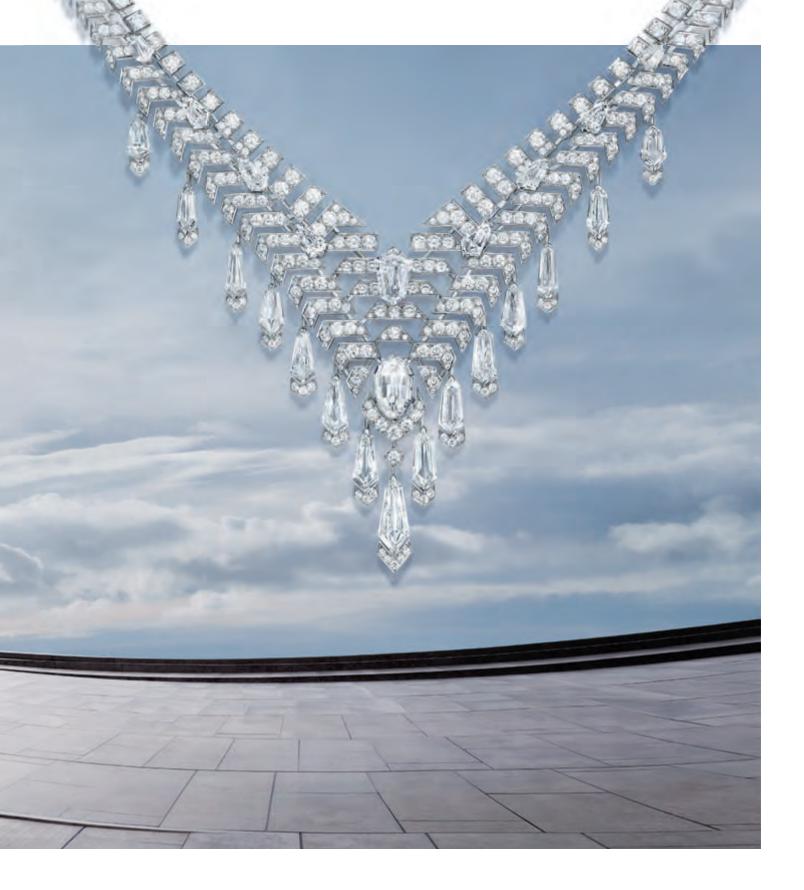

La Bohème

MUSIC BY GIACOMO PUCCINI

Structure: 4 acts, with one intermission after Act II

Running time: 2 hours, 15 minutes

Language: Sung in Italian with English supertitles

Key Characters:

- · Rodolfo, a poet who lives in a Parisian garret
- · Mimi, a seamstress who has just moved into the building
- · Marcello, a painter and Rodolfo's roommate
- · Musetta, Marcello's on-and-off-again lover

La Bohème, Puccini's 1896 masterpiece about love and loss among a group of bohemian artists who are struggling to make

ends meet in 19th-century Paris, is probably the most frequently performed opera in history. Its poignant drama and surging melodies encompass a microcosm of human emotions, from the intoxication of young love to jealousy to the pain of loss that comes far too early.

Did you know? San Francisco Opera founder Gaetano Merola had a particular fondness for *La Bohème*. Not only did he conduct it for the inaugural opening night of his new Company in 1923, Merola claimed that as a young conservatory student in Naples he heard the opera more than 30 times during its premiere season in Italy.

Idomeneo

MUSIC BY WOLFGANG AMADEUS MOZART

Structure: 3 acts, with two intermissions

Running time: 3 hours, 30 minutes

Language: Sung in Italian with English supertitles

Key Characters:

- · Idomeneo, King of Crete
- · Idamante, Idomeneo's son, in love with Ilia
- · Ilia, a Trojan princess captured by the Greeks
- Elettra, a Greek princess who loves Idamante

Four years before he began his trio of operas with poet Lorenzo Da Ponte (*The Marriage of Figaro, Don Giovanni*, and *Così fan tutte*), Mozart's *Idomeneo* revealed that the young prodigy had become

an artist (though still only 25) of singular originality, insight, and communicative ability. The opera centers around a fateful oath made by a king who must then face an impossible choice between duty to his kingdom and love for his own son. Australian director Lindy Hume's production updates the story from its roots in Homeric legend and enhances the dramatic tension with imagery of the surging seas and craggy coastlines of Tasmania.

Listen for: In Idomeneo's Act II aria "Fuor del mar" ("Out of the sea") the king expresses his inner turmoil at being pursued by a cruel fate. For this pivotal scene, Mozart composed a bravura showpiece for the tenor who must exhibit urgency, technical finesse, dynamic and vocal range, introspection, and dramatic power.



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WELCOME FROM THE BOARD OF SAN FRANCISCO OPERA

Welcome to summer at San Francisco Opera! We're delighted you're here with us for another year of extraordinary artistic experiences that bring the community together in moments of sublime beauty and impact.

Puccini's *La Bohème* is one of the most enduring operas ever written. In fact, it was the very first opera performed by San Francisco Opera on September 26, 1923, being a favorite of our founder Gaetano Merola. When the opera premiered in Italy in 1896, the teenaged Merola heard it performed numerous times and had a good understanding of Puccini's intent for the piece. It is fitting that it launched his new company and has appeared in no fewer than 46 seasons since. It never ceases to tug at our heartstrings with its story of young love thwarted far too soon.

Talking of youth, Mozart's *Idomeneo* represents the work of a 25-year-old composer throwing off the mantle of "child prodigy" and establishing himself as a major voice in Europe. It is a work full of propulsive energy, powerful choruses, and deeply psychological character portrayals. We're so excited for Eun Sun Kim's interpretation of *Idomeneo*, a work rarely seen here. In fact, this is just the fifth time the Company has staged the work since 1977, although it features prominently in our history. It was the opera due to be performed the day of the Loma Prieta earthquake in 1989. The Company rallied to keep playing while the city recovered, and just three days after the earthquake *Otello*, *Aida*, and *Idomeneo* were being performed at the Masonic Auditorium.

