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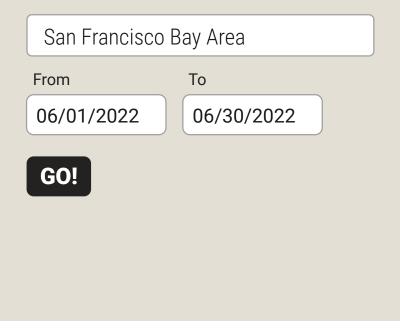
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# IN SONG: MEIGUI ZHANG RELEASED JUNE 7

San Francisco Opera's video series, In Song, a recent 2022 Webby People's Voice-winner, continues this month with a new episode, *In Song: Meigui ‰hang.* The fast-rising soprano reflects on her journey far from Chengdu, China, where she grew up on the grounds of a music conservatory, raised by singer-teacher parents. Prior to her San Francisco Opera debut this month as Dai Yu in *Dream of the Red Chamber* (June 14–July 3), she performs a traditional Kazakh folk song and French art song.

Shot on location in cities ranging from Nashville and New York City to Auckland and Cairo, each *In Song* episode explores, through story and song, the diverse cultural traditions that inform the personal and musical journey of notable artists from the world of opera. The series has featured soprano Amina Edris, mezzosopranos Jamie Barton (with banjo virtuoso Béla Fleck) and J'Nai Bridges, and tenors Arturo Chacón-Cruz and Pene Pati.

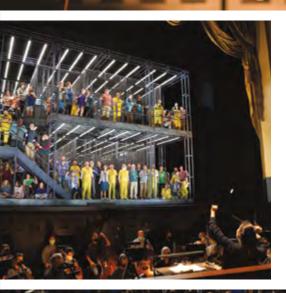

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# Another 100 Seasons

# CELEBRATES THE PAST AND LOOKS TO THE FUTURE

### A BIG BOLD SEASON

Someday people will look back and say, "remember the pandemic, when we all sat in our cars and watched the opera, so separate, and yet so together? Wasn't that something?"

While our own waistlines expanded with pandemic pounds, arts organizations slimmed down, busily adapting to meet the unprecedented challenge. Even so, San Francisco Opera's General Director Matthew Shilvock, the staff, and the Company kept their eye on the ball. Calendar pages were turning. The centennial year was coming, ready or not. Well, the moment has arrived. This fall, the Company joins only two other American companies (the Metropolitan Opera and the Cincinnati Opera) to have reached the centennial milestone. The 100th season will feature a jubilant array of new works, new productions, and stars worthy of the name. The centennial logo is a burst of kaleidoscopic color. "It's a big, bold budget and it's a big, bold season," Shilvock says. "We can't be anything but bold at the moment."

### INNOVATIVE ZEAL IS IN OUR DNA

The season is bookended by new commissions of Bay Area composers. John Adams' *Antony and Cleopatra* kicks things off with stars Gerald Finley and Amina Edris originating the title roles. "It's a story of intense love," Shilvock says, "almost *Who's-Afraid-of-Virginia-Woolf*-esque." The season closer, *El último sueño de Frida y Diego*, is a mystical take on the immortal love story of artists Frida Kahlo and Diego Rivera by acclaimed Berkeley-born composer Gabriela Lena Frank. Adding yet more local depth to the story, tempest-tossed lovers Kahlo and Rivera divorced in 1940 and remarried one another that same year in San Francisco City Hall.

Two jewels of the twentieth-century canon will honor the Company's history of important American premieres: Richard Strauss' *Die Frau ohne Schatten* (1959) and Francis Poulenc's *Dialogues of the Carmelites* (1957). Featuring these works, Shilvock says, "is a way of showing that innovative zeal has always been a part of this Company's DNA." Other past American premieres include Ravel's *L'Enfant et les Sortilège* (1930), Britten's *A Midsummer Night's Dream* (1961), and Janáček's *The Makropulos Case* (1966).

The David Hockney production of the Strauss will be new to San Francisco audiences. Full of ultra-saturated colors and luscious, organic shapes evocative of the opera's theme of fertility, Hockney's designs bring the energy of the "magic fairy tale" librettist Hugo von Hofmannsthal described. Sir Donald Runnicles takes the podium to lead a powerful cast, including sopranos Camila Nylund and Nina Stemme.

Among many highly anticipated house debuts this season, perhaps the most eagerly awaited, is the Orpheus of Jakub Józef Orliński, the Polish countertenor and champion breakdancer. (And no, that's not a typo.)

Evgenia Muraveva makes her American debut here as Tatyana in Robert Carsen's deservedly beloved production, a simple but stunning background for the almost internal monologues that drive dual tales of two ill-fated loves. "No matter how grand opera seems to be," Shilvock says, "they're almost always very intimate stories." Tchaikovsky himself did not call his setting of Pushkin an opera but rather. "intimate scenes." The production also features the house debut of Gordon Bintner in the title role.

