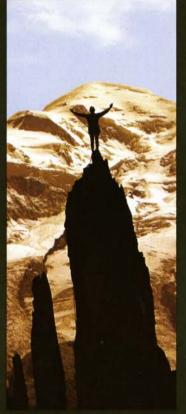
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CONSIDERING DEAD MAN WALKING

"God sends you the people that you need."" — Sister Helen Prejean

n the first day of rehearsals for Dead Man Walking, Terrence McNally was asked to address the opera's cast and creative team, all assembled in a tatty, subterranean rehearsal hall known as Zellerbach B. Soft-spoken and unprepossessing (especially for a man who's won four Tony Awards), McNally said he was "not in the habit of quoting myself," but was reminded of a line from his play, Master Class.

It comes near the end of the final act when Maria Callas tells a collection of ambitious young opera singers, "The older I get, the less I know, but I am certain that what we do matters. If I didn't believe that —" and she breaks off, silenced by emotion.

McNally said: "I just want to say that Lotfi Mansouri and the San Francisco Opera have given us something that really matters with this, and I'm grateful to be part of it."

That sentiment (or is "belief" a better word?) seems to have permeated the consciousness of every person involved with *Dead Man Walking*. Despite the frustration and anxiety that accompany the mounting of any opera, the customary descents into gallows humor and occasional punchiness that

result from nightmare schedules and fatigue, no one has managed to stray very far or long from the knowledge that the "matter" of this project is about as profound as matter gets.

As mezzo-soprano Frederica von Stade observed: "This has moved beyond everyone's reputation. I've never been a part of anything like this."

Coming from a professional and star of von Stade's experience and caliber, that statement should serve as a warning to anyone who feels compelled to box and label this work before actually seeing and hearing it. This *Dead Man Walking* is not Tim Robbins's Academy Award-winning film set to music. It is not an operatic documentary of Sister Helen Prejean's best-selling book. It is not, despite its most prominent subject matter, a polemic on capital punishment.

"This is about trust and sharing and honesty," said composer Jake Heggie. "We have all found our way through this together. It's a collaboration in the truest sense of the word."

At the center of the collaboration, the heart of the "We," is a Roman Catholic nun who may be the embodiment of trust, sharing and honesty. In 1982, Sister Helen Prejean of the Louisiana order of St. Joseph of Medaille answered a letter from a prisoner on death row in

Angola State Penitentiary. That action, that seemingly isolated and inconsequential choice, turned out to be a kind of spiritual "Big Bang" — for Prejean and for millions of Americans whose lives and values she has influenced.

It was Creation, in the purest, most humanly holy sense of the word, and it continues to draw light and energy the more that it intensifies and expands.

Some of the most recent (and powerful) infusions of such energy and light are:

TERRENCE MCNALLY — librettist

An opera lover since he was a freshman at Columbia University, paying 50 cents for a standing room spot at the old Met, McNally had wanted to write the libretto of a contemporary American opera for years. Winning Tony Awards for penning Master Class and Love! Valour! Compassion! and for writing the book for the musical adaptation of Kiss of the Spider Woman kept postponing his plans.

San Francisco Opera General Director Lotfi Mansouri thought he'd snared McNally to transform Tennessee Williams's A Streetcar Named Desire into an opera libretto. But, as Mansouri says, "Ragtime (the Broadway musical) got in the way."

Just as Prejean's life-altering choice did not come in melodramatic Old Testament form but in a simple letter from another human being, McNally's idea to use Prejean's book for an opera libretto came in — literally — the most pedestrian way.

"I was just walking down the street one day and the idea occurred to me," he said. "Really."

Prejean's account of serving as a spiritual adviser to several inmates who were executed at Angola contained every element McNally had come to expect in great opera drama.

"I don't know why it is, but a lot of contemporary opera doesn't seem that big emotionally. It never seems to get out of the recitative as opposed to that level where the emotions are so huge that it's natural for a character to *have* to sing," he said. "The story of *Dead Man Walking* has that kind of emotion. And it is contemporary, it has relevance, it has drama, and it gives us something to talk about."

Like everyone else connected to the production, McNally insists, "I've never felt this was an anti-death penalty or capital punishment opera. Sister Helen's book isn't that kind of story. The book is about her coming to terms with her own capacities as a human being."

Much has been made in many news media previews of the fact that *Dead Man Walking* is not only McNally's first full opera libretto, but also composer Heggie's maiden voyage and stage director Joe Mantello's, too.

"Well??" McNally said, his eyes widening in good-humored defense. "Verdi had to have a first opera, didn't he? And Puccini? There's so much pressure in the arts today, so much focused on the night of October 7 (the *Dead Man* opening) because this is *the* new American opera of the year. Only one new opera a year isn't healthy.

"Caruso did something like 22 world premieres during his career. The year that La Bobème was first staged, there were 45 other operas making their debuts. So, the hopes of all Italy weren't riding on Bobème; it wasn't the new Italian opera."

McNally longs for an opera arts climate in which "all the major houses announce premieres each year." Until that time, he deeply means what he said to the cast on that first day of rehearsal about the circumstances in which they have created this opera.

"Mrs. Wattis is doing a great thing," he said of philanthropist Phyllis Wattis, who contributed \$2 million to help create *Dead Man Walking*. "She only gives money for *new* projects. Lots of people want to give money for another revival, but not for a new work. She and Lotfi have taken an incredible chance. When someone like that gives you an opportunity like this, you don't take it lightly."

SUSAN GRAHAM — Sister Helen Prejean In the summer of 1998, Graham was in town singing Mahler Lieder with the San Francisco Symphony. Jake Heggie, whose work the mezzo knew through his celebrated song cycles, asked her to meet with him to hear about an opera he had been commissioned to write for Lotfi Mansouri's "Pacific Visions" new opera program.

"We were in that big coffee shop on Van Ness that has a counter going around the whole place," Graham remembered. "He told me the story of the opera and, by the end of it, I was sitting there in a complete puddle. When he described the scene between Helen and the prisoner's mother, I was moved to the point where I was fearful."

Why fear?

"We touch emotion in our work, yes, but never in such a timely and immediate way. Usually, I portray characters who probably never lived. This story is real, it has impact on the here-and-now. It's scary to go that far emotionally, to risk feeling some very deep feelings. We singers are taught: 'You don't cry; you make the audience cry.' But this opera touches you on such a primitive, emotional level, that to perform it continues to be daunting every day.

"The safety net for me is, as Sister Helen, I get to be the strong one."

About six-feet tall, but with perfect, almost elfin facial features, Graham has gained an international reputation as one of the leading Octavians and Cherubinos of our time. Her *Iphigénie en Tauride* raised the bar for portraying Gluck's tortured Greek heroine. To now set the standard for the role of Sister Helen Prejean is both a challenge and an honor.

"One can learn a lot from portraying a person like Sister Helen," said Graham. "She's just goodness and light, compassion and generosity. She's funny, sassy, sarcastic and she has a great sense of humor. She's angry, she's spunky, not sanctimonious, holier-than-thou or self-righteous. She's just strong and lives in the faith that there is hope. I think we could all learn from that."

Categorizing herself as "pretty much an optimistic type" Graham said she works hard to "maintain a kind of private spirituality and a relationship" to a

higher force. "And that's not always easy with this life on the road." Through Heggie's music and McNally's words, however, she says she has rediscovered the wisdom and truth of the tenets of many basic religions.

"I'm hearing things you say all the time, like 'the truth will set you free,' in a new way," she said. "When Helen sings, I will be there for you,' knowing what he (Joe) has to face, or when she tells him, 'God is here,' you understand what that really means."

Like the real Prejean, who sees herself as "a prism" through which God's love is reflected, Graham resonates with her character's role as spiritual medium.

"When she says, 'I love you,' to Joseph, it's God saying 'I love you' through her. She's the conduit, the witness, the vessel through which this guy will find God."