We're delighted to welcome you to our Pride Concert on June 27 as we celebrate our LGBTQIA+ community with a very special evening of music, immersive projections, and a post-show dance party. Featuring beloved San Francisco Opera artists Jamie Barton, Brian Mulligan, and Nikola Prinz, emceed by Monét X Change, and with the San Francisco Opera Orchestra conducted by Eun Sun Kim and Robert Mollicone, this promises to be a very special evening.

Thank you for making San Francisco Opera a part of your plans this summer. We are preparing exciting things for the fall and hope that you will come back and experience many more transcendent moments in the theater.

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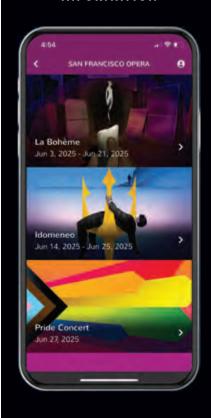

nce again, the unprecedented generosity of Cynthia and John Gunn has set the stage for a dazzling season at San Francisco Opera. Since 2002, when John joined the Opera Board, the couple has underwritten numerous productions and provided exceptional support for many of the Company's innovative endeavors. In September 2008, the Gunns made a historic commitment—believed to be the largest gift ever made by individuals to an American opera company—to help fund the signature projects of then General Director David Gockley, including new operas and productions, multimedia projects, and outreach programs, and they have proudly continued that support for General Director Matthew Shilvock. This season, the Gunns' inspired generosity is helping make possible four productions—Un Ballo in Maschera, The Handmaid's Tale, Tristan and Isolde, and La Bohème—and the Beethoven 9 Concert. John comments, "Opera is a dynamic art form, and all of us play a role in keeping it a meaningful part of our social fabric. Early in her career, Cynthia was the editor and director of *The Portable Stanford* book series for 10 years. She edited 28 books by Stanford professors on a vast array of topics, including *Economic Policy Beyond the Headlines* by George Shultz and Ken Dam.

In addition to their support of San Francisco Opera, the Gunns are active members of the community. John is a former trustee of Stanford University and is Chairman Emeritus of the Advisory Board for the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research. Cynthia currently serves as a trustee of the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco, is a former overseer of Stanford's Hoover Institution, and has been a member of the advisory board of Family and Children Services and the board of the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health. John served as Chair of San Francisco Opera's Board of Directors for 16 years and recently became Chair Emeritus in 2024. He continues to serve on its Executive Committee. Opera lovers are grateful to Cynthia and John, and applaud their commitment to keeping San Francisco Opera a leading-edge company.

ouise Gund is an accomplished theater producer with a wide range of artistic talents. She has produced 12 Broadway plays and musicals, winning a Tony Award and Drama Desk Award for All the Way, and receiving three additional Tony Award nominations. A subscriber to San Francisco Opera since 2010, Louise has served on the Opera's Board of Directors since 2013. She has also served on the boards of the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Cal Performances, Earthjustice, and the Berkeley Community Chorus and Orchestra. In addition to her major support of these organizations, she is an environmental activist and a staunch advocate on behalf of women's and children's issues. She was awarded the San Francisco Opera Spirit of the Opera Award in 2019 for devoted service to the Company and was the inspiration behind the Opera's Producers Circle.

Jan Shrem & Maria Manetti Shrem

an and Maria both developed a love for opera at a young age, despite growing up half a world apart. Jan Shrem, following a successful career in publishing across Japan and Europe, went on to establish Clos Pegase Winery in California's Napa Valley, where he cultivated a world-class collection of modern and contemporary art. Maria Manetti Shrem built an international legacy in fashion entrepreneurship, playing a key role in bringing Gucci and Fendi into U.S. department and specialty stores. Together, they have dedicated their focus and generosity to philanthropy, supporting education, the performing and visual arts, and medical causes.

Though their journeys took them across the globe, their shared passion eventually led them to San Francisco Opera—and to each other. As dedicated Company Sponsors for over a decade, Jan and Maria established four generous funds:

- The Conductors Fund: Ensuring the continued presence of esteemed conductors on the podium.
- The Great Interpreters of Italian Opera Fund: Supporting performances by today's most compelling artists in the Italian repertoire.
- The Emerging Stars Fund: Showcasing promising young talents on the San Francisco Opera stage throughout the season.

 The Luminaries Concert Fund: Bringing legendary artists to the stage for special events and performances.

In December 2022, Maria was honored with The Spirit of the Opera award in recognition of her unwavering dedication to San Francisco Opera, her leadership in advancing its success, and her commitment to the art form. In 2023, she received the prestigious UC Davis Medal, an honorary degree, for her profound impact on the arts and her dedication to fostering education and exploration.

Maria made history in April 2024 by establishing eight endowed funds in perpetuity at the UC Davis College of Letters and Science—the most significant gift in its history. In January 2025, her transformative philanthropy inaugurated the Maria Manetti Shrem Art District / Arts Renaissance. Her generosity will benefit over 35,000 students annually, supporting top faculty, emerging talents, and world-renowned artists.

Through her visionary leadership, Maria continues to shape the cultural landscape and enrich lives worldwide.

In September 2024, we mourned the peaceful passing of Jan Shrem at 94, who was honored with a memorial short film at the Manetti Shrem Museum in January 2025. We celebrate his extraordinary legacy and stand in deep sympathy with Maria during this time of loss.

Jerome & Thao Dodson (Production Sponsor, La Bohéme)

"A fiery horse with the speed of light, a cloud of dust, and a hearty, 'Hi-Yo, Silver!'" Those words, accompanied by the galloping excitement of Rossini's William Tell Overture, transfixed a young Jerry Dodson as he listened to *The Lone Ranger* on the family radio in Oak Park, Illinois. Just as Bugs Bunny's *Rabbit of Seville* had done for many, a lighthearted entertainment sparked a future operatic devotion.

That little boy grew up to attend Berkeley in the '60s, serve with the American Embassy in Vietnam where he and Thao met, and attend Harvard Business School. Eventually, the couple married, settled in the Bay Area, and raised a family. In the 1980s, Jerry was a pioneer in the field of socially responsible investing with little interest in opera. But in 1992, when San Francisco Opera decided to celebrate Rossini's

bicentennial with the rarely performed *Guillaume Tell*, Thao, already an opera lover, suggested to Jerry that they go.