#### TALENT AND TIMING.

Leontvne Price described two elements as vital for a career: talent and timing. "Being in the right place at the right time. As far as I was concerned," she said, "San Francisco was definitely that." As it has been for many. "Wozzeck proved to

# **TELLING INTIMATE STORIES**

The Centennial Season also includes some new takes on the core repertoire. Pretty Yende brings star power to the title role of director Shawna Lucey's production of *La Traviata*, which will be the first new production of that work since 1987. "Shawna goes deeply into the backstory of characters, exploring why they do what they do," Shilvock says. "We see the Parisian background through floor to ceiling windows. It resonates with the classic look you would expect in a *Traviata*, but it is also intentionally contemporary. Violetta is always on display, always in a fishbowl. It's an example of how characterization drives design. It's something of a theme as we look to new productions."

Directed by Amon Miyamoto, a new Madame Butterfly sees events through the eyes of Butterfly's son, now grown and coming to grips with the complicated heritage of his parents' tragic love. Karah Son makes her Company debut in the title role, joined by the Pinkerton of tenor Michael Fabiano and Lucas Meacham as Sharpless.

The costumes for *Butterfly* were the last major work of renowned designer Kenzō Takada, who passed away from

be a perfect choice for my reentry into the American operatic orbit," Marilyn Horne said of an invitation from San Francisco that brought her back to the States from Germany in 1961 and ignited a blockbuster career.

The American debuts of Birgit Nilsson, Giuseppe Taddei, Sena Jurinac, Renata Tebaldi, Ebe Stignani, Boris Christoff, and far too many other luminaries to name, took place right here. And then there are the "home grown" singers, as Adler called them, who came up through the young artist programs. Carol Vaness. Dolora Zajick. Janis Martin. Not to mention the role debuts. Caballé's first Turandot? Here at San Francisco Opera. The first time Pavarotti sang "Nessun dorma" on an American operatic stage was also here. Nina Stemme's first *Ring* cycle? You guessed it, here.

But perhaps the Company's most historic hire was the recent appointment of the first woman music director of any major American opera company, Eun Sun Kim. "We were looking for a new music director in 2019. It was important to us that we choose someone who had gone through a production process with us. It was pretty early on in *Rusalka* that you felt something very special happening," Shilvock says of her 2019 debut. "Stagehands were coming up to me and saying, 'I really hope it's her.' Everyone felt such total respect from Eun Sun, not just for the orchestra but through the whole theater. She has such a complete understanding of what it takes to make great opera happen." *Tosca*'s Ailyn Pérez described Kim from the singer's perspective. "She has what I feel is a psychic

ability to know what we're going to do," Pérez says, "and to walk us through it."

Another recent hire is the new chorus director, John Keene. "You could see how their musical priorities clicked so symbiotically," Shilvock said of Kim and Keene. In the wake of Sheri Greenawald's retirement, Carrie-Ann Matheson and Markus Beam have taken on the roles of artistic director and general manager of the San Francisco Opera Center, respectively. "The addition of Theresa von Klug as chief operating officer is a reflection of the growing scope of what we're trying to do as a company," Shilvock says. "As we add in new projects in the community, new experiences in the theater, new digital initiatives, we want someone who is intersecting all the different elements of the Company, who can stay in that centralizing space and pull everything together."

# THIS IS YOUR OPERA HOUSE!

Still other changes reflect a more profound shift within the organization. "We have begun to speak internally with much more vulnerability as a company," Shilvock says. "Onstage we expect our singers and our musicians to be very vulnerable, and great art is created from vulnerability. We have been trying to find that vulnerability in all our work. Taking our time to listen and make room for different perspectives."

That work is supported by the now three-year-old Department of Diversity, Equity, and Community. "Coming out of the pandemic, there's an absolute

urgency. We have to open the doors of the Opera House to the whole community and say 'This is your opera house! This is your place to experience these transformational stories of humanity."

### **STEPS INTO THE UNKNOWN...**

Since its inception the Company has worked to make storytelling contemporary, from projections and supertitles inside of the Opera House to live radio broadcasts (as early as the 1932 opening of the War Memorial Opera House), touring productions, Opera in the Park, Opera Center productions in smaller venues, programs in the public schools, and more recently Opera at the Ballpark simulcasts. This season welcomes The *Traviata Encounter*, where the fourth wall will come down, allowing artists and audience to mingle in an immersive experience of the story. Bohème Out of the Box will take opera around the Bay Area in a shipping-containerturned-stage. And perhaps most inventive, the *Instigators* program will bring together bold innovators from outside the world of opera to pioneer new directions for the art form. "These ancillary programs are all the beginnings of experiments," Shilvock says. "We're building what we call the Creative Edge Fund to ensure the funding that allows us to look at this on a multi-year basis. We have to find that replicability. Just as we've done with the simulcasts over the years. We're taking the steps into the unknown, but we're also thinking how can they develop, and how do they inflect other aspects of our work?"

