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# IN SONG: MEIGUI ZHANG RELEASED JUNE 7

San Francisco Opera's video series, In Song, a recent 2022 Webby People's Voice-winner, continues this month with a new episode, *In Song: Meigui Zhang.* The fast-rising soprano reflects on her journey far from Chengdu, China, where she grew up on the grounds of a music conservatory, raised by singer-teacher parents. Prior to her San Francisco Opera debut this month as Dai Yu in *Dream of the Red Chamber* (June 14–July 3), she performs a traditional Kazakh folk song and French art song.

Shot on location in cities ranging from Nashville and New York City to Auckland and Cairo, each *In Song* episode explores, through story and song, the diverse cultural traditions that inform the personal and musical journey of notable artists from the world of opera. The series has featured soprano Amina Edris, mezzosopranos Jamie Barton (with banjo virtuoso Béla Fleck) and J'Nai Bridges, and tenors Arturo Chacón-Cruz and Pene Pati.

Each *In Song* is free and available at **sfopera.com/insong** and on YouTube and Facebook, along with additional content including conversations between the artists and *In Song* director Elena Park about the making of each episode.

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



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
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### A BIG BOLD SEASON

Someday people will look back and say, "remember the pandemic, when we all sat in our cars and watched the opera, so separate, and yet so together? Wasn't that something?"

While our own waistlines expanded with pandemic pounds, arts organizations slimmed down, busily adapting to meet the unprecedented challenge. Even so, San Francisco Opera's General Director Matthew Shilvock, the staff, and the Company kept their eye on the

ball. Calendar pages were turning. The centennial year was coming, ready or not. Well, the moment has arrived. This fall, the Company joins only two other American companies (the Metropolitan Opera and the Cincinnati Opera) to have reached the centennial milestone. The 100th season will feature a jubilant array of new works, new productions, and stars worthy of the name. The centennial logo is a burst of kaleidoscopic color. "It's a big, bold budget and it's a big, bold season," Shilvock says. "We can't be anything but bold at the moment."

# INNOVATIVE ZEAL IS IN OUR DNA


The season is bookended by new commissions of Bay Area composers. John Adams' *Antony and Cleopatra* kicks things off with stars Gerald Finley and Amina Edris originating the title roles. "It's a story of intense love," Shilvock says, "almost *Who's-Afraid-of-Virginia-Woolf-*esque." The season closer, *El último sueño de Frida y Diego*, is a mystical take on the immortal love story of artists Frida Kahlo and Diego Rivera by acclaimed Berkeley-born composer Gabriela Lena Frank. Adding yet more local depth to the story, tempest-tossed lovers Kahlo and Rivera divorced in 1940 and remarried one another that same year in San Francisco City Hall.

Two jewels of the twentieth-century canon will honor the Company's history of important American premieres: Richard Strauss' *Die Frau ohne Schatten* (1959) and Francis Poulenc's *Dialogues of the Carmelites* (1957). Featuring these works, Shilvock says, "is a way of showing that innovative zeal has always been a part of this Company's DNA." Other past American premieres include Ravel's *L'Enfant et les Sortilège* (1930), Britten's *A Midsummer Night's Dream* (1961), and Janáček's *The Makropulos Case* (1966).

The David Hockney production of the Strauss will be new to San Francisco audiences. Full of ultra-saturated colors and luscious, organic shapes evocative of the opera's theme of fertility, Hockney's designs bring the energy of the "magic fairy tale" librettist Hugo von Hofmannsthal described. Sir Donald Runnicles takes the podium to lead a powerful cast, including sopranos Camila Nylund and Nina Stemme.

The silvery shimmer of Heidi Stober's soprano will resonate with celestial elements of Olivier Py's production of *Dialogues of the Carmelites*, an opera which is historically important to the Company for another reason. In 1957, the role of Madame Lidoine, the new prioress, went to American soprano Leontyne Price. It was her first role with a major opera company, and it was then, backstage, that General Director Kurt Herbert Adler tapped Miss Price on the shoulder and asked a question that would change the opera world forever: "Do you know *Aida*?"

### **TELLING INTIMATE STORIES**

The Centennial Season also includes some new takes on the core repertoire. Pretty Yende brings star power to the title role of director Shawna Lucey's production of *La Traviata*, which will be the first new production of that work since 1987. "Shawna goes deeply into the backstory of characters, exploring why they do what they do," Shilvock says. "We see the Parisian background through floor to ceiling windows. It resonates with the classic look you would expect in a *Traviata*, but it is also intentionally contemporary. Violetta is always on display, always in a fishbowl. It's an example of how characterization drives design. It's something of a theme as we look to new productions."

Directed by Amon Miyamoto, a new *Madame Butterfly* sees events through the eyes of Butterfly's son, now grown and coming to grips with the complicated heritage of his parents' tragic love. Karah Son makes her Company debut in the title role, joined by the Pinkerton of tenor Michael Fabiano and Lucas Meacham as Sharpless.