Tell was praised for its striking Mansouri production, and the Dodsons began attending regularly. They became season ticket holders in 1999 and supporters, "in a small way," as Jerry puts it. A friendship with David Gockley, which endures to this day, led to a larger role as Company Sponsors. "I so admired what he did for the Opera, but it was not very good for my pocketbook," Jerry laughs. Jerry also lends his financial expertise to the audit committee.

In 2016, Dodson considered the import of Gockley's departure. He met with Matthew Shilvock and joined the Board that year. "We hit it off right away!" Jerry says. He felt a similar affinity with Keith Geeslin, then President of the San Francisco Opera Association. Eager to continue support, the Dodsons see this as a perfect time to revitalize and energize the Company within the San Francisco community. The initial fire ignited by *William Tell* continues to burn brightly.



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Bertie Bialek Elliott (Production Sponsor, La Bohème)

Roberta "Bertie" Bialek Elliott has a long history of volunteerism and philanthropic support, especially in the Bay Area and at her alma mater, Northwestern University in Chicago. Mrs. Elliott was born in Omaha, Nebraska, and graduated from Northwestern in 1954 with a degree in history and Phil Beta Kappa honors. In 1963, she and her then husband moved to Carmel, California, to raise their family. She was an early investor in Berkshire Hathaway, founded by her brother, legendary investor Warren Buffett. She and her three daughters established the Berkshire Foundation in 1996 and have supported many organizations and institutions through it. Mrs. Elliott has had a relationship with San Francisco Opera for more than 20 years. She is a big fan of John Adams. She sponsored *Anthony and Cleopatra* in 2022, *Girls of the Golden West* in 2017, and was a

commissioning sponsor of *Doctor Atomic* in 2005. She has served on the boards of the Monterey Bay Aquarium, Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Monterey County Symphony Association, Carmel Bach Festival, and Community Foundation for Monterey County.

For more than 30 years, Dianne and Tad Taube have been catalysts for growth and innovation at San Francisco Opera. Libby and Burgess Jamieson have made an extraordinarily sustaining commitment to San Francisco Opera since 1985, providing steadfast support for traditional classical productions. Their generosity ensured that celebrated and memorable works such as *Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg, Il Trittico, La Bohème, Madame Butterfly, Turandot, Tosca, La Traviata*, and *Lohengrin* found a lasting presence on the War Memorial stage. Burgess' vision and commitment to support the arts will inspire generations of music lovers for years to come.

Anne Popkin

"Opera reminds us of our shared humanity," remarks Anne Popkin. "Through love, heartbreak, conflict, and forgiveness, opera reflects the entire emotional spectrum of life. And one gets to share that experience with others in the audience. Like the arts generally, we must embrace this, especially in challenging times."

Anne's philanthropy centers on education, the arts, medicine, and the environment. On moving to the Bay Area in 2011, she quickly became involved with San Francisco Opera. In 2014 she joined the Opera's Board, and in 2016 she made a significant gift to the Opera's Endowment to create programs focused on expanding new audiences. Named for her father, who first introduced her to opera, the Jordan Joseph Popkin Opera Outreach Fund is dedicated to her mission.

"The Fund reflects two priorities," Anne notes. "It enables people from all walks of life to know and fall in love with opera. And it enables the Opera to create annual and longer-term programs to address audience expansion using income the gift generates every year."

Anne's inspired leadership is expanding San Francisco Opera's goal to develop new audiences and augment future programming. She is clear about her purpose. "Opera is for everyone. Here, we create exceptional art," she reflects. "This is our guiding star. But we also have another mission: to bring the experience of opera to the broader Bay Area and its residents, to people who may not otherwise find themselves at the Opera. Donating to our Endowment is one way for me to further that mission."

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COAT CHECK

Check your coat at the north and south ends of the Main Lobby. For the safety and comfort of our audience, please check large bags at coat check.

Overlooking the magnificent main lobby, North Box Restaurant offers California cuisine with global influences and is an ideal destination for pre-performance and intermission dining.

PRE-ORDER!

Avoid lines during intermission by pre-ordering beverages and snacks with a food and beverage server upon your arrival at any point of service.

SAN FRANCISCO OPERA SHOP

Take home a memento! Located in the South Mezzanine lobby, the Opera Shop sells branded merchandise, jewelry, books, and gift items. The Shop is open 90 minutes before performances, at intermissions, and afterward. All proceeds benefit San Francisco Opera.

ALL ARE WELCOME. HELP US MAKE SURE EVERYONE HAS A WONDERFUL EXPERIENCE!

- Turn off all electronic devices during the performance, including digital watches and cell phones. We ask this out of respect for the artists and everyone in the theater enjoying a live, in-the-moment experience.

- Enjoy food and drinks, purchased onsite pre-show and during intermission, before entering the theater. You may bring purchased drinks into the theater, but please be mindful of your fellow patrons.

OPERA GLASSES

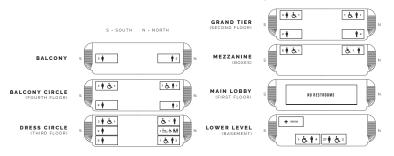
See the action up close and rent a pair of opera glasses for \$5 at the North Lobby coat check. ID deposit is requested. Credit card only.

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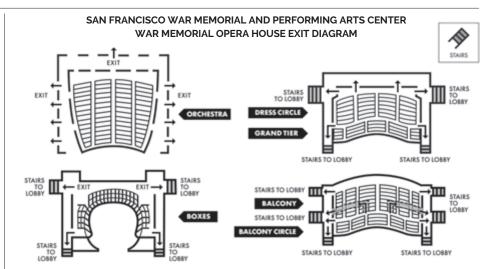

La Bohème

ACT I

It is Christmas Eve in Paris. Two poverty-stricken young artists, Marcello, a painter, and Rodolfo, a poet, attempt to work in their freezing garret. In desperation, they burn one of Rodolfo's dramas to keep warm. Their two roommates, Colline, a philosopher, and Schaunard, a musician, return home. Even though Schaunard has brought food, the four bohemians decide to eat their Christmas dinner in the Latin Ouarter. Just then, Benoit, their landlord, arrives to demand his overdue rent. The men ply him with drink and, when he boasts of marital indiscretions, they feign moral indignation and throw him out. Marcello, Colline, and Schaunard leave for the Latin Quarter. Rodolfo, always the loner, promises to join them after finishing some work, but a knock on the door interrupts him. Mimì, a young neighbor, enters in search of a light for her candle. Clearly ill and breathless from the stairs, she faints and drops her room key. Rodolfo is entranced by her and manages to detain her by concealing the key. Either by accident or design, both their candles go out. As they search in the darkness for the lost key, their hands touch. They are instantly attracted and joyfully declare their love before leaving to ioin Rodolfo's friends.