The centennial is also an opportunity to reflect and be grateful for the astounding and undeniably collective achievement of cast, crew, company, and most importantly, audience. There have been hurdles and crises. A depression. Wars. A major earthquake. That first *Frau* in '59 was fraught with all manner of challenges. Young designer Jean-Pierre Ponnelle was drafted into the French Army, leaving the Company's art department to finish the production. And no fewer than three of the principal singers had to withdraw for various reasons.

Some other Company disaster stories are apocryphal. No, the firing squad did not jump over the parapet in a 1961 *Tosca*. (There was no *Tosca* in '61.) Did an earthquake in 1933 really hurl Lily Pons out of a donkey cart in *Cavalleria*? Again, no. Pons never sang *Cavalleria*, at least not on this stage. Though there were some donkey shenanigans in a 1991 *Suor Angelica*. Night after night, the contrary beast gave those poor nuns a terrible time, and in an otherwise tragic tale, the donkey got the only big laugh of the night. That's why opera can soften even the most cynical heart, because even when it goes wrong, opera is right. To attempt opera is to have hope. To commission another work, to create a new production, or to give a new singer a chance, is to twist the kaleidoscope one more time, and let the magic happen.

In September 2008, the Gunns made a historic commitment-believed to be the largest gift ever made by individuals to an American opera company-to help fund the signature projects of General Director David Gockley, including new operas and productions, multimedia projects, and outreach programs, and they have proudly continued that support for General Director Matthew Shilvock. This season, the Gunns' inspired generosity is helping make possible six productions-Tosca, Live and in Concert: The Homecoming, Fidelio, Così fan tutte, Don *Giovanni*, and *Dream of the Red Chamber*. The Gunns hope that their support inspires others to give. John comments, "Opera is a dynamic art form, and all of us play a role in keeping it vital. We must expand our repertoire and our audiences and strive for financial flexibility. And we depend on donors to keep opera alive." John is the former

chairman and CEO of Dodge & Cox Investment Managers. He joined the firm in 1972, the year he received his MBA from Stanford Business School and married Cynthia, who graduated from Stanford with an A.B. in political science in 1970. Early in her career, Cynthia was the editor and director of The Portable Stanford book series for ten years. She edited twenty-eight books by Stanford professors on a vast array of topics, including *Economic Policy Beyond the* Headlines by George Shultz and Ken Dam. In addition to their support of San Francisco Opera, the Gunns are active members of the community. John is a former Trustee, Chairman of the Advisory Board for the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research, is Vice Chairman of the Board of Stanford Hospital Care, and is a former trustee of Stanford University. Cynthia currently serves as an overseer of Stanford's Hoover Institution and a trustee of the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco and has been a member of the advisory board of Family and Children Services and the board of the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health. Opera lovers are grateful to Cynthia and John and applaud their commitment to keeping San Francisco Opera a leading-edge company.

#### Joan Traitel/Great Singers Fund

"Without great singers, opera is not all it could be," says San Francisco Opera board member Joan Traitel. "That's why my late husband and I approached then-General Director David Gockley with the idea of creating a special way of supporting singers exclusively." The result was the Great Singers Fund, launched by the Traitels in 2008 to provide San Francisco Opera with enhanced support to attract the world's best singers. Joan, a member of the Opera's board of directors since 1998, and her late husband, David, were production sponsors for several years before founding the Great Singers Fund. "The Fund makes a difference in the quality of opera in San Francisco," Joan explains. " I am

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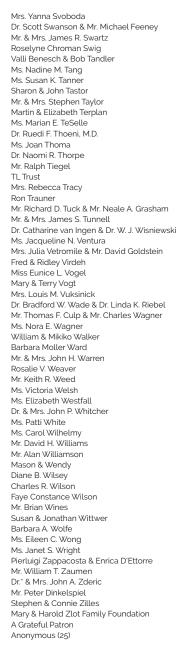

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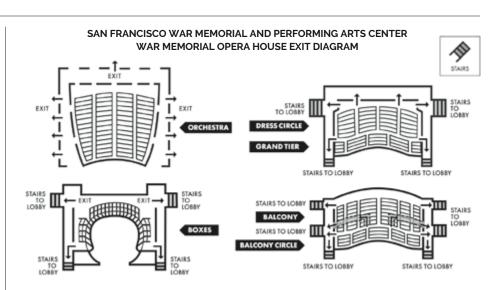
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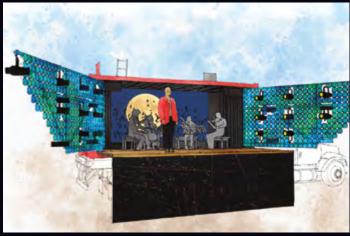

# **Dream of the Red Chamber**

# PROLOGUE

**Monk's Room** / **Ruins** / **A mythical place.** Beggars drift through the ruins of a once-great home as a monk appears. He needs to tell the world an extraordinary story: a stone, left behind from the construction of Heaven, nurtured a crimson pearl flower with its dew for 3,000 years. Together, Stone and Flower seek to fulfill their love by living as mortals on Earth. The Monk tries to dissuade them from such a course. But Stone and Flower disobey, traveling through a magic mirror to Earth.

