolic heights and depths of the opera in clear visual terms," as the Britten expert and protégé Donald Mitchell puts it. Dexter's production has been periodically revived by the Met (most recently in 2012). Porter extolled the Dexter staging as "scenically the more spectacular and emotionally the more romantic, while San Francisco's [conducted by David Atherton] was musically in sharper focus—the clearest and keenest account of the opera I have ever heard."

But New York offered a competing vision of the opera in 2014 when Michael Grandage's staging, introduced at the Glyndebourne Festival in 2010 (and his first foray into opera direction), made a stop at the Brooklyn Academy of Music. (With this presentation at San Francisco Opera, Grandage's

critically acclaimed production receives its West Coast premiere.) The careful details of Christopher Oram's curved, wooden ribcage set (making reference to another Melville icon with its suggestion of a whale) have been praised for persuasively evoking a sense of the historical period as well as the claustrophobic spaces in which the story's psychodynamics play out—all of a piece with the director's stated aim to give voice to the ideas "that were clear to the creators" of the work. David Patrick Stearns hailed the BAM revival for "exploring the musical and dramatic layers of Billy Budd with a thoroughness and balance not often found anywhere."

Like a theatrical version of punctuated equilibrium in evolution, anniversary years have prompted sudden fresh approaches to *Billy Budd* after periods of dormancy. To

mark the opera's 50th anniversary in 2001—and, as it happened, in the wake of 9/11—new productions surfaced in Chicago, directed by David McVicar (with Nathan Gunn taking on what has become a signature role), and in Vienna, where Willy Decker brought back the original four-act version, relying on a radically simple, raked staging.

Following a revival of the 1978 production in 1985 (then directed by Basil Coleman), San Francisco Opera chose Decker's version for its most recent staging (in 2004—Donald Runnicles conducted the production both in Vienna and in San Francisco). The Decker production also had the honors of introducing *Billy Budd* to the Russian stage in 2013, the centennial of Britten's birth, when it was performed at the Mikhailovsky Theater in St. Petersburg.

Another milestone production is the one Francesca Zambello directed at the Royal Opera House in 1995, with Alison Chitty's vertical designs memorably delineating the ship's power structures. "In an isolated society, like ships or prisons, certain men become the females of that world," Zambello observed. The critic Rodney Milnes remarked on the irony of an American—also notable as a woman directing Britten's all-male opera—being the first to offer a new take on *Billy Budd* at Covent Garden since the premiere of the original and revised versions there: "Perhaps it takes an outsider ...

to turn the screws on us." Zambello's production has since been revived with widespread success at various American companies.

If the effort to find a balance between realism and abstraction is a basic constant in Billy Budd productions, the work has not remained immune to attempts to update the "realistic" side of the equation. David Alden's 2012 production of the work for English National Opera, wrote London critic Andrew Clements, reimagined the action as taking place "in a rusting, steel-hulled vessel somewhere in Europe during the first decades of the 20th century, perhaps an early Soviet ship fighting a local war in the Baltic or the Black Sea, on which jack-booted officers maintain a regime of brutal suppression." In 2007, for Oper Frankfurt, Richard Jones set his production in

a naval academy in the mid-century period when the first *Billy Budd* was introduced. And already in 1987, Graham Vick's production for Scottish Opera included designs outlining "a more modernistic structure of steel ladders and catwalks, perhaps intended to suggest the interior of a Victorian prison as much as a ship," notes Mervyn Cooke.

After an absence of the work for almost two decades from the house that gave it birth, *Billy Budd* returned to the Royal Opera last season in a much-discussed new production by Deborah Warner. Using Michael Levine's set design of floating deck platforms and rigging and Chloe Oblensky's costumes, Warner blended references to the Napoleonic era with suggestions of the 20th century, while also giving Claggart's role in the tragedy a provocatively fresh slant.