Asked whether it is possible to serve both the dramatic and emotional demands of a story like *Dead Mam Walking* and deliver the vocal goods that are fundamental to successful grand opera, Graham seemed to take on the steely posture and set jaw that her Helen adopts when a prison chaplain snaps, "You're way over your head, sister."

"I think that is something a lot of singers of my generation are trying very hard to accomplish. When I sing Octavian or any other role, every syllable that comes out of my mouth is truth. It has to be that way. If I can't find the truth in every utterance of a character, it's going to fall flat.

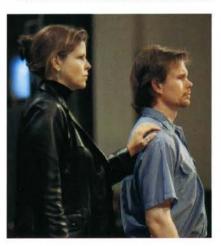
"I think what makes the most effective and moving performances is not when a soprano sings a beautiful high C, it's when she sings it for a reason."

FREDERICA VON STADE — Mrs.

Patrick de Rocher

Known throughout the opera world almost as well for her sunny disposition and un-diva-like demeanor as she is for stellar performing, von Stade wanted to portray the mother of convicted killer Joe de Rocher "waaay before I even heard the music."

Part of that was due to the celebrated

mezzo's rock-solid faith in Jake Heggie. One of his first and most ardent supporters, von Stade never doubted that Heggie would compose music worthy of her, the other principal singers and Helen Prejean's story. But she was also drawn to the pathos inherent in the character of Mrs. de Rocher.

"This woman has not one but two boys in prison, one of whom is going to be executed for murder. So, she must have been just out-to-lunch for some reason while they were growing up, probably struggling to keep everything in her life

together against terrible odds," she said.
"I'm glad to say this isn't my story — I'm not poor, and, thankfully, my kids are OK — but it could be me. Maybe it's where I am in my life, because I think you become more aware as you get older of other people's struggles and pain. You see the connections between them and you, the similarities; you're not so quick to judge. I know this mother's story is not mine, but I feel like I'm playing myself."

Which just might explain why, when the cast of Dead Man Walking sat in a circle last month and simply read their parts, several people in the room were moved to tears by von Stade's interpretation.

Was it a demonstration of her legendary acting abilities or was she truly feeling as much as her voice conveyed?

"Oh, yes! My reaction was a real one. Jake and Terrence have written a very powerful piece. We can't do what we did that day (during the reading) with a whole lot of the scores we've all done. This is an unusual, different entity. That's why the preparation for it has been different from anything else I've done. It's a real story, a tangible drama. It has a timeframe that is familiar to all of us and a subject that's current in everyone's mind. There's reality to draw from."

One element of that reality is Mrs. de Rocher's terror at speaking during her son's pardon board hearing, begging for mercy from a panel of bureaucratic men she has never met.

"I know a lot of people who would rather die than speak in front of a group under any circumstances," said von Stade. "Then, there is that total lack of control she has in bargaining with strangers. I have had enough experience with the court system to know what that feels like, to not have control over the most important things in my life. I've been there, and it makes you want to go after every person in the room."

Unlike most of the members of the Dead Man cast and production team, von Stade did not get her consciousness raised about capital punishment by getting to know Helen Prejean and reading her book. A lifelong, practicing Roman Catholic, she has been an opponent of the death penalty for decades.

"I think we do our best, but it's beyond our human capacity to judge one another in matters so grave as this. I don't think we are capable of making a decent judgment," she said. "And, now, as we've begun to see how inequitably the judicial system hands out sentences, the death penalty makes even less sense. What does it do to the people who do the killing for the state?"

Already convinced of the artistic value of Dead Man Walking, von Stade is excited about the opera's potential as a catalyst for serious thought and debate.

"It takes courageous people to go out



and fight for something like this, people like Sister Helen who just buck the system all the time," she said. "The fact that this subject has been chosen for a film and now an opera is wonderful. It will get her message out there. And getting the message out is what will help all of us see the truth."

JOE MANTELLO — stage director

Clad in jeans, sneakers and a gray hooded sweatshirt, the famous Broadway actor-turned-director looked and moved as though he was this-close to bursting into "The Jets' Song" from West Side Story. Instead, Joe Mantello bent down on one knee and focused intently on Susan Graham in her stripped-down, Sister Helen stage automobile for Act I, Scene 2 of Dead Man Walking.

"IS she afraid of this journey to her Christ?" the mezzo soprano asked, repeating a line she had just sung.

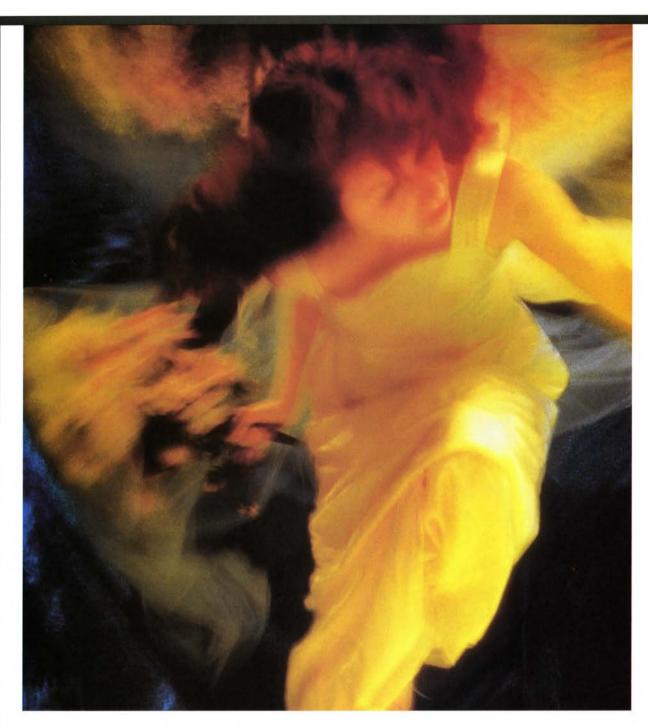
"I think it's more like you're on the verge of something totally foreign," he answered. "It's like you're about to take your first step onto the moon."

Such a simile could accurately describe Mantello's task as director of San Francisco Opera's Dead Man Walking. Highly respected in the New York theater world - he won a Tony nomination for his portraval of Louis in Angels in America and has directed the works of several major contemporary playwrights like Terrence McNally and Neil LaBute - Mantello is an embryo when it comes to opera.

Yet, so strong is his professional reputation, and so fiercely was he championed by McNally, SFO General Director Lotfi Mansouri didn't hesitate to put him in charge of this multi-million-dollar world premiere.

Besides, Mantello's modus operandi is perfect for the operatic art form (and mightily welcomed by singers who are asked to execute all manner of stunts these days): economic staging and an adherence to the essence of a story or character.

"I don't feel as much like a fish out of water as I thought I might," he said, a couple of weeks into rehearsal. "I think the vocabulary may be slightly different, but story telling is story telling. If we're all in the service of telling the story, if our goal is the same, then we're going to be OK. What I'm doing in this produc-



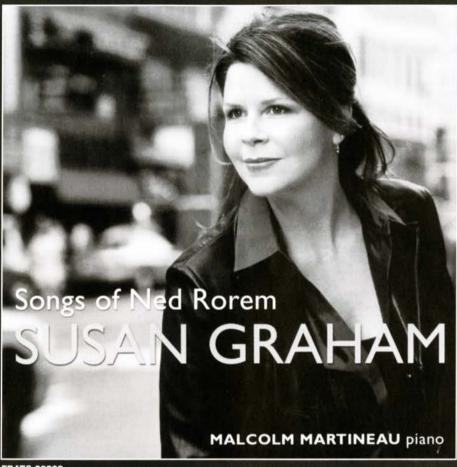

tion is what I do in the theater. I'm just watching to see in each scene and aria: Is the story clear? Is the dynamic clear? Is there an event?"

As background for the cast, Mantello took two hours of one rehearsal to show "The Farm," a documentary on Angola State Prison. Nominated for an Academy Award, the film is so searing, several singers — men and women — wept.

