#### OPERA AT THE BALLPARK RETURNS

On Saturday, September 21 at 7:30 pm, *Romeo and Juliet* will be transmitted live to Oracle Park, the home of the San Francisco Giants, marking the return of *Opera at the Ballpark* for the first time since 2017.

Presented in partnership with the San Francisco Giants, the 2019 *Opera at the Ballpark* allows audiences from around the Bay Area to experience Gounod's romantic opera while seated on the baseball field or in the stands where they can pair live opera with hot dogs, peanuts, and garlic fries.

The performance will be transmitted in high definition live from the stage of the War Memorial Opera House to the 71' x 153' videoboard in Oracle Park. This newly installed screen—twice the resolution and 50' wider and 20' taller than the previous one—will make for a "supersized" operatic evening in one of San Francisco's most picturesque sports and entertainment venues.

This year's offering of *Romeo and Juliet*, the 16th in the series of live simulcasts that have drawn audiences of all ages in excess of 303,000 since 2006, features tenor Bryan Hymel and soprano Nadine Sierra in the title roles in Opéra de Monte-Carlo Director Jean-Louis Grinda's Italian Renaissanceinspired production.

Online registration, which ensures entrance into the ballpark, is available at sfopera.com/simulcast. The simulcast of *Romeo and Juliet* is sponsored, in part, by Taube Philanthropies and Charles Schwab & Co., Inc.

## EMERGING STARS COMPETITION WINNER ANNOUNCED

Last month, San Francisco Opera announced Andriana Chuchman as the 2019 winner of the Jan Shrem and Maria Manetti Shrem Emerging Stars competition and named her "Emerging Star of the Year." In her Company debut last fall in Jake Heggie and Gene Scheer's *It's a Wonderful Life*, the Canadian soprano moved audiences with a portrayal that was filled with heart, beautiful singing, and some great dance moves (remember the "Mekee-Mekee"?).

Chuchman said, "Debuting at the San Francisco Opera this past season has been one of the highlights of my career so far. Receiving the Emerging Star Award is a huge honour, and a great way to cap off such a special moment. I want to give a huge thank you to my wonderful family, friends, and fans who voted for me! I'm feeling the love! And a special thank you to Maria Manetti Shrem and Jan Shrem for generously supporting this competition."

Earning the most online votes in a field of eight nominated artists from the 2018–19 Season, Chuchman receives a \$10,000 cash prize. Past winners of the award, which was initiated in 2016, are baritone Lucas Meachem and tenors Atalla Ayan and Arturo Chacón-Cruz. Wheelchairaccessible stalls in restrooms can be found on all floors (except the Main Lobby and 5th floor Balcony levels). The North Box Restaurant on the North Mezzanine (Box) level features locally sourced California cuisine with global influences.

Audiences may enjoy purchased beverages inside the auditorium in the appropriate containers. Outside food and drink are prohibited.

The **SAN FRANCISCO OPERA SHOP**, located in the South Mezzanine lobby, front lobby, and North Dress Circle of the Opera House, sells opera CDs, DVDs, SF Opera merchandise, and gift items. The Shop is open 90 minutes before performances, at intermissions, and afterward. 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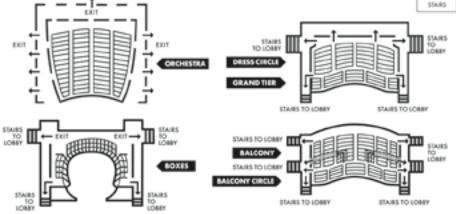
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## CHARLES CHIP MC NEAL director, department of diversity, equity and community

n August 1, San Francisco Opera established the Department of Diversity, Equity and Community, to broaden the Company's work in developing new audiences and engaging the public. At its helm is arts educator, researcher, and civic leader Charles Chip Mc Neal, formerly the senior curriculum and program manager of the opera's education department.

"By establishing a Department of Diversity, Equity and Community,

San Francisco Opera is making a bold move in a time of critical change in our country's history, and certainly in the state of California," Mc Neal says.

Mc Neal, a Bay Area native credits early experiences at the War Memorial Opera House with putting him on the path to leading this department.