ACT II

A festive crowd celebrates Christmas Eve in the Latin Quarter. At the Café Momus, Rodolfo introduces Mimì to his roommates. Their carefree mood changes when Musetta, Marcello's former lover, appears with Alcindoro, her aging suitor. Musetta, still in love with Marcello, attempts to attract his attention. He starts by deliberately ignoring her but cannot resist her obvious play for him. Musetta shrewdly gets rid of the besotted Alcindoro and leaves him to foot the entire bill as she and her bohemian friends escape through the crowd.

ACT III

Early one snowy February morning, Mimì seeks out Marcello, who is painting a mural at a tavern near the city gates. Mimì tells Marcello that she and Rodolfo have separated because of his jealousy. As Marcello tries to comfort her, Rodolfo appears, also seeking Marcello's advice. Mimì conceals herself and overhears their conversation. Rodolfo tells Marcello he is leaving Mimì

because of her flirtations with other men. Marcello is skeptical and forces Rodolfo to admit the truth: Mimì is mortally ill, and Rodolfo is consumed by feelings of guilt and remorse, knowing that the harsh conditions of their life together have endangered her health. Mimì's cough gives her away, and Rodolfo realizes she has overheard everything. Overwhelmed by her plight, Rodolfo promises to stay with Mimì until the spring. Marcello and Musetta argue viciously and separate.

ACT IV

Rodolfo and Marcello, now separated from Mimì and Musetta, respectively, are working in their garret. Schaunard and Colline arrive with supper, and the four fool around, imagining they are attending a fancy ball. Suddenly, Musetta enters with Mimì, now close to death and desperate to be with Rodolfo. Marcello and Musetta leave to summon a doctor and buy Mimì a muff to warm her hands. Colline also departs to sell his beloved overcoat. Left alone for a few moments, Mimì and Rodolfo remember their happier times together.

The others return. But before the doctor can arrive, Mimì dies.

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Episode in the Life of an Artist

LA BOHÈME RECAPTURES A WRITER'S YOUTH

ne minute. That is how long it took me to fall in love with *La Bohème*, and I suspect others, millions of them, have succumbed just as quickly, starting with the Turin audience that evening in 1896 when the curtain first rose on the bohemians' garret and Rodolfo gazed across the chimneys of Paris. At that moment, roughly a minute into the music, Puccini introduces the theme that is key to this opera: this reminiscence, this look back, back from some future vantage point on an episode long past, an episode that colored a life.

Ask what opera is all about, and *La Bohème* is likely to be part of the answer. Its beauties inspire love in first-timers and devotees. But *Bohème* is about more than beauty. It demonstrates what opera can do.

One thing opera can do is render time more convincingly than any other method of storytelling. *La Bohème* is an artist's self-portrait, an account of himself as a young man. That artist, Rodolfo, is the memory's author, and in *Bohème* he reflects on who he was. Take note: The man telling his story is different from the man we see on stage. We get to know the onstage Rodolfo through the words we hear him utter. We get to know the older Rodolfo through the music, the medium that carries the words, the medium that delivers the recollection. In a

Then comes something more unsettling, a phrase shaped symmetrically and sung B/A/A/D/A/A/G, the repeated As rising and falling a fourth, pivoting around the D before the final A drops a step, as did the first interval of this phrase, this phrase that evokes such a powerful sense of nostalgia before the music recovers and Rodolfo ends in a rising flourish. What we hear *in the music* itself is something generous and carefree, tinged at midpoint with a hint of melancholy. What we hear *Rodolfo tell us* is that he is thinking about all those comfortable warm houses while the old stove in the garret sits idle, mounting no defense against the December cold. In fitting sounds so sublime to words so banal, Puccini offers a musical equivalent to our tendency to embellish the past. *Times were hard back then, but those were the days*.

Think of *La Bohème* as narrated by an older-and-wiser Rodolfo who recalls his twenties, when he was a wannabe writer, cold and hungry in the loft he shared with three artsy friends: a painter, a philosopher, and a musician. *Times were hard back then, but those were the days.* Into this scene of poverty walks Mimì, appearing almost as an apparition. The slow sunrise of a crescendo in the strings presages her aria "Mi chiamano Mimì": "I'm always called Mimì." Her name is actually Lucia, a fact she discloses just

written memoir, the author comments self-consciously on episodes of his past. Opera dispenses with such narrative clumsiness. It can render past and present simultaneously, mimicking life. It mirrors what we do when we recall parts of our own past and reflect on what they meant, and on what they continue to mean at the moment we recapture them. No other kind of narrative achieves this so elegantly.

Now trade my abstractions for the action on stage. Puccini aligns us with his protagonist before we know what is happening. A minute in, we encounter Rodolfo's theme, fifteen bars that over the next two hours we will hear in various forms. Here, with its first appearance, the composer dresses the most mundane of subjects in his most arresting music. "In the gray skies I'm watching the smoke from a thousand Paris chimneys," Rodolfo sings in a breezy seven bars.

once and never repeats. Lucia: light. Light is what she offers Rodolfo, in the form of love and acceptance such as any poet craves from his audience. Mimì is his audience now, and she will be forever after, because everything he does and writes he will do and write for her. Now he leaves behind the goofy horseplay of the opening scenes, the banter with the guys. He gets serious. He performs for Mimì. Who am I? I'm a poet. How do I live? Yeah, well—I live. In an instant, Mimì is in love, Rodolfo has the lines and knows how to use them. Yet his delivery is anything but slick. He hears himself pleading his case to Mimì in a new voice, honest and unguarded. Mimì is not his first girlfriend-his approach to her is too eloquent for a novice—but she is the one who will make the difference, the one who has made the difference, as the older-and-wiser Rodolfo/narrator understands. Mimì, as Rodolfo recalls her,

will always illuminate the memory of those rough days, in which she played so central a role, those days that, for all their hardship, will always bear the tender ache suggested in that pivotal rising and falling fourth.