Immediately afterwards, though, Mantello pointed to a stack of xeroxed articles and encouraged the singers and production staff to read first-person accounts of heinous crimes from the victims' perspective.

"I urge you to look at the other side," he said. "This is an extremely complicated issue. And we're *not* doing a documentary."

Later he expanded on the theme:

"I don't think there are easy answers to capital punishment, not when you actually get down to specifics and you don't talk about it in the abstract. This is an opera that begins with a murder and ends with an execution. What's the difference? Where are you in the middle of it? Why is one one thing and the other another? Is it just a word difference?

"I think that's the struggle for everybody in this opera. For the opera to work, hopefully the same kind of struggle will occur in the audience. Their alliances will constantly be shifting."

Such deep searching and dramatic tension is the only kind of theater Mantello cares to participate in.

"This is about somebody who's struggling with big questions. The struggle is what makes Helen human *and* interesting. If she has all the answers, what am I sitting there watching it for?" he said.

Not surprising, Mantello's aversion to the easy way is at the core of his leap from the theater stage to the stage of a major opera house.

"Last year I made a conscious decision to actively pursue only things that terrify me," he said. "There had started to be a sameness in what I was doing. I found myself in a project thinking, 'Oh, I already solved that problem before' — and I was getting away with it. But you know, if you go to the well so many times, it's going to dry up. I wanted to get better, not stay the same. That's one of the big reasons — besides the story — I was interested in doing this: the whole idea was utterly daunting to me."

JOHN PACKARD — Joseph de Rocher Pretty much to a person, everyone in the cast and crew of Dead Man Walking agrees: baritone John Packard probably has the hardest job of anyone in the production. In the gut-wrenching opening scene, we see him rape a teenage girl, shoot her boyfriend, then stab the girl 37 times. After that, he has but four scenes in which to give us one good reason not to want to obliterate him from the face of the earth, let alone to find him worthy of forgiveness and love.

Not inconsequentially, he has to do all of this while singing some beautiful and some darkly violent operatic music.

"When I began this role, I would only speak of 'him' when I talked about Joseph. I wouldn't say 'me'," said Packard a few weeks before opening night. "I've tried to keep a safe distance from him, but I have a feeling that, by the time of the performance, I won't be able to do that. Joe (Mantello) told me, 'You can't be afraid to go to that dark place in yourself,' to inhabit it. He did that in *Angels in America* and won a Tony nomination."

Packard won the part of de Rocher from among 50 baritones who auditioned nationwide. As Mansouri tells it, "As soon as he walked on stage, I thought, 'Oh, God, I hope he can sing.' He just had that look of menace and vulnerability that we all wanted in Joseph. When he opened his mouth, yes! He has a beautiful voice."

"I guess I do have that look," Packard said. "When Sister Helen was speaking in (his hometown) Philadelphia, I went to meet her. I found out later that she

thought I was an ex-convict."

If Packard was trying to keep his emotional distance from someone like Joe, he didn't balk at getting up-close and personal with a convicted killer's world. "Method acting is not good with a role like this. What am I supposed to do? Go out and rape and murder someone to see what it feels like?" he said.

Instead, accompanied by a documentary TV crew from San Francisco's public broadcasting affiliate, KQED, Packard traveled to Louisiana to get an inside look at Angola prison.

Bound on three sides by the Mississippi River, Angola sprawls over 18,000 acres. It is home to some 5,000 inmates, 85 percent of whom will die within its walls, either from old age or state-sanctioned execution.

Although he was not allowed to speak with any of the inmates on death row, Packard was given unprecedented access to Camp F, the building to which prisoners are transferred on their last day and in which they are killed.

"It's a 10-minute drive from the main prison to Camp F," he recalled. "I rode in a car with shackles on my feet and hands. The cell is about 6-by-9 with a bunk, a metal toilet without a seat, a sheet of polished stainless steel for a mirror and a phone right outside the bars, just in case."

The walk to the actual death chamber, said Packard, "is so short it's shocking. Then you turn the corner and you're in this brilliant white room. Everything is so brilliant. And there's just the execution table. It knocked the breath out of me."

Although Packard's hosts offered to strap him to the table, "I said that, out of respect for the dead, I'd not do that."

Considerably more educated now about lethal injection than he was a year ago, the young baritone minces no words:

"The process takes about 15 to17 minutes. The first drug that goes through the IV is an antihistamine that essentially implodes your lungs. A muscle relaxant renders you incapable of moving. The final drug stops your heart. The last thing to go is the brain, your awareness. I think the only thing humane about it is it's easier on the people watching it."

PATRICK SUMMERS — conductor

"Every time I hear someone talk about how opera should stick to the proven standards, I say: If you like veal parmigiana, do you have it every night? Mr. Puccini only wrote 12 operas and only five the public wants to see. Do we do those same five every year? What does that say about who we are as a people in the year 2000?"

In other words, no one had to talk Patrick Summers into trying something new like Jake Heggie's *Dead Man Walking*.

"I have a wide appetite for music. It takes an enormous menu to satisfy it," said Summers, who serves as the music director of Houston Grand Opera and Principal Guest Conductor of San Francisco Opera. "In modern music, sometimes you find a composer who has a very simple, unique, direct voice, and that's what I find with Jake.

"His music has incredible emotional impact on the first hearing, and it is tuneful and very operatic. There is such an honesty there; he never writes to fulfill expectations. He cannot write other than as himself."

By Heggie's account, Summers was "the first person to sit down and listen to my music. It was in 1994 and I was working in the opera's public relations department. Patrick took the time to listen, and he said, 'Jake, this is real. You write real music.' I feel so safe and secure with him conducting this opera."

For his part, Summers rather likes having the composer sitting next to him during rehearsals.

"I've been involved in *Dead Man Walking* since its commission. I was present when Jake got the first themes for the score," he said. "When the composer is next to you, you don't have that guessing game about his intent. You know what the inspiration

was of the text. I can't tell you how often I wished I could lean over (during SFO's production of *Otello*) and ask Mr. Rossini, 'Just what were you thinking here?' "

A fan of film — "It is one of the fine arts in this country" — Summers nevertheless cautions people against comparing Tim Robbins's "Dead Man" with the Heggie-McNally creation.

"We are at the opposite end of the scale from film," he said. "We are not realistic. If we try to be, we're not honest to our art. What opera does is go underneath and all around the emotion. I urge people to come at this with a different set of ears and expectations than they usually do."

LOTFI MANSOURI — general director With Dead Man Walking, Mansouri has realized perhaps the ultimate of his "Pacific Visions" creative dreams. The librettist he's been after for years delivered the book, an award-winning stage director shaped the production, an established young American composer wrote the score, accomplished singers portray the characters, and the subject matter is as meaty as the Chicago stockyards.

Told that Terrence McNally had sung his praises for giving first-cabin treatment to *Dead Man* — "instead of telling us we could do it, but with a piano, bass and kazoo" — Mansouri shrugged.

"You have to. I mean, either you're going to do a project or you aren't. If you really believe in something, you have to give it every chance. I really believe in this."

And Mansouri's conviction is highly infectious. Philanthropist Phyllis Wattis, who has donated millions of dollars to new operas and productions during Mansouri's 14-year reign, is the major angel behind *Dead Man Walking* — a fact that is a testament to Mansouri's persuasive abilities.

"I sent her the book and film, and she finally called me and said, 'Lotfi, I've got a big problem with this. I'm in favor of capital punishment.' I told her that was not a problem, that our job was not to

take a political position, but to present the issue. And that is what we have done. This opera is about redemption through love, and taking responsibility for our own actions."

Asked if he is at all invested in what the professional critics - known to be cool toward new operas in general ultimately think of Dead Man Walking, Mansouri smiled. "You know me," he said. "I don't work for critics. I work for the audience."

JAKE HEGGIE — composer

"When composing is at its best, I feel like I've stepped into this field, this vibration, where the music takes on a line, an inevitability; it just has to go the way it does," said Heggie. "When you get in a collaboration as we have with this opera, everyone else starts to feel that same vibration. And that is the magic of theater, with everyone in the same place. If the audience feels it, too, it is just overwhelming."