# ACT I

**SCENE 1**: The Grand Hall. Flower becomes Dai Yu, a brilliant but sickly young woman whose mother has just died. She arrives in the home of one of the Dynasty's most prestigious old families, the Jia clan. Granny Jia, Dai Yu's grandmother, loved Dai Yu's late mother, but Lady Wang, Granny Jia's daughter-in-law, takes an immediate dislike to the newcomer.

Stone becomes the Jias' sole male heir: Bao Yu, Lady Wang's son, a spoiled youth born with a piece of jade in his mouth. When introduced, Bao Yu and Dai Yu feel they have met before. Envoys from the Emperor announce the promotion of Bao Yu's elder sister to the coveted rank of Princess. For generations, the Jias have owed a huge debt to the Imperial Court, but Princess Jia's promotion suggests that the Emperor might be willing to make peace with his long-time rivals.

**SCENE 2**: **Dai Yu's chamber.** Later that night, Bao Yu hears Dai Yu playing the qin (a stringed instrument). They begin to write poems together; her skill is superior. They resolve to transform the world with music.

**SCENE 3**: **Pear Court Pavilion.** The seasons change as time passes. To counter Dai Yu's influence, Lady Wang brings her niece, the beautiful Bao Chai from the wealthy Xue clan, into their home. Bao Chai's mother, Aunt Xue, seeks entrée to high society, while Aunt Xue's sister Lady Wang seeks the Xues' money to repay the Imperial debt; they hope to make a match. Though Bao Chai is perfect in so many ways, Bao Yu is disgusted by her practicality. Granny, on the other hand, hopes her grandson will marry Dai Yu.

**SCENE 4: Bao Yu's chamber.** Bao Yu has an erotic dream in which both women appear. Though attracted to Bao Chai, he feels Dai Yu is his soulmate.

**SCENE 5**: The Grand Hall. Princess Jia arrives home for a visit. She tells Lady Wang that the palace is filled with

enemies, and she fears she cannot keep her position. The Emperor wants Bao Yu to marry Bao Chai, and the Princess gives them both the same gift to symbolize this wish. This delights Lady Wang, upsets Granny, and throws Dai Yu into despair. But Bao Yu resolves their love will triumph.

# ACT II

**SCENE 1**: **Bamboo grove.** Dai Yu's health continues to decline. On the bank of her favorite lake, she buries the falling peach blossom petals. Overhearing her, Bao Yu is profoundly moved. She teases him about the Princess' wish for him to marry Bao Chai and storms off. But she overhears Bao Yu declaring that he remains devoted to her.

Bao Chai enters and encourages Bao Yu to submit his name for a high post. He rebukes her. Humiliated, she resolves to take action.

**SCENE 2: Princess Jia's quarters at the palace** / **Granny's chamber.** Princess Jia writes a desperate letter to her family informing them that she has lost the power struggle and will be dead by the time they read this. There is only one way for the Jias to save themselves. Granny Jia falls ill. She declares that she wants her grandson to marry Dai Yu. A eunuch arrives, bearing the letter from the Princess. Granny Jia dies, sending the clan into mourning.

**SCENE 3**: A hall in the estate. Now head of the clan, Lady Wang orders her son to carry out the Emperor's wishes and marry Bao Chai. This is the only way to pay back the Imperial debt. She has sent Dai Yu away to the other side of the lake. Bao Yu is defiant.

**SCENE 4**: Far side of the lake / Bamboo grove. Dai Yu burns the poems she and Bao Yu wrote. But Bao Yu makes a stand for love and tells Lady Wang he will become a monk. Defeated, Lady Wang agrees to let Bao Yu marry Dai Yu.

**SCENE 5: The Grand Hall.** At the wedding, Bao Yu exchanges vows with the veiled Dai Yu. Once they are married, Bao Yu discovers he has actually married Bao Chai, tricked by Aunt Xue and Lady Wang! Suddenly, Imperial soldiers storm in to confiscate the property of the Jia and Xue clans. The Emperor only encouraged this marriage so that when he arrested the Jias, he could also seize the Xue fortune. The soldiers sack and burn the estate.

**SCENE 6:** Monk's Room / Lake / Ruins. We realize that the Monk is Bao Yu's older self, writing his own life story. After the wedding, Dai Yu slowly walks into the lake, where she disappears. The Jia family has become beggars, wandering through the illusion known as life.