I have focused on one moment in this two-hour opera. That moment launches the drama's trajectory in an uninterrupted arch. Puccini's fusion of action and music is surely one reason his *Bohème* so completely overshadows Leoncavallo's. Ruggero Leoncavallo, remembered today only for *Pagliacci*, the first of his many operas and operettas, was at work on his own Bohème when he learned his rival was also adapting Scenes from Bohemian Life, an 1849 collection of sketches by French writer Henri Murger. Although Puccini in 1895 had produced only one bona fide success of his own, that success was Manon Lescaut. Leoncavallo, finding himself pitted against a composer who could create an opera of such sweeping melodies and impact, understood what he was up against, and he reacted badly. After all, he had discovered Murger first. Puccini staved cool. Let the public decide, he said, with the confidence of an artist who knows he is good for more than one hit. The two Bohèmes co-existed for ten years, until Leoncavallo's vanished from the stage and Puccini's went on to become the world's most popular opera.

Anyone inclined to sit through Leoncavallo's *Bohème* will understand why time has favored Puccini, who achieved such different results using similar material. Leoncavallo's opera, an ungainly hybrid that starts as flaccid comedy, then shifts to blustering tragedy, feels pieced together and fails to deliver the urgent sense of life that is Puccini's strong suit. Leoncavallo believed himself a competent librettist and fashioned his own script. In librettists Giuseppe Giocosa and Luigi Illica, Puccini found the ideal collaborators, both of them accomplished writers who had worked with him on Manon Lescaut and who after Bohème would deliver the librettos for Tosca (1900) and Madama Butterfly (1904). Using Murger's collection of stories drawn from his own experience as a struggling writer, they devised a tale marked by the realism and naturalism audiences would have found in contemporary novels. Puccini, who knew what made a script live or limp, demanded rewrite after rewrite, forcing his librettists to ask themselves more than once if working with this man was worth the anguish.

The results in *Bohème* speak for themselves: words that inspire the ideal musical setting and that dictate the pace. Consider the two parts of Act I. The first part rushes, pedal-to-the-floor as the garret-partners trade jokes and jibes. This contrasts with the act's second half, when Rodolfo and Mimì discover each other and the music slows to a rhapsody, embodying a passion that supplants kid stuff with ecstasy.

Early audiences faulted *Bohème* for what we now regard as one of its great strengths, its realism. So downbeat a story set against so gritty a background, those characters you might encounter on any city sidewalk—all that was fine for the pages of Balzac or Zola or Dickens or Frank Norris, but the opera stage was reserved for more graceful material. (Audiences had not yet encountered Richard Strauss' *Salome*.) Often opera asks us to suspend our disbelief. Not *Bohème*. We recognize its world.

Yet *La Bohème* is hardly a documentary. Puccini writes melodies so seductive, and he is so easy to love, that he is often dismissed as an entertainer, as if that vocation left no room for artistry. *Bohème* should convince us otherwise.

Any catalog of Puccini's gifts has to include his extraordinary use of the orchestra. In the great aria "Che gelida manina," for example, he is elegant and reserved, applying a brushstroke of strings and a dab of winds and harp to color the moment Rodolfo grasps that he is in love. His theme—the one we heard a minute in—has already returned, first on solo violin, with a delicacy that suggests his vulnerability, and again in just a hint as he stands transfixed by Mimì, stunned by the luck that has led her to his door. Now, in prelude to his greatest aria, his theme turns gentle and broad—a setting for serious words—and even as it transforms into "Talor del mio forziere," Puccini holds the orchestra back, allowing his singer full rein in this impossibly romantic music. In his orchestral restraint, even more than his *fortissimos*, Puccini displays his artistry.

The orchestra leads us through the drama. Act I opens with a rush of strings, winds, and brass as Rodolfo and Marcello kvetch and joke. It closes with a gentle reprise of "Talor del mio forziere," growing to a great crescendo as Rodolfo and Mimì pledge themselves to each other, and at last closing quietly, the lovers' voices receding offstage. Act II, perfectly shaped, ends as it began, with the Christmas revelers. In between, we meet Musetta. Her waltz is a masterful feat of foreplay and consummation, teasing and swelling until it climaxes *fortissimo* and *tutta forza*, to be followed by a quiet denouement before the revelers return. Act III, opening and closing with a great snap to attention in the orchestra, concludes as Act I

ended, only now Rodolfo and Mimì sing of parting, not of the shared life that awaits them, and the last music we hear is a sad variant of "Talor del mio forziere." Act IV's structure follows that of Act I: orchestral bluster, upbeat mood, then reversal, as Musetta enters with the news that Mimì hasn't long to live. A telling reference to Rodolfo's theme, for the first and only time heard in the minor mode, underscores the tragedy. As Mimì dies, we recall the lovers' meeting in a fleeting *pianissimo* reference to "Che gelida manina." Mimì promised springtime in her first aria, and flowers, a return to life. Rising flutters in the flute accompanied her words then, and they recur as Musetta mourns the doomed Mimì.

Although the flowers Mimì fashions from bits of fabric will last, nothing that lives and breathes can run out the clock. Real flowers die and youth passes. What Mimì and Rodolfo shared was an episode, destined to end—even if its memory will endure as surely as Mimì's flowers. In *La Bohème*, Rodolfo has seen to that.

They call me me Mimi

THREE ARTISTS
SHARE INSIGHTS ON
BRINGING PUCCINI'S
SEAMSTRESS TO LIFE

an Francisco Opera welcomes three sopranos as Mimì in *La Bohème* this month. Each traveled her own unique path to one of opera's most beloved roles. Caroline Corrales, who appears as Mimì later this month with *Bohème Out of the Box*, saw her first *La Bohème* as a teenager at her hometown Opera Theatre of Saint Louis. "I was *so* taken by the story and by the music," she remembers. "It was so sweet and beautiful and heartbreaking!"