From the real-life woman behind Dead Man Walking to the librettist, stage director, conductor, general director, major financial backer and the singers who will translate his first, full-length opera "vibration" into a performance, Heggie continually marvels at his good fortune.

"There has just been this enormous trust from everyone involved," he said. "And that trust has been incredibly liberating."

Not yet 40 and already celebrated for his soulful song cycles, Heggie said that writing the score for Dead Man was "a joy from beginning to end."

"Terrence (McNally) was so generous throughout the project. He told me, 'All I hope is that whatever I write inspires music. If it doesn't, write your own words.' I got to know the characters musically through talking about them with Terrence. Once I found out their 'language,' what they felt - not what I'd feel if I were them — I wrote the entire piece chronologically."

Like stage director Joe Mantello, who is known for his lean, economical hand, Heggie is drawn to the clean compositions of Bach, Mozart, Debussy and Britten.

"There are a couple of things I really love in opera: ensembles, where the interaction of the characters is key to the story, and motifs, something weaving through

as texture," he said. "With those in mind, I tried to be very, very economical in the way I wrote Dead Man Walking.'

A man who Frederica von Stade says "simply comes from kindness," Heggie is still awed by the kindness - and commitment, energy and courage - of the Catholic nun on whose story his opera is based.

"Sister Helen. This is a woman who knows what she's about," he said. "There's this fire of burning truth in her and she just has to share it. I can't think of anyone else in history, who was alive in the prime of her life — and accomplished what she is accomplishing.

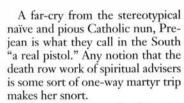
'What Helen represents is the spirit of forgiveness, and that is the hardest thing we humans are asked to do: forgive. But it is what all the great religious figures have said we must. That's why there's this amazing power to her words, because she is all about that eternal message of forgiveness."

HELEN PREJEAN — nun, author;

inspiration

Unlike the Academy Award-winning film that was based on her book about ministering to death row prisoners, Dead Man Walking, the opera, has largely come together with little hands-on guidance from the phenomenally busy Prejean. Characteristically, the sister of St. Joseph of Medaille, is not remotely worried.

"This is one little savvy person and a savvy community of sisters," Prejean said during a telephone interview from Vermont where she was speaking about her life's work. "I would never have trusted anybody who had any other agenda but to present this issue truthfully and honestly. After I talked with Jake and Lotfi and Terrence, I knew they got it. I knew I could relax and trust these guys."



"It's not like we go to this poor bastard and pour love on him," she

said. "We receive, too. The gift is to realize that everybody has something to give. In prison, the gift of your presence is all you've got to give each other."

As a consultant to Tim Robbins and Susan Sarandon during the making of their film, Prejean was along for a lineby-line ride. Not so with McNally's libretto. But, other than chiding him for a few pre-Vatican II characteristics -"Every time they had me praying, it was these stock Catholic prayers like 'Hail Mary" — she has pronounced McNally's book "a beautiful distillation" of her story and message.

Heggie's music, she said, miraculously translates the complex set of emotions she experienced while serving as a spiritual adviser to five men who were executed at Angola. When she first heard him play the opera (at Frederica von Stade's home in Alameda), tears welled up in her eyes, and she asked Heggie, "How did you know?"

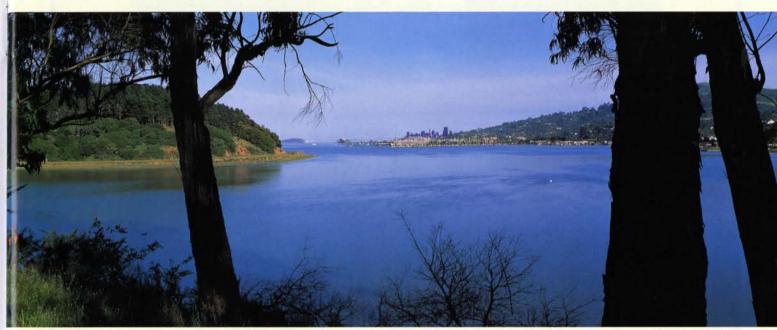
Like Heggie, McNally, Mansouri and Mantello, Prejean wants nothing to do with sermons from the stage.

"Preaching insults an audience's intelligence. It says, 'Let me tell you what you ought to think.' You've got to trust them to make their own journey," she said.

"Basically, all I have ever done is tell what happened to me. I was a witness to something that most people never get that close to. Through telling my story, I'm going to get them there so they can decide for themselves. When you do that, you're not the reality, but you're a sort of piece of glass that the light of reality shines through. And people can come through you to reach the reality."

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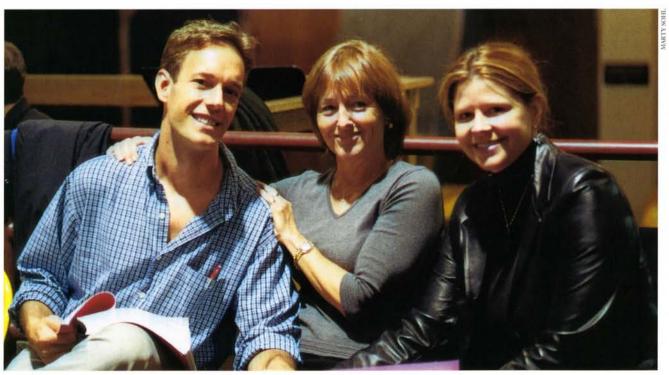

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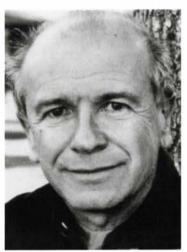
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Considered one of the major figures in contemporary American theater, playwright/librettist TERRENCE McNALLY's successes include Bad Habits, which won an Obie Award; The Ritz, which was later made into a movie; Frankie and Johnny in the Clair de Lune, which was also adapted for film; Lips Together, Teeth Apart; It's Only a Play; A Perfect Ganesh; The Lisbon Traviata; Corpus Christi; and the book for the musical The Rink. In recent years he has collected four Tony Awards for his work on Broadway: Best Book of a Musical (1993) - Kiss of the Spider Woman; Best Play (1995) - Love! Valour! Compassion!, later adapted by McNally into a film directed by Joe Mantello; Best Play (1996) -Master Class; and Best Book of a Musical (1998) - Ragtime. He has written a number of TV scripts (including "Andre's Mother" for which he won an Emmy Award), and last season wrote his first opera libretto (The Food of Love with music by Robert Beaser) as part of the triptych Central Park, produced by New York City Opera and televised on PBS. He has also written the books for two Broadway-bound musicals — The Full Monty and The Visit. Terrence McNally has received two Guggenheim Fellowships, a Rockefeller Grant, a Lucille Lortel Award, and a citation from the American Academy of Arts and Letters. A member of the Dramatists Guild Council since 1970, he has been its vice-president since 1981.



HELEN PREJEAN was born and brought up in Baton Rouge, and has lived and worked in Louisiana all her life. She joined the Sisters of St. Joseph of Medaille in 1957 and has long been involved in community work among the indigent. Involvement with poor inner-city residents in the St. Thomas Housing Projects in New Orleans in 1981 led her to prison ministry where she counseled death row inmates in the Louisiana State Penitentiary, a ministry she continues today. She has accompanied five men to execution and witnessed their deaths. She also works with murder victims' families and founded "Survive," a victims' advocacy group in New Orleans. Sister Helen is the author of Dead Man Walking: An Eyewitness Account of the Death Penalty in the U.S., which was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize. She was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 1998 and again in 1999. She has received many awards, including the Laetare Medal from Notre Dame and the Champion of Liberty Award from the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. Sister Helen has received 20 honorary degrees, including ones from Georgetown University, Amherst, the University of Glasgow and the University of San Francisco. She is honorary chairperson of Hands Off Cain, an international group based in Rome working for the abolition of the death penalty, a member of Amnesty International and the U.S. National Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty, where she served as a board member for 10 years.