The costumes for *Butterfly* were the last major work of renowned designer Kenzō Takada, who passed away from

complications of COVID in Paris in 2020. Famous for his love of florals and nuanced reinterpretation of classic Japanese design, Takada spoke of his work on the opera: "I tried to grasp Puccini's narratives while drawing Japanese spirituality as accurately as possible. It should make the audience dream and travel in ecstasy."

Gluck's *Orpheus and Eurydice* is a standout for several reasons. "It's a very different musical language than anything else in the season," Shilvock says of the rarely performed work. "A real contrast to the Strauss sonorities. It's 80 minutes, a focused burst of a very personal story of grief." Among many highly anticipated house debuts this season, perhaps the most eagerly awaited, is the Orpheus of Jakub Józef Orliński, the Polish countertenor and champion breakdancer. (And no, that's not a typo.)


Tchaikovsky's *Eugene Onegin* is the Company's first Russian opera since 2008 and another "gets you right by the heart" story. Evgenia Muraveva makes her American debut here as Tatyana in Robert Carsen's deservedly beloved production, a simple but stunning background for the almost internal monologues that drive dual tales of two ill-fated loves. "No matter how grand opera seems to be," Shilvock says, "they're almost always very intimate stories." Tchaikovsky himself did not call his setting of Pushkin an opera but rather, "intimate scenes." The production also features the house debut of Gordon Bintner in the title role.

### TALENT AND TIMING.

Leontyne Price described two elements as vital for a career: talent and timing. "Being in the right place at the right time. As far as I was concerned," she said, "San Francisco was definitely that." As it has been for many. "Wozzeck proved to




El último sueño de Frida y Diego composer Gabriela Lena Frank.



The American debuts of Birgit Nilsson, Giuseppe Taddei, Sena Jurinac, Renata Tebaldi, Ebe Stignani, Boris Christoff, and far too many other luminaries to name, took place right here. And then there are the "home grown" singers, as Adler called them, who came up through the young artist programs. Carol Vaness. Dolora Zajick. Janis Martin. Not to mention the role debuts. Caballé's first Turandot? Here at San Francisco Opera. The first time Pavarotti sang "Nessun dorma" on an American operatic stage was also here. Nina Stemme's first *Ring* cycle? You guessed it, here.

But perhaps the Company's most historic hire was the recent appointment of the first woman music director of any major American opera company, Eun Sun Kim. "We were looking for a new music director in 2019. It was important to us that we choose someone who had gone through a production process with us. It was pretty early on in *Rusalka* that you felt something very special happening," Shilvock says of her 2019 debut. "Stagehands were coming up to me and saying, 'I really hope it's her.' Everyone felt such total respect from Eun Sun, not just for the orchestra but through the whole theater. She has such a complete understanding of what it takes to make great opera happen." *Tosca*'s Ailyn Pérez described Kim from the singer's perspective. "She has what I feel is a psychic

ability to know what we're going to do," Pérez says, "and to walk us through it."

Another recent hire is the new chorus director, John Keene. "You could see how their musical priorities clicked so symbiotically," Shilvock said of Kim and Keene. In the wake of Sheri Greenawald's retirement, Carrie-Ann Matheson and Markus Beam have taken on the roles of artistic director and general manager of the San Francisco Opera Center, respectively. "The addition of Theresa von Klug as chief operating officer is a reflection of the growing scope of what we're trying to do as a company," Shilvock says. "As we add in new projects in the community, new experiences in the theater, new digital initiatives, we want someone who is intersecting all the different elements of the Company, who can stay in that centralizing space and pull everything together."

### THIS IS YOUR OPERA HOUSE!

Still other changes reflect a more profound shift within the organization. "We have begun to speak internally with much more vulnerability as a company," Shilvock says. "Onstage we expect our singers and our musicians to be very vulnerable, and great art is created from vulnerability. We have been trying to find that vulnerability in all our work. Taking our time to listen and make room for different perspectives."

That work is supported by the now three-year-old Department of Diversity, Equity, and Community. "Coming out of the pandemic, there's an absolute

urgency. We have to open the doors of the Opera House to the whole community and say 'This is your opera house! This is your place to experience these transformational stories of humanity."

### STEPS INTO THE UNKNOWN...

Since its inception the Company has worked to make storytelling contemporary, from projections supertitles inside of the Opera House to live radio broadcasts (as early as the 1932 opening of the War Memorial Opera House), touring productions, Opera in the Park, Opera Center productions in smaller venues, programs in the public schools, and more recently Opera at the Ballpark simulcasts. This season welcomes The *Traviata Encounter*, where the fourth wall will come down, allowing artists and audience to mingle in an immersive experience of the story. Bohème Out of the Box will take opera around the Bay Area in a shipping-containerturned-stage. And perhaps most inventive, the *Instigators* program will bring together bold innovators from outside the world of opera to pioneer new directions for the art form. "These ancillary programs are all the beginnings of experiments," Shilvock says. "We're building what we call the Creative Edge Fund to ensure the funding that allows us to look at this on a multi-vear basis. We have to find that replicability. Just as we've done with the simulcasts over the years. We're taking the steps into the unknown, but we're also thinking how can they develop, and how do they inflect other aspects of our work?"