Growing up in Berkeley in the 1970s and '80s, Mc Neal was an artistically driven child, dabbling in school plays and folkloric dances. But a field trip he took as a teenager offered him his first glimpse at opera. He ended up in the audience of San Francisco Opera's 1981 *Aida*, starring legendary soprano Leontyne Price.

"I didn't know there was an African American opera singer until I heard Leontyne Price. I started researching her and realizing, oh my god, this is amazing, and this is a rarity," he says. "I don't know if I would be involved in the classical arts if it weren't for those early experiences."

After high school, Mc Neal moved to New York City, where he studied under renowned acting coaches like Lee Strasberg, Stella Adler, and Uta Hagen. Attending New York University made him the first in his family to go to college.

One of his first breakthroughs as a performer came in

an off-Broadway production of *Kiss Me, Kate.* "I remember for weeks and months just pinching myself, think-ing this is crazy: a little black child from Berkeley, California, doing a show in New York."

But his successes came at a cost. The criticisms he faced as an actor and dancer eroded his self-esteem. "I was told I was too tall, too dark, too unattractive," he says. "That insidiousness, that questioning, that diminutive and oppressive reflection back at you

about who you are can be devastating."

Eventually, after a knee injury, Mc Neal started to shift his focus from performance to education—partially in reaction to those negative experiences. "This business isn't fair. It isn't equitable. So knowing that, if I were going to be in it, how could I bring that dimension? How could I bring that dimension of equity? Of humanity? Of acceptance?"

In his new role as head of San Francisco Opera's Department of Diversity, Equity and Community, Mc Neal seeks to augment SF Opera's legacy of education programming and community engagement through critical dialogues, and inclusive civic practices that focus on policies and strategies that enhance our ability to collaboratively address issues of diversity, equity, and inclusion in the arts.

Ultimately, Mc Neal hopes to create spaces where everyone—regardless of identity—feels "honored and included." Opera, he says, has that power. It's his life's work to break barriers so others can feel that empowerment too.

"If I didn't work to make arts accessible, then I don't know if I would have a purpose," he says. "That is really the essence of what I'm doing."