ARTIST PROFILES



One of the most sought-after singers of the day, mezzo-soprano SUSAN GRAHAM is a regular guest on the world's leading opera, concert and recital stages, in addition to having a growing list of recordings. A participant in the 1987 Merola Opera Program, she made her 1990 San Francisco Opera debut as Minerva in *Il Ritorno d'Ulisse in Patria* and returned here in 1993 to portray Annius in *La Clemenza di Tito*. A frequent guest at the Metropolitan Opera since her 1991 debut, the artist most recently performed there

in the world premiere of John Harbison's The Great Gatsby (Jordan Baker), Le Nozze di Figaro (Cherubino) and Der Rosenkavalier (Octavian). Other recent appearances include La Damnation de Faust with Seiji Ozawa at the Saito Kinen Festival; Ariadne auf Naxos (the Composer) with Munich's Bavarian State Opera; Der Rosenkavalier with the Royal Opera at Covent Garden; and the title role of Iphigénie en Tauride at the Salzburg Festival. Graham celebrates the art of song with a 1999-2000 recital tour of major venues including Amsterdam's Concertgebouw, London's Wigmore Hall, New York's Alice Tully Hall, and leading concert halls in Germany, Austria, Spain, Canada and France, among others. Her discography includes three solo recordings Berlioz: Les nuits d'été, an award-winning disc of Reynaldo Hahn songs, La Belle Epoque, and the recent Songs of Ned Rorem — in addition to Schumann's Scenes from Faust, Stravinsky's Pulcinella, a collaboration with Renée Fleming and Barbara Bonney entitled Strauss Heroines, and complete recordings of Falstaff, Roméo et Juliette, Béatrice et Bénédict and La Damnation de Faust. A native of New Mexico, Susan Graham earned a master of music degree from the Manhattan School of Music. She is a winner of the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions, the Schwabacher Award from the Merola Opera Program, and a recipient of a career grant from the Richard Tucker Foundation.



Mezzo-soprano KRISTINE JEPSON made her 1990 San Francisco Opera debut in *Suor Angelica* and was seen here the following season in *War and Peace* and *Elektra*. She most recently sang three roles (Wardrobe Mistress, Schoolboy, Groom) in our 1998 staging of *Lulu*. The Iowaborn artist made her Metropolitan Opera debut during the 1993–94 season in *Death in Venice*. Since then, she has returned to the Met as Cherubino in *Le Nozze di Figaro*, Siebel in *Faust*, Stephano in *Roméo et Juliette*, and Lola in *Caval-*

leria Rusticana. She has also appeared with such companies as the Dallas Opera, Canadian Opera Company, Cincinnati Opera, Florida Grand Opera, New York City Opera, Washington Opera, Opera Theatre of St. Louis and the Cleveland Opera. Recent highlights include The Crucible (Elizabeth Proctor) with Washington Opera; Il Barbiere di Siviglia (Rosina) at New York City Opera; Bluebeard's Castle (Judith) with Vancouver Opera; Ariadne auf Naxos (the Composer) for Santa Fe Opera; La Clemenza di Tito (Annius) with Dallas Opera; and Così fan tutte (Dorabella) at Florida Grand Opera. Forthcoming are Der Rosenkavalier (Octavian) at the Met, Le Nozze di Figaro for Washington Opera; and Faust for her bow at the Paris Opéra Bastille. Her concert engagements have included her debut at New York's Alice Tully Hall (Falla's El Amor Brujo) with the New York Chamber Symphony under Gerard Schwarz and Bernstein's Jeremiah Symphony with the American Symphony Orchestra.

Mezzo-soprano FREDERICA VON STADE, at the peak of an extraordinary career, continues to be one of the world's most beloved and admired artists. A guest of the world's great opera houses, her versatility and interest in a broad spectrum of musical styles and dramatic characterizations continues to impress. At ease as the heroines of Rossini's *La Cenerentola* and *Il Barbiere di Siviglia*, she is also an excellent stylist in French repertoire and is one of the favorite interpreters of the great "trouser roles" — from Strauss's Octavian and Composer to Mozart's Idamante and Cherubino. Now a Bay Area resident, she made her San Francisco Opera debut as Sextus in the 1971 Spring Opera production of *Titus* (*La Clemenza di Tito*) and has since returned on numerous occa-



sions, most recently in a role she created, Marquise de Merteuil in the 1994 world premiere of *The Dangerous Liaisons* (subject of a nationwide telecast), as Mélisande in our 1997 staging of *Pelléas et Mélisande*, and as Countess Geschwitz in *Lulu* in 1998. Since her 1970 Metropolitan Opera debut, she has sung nearly all of her great roles there (earlier this year, to celebrate the 30th anniversary of her Met debut, the company mounted a new production of *The Merry Widow* specifically for her), as well as at

San Francisco Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago and many other leading American theaters. Her career in Europe is no less spectacular, with new productions mounted for her at Milan's La Scala, London's Covent Garden, Vienna State Opera and the Paris Opera. Von Stade's numerous recordings have garnered six Grammy nominations, two Grand Prix du Disc awards, the Deutsches Schallplattenpreis, Italy's Premio della Critica Discografica and "Best of the Year" citations by Stereo Review, Opera News and other publications. An eminent recitalist worldwide, she is also familiar to audiences through numerous international television specials. The holder of four honorary doctorates, including one from her alma mater, the Mannes School of Music, Frederica von Stade was awarded France's highest honor in the arts when she was appointed an officer of L'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres in 1998.



While a student at Shorter College in Rome, Georgia, THERESA HAMM-SMITH began her career by winning several important competitions including the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions where she was a national finalist. She went on to win the Grand Prix Lyrique in Monte Carlo and was awarded a Career Development Grant from Opera Index, Inc. The soprano, a former member of the Houston Opera Studio, has appeared at the Metropolitan Opera (Parsifal,

Die Frau ohne Schatten), New Jersey State Opera (Nabucco), Wexford Festival (Leoncavallo's Zazà) and Salzburg Festival. Her portrayal of Serena in Houston Grand Opera's production of Porgy and Bess has been applauded in the U.S., Germany, France, Japan, England, Australia and New Zealand. The American artist made her Carnegie Hall debut with Verdi's Requiem and later performed this work with the Knoxville Symphony. Theresa Hamm-Smith has also sung in concert with the Atlanta Symphony, San Antonio Symphony, Louisiana Symphony, Brooklyn Philharmonic, Phoenix Symphony, St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, New Jersey Symphony and with the Grace Bumbry Vocal Ensemble, among others.



CATHERINE COOK has been featured in a wide range of roles with leading companies throughout the United States. Since her 1991 debut season in War and Peace and Elektra, the mezzo-soprano has appeared with San Francisco Opera in Boris Godunov, Christophe Colomb, The Makropulos Case, Ruslan and Lyudmila, Faust, Prince Igor, Il Barbiere di Siviglia, Le Nozze di Figaro, L'Incoronazione di Poppea, Arabella, Peter Grimes, our 1999 Ring cycle (Rossweisse, Second Norn) and Louise (Gertrude) last season. A 1990