The centennial is also an opportunity to reflect and be grateful for the astounding and undeniably collective achievement of cast, crew, company, and most importantly, audience. There have been hurdles and crises. A depression. Wars. A major earthquake. That first *Frau* in '59 was fraught with all manner of challenges. Young designer Jean-Pierre Ponnelle was drafted into the French Army, leaving the Company's art department to finish the production. And no fewer than three of the principal singers had to withdraw for various reasons.

Some other Company disaster stories are apocryphal. No, the firing squad did not jump over the parapet in a 1961 *Tosca*. (There was no *Tosca* in '61.) Did an earthquake in 1933 really hurl Lily Pons out of a donkey cart in *Cavalleria*? Again, no. Pons never sang *Cavalleria*, at least not on this stage. Though there were some donkey shenanigans in a 1991 *Suor Angelica*. Night after night, the contrary beast gave those poor nuns a terrible time, and in an otherwise tragic tale, the donkey got the only big laugh of the night. That's why opera can soften even the most cynical heart, because even when it goes wrong, opera is right. To attempt opera is to have hope. To commission another work, to create a new production, or to give a new singer a chance, is to twist the kaleidoscope one more time, and let the magic happen.

Since 2002, when John joined the Opera Board, the couple has underwritten numerous productions and provided exceptional support for many of the Company's innovative endeavors. In September 2008, the Gunns made a historic commitment—believed to be the largest gift ever made by individuals to an American opera company—to help fund the signature projects of General Director David Gockley, including new operas and productions, multimedia projects, and outreach programs, and they have proudly continued that support for General Director Matthew Shilvock. This season, the Gunns' inspired generosity is helping make possible six productions—Tosca, Live and in Concert: The Homecoming, Fidelio, Così fan tutte, Don Giovanni, and Dream of the Red Chamber. The Gunns hope that their support inspires others to give. John comments, "Opera is a dynamic art form, and all of us play a role in keeping it vital. We must expand our repertoire and our audiences and strive for financial flexibility. And we depend on donors to keep opera alive." John is the former

He joined the firm in 1972, the year he received his MBA from Stanford Business School and married Cynthia, who graduated from Stanford with an A.B. in political science in 1970. Early in her career, Cynthia was the editor and director of The Portable Stanford book series for ten years. She edited twenty-eight books by Stanford professors on a vast array of topics, including Economic Policy Beyond the Headlines by George Shultz and Ken Dam. In addition to their support of San Francisco Opera, the Gunns are active members of the community. John is a former Trustee, Chairman of the Advisory Board for the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research, is Vice Chairman of the Board of Stanford Hospital Care, and is a former trustee of Stanford University. Cynthia currently serves as an overseer of Stanford's Hoover Institution and a trustee of the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco and has been a member of the advisory board of Family and Children Services and the board of the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health. Opera lovers are grateful to Cynthia and John and applaud their commitment to keeping San Francisco Opera a leading-edge company.

Jan and Maria have provided significant support for opera artists through the establishment of four major funds. Through the Great Interpreters of Italian Opera Fund, they support many classic works of the Italian repertoire, including this season's Tosca and Don Giovanni. Through the Conductors Fund, appearances of renowned conductors are assured at San Francisco Opera, this season for *Così fan tutte* and *Dream of the Red* Chamber. Through the Emerging Stars Fund, Jan and Maria help bring some of opera's most exciting rising talents to the stage. 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



# **Don Giovanni**

# ACT I

Late at night, Don Giovanni's servant Leporello is keeping watch while his master assaults Donna Anna, the daughter of the Commendatore. The Commendatore rushes to her defense, but Don Giovanni slavs the old man and flees with Leporello. Anna returns with Don Ottavio, her fiancé, and the two swear revenge. In the early morning, Giovanni's jilted lover Donna Elvira is searching for Giovanni. When they meet, Giovanni talks his way out of trouble and escapes, leaving Leporello to explain his master's philandering ways. Around midday, Giovanni and Leporello happen upon the nuptial parade of Masetto and Zerlina. Zerlina excites Giovanni's fancy, but his seduction of her is interrupted by Elvira, who sweeps Zerlina away. Anna and Ottavio arrive, not vet recognizing Giovanni as the Commendatore's murderer. When Elvira interrupts again, Giovanni attempts to pass off her hysterics as madness and leaves to "help" Elvira in her distress. Anna soon realizes that Giovanni is her attacker and calls for vengeance.