In this bicentennial year of Melville's birth, the desire to unravel the meanings of the "Handsome Sailor," the Iagolike Claggart, the maritime Pontius Pilate, Captain Vere—and all those aboard the metaphoric *Indomitable*—remains as powerful as it is elusive. Britten has revealed that some of the most resonant answers lie beyond words.

he greatest art, Herman Melville believed, remains unfinished, awaiting posterity to unearth its secrets. *Moby-Dick*—"the draught of a draught," he called it—proved his point. Virtually ignored on publication in 1851, it followed most of his novels in dropping out of print, a collective failure that led him to abandon fiction for poetry. Then, in 1888, something compelled him to start a new short novel, *Billy Budd*. "God keep me from ever completing anything," he had written in *Moby-Dick* about the paradox of big aspirations. Now the almighty took him at his word. Melville's death in 1891 arrested *Billy Budd*'s gestation. The manuscript, a jumble of bad penmanship, strikethroughs, additions, and interpolations, remained a mess that no one except his widow knew existed.

By 1919, with a Melville revival underway, the scholar Raymond Weaver planned the first biography of the novelist. In his research he combed through Melville's papers. Among them he uncovered *Billy Budd*—for a literary specialist, a find analogous to stumbling upon Machu Picchu or excavating Tutankhamun's tomb. He worked fast to share his discovery.

Unfortunately, he worked too fast. Errors large and small riddle his *Billy Budd* edition of 1924, and many of these were repeated in 1948 in what claimed to be the "first accurate transcription." Not until 1962 did the now-standard version appear. Its editors prepared their text with the care of detectives, and their investigations revealed that, every time Melville believed he had finished the manuscript, he found more to revise. "What still fur-

ther changes he might have made had he lived," they admitted, "are of course conjectural."

Conjecture propelled the work of E.M. Forster when, in 1949, working with Eric Crozier (who contributed theatrical expertise), he began transforming *Billy Budd* into a libretto for Benjamin Britten. Forster, among the 20th century's pre-eminent English novelists, knew music well, and we can thank him for making Benjamin Britten an opera composer. Britten in 1941 chanced upon a Forster article that sparked his interest in the Romantic poet George Crabbe. "In a flash I realized ... that I must write an opera," Britten recalled of his encounter with Crabbe's *The Borough*. That poem inspired *Peter Grimes*, which premiered in 1945 and changed the trajectory of Britten's life. A friendship developed between composer and writer. Soon, to Britten's delight, Forster suggested he might try his hand at a libretto.

Forster adhered to much of what he found in Melville. But while Melville's editors rebuilt a novel from what they discovered, Forster used Melville as foundation for a new edifice. To criticize it for divergences from its source is to ignore that the opera, while true to Melville's outline, is not Melville's. Besides the Act 2 pursuit of the French frigate, an action sequence absent from the novel, Forster's major inventions are a prologue and an epilogue that frame the action and enable him to tell the story from Captain Vere's perspective, unlike Melville, who uses an omniscient narrator.

Forster also brought his sensibilities to Melville's tale. He believed Billy Budd offered the opportunity to be candid about homosexuality. That subject inevitably surfaces in discussing the opera and the novel. You might agree it exists in Melville's book, but only if you look, and look closely, and Britten's reluctance to look closely disappointed Forster. Melville, a sailor in his young years, understood how long sea journeys and cramped quarters can ignite carnal instincts in men confined to each other's company. He touched on this in his 1850 book, White-Facket. There the narrator makes clear he doesn't share this orientation, but even if we assume he speaks for the author, we should remember that Melville possessed human sympathies uncommon for his or any time. In Moby-Dick, Ishmael and Queequeg share a bed—a pairing of necessity, not sex enabling Melville to emphasize that humans of every color and faith are "wedded," as Ishmael says. Melville wrote openly and with no embarrassment about men's affection for one another. Best not to mistake his artistic stratagems for a preoccupation with the intimacies of male bonding. While much is made of Billy's physical beauty, that beauty is emblematic—not of Eros, but of innocence. John Claggart intends to destroy Billy not because his advances have been rejected—he makes none—but because Billy's goodness offends him. Descended from *Paradise Lost*'s Satan, Claggart is a psychopath, dispensing evil because he can. He likes Billy's looks but despises what they signify. When he calls Billy "handsome," Claggart is stating a fact, not proposing a hookup.