Nicole Car's introduction was a baptism by fire. As a young artist with Sydney Opera, she asked to sit in on rehearsals for a new *Bohème* and found herself jumping in for an ailing colleague. "I had two weeks to learn [Mimì], which was crazy. I remember working with coaches three or four hours a day, trying to absorb all this amazing music. I just got thrown in there, which in some ways was really positive, because everything felt kind of organic, in terms of the character development." Car has taken her Mimì to many top companies around the world, including London's Royal Opera and the Metropolitan Opera.

Karen Chia-ling Ho, making her role debut this season, admits that when she first saw *Bohème* as a student in Taiwan she "wasn't a big fan of opera. I was like, 'Opera is clichéd. It's all love stories.' I was into German lieder. But

my teachers at Eastman and CCM [Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music] gave me so many different tools and resources, so I started doing more opera scenes and workshops, and I started to grow into the love of opera."

Each artist has a highly personal take on Mimì's essential qualities. "For me, the essence of Mimì is a sense of innocence, a naïveté that needs to be brought out," says Car. "She has this big, loving heart. I think Mimì—my Mimì at least—is lonely. She's spent a lot of time by herself, and she ends up with this band of boys, and I think it plays to something quite social in her that she didn't know she had. I think she found in those boys, and in Musetta, something really special, and I definitely relate to that. And the idea of that special ever-giving love. She's not an absorber. She *gives out* light to the world."

Ho, too, connects with Mimi's introverted side. "I think she's a little bit similar to my younger self, because I wasn't very social. She says, in her text, 'I don't go out, I just stay in my room.' I was a little bit like that, and I was a little naïve." She notes that in other respects she and Mimi are very different. "I think she's very brave—which I am not," she says with a confiding smile. "She dares to love."

Corrales admires Mimi's kindness of heart above all. "She's so thoughtful and so intentional with her words, and with the delicate way she treats other people, with so

much respect and love. Even when she's ready to leave Rodolfo, she keeps saying 'Senza rancor' [without rancor]— and it's genuine! It's such a joy to be able to play this wonderful, deeply good, authentic, and lovely woman."

Despite the tragedy of Mimi's story, her portrayers see her as a positive figure of truth and beauty. "I never like Mimi to be the downer," says Car. "She's not sad about her illness, she's not angry about it. She accepts it as part of her life; and she wants to live that life as much as she can until her time is up. I think there's this kind of radiant sunshine that comes out of her that comes from a truthful place."

One of the defining moments for Corrales comes in her first aria: "after the climax, where she's talking about when the frost disappears and the flowers start to bloom, and she feels the warmth of the sun, and it's all hers. It's this huge dramatic musical moment, and then everything drops, and she talks about seeing these flowers in a vase and investigating each petal, and how sweet it is to smell them and see them. That's really who she is. She's so curious and so thorough and so gentle, and the greatest joy in her life is literally smelling the roses."

Ho is approaching her first Mimì with her heart and mind wide open. "The key is in her first aria," she says. "But after discussion with my friends and colleagues, they all have different interpretations, and now I'm thinking, 'Hmm ... which kind of Mimì will I be?' because my interpretation is very straightforward. I think she's innocent, she's poor, but she wants to experience different things in life. But some people say, 'Actually she's very calculated. That's why she went to knock on [Rodolfo's] door....' I still feel like there are many parts where I need some other people's insights into the character to give me inspiration."

Two of the sopranos offer strikingly similar perceptions about Mimi's lyrical bent. "When she starts talking about herself in 'Mi chiamano Mimi,'" says Car, "she doesn't even realize that in a lot of ways she becomes so much more poetic than the actual poet is in his aria." Corrales picks up the theme: "As she's getting to know Rodolfo, and he tells her that he's a poet, she talks about how all the things she loves to do are 'poesia' too. And in the final duet, she's so, so poetic. She talks about how her love is so profound, it's deeper than the sea. She has this amazing moment where she's reflecting some of Rodolfo's ideas, and it just shows how much she listened and was a great partner in that way—to take on these qualities, and to enhance these qualities in herself, that just deepens their connection."

When learning a new piece, Ho avoids referring to performances of the past. "Normally, I just listen one time through, and then I'll put it aside, because I'm pretty good at copying, so I try not to do that. I just want to know the shape of the music, and then I'll do exploration by myself." Car and Corrales, on the other hand, tip their hats to the same touchstone Mimì. "[Mirella] Freni's version is one of the most pure, beautifully sung, respectful of the score, and just very informed in terms of the character," says Car. "My favorite production ever was San Francisco Opera with Mirella Freni and [Luciano] Pavorotti," says Corrales. "It's wonderful to be able to understand those performance traditions and see, 'Okay, what is Mirella doing that's in the score, and what is she doing that's her own signature? And what is resonating with me so much that I could take inspiration from it?"

The role's emotional stakes pose a significant challenge. "It took me at least two or three weeks of coachings to be able to sing the last few pages of her music without crying," confesses Corrales. Ho faced the same hurdle. "My teacher Diana Soviero told me, 'You cannot cry on the stage, because if you cry, the audience

will not cry," she says. "So you have to be very present—you're yourself, at the same time that you have to bring out the character to the audience. It's pretty challenging."

All three agree on the secret of the opera's evergreen charms. "It's the power of verismo opera," says Ho. "It's very close to people's heart. The love story never ends, and it can be transplanted to many different places and times."

"These are real people's stories," echoes Corrales. "We see ourselves in them. They are vibrant and resourceful, and deep and caring people who are living in an economic struggle, who are trying to survive while being true to themselves. All of them are raw and real. What's more relatable than the opening scene of a bunch of friends and roommates trying to scrabble together money for food and heat? And then making art, and falling in love, and finding joy in the little things."

"Love is a universal story," says Car. "It's not a story of kings and queens, it's a story of something that is possible for all of us. Everyone in that public will have some story that informs them of something these characters are doing onstage. My aim is to be a vessel for that."