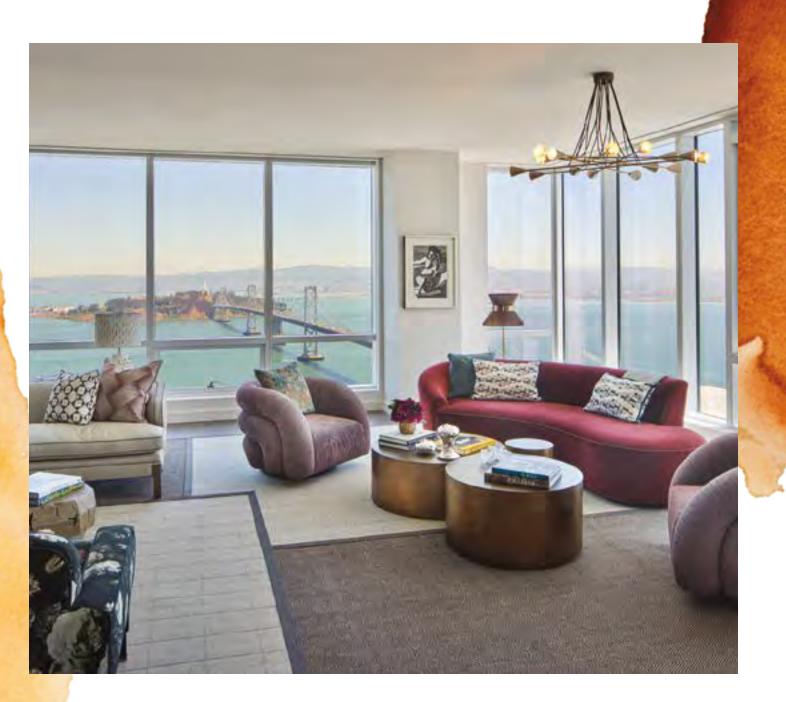
## JOHN A. & CYNTHIA FRY GUNN

John chairs the advisory board for the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research, is Vice Chairman of the Board of Stanford Hospital Care and is a former trustee of Stanford University. Cynthia currently serves as an overseer of Stanford's Hoover Institution and a trustee of the San Francisco Fine Arts Museums and has been a member of the advisory board of Family and Children Services and the board of the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health. 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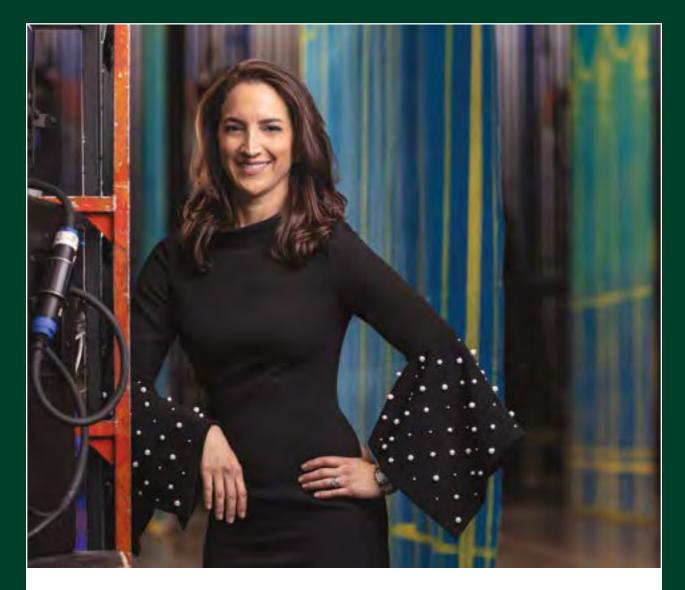

#### SYNOPSIS

## **ROMEO AND JULIET**

## ACT I

After the prologue, the curtain rises on a dazzling ball in the palace of the Capulets. They are celebrating Juliet's birthday. Her father, Count Capulet, has promised her to Count Paris. Everyone admires the young girl's beauty, and her father bids the guests to enjoy themselves. Two masked members of the rival Montague clan-Romeo and Mercutio-have slipped incognito into the ball. Romeo has dark forebodings, but his friend jokes teasingly that Mab the queen of dreams must have paid him a visit during the night. Suddenly Romeo sees Juliet at a distance and is immediately smitten with love for her. Juliet confesses to her nurse, Gertrude, that she would like to enjoy her youth before getting married. Seeing that Gertrude has been called away, Romeo approaches Juliet and declares his love for her, which arouses tender emotions in response. The arrival of Tybalt, Juliet's cousin, brutally shatters the enchantment. Romeo realizes that his beloved is the daughter of his enemy Capulet, while Tybalt recognizes the voice of the hated Romeo. The lovers are horrified to discover that they belong to two families separated by an ancient and hate-filled feud. The rules of hospitality forbid Tybalt from venting his anger there and then, and Capulet orders the festivities to proceed.

Night has fallen. Romeo is alone and enters Juliet's garden. He sees her at her window and compares her beauty to that of the rising sun. Juliet steps out onto her balcony and the two lovers pledge their love for each other. But their idyll is interrupted by the arrival of a group of servants, led by Gregorio, searching for some Montagues suspected of slipping into the ball. Gertrude sends them away and then calls Juliet in, scolding her for not being in bed. The lovers reluctantly take leave of each other, promising to meet again the next day.

## ACT III

**SCENE 1** At sunrise Romeo and Juliet go to Friar Lawrence's laboratory. Deeply moved by the force of their love and seeing the opportunity to reconcile the two houses, he agrees to marry them in secret. Gertrude, who has arrived in the meantime, shares their joy.

## -INTERMISSION-

**SCENE 2** Romeo's page, Stephano, comes looking for his master. He mockingly compares the Capulets' palace to a vulture's nest where Juliet, a turtle dove, is living in bad company. The reaction is swift: Gregorio challenges him to a duel. Mercutio rushes in to help Stephano. Then Tybalt rushes into the affray. Romeo runs in to calm everyone down and refuses to fight against Tybalt who is now his cousin by marriage. But Mercutio is mortally wounded and Romeo immediately avenges his death by killing Tybalt. The Duke of Verona arrives and after pronouncing harsh words against both families he banishes Romeo from Verona.