Giovanni orders Leporello to prepare a party in honor of Masetto and Zerlina's wedding. He renews his wooing of Zerlina, but her sharp-eyed fiancé intervenes. As Giovanni leads the young couple into the party, Anna, Ottavio, and Elvira arrive wearing disguises and are quickly invited to join the festivities. With the celebration in full swing, Giovanni pulls Zerlina into an adjoining room. She cries for help, and Giovanni tries to make Leporello look like the offending villain. The three guests unmask and believe they have Don Giovanni trapped. However, he once again escapes his accusers.

### ACT II

Later that evening, Don Giovanni soothes a disgruntled Leporello and hatches his latest plot, this one aimed at Elvira's maid, requiring master and servant to exchange clothes. Elvira is lured away by the man she thinks is her beloved, and the real Giovanni is left to serenade the maid. Just then an armed group led by Masetto arrive in search of the fugitive. Giovanni, disguised as Leporello, sends them off in all directions, disarms Masetto, and beats him. Leporello, still disguised as Don Giovanni, is trying to flee when Anna, Ottavio, Masetto, and Zerlina converge upon him. Leporello reveals his identity, confusing everyone, and hides. Zerlina discovers him once everyone has left and threatens immediate retribution for his crimes.

Leporello, proving to be as elusive as his master, narrowly escapes.

Later that night, Giovanni and Leporello have sought refuge in a cemetery. Their conversation is interrupted by a ghostly voice from the statue of the Commendatore. In response to a doomful warning, Giovanni orders Leporello to invite the statue for a pre-dawn supper. The invitation is accepted, and the two leave to prepare. Meanwhile, Ottavio seeks to console Anna, suggesting marriage. Temporarily rejected, he charges Anna with cruelty. Anna protests her love and begs for patience. Giovanni eats supper while a band serenades him with popular tunes of the day. Elvira rushes in and tries to persuade Giovanni to change his ways so she can forgive him. He cruelly taunts her, and she leaves in despair. Moments later, her terrified scream is heard and Leporello rushes back in terror, announcing the arrival of the statue of the Commendatore. The Commendatore asks if Giovanni will dine with him, and the arrogant Giovanni accepts. The Commendatore demands repeatedly that Giovanni repent his behavior, but Giovanni refuses and is dragged to hell.

# **EPILOGUE**

The other characters return searching for Giovanni. Leporello tells them what has happened. They all cite the moral of the opera: This is the evil-doer's end, and sinners will die just as they have lived.

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# A Cautionary Tale and a Fresh Start



o here we are. This is the third and final installment of our trilogy of the Mozart and Da Ponte operas, a journey that has taken many years but now feels like it has rocketed by in a flash. World events in these same few years have also greatly influenced the sensation of time passing for so many of us. 2019 seems like an eternity ago, and, with one unsettling turn of events after another hurtling towards us, we might wonder what year we're living in.

When we charted The Great American House journey, we deliberately stretched our timeline to demonstrate the universality and timelessness of the common themes in these amazing works. The place in this trilogy has stayed the same, but the time frame advances over centuries. The more things change, the more they—and we—remain the same. We didn't set out to be so prescient, and I wish we weren't, but here we are.

The first opera in this arc, *The Marriage of Figaro*, was set in the late eighteenth century—Mozart's period—a time of hope, possibility, and optimism for the characters and their society, as symbolized by the construction of the great manor house. For the second chapter, we set *Così fan tutte* 150 years later, in the late 1930s. The house's new inhabitants, like the structure and the Nation itself, have reached a crossroads after years of growth, struggle, and

upheaval. Their choices inevitably and indelibly transform them and the world.

Now we find ourselves in a time of finality and conclusion, when the consequences of those selfish actions have been visited on this same place, some 150 years later. It is the late 2080s, a not-too-distant and not unlikely future in a now-ruined world, destroyed not by some external force but a natural one, that of human nature at its worst. Greed, desire,

and hunger for power, without regard for the impacts on our fellow human beings, has stolen our future and loosed monsters on the world. And those monsters look like us.

This, then, is a cautionary tale, promising (not just threatening) catastrophe if our private urges are not tempered by empathy for others and a regard for the greater good. More importantly, at the end of it all, the people of this world are offered a chance for renewal. The epilogue of our story offers the characters a fresh start to learn from their losses and rebuild their lives, families, and societies. We can only hope that we, in the real world, get the same chance.

We must take the long view, from the perspective of the great arc of time, in the houses we build as individuals and together as a society. If we do, we might just learn these essential lessons before consequence and calamity claim us. We could have no better teachers than Mozart and Da Ponte.

# Wiener Fassung: The Vienna Version of *Don Giovanni*

hen a conductor is invited to lead a new production of Don Giovanni, the first question is, of course, "Which version?" This deliberation requires close collaboration between the opera house, the director and the conductor. The choice of version has a crucial influence on the entire production.

It is common practice for repertory theaters in Europe to present a dubious mix of two existing versions:

Mozart's original version for Prague (1787) and his Vienna version (1788). The reason for combining elements of these two incarnations of the work is simple: it gives singers the freedom to sing all of their arias from both versions, or even to pick and choose arias for themselves.