San Francisco Opera's trio of Mim's say the credit for their

portrayals goes to the composer. "Puccini wrote a piece that is genius. There is no extra note, there are no extra words, it's not overly dramatic. It's just perfectly written," says Car. "It's such an ensemble-y piece! If you have six people who are really willing to put themselves in the situation and be there for each other—no divas, no divos—you have an absolute winning combination every time. "

"Puccini is so specific," says Corrales. "Every tempo marking, every dynamic marking, every swell is so deeply connected to the text and to the character. When I started learning [Mimì], my teacher was Nova Thomas, who had studied with Mirella Freni and spent a month living with her, just learning [Mimì]. And Mirella said to her, 'If you sing and observe every piece of ink on the page, you'll be a hundred times greater the Mimì than I ever was.' Which I don't think is possible, but she was so right that every single thing you need to be a great Mimì is right there on the page. You don't have to do any kind of inventing. You just come to it with an open heart and let Mimì in."

José González Granero

PRINCIPAL CLARINET

n the world of opera, where vibrant voices and grand stagings come together, there is an element at work that is not often seen but is surely felt. This presence is the orchestra, breathing color into phrases, stirring our hearts, and soothing our ears with elegant, floated tones. It is embodied in the sound of José González Granero's clarinet.

Granero grew up in Iznatoraf, Spain, where the olive trees wrapped around his village like silent storytellers. His first music mentors were his father and grandfather, both of whom were band leaders. "I got into music through the

community band. It's very common in Spain. Every town has a wind band," says Granero. This early exposure to music ignited his passion for the clarinet, leading him to travel nearly a hundred miles by bus three days a week for lessons during middle and high school.

Granero received his B.A. from the Granada Superior Conservatory in Spain and the G. Verdi Conservatory in Italy. In 2007, he moved to Los Angeles to attend the Colburn School of Music and study with renowned clarinet teacher Yehuda Gilad, who encouraged him to "sing through the clarinet."

"My goal and passion was always classical music since the beginning," says Granero. "My first opera was *Il Trovatore*. I was so lucky to get to attend it in Busseto, the birthplace of Verdi." But it is Mozart he leans into with awe. Mozart's first operatic use of the clarinet was in *Idomeneo*.

Granero marvels at Mozart's intuitive understanding of the clarinet's potential: "It still amazes me because Mozart used woodwinds in a way that lets it come out in the orchestra. He let the clarinet sing in the highest range of the woodwinds. That color with clarinet, bassoon, and horn is just the perfect combination." Although the clarinet appears infrequently in *Idomeneo*, its presence is purposeful, deepening the woodwind textures in moments of pathos, such as during Ilia's sorrowful arias, and adding richness to the storm scenes in Act III.



One of the most surprising difficulties for the clarinet in *Idomeneo* isn't the playing—it's waiting to play. "In the final act, I might have 20 minutes of silence before my next entrance," Granero says. "The clarinet cools down; the reed dries out; and if I'm not careful, my first note will be flat. So I have to keep warming it and checking the pads for condensation. I wipe it with cigarette papers!"

If *Idomeneo* is where the clarinet found its operatic voice, it is Puccini's *La Bohème* where it found its heart. The clarinet flows through *Bohème*'s restless rhythms, adapting to the singers' feelings as it

stretches and contracts alongside them. Granero reflects on Rodolfo's aria "Che gelida manina," where the clarinet is a heartbeat: delicate, invisible, but pulsating. "[The aria] is my favorite. What Pavarotti did ... when he held the high C note for a long time, it's amazing. It gives me chills."

The emotional volatility in *Idomeneo* requires constant dialogue with Maestro Eun Sun Kim, whose precision fosters an appreciated clarity from the orchestra. "She always is making a connection to the stage, the orchestra, or the chorus. And she's very, very good at that," says Granero. "She communicates with her eyes, her baton, her left hand."

The San Francisco Opera Orchestra woodwind section is a close-knit group. Granero shares his appreciation for the camaraderie with principal bassoonist and neighbor in the pit Rufus Olivier. "We have perfect communication. We can anticipate what the other is going to do. We follow each other. We are friends, too," Granero continues. "That's what makes our Orchestra special. We have a very good relationship with each other, no drama."

Granero, who celebrates his 15th year with the Company this summer, believes the magic of opera lies in its collective spirit. "Every night is different," he says. "The singer may take a breath differently; the conductor may reshape a phrase. Our job is to listen, be flexible, and adjust to the composer's vision." It is a reminder that for Granero, music lives in the spaces between notes, breaths, and shared intention.

Bohème Out of the Box

Launched in 2023 as part of San Francisco Opera's Centennial Season, *Bohème Out of the Box* has taken *La Bohème*'s powerful emotions and soaring music to outdoor locations in South San Francisco, Los Gatos, Dublin, Burlingame, Alameda, Albany, and Union City, as well as Silicon Valley for staff performances at tech and corporate campuses. This season, the mobile shipping container production has pulled up in Sausalito, San Ramon, and Los Altos Hills, with June 28 and 29 performances scheduled for Heritage Plaza in Hayward. Come enjoy Puccini's classic al fresco!