### ACT IV

Romeo has joined Juliet for one last night. She forgives him for killing Tybalt. The song of the lark announces the dawn, the moment of their heart-rending farewells before Romeo's departure. Capulet enters, accompanied by Friar Lawrence who has to prepare Juliet for her imminent marriage to Paris. Alone with Juliet, who wants to die, Friar Lawrence gives her a potion that will cause her to appear to be dead, and plans for Romeo to meet her inside the tomb when she awakens. The friar leaves and Juliet summons the courage to drink the potion.

## ACT V

Believing that Juliet is dead, Romeo takes one final look at her and then drinks poison. Juliet slowly wakes from her deep sleep. Their joy at being reunited is shortlived. Romeo weakens. Juliet sees the empty vial and realizes what has happened. She stabs herself. The lovers die in each other's arms, imploring God's forgiveness.

First San Francisco Opera performance: October 4, 1923. ## GOUNOD'S, ROMED ET JULIERT

## AN INTRODUCTION

y 1867 Napoleon III's Second Empire seemed to be approaching the glorious new future he had promised. Paris had been rebuilt by the indefatigable Baron Haussmann with grand new boulevards lined with trees and handsome buildings, the low-rise Paris that we know today. The impact of accumulated wealth was everywhere to be seen-in fine new city residences, in glamorous fashions, in the flourishing spas of Europe where the great and the good took their summer vacations, and in the fast-growing reputation of Paris as the city of gaiety and pleasure. Despite the Emperor's dubious legitimacy, or more probably because of it, he liked to hobnob with the hereditary monarchs of Europe, and to show off his beautiful city and his beautiful wife. The 1867 Exposition Universelle was planned to draw the attention of the world to the glories of French commerce and culture, and to attract the possessors of curiosity, wealth, or titles in great numbers. In great numbers they came, and with an official opening on April 1 the city put on its best show.

Eiffel built not a tower—that would come later—but a splendid iron and glass pavilion on the Champs-Élysées, with hydraulic elevators carrying visitors up to the roof. The Bateaux Mouches began their popular sightseeing trips down the Seine. Nadar, the photographer, took twelve tourists at a time up in his double-decker balloon. A large-scale model of the soon-to-be-opened Suez Canal was shown, complete with ships passing through it. From Vienna the younger Johann Strauss brought a new waltz called *The Blue Danube*. The Japanese exhibit proved to be very popular, leading to a craze for *japonoiserie*. The United States exhibited surgical instruments and artificial limbs, while Victorian England sent biblical tracts, agricultural implements, and a school.

The three opera houses all had something special to offer. The magnificent new Opéra, the Palais Garnier, was still only half finished, so in their old building in the Rue Le Peletier they mounted Verdi's Don Carlos after a protracted rehearsal period which drove the fastidious composer to distraction. The opera received forty-three performances but was not considered a success, maybe because there were two or three major rivals for all that applause: the Opéra-Comique had a hit from the previous year, Ambroise Thomas' Mignon playing to packed houses, while at the Théâtre-Lyrique on the Place du Châtelet Gounod followed up his Goethe hit (Faust) with a Shakespeare hit (Roméo et *Fuliette*) which opened on April 27 and achieved 322 performances in its first six-year run. But none of these could compete with Offenbach at the Théâtre des Variétés, where his La Grande-Duchesse de Gérolstein and his star, Hortense Schneider, were the sensation of the season.

But while Offenbach's successes came and went with dazzling frequency, Gounod's success had a continuous future ahead. Within months it was to be heard in cities all over Europe and in New York too. It passed in 1873, after the demise of the Théâtre-Lyrique, to the Opéra-Comique, and from there to the larger stage of the Opéra in 1888. Gounod never believed in definitive forms of his opera, recognizing that different audiences require different levels of sophistication. *Roméo et Juliette* thus survives in many different forms, which can be adjusted depending on the singers, the stage direction, and the public.