寶釵欲勸寶玉謀取仕官職位,寶玉責斥她,說自己心中愛慕的只有黛玉。黛玉走得不遠,聽到他們對話。寶釵再次感到委屈。她 下定決心,必須把握機會。

第二場:鳳藻宮 / 賈母廂院 元妃寫下家書:她深知已失聖眷,性命不能久保。要挽救賈府的劫難,只剩下一個方法。

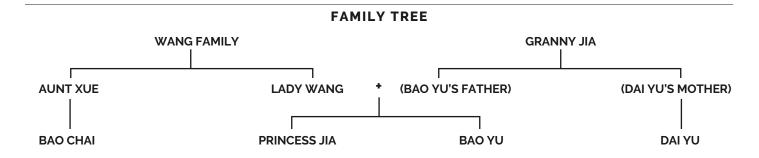
賈母病危,說出她心中的遺願是要寶、黛為配。太監送上元妃家書;絕望中賈母不支身亡,家族準備喪葬。

#### DIRECTOR'S NOTE BY STAN LAI

ream of the Red Chamber is the most revered novel in Chinese literature for a reason. I can't think of any other work that comes close in terms of length, complexity, depth, passion, characters, story arc, and beauty of language. When I first learned that David Henry Hwang and Bright Sheng were working on an opera based on the novel, I could not help but ask "How?" To consider transforming such a panoramic depiction of Chinese life, death, and relations into a two-and-a-halfhour opera, to present the story in all its broad strokes and fine lines to a contemporary Western audience, to reveal all the fascinating and wildly diverse characters in all their multi-faceted subtleties, within the complexities of their relationships, was a daunting thought indeed.

How surprised was I when I got the first draft of the libretto and saw that most of the characters had been cut! What? To retain only seven of around 40 major characters

was equivalent to perhaps keeping only Hamlet, Ophelia, and Laertes in an operatic *Hamlet*—keeping in mind that *Dream* is 20 times longer. I came to realize what a brilliant decision this was. A literal rendition faithful to all the characters and storylines would be to me adaptation suicide. By concentrating on the bare nucleus of the *dramatis personae*, in particular the Bao Yu-Dai Yu-Bao Chai love triangle, we are afforded the opportunity to let all other things-political, social, cultural, and philosophical-seep through to create an operatic work that is expansive yet intimate, sensible and accessible to a contemporary audience.

As director, I contemplated at length what my main objectives would be. To me, Dream of the Red Chamber is an encyclopedia of aristocratic life in the Qing Dynasty, and within the details of such living lies the grand sophistication of the Chinese people, which includes an intricate net of social behavior and relationships. The key to opening the visual essence of this opera would be to depict the sophisticated lifestyle itself, in all its detail, to make it a medium that displays the quintessence of Chinese life and thought.

Permeating the novel and this opera are the Buddhist and Daoist themes of impermanence and karma. How to enhance these subtle and abstract concepts that advance through the opera's progression became another of my concerns, which led to the floating quality of all the costumes and the translucent and unstable quality of the Grand Garden.

Over the years, I usually direct my own work as playwright, so whatever conflicts arise between writer and director are reconciled internally. Working with David and Bright posed potential occupational hazards, for we are all strong-minded and proudly assured of ourselves in our own ways. The process turned out to be a joy, filled with mutual respect and admiration. We discussed together the particular staging of key dramatic moments and any proposed libretto and musical changes. Our relationship was such that I was even emboldened to request that Bright add music in certain places in order to give me more time to build a meaningful theatrical image or transition. We certainly had our share of differences but none that could not be reconciled through mutual understanding.

The "dream" of the Red Chamber, to me, is its impermanence, the fleeting transient quality of the very real loves and passions in the garden. As if waking from a dream, Dai Yu and Bao Yu see the reality of their lives, which inherently is dream-like, unreal, ephemeral, colored by the interplay of lushness and sparsity, and the myriad shades of translucence. Deep gratitude to the San Francisco Opera for bringing us together to create this luminous work.

## Dream Journey: To China and Back Again

ix months after its world premiere in San Francisco in September 2016, *Dream of the Red Chamber* traveled to the Hong Kong Arts Festival. In another six months, the production made history when it became the first American opera to tour China, with initial performances at Beijing's Poly Theatre before launching the opening of Changsha's new Meixihu International Culture and Arts Centre Grand Theatre and finally ending its run at the Qintai Grand Theatre in Wuhan.

This month, composer Bright Sheng and librettist David Henry Hwang's operatic retelling of author Cao Xueqin's Qing Dynasty epic is set to make history again, with its international cast and a pan-Asian creative team (including director Stan Lai and Oscar-winning designer Tim Yip), marking the first of San Francisco Opera's many commissioned works to be revived at the War Memorial Opera House.

As San Francisco audiences prepare to revisit this acclaimed production, we spoke with several people who witnessed firsthand the opera's landmark tour of China: music critic Li Cheng, whose early writings about the opera in the *Beijing Morning Post* paved the way for good notices around the country; the Beijing-based impresario Wray Armstrong, founder of Armstrong Music & Arts, who was instrumental in bringing the production to China; and Karen Chia-ling Ho, the soprano and former Merola artist who made her San Francisco Opera debut as Princess Jia and remains the only performer to appear in this production on each step of its journey, from the world premiere through the China tour and back to San Francisco in 2022.

#### *Dream of the Red Chamber* is a story most Chinese people know (and have an opinion about). How well did you know it beforehand, and how did that color your opinion of the opera?