The privilege of a new production is that it allows us to ask anew that essential question: What was Mozart's artistic motivation? He knew full well that Prague and Vienna would have different casting possibilities and his practical flair enabled him to adapt his creation accordingly.

Historically, there is absolutely no doubt about the structure of the Prague version. What was presented in Vienna, on the other hand, requires more reflection. There has been much debate among musicologists on this subject, leading to an overall constructive evolution.

For the singers who would perform his opera in Vienna, Mozart composed two new arias and corresponding recitatives. The additions included the two well-known arias: "Dalla sua pace" for Don Ottavio and Donna Elvira's "In quali eccessi ... Mi tradi quell'alma ingrata," a special showcase for the soprano Caterina Cavalieri. Mozart also composed the Act II duet, "Per queste tue manine," for his new Leporello and Zerlina.

Along with additions to the score, the composer also omitted some music from the Prague version. Leporello's aria "Ah pietà, Signore miei" was cut and replaced with the recitative, "Ah pieta ... con passion." Mozart also made changes to the finale where Donna Anna, Donna Elvira, Zerlina, Don Ottavio, Leporello, and Masetto relate their



next steps ("Or che tutti, o mio tesoro"). He crossed out about 60 measures and inserted new music for the text beginning with "Ah certo, è l'ombra" through "Resti dunque quel birbon, con Proserpina e Pluton," which leads us more directly into "Questo è il fin di chi fa mal"—the final pronouncement on the Don: "So do all wrong-doers end." This change to the epilogue is rarely performed in the composite versions of *Don Giovanni*.

These additions, cuts, and changes to the opera had major consequences. For one, the role of Elvira took on considerably more depth, becoming as important as Donna Anna. The comic duet between Zerlina and Leporello was often criticized, but it offers a real glimpse into the future: this duet from Don Giovanni suggests the overture of *Così fan tutte* in the oboe melody and the general tonality of C Major, as well as the repeated coloraturas on the word "così." Was it Mozart's intention to introduce his third work in the Da Ponte trilogy even though Così fan tutte would not have its Viennese premiere until 1790? We do not know. This duet might seem strange in a traditional *Don Giovanni*, but this note of humor underpins what is often forgotten: the opera is subtitled dramma giocoso. It is Don Giovanni's second version-"die Wiener Fassung" or Vienna version—which will be presented here in San Francisco in its historical entirety for the first time.

The fact that Mozart conducted two different versions of *Don Giovanni* for Prague and Vienna within the space of just a few months, offers an important point for the question of whether there are two versions or two different operas. Mozart left no final verdict on which was his preferred version or what was the "true" *Don Giovanni*—had he conducted it in London or Paris, there might be even more versions. What we have are two masterpieces by a genius at the peak of his creative powers, and we will perform it in the form that the Viennese public heard in 1788. To be honest—and just between us—do we really have to decide which one is the best one?



# Listen to Her: Hearing the Women in Mozart's Don Giovanni

"Cause everything old is new again." This clever catchphrase from Peter Allen's 1974 song neatly sums up the paradoxical magic of Western classical opera as a staged art form. Scan the latest season offerings from opera houses around the world and you will find that most titles premiered at least a century ago. Yet these same operas—when fully realized in live performance—demand current, or at minimum, fresh perspectives. From its origins in the seventeenth century, opera has always been about more than the musical score. Opera is *drama*: visual, textual, and aural. And so, every staged production of a long-familiar opera creates an opportunity for discovery.

Such re-visioning is especially urgent with *Don Giovanni* which, right up to present day, has had a difficult time shaking a critical orthodoxy dating back to the nineteenth century: namely, that the title character is heroic or at least sympathetic. There is a significant ethical issue today in lionizing a man who will say or do anything to make a sexual conquest for an audience that has witnessed the #MeToo movement and the subsequent indictment of many powerful men. There is also plenty of evidence against a heroic view of Don Giovanni in the work itself. The reception history of Don Giovanni-including critical and scholarly commentary as well as productions-has largely ignored or explained away what is right there on the page: three female characters of very different character and situation, accusing the Don of deception and abuse. Even more striking, Donna Anna, Donna Elvira, and Zerlina listen to—and defend one another against a man of rank, a surprisingly rare

occurrence in *opera buffa* and, frankly, in opera generally.\* The women's joint resistance to Don Giovanni drives the narrative of the opera, forcing the nobleman into a defensive position and thwarting the aims of his libidinous entitlement.