The critic Ernest Newman, who knew a lot about opera, used to say that Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet* was not very suitable for the operatic stage, despite constant attempts by composers of all ages to fashion that great play into an opera. His argument was that the two lovers don't change much during the course of the action, whereas circumstances, to which they are completely in thrall, do. When it comes to Gounod's beautifully lyrical version, that argument looks distinctly weak, since the mood in which the lovers meet their death in the last scene is completely different musically and emotionally from the tender, polite "Madrigal" which they sing to each other when they first meet, both still ignorant of who the other is.

The lovers are very young, of course. Shakespeare gave Juliet a tender thirteen years; Gounod's librettists presumed something a little older, but in any case teenagers grow faster than adults, as we all know, especially if they are dealt the extraordinary thunderbolt which strikes both children down in the first act when they catch sight of each other for the first time. There is no more celebrated case of love at first sight than this, and in the course of their four duets this is transformed into a passion of real tenderness and depth. Juliet's response to Friar Lawrence in Act Four, when he offers her the potion that will bring about the semblance of death, is stark and fearful, more for the thought of failure (which would force her to marry Paris) than from the simulacrum of death that she will have to undergo.

Gounod's original Juliet was Marie Caroline Miolan-Carvalho, who was nearly forty when *Roméo et Juliette* was first heard. She had already created two famous Gounod roles— Marguerite (in *Faust*) and Mireille—and she was celebrated for her magnificent coloratura. Gounod could not possibly deny her the chance to show off such talent, so he composed the "Valse-Ariette" in Act One (a sequel to the Jewel Song in *Faust*) expressly for her voice. It was inevitably the hit of the show. Alas, she was not up to the dramatic demands of the final scenes, but since she was married to the director of the theater, no one was in a position to complain.

Events in Verona move rapidly too. Civil strife in the streets is not represented with a colossal brawl in the manner of Wagner's *Meistersinger* (premiered a few months later than *Roméo et Juliette*), since Gounod was not writing for a major stage. But it is felt in the tension between the families, especially when a few snide exchanges between Romeo's page, Stephano (a nice trouser role for a soprano), and Gregorio lead to drawn swords, pulling first Mercutio, then Tybalt, then Romeo into the fray. In no time at all both Mercutio and Tybalt are dead, and Romeo's circumstances, already untenable because of his secret marriage to Tybalt's cousin, force on him the desperate action that leads to the tragic dénouement.

The ending is not Shakespeare's ending, for the families are not reconciled, nor does Friar Lawrence have an opportunity to explain his unhappy part in the lovers' fate. These were changes made originally in London in the eighteenth century, and they remained in tune with the Romantic taste for stark tragic endings. Also, in the vault scene Juliet wakes from her false death before the poison has done its work. So Romeo is still alive, and they thus sing one more duet, this time fragmented and doomed while their themes pile up in the orchestra. Juliet stabs herself, and their last words are a prayer to heaven for forgiveness. Gounod's piety has the last word.

These adjustments to Shakespeare's action are also found in Berlioz's choral symphony *Roméo et Juliette*, which was the last music Gounod heard in Paris in 1839 before leaving for Rome as winner of the annual Prix de Rome. He was twenty-one, and he remembered the work vividly. He paid tribute to Berlioz at the start of the opera when the chorus interrupts the overture to set the scene in a type of choral recitative that had only ever been heard before in the introduction to Berlioz's work: "Vérone vit jadis deux familles rivales, les Montaigus, les Capulets."

Being true to Shakespeare was in any case not the top priority of Gounod's librettists, Jules Barbier and Michel Carré, who were not afraid a year later to give *Hamlet* a happy ending in their libretto for Thomas. With *Faust*, *Mignon*, *Roméo et Juliette*, and *Hamlet* they transformed Goethe and Shakespeare for the genre of opera as it was understood in their time.

When *Roméo et Juliette* moved up to the Opéra-Comique, Gounod was in London entangled in legal and matrimonial problems that forced him to enlist Bizet to carry out the revisions that were needed. Then later, for the grander stage of the Paris Opéra, Gounod had to supply a ballet, as he also had to do for *Faust*. Even without the ballet (which Shakespeare's dramaturgy scarcely requires) there is a remarkable variety of musical types in the score, from Mercutios's enchanting song about Queen Mab to the brilliant build-up of violence as the finale to Act Three. The story is eternal, of course, assisted by the great creative minds that have transformed and adapted it for every medium and every age. Gounod's music struck a chord with Second Empire Paris, and it can still stir us deeply today.