Merola Opera Program participant and 1991–92 Adler Fellow, the mezzo's credits for the Opera Center include the title role of Ariodame, Meg Page in The Merry Wives of Windsor, and an acclaimed Schwabacher Debut Recital. A native of Chicago, the artist made her 1994 Lyric Opera of Chicago debut as the Innkeeper in Boris Godunov, followed by Berta in Il Barbiere di Siviglia. A winner of the prestigious 1997 ARIA Foundation Award, **NICOLLE FOLAND** is establishing herself as a leading soprano in many prominent theaters. Associated with San Francisco Opera for many seasons, the former Adler Fellow has been seen here in over 10 productions, foremost among them *Le Nozze di Figaro* (Countess), *Carmen* (Micaëla), *Die Fledermaus* (Rosalinde), *Eugene Onegin* (one performance as Tatyana), 1999's *Ring* cycle staging of *Das Rheingold* (Freia), in addition to *La Bohème* (Musetta)

and Don Giovanni (Donna Anna). In addition, she appeared as soloist in a concert with Plácido Domingo and made her San Francisco recital debut as part of the Opera Center's 1997 Schwabacher Debut Recital series. Other Opera Center credits include Adele and Rosalinda in Die Fledermaus; Donna Anna in Don Giovanni; and Tina in the 1996 Showcase production of Argento's The Aspern Papers. In recent seasons she has made debuts with Los Angeles Opera, Seattle Opera and Spain's Opera Bilbao as Musetta, and also as Micaëla in Cincinnati, the First Lady (Die Zauberflöte) in Los Angeles, and in the title role of La Traviata at Festival Opera of Walnut Creek. Last year, she made bows with Boston Lyric Opera and the Opera Company of Philadelphia (Mozart's Countess), Minnesota Opera (her first Desdemona in Verdi's Otello), with Lyric Opera of Chicago and Houston Grand Opera (Traviata's Violetta), and with Baltimore Opera (Musetta). Future plans include Falstaff (role debut as Alice Ford) with Michigan Opera Theatre and a new staging of Mitridate, re di Ponto (Sifare) for her Santa Fe Opera debut. The soprano also frequently appears with leading symphony orchestras. The native of Des Moines received a master of music degree from the University of Northern Iowa and currently resides with her husband in San Francisco.



Originally from Capetown, South Africa, secondyear Adler Fellow **DONITA VOLKWIJN** made her first San Francisco Opera appearances last season, performing in *Louise* (Irma), *Nabucco* (Anna), *La Bobème* (Mimi) and *Parsifal* (Flower Maiden). She recently made her professional U.S. recital debut as part of San Francisco Opera Center's Schwabacher Debut Recital series. Other Opera Center credits include Fiordiligi in last year's Showcase production of *Così fan tutte* and Pamina in the 1998 Merola Opera Program

staging of *The Magic Flute*. (She returns to the stage of the War Memorial in the same role in January.) The artist has also performed with the Bronx Opera, where she sang Donna Anna in *Don Giovanni*, Mariane in *Tartuffe*, and Adina in *The Elixir of Love*, a role she repeated with Milwaukee's Skylight Opera. The soprano made her European debut last season with concert performances at the International Opera Center of the Netherlands. A national winner of the Leontyne Price Vocal Arts Competition and a district winner of the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions, she was an apprentice with the Ezio Pinza Council for American Singers of Opera and with Lyric Opera Cleveland, where she appeared as Frasquita in *Carmen*. Volkwijn earned her bachelor's degree in vocal performance from the Oberlin Conservatory and her Master of Music degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music.



American baritone JOHN PACKARD is quickly garnering national prominence on the opera stage. He scored an impressive critical and public success last year in the title role of *Billy Budd* for the Lyric Opera of Kansas City. His first appearance with New York City Opera was as Marcello in *La Bobème*, a role he has also performed with the Opera Company of Philadelphia and in Franco Zeffirelli's production at the New Israeli Opera. Additional operatic highlights include Sharpless in *Madama Butterfly* with Dallas

Opera, Greater Buffalo Opera and at La Fenice in Venice; Valentin (role debut) in Faust in a new David Alden production at the Vienna Volk-

soper; in addition to two City Opera tours (Figaro/Il Barbiere di Siviglia, Marcello/La Bohème). He recently added to his repertoire the part of Eisenstein in Die Fledermaus, performing the role for Calgary Opera. In concert, he has performed with, among others, the Paris Orchestre Colonne (Silvio/Pagliacci) and the Haifa Symphony (his first performances of Carmina Burana). Packard was the recipient of the Clarisse Kampel Grant from the Richard Tucker Foundation on two occasions, and was a prize-winner of the Puccini, Loren Zachary, MacAllister and Liederkranz competitions.



At the age of 20, TEDDY TAHU RHODES was awarded the Dame Sister Mary Leo Scholarship as New Zealand's most promising singer. After studies at London's Guildhall School of Music and Drama, the baritone was a finalist in the Kathleen Ferrier Award Competition and last year represented New Zealand in the Cardiff Singer of the World Competition. He frequently appears in his native country with major opera, concert and choral groups. His 1998 New Zealand engagements included Marcello in La

Bohème for Canterbury Opera, Méphistophélès in a concert version of Faust for Church City Choir, Tippett's A Child of Our Time with the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra and Escamillo in an arena staging of Carmen in Auckland. Recent operatic highlights include an acclaimed 1998 debut with Opera Australia as Dandini in La Cenerentola, Sharpless in Madama Butterfly with Canterbury Opera, Silvio in Pagliacci and Marcello for Opera New Zealand, as well as a return to Sydney for The Marriage of Figaro (The Count) and A Midsummer Night's Dream (Demetrius). Foremost among his recent concert engagements are a debut with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra (Mozart's Coronation Mass); the Messiah and Fauré's Requiem with Queensland Symphony Orchestra; Messiah and Bach's St. John Passion with the Sydney Philharmonic; and his recording debut as baritone soloist in Fauré's La Naissance de Vénus and Requiem. Next season, Rhodes will join Opera Australia as a resident principal artist, performing the roles of Guglielmo in Così fan tutte, Count Boni in Kálmán's The Gypsy Princess, Belcore in L'Elisir d'Amore and the Herald in Lobengrin.



Since his 1989 San Francisco Opera debut season in *Lulu* and *Falstaff*; **GARY RIDEOUT** has appeared with the Company in *Rigoletto* and *Die Fledermaus* (1990); as Count Hauk-Sendorf in *The Makropulos Case* and Balthasar Zorn in *Die Meistersinger* (1993); Heinrich in *Tambäuser* (1994); Yeroshka in *Prince Igor* (1996); Flavio in *Norma*, Reverend Horace Adams in *Peter Grimes* and Pang in *Turandot* (1998–99); also Mime in the *Ring* Festival (1999). Formerly a Resident Artist with the Canadian Opera Company of

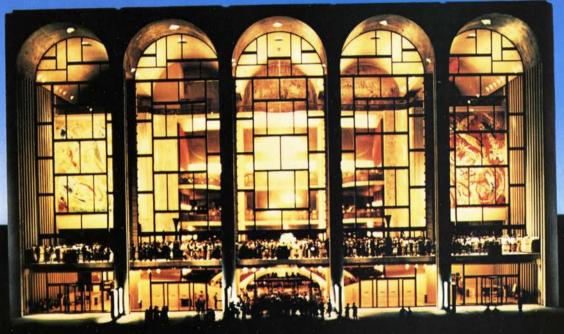
Toronto, the tenor has been heard in that house in numerous productions. Among his most recent performances are Salome with Cincinnati Opera; Števa in Jenitja with Montreal Opera; Avito in L'Amore dei Tre Re with Victoria's Pacific Opera; Cavaradossi in Tosca for Hawaii Opera Theatre and Pacific Opera; the Tempter/Abbot in Britten's The Prodigal Son with Festival Canada, Ottawa; his first Loge in Das Rheingold for Arizona Opera; and the Witch in Hänsel und Gretel with the Canadian Opera Company. Concert engagements include the Verdi Requiem with the Victoria (B.C.), Edmonton and Charlotte Symphonies; Beethoven's Ninth with the Baltimore, New Mexico and Milwaukee Symphonies; Mahler's Eighth at Carnegie Hall; in addition to Handel's Messiah, Mozart's Vespers of the Confessor and Bruckner's Third Mass with the Montréal Symphony Orchestra. The versatile artist also performed the role of Ubaldo Piangi in The Phantom of the Opera on Broadway.