Collectively, the three women characters claim the lion's share of the opera's musical gems; in comparison, Don Giovanni's musical numbers (apart from "Là ci darem la mano") are unremarkable. And in terms of the opera's large-scale tonal planning, the primary musical key of this opera—the key of D, both major and minor modes, as introduced in the overture—belongs not to the libertine or even to the supernatural agent of his demise, the Commendatore's statue come to life. Instead, the key of D really belongs to Donna Anna. Don Giovanni briefly invokes D minor in his final words to the Commendatore— "Stay, if you want to die"—but Donna Anna fully embraces the key in a duet with her betrothed, Don Ottavio. Fainting at the sight of her father's bloody corpse, Donna Anna revives with traumatized, D-minor despair ("Fuggi, crudele," or "Flee, cruel one"). Don Ottavio tries to shift her to a more tranquil harmonic area, but Donna Anna is fixed on that fatal key, making her fiancé promise to avenge her father. In the duet that follows, the two lovers lament the horrible weight of this vow, their joint exclamations ringing with the power of a later Mozart work in D minor—the Requiem or more specifically the "Dies irae" ("Day of wrath, day of judgement").

When Donna Anna later recognizes Don Giovanni's voice as that of her assailant and her father's killer, she urges Don Ottavio not to weaken his resolve, even though the guilty party is one of their own: a man of rank. In the aria "Or sai chi l'onore" (which cost Mozart an unusual amount of revision), Donna Anna demands—in clarion, alla breve D major—that the man who tried to assault ("rapire") her and killed her father be brought to justice. Taken together, the vengeance duet and "Or sai chi l'onore" connect compellingly to the music and events of the opera's finale: Don Giovanni's descent into hell (D minor) and the ensemble moral that follows (D major): "This is how the perfidious life, the one who harms others, ends."

The competing claims of grief, retribution, and love that overwhelm Donna Anna also shape the character of Donna Elvira. Abandoned by Don Giovanni, she is frequently made an object of derision. Don Giovanni and Leporello undercut her entrance aria with sardonic irony; a little later, Leporello addresses the infamous Catalogue Aria to Donna Elvira, confirming her humiliating status as one of thousands of women he has seduced. (There is even chromatic insinuation in Leporello's comment to Elvira that the Don's favorite is the "young beginner.") Vacillating between forgiving Don Giovanni and reviling him, Donna Elvira is nevertheless the character that most actively opposes him, risking her own dignity to inveigh against him publicly, so that other women will not suffer her fate. From this perspective, Donna Elvira's most dramatically riveting number is not a solo aria but the Act I quartet, "Non ti fidar, o misera." Not only does this quartet demonstrate Mozart's masterful control of multiple points of view and characterization within a single musical number, but it helps to establish Donna Elvira's credibility. She first speaks directly to Donna Anna, "Do not trust him, poor woman, that rebellious heart; he has already betrayed me and will deceive you as well." Don Giovanni offers Donna Anna and Don Ottavio an all-tooconventional defense: la povera ragazza è pazza ("The poor girl is *crazy*"). But the noble couple have a very different impression. Observing Donna Elvira, they note her "noble bearing" and "sweet majesty." Donna Anna is

especially doubtful, "There is nothing in her face, her speech that suggests that madness."

Ultimately, Donna Elvira's tender nature and devotion to the idea of her first love makes it difficult for her to hold a hard line. In this sense, she recalls Countess Almaviva in *The Marriage of Figaro*, with whom she shares a musical signature: Mozart bestows on both women a musical language rooted in "flat" keys and softened by the mellow timbre of the clarinet. Donna Anna's music, in contrast, mostly uses opera seria orchestration with flute and oboe; notably, the aria "Non mi dir," in which Donna Anna assures Don Ottavio of her love, features clarinet. Likewise, the music of the country peasant Zerlina—including the duet with Don Giovanni, "Là ci darem la mano"—forgoes the clarinet except for her final aria, "Vedrai, carino," a far more sincere effort than the earlier "Batti, batti" to win back her begrudging betrothed, Masetto.

Zerlina presents a unique dramatic position vis-à-vis Don Giovanni as the girl who first says yes, then emphatically removes consent. As a peasant, she is automatically subject to his power of rank; in fact, Don Giovanni first appeals to Zerlina as a noble gentleman who can "change her life" through marriage. Donna Elvira forcefully interrupts this first seduction attempt, but Don Giovanni does not give up. Spying Zerlina at the ball he is hosting (the end of Act 1), the libertine ushers her forcefully to a more secluded space offstage. Soon we hear her screams for help. She calls Don Giovanni

scellerato—villain—the same word Donna Anna used to curse the masked man who accosted her in the opera's opening scene.

Caught in the act of trying to rape Zerlina, Don Giovanni nevertheless manages to escape punishment, hiding as always behind status, wealth, charisma, and—most of all—lies. Respecting nothing but his own will and appetites, the libertine even mocks the Commendatore's statue, glibly inviting the man he murdered to dinner. In the end, a patriarchal "divine intervention" finally brings Don Giovanni to judgement: one man of rank coming back from the dead to settle accounts with another man of rank.