### ROMEO AND JULIET A DRAMA OF ABSOLUTE LOVE

**o** approach *Romeo and Juliet* requires painstaking research in order to fully comprehend the multiple facets of this masterpiece. While this research, which spans from Shakespeare to Gounod, has shed light on the characters, it has most importantly convinced me of two critical imperatives: the importance of respecting the time period, and the need to present the scenic elements with the utmost simplicity and elegance.

Respecting the period is key to me because it allows us to do justice to the original story and at the same time recognize Gounod's efforts to imbue the work with a Renaissance flavor. This does not imply that shifting the time period would weaken this story: it is far too strong to be diminished by such an adaptation, for its message is timeless. But on reflection, such a transposition seemed an unnecessary device, and I opted to interpret the piece as written.

The time period is evidenced here primarily via the costumes, as well as by the spare simplicity of the scenery. Why? The reasons are many. First, it is necessary to subtly evoke the physical locations, for any attempt to reproduce them faithfully would be a lost cause. How to bring to life

on stage the splendors of Verona's palaces? Let us instead elicit them, suggest them, and leave the rest to the imagination. Moreover, as the costumes of the period were lavish to the extreme, I opted not to present them with such burdensome complexity.

Stopping short of obvious minimalism, I wanted to offer an airy stage with wide open spaces, driving the audience's focus fully on the characters themselves. That is the challenge we have posed.

Within this frame, one can mount this drama of absolute love, which touches every viewer with its deep injustice and a tragic outcome so easily avoidable... The prologue leaves no doubt as to the ending, yet we will experience the story as if for the first time. Juliet's carefree insouciance, Romeo's premonition, Tybalt's hateful fury, Mercutio's provocative bitterness, all these twists are well known, and yet, we experience them each time as if it were the first.

To direct *Romeo and Juliet*, one must take all these elements and so many more into consideration.

### *"Romeo, Romeo, Romeo! Here's drink—I drink to thee!"* [SHE DRINKS, AND FALLS UPON HER BED WITHIN THE CURTAINS.]

o ends the dramatic soliloquy Shakespeare gives his heroine as she steels herself for downing Friar Lawrence's potion to give her the "borrowed likeness of shrunk death." The corresponding scene in Gounod's opera is a challenging bravura aria, "Amour, ranime mon courage" (Love, revive my courage), in the fourth of the five acts. Until a few decades ago it had mostly been suppressed, and therein lies a tale.

Gounod's first Juliette, Marie Caroline Miolan-Carvalho, was the wife of Léon Carvalho, director of the Théâtre Lyrique in Paris where *Roméo et Juliette* premiered in 1867. She was at that point the composer's "goto" soprano, having already created the part of Marguerite in *Faust* (1859) and the title role of *Mireille* (1864). She had insisted on cuts in both, and did so again with Juliette. Backed by her impresario husband, she demanded that the difficult "Potion Aria" (more often, somewhat inaptly, called the "Poison Aria") be dropped. Although it appeared in the original vocal score, it was not performed and disappeared from later editions as the work moved to the Opéra Comique in 1873 and finally the more prestigious Paris Opéra at the Palais Garnier in 1888.

In place of the Potion Aria, Gounod gave Madame Carvalho something more suited to her rather light lyric voice: the now-famous Act One waltz-song "Je veux vivre dans le rêve qui m'enivre" (I want to live in this intoxicating dream). This popular coloratura romp is a close cousin to the giddy showpiece "O légère hirondelle" (O graceful swallow) he had given her in *Mireille*. Thus Juliette's virtuoso scene of mature and defiant determination late in the story was supplanted by a carefree expression of girlish delight near the beginning. Live performances of the Potion Aria were so scarce until recently that as late as 1990 Gounod biographer Steven Huebner declared it "rarely given today." Its vocal demands are admittedly daunting, complete with two prominent high Cs.