Li Cheng: I first read the novel in junior high school, during the final years of the Cultural Revolution, when the government allowed it for [restricted] publication again and my family had access. As a teenager I didn't have much patience for the poetry or the metaphors, but I later found them more interesting. Now I don't have so much time to read, but the story stays with me.

**Wray Armstrong:** I knew almost nothing, except that it was terribly famous. Only after I heard about the project did I start getting into it properly—and it was very intimidating! We had been confident in the performances and production but were concerned about some details of the adaptation, and that the story was going to be performed in English. I'm not sure when the exact "eureka" moment came to push ahead, but at the San Francisco premiere my Chief Operations Officer Evita Zhang and I noticed an incredible excitement. Nothing I'd seen in China by contemporary composers rang so strongly with what I knew about Chinese history, but I really think it was the opening night party that convinced us. The buzz was extraordinary, with a strong sense of pride from the Chinese folks there.

**Karen Chia-ling Ho:** I first read a small part of the story in my high school literature class in Taipei. I was a little scared of this role, actually. I know it's not that big in the opera, but being a princess is a very big deal for the Jia family. Preparing for the role, I tried to read the whole book, but I gave up after about 10 pages and started watching the TV versions, which actually helped shape my stage presentation. Our choreographer Fang-Yi Sheu [in 2016] also helped in making my role look big since my normal personality is not like that.

After San Francisco, the opera went on to Hong Kong and then three cities in China. How did different audiences respond? Did word-of-mouth and internet chatter match with your experience?

**WA:** There was always a sense of wonder everywhere we took it. I don't know Hong Kong audiences so well, but they seemed slightly cooler. On opening night in Beijing, and particularly in the smaller cities, audiences were generally warm. I asked a number of people if they were upset that it wasn't in Chinese, and they thought it was great, first of all, that Americans did this show, and second, that Chinese audiences got to see the show as the Americans saw it.

**LC:** I only saw the opera in Beijing, where the audience response was polarized. Many in the cultural elite didn't like the libretto, because as you say, every Chinese person has their own ideas. I was in the camp that liked the opera. I might not have agreed with some of the smaller details, but the way the story develops through hidden clues was detailed and well-crafted.

**KH:** Audiences in China were more serious about the story. I'd read comments online like, "How could you turn such a long book into two-and-a-half hours?" But others were more optimistic, like "This great Chinese work has been set loose in the world!" The audiences there were

quite different. In one performance outside of Beijing, the cast got distracted because some audience members were eating and drinking during the performance.

San Francisco Opera's appearance in China, coproduced by the Poly Group and Armstrong Music and Art, was a landmark experience on many levels. What was it like from your perspective?

LC: The last time an American opera company came to China was more than 10 years ago, when Opera Boston brought Zhou Long's *Madame White Snake* to the Beijing Music Festival. But that production was nowhere near the scale of *Dream of the Red Chamber* and traveling only to one city isn't actually a tour. I don't know how much planning is involved in touring abroad, but seeing the results made me appreciate how difficult it is.

**WA:** The experience was, shall we say, nail-biting. Most of the things we present come prepackaged and pre-rehearsed, and the complications come in advance. *Dream* had an endless list of details, from fundraising to shipping costumes and sets by sea, with many additional challenges once we got to China. Our initial shock was that our plans with the Central Opera House fell through, so we suddenly had no chorus, orchestra, or rehearsal space, with about a month to reassemble the forces. We ended up hiring two different orchestras and an additional

conductor. We heard five or six local choirs, and while they were all excited and willing, no one could commit to learning a complete contemporary opera in just two weeks. We finally found a fabulous Ukrainian chorus from Dnipro that arrived practically off-book at the first rehearsal. Going to China's second-tier cities was particularly exciting. Wuhan had presented a number of big projects but never a full opera production from a Western company, and we were the first major project at Zaha Hadid's Culture and Arts Centre in Changsha. They had to finish building a new road just to load us in.

**KH:** I haven't been "on tour" since I was in a children's choir. We'd performed in the U.S., New Zealand, Japan, but we were young and never thought of it as work. For *Dream*, we were away for an intense one-and-a-half months, moving to different cities every four or five days, with very little rehearsal time with different orchestras or stage crews. That was the tough part. On the other hand, we got to see China and feel its history, and we all got very close—not only the cast but also many of the chorus singers. Most of chorus didn't speak English, but they tried their best to communicate with us. Music was our common language.

#### What did you take away from this experience?

**LC:** I've forgotten many details, but I clearly remember the final ensemble, which is the most complicated finale

ever written by a Chinese composer and impressive even among European operas. For decades now, any ensembles in Chinese operas are short, and not even the Chinese composers living abroad or those still in China heavily influenced by Western music have written anything close.