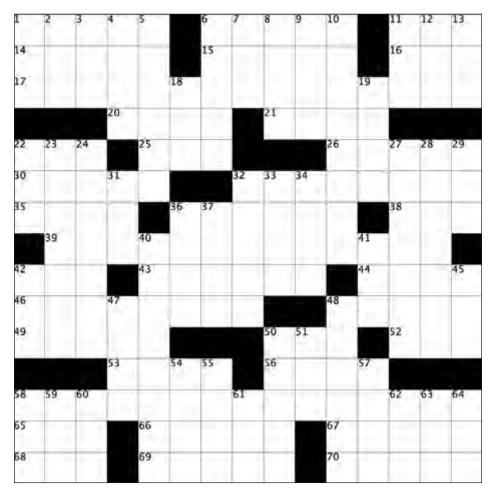

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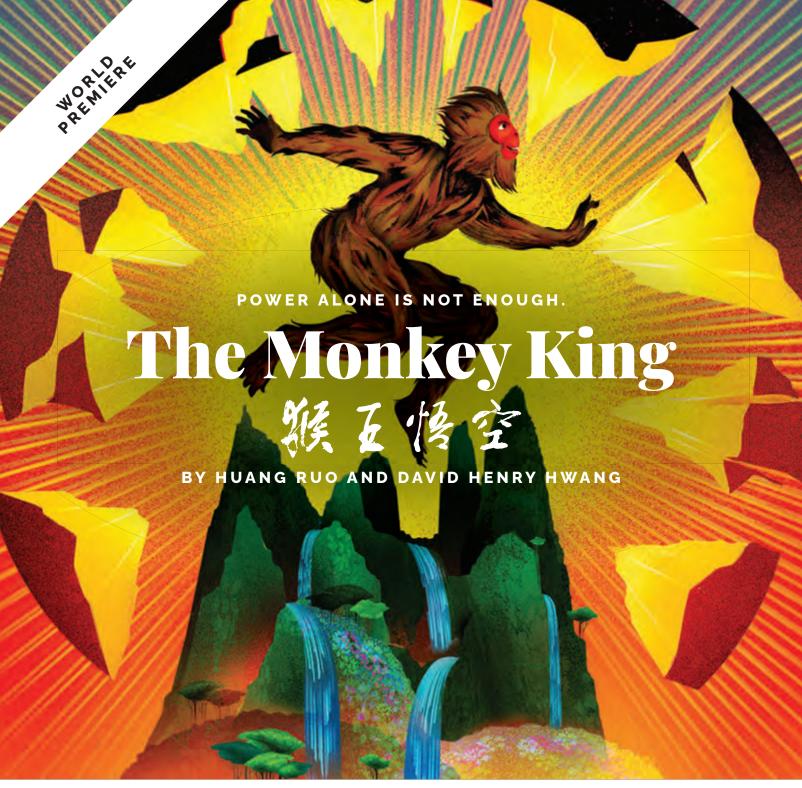

In January, San Francisco Opera relaunched its performance database, an online searchable resource detailing each performance since the Company's founding in 1923. The new site, funded by a generous gift from an anonymous donor and developed in partnership with Kanopi Studios, replaces the Company's original platform that launched in 2008. Director of Archives Barbara Rominski, who manages and updates the database regularly, says the newly reconstituted database has enhanced functionality and introduces many additional features, including records of performances not previously included, thousands of archival photographs, and the digitization of original program books.

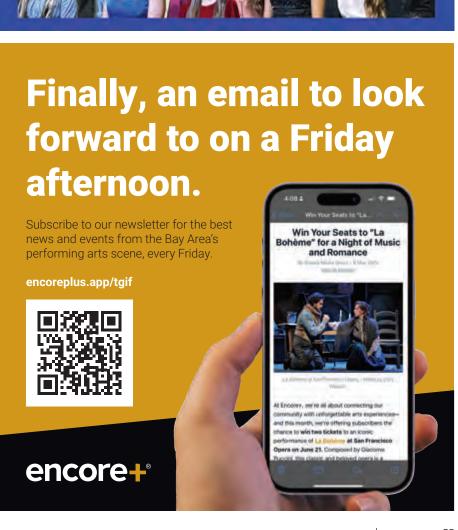

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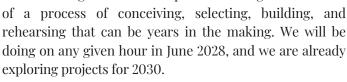
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Years in the Making

he great Maria Callas once said, "An opera begins long before the curtain goes up and ends long after it has come down. It starts in my imagination, it becomes my life, and it stays part of my life long after I've left the opera house." While she was speaking as a singer, her sentiments can be applied to the whole process of producing opera. The few hours we see onstage are but the tip of an iceberg

The immense arc of preparing opera is a part of its lasting impact. Like Pygmalion carving his beloved Galatea from a block of marble, we bring things to life with extraordinary patience, commitment to craft, and belief in the beauty of what can be. But, unlike carving a sculpture, opera isn't a solitary sport; we come together as a creative community, each person bringing their own skills, experiences, talents, and resources to

make possible something exquisite.

Just a few weeks after we close this summer, we will be back onstage for technical rehearsals for the fall. Through August we'll work backwards, beginning with

The Monkey King and ending with Rigoletto. Each set has a few days on stage, working out technical challenges, setting the lighting, working through chorus scenes, and ensuring seamless scene shifts—all before we start rehearsals with the casts and orchestra.

This means that new productions—this year *The Monkey King* and *Parsifal*—must be completed by the end of July. Last fall, scenic and costume designs were turned into the blueprints for building so that our workshops could spend the spring building. In the case of *Parsifal* that is a well-established building process, although one infused with cutting edge technology (3-D printing, computer-aided design, and a computerized woodcutter).

The Monkey King represents a completely different approach—a world of ephemerality, fluidity, and stage magic. With 60,000 feet of fabric, puppetry, projections, and scenery that moves in the hands of our dancers, creating *The Monkey King* is about building a theatrical toolkit that will come to life in the real-time process of rehearsals. So much of preparing *Monkey King* is experimentation: testing lightweight materials, seeing how fabric hangs to catch the light, and, for our costume shop, realizing the fantastical designs so beautifully designed by Anita Yavich.

The creation of new productions is something deep in our DNA. Since the beginning of San Francisco Opera's existence, we have built our own scenery, although in the

early decades it was largely painted two-dimensional fabric. By the 1950s we had evolved into more physical scenery, but the crafts of theatrical building, scenic painting, and creating the illusion of reality date back in an unbroken lineage to the days of the Gold Rush when vaudeville, musical revue and opera performances could be found in a plethora of now-long-gone theaters around town.

That unbroken lineage also defines our costume production. For decades, we partnered with an external company, Goldstein & Co., founded in 1868. In 1972, Goldstein's inventory was liquidated and its senior costumer Walter Mahoney became our first costume director. Daniele McCartan took on the role in 2002, becoming only the third costume director in our history, though Daniele's tenure in the shop actually began in 1986.

Whether artists, artisans, or technicians, every aspect of the Company represents a lineage back through generations. San Francisco is one of the few cities in America to have maintained these crafts, and I am so proud of the creative community nurtured and sustained by you all. This beautiful symbiosis enables us to produce transcendent works, time and again. I do hope that you'll join us this fall and see the results of these projects which "start in our imagination, become our lives, and stay part of our lives long after we've left the opera house." And, in that, is something very special.

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