Any soprano attempting the passionate Potion Aria must take care to reserve some energy for the subsequent Tomb Scene, with its transcendent final duet as the doomed lovers die together. (Unlike Shakespeare's original, but mirroring some 18th-century revisions of the play, Gounod's self-poisoned Romeo clings to life long enough for this duet to unfold as Juliet, victim of her own dagger, expires with him.)

The text of the scene, derived by librettists Jules Barbier and Michel Carré from Victor Hugo's French translation of the play, closely reflects Shakespeare's structure, varying in only one minor respect at the outset: Gounod's Juliette at first worries only that the potion will not work, not sharing the original Juliet's initial suspicion that it might be a fatal poison. (Perhaps Friar Lawrence means for her to die before being forced into a sinful second marriage to Paris after already

secretly marrying Romeo?)

That difference aside, Juliet in the play and Juliette in the opera then follow the same emotional path through the scene. They shake off their qualms about the potion and summon their courage, invoking the inspiration of love. But they succumb to momentary terror at the thought of awakening in the sepulcher long before Romeo-according to the Friar's fatally flawed plan-arrives to whisk her away to freedom. In horror they both imagine the haunting ghost of cousin Tybalt whose gruesome fresh corpse, victim of Romeo's revenge for the killing of his friend Mercutio, already lies entombed there. (Swirling scales in the orchestra underscore the singer's agitation.) And they then rally their courage a second

time, casting aside their fears. Juliet's concluding "I drink to thee!" becomes Juliette's "Je bois à toi!"

A century of famous Juliettes—from Nellie Melba to Mirella Freni—were content to leave the Potion Aria alone both on stage and in the recording studio, but with the 1984 EMI recording of the opera with Catherine Malfitano singing it, subsequent sopranos have mostly embraced the challenge. The first known performance of the scene at San Francisco Opera was in 1987, the last time the opera was given here, sung by longtime SFO favorite Ruth Ann Swenson, whose 25-year starring career on this stage earned her countless fans and the San Francisco Opera Medal. Patrons with a long memory will recall her triumphant execution of the role, aptly characterized by the *New York Times,* reviewing her subsequent performance of the opera at the Met, as "radiant, full and unforced."

One of this season's Juliettes, Nadine Sierra, has already wowed local audiences with her Potion Aria while still an Adler Fellow with the San Francisco Opera Center during a concert in 2012. The *San Francisco Chronicle* declared "Sierra's way with the French repertoire had infused ... a vivid and breathtakingly sung account of [the aria]. This is a singer with enormous reserves of vocal power, along with the ability to calibrate it perfectly to the setting—her high notes were potently sustained but never shrill or overbearing."

> San Francisco Classical Voice agreed: "Sierra does not simply assume a pose or pretend to act; every vocal and facial expression, every move of her lithe body proclaims total involvement. Her sensational final high note, which seemed to go on forever, telegraphed triumph after triumph in the years ahead."

> In a recent interview Sierra described the challenges presented by the Potion Aria. "It's Gounod kind of doing the same thing that Verdi did for Gilda or Violetta: allowing the audience to see, over two or three hours, a dramatic change within the character. The role of Juliette starts off rather light-ish and it just gets heavier after that. It can be like running a marathon. You have to pace yourself. But that is the fun of being an opera singer.

The roles that we get to play still challenge us and push us to grow along with these characters."

A prominent American conductor who frequently guests here, and who knows both Gounod's opera and Sierra well, commented recently about the long-neglected Potion Aria: "It is high, sustained, and relentless, quite evocative of Juliette at such a desperate moment. And there have been very few sopranos who could handle it. A soprano like Nadine, of course, will have the opposite problem of many of her predecessors: she will have to work to make it look difficult!"

## WHEREFORE ART THOU ROMEO?

ne of opera's great unsolved mysteries concerns a recording of Roméo's last act aria by one of the greatest artists the lyric stage has ever known. During the 1890s, legendary Polish tenor Jean de Reszke was the idol of the public in New York, Paris, and London, but unlike many of his Golden Age colleagues, the prince of tenors was dubious about the emerging technology of recorded sound and refused to make records.