**WA:** One key reason for our success was having a fearless COO. So many things could've gone wrong, and Evita just never let go. Largely because of COVID, we haven't done anything on this scale since. But thanks to delivering *Dream* we were able to create the music-theatre-dance piece *Magical Night at the Art Museum* with San Francisco Ballet Principal Dancer Yuan Yuan Tan, which we toured in nearly 20 Chinese cities. We only had seven musicians, not a symphony orchestra, and our show wasn't "operatic" in scale, but we did create and produce the costumes from

scratch. And thanks to *Dream*, we knew that experienced wigmakers and makeup people are essential.

**KH:** The tour taught me, first, never expect too much beforehand, and second, always be ready to react quickly. We had two different singers playing Bao Yu, and because our second Bao Yu didn't get much rehearsal time he would sometimes forget his entrances. We learned to be aware of everything around us at all times and always help each other out.

# **Prisoners of Cao Xueqin**

or much of the 18th century, *Dream of the Red Chamber (Honglou meng)* circulated in manuscript form among a limited circle. But by the 1790s, as the first printed editions appeared, the novel began to ensnare an ever-increasing number of readers, some of whom resorted to fisticuffs when it came to the allimportant question of which of the two heroines, Dai Yu or Bao Chai, was favored by the author.

Within only a few years of the earliest printed editions, readers began to write sequels to the work, one of which resorted not only to having the author, Cao Xueqin, become one of its characters but also to make him recant his original version in favor of a more "accurate" one. However, despite having written his own name into the novel's first chapter (albeit as editor rather than author) Cao was forgotten for most of the 19th century. Not until well into the 20th century, as information about Cao and his family (including the earliest commentaries, written by his friends and relatives) was rediscovered and re-evaluated, did the majority of Chinese readers realize that Cao was the author, his fame and influence coming to rival that of Shakespeare. Today, Cao's novel has inspired a whole discipline of study, "Redology" (Hongxue), with a sub-discipline, Cao-ology (Caoxue), devoted to the study of Cao himself.

It is too early, perhaps, to tell whether the United States will become similarly enamored with the novel. Two complete English translations have been available for decades (under the respective titles *Dream of Red Mansions* and *The Story of the Stone*), but so far only the lucky Western academics who teach the novel regularly (among whom I count myself) come close to the satiety of Chinese readers who return to the novel annually. Although there have been attempts in English to recount the novel in a single evening (including a certain adaptation for Western opera ... ), we are still very far indeed from the onslaught of countless adaptations that the Chinese have enjoyed (some might say suffered) for many decades.



For one thing, the novel itself exists in a vast array of Chinese versions, many including commentary instructing the reader how to approach the novel (to become, in essence, an informed reader the first time around). Commentary editions became less common in the 20th century as the Chinese realized this was not the way Westerners published and read fiction. As the commentary tradition was re-evaluated (claimed as uniquely Chinese by the late 20th century), important literary figures, such as former Minister of Culture Wang Meng, began to publish their own commentary editions. Modern versions contain copious annotation, and the range of reading aids and reference works available for Chinese readers include an almost 1,500-page "dictionary" (only slightly shorter than a standard, lightly annotated edition of the novel) with summary information on nearly all of the novel's "sequels" (more than 50 are listed).

In addition, the story has been adapted for a wide range of performance genres, traditional as well as modern. The earliest TV miniseries adaptation (in 36 hour-long episodes) appeared in 1987; a longer one premiered in 2010 (50 episodes). Other miniseries have



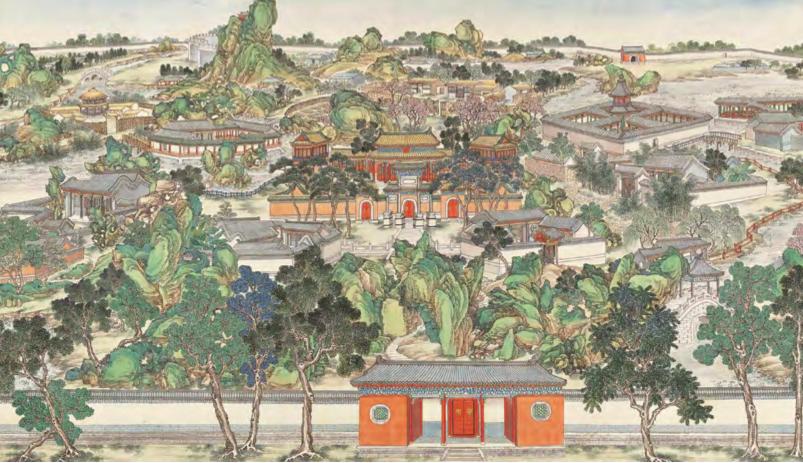

been distinguished either by their emphasis (one focusing only on the maids ran for 21 episodes; another centered around Dai Yu had more than 35) or how the story is told (from a nine-episode series where all the characters are played by little children to a 30-episode version told in Yueju, a Chinese-opera form indigenous to Shanghai). During filming for the first and last of these miniseries (in Beijing and Shanghai, respectively), *Red Chamber* theme parks were constructed and continue to host tourists.