Which leaves us to wonder: was killing the Commendatore the only real crime committed? What about that list Leporello keeps: all those women, all those "young beginners"? What about Zerlina's and Donna Anna's screams for help? When we listen closely to the words and music of the women in Don Giovanni, we find that the Don is not a dashing rake but the criminal predator of the opera's original title: Il dissolute punito. Seeing him, the "punished dissolute," through the eyes of Donna Anna, Donna Elvira, and Zerlina, we experience this old story—and Mozart's enduring opera—in a new light.

his new production of *Don* Giovanni marks the culmination of the Mozart-Da Ponte Trilogy, San Francisco Opera's multi-year project to present all three operas by Mozart and poet Lorenzo Da Ponte as a unified narrative. In the unique conception by Michael Cavanagh, these three masterpieces share the same setting—an American manor house—at three distinct points across 300 years of history. The story progresses from the founding of the United States in the late eighteenth century (The Marriage of Figaro), to the late 1930s when the characters and the house are at a crossroads (*Così fan tutte*), and arrives at a dystopic vet not improbable future in the 2080s when the house and societv are in ruins (Don Giovanni).

Before the curtain rises on the climactic chapter of this vast theatrical journey, witness the spirit of invention, teamwork, and connection that course through these operatic worlds thanks to the artisans and craftspeople of San Francisco Opera.

# Murderer, Seducer, Liar: Why do we need Don Giovanni?

"The character of Don Juan has exercised the imagination of poets of all countries for at least the last three centuries, clear proof of the fact that the problems raised by the figure ... go to the very heart of human existence," wrote musicologist Hermann Abert. "The world of Don Juan is simply that of the senses, an extreme affirmation of the life force that recognizes no other values than its own." And Mozart's Don Giovanni himself, says Abert, "is the heroic embodiment of the most unbridled life force."

With *Don Giovanni*, Mozart and Da Ponte created an opera that has fascinated Western civilization for over 200 years. It has inspired some people, infuriated others, and baffled not a few, but always it has been one of the hallmarks of our society, one of those supreme works of art that define us. And that begs a rather serious question: Why? What does it say about our society that one of its pinnacles of achievement has at its center a man who is a murderer, a seducer, a liar, a man who seems to go out of his way to break the laws and mores that hold that society together? Why are we so fascinated by him?

A clue can be found in the preface to George Bernard Shaw's play *Man and Superman*, when he comments that what "attracts and impresses" us is "the heroism of daring to be the enemy of God ... Philosophically, Don Juan is a man who, though gifted enough to be exceptionally capable of distinguishing between good and evil, follows his own instinct without regard to the common statute, or canon law." But this still begs the question: Why? Why does such an apparently destructive character strike such a deep chord in our collective psyche?

Sören Kierkegaard brings us close to the answer when he explains that Don Giovanni is "... a seducer from the ground up. His love is not physical but sensuous, and sensuous love, in accordance with its concept, is not faithful, but absolutely faithless; it loves not one but all." Don Giovanni says as much to Leporello in Act II: "Love is much the same in any form. He who remains faithful to one is being cruel to the others. I, who have an overabundance of sentiment, love them all." Mozart deftly depicts this "love them all" aspect in the Don's music in Act II, by having him sing the same melody to seduce Donna Elvira ("Discendi, o gioa bella") and, immediately after that, her maid ("Deh vieni alla finestra").

Kierkegaard was right when he explains that Don Giovanni "is actually neither Idea nor Individual; he hovers between both." The score says he's "a young nobleman," but he is not really a part of the other aristocrats' world something Mozart's music makes very plain. Donna Anna, Don Ottavio, and Donna Elvira all have arias that are often rather formal and heavily embellished, as befits their higher status. Don Giovanni does not. He has three arias; two are short, much shorter than the aristocrats' arias: the famous Champagne Aria, a breathless explosion of energy with an almost primitively simple melody and a relentless rhythm; and his equally famous Serenade, "Deh vieni alla fenestra," which is described in the score as a Canzonetta, (a light strophic song, often sung at night). It's a typical wooing song which might be sung by any swain underneath the window of his lady love—exactly as Don Giovanni is doing in Act II. It is immediately followed by an aria in which Don Giovanni impersonates his servant

Leporello and is, musically speaking, the man to a T. So the Don's music sets him apart from the other characters we would assume to be his equals.

And when we think about the way all the characters both aristocrats and peasants—interact, it immediately becomes clear that everyone revolves around Don Giovanni. Despite the fact they have been hurt by him, they cannot let him go. Our interest in them is because of their relationship to him. Mozart illustrates this brilliantly in the Epilogue when he wrote music that is as close as the mature Mozart ever came to writing trite music. In 1900, the well-respected critic Henry Krehbiel commented, "This finale was long ago discarded, and though Mozart set it to music, he did so in a manner which tells more plainly than the situation that it is an anti-climax, that the opera reached its end with the death of its hero." But that is precisely the point of the Epilogue to vividly show that without the magnetic Don Giovanni there is nothing but the mundane. Without him, the characters have deflated, shrunk to the commonplace.