On April 22, 1905, de Reszke, recently retired and apparently feeling adventurous, finally relented and sang two arias into the recording horn for the Fonotipia company. His selections were obvious ones: "O souverain, ô juge!" from Massenet's *Le Cid*, an opera that was composed especially for Jean in 1885, and the tomb scene from *Roméo et Juliette*, one of his greatest roles. Dissatisfied with the results of the session, de Reszke ordered the recordings destroyed, denying future generations a memento of his world-renowned voice.

Rumors of a preserved test pressing of de Reszke's only

record have circulated for nearly a century. While there have been seemingly credible claims, most reports have turned out to be elaborate hoaxes. Hope remains that de Reszke's Roméo will one day be heard, but where is it? Perhaps the record has already been found but is squirreled away in a private collection in France. Maybe it lies forgotten in someone's attic, gathering dust. Did the precious but breakable item survive two World Wars? Until there is news of a discovery, we must be content with the Mapleson Cylinders, turn-of-the-century live recordings from the Metropolitan Opera House, where the voice of Jean de Reszke, among other stage divinities of a distant age, can be faintly made out amid a wall of surface noise. Discovering the great tenor on these unique documents is another kind of quest. Check YouTube!

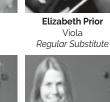

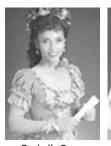

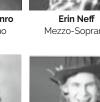

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#### POSTLUDE

### **REFLECTING COMMUNITY**

hen I am visiting opera houses around the world, I am struck by how often these buildings are intended to be gathering points for their communities. They are often situated at major nexus points in their cities, close to major transit thoroughfares, and set amidst thriving marketplaces and cultural districts. Opera houses can be the embodiment of the cultural life of the communities that surround them. In the

best of cases, the art on stage inspires the community, and the community inspires the art.

The very way that people used to interact with the art form is indicative of the innate power of opera to bring people together. Until the late 19th century, auditoriums were fully lit, and opera performances were vibrant, energetic, boisterous events. The Italianate horseshoe design was intended to facilitate viewing—not of the stage, but of other people in the audience. Eating, drinking, talking, business deals, and amorous pursuits were the norm. Sitting as we do in almost reverential silence now, it's hard to imagine this communal experience. The closest example I've seen is in the beautiful 1988 film *Cinema Paradiso* in which there are wonderful scenes of a small Sicilian village gathering in the cinema and living life against the backdrop of art.

Opera can and should energize the community in which it exists. It should entertain, challenge, probe, and reflect. Even if the norms of opera-going are now more restrained, the dialogue around performances should still be as vibrant and dynamic. As we move towards our second century, we are focused on ensuring that the stories we tell through opera have meaning to this community, that we are telling those stories to as broad an audience as possible, and that we in the Company—the storytellers—are reflective of the rich diversity of this wonderful community. Reflecting our community in our story telling was a major impetus in establishing a department of diversity, equity and community. We want to be a place where the whole community can come and engage in deeply powerful storytelling.

As a part of this focus, we are committed to bringing stories to this stage that reflect the community's focus in the Bay Area, here and now. Whether through something pointedly local like *The* (*R*)*evolution of Steve Jobs* later this season or works that directly address contemporary themes, we have numerous exciting projects underway to

bring conversation-provoking and insightful works to our stage in upcoming seasons, and I can't wait to experience those with you.

Another wonderful example of community gathering together around opera is seen in our free-to-attend simulcasts at Oracle Park, home of the San Francisco Giants. I am so happy that we are returning on September 21st for a live relay of *Romeo and Juliet*. These simulcasts have become amazing shared moments for the community. We've seen audiences of up to 30,000 gather together to cheer the heroes, boo the villains, and enjoy the performance with an unabashed freedom that harkens back to the early centuries of opera. You can eat, drink, walk around, and talk to your neighbors. It's thrilling to see that kind of energized participation and engagement.

I'll often sneak up to a far-flung corner of the ballpark during the simulcast and take a moment to watch the audience experiencing the opera. Even with the very different environment at the ballpark, this audience of tens of thousands is completely riveted on the emotional world unfolding before them. As in the opera house, the simulcast audience shares in collective moments of emotional catharsis. The community comes together and participates in storytelling that speaks to the deep truths of who we are as humans. That's what opera can and should be!