ROBERT ORTH is a leading baritone with major opera companies including those in San Francisco, New York City, Chicago, Toronto, Washington, D.C., Houston, Seattle, Los Angeles, San Diego, Miami, Calgary and many others. He made his 1993 Company debut as Beckmesser in *Die Meistersinger* and was seen here in the title role of *Harvey Milk* (a part he created at Houston Grand Opera) in 1996. His repertoire ranges from world premieres and revivals of rarely performed works (such as *Six Characters in Search of an Author* and *Rosina*), to the standard repertory, including *La Bobème*, *Faust*, *Don Pasquale*, *L'Elisir*

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d'Amore, and one of his signature roles, Figaro in Il Barbiere di Siviglia. Among his career highlights are his New York City Opera debut as Eisenstein in Die Fledermaus (for which he was selected "Debut Artist of the Year"); his portrayal of John Buchanan, Jr. in Hoiby's Summer and Smoke which was telecast on PBS; Danilo in The Merry Widow at Seattle Opera (a portrayal for which he was named Artist of the Year); the Lodger in The Aspern Papers for Washington Opera; and Papageno in The Magic Flute in Manila. Among

the highlights of his most recent engagements are *Die Fledermaus* in Miami and Seattle; *Falstaff* (Ford) in Los Angeles, Cincinnati and Philadelphia; the title part of *Giamii Schicchi* (role debut) and *Hansel and Gretel* (his first performances of the Witch) in Indianapolis; *La Cenerentola* (Dandini) in Philadelphia; *Madama Butterfly* (Sharpless) in Cleveland; *Candide* (Voltaire/Pangloss) in Austin; and *Six Characters in Search of an Author* (the Father) with the Opera Festival of New Jersey. The native of Chicago's recordings include Menotti's *The Telephone*, *Six Characters* and *Harvey Milk*, the latter conducted by Donald Runnicles.



JAY HUNTER MORRIS is establishing himself as one of the most promising tenors on the operatic and concert scene today. In the 1998–99 season he made his San Francisco Opera debut as Mitch in the world premiere of *A Streetcar Named Desire*, his Opera Pacific debut as Pinkerton in *Madama Butterfly*, and his bow at Seattle Opera as Anatol in *Vanessa*. Engagements during the 1999–2000 season thus far have included *Butterfly* at the New Jersey Festival; the Noctambulist in S. F. Opera's new

production of *Louise*; Jeník in *The Bartered Bride* for his bow at the Opéra du Rhin in Strasbourg; *Pagliacci* (Canio) with Houston Grand Opera; *Streetcar* for his New Orleans Opera debut; and Sam Polk in *Susamnah* at Kentucky Opera. Morris also created the role of Tony in Terrence McNally's play, *Master Class*, at the Philadelphia Theatre Company. He continued in the part in Los Angeles, Washington, D.C., and in New York City, with his characterization on Broadway earning him an "Outstanding Debut of an Actor" nomination from the Outer Critics Circle. Among the Texas native's future engagements are *Madama Butterfly* for Seattle Opera and Utah Opera, as well as a return to the Company for several important roles.



During San Francisco Opera's 1999–2000 Season, **DAVID OKERLUND** appeared as Marcello in *La Bobème*, in the title role of *Don Giovami*, and was seen in the Company's 1999 *Ring* cycle as Donner in *Das Rheingold* and Gunther in *Götterdämmerung*. The previous season here, he sang the roles of Stanley in the final performance of *A Streetcar Named Desire* and Sharpless in *Madama Butterfly*. Since his 1995 bow with San Francisco Opera, the baritone has performed in numerous Company

productions including Eugene Onegin (title role), Lobengrin (King's Herald), Die Fledermaus (Eisenstein), Le Nozze di Figaro (Count Almaviva) and La Bohème (Schaunard). The former Adler Fellow's credits for the Opera Center include participation in the Merola Opera Program (1993–94), tours with Western Opera Theater (Falke in Fledermaus, title role of Don Giovanni), the Showcase presentation of The Aspern Papers (The Lodger) and a Schwabacher Debut Recital. Additional credits include Germont in La Traviata for Vancouver Opera, the title role of Don Giovanni at Mississippi Opera, Donner in Arizona Opera's production of Das Rheingold, Guglielmo in Così fan tutte for Opera Carolina and Piedmont Opera Theater, as well as Madama Butterfly in Honolulu and Tokyo. Earlier this year he was applauded as Stanley in San Diego Opera's presentation of Streetcar. Among his forthcoming engagements are Streetcar for the Pittsburgh Symphony and Strasbourg's Opéra National du Rhin, The Rake's Progress (Nick Shadow) in Vancouver, Salome (Jokanaan) in Honolulu, and Le Nozze di Figaro (Figaro) in Tulsa. A native of Kearney, Nebraska, Okerlund earned his bachelor and master of music degrees from the University of Missouri - Kansas City Conservatory of Music.



Second year Adler Fellow **JOHN AMES** made his first appearances with San Francisco Opera last season as Tom in *Un Ballo in Maschera* and as Colline in *La Bobème*. The bass was seen as Superintendent Budd in S.F. Opera Center's 2000 Showcase presentation of *Albert Herring* and appeared as Don Alfonso in the 1999 Showcase production of *Così fan tutte*. The native of Reno was a participant in the 1998 Merola Opera Program, in which he sang the role of Sarastro in *The Magic Flute*. A recipient of the

Anna Ross Foundation Scholarship for Apprentice Artists, Ames studied voice while performing nearly a dozen roles at Nevada Opera including Colline, the Speaker (*The Magic Flute*) and the Old Hebrew (*Samson et Dalila*). A winner of the Elsie Sweeney Scholarship, he studied with Giorgio Tozzi at Indiana University where his credits included Sparafucile in *Rigoletto* and the Commendatore in *Don Giovanni*. After leaving I.U., he made debuts with Indianapolis Opera and Kentucky Opera, and toured with the Nevada Opera Studio as Sulpice in *The Daughter of the Regiment*. In concert, he has performed Mozart's *Coronation Mass* and Requiem with the Reno Philharmonic.



Second-year Adler Fellow PHILIP HORST made his first appearances with the Company last season as Leporello in *Don Giovanni*, the Second Knight of the Grail in *Parsifal*, and the Keeper of the Madhouse in *The Rake's Progress*. The baritone's additional recent engagements include *The Mother of Us All* (Ulysses S. Grant) at New York City Opera and *La Traviata* (Baron Douphol) at Dallas Opera. A 1999 Merola Opera Program participant, Horst performed in Western Opera Theater's tour of *Don Giovanni*,

in which he sang the title role as well as the part of Leporello, and was seen as Mustafa in the Merola staging of L'Italiana in Algeri. Among other credits are Méphistophélès in Faust, Dr. Miracle in The Tales of Hoffmann, Abimelech and the Old Hebrew in Samson et Dalila, Cesare in Giulio Cesare, Superintendent Budd in Albert Herring, Dulcamara in L'Elisir d'Amore and Older Rimbaud in the world premiere of Harold Blumenfeld's Seasons in Hell. A national winner in the 1998 Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions and a first place winner in the 1996 Corbett Opera Scholarship Competition, Horst, a native of Lansing, Michigan, earned his bachelor's degree from Goshen College and his master of music in vocal performance at the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.



Actor/singer ELI BORGGRAEFE is a recent graduate of San Francisco State, where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Music. The tenor's recent Bay Area theatrical credits include the U.S. regional premiere of Side Show and the world premiere of Everything's Ducky with Theatreworks in Palo Alto, Follies, Big River, The Who's Tommy and The Music Man with San Jose's American Musical Theatre; Forever Plaid and Blood Brothers with the Palo Alto Players; and Fumny Face with 42nd St. Moon. The Bay Area native is

also a graduate of the American Conservatory Theater's Summer Training Congress and AMTSJ's Theatre Artists' Institute.