Cao Xueqin himself and his writing of the novel was also the subject of a 30-episode TV miniseries, despite the fact that we know very little about his life (his family fell precipitously from wealth and favor when their household was raided and confiscated on imperial orders). Although some of these miniseries are available online, the quality of the English subtitles is generally not good.

Great novels are worth fighting over. There are a number of reasons why so many Chinese have had such strong and conflicting opinions. One is the fact that although Cao Xueqin has been at the center of most everyone's understanding of the novel, we do not have a complete and final version that we can be sure is completely his. Whereas the early manuscripts in 80 chapters can be assumed to be his, even they cannot be said to represent a final, completed

version of those chapters. We know that Cao wrote more, but those additional chapters have not survived. The publishers of the first printed editions claimed that the last 40 chapters of their 120-chapter versions were based on manuscripts by the original author (whom they do not try to identify), but those chapters are so often at odds with many clear hints in the commentary and original manuscripts about how the novel should end that the publishers' claims are difficult to believe. Big debates in those chapters still concern what Cao Xueqin might have written, what he couldn't possibly have written, and even how he wanted the novel to end. And to complicate matters further, we are pretty sure that Cao recycled parts of an earlier draft into at least the first 80 chapters without completely changing the material to match the new style. We are left, then, with a famous and beloved novel that has at least three parts, each with its own tone, none clearly labeled or completely distinct from the other parts. Far from turning Chinese readers off, however, this complexity seems to have made the novel all the more endearing.

The other underlying reason why the novel is so contentious is that the portions that seem most to represent Cao's style and conception eschew the traditional allknowing and omniscient narrator of most Chinese novels. Here he tends not to spell out in any straightforward way his own view of the more important (and more complex) characters, which forces the reader to rely on subtle clues. This is intensified in the case of some characters, such as Bao Chai, about whom the author never shows his hand. Typically in this genre, readers are impelled to look past the characters' surface presentation to find evidence of their hypocrisy. Despite clear evidence in the text and commentary that Bao Chai and Dai Yu were not seen as antagonists by Cao but rather as aspects of a composite ideal woman, the majority of readers have been suspicious of Bao Chai's motives for being so "good."

Adapters, like translators, are typically confronted with linguistic and time constraints that make it impossible for them to realize all the different levels of the original. This is certainly the case with *Dream of the Red Chamber*, where debates continue over what the "original" is or should be. We should not expect any adaptation or translation to be perfect, only that the effort is creative and honest in representing as many aspects of the original as possible. Why should only Chinese readers be the prisoners of Cao Xueqin?

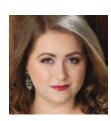

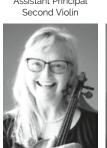

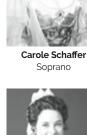

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### **Making Traditions**

**n** April, the San Francisco International Film Festival screened Jon Else's new documentary, *Land of Gold*, about our 2017 world premiere of John Adams and Peter Sellars' *Girls of the Golden West*. The film is a fascinating glimpse into our opera company at work and the multitude of creative talents that go into creating live opera on the stage.

This year, we are unveiling four new productions and a brand-new opera. We have gone from the isolation of the pandemic to a

thrilling profusion of creativity! As we prepare to raise the curtain on new conceptions of *Don Giovanni*, *Antony and Cleopatra*, *Orpheus and Eurydice*, and *La Traviata*, I am in awe of the creativity of this company operating in hyperdrive. It is an inspiring reminder that we are a company of makers: that we take the raw materials of notes, words, gesture, wood, metal, fabric and light and fashion them into unique moments of artistic expression.

I love seeing archival photos of the Company at work. These images reinforce that our artistry is the continuation of traditions built over decades. There are so few companies operating at the scale we do in America, and we have a huge responsibility to ensure that these theatrical traditions are maintained—scenic building, orchestral performance practice, costume creation, prompting, and stage combat just to name a few. The Opera House is a community of exceptionally talented individuals whose artistry and crafts build off those who have come before and will inspire those who come after.



KRISTEN LOKEN

The technology of opera production is always evolving, but the basic tenets of how we bring a stage to life are still very much the same. Our work in the theater today has a lineage extending back through the last 100 years of the Company. We are continually guided by those traditions. In navigating the pandemic, it was imperative that we sustain company members and artists, not only because it was the right thing to do, but because our company members carry the

institutional DNA that makes us the Company we are.

We are currently building our new production of *La Traviata*—our first new *Traviata* in 35 years. The original designs called for an aluminum frame, but a complete global shortage of aluminum during the pandemic made that impossible. Our scene shop artisans drew on their deep theatrical experience and switched to a traditional wooden construction, using age-old techniques to graft together 16' lengths of pine to create the necessary 32' lengths.

Whether evidenced in the traditions of the scene shop, ornamentation of a *bel canto* aria, making costumes durable for alterations, or creating a sunrise through lighting effects, our Company is one of the great holders of theatrical tradition in the world. As we prepare to celebrate our Centennial, we honor those before us who built up our theatrical tradition. And we commit to carrying that tradition forward, building and inflecting it to meet the possibilities of the future.