In dense prose, and as gingerly as a cardiologist threading a scope through an artery, Melville explores the minds and motivations of Captain Edward Fairfax Vere and Master-at-Arms John Claggart. He called this deliberate drama "An Inside Narrative." Translating it to the stage demanded much from the librettists but more from the composer, and Britten reveled in the challenge ("I've never been so obsessed by a piece"). The music bears responsibility both for psychological penetration and dramatic movement. In Britten's hands, everything springs to life from the first scene on deck, where he infuses mundane phrases with energy and ignores the bar lines' limits, enlivening nautical references and commands and even conjuring the ocean's mystery (as in the chorus "O heave! O heave away, heave," kin to "Dawn," first of Grimes' Four Sea Interludes). Immediately Britten plunges us into the world of a British man-of-war, circa 1797. Using only male voices and weaving them into an orchestra lit with brass and high winds, Britten creates a continuously varied sound texture.

The score abounds in thematic correspondences across its span. The slow *pianissimo* string figure we hear at the outset, and which recurs in the epilogue, generates such variants as the forward-thrusting figure at the first men-

tion of Claggart's name, the bass clarinet line that snakes beneath Claggart's accusation to Vere, the strings' nervous pulse as Billy defends himself to the drumhead court, even the fanfare that drives the sea chase.

Embracing Melville's pessimism, Forster and Britten portray the perils of innocence. A stammer plagues the apparently undefiled Billy and turns this angel into a murderer, striking him mute when challenged, able only to counter false witness with a primitive response, a killing blow of his fist. In the fallen world, the cards are stacked against innocence, and self-defense is its undoing. Claggart serves as the universe's instrument to annihilate Billy. At his death the burden passes to Vere, who accepts responsibility while tortured by the justice he feels forced to dispense. "Beauty, handsomeness, goodness," he laments, echoing Claggart, "it is for me to destroy you."

Among the puzzles and triumphs of Melville's novel is the scene in which, having agreed with his officers that Billy must die, the captain disappears into an anteroom where Billy waits. "Beyond the communication of the sentence," writes Melville, "what took place at this interview was never known." The tale's narrator goes so far as to imagine that Vere "may in the end have caught Billy to his heart." Who can say? "Holy oblivion providentially covers all at last." Vere's disclosure of the verdict and Billy's reaction remain private. Words failed Billy at his crucial moment. Words fail Melville now. Nor did Forster invent words for a scene that remains unseen. The music communicates a numinous solemnity. For three minutes that feel timeless, the orchestra takes over. Group by group, brass, strings, winds, and horns take turns playing a series of common triads—a radiant, chorale-like sequence spanning 34 bars. The writer Donald Mitchell believes that Britten envisioned a scenario, "each chord ... within the total arch [representing] a stage in the development of the encounter between Vere and Billy." Here, Mitchell concludes, "music speaks in a tongue for which words could never be found." These same chords return in Billy's last monologue, when, section by orchestral section as in the interview sequence, they accompany him as he sings, "I'm strong, and I know it, and that's enough." Once more the chords sound, now in the epilogue, as Vere adopts Billy's words: "I've sighted a sail in the storm, the far-shining sail, and I'm content."

A forced optimism, at extreme odds with Melville, seems to inhabit the epilogue. Yet the chords of the interview sequence rising through this scene suggest a recurrent Melville theme: salvation through human empathy,

the empathy those chords represent. At last, after a surge of affirmation, the orchestra falls silent, the captain's words end in a mutter, and the opera concludes, not quite sure of what has transpired in these final moments.

Critical response was mixed when *Billy Budd* premiered, on December 1, 1951, at the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden. Nine years later Britten compressed the original four acts into two, tightening the structure and quickening the pace. The art historian Kenneth Clarke may have gone too far in calling the opera "one of the great masterpieces that change human conduct," but *Billy Budd* lodges in the consciousness, where it keeps doing its work. Like Melville's story, the opera's enigmas invite continuing interpretation. In that sense it remains unfinished, as Melville might say, and as such it proves most true to him.

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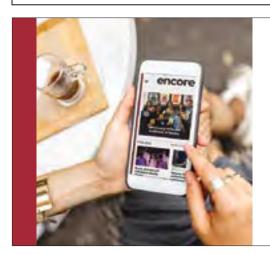