Music Director at Houston Grand Opera and the Company's recently-appointed Principal Guest Conductor, PATRICK SUMMERS has had a long and fruitful association with San Francico Opera. He served as Music Director of the Opera Center from 1990–1994 and made his Company conducting debut in 1990 with performances of Die Fledermaus. He has since led SFO productions of Così fan tutte, La Traviata, Rossini's Ermione (U.S. premiere) and Otello, L'Elisir d'Amore, Tosca, La Bobème, La Fille du Régiment, La Cenerentola,

Faust, Il Barbiere di Siviglia, Rigoletto, Guillaume Tell, L'Incoronazione di Poppea (in his own realization), Carmen, four performances of the world premiere of André Previn's A Streetcar Named Desire, Norma and last

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season's new production of Louise. Maestro Summers has numerous credits for the various programs of the Opera Center - Showcase presentations, Merola Opera Program productions, and Western Opera Theater tours. He has traveled extensively for the Center, leading performances of Carmen in Guam and Japan, Tosca in Shanghai and La Bohème in Japan. Elsewhere, he has been applauded at the Metropolitan Opera (a 1998 debut with Die Fledermaus), Lisbon's Teatro Nacional São Carlos (Tosca, Ariadne auf Naxos), Rome Opera (Manon Lescaut), Opera Australia (Die Entführung aus dem Serail, La Cenerentola, La Bohème, Lucrezia Borgia, Werther, Iphigénie en Tauride, Rinaldo, Madama Butterfly (available on video), Houston Grand Opera (Traviata; world premieres of Machover's Resurrection, Floyd's Cold Sassy Tree and Adamo's Little Women; L'Elisir d'Amore), Dallas Opera (Poppea, The Tempest), Opéra de Bordeaux (Don Pasquale) and Seattle Opera (Bohème), among others. He led a 1998 concert tour (London, Amsterdam, Paris, Berlin, Rotterdam) with Olga Borodina and Dimitri Hvorostovsky which resulted in a recording of arias and duets with Summers leading the English Chamber Orchestra. The artist was named "Outstanding Young San Franciscan" by the S.F. Chamber of Commerce in 1991, and in 1997 won the Stolichnaya Artist of the Year Award.



Director/actor JOE MANTELLO is best known for his work for the New York stage, both on and off Broadway. A native of Illinois, he graduated from the North Carolina School of the Arts and subsequently joined the prestigious Circle Repertory Company as an actor and a director. Mantello's Broadway directing credits include Proposals and Terrence McNally's Love! Valour! Compassion! (also at Manhattan Theatre Club and The Geffen Playhouse). Additional credits include

the recent bash by Neil LaBute at the Douglas Fairbanks Theater; The Vagina Monologues; Another American: Asking and Telling; McNally's Corpus Christi; The Mineola Twins at the Roundabout Theatre; Mizlansky/Zilinsky or "schmucks" and Blue Window at Manhattan Theatre Club; God's Heart at Lincoln Center; The Santaland Diaries at The Atlantic Theater; Lillian at the Goodman Theatre and Playwright's Horizons, Snakebit at New York Stage & Film, Imagining Brad, Bahylon Gardens and Three Hotels at Circle Rep; House at the Bay Street Theatre Festival; as well as Fat Men in Skirts and Nebraska at Naked Angels. He also directed the 1997 film version of Love! Valour! Compassion!. As an actor he has appeared in Angels in America (Tony nomination) and The Baltimore Waltz. Mantello has been the recipient of the Outer Critics Circle, Drama Desk, Helen Hayes, Clarence Derwent, Obie, and Joe A. Callaway awards. He is an Associate Artist with the Roundabout Theatre.



MICHAEL YEARGAN's designs are featured in three new productions during our 2000–2001 Season: Luisa Miller, Dead Man Walking and Simon Boccanegra. The Texas native is a professor of stage design at the Yale School of Drama and the resident designer for the Yale Repertory Theatre, where he has designed more than 50 productions. Since his San Francisco Opera debut with the 1993 staging of I Puritani, his sets and costumes have been seen

here in new productions of La Bohème (summer 1996, 1999-2000), Carmen (1996-97, 1998 Femmes Fatales Festival), Madama Butterfly (summer 1997, 1998-99), Rigoletto (1997-98) and the world premiere staging of A Streetcar Named Desire (1998-99). Yeargan's North American opera credits include designs for the Metropolitan Opera (premiere of Harbison's The Great Gatsby, Ariadne auf Naxos, Otello, Così fan tutte, Susannah); Los Angeles Opera (Stiffelio, Hänsel und Gretel); Lyric Opera of Chicago (premiere of Bolcom's A View from the Bridge, Antony and Cleopatra, Susannah, Nabucco); Dallas Opera (Vanessa, Rigoletto, Bohème); Houston Grand Opera (premiere of Floyd's Cold Sassy Tree, Susannah); and Glimmerglass Opera (premiere of Central Park, La Finta Giardiniera, Butterfly), among others. Internationally, he has designed productions for Welsh National Opera (Beatrice and Benedict, Eugene Onegin, Norma, Bohème, The Merry Widow, Cavalleria Rusticana, Pagliacci); Covent Garden (Stiffelio, Simon Boccanegra, Aida, Attila); Scottish Opera (La Forza del Destino, Bohème); Théâtre Musical de Paris (Die Zauberflöte); Frankfurt Opera (Così fan tutte) and Opera Australia (Werther, La Traviata, Il Barbiere di Siviglia).



SAM FLEMING's costume designs have been seen at theaters across the country including the Alley Theatre in Houston, Atlanta's Alliance Theater Company, the Hartford Stage, Denver Center Theatre, Buffalo Studio Arena, Center Stage in Baltimore, StageWest in Springfield, MA, Houston Opera Studio, Skylight Opera Theatre, Texas Opera Theatre, Arizona Theatre Company, Georgia Shakespeare Festival and Berkeley Repertory Theatre

(Craig Lucas's award-winning *Reckless*). She designed over 50 productions for Milwaukee Repertory Theater during her 14 years with the company. Fleming received the Los Angeles Drama Critics Circle Award for her designs for the Dr. Seuss-inspired *A Midsummer Night's Dream* at the Westwood Playhouse. Off-Broadway, she has worked with the Manhattan Class Company and The Womens' Project at American Place Theatre. In the commercial side of the industry, she is the Associate Costume Designer for *The Phantom of the Opera*. Next year she will join the faculty at her alma mater, Temple University, to teach costume design in the MFA program.



Chorus director and conductor at the San Francisco Opera since 1987, IAN ROBERTSON made his Company conducting debut with the 1988 production of Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk and has since led performances of Falstaff, Lobengrin, Rigoletto, La Traviata, Don Carlo, Turandot, Il Trovatore and La Bobème. In addition to his highly praised work with the Opera Chorus, he has led the Opera Orchestra and Chorus in many concerts. Additional assignments include Opera Center's productions of The Italiam Girl in

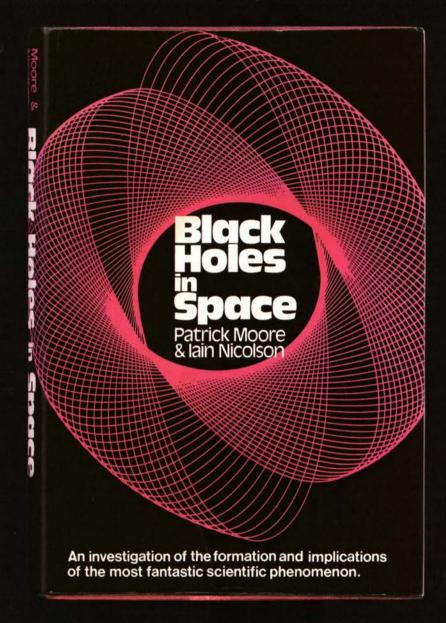

She has been awarded two "Bessies" and an "Olivier" for her work in dance. Her work in the theater has resulted in numerous honors including a Joseph Jefferson Award, a

Drama-Logue Award, an Obie, two Drama Desk Awards and two Tonys. Tipton has been an artistic associate with the American Repertory Theatre in Cambridge, MA, and the Goodman Theatre in Chicago.