What has gone is the effervescent life force that animated the opera up to that final Epilogue, the quality that has sometimes led to Don Giovanni being called a Dionysian character. For the ancient Greeks, Dionysus was a fertility god (life) and a god of wine; he liberated the emotions and was the source of ecstasy and joy. The Romans debased him into Bacchus, the god of drunkenness (which was not part of Dionysus' cult), and Christianity pushed him even further away by turning him into the Devil, complete with horns, tail, and the cloven hooves of a goat, one of the forms Dionysus sometimes took.

Today, of course, we are much too sophisticated to believe in the ancient Greek Gods who sat on Mount Olympus. But in a curious, profound way they often continue to affect our lives, even though we deny it. "We think we can congratulate ourselves on having already reached such a pinnacle of clarity, imagining that we have left all these phantasmal gods far behind," wrote Carl Jung. "But what we have left behind are only verbal spectres, not the psychic facts that were responsible for the birth of the gods ... Today they are called phobias, obsessions, and so forth; in a word, neurotic symptoms. The gods have become diseases."

In his intriguing book *Ecstasy, Understanding the Psychology of Joy*, Robert A. Johnson notes, "Dionysus is a complex figure who symbolizes the irrational world of our senses as it interacts with the rational world of rules and limitations ... To worship Dionysus is to worship the life force ... Dionysus is the perennial profusion of color and life and energy. When we touch Dionysus we touch the irrational wisdom of the senses and experience joy."

We hunger to experience this ecstatic joy but Western society is very uncomfortable with the whole idea. Touching this potent energy means surrendering control—not something we are encouraged to do, even when it is surrendering to the divine. So what happens when this basic human instinct runs into the rigid cultural restrictions? We have turned Dionysus into addictive behavior. It is no accident that for a while one of the most widely used party drugs was called "ecstasy." Unfortunately, our (usually unconscious) attempts to experience Dionysus' divine energy too often results in destructive behavior. But while we cannot control Dionysus, we can have a conscious relationship with him. "We must touch Dionysus," Johnson urges, "we must bring him back into our lives in a humanized form, or in denying him we will destroy ourselves."

Is it any wonder that Mozart and Da Ponte's *Don Giovanni* occupies such an iconic place in our culture? Hermann Abert describes the Don in his final scene as not a mere man but "a demonic passion spurred on to ever greater heights by every act of resistance it encounters." The ritual of encountering Dionysus by experiencing Mozart's opera—either in the theater with a community of like-minded people or in the privacy of one's home—is a safe way for us to begin to touch a bit of his presence. And in doing so we can begin the process of transformation to a richer, fuller, more joyful life, to be all we can be.

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# **Making Traditions**

n April, the San Francisco International Film Festival screened Jon Else's new documentary, Land of Gold, about our 2017 world premiere of John Adams and Peter Sellars' Girls of the Golden West. The film is a fascinating glimpse into our opera company at work and the multitude of creative talents that go into creating live opera on the stage.

This year, we are unveiling four new productions and a brand-new opera. We have gone from the isolation of the pandemic to a

thrilling profusion of creativity! As we prepare to raise the curtain on new conceptions of *Don Giovanni*, *Antony and Cleopatra*, *Orpheus and Eurydice*, and *La Traviata*, I am in awe of the creativity of this company operating in hyperdrive. It is an inspiring reminder that we are a company of makers: that we take the raw materials of notes, words, gesture, wood, metal, fabric and light and fashion them into unique moments of artistic expression.

I love seeing archival photos of the Company at work. These images reinforce that our artistry is the continuation of traditions built over decades. There are so few companies operating at the scale we do in America, and we have a huge responsibility to ensure that these theatrical traditions are maintained—scenic building, orchestral performance practice, costume creation, prompting, and stage combat just to name a few. The Opera House is a community of exceptionally talented individuals whose artistry and crafts build off those who have come before and will inspire those who come after.

The technology of opera production is always evolving, but the basic tenets of how we bring a stage to life are still very much the same. Our work in the theater today has a lineage extending back through the last 100 years of the Company. We are continually guided by those traditions. In navigating the pandemic, it was imperative that we sustain company members and artists, not only because it was the right thing to do, but because our company members carry the

institutional DNA that makes us the Company we are.

We are currently building our new production of *La Traviata*—our first new *Traviata* in 35 years. The original designs called for an aluminum frame, but a complete global shortage of aluminum during the pandemic made that impossible. Our scene shop artisans drew on their deep theatrical experience and switched to a traditional wooden construction, using age-old techniques to graft together 16' lengths of pine to create the necessary 32' lengths.

Whether evidenced in the traditions of the scene shop, ornamentation of a *bel canto* aria, making costumes durable for alterations, or creating a sunrise through lighting effects, our Company is one of the great holders of theatrical tradition in the world. As we prepare to celebrate our Centennial, we honor those before us who built up our theatrical tradition. And we commit to carrying that tradition forward, building and inflecting it to meet the possibilities of the future.