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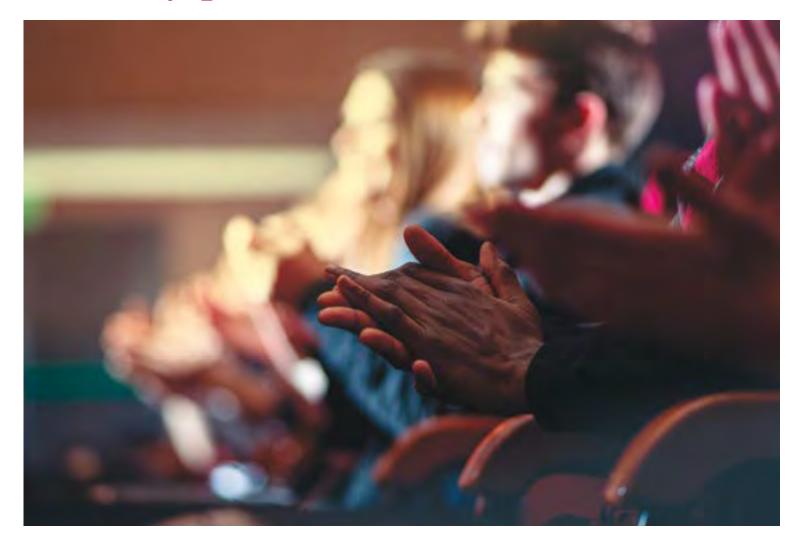

REFLECTING COMMUNITY

BY GENERAL DIRECTOR MATTHEW SHILVOCK

hen I am visiting opera houses around the world, I am struck by how often these buildings are intended to be gathering points for their communities. They are often situated at major nexus points in their cities, close to major transit thoroughfares, and set amidst thriving marketplaces and cultural districts. Opera houses can be the embodiment of the cultural life of the communities that surround them. In the

best of cases, the art on stage inspires the community, and the community inspires the art.

The very way that people used to interact with the art form is indicative of the innate power of opera to bring people together. Until the late 19th century, auditoriums were fully lit, and opera performances were vibrant, energetic, boisterous events. The Italianate horseshoe design was intended to facilitate viewing—not of the stage, but of other people in the audience. Eating, drinking, talking, business deals, and amorous pursuits were the norm. Sitting as we do in almost reverential silence now, it's hard to imagine this communal experience. The closest example I've seen is in the beautiful 1988 film *Cinema Paradiso* in which there are wonderful scenes of a small Sicilian village gathering in the cinema and living life against the backdrop of art.

Opera can and should energize the community in which it exists. It should entertain, challenge, probe, and reflect. Even if the norms of opera-going are now more restrained, the dialogue around performances should still be as vibrant and dynamic. As we move towards our second century, we are focused on ensuring that the stories we tell through opera have meaning to this community, that we are telling those stories to as broad an audience as possible, and that we in the Company—the storytellers—are reflective of the rich diversity of this wonderful community. Reflecting our community in our story telling was a major impetus in establishing a department of diversity, equity and community.

We want to be a place where the whole community can come and engage in deeply powerful storytelling.

As a part of this focus, we are committed to bringing stories to this stage that reflect the community's focus in the Bay Area, here and now. Whether through something pointedly local like *The* (*R*)evolution of Steve *Jobs* later this season or works that directly address contemporary themes, we have numerous exciting projects underway to

bring conversation-provoking and insightful works to our stage in upcoming seasons, and I can't wait to experience those with you.

Another wonderful example of community gathering together around opera is seen in our free-to-attend simulcasts at Oracle Park, home of the San Francisco Giants. I am so happy that we are returning on September 21st for a live relay of *Romeo and Juliet*. These simulcasts have become amazing shared moments for the community. We've seen audiences of up to 30,000 gather together to cheer the heroes, boo the villains, and enjoy the performance with an unabashed freedom that harkens back to the early centuries of opera. You can eat, drink, walk around, and talk to your neighbors. It's thrilling to see that kind of energized participation and engagement.

I'll often sneak up to a far-flung corner of the ballpark during the simulcast and take a moment to watch the audience experiencing the opera. Even with the very different environment at the ballpark, this audience of tens of thousands is completely riveted on the emotional world unfolding before them. As in the opera house, the simulcast audience shares in collective moments of emotional catharsis. The community comes together and participates in storytelling that speaks to the deep truths of who we are as humans. That's what opera can and should be!

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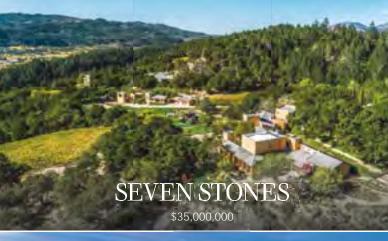
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
